- •The Terrier bench will consist of just five players with only Brandon Boyce and Mike Lenzly having been on the team last season.
- •After defeating Clemson 79-74 last year, the Terriers nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC when they trailed Georgia Tech by just one point with less than four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score in Atlanta. Ian Chadwick had a game-high 26 points in that contest.
- •Lee Nixon and Grant Sterley will be making their first collegiate starts while Kenny Hastie and Colon Largent will both be in the starting lineup for just the second time in their careers.
- •The Terriers have four players from the Atlanta area: Brandon Boyce, Ian Chadwick, David Eaton, and Mike Lenzly.
- •Wofford topped the SoCon last season with an average of 7.1 3-pointers per game.

Nov. 17, 2000, at Georgia Tech, Alexander Memorial Coliseum (10,000), Atlanta, Ga.; 7:30 p.m.

The Game

The Wofford College basketball team, one of only two programs in the nation to have improved its win total in each of the last four seasons, opens the 2000-01 campaign at Georgia Tech.

After posting a 79-74 win at Clemson (Nov. 21), the Terriers nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC last year when they threw a major scare into Georgia Tech. Wofford trailed by just a point with under four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score in Atlanta (Dec. 22).

Ian Chadwick topped the Terriers that night with a game-high 26 points.

Missing From Action

Wofford will play its opening three games without two-time All-Southern Conference guard Ian Chadwick, starting power forward Bishop Ravenel, and backup center Edvin Masic.

The trio has been forced to sit out due to their participation in a **Kevin Garnett** summer basketball tournament in Greenville, S.C., that wasn't sanctioned by the NCAA.

Chadwick (16.8 ppg), an Atlanta native and Parkview High School graduate, is on pace to shatter the SoCon's all-time 3-point record. He has 226 treys in his career. Ravenel (7.0 ppg, 5.9 rpg) is the Terriers' top returning rebounder and second-leading scorer. Masic was a medical redshirt last season.

Meet The Coach

•Richard Johnson, in his 16th season as head coach at Wofford College, has a 100 percent graduation rate for all players who have completed their eligibility under him.

The 6-foot-8 Johnson has been the runner-up for SoCon Coach of the Year honors in each of the last two seasons. He ranks second all-time at Wofford in victories and third in winning percentage with a 213-196 mark (.521).

A 1976 Citadel graduate, Johnson came to Wofford after serving nine years as an assistant at his alma mater under then coach and now Athletic Director **Les Robinson**.

During his Wofford tenure, Johnson has guided the Terriers from NAIA membership to NCAA Division II in 1988, Division I Independent status in 1995, and the Southern Conference in 1997.

•Johnson's staff includes Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** (12th year, Emory & Henry '86) and assistant coaches **Bob Johnson** (1st year, Washington '68) and **Alex Peavey** (1st year, Virginia '99).

A Near ACC Sweep

On the heels of a 79-74 win at Clemson (Nov.21), Wofford nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC last season when it faced Georgia Tech (Dec. 22).

The Terriers trailed the Yellow Jackets by just one point with under four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score.

Wofford Beats Duke?

Wofford beat Clemson last year, Clemson beat NC State, NC State beat Maryland, and Maryland beat Duke.

Scanning The Roster

- •Wofford has four Georgia natives on its roster: **Brandon Boyce** (Dacula), **Ian Chadwick** (Atlanta), **David Eaton** (Atlanta), and **Mike Lenzly** (Jonesboro).
- •Eight states and Bosnia are represented on Wofford's 15-man roster.
- •The Terriers have five seniors, two juniors, five sophomores, and three freshmen.

Mainstays in the Lineup

With older brother **Seth Chadwick** being a four-year starter for the Terriers (1993-97) and Ian joining the program the following year, Wofford will have had a Chadwick sibling in the starting lineup for eight straight seasons by the time Ian graduates this spring.

Terriers and Politics

Ex-Wofford basketball standout **Don Fowler** (1953-57), the ninth all-time leading scorer for the Terriers with 1,526 points, is a former Co-Chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

Terriers Sign Daniels

The Wofford College men's basketball program has announced the signing of **Sam Daniels** to a National Letter-of-Intent.

A 6-foot-9 forward from Carolina Day School in Asheville, N.C., Daniels averaged 17.6 points, 11.6 rebounds, and six blocks per game as a junior last season. He earned Western North Carolina Player of the Year honors from the Asheville *Citizen-Times* as he helped lead Carolina Day to a 23-6 record.

"We're extremely pleased to have Sam join our program," Wofford Head Coach **Richard Johnson** said. "He comes to us as a very highly recruited young man. We had to beat several people in our conference as well as a couple of Ivy League schools to get him in the recruiting battle. I think that shows how far we've come as a program. A couple of years ago, we wouldn't have been able to do that. Sam is a bright young man. He has size and potential and we believe he's going to be an outstanding player for us."

"I'm very excited," Daniels said. "I really liked the coach and the players were some of the best people I met all summer."

Waiting in The Wings

The Terrier backcourt will receive a boost next season with the addition of point guard **Edmond Davis**.

The younger brother of former Terrier point guard standout **Donald Davis** (1997-99), Edmond is sitting out this season after transferring from LSU. He will have three years of eligibility at Wofford.

Schedule Difficulty

According to the Sagarin Ratings, Wofford played the third toughest pre-Christmas schedule in the nation last year. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

The Terriers opened the season with road games at South Carolina, Clemson, West Virginia, and Marquette. Wofford then closed December with visits to Vanderbilt, Texas, William & Mary, and Georgia Tech.

This year's slate is again formidable with visits to Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt.



The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Richard Johnson's** three assistants:

•Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** is in his 12th season at Wofford. He has been with the Terriers through their rise from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent and the Southern Conference.

The Terriers have posted a 155-146 record (.515) during Young's tenure.

•Assistant Coach **Bob Johnson** is in his first season with the Terriers after a distinguished 10 years at the University of Washington (1975-85), where he led the Huskies to three NCAA Tournament appearances and four trips to the NIT. He was also head coach at Seattle University from 1985-91.

Johnson and his wife, Tish, are the owners and operators of a McDonald's franchise in Spartanburg.

•Alex Peavey joined the Terriers this season after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth last season.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and current Executive Director of the NCAA Foundation.

Versus The SoCon

With a 22-24 record, Wofford has played nearly .500 ball in its brief SoCon history which also represents just the third, fourth, and fifth years in Division I.

Point Differentials

Five of Wofford's eight SoCon wins last season were by at least 13 points.

In their first two seasons of SoCon play, the Terriers had only two of their 14 wins by a margin of 13 points or better.

The Miscellaneous

- •The Terriers topped the SoCon with an average of 7.1 3-pointers per game last season.
- •Ignore the stats that show Wofford ranking last in the SoCon in rebounding margin last year. The Terriers outboarded the opponent in nine of 16 SoCon games. The numbers got skewed by the rigorous pre-Christmas schedule that Wofford faced.
 - •Wofford was 8-0 when shooting at least 44.8 percent from the field last season.
- •Wofford had a 10-1 home record last season after being just 6-6 in the Benjamin Johnson Arena during the 1998-99 campaign.
- •Wofford was 7-1 at home in SoConplay last year and 1-7 on the road. In the 1998-99 season, the Terriers were 3-5 at home and 5-3 on the road.
- •Wofford was 5-2 in games decided by five points or fewer last season after being 1-7 in those contests the previous year.
 - •Wofford was 9-3 when holding a halftime lead.
 - •Wofford was 12-1 when scoring at least 71 points in regulation play last season.

Series Notes

- •Georgia Tech holds a 10-2 edge in a series that began in the 1920-21 campaign.
- •The Terriers and Yellow Jackets are meeting for the fifth consecutive year.

When the teams met in the 1996-97 season opener, Wofford was in just its second year on the Division I level. Georgia Tech took a 74-49 victory that night.

The Yellow Jackets won 90-58 in a 1997-98 meeting. The Terriers then hung tough in 76-63 and 80-70 losses the last two seasons.

•Wofford's last win in the series was a 49-44 victory when the Terriers were NAIA members in the 1980-81 campaign. Since then, Georgia Tech has run off six consecutive wins in the series.

•All 12 meetings in the series have taken place in Atlanta.

Double-Doubles

Bishop Ravenel had four "double-doubles" last season for the most by a Wofford player since **John McGinnis** recorded eight in the 1993-94 campaign.

Ravenel missed two additional "double-doubles" by just one rebound.

He also became the first Wofford player to post back-to-back double-doubles since McGinnis and **Sidney Thomas** in 1993-94.

Comeback Kids

Wofford's 17-point comeback in the final 10:43 to defeat Clemson last year was the second-largest come-from-behind victory in the 16-year tenure of Head Coach **Richard Johnson**.

