Colonel.

I have the honor to report that a few men are working this morning at the large battery near Fort Johnson, and also, on Cummings Point, behind battery No. 2:

I have examined the point alluded to, by Mr. Fox, last night. A vessel, lying there, will be under the fire of thirteen guns from Fort Moultrie. And Capt. Foster says that, at the Pan-Coupe, or, immediately on its right, the best place for her to land, she would require soon at high tide, if drawing ten 10' fut., a staging of forty 40' fut. The department can decide what the chances will be of a safe debarkation and unloading, at that point, under these circumstances.
