2002-03 Wofford College Basketball

Feb. 3, 2003, vs. Davidson, Benjamin Johnson Arena (3,500), Spartanburg, S.C.; 7 p.m.

The Game

The Wofford basketball team hosts Davidson in its lone home contest over a five-game stretch.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 season, the Terriers have a 2-5 record against the Wildcats. Behind a career-high 31 points from **Lee Nixon**, Wofford posted an 83-73 win over Davidson in the last meeting between the teams in Spartanburg, S.C.

The Terriers and Wildcats will be South Division rivals next season when Davidson and Chattanooga switch divisions.

Worth Noting

- SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** (11.7 ppg, 5.4 rpg) is averaging 12.9 points while shooting 59.4 percent in SoCon play. He tops the Terriers in blocks (16) and is second in free-throw attempts (66).

- Two-time All-SoCon point guard **Mike Lenzly** had a career-high 32 points in Saturday's UNC Greensboro game, the most by a Terrier since **Ian Chadwick** scored 40 at Georgia Southern on Jan. 2, 2001. Lenzly tops the Terriers in scoring (15.3 ppg) while tying for the team lead in rebounding (5.4 rpg).

- Standout guard **Justin Stephens** is sidelined for the season by a knee injury. He was a member of the All-SoCon Freshman team last year when he averaged 12.4 points, including 14.1 in league action.

- The Terriers' non-conference schedule was ranked as the most difficult in the nation by the RPI and Sagarin Ratings.

- Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I with an enrollment of 1,100, behind only Centenary (850 students). Wofford actually has a higher SAT average (1236) than enrollment (1,100).

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director last Dec. 3 with the announcement that he would coach Wofford just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

About Wofford

- Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).

- Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).

- Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

- With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.

- Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.

- Wofford ranks No. 1 among national liberal arts colleges in "operating efficiency," providing a quality education while spending relatively less.

In the 2000 NCAA Division I Graduation Rate Report, Wofford was the only school in the nation to rank in the Top 10 in all four categories: overall student-athlete graduation rate as well as those for the football, men's basketball, and women's basketball teams.

A Youthful Staff

The Wofford men's basketball coaching staff is the youngest in the country in a national study conducted by Radford University.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

Liking the Home Nets

Wofford's top three shooting nights on the year have come at home, including 52.5 efforts against both Charleston and Chattanooga.

The Terriers shoot 46.6 percent in going 2-2 in league home contests, compared to a 38.6 mark in posting a 2-2 SoCon road record.

Shooting Down Hokies

Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly (15.3 ppg) and **Lee Nixon** (14.1 ppg), the Terriers' top two scorers, were a combined 9-of-13 (69.2 percent) on treys that night.

The Charity Stripe

•Wofford's 70.5 season mark at the free-throw line represents its highest percentage since a 71.1 effort in the 1989-90 campaign.

•The Terriers have a 77.3 percentage in four SoCon road games and a 58.3 mark in four league home contests.

•The Terriers shoot 74.8 percent (104-of-139) in their eight wins and 67.2 (121-of-180) in the 10 losses.

•Leading scorers **Mike Lenzly** and **Lee Nixon** are shooting 87.1 and 84.0 percent, respectively, at the line in SoCon action. They are at 79.4 and 79.6 on the season.

Board Watch

Wofford is 6-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 2-9 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

Days of the Week

Wofford has won its last three Monday games (at The Citadel, Jan. 13; vs. Chattanooga, Jan. 20; vs. Georgia Southern, Jan. 27).

The Terriers are 4-2 overall on Mondays, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford is 3-4 on Saturdays, 1-0 on Tuesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

Schedule Difficulty

•The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

•In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

•The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

•According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

What They're Saying

"I think (Tyler) Berg is outstanding. I don't think there's any question he's putting himself into position to be a force in this league for four years. That's going to be a concern for everybody they play against."

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

•**Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

•**Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

•**Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.4 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 11.7 points per game average (12.9 in SoCon play) is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In Wofford's last two victories, over Chattanooga and Georgia Southern, Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is tied for the Terrier lead in rebounding (5.4 rpg) while placing third in scoring (11.7 ppg). He has a team-high 56.2 field-goal percentage, including 59.4 in SoCon action as his scoring average increases to 12.9 ppg. He also tops Wofford in blocks (16) and is second in free-throw attempts (66).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was listed as doubtful for the Jan. 6 College of Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Pulling Down Boards

Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.4 rpg) and freshman center **Tyler Berg** (5.4 ppg) are in a dead heat for the team rebounding lead. They each have 97 boards on the year.

No Cupcakes at Home

Including tonight, Wofford's five SoCon home opponents (College of Charleston, Chattanooga, East Tennessee State, Georgia Southern, Davidson) this season have a combined 64-33 overall record (.660) and a 27-14 (.659) SoCon mark.

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their eight-man rotation, with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 11.7 points and 5.4 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (4.9 ppg, 3.7 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.9 ppg, 1.7 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 19.5 points and 10.8 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 56.2 and 49.3, respectively. Those marks increase to 59.4 and 50.0 in SoCon play.

Berg and Wilkerson had career-high scoring totals of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in the 73-70 win over Georgia Southern. Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds that night.

In the 60-59 win at Furman, Wilkerson had two key offensive boards in the final minute while Fields hit the game-winning free-throws with 24 seconds left.

Berg and Wilkerson were instrumental in the 79-71 win over Chattanooga. Berg had 14 points while Wilkerson grabbed eight rebounds to go with seven points and three blocks.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

Keeping Busy

Sidelined by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 ETSU home game and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

The Fork Union Pipeline

Head Coach **Mike Young** played one season at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy and refers to longtime FUMA coach **Fletcher Arritt** as one of his coaching mentors.

Nixon stands 6-foot-4 with his hair in cornrows. When he sports the afro, Nixon increases to 6-foot-8.

Worth Noting

The Terriers are 8-0 when holding a halftime lead and 0-10 when behind at the intermission.

In the defeats, Wofford trailed at the break by four or fewer points on five occasions.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has three road wins this season, including two straight in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory last year (66-64 at the College of Charleston).

Two of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman) have been by a combined total of three points with a defensive stand on the final possession of each game.

Game 2 -- Clemson 79, Wofford 72 November 24, 2002 Anderson, S.C.

Wofford and Clemson went down to the wire for the fourth straight year, before the Tigers pulled out a 79-72 victory in Anderson, S.C.

Trailing 49-34 at the half, Wofford faced its largest deficit of the contest at 52-34 with 18:20 to play.

The Terriers, playing the second half without an injured **Justin Stephens**, answered with a 24-9 run to pull within 61-58 on a **Tyler Berg** hook with 9:11 remaining. The freshman center had nine points during the spurt as he finished the game with 13 points and seven rebounds, including 11 points and five boards in the second half.

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

In their bid for a second straight win over a Big East opponent, the Terriers went down to the wire with West Virginia before dropping a 79-69 decision.

West Virginia, with a win over Florida earlier this season, shot 78.3 percent (18-of-23) in the second half and 63.3 for the game. The Mountaineers were 8-of-17 from 3-point range.

Wofford held a 33-21 rebounding edge, including 17-to-5 on the offensive end. However, the Terriers were just 3-of-16 behind the arc.

DAVIDSON AT WOFFORD

Game 9 -- No. 24 NC State 86, Wofford 71 December 29, 2002 Raleigh, N.C.

Julius Hodge had 26 points and 11 rebounds to lead No. 24 NC State to an 86-71 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 10,780 in Raleigh and a regional television audience.

Lee Nixon and **Mike Lenzy** topped the Terriers with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Nixon added a team-best seven rebounds which also equaled a career-high for the senior guard. Freshman center **Tyler Berg** contributed 10 points off-the-bench.

A Nixon free-throw with 8:35 to play in the first half pulled Wofford within 20-15. However, Hodge then keyed a 13-2 NC State run which helped the Wolfpack to their 14-point margin at the intermission.

The Terriers shot just 37.0 percent, including missing all eight 3-point attempts, in falling behind 38-24 at the half. Wofford made 47.1 percent of its field-goal attempts in the second half in being outscored just 48-47.

N.C. State was 22-of-25 (88.0 percent) at the free-throw line while Wofford was just 14-of-23 (60.9 percent). The Terriers came into the game shooting 73.9 for the season at the charity stripe.

Clifford Crawford added 22 points for NC State, who entered the game having outscored its opponents by an average of 21.5 points.

Game 12 -- Wofford 60, Furman 59 January 11, 2003 Greenville, S.C.

Freshman **Byron Fields** sank a pair of free-throws with 24 seconds left to cap a five-point Wofford comeback in the final 3:48 as the Terriers defeated Furman, 60-59, in Greenville, S.C.

The Terriers were a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line, including a 10-of-10 performance by **Mike Lenzly** on the way to his team-high 17 points.

Wofford won despite shooting a season-low 32.1 percent, including just 25.0 percent (6-of-24) in the second half. The Terriers were also outrebounded 40-31 and were beset by foul trouble as **Tyler Berg** and **Adrien Borders** were limited to just 13 and 22 minutes, respectively, before fouling out.

With Wofford trailing 57-53 with 1:48 to play, Lenzly was fouled on a 3-point attempt and made all three free-throws to pull the Terriers within 57-56. After a **Kenny Zeigler** layup gave Furman a 59-56 lead, **Sam Daniels** pulled the Terriers within a point at 59-58 with a layup off his own offensive rebound at the 1:00 mark. It was part of three offensive boards for the Terriers on that possession.

Following Fields' free-throws, the Paladins missed three shots in the final eight seconds. After a Zeigler jumper misfired, Furman regained possession on the alternate jump ball with five seconds left. **Karim Souchu** then missed a hanging jumper with three seconds to play with Zeigler unable to convert the putback as time expired.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen Tyler Berg and Howard Wilkerson had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A Terry Williams' 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. After Wofford's Mike Lenzly and Georgia Southern's Julius Jenkins traded layups, the Terriers took a 70-68 lead with 31 seconds remaining when Wilkerson made a pair of free-throws after being fouled on an offensive rebound. In addition to his career-high points, Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds.

The Eagles tied the game at 70-70 on a Jenkins layup with 16 seconds to play, setting the stage for Nixon's long 3-pointer which provided the winning points. Georgia Southern had a final chance to tie but Kordel Gibson missed a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

Georgia Southern scored the game's opening nine points and twice led by 10 points, before Wofford battled back to take its first lead of the night at 35-33 on a pair of Wilkerson free-throws with 1:54 remaining in the first half. The Terriers eventually took a 37-36 lead into the locker room at the intermission.

Jenkins, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the game (23.6 ppg), was held to 4-of-14 shooting, including 2-of-8 from 3-point range.

Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Wofford held its one-point lead at the half despite shooting 40.0 percent compared to 57.7 for the Eagles.

Mike Lenzly had a career-high 32 points, including 26 in the second half, as Wofford attempted a valiant comeback before dropping an 85-79 decision at UNC Greensboro.

The Terriers trailed 42-33 at the half and faced their largest deficit of the game at 63-48 with 10:54 to play. However, Lenzly hit a 3-pointer, a pair of free-throws, and a layup in just 43 seconds as Wofford cut the deficit to 63-55 with 10:11 left. Lenzly scored a total of 14 consecutive Terrier points in a 3:50 span.

The Spartans built their lead back to 12 points with 4:49 to play and still led 80-71 with 1:55 remaining when Wofford attempted a final rally. An Adrien Borders layup and a long Lenzly 3-pointer trimmed the UNCG margin to just 80-76 with 1:14 left.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, Mike Lenzly had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading a torrid shooting Wofford team to a 98-82 victory over Davidson tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win in the 2000-01 campaign.

