Honor System In Classes

These instructions were drawn up by student Honor Council members, representatives elected by you students.

1. While the Honor System is to be enforced by a Student Council, its success can be established only through active cooperattion of the Faculty.

2. In order to remove the temptation which is ever present where a student is within reading distance of his classmates' paper, students will be seated in every other seat where it is possible to do so.

3. Immediately preceding each examination or test, Instructors will remind their classes that they are governed by the Honor System.

4. Instructors will not police the class, or collect text books, or in any way obviously show mistrust of students' integrity during examinations or tests, but Instructors will remain with classes during examinations and tests.

5. In case a breach of the Honor System comes under the observation of an Instructor, he may report the matter in writing to the Honor Council or he may appear before the Council to give testimony on the matter.

 Students who detect cheating on examinations will report direct to the Honor Council.

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Editorial

As each succeeding Quintile "E" leaves Wofford, practically all of the men in the departing group, looking back at their stay in the 40th C. T. D., reach the conclusion that their time was well spent. They feel confident that the new skills they have acquired will enable them to make the grade in their further training. They admit that the physical training, hard as it was to take, has been good for them, and they are glad to have had a brief chance to take the controls of a training plane and "get the feel of the ship." But outside of the good times, the dances and the other recreations, the tendency among the men is to think their time at Wofford has been devoted to learning useful, purely mechanical tricks.

Some Aviation Students often complain when their professors break from the immedate subject at hand to bring out the background material behind it. Such students fail to see that the background shows how the foreground is developed, thus changing it from a clever manipulation which is not understood to a completely comprehended configuration, easily derived from its basic ideas. Perhaps these men may feel that such complete knowledge is unnecessary. However, superficial mentories are easily forgotten when they are needed most, when they are needed under fire. The only man who will remember necessary information is the man who fully understands it. For this reason, every digression of professors must be examined for the background material it contains. Students must stear clear of the idea that the intellectual skills gained at Wofford are mere tricks.

If students take the attitude that the academic routine is merely trick, they may get their bars on a "Wing and a Prayer."

Religious Services

Religious services are held on the post for the two weeks following the arrival of a new quintile. Although the services are especially for the new men, everyone is cordially invited to attend.

Catholic services are conducted, by the priests of St. Paul's Church, in room 206 of the Administration Building. Confessions are heard at 0730, and Mass begins at 0800.

Non-sectarian services, directed by Dr. Nesbitt, Professor Trawick, and James Craine, Wofford senior at Converse College, begin at 1000 in the chapel. As a special feature, several attractive young ladies from Converse College will lend their vocal talents, which should add much to the service.

Wings for Wofford

When aviation students first marched on the campus of Wofford College in March of this year, they, in a sense, began a new era with Wofford having only men in uniform. But in a larger sense they entered into a tradition begun many years ago.

Wofford's special interest in aviation became apparent when scores of men completed the prescribed government course in civilian pilot training.

Although Wofford's ROTC is an infantry unit, it is worth noting that about two hundred and fifty of the eleven hundred alumni in uniform are in the various flying units of the armed services. Most of the two hundred and fifty are members of the AAF.

Many Wofford Airmen have been decorated. Of the sixteen Wofford men decorated for gallantry so far in this war, ten have been fliers. Of these, nine are AAF men.

Since the Wofford sudent body organized itself into a voluntary military training unit in 1917, almost immediately upon the outbreak of the First World War, there has been organized military training of some type at Wofford.



Wofford Drops Close Meet

In a triangular track meet held last Wednesday, September 29, at P. C., Clinton, S. C., the Wofford College track team placed a very close second, losing out by two-thirds of a point. The host, P. C., lead the team score with 57 1-3; Wofford, 56 2-3; Erskine, 15. Two relay trophies were brought home and "Tex" Grantham won the individual trophy with his exciting pentathalon victory.

The first silver cup was won when the distance relay team of Fachndrich (440), Trough (220), Kolton (220), and Smith (880) came in first. The second cup was won in the last event and the important mile relay. Running successive quarters and winning by 80 yards were Fachndrich, Smith, Harris, and Janicula.

In the five-event contest, the pentathalon, "Tex" Grantham captured first in the 100, 880 and broad jump and second in the shot put and sixth in the rope climb, to gain the title and
