### PASTORAL ADDRESS.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN IN THE LORD,

Br the direction and in the behalf of the South Carolina Annual Conference, we now address you on several subjects, which we judge of vital importance to the best interests of religion in general, and of Methodism in particular.

And first, we believe it all-important that we sacredly guard and preserve from innovation the doctrines of the gospel, as they are expressed in that admirable form of sound words which we have received from our forefathers. This caution is the more necessary now, when so many efforts are made by men of all ranks, either to overthrow the whole fabric of Christianity, or so to neutralize the word of the gospel of God, by worldly maxims and the reasonings of fleshly wisdom, as to render it altogether inefficient as to the work of converting the soul and reforming the life. You will be in peculiar danger here, because you will not only be attacked by the vulgar and profane, but by more dangerous foes to be found in the ranks of literature, who may insidiously endeavour to overthrow your faith by all the arts of learned sophistry, and by all the power of persuasive eloquence. Nor is your danger lessened by the fact that all these efforts to destroy the foundation of your hope are made under the mask of a most amiable liberality. Dear brethren, we wish you to have deeply impressed on your minds the sacred importance of the great and essential principles of the gospel of Jesus. A man's creed has more influence on both his experience and practice than is generally apprehended.

In order that you may be well grounded in your own views of the gospel, and be able to defend them against the attacks of the adversaries of the truth, we would. remind you that religion requires knowledge, and a constant improvement in knowledge. We believe that it is as entirely necessary that a man should grow in Christian knowledge as it is that he be converted to God. There is great danger of our neglecting this improvement, and sinking into Antinomian stupidity and indolence. We would earnestly recommend to you the diligent study of the Holy Scriptures; not merely that you read them occasionally, but that you read them daily—that you read them regularly and prayerfully; and if you can combine the study of Coke's, Benson's, or Clarke's very valuable Commentaries on the Holy Scriptures, you will do well. We would also particularly recommend to you a careful and frequent perusal of the works of those eminent men of God, Wesley and Fletcher; from these, you will not only obtain correct views of the gospel generally, but will also be furnished with suitable arguments to defend those views of religion which have been embraced by us as a denomination of Christians. But while we thus earnestly exhort you to a diligent and careful observance of all the means necessary to the attainment of Christian knowledge, we would not forget to remind you that to know is not enough; there must be a living, a powerful, and a constant experience in the soul, of the power of those scriptural doctrines which we have embraced, or else all our knowledge will be unavailing.

We would affectionately and earnestly exhort you to a conscientious and diligent observance of our discipline. Experience has fully proved the importance of maintaining a strict and godly discipline in the church of Christ; and it would be no exaggeration to say that it is not less essential to the wellbeing of the church than a godly creed.

We recommend to you a prayerful and constant attention to all the means of grace, both those which pertain to · Christianity generally, and those which peculiarly belong to you as members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Experience and observation have fully convinced us, that a proper attention to these will at all times be happily conducive to the best interests of man. Among those which belong to you in common with your Christian brethren of every denomination, we would particularly notice a constant attention to hearing and reading the word of God, a prayerful and proper attention to the ordinance of the Lord's Supper; prayer, private, social, and family; a strict attention to visiting the sick: and a conscientious giving of your substance, according to your ability to meet the necessities of those who are in want, Among those duties which peculiarly belong to you as Methodists, permit us to invite your attention particularly to class meetings; we have long observed that wherever the Methodists have become slack in their attention to class meetings, there the spirituality and power of godliness have also declined. Forget not the plainness and simplicity of conversation and appearance for which the first Methodists were so remarkable; and take heed lest a disposition to accommodate our religion to the opinions and taste of a degenerate age, should cause us to depart from the self-renouncing conduct which our fathers have so loudly recommended to us by their own example. Brethren, in receiving the institutions of Methodism from our forefathers we have received a most precious and sacred deposit, let us transmit if to our children unimpaired. At the same time that we recommend to you a strictly Methodistical course of conduct, and would be glad to see the doctrine and discipline of Methodism identified in all your deportment. we would remind you that Methodism is not bigotry. Cultivate toward your Christian brethren of every name

a spirit of Christian forbearance and brotherly affection. Methodism throws no obstacles in the way of the most cordial Christian union and friendship; but let us always remember that he is the best Methodist who loves his God and his neighbour most.