The Terriers' 5-4 SoCon record equals their best start (1999-00) in their six-year SoCon history. Wofford is 9-10 overall after playing the nation's most difficult pre-conference schedule according to the RPI and Sagarin Ratings. Davidson drops to 12-7 overall and 6-3 in the SoCon.

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while Grant Sterley connected on a pair of 3-pointers in scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took its largest lead of the first half when Adrien Borders connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half and give the Terriers a 52-30 lead at the intermission.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a Lee Nixon jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon had 22 points.

Davidson answered with a 27-10 run over the next 7:12 to pull within 66-57 on a 3-point play by Terrell Ivory with 11:36 to play. The Wildcats still trailed 68-59 on a Conor Grace layup with 10:08 left, but that would be as close as they would get the remainder of the night.

"It was a great team effort from our guys," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "We shared the basketball, played defense, and outrebounded them (39-38).

"Mike Lenzly has had a great 48 hours. He and Lee Nixon (both seniors) may have a sense of urgency. They don't have many games left.

"Our students created a great home court. They make the Benjamin Johnson Arena one of the toughest places to play in the conference."

Davidson entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but was held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0). Ian Johnson topped the Wildcats with 26 points while Matt McKillop scored 18 and Grace had 10.

"Our defense was a no-show tonight," Davidson coach Bob McKillop said. "That's difficult for me to say because we take such pride in our defense.

"We just did not have the energy to get over the hump. Plain and simple, we just got outfought tonight."

Sam Daniels equaled a season-high with 13 points while grabbing a team-best seven rebounds for Wofford.

The Terriers' 13 3-pointers equaled a season-high, set in the 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford begins a stretch of three consecutive road games when it travels to VMI for a 1 p.m. contest on

The Game

The Wofford basketball team will look to continue the momentum from Monday's 98-82 rout of Davidson when it travels to VMI in the first of three consecutive road games for the Terriers.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, the Terriers are 3-3 versus the Keydets. Wofford is 0-2 versus VMI in Lexington, Va. With VMI leaving the SoCon for the Big South Conference at the conclusion of the year, this is the final regular-season meeting as SoCon rivals between the teams.

Wofford took a 78-68 decision over VMI last year as **Mike Lenzly** had 17 points and a career-high tying 14 rebounds.

Worth Noting

•SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** (11.4 ppg, 5.3 rpg) is averaging 12.1 points while shooting 59.7 percent in league play.

•Point guard **Mike Lenzly** followed a career-high 32 points at UNCG with 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists, and no turnovers in Monday's 98-82 win over Davidson. Lenzly tops the Terriers in scoring (15.8 ppg), rebounding (5.4 rpg), assists (3.8 apg), steals (28), 3-pointers (48), free-throw attempts (73) and percentage (80.8).

•Standout guard **Justin Stephens** is sidelined for the season by a knee injury. He was a member of the All-SoCon Freshman team last year when he averaged 12.4 points, including 14.1 in league action.

•The Terriers' non-conference schedule was ranked as the most difficult in the nation by the RPI and Sagarin Ratings.

•Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I with an enrollment of 1,100, behind only Centenary (850 students). Wofford actually has a higher SAT average (1236) than enrollment (1,100).

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director last Dec. 3 with the announcement that he would coach Wofford just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

About Wofford

- Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).

- Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).

- Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

- With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.

- Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.

A Youthful Staff

The Wofford men's basketball coaching staff is the youngest in the country in a national study conducted by Radford University.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

Liking the Home Nets

Wofford's top six field-goal performances on the season have come at home, including a 54.0 effort in Monday's 98-82 rout of Davidson.

The Terriers shoot 48.1 percent in going 3-2 in league home contests, compared to a 38.6 mark in posting a 2-2 SoCon road record.

Shooting Down Hokies

Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly (15.8 ppg) and **Lee Nixon** (14.5 ppg), the Terriers' top two scorers, were a combined 9-of-13 (69.2 percent) on treys that night.

The Charity Stripe

•Wofford's 69.9 season mark at the free-throw line represents its highest percentage since a 70.6 effort in the 1988-89 campaign.

•The Terriers have a 77.3 percentage in four SoCon road games and a 59.8 mark in five league home contests.

•The Terriers shoot 72.9 percent (121-of-166) in their nine wins and 67.2 (121-of-180) in the 10 losses.

•Leading scorers **Mike Lenzly** and **Lee Nixon** are shooting 88.9 and 78.1 percent, respectively, at the line in SoCon action. They're at 80.8 and 76.8 on the season.

The Lone One

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (No. 8, 15.8 ppg) and assists (No. 8, 3.8 apg) in addition to the Top 20 in rebounding (No. 19, 5.4 rpg).

Days of the Week

Wofford has won its last four Monday games and is 5-2 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford is 3-4 on Saturdays, 1-0 on Tuesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

Schedule Difficulty

•The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

•In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

•The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

•According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

- Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

- Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

- Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.3 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 11.4 points per game average (12.1 in SoCon play) is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In recent victories over Chattanooga and Georgia Southern, Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (5.3 rpg) while placing third in scoring (11.4 ppg). He has a team-high 56.4 field-goal percentage, including 59.7 in SoCon action as his scoring average increases to 12.1 ppg. He also tops Wofford in blocks (16) and is second in free-throw attempts (68).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was listed as doubtful for the Jan. 6 College of Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

- Wofford is 7-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 2-9 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

- Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.4 rpg) holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (5.3 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of two more boards (103-101).

- In SoCon play, Berg has more offensive rebounds (24) than defense (20).

- Despite being outrebounded on the year by 48 boards (705-657), Wofford does hold the edge in offensive rebounding (241-240).

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their eight-man rotation, with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 11.4 points and 5.3 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.1 ppg, 3.6 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.9 ppg, 1.6 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 19.4 points and 10.5 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 56.4 and 51.4, respectively. Those marks increase to 59.7 and 54.1 in SoCon play.

Berg and Wilkerson had career-high scoring totals of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in the 73-70 win over Georgia Southern. Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds that night.

In the 60-59 win at Furman, Wilkerson had two key offensive boards in the final minute while Fields hit the game-winning free-throws with 24 seconds left.

Berg and Wilkerson were instrumental in the 79-71 win over Chattanooga. Berg had 14 points while Wilkerson grabbed eight rebounds to go with seven points and three blocks.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

The Terriers are 9-0 when holding a halftime lead and 0-10 when behind at the intermission.

In the defeats, Wofford trailed at the break by four or fewer points on five occasions.

The Fork Union Pipeline

Head Coach **Mike Young** played one season at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy and refers to longtime FUMA coach **Fletcher Arritt** as one of his coaching mentors.

Quality Victories

Each of Wofford's last three wins (79-71 vs. Chattanooga; 73-70 vs. Georgia Southern; 98-82 vs. Davidson) were over teams residing in first or second place at the time.

Davidson Notables

- Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

- Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

- The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech.

- The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has three road wins this season, including two in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory last year (66-64 at the College of Charleston).

Two of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman) have been by a combined total of three points with a defensive stand on the final possession of each game.

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Game 18 -- UNC Greensboro 85, Wofford 79 February 1, 2003 Greensboro, N.C.

Mike Lenzly had a career-high 32 points, including 26 in the second half, as Wofford attempted a valiant comeback before dropping an 85-79 decision at UNC Greensboro.

The Terriers trailed 42-33 at the half and faced their largest deficit of the game at 63-48 with 10:54 to play. However, Lenzly hit a 3-pointer, a pair of free-throws, and a layup in just 43 seconds as Wofford cut the deficit to 63-55 with 10:11 left. Lenzly scored a total of 14 consecutive Terrier points in a 3:50 span.

The Spartans built their lead back to 12 points with 4:49 to play and still led 80-71 with 1:55 remaining when Wofford attempted a final rally. An **Adrien Borders** layup and a long Lenzly 3-pointer trimmed the UNCG margin to just 80-76 with 1:14 left, but that would be as close as the Terriers would get the remainder of the night.

Game 19 -- Wofford 98, Davidson 82 February 3, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Wofford point guard Mike Lenzly was named the Men's College Player of the Week by the Spartanburg Tip-Off Club.

At its meeting each Friday, the Spartanburg Tip-Off Club recognizes a men's and women's player of the week among the local colleges and universities.

Following a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro last Saturday, Lenzly had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in the Terriers' 98-82 win over Davidson on Monday.

Lenzly was 8-of-12 from the field, including 5-of-7 on 3-pointers, against the Wildcats. He had 17 first-half points (4-of-4 on 3-pointers) as Wofford built a 52-30 lead at the intermission.

The senior from Jonesboro, Ga., scored 26 points in the second half at UNCG, including seven in a 43-second span. He also had 14 straight Wofford points over a 3:50 stretch.

For the week, Lenzly averaged 29.0 points on 59.4 percent shooting (19-of-32), including 9-of-17 (52.9 percent) on 3-pointers. He also averaged 4.5 rebounds, 4.0 assists, and 1.5 steals in the two games.

Lenzly tops the Terriers in scoring (15.8 ppg), rebounding (5.4 rpg), assists (3.8 apg), steals (28), 3-pointers (48), free-throw attempts (73) and percentage (80.8).

Terriers Win Overtime Thriller at VMI February 8, 2003

Lee Nixon scored 26 points, including a running jumper with 0.2 seconds to play to force overtime, while **Sam Daniels** hit a key 3-pointer in overtime on the way to a career-high 19 points, as Wofford took a 94-93 thriller over VMI in Lexington, Va.

The Terriers (10-10, 6-4) played short-handed as starting forward **Grant Sterley** missed the game with a sprained ankle, while point guard **Mike Lenzly** fouled out with 1:28 left in regulation.

Wofford led 43-33 at the half, and took their largest lead of the game at 50-35 on a Daniels trey with 18:05 to play. The Keydets then got back in the game behind 70.8 percent (17-of-24) shooting in the second half. VMI took a 59-58 lead on a **Radee Skipworth** layup with 10:15 left. Skipworth had 22 points in the second half and four in overtime on the way to a game-high 37.

VMI (6-15, 1-9) built its margin to as large as six points, 67-61, with 5:21 to play on a **Tadas Mankevicius** layup.

Nixon then answered with a 3-pointer and layup to begin a 10-2 Wofford spurt capped by a Lenzly trey that gave the Terriers a 71-69 with 3:23 left.

A Skipworth layup and two **Richard Little** free throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. **David Eaton** then tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton, who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes. A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper with 0.2 seconds left to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A **Howard Wilkerson** free throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon then sealed the game with a pair of free throws to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the buzzer to provide the final margin.

"I'm really proud of our guys for playing smart basketball and winning a tough game in a snakepit," said Terrier Head Coach **Mike Young**. "It is really tough for visiting teams to win here.

"We had a lot of guys step up. Sam [Daniels] and **Adrien Borders** [forced to play the point when Lenzly fouled out] were terrific. We were tough when it really counted."

The Terriers built their 10-point halftime lead by shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) in the opening 20 minutes. A total of five Terriers scored in double figures. Wilkerson, starting in place of Sterley, had 12 points, one shy of his career-best. He also equaled a career-high with a team-leading nine rebounds. Lenzly added 11 points to go with six rebounds, five assists and no turnovers in 35 minutes. He now has 12 assists and no turnovers in 72 minutes over the last two games.

Wofford shot 54.0 percent from the field for the second straight game.

The Terriers play the second of three consecutive road games when they travel to Chattanooga Monday for a 7 p.m. game.

The Game

The Wofford basketball team will look to continue the momentum of a three-game winning streak when it travels to Georgia Southern.

The Terriers are averaging 94.7 points while shooting 54.9 percent, including 46.7 (35-of-75) from 3-point range, in their current three-game victory run. The Georgia Southern contest will close a stretch of three consecutive road games for Wofford, which has already won at VMI and Chattanooga in the first two stops on the swing.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, the Terriers have an 8-3 record against the Eagles. Wofford is 5-1 in Spartanburg and 3-2 in Statesboro.