The Terriers trailed Furman by 18 points in the 1998-99 season before rallying to win 90-83 in overtime.

Recapping Clemson

- •Wofford defeated Clemson for the first time since a 52-46 home victory in the third game of the 1947-48 season.
- •Wofford had lost six straight to Clemson, including 77-28 (1995-96) and 89-49 (1996-97) decisions in two previous meetings.
- •Wofford won at Clemson for the first time since a 34-25 victory in 1934, representing a stretch of 30 games.
- •The Terriers snapped the Tigers' 39-game home winning streak in non-conference games.
- •Wofford also halted Clemson's 42-game home winning streak against SoCon teams.
- •Clemson had won 13 straight contests against SoCon teams regardless of site.
- •Wofford outscored Clemson 28-2, including a 19-0 spurt, during its second-half run. In a 1995-96 game, the Tigers outscored the Terriers 26-0 to open the game.

Wofford Again Tops The Southern Conference

In each of its first three years in the league, Wofford College has won the Southern Conference Graduation Rate Award for graduating the highest percentage of its student-athletes over the previous five years. The Terriers captured the title outright in their first two seasons before tying Davidson, a non-scholarship football playing school, in 1999. Rising Through the Ranks

Wofford College is in just its sixth season on the Division I level.

The Terriers competed for seven years in Division II (1988-95). Prior to 1988, Wofford was an NAIA member.

About Wofford

- •Located in Spartanburg, SC, Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (NY).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

The Terriers placed third in the South Division in 1998-99, two places ahead of their fifthplace forecast by the league coaches and media.

Wofford finished second in 1997-98 after being a fifth-place pick out of five teams.

European Vacation

Wofford made a 10-day trip to England and France at the close of May.

During their stay overseas, the Terriers also played a series of exhibition games against European teams.

Where Are They Now?

Wofford's two seniors from last year are doing quite well in their post-collegiate life.

Starzee Walker, last year's second-leading scorer (13.1 ppg) and an All-SoCon Tournament selection, is an account executive with WASV-TV in Spartanburg while former starting center Rashane DeLoach is a supervising agent with American Income Life in Atlanta.

The Game

The depleted Wofford College basketball team will make the short trek down I-26 Tuesday to face South Carolina.

The Terriers dropped a 76-62 decision to the Gamecocks in last year's season opener for both teams. **Ian Chadwick** had a game-high 19 points. The Terriers then bounced back two days later to post a 79-74 victory at Clemson.

The Terriers and Gamecocks are scheduled to meet again next year in Spartanburg. It will be USC's first visit to Wofford since the 1956-57 campaign.

Missing From Action

Wofford is playing its opening three games without two-time All-Southern Conference guard Ian Chadwick, starting forward Bishop Ravenel, and center Edvin Masic.

The NCAA has suspended the trio for their participation in a non-sanctioned **Kevin Garnett** summer basketball tournament in Greenville.

Chadwick (16.8 ppg) is on pace to shatter the SoCon's all-time 3-point record. He has 226 treys in his career. Ravenel (7.0 ppg, 5.9 rpg) is the Terriers' top returning rebounder and second-leading scorer. The 6-foot-10 Masic, a medical redshirt last season, is the backup center behind Columbia native **Kenny Hastie**.

Meet The Coach

•Richard Johnson, in his 16th season as head coach at Wofford College, has a 100 percent graduation rate for all players who have completed their eligibility under him.

The 6-foot-8 Johnson has been the runner-up for SoCon Coach of the Year honors in each of the last two seasons. He ranks second all-time at Wofford in victories and third in winning percentage with a 213-197 mark (.520).

A 1976 Citadel graduate, Johnson came to Wofford after serving nine years as an assistant at his alma mater under then coach and now Athletic Director **Les Robinson**.

During his Wofford tenure, Johnson has guided the Terriers from NAIA membership to NCAA Division II in 1988, Division I Independent status in 1995, and the Southern Conference in 1997.

•Johnson's staff includes Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** (12th year, Emory & Henry '86) and assistant coaches **Bob Johnson** (1st year, Washington '68) and **Alex Peavey** (1st year, Virginia '99).

A Near ACC Sweep

On the heels of a 79-74 win at Clemson, Wofford nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC last season when it faced Georgia Tech in Atlanta.

The Terriers trailed the Yellow Jackets by just one point with under four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score.

Terriers or Puppies?

With starters **Ian Chadwick** and **Bishop Ravenel** unavailable for the opening three games, Wofford's starting lineup features some unfamiliar faces.

Sophomores Lee Nixon and Grant Sterley made their first collegiate starts against Georgia Tech while Colon Largent and Kenny Hastie had just their second appearance in the starting lineup.

Point guard **Jon Pryor**, a starter in all 30 games last season, is the lone seasoned veteran in the Terriers' starting five.

Scanning The Roster

•Wofford has four South Carolina natives on its roster: **Kenny Hastie** (Columbia), **Lee Nixon** (Hanahan), **Bishop Ravenel** (Charleston), and **Terenthial White** (Holly Hill).

•Eight states and Bosnia are represented on Wofford's 15-man roster.

Homecomings

Columbia native and Heathwood Hall graduate **Kenny Hastie** is in his first season as the starting center for the Terriers.

Hastie is in his third year at Wofford. He previously attended Duke for one year but did not play on the basketball team. He was instead a regular student and Cameron Crazy.

Mainstays in the Lineup

With older brother **Seth Chadwick** being a four-year starter for the Terriers (1993-97) and Ian joining the program the following year, Wofford will have had a Chadwick sibling in the starting lineup for eight straight seasons by the time Ian graduates this spring.

Terriers Sign Daniels

The Wofford College men's basketball program has announced the signing of **Sam Daniels** to a National Letter-of-Intent.

A 6-foot-9 forward from Carolina Day School in Asheville, N.C., Daniels averaged 17.6 points, 11.6 rebounds, and six blocks per game as a junior last season. He earned Western North Carolina Player of the Year honors from the Asheville *Citizen-Times* as he helped lead Carolina Day to a 23-6 record.

"We're extremely pleased to have Sam join our program," Wofford Head Coach **Richard Johnson** said. "He comes to us as a very highly recruited young man. We had to beat several people in our conference as well as a couple of Ivy League schools to get him in the recruiting battle. I think that shows how far we've come as a program. A couple of years ago, we wouldn't have been able to do that. Sam is a bright young man. He has size and potential and we believe he's going to be an outstanding player for us."

"I'm very excited," Daniels said. "I really liked the coach and the players were some of the best people I met all summer."

Waiting in The Wings

The Terrier backcourt will receive a boost next season with the addition of point guard **Edmond Davis**.

The younger brother of former Terrier point guard standout **Donald Davis** (1997-99), Edmond is sitting out this season after transferring from LSU. He will have three years of eligibility at Wofford.

Schedule Difficulty

According to the Sagarin Ratings, Wofford played the third toughest pre-Christmas schedule in the nation last year. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

The Terriers opened last season with road games at South Carolina, Clemson, West Virginia, and Marquette. Wofford then closed December with visits to Vanderbilt, Texas, William & Mary, and Georgia Tech.

This year's slate is again formidable with visits to Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt.

Wofford Beats Duke?

Wofford beat Clemson last year, Clemson beat NC State, NC State beat Maryland, and Maryland beat Duke.

Terriers and Politics

Ex-Wofford basketball standout **Don Fowler** (1953-57), the ninth all-time leading scorer for the Terriers with 1,526 points, is a former Co-Chairman of the Democratic National Committee.



The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Richard Johnson's** three assistants:

•Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** is in his 12th season at Wofford. He has been with the Terriers through their rise from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent and the Southern Conference.

The Terriers have posted a 155-147 record (.513) during Young's tenure.

•Assistant Coach **Bob Johnson** is in his first season with the Terriers after a distinguished 10 years at the University of Washington (1975-85), where he led the Huskies to three NCAA Tournament appearances and four trips to the NIT. He was also head coach at Seattle University from 1985-91.

Johnson and his wife, Tish, are the owners and operators of a McDonald's franchise in Spartanburg.

•Alex Peavey joined the Terriers this season after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth last season.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and current Executive Director of the NCAA Foundation.

Versus The SoCon

With a 22-24 record, Wofford has played nearly .500 ball in its brief SoCon history which also represents just the third, fourth, and fifth years in Division I.

Five of Wofford's eight SoCon wins last season were by at least 13 points.

In their first two seasons of SoCon play, the Terriers had only two of their 14 wins by a margin of 13 points or better.

