Marshall May 17,

My dear Sir

I have this moment returned from Rusk
Cheroke County having been
absent ten days yesterday
I received yours of the 24th & the
alt & copy of letter to Dr. Fra-
nck. Your letter has extinguished
the last spark of hope for success
as I return to the practice of
my profession. I blame no one
for failure, God knows it is not
my fault. I have done all that
man could do & have had to
work here alone. If I could
have seen you or Mr Walker
or you could have been here
as I wished to see for yourselves
matters would have turned
out otherwise. All that was
wanting was money enough
to pay off some small debts
here & induce the return of
the Engineers. Any number
of hands could have been
employed & paid for in stock

or bands. Dr Powelke offered
to put 300 hundred bands on
the Road if we wanted rails
too. I have raised the 200 &
written him. During my visit
to Tyler I saw many pictures &
received assurance that 300 bands
would be placed before on the
Road & soon as the work can
commence. I do not mean when
Dr Powelke brings his bands
but as soon as the Board of
Directors meet & the Engineers
are here & the Route ^{is} determined
on. Send you an extract from
the Tyler Telegraph her before you go
will trust that you may see
that I am not coloring too highly
when I say that re-action has
taken place & I do not hesitate
to say that Shreve produced
it. It is useless to argue ^{modestly}
when it is not felt, Shreve had
to work alone. You can tell
how at my complaints about
hearing from you, you must
understand that these letters
were written before you may
have received. If this is taken

it was because I was left without
the information necessary for
a defense of Mr Walker & yourself.
You surely can forgive me for
some little impatience on such
a subject. I have up to this time
calculated certainly on a mat-
ter of the Directors here, now
it seems that nothing is to be done
till a meeting of the Legislature,
when advice to be asked. I assure
you that the only answer will
be an appeal of every Chamber. If
you will come on with only
Directors enough to form a quor-
um all will yet go well. Hyden
Sir, I have lately been forced to
speak upon the subject of your
coming & have pledged myself
by word all retraction that you
your coming & going to work. I
have done this in repaying to
President State system action in
which he says, that the plan
of building by companies has
failed, I have said that it
has not failed, That all started
was a few funds to have a major-
ity of the Directors here & the look

going on. Come for God sake & let
me fail if I can not & do not
get the hands I want in. If you
will run the Road to Jefferson
from the line & thence (a few
feet) practicable road) between

500 hands at work by the
1st July. I can add to the 500

will not come. Come yourself;
but I think he loves some-
thing to me & should not desert
me now. I have neglected all
other business. I have visited
Ccp, Upshur, Parshall, Rusk,
Cherokee & Smith counties & have
passed successfully in all of
them. I have seen or written
to G. W. Jones, The Clarksville
Standard, Dallas Herald, If.
for an Herald, Tyler Telegraph
have come out in favor of
the Company. The Republican

here is silenced. All is well, The
people are never not only ~~wor~~
eas inciting but anxious to
put labor on the Road & no-
thing is wanting but a meeting
of the Slave to see for the work
to commence, I do not know
what to add. I have written
& written & to no effect, & tell
you plainly that your per-
son is inspiring & that nothing
else is inspiring. If you have
been forced to sacrifice all your
pecuniary interest in the com-
munity but a temporary sac-
rifice come on and com-
plete the organization of your
Society as Director or President
of Mr Walker will resign as
I hope he will not will more
than compensate you. I would
not write you with the confidence
I do if I did not know that
I can do what I promise, If
you will come on as soon
as you receive this you will
be here during our Court & then

came be no better time for the
meeting. I shall not enumerate
to any one my change of plan
as I again hear from you
or see you. I suppose your things
look very difficult now from
what they did when I reached
home from Langley. Let me
again beg that in the receipt of
this you & Mr Walker & our
planned wife at once communicate
If you will we can not & will
not fail. We will bring out a
Candidate for you against
Peach on his strength &
can beat him in August, but
every thing depends on how
they help draw over. I have
all along felt the difficulty
of communicating by letter.
If you will only come on here
you will see that I can right
& that all is well. If you will
not I can not help it & I must
submit with such patience as
I can to part with all my
possessions & predictions. I am
willing to part with it in the
affinity of fifty thousand

right. If I can not I will
shut it by a passage to be
missed on the way. If you
would know what I have done
the promises I have made, the
confidence that has been re-
established you would see
any apparent heat or indepen-
tence of expression. Let me beg
you to believe that I am sin-
cere & your friend & that I have
been doing all in my power
to put you right before this
people and that I have suc-
ceeded. Natty's is now went
but that you should be hin-
ted to yourselves & your wife se-
cured in this point in due time
& will get all the credit for
this except, I shall go over
to Daffern tomorrow morning
by boat I remain & by his
testimony at the conclusion
of your letter & him about
diligent as a physician to the
signature for and I will
be death to the undertaking.
Let us go to work & when
that is done we can ap-

forward of my company. I must
conclude. Presenting kindest