A Lee Nixon 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play provided the winning points for Wofford in its 73-70 win over Georgia Southern in the first meeting (Jan. 27) between the teams this season.

Worth Noting

•SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** (10.7 ppg, 5.0 rpg) scored a career-high 23 points (10-of-15 from the field) in the Terriers' 73-70 win over Georgia Southern.

•Point guard **Mike Lenzy** is the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (No. 7, 16.4 ppg) and assists (No. 8, 4.0 apg) in addition to the Top 20 in rebounding (No. 19, 5.5 rpg). Over the last four games, he's averaging 25.3 points, 5.5 rebounds, 5.0 assists, and 1.5 steals. He's shooting 60.4 percent (32-of-53), including 60.7 (17-of-28) on 3-pointers, in that span.

•After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is a half-game out of second place in the South Division while holding the tiebreaker edge on Chattanooga.

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director last Dec. 3 with the announcement that he would coach Wofford just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

•The Terriers have scored at least 90 points in three consecutive games for the first time since competing in Division II in Feb. 1993, when Wofford reached the plateau in consecutive games against Newberry (93-77), Gardner-Webb (101-73), and USC Aiken (94-96).

•The Terriers shoot 48.1 percent in going 3-2 in league home contests, compared to a 44.4 mark in posting a 4-2 SoCon road record.

•Six of Wofford's top eight field-goal performances on the season have come at home. The Terriers shoot 50.0 percent in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and 42.0 on the road.

•Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** were a combined 9-of-13 on treys that night.

Setting the SoCon Pace

Wofford tops the SoCon in assist-to-turnover ratio at 1.05.

The Terriers are averaging 15.7 assists and 15.0 turnovers per game on the season. In SoCon action, Wofford averages 16.8 assists and 13.9 turnovers.

Days of the Week

Wofford has won its last five Monday games and is 6-2 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford is 4-4 on Saturdays, 1-0 on Tuesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

Schedule Difficulty

•The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

•In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

•The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

•According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

Waiting in the Wings

Greg Taylor, a transfer from the University of South Carolina, is sitting out this season per NCAA transfer rules.

The 6-foot-5 guard will have two years of eligibility with the Terriers.

Taylor signed with **Eddie Fogler** at USC after a highly decorated prep career at Hillcrest High School in Simpsonville, S.C.

Forget the Stats

Trailing 40-39 at the intermission to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6), Wofford was 17-of-28 (60.7 percent) from the field in the second half and lost 88-79.

Leading Furman 33-31 at the half (Jan. 11), the Terriers were just 6-of-24 (25.0 percent) over the final 20 minutes and won 60-59.

The Charity Stripe

- The Terriers have a 73.1 free-throw percentage in six SoCon road games and a 59.8 mark in five league home contests.

- Leading scorers **Mike Lenzly** and **Lee Nixon** are shooting 89.1 and 80.4 percent, respectively, at the line in SoCon action. They're at 81.9 and 78.6 on the season.

- The Terriers shoot 71.2 percent (151-of-212) in their 11 wins and 67.2 (121-of-180) in the 10 losses.

- Wofford's 69.4 season mark at the free-throw line represents its highest percentage since a 70.6 effort in the 1988-89 campaign.

- Wofford was a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line in the 60-59 win at Furman (Jan. 11), just one game after shooting a season-low 40.0 percent (6-of-15) in an 88-79 loss to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6).

Checking the Sagarin Ratings and RPI

In the Sagarin Ratings for games through Feb. 13, the Terriers are ranked No. 159 out of 327 Division I programs, placing sixth among SoCon schools. Wofford was ranked No. 174 in the RPI prior to Monday's 92-83 win at Chattanooga.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

Keeping Busy

Sidelined for the season by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 ETSU home game and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

Stephens also served as the official scorer at the Feb. 10 Wofford women's basketball home game versus Furman.

Whatever Happened To...

Former Terrier guard **Ian Chadwick**, arguably the best player in Wofford basketball history, is playing with the Mattersburg 49ers in the top division of Austria.

A 2001 Wofford graduate with a degree in business economics, Chadwick was a three-time All-SoCon selection and the league's career 3-point leader with 299. He was runner-up for SoCon Player of the Year honors his senior year.

Chadwick finished his career sixth on the Terriers' all-time scoring list with 1,789 points.

Hanging Out with Grant

Starting forward **Grant Sterley** was the overwhelming favorite in a Wofford web page poll that asked, "With which Terrier player would you most like to spend the day?"

Raising \$\$\$\$

Terrier coach **Mike Young's** wife, Margaret, is the drive co-chairman for the Terrier Club, Wofford's fundraising organization which raised \$1,053,252 in 2002 for scholarship support for Terrier student-athletes.

Baby Watch

Wofford coach **Mike Young** became a father for the second time when his wife, Margaret, gave birth to **Robert Davis Young** (six pounds, 15 ounces), on Jan. 9 at 12:08 p.m.

The Youngs have a three-year-old daughter, Cooper, who is a fixture at Wofford home games in her Terrier cheerleading uniform.

Senior guard **Lee Nixon** had two heights this year for the Wofford basketball team.

Nixon stands 6-foot-4 with his hair shaved or in cornrows. When he sported the afro, Nixon increased to 6-foot-8.

SoCon Streaks

Wofford has put together a three-game SoCon winning streak for the fifth consecutive season. Only once, in the 1998-99 campaign, have the Terriers been able to extend that streak to four games.

The Terriers have opened their current stretch of three consecutive road games with wins at VMI (94-93) and Chattanooga (92-83). The 1998-99 season also represents the lone occasion in which Wofford has won three straight SoCon road games.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

•**Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

•**Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

•**Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.7 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 10.7 points per game average is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In recent victories over Chattanooga (Jan. 20) and Georgia Southern (Jan. 27), Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (5.0 rpg) while placing third in scoring (10.7 ppg). He has a team-high 56.9 field-goal percentage, including 60.5 in SoCon action. He also tops Wofford in blocks (18) and is second in free-throw attempts (72).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was listed as doubtful for the Jan. 6 College of Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

•Wofford is 8-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 3-9 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

•Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.5 rpg) holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (5.0 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of 10 more boards (116-106).

•In SoCon play, Berg has nearly as many offensive rebounds (24) as defensive (25).

•Despite being outrebounded on the year by 59 boards (778-719), Wofford is nearly even in offensive rebounding (259-268).

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their rotation, with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 10.7 points and 5.0 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.6 ppg, 4.0 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.7 ppg, 1.5 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 19.0 points and 10.5 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 56.9 and 52.9, respectively. Those marks increase to 60.5 and 55.8 in SoCon play.

Berg and Wilkerson had career-high scoring totals of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in the 73-70 win over Georgia Southern. Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds that night.

In the 60-59 win at Furman, Wilkerson had two key offensive boards in the final minute while Fields hit the game-winning free-throws with 24 seconds left.

Berg and Wilkerson were instrumental in a 79-71 win over Chattanooga. Berg had 14 points while Wilkerson grabbed eight rebounds to go with seven points and three blocks.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

The Terriers are 11-0 when holding a half-time lead and 0-10 when behind at the intermission. In defeat, Wofford trailed at the break by four or fewer points on five occasions.

Surprise, Surprise

After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is just a half-game out of second place in the South Division while holding the tiebreaker advantage over Chattanooga.

Davidson Notables

•Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson (Feb. 3) represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

•Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

•The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

•The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has five road wins this season, including a 4-2 mark in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory for all of last year (66-64 at College of Charleston).

Three of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman, 94-93 at VMI) have been by a combined total of four points with a defensive stand on the final possession in two of those contests (Virginia Tech, Furman).

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Game 6 -- West Virginia 79, Wofford 69 December 14, 2002 Morgantown, W.Va.

In their bid for a second straight win over a Big East opponent, the Terriers went down to the wire with West Virginia before dropping a 79-69 decision.

Wofford had three consecutive dunks in a 1:30 span, including a pair of spectacular alley-oop slams by Lee Nixon, to close within 60-55 with 6:33 to play. However, the Mountaineers answered with a 9-0 run to build their margin back to 14 with 4:23 left. Mike Lenzly then had six points to key an 8-2 spurt that cut the Terrier deficit to 71-63 with 2:42 remaining.

Nixon topped the Terriers with 19 points while freshman center Tyler Berg contributed 15 points and seven rebounds off-the-bench.

West Virginia, with a win over Florida earlier this season, shot 78.3 percent (18-of-23) in the second half and 63.3 for the game. The Mountaineers were 8-of-17 from 3-point range.

Wofford held a 33-21 rebounding edge, including 17-to-5 on the offensive end. However, the Terriers were just 3-of-16 behind the arc.

Game 9 -- No. 24 NC State 86, Wofford 71 December 29, 2002 Raleigh, N.C.

Julius Hodge had 26 points and 11 rebounds to lead No. 24 NC State to an 86-71 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 10,780 in Raleigh and a regional television audience.

Lee Nixon and **Mike Lenzly** topped the Terriers with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Nixon added a team-best seven rebounds which also equaled a career-high for the senior guard. Freshman center **Tyler Berg** contributed 10 points off-the-bench.

A Nixon free-throw with 8:35 to play in the first half pulled Wofford within 20-15. However, Hodge then keyed a 13-2 NC State run which helped the Wolfpack to their 14-point margin at the intermission.

The Terriers shot just 37.0 percent, including missing all eight 3-point attempts, in falling behind 38-24 at the half. Wofford made 47.1 percent of its field-goal attempts in the second half in being outscored just 48-47.

N.C. State was 22-of-25 (88.0 percent) at the free-throw line while Wofford was just 14-of-23 (60.9 percent). The Terriers came into the game shooting 73.9 for the season at the charity stripe.

Clifford Crawford added 22 points for NC State, who entered the game having outscored its opponents by an average of 21.5 points.

Wofford shot 52.8 percent for the game, including 60.7 (17-of-28) in the second half. However, the Terriers were victimized by a 6-of-15 (40.0 percent) night at the free-throw line. Wofford also had 18 turnovers to just 10 for Charleston.

Troy Wheless led the Cougars with a career-high 26 points, including five 3-pointers.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen **Tyler Berg** and **Howard Wilkerson** had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A **Terry Williams'** 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. After Wofford's **Mike Lenzly** and Georgia Southern's **Julius Jenkins** traded layups, the Terriers took a 70-68 lead with 31 seconds remaining when Wilkerson made a pair of free-throws after being fouled on an offensive rebound. In addition to his career-high points, Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds.

The Eagles tied the game at 70-70 on a Jenkins layup with 16 seconds to play, setting the stage for Nixon's long 3-pointer which provided the winning points. Georgia Southern had a final chance to tie but **Kordel Gibson** missed a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

Georgia Southern scored the game's opening nine points and twice led by 10 points, before Wofford battled back to take its first lead of the night at 35-33 on a pair of Wilkerson free-throws with 1:54 remaining in the first half. The Terriers eventually took a 37-36 lead into the locker room at the intermission.

Jenkins, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the game (23.6 ppg), was held to 4-of-14 shooting, including 2-of-8 from 3-point range.

Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Wofford held its one-point lead at the half despite shooting 40.0 percent compared to 57.7 for the Eagles.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Lee Nixon scored 26 points, including a running jumper with 0.2 seconds to play to force overtime, while **Sam Daniels** hit a key 3-pointer in the extra period on the way to a career-high 19 points as Wofford took a 94-93 thriller over VMI in Lexington, Va.

The Terriers played shorthanded as starting forward **Grant Sterley** missed the game with a sprained ankle while point guard **Mike Lenzly** fouled out with 1:28 left in regulation.

