Senior Seminar Visits Cherokee by Andrea Kelsey

Rain and cold temperatures did not stop a group of five senior ENVS majors from enjoying a camping trip to Cherokee, NC on May 3 and 4 accompanied by Reverend Ron Robinson, Dr. John Simmons, Dr. Kaye Savage, and Professor John Lane. The trip began with a visit to The Museum of the Cherokee Indian where the highlight was talking with Jerry Wolfe, recently named the tribe's "Beloved Man", the first Cherokee man to hold this title since 1801. Jerry shared Cherokee tales of creation and the interactions of the animal world.

The group then made their way to the Smoky Mountains National Park to observe elk that had been reintroduced to the area beginning in 2001 after being eliminated from the region due to habitat loss and over-hunting in the late 1700s. By dusk, a group of grown elk made their way out of the forest in preparation for sleeping in the open field where the Wofford group stood in observation.

After dining in Sylva, the Wofford group set camp near John Lane's mountain cabin. In the morning, renowned poet and nature writer Thomas Rain Crowe talked with the group about his experiences in the mountains of North Carolina and his own sustainable lifestyle. Fog and rain filled the mountains as the group descended the mountains from the Blue Ridge Parkway. While the beautiful vistas were not visible due to the weather, the mystery of the mountains reminded the entire group of the majesty of nature at all times.