The Miscellaneous

- •The Terriers topped the SoCon with an average of 7.1 3-pointers per game last season.
- •Ignore the stats that show Wofford ranking last in the SoCon in rebounding margin last year. The Terriers outboarded the opponent in nine of 16 SoCon games. The numbers got skewed by the rigorous pre-Christmas schedule that Wofford faced.
 - •Wofford was 8-0 when shooting at least 44.8 percent from the field last season.
- •Wofford had a 10-1 home record last season after being just 6-6 in the Benjamin Johnson Arena during the 1998-99 campaign.
- •Wofford was 7-1 at home in SoCon play last year and 1-7 on the road. In the 1998-99 season, the Terriers were 3-5 at home and 5-3 on the road.
- •Wofford was 5-2 in games decided by five points or fewer last season after being 1-7 in those contests the previous year.
 - •Wofford was 9-3 when holding a halftime lead.
 - •Wofford was 12-1 when scoring at least 71 points in regulation play last season.

Series Notes

•South Carolina holds a 34-18 edge over Wofford in a series that began in the 1908-09 campaign.

The Gamecocks have also won the last 16 meetings dating back to a 33-31 Wofford victory in the 1938-39 season.

•Tuesday represents the sixth straight meeting in Columbia. Wofford and USC also met in a 1984-85 game in Charleston. The Gamecocks have not played in Spartanburg since a 90-71 win in the 1956-57 campaign.

See You In Spartanburg

South Carolina is scheduled to play at Wofford next season for the first time since the 1956-57 campaign, representing a stretch of nine games when including Tuesday's contest.

Double-Doubles

Bishop Ravenel had four "double-doubles" last season for the most by a Wofford player since **John McGinnis** recorded eight in the 1993-94 campaign.

Ravenel missed two additional "double-doubles" by just one rebound.

He also became the first Wofford player to post back-to-back "double-doubles" since McGinnis and **Sidney Thomas** in 1993-94.

Comeback Kids

Wofford's 17-point comeback in the final 10:43 to defeat Clemson last year was the second-largest come-from-behind victory in the 16-year tenure of Head Coach **Richard Johnson**.

The Terriers trailed Furman by 18 points in the 1998-99 season before rallying to win 90-83 in overtime.

Recapping Clemson

- •Wofford defeated Clemson for the first time since a 52-46 home victory in the third game of the 1947-48 season.
- •Wofford had lost six straight to Clemson, including 77-28 (1995-96) and 89-49 (1996-97) decisions in two previous meetings.
- •Wofford won at Clemson for the first time since a 34-25 victory in 1934, representing a stretch of 30 games.
- •The Terriers snapped the Tigers' 39-game home winning streak in non-conference games.
- •Wofford also halted Clemson's 42-game home winning streak against SoCon teams.
- •Clemson had won 13 straight contests against SoCon teams regardless of site.
- •Wofford outscored Clemson 28-2, including a 19-0 spurt, during its second-half run. In a 1995-96 game, the Tigers outscored the Terriers 26-0 to open the game.

Wofford Again Tops The Southern Conference

In each of its first three years in the league, Wofford College has won the Southern Conference Graduation Rate Award for graduating the highest percentage of its student-athletes over the previous five years. The Terriers captured the title outright in their first two seasons before tying Davidson, a non-scholarship football playing school, in 1999. - •Located in Spartanburg, SC, Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (NY).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

Based on preseason predictions, Wofford has surprised the SoCon in each of its first three seasons in the league.

The Terriers placed third in the South Division last year after being a preseason fourthplace pick by the SoCon coaches.

The Terriers placed third in the South Division in 1998-99, two places ahead of their fifthplace forecast by the league coaches and media.

Wofford finished second in 1997-98 after being a fifth-place pick out of five teams.

European Vacation

Wofford made a 10-day trip to England and France at the close of May.

During their stay overseas, the Terriers played a series of exhibition games against European teams.

Where Are They Now?

Wofford's two seniors from last year are doing quite well in their post-collegiate life.

Georgia Tech, in the debut of new Head Coach Paul Hewitt, received a torrid shooting performance from Shaun Fein, who hit seven 3pointers on the way to 32 points. The Yellow Jackets led by just 12 points early in the second half before an 18-0 run put the game away.

The Terriers rallied from a 17-point deficit in the final 10:43 for a 79-74 victory over the Tigers last season. **Ian Chadwick** topped Wofford with 27 points, including seven 3-pointers. He had 17 points during a 28-2 Wofford run.

Worth Noting

- •Wofford is the second-smallest school in Division I with an enrollment of 1,100. In fact, the Wofford campus actually has a higher SAT average (1201) than enrollment (1,100).
- •In the 2000 NCAA Division I Graduation Rate Report, Wofford is the only school in the nation to rank in the Top 10 in all four categories: overall student-athlete graduation rate as well as those for the football, men's basketball, and women's basketball teams.
- •Two-time All-SoCon selection **Ian Chadwick** has 238 career 3-pointers and needs just eight treys to become the league's all-time leader.
- •Wofford's season-opening scores at Georgia Tech and South Carolina contain an asterisk in that Chadwick, starting forward **Bishop Ravenel**, and center **Edvin Masic** were forced to sit out by the NCAA because of their participation in a non-sanctioned **Kevin Garnett** summer tournament in Greenville.

Meet The Head Coach

•Richard Johnson in his 16th season at Wofford College. The 6foot-8 head coach has a 100 percent graduation rate for all players who have completed their eligibility under him.

Johnson has been the runner-up for SoCon Coach of the Year honors in each of the last two seasons. He ranks second all-time at Wofford in victories and third in winning percentage with a 217-200 mark (.520). His 200th win was last year's 79-74 victory at Clemson.

A 1976 Citadel graduate, Johnson came to Wofford after serving nine years as an assistant at his alma mater under then coach and now Athletic Director **Les Robinson**.

During his Wofford tenure, Johnson has guided the Terriers from NAIA membership to NCAA Division II in 1988, Division I Independent status in 1995, and the Southern Conference in 1997.

•Johnson's staff includes Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** (12th year, Emory & Henry '86) and assistant coaches **Bob Johnson** (1st year, Washington '68) and **Alex Peavey** (1st year, Virginia '99).

A Near ACC Sweep

On the heels of a 79-74 win at Clemson, Wofford nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC last season when it faced Georgia Tech in Atlanta.

The Terriers trailed the Yellow Jackets by just one point with under four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score.

Another Stunner?

Wofford nearly pulled off its second major upset in as many years when it went down to the wire against No.22-ranked Alabama before falling by a 68-64 score (Dec. 7).

Ian Chadwick had a game-high 26 points to pace the Terriers.

Chasing The Big Dance

Wofford made a run at an NCAA Tournament bid last season when it advanced to the semifinals of the SoCon Tournament.

In that contest, the Terriers led the College of Charleston by four points with just over three minutes remaining before falling by a 74-64 score.

It's The Best Start

Wofford's 4-4 record represents its best start to a season since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 campaign.

The Terriers' early-season schedule is usually marked by numerous matchups with major conference opponents.

Shaking Off Cobwebs

Saturday's contest at Clemson will represent Wofford's first action in exactly a week.

Since routing Emmanuel on Dec. 9, the Terriers took a break for final exams. They held short practices on just three days (Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday).

The Cocks Are Coming!

The University of South Carolina is scheduled to play at Wofford next season for the first time since the 1956-57 campaign, representing a stretch of nine games in the series.

Terriers Sign Daniels

The Wofford College men's basketball program announced the signing of **Sam Daniels** to a National Letter-of-Intent during the early period.

A 6-foot-9 forward from Carolina Day School in Asheville, N.C., Daniels averaged 17.6 points, 11.6 rebounds, and six blocks per game as a junior last season. He earned Western North Carolina Player of the Year honors from the Asheville *Citizen-Times* as he helped lead Carolina Day to a 23-6 record.

"We're extremely pleased to have Sam join our program," Wofford Head Coach **Richard Johnson** said. "He comes to us as a very highly recruited young man. We had to beat several people in our conference as well as a couple of Ivy League schools to get him in the recruiting battle. I think that shows how far we've come as a program. A couple of years ago, we wouldn't have been able to do that. Sam is a bright young man. He has size and potential and we believe he's going to be an outstanding player for us."

"I'm very excited," Daniels said. "I really liked the coach and the players were some of the best people I met all summer."

Waiting in The Wings

The Terrier backcourt will receive a boost next season with the addition of point guard **Edmond Davis**. The younger brother of former Terrier point guard standout **Donald Davis** (1997-99), Edmond is sitting out this season after transferring from LSU. He will have three years of eligibility at Wofford.

Schedule Difficulty

This year's non-conference slate for Wofford is again formidable with visits to Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. In fact, it currently ranks as the nation's eighth-most difficult.