The Terriers led 43-33 at the half and took their largest lead of the game at 50-35 on a Daniels trey with 18:05 to play. The Keydets got back in the game behind 70.8 percent (17-of-24) shooting in the second half. VMI took a 59-58 lead on a **Radee Skipworth** layup with 10:15 left.

VMI built their margin to as large as six points, 67-61, with 5:21 to play on a **Tadas Mankevicius** layup.

Nixon then answered with a 3-pointer and layup to begin a 10-2 Wofford spurt, capped by a Lenzly trey, that gave the Terriers a 71-69 lead with 3:23 left.

A Skipworth layup and two **Richard Little** free-throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. **David Eaton** tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes.

A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A **Howard Wilkerson** free-throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon sealed the game with a pair of free-throws

to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the final buzzer to provide the final margin.

Wofford built its 10-point halftime lead by shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) in the opening 20 minutes.

Five Terriers scored in double figures. Wilkerson, starting in place of Sterley, had 12 points, one shy of his career-best. He also equaled a career-high with a team-leading nine rebounds.

Wofford shot 54.0 percent from the field for the second straight game.

Mike Lenzly equaled a career-high with 32 points, including 6-of-7 shooting on 3-pointers and 10-of-13 overall, to lead Wofford to a 92-83 victory at Chattanooga.

Lenzly also had seven rebounds and seven assists while playing all 40 minutes as the Terriers won at McKenzie Arena for the first time.

After Chattanooga took its first lead of the second half at 48-47 with 17:48 to play, Lenzly answered with three consecutive 3-pointers to put Wofford on top 56-48 with 16:28 remaining.

Terriers Drop Heartbreaker to Eagles February 15, 2003

The Wofford basketball team's quest for a third-straight road victory in a week came to an end tonight with a 69-68 loss to Georgia Southern in Statesboro, Ga.

Down one with 11.6 seconds left, the Terriers called time out to set up a final play. With the clock winding down, **Mike Lenzly** drove to the basket, drew contact, and was knocked to the ground. However, the officials ruled that time had expired.

A Lenzly free throw with 47 seconds left gave Wofford a 68-67 lead. However, Georgia Southern countered on its next possession with a **Julius Jenkins** driving layup to take a 69-68 lead with 36 seconds to play. Jenkins had 17 points and 11 rebounds.

The Terriers (11-11, 7-5) trailed 36-31 at the intermission, but took their first lead of the second half at 47-46 on an **Adrien Borders** jumper with 11:36 remaining. It capped an 11-4 Wofford run. Wofford took its largest lead of the second half at 64-58 on a **Howard Wilkerson** layup with 5:45 to play. Georgia Southern (13-10, 6-6) then ran off seven straight points to take a 65-64 lead on a **Frank Bennett** layup off of an offensive rebound with 2:28 to play. The Eagles had 17 offensive rebounds and held a 43-34 edge in total rebounding on the night. Wofford broke a 4:17 scoreless drought on a 3-point play by Lenzly which gave the Terriers a 67-65 lead with 1:28 to play.

Lenzly, Borders, and **Lee Nixon** all had 13 points for Wofford, while Wilkerson had nine points and a team-high eight rebounds.

"They got the stops when they needed to," said Wofford Head Coach Mike Young. "They also took us out of some things we wanted to do the last three or four minutes. We came here expecting to win and were disappointed. Bottom line - Georgia Southern played better than we did tonight."

Bennett led Georgia Southern with 19 points. The Terriers fall a game behind Chattanooga for second place in the South Division, which carries a bye in the opening round of the SoCon Tournament. Wofford hosts Appalachian State, the nation's highest-scoring team in Division I, Monday at 7 p.m. in the Benjamin Johnson Arena. The Terriers will close SoCon play with three of its final four games at home.

The Game

After playing three straight road games and four of the last five away from home, the Wofford basketball team returns to the Benjamin Johnson Arena to host SoCon North Division leader Appalachian State.

The contest was originally slated for Feb. 17, but was postponed 24 hours due to the area's winter storm.

The Mountaineers are the nation's highest scoring team with an average of 86.4 points per game.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, the Terriers have a 1-4 record versus the Mountaineers. Wofford's lone victory over Appalachian State was an 86-65 decision when the teams last met in Spartanburg, S.C., during the 2000-01 campaign. In that game, Terrier point guard **Mike Lenzly** had seven first-half 3-pointers on the way to a 29-point night.

Worth Noting

•SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** places third on the Terriers in scoring (10.5 ppg) and second in rebounding (5.0 rpg). He's shooting a team-best 57.7 percent on the season, including 62.0 in SoCon play.

•For most of the season, Terrier point guard **Mike Lenzly** has been the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (16.2 ppg) and assists (4.0 apg) in addition to the Top 20 in rebounding (5.4 rpg).

•After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is one game out of second place in the South Division while holding the tiebreaker advantage over Chattanooga.

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director on Dec. 3, 2001 with the announcement that he would coach just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

- Wofford averaged 94.7 points while shooting 54.9 percent, including 46.7 (35-of-75) from 3-point range, in a three-game winning streak that was snapped Saturday at Georgia Southern.

- The Terriers scored at least 90 points in three consecutive games for the first time since competing in Division II in Feb. 1993, when Wofford reached the plateau in consecutive games against Newberry (93-77), Gardner-Webb (101-73), and USC Aiken (94-96).

- Wofford is 7-1 when shooting at least 50.0 percent and 9-1 with at least a 44.6 percentage.

- The Terriers shoot 48.1 percent in going 3-2 in league home contests, compared to a 44.1 mark in posting a 4-3 SoCon road record.

- Six of Wofford's top eight field-goal performances on the season have come at home. The Terriers shoot 50.0 percent in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and 42.1 on the road.

- Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** were a combined 9-of-13 on treys that night.

Schedule Difficulty

- The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

- In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

- The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

- According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

Forget the Stats

Trailing 40-39 at the intermission to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6), Wofford was 17-of-28 (60.7 percent) from the field in the second half and lost 88-79.

Leading Furman 33-31 at the half (Jan. 11), the Terriers were just 6-of-24 (25.0 percent) over the final 20 minutes and won 60-59.

The Charity Stripe

- The Terriers have a 72.9 free-throw percentage in six SoCon road games and a 59.8 mark in five league home contests.

- Leading scorers **Mike Lenzly** and **Lee Nixon** are shooting 86.3 and 79.6 percent, respectively, at the line in SoCon action. They're at 80.7 and 78.1 on the season.

- The Terriers shoot 71.2 percent (151-of-212) in their 11 wins and 67.7 (136-of-201) in the 11 losses.

- Wofford's 69.5 season mark at the free-throw line represents its highest percentage since a 70.6 effort in the 1988-89 campaign.

- Wofford was a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line in the 60-59 win at Furman (Jan. 11), just one game after shooting a season-low 40.0 percent (6-of-15) in an 88-79 loss to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6).

One or the Other

Either **Mike Lenzly** (16.2 ppg) or **Lee Nixon** (15.1 ppg) has topped Wofford in scoring in all but five games this season.

The Terriers are 10-7 with Lenzly or Nixon as the leading scorer and 1-4 with someone else setting the pace.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

What a Victory Means

- A victory would put Wofford (11-11) over the .500 mark this late in the season for the first time since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 season.

- A win would allow the Terriers to equal their highest SoCon win total in six seasons of league play. Wofford posted 8-8 marks in the 1998-99 and 1999-00 campaigns. Following tonight's contest, the Terriers have home games remaining with Furman and The Citadel in addition to traveling to Western Carolina.

Keeping Busy

Sidelined for the season by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 ETSU home game and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

Stephens also served as the official scorer at the Feb. 10 Wofford women's basketball home game versus Furman.

Whatever Happened To...

Former Terrier guard **Ian Chadwick**, arguably the best player in Wofford basketball history, is playing with the Mattersburg 49ers in the top division of Austria.

A 2001 Wofford graduate with a degree in business economics, Chadwick was a three-time All-SoCon selection and the league's career 3-point leader with 299. He was runner-up for SoCon Player of the Year honors his senior year.

Chadwick finished his career sixth on the Terriers' all-time scoring list with 1,789 points.

Raising \$\$\$\$

Terrier coach **Mike Young**'s wife, Margaret, is the drive co-chairman for the Terrier Club, Wofford's fundraising organization which raised \$1,053,252 in 2002 for scholarship support for Terrier student-athletes.

Baby Watch

Wofford coach **Mike Young** became a father for the second time when his wife, Margaret, gave birth to **Robert Davis Young** (six pounds, 15 ounces), on Jan. 9 at 12:08 p.m.

The Youngs have a three-year-old daughter, Cooper, who is a fixture at Wofford home games in her Terrier cheerleading uniform.

NBA Schedule

Due to weather postponements, Wofford will be playing back-to-back nights. The Appalachian State game was postponed 24 hours while tomorrow's Toccoa Falls contest was originally on Dec. 4.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

- Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

- Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

- Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.9 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 10.5 points per game average is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In recent victories over Chattanooga (Jan. 20) and Georgia Southern (Jan. 27), Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (5.0 rpg) while placing third in scoring (10.5 ppg). He has a team-high 57.7 field-goal percentage, including 62.0 in SoCon action. He also tops Wofford in blocks (19) and is second in free-throw attempts (74).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was doubtful for the Jan. 6 Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

- Wofford is 8-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 3-10 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

- Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.4 rpg) holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (5.0 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of seven more boards (118-111).

Days of the Week

Wofford has won its last five Monday games and is 6-2 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford is 4-5 on Saturdays, 1-0 on Tuesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their rotation, with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 10.5 points and 5.0 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.8 ppg, 4.2 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.6 ppg, 1.4 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 18.9 points and 10.6 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 57.7 and 52.7, respectively. Those marks increase to 62.0 and 55.2 in SoCon play.

SoCon Stats

- Wofford ranks second in assist/turnover ratio (1.19) in SoCon games only.

The Terriers place second in league games with their per game average of 16.2 assists and just 13.7 turnovers.

- The Terriers are also third in SoCon contests only with an average of 7.9 3-pointers.

Mike Lenzly is shooting 46.4 percent (32-of-69) behind the arc against league foes.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

The Terriers are 11-0 when holding a half-time lead and 0-11 when behind at the intermission. In defeat, Wofford trailed at the break by four or fewer points on five occasions.

Surprise, Surprise

After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is just one game out of second place in the South Division while holding the tiebreaker advantage over Chattanooga.

Davidson Notables

•Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson (Feb. 3) represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

•Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

•The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

•The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has five road wins this season, including a 4-3 mark in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory for all of last year (66-64 at College of Charleston).

Three of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman, 94-93 at VMI) have been by a combined total of four points with a defensive stand on the final possession in two of those contests (Virginia Tech, Furman).

WOFFORD VS. APPALACHIAN STATE

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Wofford built a six-point second-half lead before the University of South Carolina rallied for a hardfought 70-59 victory before a crowd of 10,028 at the Carolina Center in Columbia and a regional television audience.

Already without standout guard **Justin Stephens**, sidelined for the season with a knee injury, Wofford also played without starting forward **Grant Sterley**. The senior was a last-minute scratch due to food poisoning. Freshman **Howard Wilkerson** made his first collegiate start as the Terriers often had three freshmen on the court at the same time.

Trailing 27-24 at the intermission, the Terriers opened the second half with an 11-2 run, keyed by five points from **Sam Daniels**, to take their largest lead of the night at 35-29 on an **Adrien Borders** layup with 16:19 to play. Borders topped Wofford with 13 points and a career-high eight rebounds. Daniels scored all 10 of his points in the second half.

The Gamecocks scored the next 13 points to regain a 42-35 margin with 12:54 remaining. **Lee Nixon** then hit a 3-pointer and a running jumper to cut the Terrier deficit to 42-40 with 12:18 to play. Nixon had nine points while playing all 40 minutes.