We desire now to direct your attention to the education of your children; a subject surely of the deepest interest to yourselves, to your country, and to the church. In many places, it is to be feared, parents manifest but too little concern for the mental cultivation of their children: they permit them to grow up in the most wretched ignorance of even the first rudiments of learning; and it is a melancholy fact that in this land of light and improvement, children grow up who are not able to read the book of God. We would not, however, apply this as a general censure to those who are members of our communion; for we have witnessed with no small share of pleasure the manifest improvement which has taken place in this particular within the last few years. Schools are multiplying, and the taste for literary improvement is increasing among us; these we receive as favourable tokens, and pray for a still more abundant increase. But, brethren, we would not leave this subject without adverting to another important particular connected with the present and future welfare of your children-we mean the character of those literary institutions to which in early life they are sent, and where not only their literary but in a very considerable degree their moral taste and character are formed. Are these institutions under the guidance of piety; are those who manage them Godfearing men; if not, should not parents pause before they commit into the hands of such instructers souls that are to be trained for immortality! It is, indeed, a melancholy fact that many of our youth are annually committed to the care of the irreligious and profligate; but among Christian parents, at least, this ought not to be. To sum

ring the last year. By reference to our annual minutes, which accompany this address, you will see that our last year's increase is more than three thousand.—To God be given all the glory! Our conference was attended with the divine blessing to the people of Wilmington, who so kindly received us into their houses; and it shall be our prayer that God may continue to water them with the showers of his grace. The business of the conference was conducted in the spirit of brotherly affection, and great peace and harmony prevailed among us during our session.—We have indeed one subject of deep regret, that the labourers should be so few in a field already so great and so constantly enlarging: there are annually many new doors opening before us into which we would gladly enter, but we lack men to go. We would earnestly exhort you to pray the Lord of the harvest that he would send forth labourers into his harvest. Is not this the command of God, and should not this petition form a part of all our addresses to the throne of grace, whether private, social, or public. Let us always remember it is God alone who can raise up labourers, and we must ask him earnestly to do it, until the walls of Zion shall be filled with watchmen.

We wish to recommend to your attention and liberality the case of our infant society in St. Augustine, they have no house of worship, but earnestly desire to have one; they are few in number and unable of themselves to accomplish so important an object: under these circumstances they have applied to the conference, and through this medium the conference now appeals to you in their behalf. We beecech you, brethren, to aid them in the laudable work of raising a house for the worship of our God. It is important that we have a Methodist church in St. Augustine, and that we have it speedily: whatever you are disposed to give can be communicated to them by means of the presiding elder of your district, or you can remit

it to the Rev. D. G. M'Daniel, or Davis Floyd, Esq.,

The conference, at its last session, determined on both of St. Augustine. establishing a weekly religious newspaper, to be called the Wesleyan Journal. We cordially recommend this paper to your patronage for several reasons:-1. Because it is to be the property of the conference, and whatever profits may accrue from its circulation are to be sacredly appropriated to the most important of all charities, that of assisting to spread the gospel. 2. We believe the time has fully come when the Methodist Church in the southern states should possess all that influence in the moral world which is consequent upon the operations of a well-conducted periodical press; our numbers would seem to require such an establishment, and the improvement and stability of our institutions depend very greatly upon it. The publishing committee appointed by the conference have engaged the Rev. Stephen Olin as editor of the journal, and entertain no doubt that under his superintendence it will be conducted to the entire satisfaction of every sincere friend of piety and literature.



Brethren, we have no distinct or separate interests from yours. We were among you at first-among you we have found the pearl of great price-and although we believe that God hath separated us to the gospel of his Son, it was not that we might serve some separate interest, but, that we might minister the word of reconciliation to you and your children. We beseech you to bear us constantly in your hearts when you approach the throne of grace, that the word of God ministered by us may mightily prevail in the awakening, conversion, and sanctification of souls. And now, brethren, we commend you to God and the word of his grace, who is able to keep you to that day when pastors and their flocks shall for ever unite in the song of redemption, in the mansions of eternal rest.

\*\*\* The first Fridays in May and September are set apart as days of fasting and prayer throughout the conference.




## CONFERENCE STEWARDS' REPORT.

DEAR BRETHREN,

Your stewards, as you will perceive from the Report. have settled with the deficient preachers at a deduction of  $60\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. This makes the allowance of a deficient single preacher only \$39 50, and of a married preacher \$79 00. You will perceive also, that there is not a cent of surplus from any of the circuits or stations; and the conference collections much less than last year. We hope that when this exhibit is laid before our societies they will be convinced of their duty to be liberal, and that you will awake to a sense of the need of conference collections.