According to the Sagarin Ratings, Wofford played the third toughest pre-Christmas schedule in the nation last year. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

The Terriers opened last season with road games at South Carolina, Clemson, West Virginia, and Marquette. Wofford then closed December with visits to Vanderbilt, Texas, William & Mary, and Georgia Tech.

Smart Guy

Starting forward **Bishop Ravenel** has earned Phi Beta Kappa honors.

After having to sit out the opening three games for playing in the non-sanctioned **Kevin Garnett** summer tournament in Greenville, Ravenel is believed to be the first student-athlete ever to be named Phi Beta Kappa and receive an NCAA suspension in the same year.

Wofford Beats Duke?

Wofford beat Clemson last year, Clemson beat NC State, NC State beat Maryland, and Maryland beat Duke.

Calling Dr. Boyce

Center **Brandon Boyce** made good use of Wofford's trip to Alabama (Dec. 7).

During the day, the senior Dean's List student went through a series of medical school interviews at UAB. He then returned to Tuscaloosa in time for the game that night.

Mainstays in the Lineup

With older brother **Seth Chadwick** being a four-year starter for the Terriers (1993-97) and Ian joining the program the following year, Wofford will have had a Chadwick sibling in the starting lineup for eight straight seasons by the time Ian graduates this spring.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Richard Johnson's** three assistants:

•Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** is in his 12th season at Wofford. He has been with the Terriers through their rise from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent and the Southern Conference.

The Terriers have posted a 159-150 record (.515) during Young's tenure.

•Assistant Coach **Bob Johnson** is in his first season with the Terriers after a distinguished 10 years at the University of Washington (1975-85), where he led the Huskies to three NCAA Tournament appearances and four trips to the NIT. He was also head coach at Seattle University from 1985-91.

Johnson and his wife, Tish, are the owners and operators of a McDonald's franchise in Spartanburg.

•Alex Peavey joined the Terriers this season after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth last season.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and current Executive Director of the NCAA Foundation.

With a 22-24 record, Wofford has played nearly .500 ball in its brief SoCon history which also represents just the third, fourth, and fifth years in Division I.

Comeback Kids

Wofford's 17-point comeback in the final 10:43 to defeat Clemson last year was the second-largest come-from-behind victory in the 16-year tenure of Head Coach **Richard Johnson**.

The Terriers trailed Furman by 18 points in the 1998-99 season before rallying to win 90-83 in overtime.

Recapping Clemson

- •Wofford defeated Clemson for the first time since a 52-46 home victory in the third game of the 1947-48 season.
- •Wofford had lost six straight to Clemson, including 77-28 (1995-96) and 89-49 (1996-97) decisions in two previous meetings.
- •Wofford won at Clemson for the first time since a 34-25 victory in 1934, representing a stretch of 30 games.
- •The Terriers snapped the Tigers' 39-game home winning streak in non-conference games.
- •Wofford also halted Clemson's 42-game home winning streak against SoCon teams.
- •Clemson had won 13 straight contests against SoCon teams regardless of site.
- •Wofford outscored Clemson 28-2, including a 19-0 spurt, during its second-half run. In a 1995-96 game, the Tigers outscored the Terriers 26-0 to open the game.

Wofford Again Tops The Southern Conference

In each of its first three years in the league, Wofford College has won the Southern Conference Graduation Rate Award for graduating the highest percentage of its student-athletes over the previous five years. Alabama had entered the game leading the nation in scoring offense (102.3 points per game) and scoring margin (40.0 points per game). After **Grant Sterley's** 3-pointer from the corner trimmed the Alabama lead to just 67-64 with 10 seconds remaining, Crimson Tide guard **Tarik London** hit a free-throw with six seconds to play to seal the game.

Ian Chadwick scored 18 of his game-high 22 points in the first half while point guard **Jon Pryor** equaled a career-high with 10 assists as Wofford rolled to a 105-58 victory over Emmanuel this afternoon in Spartanburg.

The Terriers, playing just 44 hours after Thursday's near upset of No. 23-ranked Alabama, improve to 4-4. With final exams beginning Monday, Wofford will not return to action until next Saturday, Dec. 16, when it travels to Clemson. The Terriers defeated the Tigers 79-74 last year. Emmanuel drops to 3-7.

Wofford has topped the 100-point mark twice in the same season for the first time since moving to Division I in the 1995-96 campaign. It's the first time overall since the 1992-93 season when the Terriers competed in Division II. Wofford has also won 14 of its last 15 home games dating back to last season.

Chadwick's 22 points enabled him to climb two more spots on Wofford's career scoring list. He now has 1,379 points to rank 13th all-time at the school. He moved past **Ralph Hanna** (1,358, 1972-76) and **Ronnie Harris** (1,370, 1976-79). Next up is No. 12 **Trap Hart** with 1,401 points (1956-59).

All 13 Wofford players scored at least four points. Chadwick was the lone Terrier in double figures. Crowd favorite **David Eaton** came off-the-bench to shoot 3-of-3 from 3-point range in scoring nine points in 12 minutes while five Terriers had eight points.

The Terriers trailed by as many as five points before taking the lead for good at 23-22 on a **Colon Largent** free-throw with 9:44 to play in the first half. Wofford led 39-31 before breaking the game open with a 20-3 run to head into the locker room with a 59-34 halftime lead. The Terriers then opened the second half with a 15-0 spurt to further distance themselves from the Lions.

Largent had a career-high eight assists to go with seven points. **Terenthial White** had a team-best seven rebounds to go with his eight points. Wofford shot 55.3 percent from the field.

Emmanuel was led by Al Gibbs with 19 points while Dan Allums scored 18.

- •Wofford (WAU-FURD) is the second-smallest school in Division I with an enrollment of 1,100. In fact, the Wofford campus actually has a higher SAT average (1201) than enrollment (1,100).
- •In the 2000 NCAA Graduation Rate Report just released, Wofford is the only school in the nation to rank in the Top 10 in all four categories -- graduation rate for all student-athletes as well as those on the football, men's basketball, and women's basketball teams.
- •The Terriers are led by two-time All-Southern Conference selection **Ian Chadwick** (17.0 ppg). With 232 career 3-pointers, the 6-foot-4 senior guard is on pace to shatter the league's all-time 3-point record (245, **Anquell McCollum**, Western Carolina, 1992-96).
- •Wofford's season-opening scores at Georgia Tech and South Carolina contain an asterisk in that Chadwick, starting forward **Bishop Ravenel**, and center **Edvin Masic** were forced to sit out by the NCAA because of their participation in a non-sanctioned summer tournament.

Meet The Coach

•Richard Johnson, in his 16th season as head coach at Wofford College, has a 100 percent graduation rate for all players who have completed their eligibility under him.

The 6-foot-8 Johnson has been the runner-up for SoCon Coach of the Year honors in each of the last two seasons. He ranks second all-time at Wofford in victories and third in winning percentage with a 216-199 mark (.520).

A 1976 Citadel graduate, Johnson came to Wofford after serving nine years as an assistant at his alma mater under then coach and now Athletic Director **Les Robinson**.

During his Wofford tenure, Johnson has guided the Terriers from NAIA membership to NCAA Division II in 1988, Division I Independent status in 1995, and the Southern Conference in 1997.

•Johnson's staff includes Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** (12th year, Emory & Henry '86) and assistant coaches **Bob Johnson** (1st year, Washington '68) and **Alex Peavey** (1st year, Virginia '99).

A Near ACC Sweep

On the heels of a 79-74 win at Clemson, Wofford nearly made it 2-0 against the ACC last season when it faced Georgia Tech in Atlanta.

The Terriers trailed the Yellow Jackets by just one point with under four minutes to play before falling by an 80-70 score.

Passing Big Brother

Ian Chadwick ranks 16th on Wofford's all-time scoring list with 1,331 points.

He passed older brother **Seth Chadwick** (1,292 points, 1993-97) to move into 17th place in a Nov. 27 rout of Toccoa Falls. The younger Chadwick then vaulted ahead of **Bill Barbee** (1,303, 1956-60) into the No. 16 position against William & Mary (Nov. 29).

Next up for Chadwick is **Boyce Berry** (1,345, 1958-62). Chadwick needs 15 points to reach the No. 15 position.

Homecomings

Wofford assistant coach **Alex Peavey** is a 1995 graduate of Tuscaloosa Academy.

He lived in Tuscaloosa while his father, 1965 Wofford alumnus **Marion Peavey**, was serving as the Vice President of Development at the University of Alabama (1991-96).

The elder Peavey is now the Executive Director of the NCAA Foundation.

Scanning The Roster

Four South Carolina natives wear the Wofford jersey: **Kenny Hastie** (Columbia), **Lee Nixon** (Hanahan), **Bishop Ravenel** (Charleston), and **Terenthial White** (Holly Hill). A total of eight states and Bosnia are represented on Wofford's 15-man roster.

