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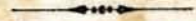

COURSE OF STUDIES.

FOR ADMISSION TO THE FRESHMAN CLASS.

A candidate is required to have studied carefully the English, Latin and Greek Grammars, including Prosody.

Ancient and Modern Geography.

Arithmetic.

Algebra, through Equations of Second Degree.

Cæsar's Commentaries, four books.

Virgil's *Æneid*, six books.

All of Sallust.

Four of Cicero's Orations.

All of Jacobs' Greek Reader.

Xenophon's *Anabasis*, six books.

Candidates for a more advanced class will be examined on all the studies already pursued by the class they wish to join.

FRESHMAN YEAR.

FIRST TERM.

Three Books of Livy, (Lincoln's,) Latin Prose Composition, two books of Herodotus, Arnold's Greek Prose Composition, Greek Testament, Greek and Roman Antiquities (Fisk's,) Algebra, Ancient History.

SECOND TERM.

Horace, (to Satires,) Homer's *Iliad*, six books, Ancient Geography and Mythology, Geometry, Ancient History.

SOPHOMORE CLASS.

FIRST TERM.

Horace completed, Demosthenes or *Æschines*, Latin and Greek Exercises, Plane Trigonometry and its applications, (Loomis') Ancient History.

SECOND TERM.

Tacitus, Terence or Plautus, (one Play,) Euripides or Sophocles, Latin and Greek Prose Composition and Antiquities, Spherical Trigonometry, Surveying, Analytical Geometry, (Loomis') Ancient History, Blair's Rhetoric.

JUNIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM.

One of Cicero's Rhetorical or Philosophical Works, Thucydides or one of Plato's Dialogues, Greek and Roman Antiquities, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, History.

SECOND TERM.

Juvenal and Persius or Lucretius, *Æschylus* or Aristophanes, Calculus, Chemistry, Lectures on Agricultural Chemistry, Logic, Modern History.

SENIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM.

Moral Philosophy, Evidences of Christianity, Astronomy, Natural Philosophy, Mineralogy, Modern History, Kames' Elements of Criticism.

SECOND TERM.

Mental Philosophy, Political Economy, Evidences of Christianity, Astronomy, Geology, Modern History, Kames' Elements of Criticism.

Compositions and Declamation required throughout the course; and the Senior Class deliver Original Speeches.

EXPENSES.

The College is conducted on the non-resident system. Students can procure Boarding in the Village at from \$10 to \$12 per month.

TERMS AND VACATIONS.

The First Term of the Scholastic Year begins on the first day of October, and ends on the third Wednesday of December.

The second Term begins on the third Wednesday of January, and ends on the ~~fourth~~ Wednesday of July, which is COMMENCEMENT DAY.

The Preparatory School (exclusively classical) is under the charge of Robert W. Boyd, A. B.

Each Student is informed of the delinquencies reported against him, and has opportunity given for rendering a written excuse for the same, before they are acted on by the Faculty.

When the demerits of any Student, at any time during one session, shall have reached one hundred and fifty, he will be positively and immediately sent home; and will in no case be re-admitted into the Institution, except upon direct application, either in person or writing, from his parent or guardian, accompanied with satisfactory assurances from himself of future good conduct.

ADMISSION OF STUDENTS.

Applicants for admission are expected to bring written testimonials of moral character, and to stand a satisfactory examination on our published requisitions. After which, having procured boarding at some house approved by the President, (or in his absence by the Faculty,) and having procured his Treasurer's receipt for Tuition and contingent fee, (which contingent fee shall be Two Dollars each term,) he shall be allowed to take his place in the class assigned him.

The Faculty shall keep a Register, in which shall be recorded the name and residence of every Student, his age, date of admission, dismissal, or graduation, together with the name and post office of his father or guardian.

EXERCISES.

There shall be one Recitation on Saturday, and three on every other day, at such hours as the Faculty may appoint.

There shall be devotional exercises every morning and evening, at which time every Student is expected to be present, and to behave with the seriousness and reverence proper to a religious assembly.

PUNISHMENT, CONDUCT, &c.

The Punishments shall be reproof, private or public, complaint made to parent or guardian, suspension or expulsion.

In a case of gross deficiency in study, a Student may be degraded to a lower class.

Where the intellectual or moral habits of a young man are such as to render the privileges of the College useless to him, or render his example hurtful to other Students, the parent or guardian will be requested to withdraw him.

Gaming, drunkenness, the use of profane or obscene language, visiting drinking houses, loitering idly about stores or public places, and all riotous, disorderly, and immoral conduct generally, are forbidden.

The Report of the President to Trustees shall refer particularly to all cases of gross misdemeanor or immorality, for which Students have been suspended or expelled.

The Students are strictly enjoined not to visit or walk on the streets during study hours; and they are expected at all times, and in all companies, (especially at their boarding houses and in all their intercourse with citizens of the village and vicinity,) to display that delicate regard for the rights and feelings of others, which is the sure test and unfailing characteristic of *the GENTLEMAN*.

A strict observance of the Sabbath, and habitual attendance on religious service, are enjoined on all the Students.