Wofford was still within five points, 50-45, after a **Tyler Berg** free-throw with 8:35 remaining.

USC then scored the next 11 points to build a 16-point lead before the Terriers again answered. A 12-4 run, sparked by consecutive 3-pointers by **Mike Lenzly** and capped by a Borders trey, pulled Wofford within 65-57 with 2:08 to play.

"It's a good thing we prepared for Wofford tonight because, if we hadn't, we would have lost the game," South Carolina Head Coach **Dave Odom** said. "Every team that Wofford has played similar to us, they have taken it straight down to the end.

Game 11 -- College of Charleston 88, Wofford 79 January 6, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

College of Charleston hit a school record 14 3-pointers in defeating Wofford, 88-79, in the SoCon opener for both teams.

Terrier freshman center **Tyler Berg** scored a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field) after being listed as doubtful for the game. He had surgery the day before to repair a lacerated eye lid and tear duct after being accidentally poked in the eye during a team practice.

The Terriers fell behind 16-5 to start the game, before pulling within 40-39 at the intermission.

Wofford then took its first lead of the game less than a minute into the second half when **Mike Lenzy** hit a 3-pointer to make the score 42-40. The Terriers twice built the margin to four points, the last being 54-50 when **Lee Nixon** nailed a 3-pointer with 14:34 remaining. The Cougars, though, used a 15-5 spurt down the stretch to pull away.

Wofford shot 52.8 percent for the game, including 60.7 (17-of-28) in the second half. However, the Terriers were victimized by a 6-of-15 (40.0 percent) night at the free-throw line. Wofford also had 18 turnovers to just 10 for Charleston.

Troy Wheless led the Cougars with a career-high 26 points, including five 3-pointers.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen **Tyler Berg** and **Howard Wilkerson** had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A **Terry Williams'** 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. After Wofford's **Mike Lenzly** and Georgia Southern's **Julius Jenkins** traded layups, the Terriers took a 70-68 lead with 31 seconds remaining when Wilkerson made a pair of free-throws after being fouled on an offensive rebound. In addition to his career-high points, Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds.

The Eagles tied the game at 70-70 on a Jenkins layup with 16 seconds to play, setting the stage for Nixon's long 3-pointer which provided the winning points. Georgia Southern had a final chance to tie but **Kordel Gibson** missed a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

Georgia Southern scored the game's opening nine points and twice led by 10 points, before Wofford battled back to take its first lead of the night at 35-33 on a pair of Wilkerson free-throws with 1:54 remaining in the first half. The Terriers eventually took a 37-36 lead into the locker room at the intermission.

Jenkins, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the game (23.6 ppg), was held to 4-of-14 shooting, including 2-of-8 from 3-point range.

Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Wofford held its one-point lead at the half despite shooting 40.0 percent compared to 57.7 for the Eagles.

Game 19 -- Wofford 98, Davidson 82 February 3, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Lee Nixon scored 26 points, including a running jumper with 0.2 seconds to play to force overtime, while Sam Daniels hit a key 3-pointer in the extra period on the way to a career-high 19 points as Wofford took a 94-93 thriller over VMI in Lexington, Va.

The Terriers played shorthanded as starting forward Grant Sterley missed the game with a sprained ankle while point guard Mike Lenzly fouled out with 1:28 left in regulation.

The Terriers led 43-33 at the half and took their largest lead of the game at 50-35 on a Daniels trey with 18:05 to play. The Keydets got back in the game behind 70.8 percent (17-of-24) shooting in the second half. VMI took a 59-58 lead on a Radee Skipworth layup with 10:15 left.

VMI built their margin to as large as six points, 67-61, with 5:21 to play on a Tadas Mankevicius layup.

Nixon then answered with a 3-pointer and layup to begin a 10-2 Wofford spurt, capped by a Lenzly trey, that gave the Terriers a 71-69 lead with 3:23 left.

A Skipworth layup and two Richard Little free-throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. David Eaton tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes.

A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A Howard Wilkerson free-throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon sealed the game with a pair of free-throws

to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the final buzzer to provide the final margin.

Wofford's hopes for a third road win in a week ended with a 69-68 loss at Georgia Southern.

Trailing by one with 11.6 seconds left, the Terriers called timeout for a final possession. **Mike Lenzly** drove to the basket, drew contact, and was knocked to the ground. However, the officials ruled time had expired.

Wofford took its largest lead of the contest at 64-58 on a **Howard Wilkerson** layup with 5:45 to play. However, the Terriers would then go scoreless over the next 4:17 before a Lenzly 3-point play with 1:28 remaining gave Wofford a 67-65 lead.

Shawn Hall topped four Mountaineers in double figures with 14 points as SoCon North Division leader Appalachian State held off Wofford for a 76-72 victory tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

The Mountaineers (17-7, 10-3) used a 12-2 run to take their largest lead of the game at 66-57 on a 3-pointer by P.J. Bullock with 8:22 to play. The Terriers (11-12, 7-6) then scored the next 10 points to grab a 67-66 lead with 4:37 left. David Eaton and Mike Lenzly had consecutive treys to begin the spurt which was capped by a pair of Sam Daniels layups.

With the game tied at 70-70, a Chris McFarland layup with 1:34 remaining gave Appalachian State the lead for good. Following a Terrier turnover, the Mountaineers extended their margin to 73-70 on a Nate Carson free-throw with 36 seconds left. Lee Nixon then missed a 3-pointer which would have tied the game with 24 seconds to play. The Mountaineers converted 3-of-4 free-throws down the stretch to seal the game.

The loss was the first of the season for Wofford in which it held a halftime lead. Wofford was ahead 34-31 at the intermission. The Terriers had been 11-0 this season when leading at the break.

Appalachian State entered the contest as the top scoring team in Division I with its average of 86.4 points per game.

"This was a great hardfought win," Appalachian State coach Houston Fancher said. "We showed a lot of character down the stretch.

"We did a good job executing our offense late in the game. I am very proud of our bench. We subbed 5-for-5 to keep fresh bodies on the floor. We tried to keep fresh while defending their perimeter shooters."

Lenzly topped Wofford with 20 points while Adrien Borders equaled a season-high with 14. Nixon scored 11 points. Daniels had nine points and a team-high seven rebounds while Eaton had three 3-pointers for nine points.

"I was not pleased with our ball handling tonight," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "We also didn't get key rebounds when we needed them at the end of the game.

"Our guys played hard and I was pleased with their intensity, but Appalachian State is too good a team to not make big plays and win."

Nate Carson and Josh Shehan each scored 13 points for the Mountaineers.

Wofford will be back in action tomorrow night as it hosts Toccoa Falls at 7 p.m. in the make-up of a Dec. 4 game that was postponed due to an ice storm. Appalachian State will host Davidson on Saturday at 3 p.m.

Three Terriers set or equaled career-highs in scoring as Wofford hit a single-game school record 16 3-pointers in a 114-61 rout of Toccoa Falls tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

David Eaton led Wofford with a career-high 22 points, including six 3-pointers, while Jeff Tarr added career-best totals of 14 points and seven rebounds. Grant Sterley equaled his single-game high with 17 points as six Terriers scored in double figures. All 11 players who dressed entered the points column.

This game was originally scheduled for Dec. 4 but was postponed when an ice storm hit the area.

Wofford's point total was its highest since a 116-71 win over Warren Wilson on Jan. 23, 1989, a stretch of 394 games. The 53-point margin of victory was the Terriers' largest since a 110-49 decision over Tennessee Wesleyan on Nov. 22, 1997.

After playing the nation's most-difficult non-conference schedule according to the Ratings Percentage Index (RPI) and Sagarin Ratings, the Terriers (12-12) are now at .500 this late in the campaign for just the second time in their eight seasons of Division I play. With three regular-season games and the SoCon Tournament remaining, Wofford has already surpassed its win total from last year (11-18).

The Terriers scored the game's opening seven points. However, the Eagles (12-16) hung tough and trailed just 29-24 on a Denis Lopo layup with 9:10 left in the first half. A pair of 3-pointers by Eaton and treys by Lee Nixon and Mike Lenzly keyed an 18-4 Wofford run that gave the Terriers a 47-28 lead en route to a 56-33 margin at the half.

"I thought our guys played hard," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "We were able to get some guys some minutes who haven't played much lately.

"We really shared the ball. We don't care who scores the points. We've had a lot of bonding this year. Our players enjoyed watching each other do well tonight."

Nixon had 18 points while Tyler Berg and Sam Daniels contributed 12 and 10, respectively. Byron Fields had a career-high nine assists to go with eight points.

The Terriers had season-highs in field-goal percentage (60.8), assists (28), and steals (19). Wofford was 16-of-30 (53.3 percent) behind the arc.

Lopo topped the Eagles with 18 points while Tony Doyley scored 11.

The Game

The Wofford basketball team hosts Furman in a regionally-televised contest on FOX Sports Net South.

The Terriers will be looking to keep their hopes alive for a second-place finish in the South Division and a subsequent bye in the opening round of the SoCon Tournament. Wofford trails Chattanooga by two games but holds the tiebreaker advantage by virtue of its season sweep of the Mocs.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, Wofford has a 7-4 record versus Furman. The Terriers are 4-1 versus the Paladins in Spartanburg and 3-3 in Greenville.

In the first meeting with Furman this season, Wofford shot a season-low 32.1 percent and was outrebounded 40-31 but still prevailed by a 60-59 score. Freshman **Byron Fields** sank the game-winning free-throws with 24 seconds to play as the Terriers rallied from a five-point deficit in the final 3:48.

Worth Noting

•SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** places third on the Terriers in scoring (10.3 ppg) and second in rebounding (4.9 rpg). He's shooting a team-best 56.8 percent on the season, including 58.8 in SoCon play.

•Terrier point guard **Mike Lenzly** is the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (No. 8, 15.9 ppg) and assists (No. 8, 4.0 apg). He's also Wofford's top rebounder at 5.2 boards per game.

•After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is in a battle for second place in the South Division.

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director on Dec. 3, 2001 with the announcement that he would coach just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

The Wofford men's basketball coaching staff is the youngest in the country in a national study conducted by Radford University.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

Women Beware

Wofford College assistant men's basketball coaches **Alex Peavey** and **Mark Prosser** have been named to "College Basketball's 50 Most Eligible Bachelors and Bachelorettes" list by www.collegeinsider.com.

Wofford is the lone school to have two representatives in the bachelor category.

Peavey, a repeat selection from last year, is in his third year at Wofford. Prosser, the son of Wake Forest coach **Skip Prosser**, is in his first season with the Terriers after graduating from Marist last spring.

"I've tried desperately to get both of them dates," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "They choose instead to spend so much time in the office. They might be staying bachelors for awhile."

Finding the Net

- Wofford averaged 94.7 points while shooting 54.9 percent, including 46.7 (35-of-75) from 3-point range, in a recent three-game winning streak over Davidson, VMI, and Chattanooga (Feb. 3-10).

- The Terriers scored at least 90 points in three consecutive games for the first time since competing in Division II in Feb. 1993.

- Wofford's 76.6 season scoring average is its highest in eight years of Division I play.

- Wofford is 8-1 when shooting at least 50.0 percent and 9-2 with at least a 44.6 percentage.

- The Terriers shoot 48.2 percent in going 3-3 in league home contests, compared to a 44.1 mark in posting a 4-3 SoCon road record.

- Wofford has shot over 50.0 percent in nine games this season, with seven of those occasions being at home. The Terriers have a 51.2 field-goal percentage in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and 42.1 on the road.

- Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** were a combined 9-of-13 on treys that night.