Mainstays in the Lineup

With older brother **Seth Chadwick** being a four-year starter for the Terriers (1993-97) and Ian joining the program the following year, Wofford will have had a Chadwick sibling in the starting lineup for eight straight seasons by the time Ian graduates this spring.

Terriers Sign Daniels

The Wofford College men's basketball program announced the signing of **Sam Daniels** to a National Letter-of-Intent during the early period.

A 6-foot-9 forward from Carolina Day School in Asheville, N.C., Daniels averaged 17.6 points, 11.6 rebounds, and six blocks per game as a junior last season. He earned Western North Carolina Player of the Year honors from the Asheville *Citizen-Times* as he helped lead Carolina Day to a 23-6 record.

"We're extremely pleased to have Sam join our program," Wofford Head Coach **Richard Johnson** said. "He comes to us as a very highly recruited young man. We had to beat several people in our conference as well as a couple of Ivy League schools to get him in the recruiting battle. I think that shows how far we've come as a program. A couple of years ago, we wouldn't have been able to do that. Sam is a bright young man. He has size and potential and we believe he's going to be an outstanding player for us."

"I'm very excited," Daniels said. "I really liked the coach and the players were some of the best people I met all summer."

Waiting in The Wings

The Terrier backcourt will receive a boost next season with the addition of point guard **Edmond Davis**.

The younger brother of former Terrier point guard standout **Donald Davis** (1997-99), Edmond is sitting out this season after transferring from LSU. He will have three years of eligibility at Wofford.

Schedule Difficulty

This year's non-conference slate for Wofford is again formidable with visits to Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt.

According to the Sagarin Ratings, Wofford played the third toughest pre-Christmas schedule in the nation last year. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

The Terriers opened last season with road games at South Carolina, Clemson, West Virginia, and Marquette. Wofford then closed December with visits to Vanderbilt, Texas, William & Mary, and Georgia Tech.

Wofford Beats Duke?

Wofford beat Clemson last year, Clemson beat NC State, NC State beat Maryland, and Maryland beat Duke.

Terriers and Politics

Ex-Wofford basketball standout **Don Fowler** (1953-57), the ninth all-time leading scorer for the Terriers with 1,526 points, is a former Co-Chairman of the Democratic National Committee.



The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Richard Johnson's** three assistants:

•Associate Head Coach **Mike Young** is in his 12th season at Wofford. He has been with the Terriers through their rise from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent and the Southern Conference.

The Terriers have posted a 158-149 record (.515) during Young's tenure.

•Assistant Coach **Bob Johnson** is in his first season with the Terriers after a distinguished 10 years at the University of Washington (1975-85), where he led the Huskies to three NCAA Tournament appearances and four trips to the NIT. He was also head coach at Seattle University from 1985-91.

Johnson and his wife, Tish, are the owners and operators of a McDonald's franchise in Spartanburg.

•Alex Peavey joined the Terriers this season after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth last season.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and current Executive Director of the NCAA Foundation.

The trio was suspended by the NCAA for playing in a non-sanctioned **Kevin Garnett** summer tournament in Greenville, S.C.

Comeback Kids

Wofford's 17-point comeback in the final 10:43 to defeat Clemson last year was the second-largest come-from-behind victory in the 16-year tenure of Head Coach **Richard Johnson**.

The Terriers trailed Furman by 18 points in the 1998-99 season before rallying to win 90-83 in overtime.

Recapping Clemson

- •Wofford defeated Clemson for the first time since a 52-46 home victory in the third game of the 1947-48 season.
- •Wofford had lost six straight to Clemson, including 77-28 (1995-96) and 89-49 (1996-97) decisions in two previous meetings.
- •Wofford won at Clemson for the first time since a 34-25 victory in 1934, representing a stretch of 30 games.
- •The Terriers snapped the Tigers' 39-game home winning streak in non-conference games.
- •Wofford also halted Clemson's 42-game home winning streak against SoCon teams.
- •Clemson had won 13 straight contests against SoCon teams regardless of site.
- •Wofford outscored Clemson 28-2, including a 19-0 spurt, during its second-half run. In a 1995-96 game, the Tigers outscored the Terriers 26-0 to open the game.

Wofford's two seniors from last year are doing quite well in their post-collegiate life.

Starzee Walker, last year's second-leading scorer (13.1 ppg) and an All-SoCon Tournament selection, is an account executive with WASV-TV in Spartanburg while former starting center Rashane DeLoach is a supervising agent with American Income Life in Atlanta.

The Wofford College basketball team took the game down to the wire against No. 23-ranked Alabama before dropping a heartbreaking 68-64 decision in a regionally-televised game from Tuscaloosa, Ala.

The Crimson Tide (5-0) entered the game leading the nation in both scoring offense (102.3 points per game) and scoring margin (40.0 points per game). Among Alabama's victories this season was a 100-71 rout of Louisville.

Ian Chadwick tallied a game-high 26 points, including a 12-of-12 mark at the free-throw line. A Chadwick 3-pointer with 2:12 left in the first half gave Wofford its first lead of the game at 26-24. After a **Rod Grizzard** bucket tied the game for Alabama, Chadwick hit another jumper to put Wofford up 28-26 with 58 seconds left before the intermission. The Tide eventually forced a 28-28 tie at the half.

The Terriers stayed in the contest throughout the second half. Alabama took its biggest lead of the game at 63-54 with 2:40 to play on a dunk by freshman sensation **Gerald Wallace**, last year's Naismith and *USA Today* National High School Player of the Year. However, a Chadwick jumper and 3-point shot by **Colon Largent** quickly cut the Alabama margin to 63-59 with 2:06 remaining. After Alabama's **Terrance Meade** hit a jumper to put the Tide back up 65-59, Chadwick scored again on an acrobatic layup to close the deficit to 65-61 with 1:23 left.

After Wallace and **Tarik London** each went 1-of-2 at the free-throw line, Terrier forward **Grant Sterley** hit a 3-pointer from the corner to pull Wofford within 67-64 with 10 seconds to play.

London added another free-throw with six seconds left to provide the final 68-64 margin. Sterley attempted another 3-pointer from the corner with two seconds remaining but the ball went in-and-out. The teams then scrambed for the rebound as the clock expired.

"I couldn't be more proud of our effort," Wofford Head Coach **Richard Johnson** said. "Our defensive effort was awesome, as good as a Wofford team has been. We had 18 offensive rebounds and Alabama has some incredible athletes. I think this is the most athletic team we've played since moving up to Division I (1995-96).

"We showed tremendous poise. That's the exciting thing about it. We could not have played with more poise. We could not have played with better chemistry. That was tremendous character we showed tonight."

Bishop Ravenel had eight points and eight rebounds for Wofford while **Kenny Hastie** had an impressive game with six points, eight rebounds, four blocked shots, and two steals. **Lee Nixon** added nine points off-the-bench before leaving the game with a sprained ankle while Sterley scored seven.

"We knew they (Wofford) were a dangerous team," Alabama senior guard **Doc Martin** said. "They have beaten some strong teams this year and last.

"They gave us a good test and showed us some things we need to work on."

Wofford College men's basketball standout **Ian Chadwick** and Lady Terrier star **Jenny Nett** were both selected to the second-team All-Southern Conference Tournament squad.

Chadwick completed an illustrious Terrier career with 32 points in Wofford's 60-57 opening-round loss to Davidson. It was the third-best career game for Chadwick. His long 3-pointer with 33 seconds left had tied the contest at 57-57. Chadwick topped the SoCon in scoring this year at 20.4 points per game. It was the highest season average in the league since **John Brannen** of Marshall scored at a 20.9 clip in the 1996-97 campaign. Chadwick is the SoCon and Wofford career leader in 3-pointers with 299.

Chadwick was also an All-SoCon Tournament selection last year as he led the Terriers to the semifinal round. His jumper with 2.8 seconds to play gave Wofford a 65-64 quarterfinal-round victory over Davidson a year ago.

Nett posted double-doubles in both Lady Terrier games. She had 18 points and 13 rebounds in a 76-62 victory over Davidson to go with 16 points and 10 boards in the 77-59 loss to Chattanooga. Nett will return next year for a fifth season of eligibility. A Dean's List student with a 3.9 grade-point average, Nett is on pace to become the Lady Terriers' all-time leading scorer.

Both Chadwick and Nett were first-team All-SoCon selections this season. Chadwick became the 25th player in league history to be a three-time All-SoCon performer while Nett received the honor for the second time.

Ian Chadwick scored a career-high 40 points, including 30 in the second half, as he became Wofford's all-time 3-point leader in an 82-74 victory at Georgia Southern in the Southern Conference opener for both teams.

