The table above presents a comparison of terminal usage figures for the periods September 1975 through August 1976 and September 1974 through August 1975. Total usage is more than five times greater than in 1974-75. Records of the number of different users were not available for the latter period but the number of accounts has increased to over 300.

USER DISTRIBUTION.

The table below gives the number of graduates in the classes of 1975 and 1976 who possessed account numbers for the use of the computer. As expected, a higher proportion of B.S. candidates had accounts than B.A. candidates. Forty-two Percent of all graduates in the class of 1975 had accounts; forty-seven percent of the class of 1976 had accounts—an increase of 5%.

Operating costs (based on connect hours) are \$3.42 per connect hour. This figure is .46 per hour less than that of the previous year.

NEW HARDWARE

Due to the significant increase in usage and users recorded above, it became necessary to add terminals to the system. A videoscope (VT50) and a LA36 were installed in July. There are now five public terminals in addition to the two in chemistry and the console.

In May, an optical-mark card reader was added to the system. This additional data-entry capability is especially suited for collecting data from a large number of scattered sources. The initial application for the reader will be in connection with the faculty evaluation procedure in which several thousand responses are tallied each semester.

Software Spotlight

During the year forty physics-chemistry programs were acquired. These are to be converted to a form suitable for the DEC system and will then be entered into the system library.