Schedule Difficulty

- The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

- In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

- The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

- According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

What They're Saying

"They (the Terriers) played against West Virginia, Auburn, Virginia Tech and NC State, and I'm not so sure that in all those games they didn't have the better backcourt. That's how much I respect those two players (Mike Lenzly and Lee Nixon)."

No Cupcakes at Home

Wofford is 3-3 in six SoCon home games this season against teams (College of Charleston, Chattanooga, East Tennessee State, Georgia Southern, Davidson, Appalachian State) with a combined 98-47 overall record (.676) and a 54-24 SoCon mark (.692).

Waiting in the Wings

Greg Taylor, a transfer from the University of South Carolina, is sitting out this season per NCAA transfer rules.

The 6-foot-5 guard will have two years of eligibility with the Terriers. Taylor signed with **Eddie Fogler** at USC after a highly decorated prep career at Hillcrest High School in Simpsonville, S.C.

Forget the Stats

Trailing 40-39 at the intermission to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6), Wofford was 17-of-28 (60.7 percent) from the field in the second half and lost 88-79.

Leading Furman 33-31 at the half (Jan. 11), the Terriers were just 6-of-24 (25.0 percent) over the final 20 minutes and won 60-59.

The Charity Stripe

•The Terriers have a 72.9 free-throw percentage in six SoCon road games and a 59.6 mark in five league home contests.

•Leading scorers **Mike Lenzly** and **Lee Nixon** are shooting 84.2 and 79.6 percent, respectively, at the line in SoCon action. They're at 79.8 and 76.6 on the season.

•The Terriers shoot 70.7 percent (159-of-225) in their 12 wins and 67.1 (143-of-213) in the 12 losses.

•Wofford's 68.9 season mark at the free-throw line represents its highest percentage since a 70.6 effort in the 1988-89 campaign.

•Wofford was a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line in the 60-59 win at Furman (Jan. 11), just one game after shooting a season-low 40.0 percent (6-of-15) in an 88-79 loss to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6).

One or the Other

Either **Mike Lenzly** (15.9 ppg) or **Lee Nixon** (15.0 ppg) has topped Wofford in scoring in all but six games this season.

The Terriers are 10-8 with Lenzly or Nixon as the leading scorer and 2-4 with someone else setting the pace.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

What a Victory Means

•A victory would put Wofford (12-12) over the .500 mark this late in the season for the first time since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 season.

•A win would allow the Terriers to equal their highest SoCon win total in six seasons of league play. Wofford posted 8-8 marks in the 1998-99 and 1999-00 campaigns. Following the Furman contest, the Terriers will be at Western Carolina on Monday before hosting The Citadel next Saturday.

Keeping Busy

Sidelined for the season by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 home game with East Tennessee State and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

Stephens also served as the official scorer at the Feb. 10 Wofford women's basketball home game versus Furman.

Whatever Happened To...

Former Terrier guard **Ian Chadwick**, arguably the best player in Wofford basketball history, is playing with the Mattersburg 49ers in the top division of Austria.

A 2001 Wofford graduate with a degree in business economics, Chadwick was a three-time All-SoCon selection and the league's career 3-point leader with 299. He was the runner-up for SoCon Player of the Year honors his senior year.

Chadwick finished his career sixth on the Terriers' all-time scoring list with 1,789 points.

Raising \$\$\$\$

Wofford coach **Mike Young's** wife, Margaret, is the drive co-chairman for the Terrier Club, Wofford's fundraising organization which raised \$1,053,252 in 2002 for scholarship support for Terrier student-athletes.

Baby Watch

Wofford coach **Mike Young** became a father for the second time when his wife, Margaret, gave birth to **Robert Davis Young** (six pounds, 15 ounces), on Jan. 9 at 12:08 p.m.

The Youngs have a three-year-old daughter, Cooper, who is a fixture at Wofford home games in her Terrier cheerleading uniform.

Terriers Make Mark in Post

Three of Wofford's top four post players (**Tyler Berg**, 56.8 percent; **Howard Wilkerson**, 53.6; **Sam Daniels**, 50.7) are shooting over 50 percent on the season. The trio (Berg, 58.8; Wilkerson, 55.7; Daniels, 51.8) increases its field-goal percentage in SoCon play.

How Tall is He?

Senior guard **Lee Nixon** had two heights this year for the Wofford basketball team.

Nixon stands 6-foot-4 with his hair shaved or in cornrows. When he sported the afro, Nixon increased to 6-foot-8.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

- Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

- Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

- Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.8 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 10.3 points per game average is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In recent victories over Chattanooga (Jan. 20) and Georgia Southern (Jan. 27), Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (4.9 rpg) while placing third in scoring (10.3 ppg). He has a team-high 56.8 field-goal percentage, including 58.8 in SoCon action. He also tops Wofford in blocks (24) and is third in free-throw attempts (76).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was doubtful for the Jan. 6 Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

- Wofford is 9-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 3-11 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

- Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.2 rpg) holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (4.9 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of seven more boards (124-117).

Days of the Week

Wofford has won its last five Monday games and is 6-2 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Wofford is 4-5 on Saturdays, 1-1 on Tuesday, 1-0 on Wednesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their rotation, with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 10.3 points and 4.9 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.6 ppg, 4.3 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.7 ppg, 1.3 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 18.6 points and 10.5 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 56.8 and 53.6, respectively. Those marks increase to 58.8 and 55.7 in SoCon play.

SoCon Stats

- Wofford tops the SoCon in assist/turnover ratio (1.09).

The Terriers are fourth in the league in assists (16.1 apg) while committing the second-fewest turnovers per game (14.8).

- The Terriers are third in SoCon contests only with an average of 7.9 3-pointers.

Mike Lenzly is shooting 44.7 percent (34-of-76) behind the arc against league foes.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

Wofford is 12-1 when holding a halftime lead and 0-11 when behind at the intermission. The Terriers' only loss when leading at the break was Tuesday against Appalachian State when Wofford held a 34-31 advantage.

The Fork Union Pipeline

Head Coach **Mike Young** played one season at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy and refers to longtime FUMA coach **Fletcher Arritt** as one of his coaching mentors.

Surprise, Surprise

After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is still alive for a second-place finish in the South Division. The Terriers hold the tiebreaker edge on Chattanooga.

Davidson Notables

•Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson (Feb. 3) represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

•Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

•The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

•The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has five road wins this season, including a 4-3 mark in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory for all of last year (66-64 at College of Charleston).

Three of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman, 94-93 at VMI) have been by a combined total of four points with a defensive stand on the final possession in two of those contests (Virginia Tech, Furman).

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Julius Hodge had 26 points and 11 rebounds to lead No. 24 NC State to an 86-71 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 10,780 in Raleigh and a regional television audience.

Lee Nixon and **Mike Lenzy** topped the Terriers with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Nixon added a team-best seven rebounds which also equaled a career-high for the senior guard. Freshman center **Tyler Berg** contributed 10 points off-the-bench.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen **Tyler Berg** and **Howard Wilkerson** had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A **Terry Williams'** 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Mike Lenzly had a career-high 32 points, including 26 in the second half, as Wofford attempted a valiant comeback before dropping an 85-79 decision at UNC Greensboro.

The Terriers trailed 42-33 at the half and faced their largest deficit of the game at 63-48 with 10:54 to play. However, Lenzly hit a 3-pointer, a pair of free-throws, and a layup in just 43 seconds as Wofford cut the deficit to 63-55 with 10:11 left. Lenzly scored a total of 14 consecutive Terrier points in a 3:50 span.

The Spartans built their lead back to 12 points with 4:49 to play and still led 80-71 with 1:55 remaining when Wofford attempted a final rally. Game 19 -- Wofford 98, Davidson 82 February 3, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Game 20 -- Wofford 94, VMI 93 (OT) February 8, 2003 Lexington, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 26 points, including a running jumper with 0.2 seconds to play to force overtime, while **Sam Daniels** hit a key 3-pointer in the extra period on the way to a career-high 19 points as Wofford took a 94-93 thriller over VMI in Lexington, Va.

The Terriers played shorthanded as starting forward **Grant Sterley** missed the game with a sprained ankle while point guard **Mike Lenzly** fouled out with 1:28 left in regulation.

The Terriers led 43-33 at the half and took their largest lead of the game at 50-35 on a Daniels trey with 18:05 to play. The Keydets got back in the game behind 70.8 percent (17-of-24) shooting in the second half. VMI took a 59-58 lead on a **Radee Skipworth** layup with 10:15 left.

VMI built their margin to as large as six points, 67-61, with 5:21 to play on a **Tadas Mankevicius** layup.

Nixon then answered with a 3-pointer and layup to begin a 10-2 Wofford spurt, capped by a Lenzly trey, that gave the Terriers a 71-69 lead with 3:23 left.

A Skipworth layup and two **Richard Little** free-throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. **David Eaton** tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes.

A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A **Howard Wilkerson** free-throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon sealed the game with a pair of free-throws

to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the final buzzer to provide the final margin.

Wofford built its 10-point halftime lead by shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) in the opening 20 minutes.

Five Terriers scored in double figures. Wilkerson, starting in place of Sterley, had 12 points, one shy of his career-best. He also equaled a career-high with a team-leading nine rebounds.

Karim Souchu's 3-pointer with 20 seconds to play provided the go-ahead points as Furman rallied from a nine-point second-half deficit for a 69-66 victory over Wofford tonight in Spartanburg, S.C., before a crowd of 3,469 in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and a regional television audience.

The Terriers (12-13, 7-7) were victimized by an 8-of-17 night (47.1 percent) at the free-throw line while the Paladins (12-16, 6-8) controlled the boards by a 41-33 margin, including 17-7 on the offensive end.

Souchu had 19 of his game-high 27 points in the second half in addition to grabbing nine rebounds.

The teams were tied 32-32 at the half and were still deadlocked at 38-38 with 15:59 to play, when Wofford went on a 12-3 run to take its largest lead of the game at 50-41 on a 3-pointer from the corner by Adrien Borders. Mike Lenzy keyed the spurt with five of his team-high 22 points. He was the only Terrier in double figures. The senior point guard also topped Wofford with seven rebounds and six assists.

Wofford still led 63-56 on a pair of Tyler Berg free-throws with 4:52 remaining. Two Souchu layups sandwiched around a 3-point play by Kenny Zeigler evened the game for the sixth time at 63-63 with 1:43 left.

Lenzy hit a layup with 1:29 to play before making 1-of-2 free-throws at the one-minute mark to give the Terriers a 66-63 lead.

Nick Sanders nailed two free-throws to pull Furman within 66-65 with 45 seconds remaining. Following a Terrier turnover, Souchu hit the big trey to give the Paladins a 68-66 lead. Lee Nixon then drove to the basket for Wofford but his layup missed. Furman's Maleye Ndoeye was fouled with five seconds left. After making the first free-throw, he missed the second. The Terriers raced downcourt but Lenzy's 3-point attempt at the buzzer fell short.

"I thought Souchu and (Guilherme) Da Luz played really well for Furman tonight," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "Da Luz was able to control the tempo the entire night and allow them to play a halfcourt game.

"I don't have an answer as to why we're not hitting our free-throws. When you shoot 50 percent from the field at home, you should win games like this. We got killed on the boards and have to do a better job rebounding."

The Terriers shot 50.0 percent compared to 40.6 for the Paladins. In the second half, Wofford made 52.0 percent of his field-goal attempts while Furman was at 39.4.

"This win is exactly what we needed going down the stretch for real confidence," Furman coach Larry Davis said. "To come on the road, in a tough environment, against a veteran backcourt like Wofford, and win is big.

"To come from behind like we did was huge. Wofford has been one of the surprise teams in the league and Mike (Young) has done a super job. I can't tell you what a significant win this is."

Howard Wilkerson had nine points and five rebounds for Wofford while Nixon also scored nine. Zeigler totaled 14 points and 11 rebounds for Furman with Da Luz adding 13 points and five assists.