Chadwick's six treys give him 253 in his career as he moved past older brother Seth Chadwick (251, 1993-97) on the Terriers' career list. The younger Chadwick is already the SoCon's all-time 3-point leader.

Wofford (6-6, 1-0) took the lead for good at 47-46 on a Kenny Hastie jumper with 11:38 remaining. It began a 14-4 Terrier run that saw Chadwick cap the spurt with back-to-back 3-pointers as Wofford built a 59-50 lead with 8:32 to play. It also began a stretch that saw Chadwick score 17 consecutive Terrier points over a 5:50 span.

After the Eagles (4-8, 0-1) pulled within 60-56 with 6:09 left, Chadwick hit consecutive 3-pointers to help Wofford extend its margin back to 66-58.

Georgia Southern was able to close the deficit to 73-68 on a pair of Julius Jenkins free-throws with 1:25 remaining. However, Colon Largent grabbed a key offensive rebound and then hit a pair of free-throws with 46 seconds to play to give Wofford a 75-68 lead. The Eagles would not get closer than six points the remainder of the contest.

The Terriers won despite starting center Hastie fouling out with 6:40 to play and Bishop Ravenel also leaving the game with five fouls with 4:23 remaining. Terenthial White, Grant Sterley, and Edvin Masic filled in admirably off-the-bench. White, a student manager on last year's team, had a pair of offensive rebounds as well as making a key free-throw with 2:10 left.

Chadwick's 40 points are the most by a Wofford player since Greg O'Dell had 40 in a 1988-89 contest against Newberry. It ties for the fifth-best single-game performance by a Terrier. The Wofford record is 57 points by Daddy Neal in a 1952-53 game versus Erskine.

Chadwick was 8-of-10 from the field in the second half, including 5-of-6 behind the arc. He hit 9-of-12 free-throws in the final 20 minutes.

Chadwick also leapfrogged Stephon Blanding (1,454 points, 1986-90) and

Jimmy Littlefield (1,459 points, 1965-69) into 10th place on Wofford's all-time scoring list with 1,475 points. Next up is Don Fowler in ninth place with 1,526 points (1953-57).

Two controversial calls in the final 11 seconds led to a 56-55 College of Charleston victory tonight in Southern Conference action from Spartanburg, S.C.

With the Cougars leading 56-55 with 11 seconds to play, Wofford's Colon Largent was called for a blocking foul after a collision with Jeff Bolton. After Bolton missed the front end of the one-and-one, the Terriers came down court before Charleston hit the ball out of bounds with four seconds left. With the Terriers inbounding the ball on the baseline, Wofford's Ian Chadwick was knocked to the ground with no foul called. Bishop Ravenel picked up the loose ball, lost his balance, and was unable to get a shot off as Charleston's Jody Lumpkin slapped the ball away to end the game.

The Cougars improve to 12-2, 4-0 while the Terriers fall to 6-8, 1-2.

Trailing 54-48 with 5:45 to play, Wofford scored seven straight points to take a 55-54 lead on a Mike Lenzly layup with 2:14 left. Lenzly pulled the Terriers within a point at 54-53 when he hit a 3-pointer with 3:50 remaining. The Cougars took the lead back at 56-55 when A.J. Harris hit a short jumper for the game's final points with 1:17 to play. The Terriers had an opportunity to take the lead with 42 seconds left but Ian Chadwick misfired on a jumper. Charleston then ran the clock down before the controversial collision between Bolton and Largent.

"We played well enough to win and deserved to win," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "There was an awful lot of contact on that last series for no call to be made."

Leighton Bowie topped Charleston with 16 points and 10 rebounds. He had 12 of his points in the first half. Jody Lumpkin added 13 points and eight boards with Jeff Bolton scoring 11.

Chadwick led Wofford with 12 points with Ravenel totaling 10 to go with a team-best seven rebounds. The Terriers shot 50.0 percent in the first half to lead 32-27 at the intermission. Wofford was just 8-of-29 (27.6 percent) in the second half compared to Charleston's 12-of-25 (48.0 percent). However, nine offensive rebounds in the final 20 minutes kept the Terriers in the game.



"From my perspective, coming from where I was sitting, it was a good no call," Charleston Head Coach John Kresse. "The referees certainly let bodies fly on both ends like they should.

"I believe this is Richard Johnson's best team since we've been playing Wofford in the Southern Conference. He's got classy players who know the game, who got all out for him at both ends, and are tough this particular season. They are for sure one of the best teams in the Southern Conference and it's going to be a war every time you step on the court against the Terriers."

Karim Souchu had a game-high 21 points while Kenny Zeigler added 15 points and 12 rebounds, including seven offensive, to lead Furman to a 70-62 victory over Wofford tonight in Spartanburg.

The Paladins improve to 6-5, 1-1 while the Terriers fall to 6-7, 1-1. The loss also snaps Wofford's 11-game winning streak in the Benjamin Johnson Arena, which had the Terriers tied with Valparaiso for the 17th-longest current home court winning streak in the nation. Wofford's last home loss was nearly one year ago, a 75-64 defeat to the College of Charleston on Jan. 10, 2000.

After a Lee Nixon jumper gave the Terriers a 44-43 lead with 9:03 to play, Furman took the lead for good at 45-44 on a Souchu layup just 13 seconds later. It also began a 7-0 Paladin run that was capped by a Paul Foster 3-pointer to give Furman a 50-44 advantage with 7:49 remaining.

Nixon countered with a trey to cut the Furman margin back to 50-47, but Paladin point guard Guilherme Da Luz answered with a 3-pointer of his own to begin a 7-2 spurt that increased the Paladin lead to 57-49 with 5:40 to play.

Colon Largent then led a Wofford surge as he had a pair of steals that led to his own dunk and layup, cutting Furman's lead to 57-53 with 4:36 remaining. However, the Terriers would not be able to get closer than four points the remainder of the contest, the last time being 59-55 on a Bishop Ravenel layup with 3:56 left.

An Ian Chadwick free-throw with 1:05 to play trimmed the Terrier deficit to 65-60, but Anthony Thomas hit a pair of free-throws with 53 seconds remaining to put the game away.

"I've been saying for quite some time, and nobody wanted to listen to me, that Furman is one of the best teams in the Southern Conference," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "They really got after it tonight. They played with a lot more energy and enthusiasm than us. For whatever reason, we seemed flat. We didn't have our usual spark.

"Furman is also very athletic and they cause a lot of matchup problems. I hope we learn from this game and come back with a better effort Monday night against the College of Charleston."

Largent led Wofford with 11 points while Ravenel and Nixon added nine. Chadwick, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the contest at 21.7 points per game, was held to a season-low seven points after scoring a career-high 40 in Tuesday's 82-74 win at Georgia Southern. Chadwick was held to single digits for the first time since a Feb. 19 contest last year at Chattanooga when he also scored seven. The SoCon's career leader with 253 career 3-pointers, Chadwick was held without a trey for the first time in 23 games, dating back to a Jan. 25 contest last year versus The Citadel.

"Anytime you can get a road win in the league, it's good," Furman Head Coach Larry Davis said. "Wofford is very tough at home.

"They are a veteran team. When they got the steal and dunk, I thought we answered. That was big. We did a super job on the perimeter, executed down the stretch, and made our free-throws."

Da Luz added 15 points for Furman while Thomas scored 12. Wofford actually outshot (42.9 - 41.4 percent) and outrebounded (37-35) Furman, but was victimized by 17 turnovers. The Terriers shot just 32.1 percent in the first half but were tied 26-26 at the intermission.

Kashien Latham had 19 points to go with a career-high 17 rebounds as Georgia Southern scored the game's opening 15 points before holding off Wofford for a 65-60 victory in Southern Conference action tonight in Spartanburg.

The Eagles, coming off a 68-63 victory over the College of Charleston on Saturday, improve to 9-11 overall and 5-4 in the SoCon. The Terriers drop to 8-12, 3-6.

After Georgia Southern took its 15-0 lead, the Terriers' first points didn't come until Mike Lenzly scored on a driving layup 6:26 into the contest. Wofford eventually got back in the game to trail just 35-28 at the intermission.

The Eagles took their largest lead of the second half at 48-36 on an Edward Keith jump shot with 11:09 to play. Wofford then began its comeback by going on a 12-2 run, capped by an Ian Chadwick 3-pointer, to close within 50-48 with 7:49 remaining.

The Eagles extended their margin back to 56-50 on a pair of Frank Bennett free-throws before the Terriers came charging again. After Chadwick hit another 3-pointer, Lenzly added a pair of free-throws to bring Wofford within 56-55 with 4:24 left.