Wofford will be at Western Carolina on Monday while Furman travels to East Tennessee State.

The Game

The Wofford basketball team plays its final road game of the season when it makes the two-hour trek to face Western Carolina.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, the Terriers and Catamounts have split six meetings. Wofford is 2-0 in Cullowhee, N.C., taking 90-85 and 90-76 decisions in the 1998-99 and 2000-01 campaigns, respectively. The Terriers are 1-2 at home against the Catamounts and 0-1 in SoCon Tournament play.

The Terriers are tied with Georgia Southern for third place in the South Division. After facing Western Carolina, Wofford hosts The Citadel on Saturday. The Eagles are home for Chattanooga tonight before playing Saturday at College of Charleston.

In posting a 7-7 SoCon record, Wofford is 4-3 on the road and 3-4 at home. The Terriers have dropped three straight league games by a total of just eight points. Wofford held leads in the final 36 seconds in two of those contests and was tied with 1:34 to play in the other game.

Worth Noting

- After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is in third place in the South Division.

- SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** places third on the Terriers in scoring (10.1 ppg) and second in rebounding (4.8 rpg). He's shooting a team-best 56.3 percent on the season, including 57.8 in SoCon play.

- Terrier point guard **Mike Lenzly** is the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (No. 6, 16.2 ppg) and assists (No. 8, 4.0 apg) in addition to the Top 20 in rebounding (No. 19, 5.2 rpg).

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director on Dec. 3, 2001 with the announcement that he would coach just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

- Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).

- Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).

- Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

- With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.

- Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.

A Youthful Staff

The Wofford men's basketball coaching staff is the youngest in the country in a national study conducted by Radford University.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

Women Beware

Wofford College assistant men's basketball coaches **Alex Peavey** and **Mark Prosser** have been named to "College Basketball's 50 Most Eligible Bachelors and Bachelorettes" list by www.collegeinsider.com.

Wofford is the lone school to have two representatives in the bachelor category.

Peavey, a repeat selection from last year, is in his third year at Wofford. Prosser, the son of Wake Forest coach **Skip Prosser**, is in his first season with the Terriers after graduating from Marist last spring.

"I've tried desperately to get both of them dates," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "They choose instead to spend so much time in the office. They might be staying bachelors for awhile."

Finding the Net

- Wofford averaged 94.7 points while shooting 54.9 percent, including 46.7 (35-of-75) from 3-point range, in a recent three-game winning streak over Davidson, VMI, and Chattanooga (Feb. 3-10).

- The Terriers scored at least 90 points in three consecutive games for the first time since competing in Division II in Feb. 1993.

- Wofford's 76.2 season scoring average is its highest in eight years of Division I play.

- Wofford is 8-2 when shooting at least 50.0 percent and 9-3 with at least a 44.6 percentage.

- The Terriers shoot 48.5 percent in going 3-4 in league home contests, compared to a 44.1 mark in posting a 4-3 SoCon road record.

- Wofford has shot at least 50.0 percent in 10 games this season, with eight of those occasions being at home. The Terriers have a 51.1 field-goal percentage in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and 42.1 on the road.

- Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing season-highs in both 3-pointers and percentage.

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** were a combined 9-of-13 on treys that night.

Schedule Difficulty

- The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

- In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

- The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

- According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

What They're Saying

"They (the Terriers) played against West Virginia, Auburn, Virginia Tech and NC State, and I'm not so sure that in all those games they didn't have the better backcourt. That's how much I respect those two players (Mike Lenzly and Lee Nixon)."

Greg Taylor, a transfer from the University of South Carolina, is sitting out this season per NCAA transfer rules.

The 6-foot-5 guard will have two years of eligibility with the Terriers.

Taylor signed with **Eddie Fogler** at USC after a highly decorated prep career at Hillcrest High School in Simpsonville, S.C.

Favorite Days

Wofford has won its last five Monday games and is 6-2 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2). Wofford is 4-6 on Saturdays, 1-1 on Tuesday, 1-0 on Wednesday, 0-1 on Thursday and Friday, and 0-2 on Sundays.

The Charity Stripe

- The Terriers have a 72.9 free-throw percentage in seven SoCon road games and a 57.8 mark in seven league home contests.

- The Terriers shoot 70.7 percent in their 12 wins and 65.7 in the 13 losses.

- Wofford was a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line in the 60-59 win at Furman (Jan. 11), just one game after shooting a season-low 40.0 percent (6-of-15) in an 88-79 loss to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6).

Terriers Make Mark in Post

Three of Wofford's top four post players (**Tyler Berg**, 56.3 percent; **Howard Wilkerson**, 53.3; **Sam Daniels**, 50.6) are shooting over 50 percent on the season. The trio (Berg, 57.8; Wilkerson, 55.1; Daniels, 51.6) increases its field-goal percentage in SoCon play.

One or the Other

Either **Mike Lenzly** (16.2 ppg) or **Lee Nixon** (14.8 ppg) has topped Wofford in scoring in all but six games this season.

The Terriers are 10-9 with Lenzly or Nixon as the leading scorer and 2-4 with someone else setting the pace.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

What a Victory Means

- A victory would put Wofford (12-13) at the .500 mark this late in the year for the first time since beginning Division I play in the 1995-96 season.

The Terriers are in pursuit of their first .500-plus record in eight years on the Division I level. Wofford's previous best mark was 14-16 during the 1999-00 campaign.

- A win would allow the Terriers to equal their highest SoCon win total in six seasons of league play. Wofford posted 8-8 marks in the 1998-99 and 1999-00 campaigns. Following the Western Carolina contest, the Terriers close the regular season Saturday with a home game versus The Citadel.

Keeping Busy

Sidelined for the season by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 home game with East Tennessee State and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

Stephens also served as the official scorer at the Feb. 10 Wofford women's basketball home game versus Furman.

Whatever Happened To...

Former Terrier guard **Ian Chadwick**, arguably the best player in Wofford basketball history, is playing with the Mattersburg 49ers in the top division of Austria.

A 2001 Wofford graduate with a degree in business economics, Chadwick was a three-time All-SoCon selection and the league's career 3-point leader with 299. He was the runner-up for SoCon Player of the Year honors his senior year.

Chadwick finished his career sixth on the Terriers' all-time scoring list with 1,789 points.

Raising \$\$\$\$

Wofford coach **Mike Young's** wife, Margaret, is the drive co-chairman for the Terrier Club, Wofford's fundraising organization which raised \$1,053,252 in 2002 for scholarship support for Terrier student-athletes.

Baby Watch

Wofford coach **Mike Young** became a father for the second time when his wife, Margaret, gave birth to **Robert Davis Young** (six pounds, 15 ounces), on Jan. 9 at 12:08 p.m.

The Youngs have a three-year-old daughter, Cooper, who is a fixture at Wofford home games in her Terrier cheerleading uniform.

Senior guard **Lee Nixon** had two heights this year for the Wofford basketball team.

Nixon stands 6-foot-4 with his hair shaved or in cornrows. When he sported the afro, Nixon increased to 6-foot-8.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

- Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

- Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

- Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 8.8 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 10.1 points per game average is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In recent victories over Chattanooga (Jan. 20) and Georgia Southern (Jan. 27), Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (4.8 rpg) while placing third in scoring (10.1 ppg). He has a team-high 56.3 field-goal percentage, including 57.8 in SoCon action. He also tops Wofford in blocks (24) and is second in free-throw attempts (80).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was doubtful for the Jan. 6 Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

- Wofford is 9-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 3-12 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

- Wofford holds a 35.2-34.1 rebounding margin over the opposition in its 12 wins. The 13 defeats see the opponent with a 39.9-33.4 edge on the glass.

- Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.2 rpg) ranks No. 19 in the SoCon in rebounding and holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (4.8 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of 10 more boards (131-121).

- In SoCon play, Berg has nearly as many offensive rebounds (28) as defensive (34).

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their rotation with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 10.1 points and 4.8 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.7 ppg, 4.3 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.6 ppg, 1.3 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 18.4 points and 10.4 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 56.3 and 53.3, respectively. Those marks increase to 57.8 and 55.1 in SoCon play.

SoCon Stats

- Wofford tops the SoCon in assist/turnover ratio (1.09).

The Terriers are fourth in the league in assists (16.0 apg) while committing the second-fewest turnovers per game (14.7).

- The Terriers are third in SoCon contests only with an average of 7.7 3-pointers.

Mike Lenzly is shooting 44.0 percent (37-of-84) behind the arc against league foes.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

Wofford is 12-1 when holding a halftime lead, 0-11 when behind at the intermission, and 0-1 when tied. The Terriers' only loss when leading at the break was against Appalachian State when Wofford held a 34-31 advantage.

Surprise, Surprise

After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is in third place in the South Division. The Terriers have swept Chattanooga in addition to a rout of Davidson.

Davidson Notables

•Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson (Feb. 3) represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

•Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

•The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

•The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford already has five road wins this season, including a 4-3 mark in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory for all of last year (66-64 at College of Charleston).

Three of the road wins (77-75 at Virginia Tech, 60-59 at Furman, 94-93 at VMI) have been by a combined total of four points with a defensive stand on the final possession in two of those contests (Virginia Tech, Furman).

WOFFORD AT WESTERN CAROLINA

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Wofford had three consecutive dunks in a 1:30 span, including a pair of spectacular alley-oop slams by Lee Nixon, to close within 60-55 with 6:33 to play. However, the Mountaineers answered with a 9-0 run to build their margin back to 14 with 4:23 left. Mike Lenzly then had six points to key an 8-2 spurt that cut the Terrier deficit to 71-63 with 2:42 remaining.

Nixon topped the Terriers with 19 points while freshman center Tyler Berg contributed 15 points and seven rebounds off-the-bench.

West Virginia, with a win over Florida earlier this season, shot 78.3 percent (18-of-23) in the second half and 63.3 for the game. The Mountaineers were 8-of-17 from 3-point range.

Game 7 -- South Carolina 70, Wofford 59 December 16, 2002 Columbia, S.C.

Wofford built a six-point second-half lead before the University of South Carolina rallied for a hardfought 70-59 victory before a crowd of 10,028 at the Carolina Center in Columbia and a regional television audience.

Already without standout guard **Justin Stephens**, sidelined for the season with a knee injury, Wofford also played without starting forward **Grant Sterley**. The senior was a last-minute scratch due to food poisoning. Freshman **Howard Wilkerson** made his first collegiate start as the Terriers often had three freshmen on the court at the same time.

Trailing 27-24 at the intermission, the Terriers opened the second half with an 11-2 run, keyed by five points from **Sam Daniels**, to take their largest lead of the night at 35-29 on an **Adrien Borders** layup with 16:19 to play. Borders topped Wofford with 13 points and a career-high eight rebounds. Daniels scored all 10 of his points in the second half.

The Gamecocks scored the next 13 points to regain a 42-35 margin with 12:54 remaining. **Lee Nixon** then hit a 3-pointer and a running jumper to cut the Terrier deficit to 42-40 with 12:18 to play. Nixon had nine points while playing all 40 minutes.

Wofford was still within five points, 50-45, after a **Tyler Berg** free-throw with 8:35 remaining.

USC then scored the next 11 points to build a 16-point lead before the Terriers again answered. A 12-4 run, sparked by consecutive 3-pointers by **Mike Lenzly** and capped by a Borders trey, pulled Wofford within 65-57 with 2:08 to play.

"It's a good thing we prepared for Wofford tonight because, if we hadn't, we would have lost the game," South Carolina Head Coach **Dave Odom** said. "Every team that Wofford has played similar to us, they have taken it straight down to the end.

"Wofford is a very scrappy team and they are well coached. The Terrier fans have to be happy because (Head Coach) **Mike Young** has them headed in the right direction."