On Georgia Southern's next possession, with the shot clock about to expire, Bennett scored on a layup and was fouled. His 3-point play pushed the Eagle lead to 59-55. Wofford went 3:03 without a field goal before a Bishop Ravenel dunk cut the Georgia Southern margin to 61-57 with 1:36 remaining. After Wofford's Lee Nixon hit 1-of-2 free-throws to trim the deficit to 61-58 with 30 seconds left, Georgia Southern broke the Terrier press with Latham feeding Kenny Faulk for a breakaway dunk that made the score 63-58 and put an end to Wofford's comeback hopes.

"We were out of sync all night and shot the ball poorly," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson. "Our movement on offense was bad and our defense was non-existent.

"We just didn't play. We're not talented enough to take a night off, especially when you're playing a very good team like Georgia Southern.

I'm very disappointed with our effort. The 3-point play by Bennett with the shot clock winding down was huge. Those are the types of plays that turn games and we didn't make them."

The Terriers shot just 30.0 percent for the game while the Eagles were at 45.9. Georgia Southern also held a 46-37 rebounding edge. Wofford committed just five turnovers while forcing 14 from the Eagles.

"We played great defense," Georgia Southern Head Coach Jeff Price said. "It's the second game in a row that our defense has been the key to us winning. This is a great road win."

Latham recorded his eighth double-double on the season. Julius Jenkins added 13 points while Todd Shipley scored 12. Chadwick had a game-high 23 points for the Terriers with Lenzly and Nixon adding 13 and 11 points, respectively, off-the-bench.

Wofford led by as many as 14 points in the first half before The Citadel rallied to cut the deficit to just 36-31 at the intermission. The Bulldogs then scored the opening four points of the second half to trim the Terrier lead to 36-35. However, Wofford went on a 32-7 run over the next 14:45 to take its largest lead of the night at 68-42 with 4:30 to play. A Chadwick 3-pointer began the spurt that saw The Citadel go 5:30 without a field goal.

"Somebody said it wasn't very pretty and I disagreed by saying it was really pretty -- pretty ugly," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "You got to win ugly.

Mike Lenzly scored a career-high 29 points, including 25 in the first half, while Ian Chadwick added 21 points as Wofford defeated Appalachian State, 86-65, in Southern Conference action tonight in Spartanburg.

After equaling a career-high with 21 points in posting Wofford's first-ever triple-double in Tuesday's 105-69 win over Chattanooga, Lenzly posted a new personal best in points when he hit the sixth of his seven first-half 3-pointers to reach 22 points with 2:45 left before the intermission.

Wofford has now won three of its last four games to improve to 11-14 overall and 6-8 in the SoCon. ASU drops to 10-17, 7-7. It's also the Terriers' first win in four games against the Mountaineers since Wofford began SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign.

After trailing 7-4 to open the game, Wofford went on a 20-2 run over a 7:57 span to take a 24-9 lead with 9:05 left in the first half. Lenzly's first 3-pointer of the game capped the spurt which was keyed by seven points from Chadwick. All seven of Lenzly's first-half 3-pointers came in a 7:59 stretch.

Wofford led by as many as 27 points before taking a 49-25 halftime lead. The Terrier lead then grew to as many as 34 points in the second half.

"It was an outstanding team effort tonight," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "I was real pleased with our guys. They played very well.

"Offensively, we were sharp. We worked inside and got easy shots early which got us out of the block. We then shot really well outside the arc (Wofford was 9-of-15 on 3-pointers in the first half before finishing the game 11-of-25)."

Lee Nixon added 12 points and a career-high nine assists, including eight in the first half, for the Terriers. Seven of Nixon's assists on the night led to Lenzly baskets. Lenzly and Terenthial White tied for the team-high honors in rebounding with five. Lenzly has now either led or been tied for the team lead in rebounding in each of the last four games, which also represent his first four collegiate starts.



Wofford shot 55.3 percent for the game and won despite being outrebounded by a 43-28 margin, including a 19-6 deficit on the offensive end. The Terriers did force 16 turnovers while committing just eight.

"We don't score well enough to allow opponents to build leads like Wofford did in the first half and expect to come back to win," Appalachian State Head Coach Houston Fancher said. "Wofford shot the ball well. We didn't play great defense, but Coach Johnson's team hit open shots.

"Their scoring was no surprise. They have great shooters. We knew we were going to have to defend them well."

Josh Shehan topped ASU with 19 points and seven rebounds while Buddy Davis had 11 points and nine boards. The Mountaineers shot 40.7 percent for the game after a 33.3 effort in the first half.

Mike Lenzly scored a career-high 21 points while Kenny Hastie added a career-best 13 rebounds to lead Wofford to a 68-50 victory over Guilford in the Terriers' home opener tonight in Spartanburg.

Wofford was playing its final game without two-time All-Southern Conference guard Ian Chadwick, starting forward Bishop Ravenel, and center Edvin Masic. The trio was suspended by the NCAA for the opening three games for playing in a non-sanctioned summer basketball tournament. They will make their season debut Monday night when the Terriers host Toccoa Falls.

The Terriers (1-2) overcame a sluggish start that saw them fall behind by nine points in the first half before rallying for a 25-23 halftime lead. A Lee Nixon 3-pointer tied the game with 15 seconds left in the half. Lenzly then stole the ball on Guilford's ensuing possession and drove the length of the court for a layup with one second to go to give the Terriers the lead at the intermission.

Wofford then gradually pulled away in the second half. After the Quakers (0-2) pulled to within six at 35-29 on a pair of Thomas Swindell free-throws with 15:32 remaining, Wofford answered with an 11-0 run, capped by a Jon Pryor 3-pointer, to lead 46-29 with 11:36 to play. Pryor keyed the spurt with six points. Guilford would not get closer than 13 points the remainder of the contest.

"They caught us on a good night," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "We weren't shooting the ball well. There was a chance for Guilford to pull the upset. We survived it."

Wofford forced Guilford into 32 turnovers, including 21 in the first half. The Terriers shot 37.3 percent for the game after a 32.4 mark in the opening 20 minutes.

Lenzly contributed five rebounds and five steals in addition to his 21 points. Hastie had eight points, three blocks, and three steals to go with his 13 boards. Colon Largent and Grant Sterley each added eight points. Largent and Nixon had four steals each as Wofford totaled 19 on the night.

"I was very pleased with our first half except for the turnovers," Guilford Head Coach Butch Estes said. "The turnovers kept us from having a significant lead, because we were scoring effectively and doing everything defensively we wanted. They wore us down in the second half

and were able to get a lot of second shots."

Swindell was the lone Quaker in double figures with 17 points and 10 rebounds.

Mike Lenzly became the first player in Wofford history to record a triple-double while Ian Chadwick added 28 points to lead the Terriers to a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga in Southern Conference action tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

Lenzly equaled a career-high with 21 points to go with a career-best 12 assists and 10 rebounds. The sophomore point guard from Jonesboro, Ga., left the game to a standing ovation after grabbing his 10th board on the defensive end with 2:06 to play. It also marked the third straight game that the 6-foot-3 Lenzly has topped the Terriers in rebounding.

Chadwick's 28 points came on 9-of-13 shooting, including a 7-of-9 performance behind the arc. The SoCon and Wofford all-time leader for 3-pointers now has 285 treys in his career.

The Terriers (10-14, 5-8) never trailed in the contest. A Chadwick 3-pointer and layup capped an 11-2 run to open the game. Chattanooga's Bryan Richardson then answered with a 3-pointer to close the deficit to 11-5. That would be as close as the Mocs (13-11, 7-6) would get the remainder of the contest. Lenzly converted a 3-point play to begin an 8-0 run that gave Wofford a 19-5 lead just 4:23 into the contest. Wofford eventually took a 52-32 halftime lead when Chadwick converted three free-throws after being fouled on a 3-point attempt with no time on the clock.

"It was an outstanding team effort," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "What's special about Mike Lenzly's performance is that he did it in the context of the team.

"Anytime you get a triple-double, it's a great individual accomplishment. Two of those components are team accomplishments. Twelve assists means he's sharing the ball and spreading it around. That's 12 opportunities he could have scored but gave it to other guys on the team. Ten rebounds is just him having an aggressive attitude on the boards and that helps the team. It was a phenomenal individual performance but it came within the context of what we did as a team.

"It was clearly our best outing of the season."

Five Terriers scored in double figures. In addition to Chadwick and

Lenzly, Lee Nixon scored 15 points while Bishop Ravenel added 13 and Kenny Hastie totaled 12. Wofford shot a season-high 57.7 percent from the field and had 31 assists on its 41 baskets.

Richardson topped the Mocs with 14 points while Oliver Morton and Idris Harper each added 10. Brian Dickerson and Diamory Sylla had career-high outings with seven and six points, respectively.

"Tonight was an embarrassing loss," Chattanooga Head Coach Henry Dickerson said. "It's tough. I know we didn't come here to play like this.

"Wofford was quicker to the loose balls. It seemed like every ball on the rim fell down for them. They made their own opportunities."

Tonight represented the highest point total and victory margin for Wofford over a Division I opponent since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 campaign. It was also just the seventh 100-point game allowed by Chattanooga in a regular-season game in its SoCon history.

Lee Nixon scored a career-high 31 points while Ian Chadwick added 27 as a depleted Wofford team shot 55.8 percent from the field in defeating Davidson, 83-73, tonight in Southern Conference action from Spartanburg.

The Terriers announced before the game that starters Jon Pryor and Colon Largent had been dismissed from the program for disciplinary reasons.

Nixon was 11-of-16 from the field as he more than doubled his previous career-high of 15 points set earlier this season at Clemson. Chadwick hit 10-of-13 attempts, including 3-of-6 behind the arc to increase his SoCon and Wofford career-leading 3-point total to 278.

The Terriers trailed by as many as 12 points early in the contest before eventually pulling even on a pair of Nixon free-throws with 57 seconds left in the first half. Nixon then hit a pull-up jumper with six seconds to play before the intermission to give Wofford a 40-39 halftime lead.

The Terriers (9-13, 4-7) opened the second half with a 20-5 run to take their largest lead of the night at 60-44 with 12:18 to play. Chadwick had eight points while Nixon scored seven in the spurt.

Davidson (10-14, 4-7) was able to pull within seven points at 74-67 with 2:57 remaining on a 3-pointer by Michael Bree. However, that would be as close as the Wildcats would get the remainder of the night. Chadwick hit a layup and a pair of free-throws to build the Terrier lead back to 11 points at 78-67 with 1:26 left.

"It was a great team effort tonight," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "It was a fresh start for everybody and I'm just thrilled.

"The kids deserved this one. They worked so hard for it. It would have been very easy to pack it in when we were down 12 in the first half, but they had tremendous resiliency and that's been the hallmark of these guys throughout the year. They deserved this one."

Jouni Eho scored 15 points to lead three Davidson players in double figures. The Wildcats shot 55.6 percent in the first half compared to a 37.9 mark after the intermission. For the game, Davidson finished at 46.4 percent.



"The three spots in the backcourt (Chadwick, Nixon, and Mike Lenzly) beat us like a drum tonight," Davidson Head Coach Bob McKillop said. "Give Nixon credit. We could not stop him. He hit his threes, his jumpers, and his free-throws."

Wofford, playing at home for just the second time in its last six games, returns to the road Saturday at VMI. Davidson will be at Appalachian State.

Mike Lenzly scored 28 points while Lee Nixon added 22 and Ian Chadwick totaled 21 as Wofford rallied from a pair of 10-point second-half deficits for a 90-76 win at Western Carolina.

Trailing 61-52 with 11:38 to play, the Terriers went on a 27-7 run over the next 7:07 to take command of the game with a 79-68 lead with 4:31 left. Chadwick hit back-to-back 3-pointers to cap the spurt. He and Lenzly each had nine points during the run. After Western Carolina scored the next four points to pull within 79-72, Lenzly and Chadwick each hit a pair of free-throws to build the Wofford margin back to 11 with 1:35 to play.

The Terriers took their first lead of the second half at 64-63 on a Lenzly 3-pointer with 7:57 left. The 6-foot-3 sophomore from Jonesboro, Ga., began the game by hitting his first three attempts behind the arc in the game's opening 3:43. His 28 points were just one shy of the career-high 29 he scored in Saturday's 86-65 win over Appalachian State.

"We won this game on the defensive end," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "We got stops when we needed to and that led to our opportunities on the offensive end.

"Our guys really wanted this one down the stretch. They just went after it and got the victory. We have a veteran team and they played like it. This is a very good win. It's huge anytime you can go on the road and win."

Western Carolina shot 60.0 percent in the opening 20 minutes to take a 46-41 halftime lead. The Catamounts were then held to 30 points and 42.4 percent shooting in the second half.

Lenzly played all 40 minutes at point guard and grabbed eight boards he led the Terriers in rebounding for the fifth straight game. Chadwick also played 40 minutes with 19 of his 21 points coming in the second half. Nixon's 22 points represented the second-best effort of his career.

Wofford (12-14, 7-8) won its third straight game and fourth in the last five contests. The Terriers will close the regular season when they host SoCon North Division leader East Tennessee State (16-9, 11-3) Saturday night.

The Terriers have now won three straight to improve to 3-2 on the year. Wofford's 3-2 record also represents its best start since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 campaign. The Tribe fall to 2-2.

Ahead 28-16 at the half, Wofford took its biggest lead of the game at 35-17 on a pair of Colon Largent free-throws with 17:55 to play. The Tribe then rallied and took their only lead of the night at 55-54 on a Sherman Rivers jumper with 4:03 remaining. Wofford then regained the lead for good on its next possession as Largent hit a layup and was fouled for a 3-point play. Chadwick made the play possible with a beautiful assist from the free-throw line. It gave the Terriers a 57-55 lead with 3:37 left.

Kenny Hastie sank a pair of free-throws to extend the Wofford lead to 59-55 with 3:07 to play. After the Tribe pulled within a basket at 59-57, Pryor sank a big 3-pointer to push the Terrier margin back to 62-57 with 2:18 remaining.

The Tribe attempted to rally but a pair of Chadwick free-throws with nine seconds left sealed the game and provided the final margin of 67-63.

"We didn't give anything away," Wofford Head Coach Richard Johnson said. "They came back like the good basketball team that they are.

"They took it to us in the second half. They used their superior size and made shots. It was just a hardfought, well-played game against a really quality opponent. Colon Largent did a tremendous job with four fouls of defending against an All-Colonial player in Jim Moran. Colon refused to give in and was outstanding. Colon has really helped us replace the leadership of a guy like Starzee Walker who graduated."

Bishop Ravenel was also key for the Terriers with eight points and seven rebounds while Largent's nine points and five boards were both season-highs.

Jim Moran led William & Mary with 16 points while Mike Johnson scored 12 and Rivers added 10.

"It was a great game," William & Mary Head Coach Rick Boyages said. "We couldn't buy a basket in the first half. I challenged them at the half. We had to pick up our intensity. We gave a good effort."

Ian Chadwick tied the all-time Southern Conference 3-point record at 245 as he hit four treys on the way to a team-high 22 points in Wofford's 95-81 victory over Bryan College (Tenn.) tonight in Spartanburg.

Chadwick's four 3-pointers, all in the second half, ties him with **Anquell McCollum** (Western Carolina, 1992-96) for the career SoCon mark. SoCon Commisssioner **Alfred White** was in attendance for a ceremony if Chadwick would have broken the record. Instead, the senior guard will now wait until Thursday's game at Vanderbilt. The Wofford mark is 251 3-pointers by Ian's older brother **Seth Chadwick** (1993-97).

After hitting his fourth 3-pointer with exactly four minutes to play, Chadwick had one attempt to put his name alone in the SoCon record book. However, his 35-foot shot with just two seconds remaining bounced off the rim.

The Terriers improve to 5-5 on the season. Wofford also extends its home court winning streak to 11 games, which is tied with Florida for the 18th-longest current streak in Division I. NAIA member Bryan falls to 8-5. In the RPI rankings, which measures Division I games only, Wofford's schedule thus far ranks as the nation's toughest.

Bryan opened the game with a 6-0 lead on consecutive 3-pointers by **Jason Beschta**, who hit seven treys en route to a game-high 29 points. The Lions were 6-of-11 from behind the arc in the first half on the way to 58.3 percent shooting in the opening 20 minutes to build a 38-36 lead at the intermission.

Wofford still trailed 43-42 with 16:22 to play before a **Lee Nixon** jumper began a 23-6 Wofford run that gave the Terriers a 65-49 lead with 9:30 remaining. Nixon, the Terriers' second-leading scorer with 13 points off-the-bench, had seven points to key the spurt. The Lions would get no closer than nine points the remainder of the contest.

Bishop Ravenel and **Kenny Hastie** each added 11 points while **Jon Pryor** had nine points, seven rebounds, and seven assists. **Colon Largent** also scored nine points with **Mike Lenzly** and **Terenthial White** both contributing seven points. **Grant Sterley** had six points as all nine players who saw action had at least six points.

Chadwick's 22 points enabled him to move into 12th place on Wofford's career-scoring list with 1,421 points. **Trap Hart** (1,401 points, 1956-59) was previously in the No. 12 position.