Game 9 -- No. 24 NC State 86, Wofford 71 December 29, 2002 Raleigh, N.C.

Julius Hodge had 26 points and 11 rebounds to lead No. 24 NC State to an 86-71 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 10,780 in Raleigh and a regional television audience.

Lee Nixon and **Mike Lenzy** topped the Terriers with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Nixon added a team-best seven rebounds which also equaled a career-high for the senior guard. Freshman center **Tyler Berg** contributed 10 points off-the-bench.

A Nixon free-throw with 8:35 to play in the first half pulled Wofford within 20-15. However, Hodge then keyed a 13-2 NC State run which helped the Wolfpack to their 14-point margin at the intermission.

The Terriers shot just 37.0 percent, including missing all eight 3-point attempts, in falling behind 38-24 at the half. Wofford made 47.1 percent of its field-goal attempts in the second half in being outscored just 48-47.

N.C. State was 22-of-25 (88.0 percent) at the free-throw line while Wofford was just 14-of-23 (60.9 percent). The Terriers came into the game shooting 73.9 for the season at the charity stripe.

Clifford Crawford added 22 points for NC State, who entered the game having outscored its opponents by an average of 21.5 points.

Terrier freshman center **Tyler Berg** scored a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field) after being listed as doubtful for the game. He had surgery the day before to repair a lacerated eye lid and tear duct after being accidentally poked in the eye during a team practice.

The Terriers fell behind 16-5 to start the game, before pulling within 40-39 at the intermission.

Wofford then took its first lead of the game less than a minute into the second half when **Mike Lenzy** hit a 3-pointer to make the score 42-40. The Terriers twice built the margin to four points, the last being 54-50 when **Lee Nixon** nailed a 3-pointer with 14:34 remaining. The Cougars, though, used a 15-5 spurt down the stretch to pull away.

Wofford shot 52.8 percent for the game, including 60.7 (17-of-28) in the second half. However, the Terriers were victimized by a 6-of-15 (40.0 percent) night at the free-throw line. Wofford also had 18 turnovers to just 10 for Charleston.

Troy Wheless led the Cougars with a career-high 26 points, including five 3-pointers.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen **Tyler Berg** and **Howard Wilkerson** had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A **Terry Williams'** 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. After Wofford's **Mike Lenzly** and Georgia Southern's **Julius Jenkins** traded layups, the Terriers took a 70-68 lead with 31 seconds remaining when Wilkerson made a pair of free-throws after being fouled on an offensive rebound. In addition to his career-high points, Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds.

The Eagles tied the game at 70-70 on a Jenkins layup with 16 seconds to play, setting the stage for Nixon's long 3-pointer which provided the winning points. Georgia Southern had a final chance to tie but **Kordel Gibson** missed a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

Georgia Southern scored the game's opening nine points and twice led by 10 points, before Wofford battled back to take its first lead of the night at 35-33 on a pair of Wilkerson free-throws with 1:54 remaining in the first half. The Terriers eventually took a 37-36 lead into the locker room at the intermission.

Jenkins, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the game (23.6 ppg), was held to 4-of-14 shooting, including 2-of-8 from 3-point range.

Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Wofford held its one-point lead at the half despite shooting 40.0 percent compared to 57.7 for the Eagles.

Game 19 -- Wofford 98, Davidson 82 February 3, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

A Skipworth layup and two Richard Little free-throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. David Eaton tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes.

A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A Howard Wilkerson free-throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon sealed the game with a pair of free-throws

to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the final buzzer to provide the final margin.

Wofford built its 10-point halftime lead by shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) in the opening 20 minutes.

Five Terriers scored in double figures. Wilkerson, starting in place of Sterley, had 12 points, one shy of his career-best. He also equaled a career-high with a team-leading nine rebounds.

Wofford shot 54.0 percent from the field for the second straight game.

Game 21 -- Wofford 92, Chattanooga 83 February 10, 2003 Chattanooga, Tenn.

Mike Lenzly equaled a career-high with 32 points, including 6-of-7 shooting on 3-pointers and 10-of-13 overall, to lead Wofford to a 92-83 victory at Chattanooga.

Lenzly also had seven rebounds and seven assists while playing all 40 minutes as the Terriers won at McKenzie Arena for the first time.

After Chattanooga took its first lead of the second half at 48-47 with 17:48 to play, Lenzly answered with three consecutive 3-pointers to put Wofford on top 56-48 with 16:28 remaining.

The Mocs countered with a 16-7 run to take a 64-63 lead. The teams then saw six lead changes before Wofford went on top for good, 71-70, on a Lenzly layup with 6:08 left.

Lenzly followed with his sixth and final 3-pointer to extend the margin to 74-70 with 5:26 left. Chattanooga closed to within two points on two occasions, the last time being 76-74 on an Aaron Morgan jumper with 3:27 to play. Lee Nixon then nailed a 3-pointer to extend the Terrier margin back to 79-74 with 3:08 remaining.

Wofford built its lead to seven points at 87-80 on a Lenzly layup with 1:01 remaining. Ashley Champion then hit a 3-pointer from the top of the key to bring the Mocs within 87-83 with 47 seconds left, but that would be as close as Chattanooga would get the remainder of the contest.

Wofford shot 56.9 percent from the field, its high game against a Division I opponent this season.

David Eaton and Jeff Tarr had career-high scoring nights while Wofford set a single-game school record with 16 3-pointers in a 114-61 win over Toccoa Falls.

Eaton tallied a game-high 22 points, including six 3-pointers, while Tarr had career-best totals of 14 points and seven rebounds. Grant Sterley equaled a career-high with 17 points while Byron Fields set a personal best with nine assists to go with eight points.

The Terriers posted their highest point total in a game since a 116-71 win over Warren Wilson on Jan. 23, 1989, a stretch of 394 contests. The 53-point margin also represented the Terriers' largest victory since a 110-49 win over Tennessee Wesleyan on Nov. 22, 1997.

Wofford scored the game's opening seven points and never trailed. Toccoa Falls did close within five points, 25-20, with 9:10 left in the first half. The Terriers then answered with an 18-4 run to pull away en route to a 56-33 halftime lead.

The highlight of the game for Wofford was Fields feeding Tarr for an acrobatic alley-oop slam midway through the second half.

Game 25 -- Furman 69, Wofford 66 February 22, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Karim Souchu's 3-pointer with 20 seconds to play provided the go-ahead points as Furman rallied from a nine-point second-half deficit for a 69-66 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 3,469 in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and a regional television audience.

The Terriers were victimized by an 8-of-17 night (47.1 percent) at the free-throw line while being outrebounded 41-33, including 17-7 on the offensive end.

The teams were tied 32-32 at the half and were still deadlocked at 38-38 with 15:59 to play, when Wofford went on a 12-3 run to take its largest lead of the game at 50-41 on a 3-pointer from the corner by

Adrien Borders.

Wofford still led 63-56 on a pair of Tyler Berg free-throws with 4:52 remaining. Two Souchu layups sandwiched around a 3-point play by Kenny Zeigler evened the game for the sixth time at 63-63 with 1:43 left.

Lenzly hit a layup with 1:29 to play before making 1-of-2 free-throws at the one-minute mark to give the Terriers a 66-63 lead.

Nick Sanders nailed two free-throws to pull Furman within 66-65 with 45 seconds remaining. Following a Terrier turnover, Souchu hit the big trey to give the Paladins a 68-66 lead. Lee Nixon then drove to the basket for Wofford but his layup missed. Furman's Maleye Ndoye was fouled with five seconds left. After making the first free-throw, he missed the second. The Terriers raced downcourt but Lenzly's 3-point attempt at the buzzer fell short.

The Terriers shot 50.0 percent compared to 40.6 for the Paladins. In the second half, Wofford made 52.0 percent of his field-goal attempts while Furman was at 39.4.

Nixon's Big Night Not Enough for Terriers

February 22, 2003

Lee Nixon's 26 points (10-of-15 shooting, 4-of-7 on 3-pointers) weren't enough as Wofford dropped an 86-77 decision at Western Carolina.

The Terriers can clinch a No. 3 seed in the South Division in the SoCon Tournament with a home win on Saturday over The Citadel and a Georgia Southern loss at College of Charleston. Wofford holds a tiebreaker advantage over Georgia Southern and Furman by virtue of its season sweep of Chattanooga.

Nixon had 21 second half points as he moved past **Dennis Mathis** (1,171, 1952-56), **Bob Waldrop** (1,192, 1958-63), and **Sidney Thomas** (1,193, 1990-94) into the No. 21 position on Wofford's career scoring chart with 1,197 points.

The Terriers played several long stretches without **Mike Lenzly**, who was charged with two fouls in the opening 1:24 and a third foul just 24 seconds into the second half.

Adrien Borders had a season-high 16 points, just one shy of a career best. Included in his total was just the fifth four-point play in Wofford history.

The Terriers (12-14, 7-8) trailed 12-2 to start the game before using a 17-6 run to take their only lead of the night at 19-18 on a **Tyler Berg** dunk with 10:01 left in the first half. The Catamounts (9-17, 6-9) then scored the next seven points as they would not trail for the remainder of the contest.

Western Carolina led 41-35 at the intermission and built its second half margin to eight points before the Terriers made a charge. A **Sam Daniels** jumper pulled Wofford within 58-57 with 9:45 left. However the Catamounts answered with a 14-5 run to lead 72-62 with 4:11 remaining. A 3-pointer by Nixon closed the gap to 72-65 with 3:55 to play, but that would be as close as the Terriers would get the remainder of the way.

Kevin Martin led Western Carolina with 25 points, while **Corey Muirhead** scored 21.

The Catamounts shot 50.0 percent, while the Terriers were at 45.3. Wofford attempted a season-high 33 3-pointers, but connected on just nine (27.3 percent). The Terriers were 10-of-11 (90.9 percent) at the free throw line, while the Catamounts hit 22 of their 29 attempts (75.9 percent). Western Carolina also held a 36-31 rebounding edge.

The Game

The Wofford basketball team will close the regular season by hosting The Citadel.

A Terrier victory and a Georgia Southern loss at College of Charleston would give Wofford the No. 3 seed from the South Division in the upcoming SoCon Tournament.

Wofford seniors **Mike Lenzly**, **Lee Nixon**, and **Grant Sterley** as well as junior **Edmond Davis**, who will be graduating early, will be honored in a pregame ceremony as they play their final home game.

Since beginning SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign, Wofford has a 7-4 record versus The Citadel. In the first meeting between the teams this season, Lenzly had a team-high 17 points and the Terriers held the Bulldogs without a field goal for over 13 minutes in the second half in pulling away for a 69-54 win in Charleston, S.C.

Worth Noting

- After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is in position to finish as high as third in the South Division.

- SoCon Freshman of the Year candidate **Tyler Berg** places third on the Terriers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and second in rebounding (4.8 rpg). He's shooting a team-best 57.0 percent on the season, including 58.9 in SoCon play.

- Terrier point guard **Mike Lenzly** is the only player in the SoCon to rank in the Top 10 in scoring (No. 8, 15.8 ppg) and assists (No. 8, 4.1 apg) in addition to the Top 20 in rebounding (No. 20, 5.2 rpg). He's also the only player in the league to top his team in all three categories.

Meet The Head Coach

After 13 seasons as a Wofford assistant to **Richard Johnson**, **Mike Young** is in his first year as head coach of the Terriers.

Johnson was promoted to athletic director on Dec. 3, 2001 with the announcement that he would coach just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season. His first head coaching hire, made that same day, was the elevation of Young effective at the close of the campaign.

A native of Radford, Va., and a 1986 graduate of Emory & Henry (Va.), Young helped guide Wofford from NCAA Division II to Division I Independent status in 1995-96 and the Southern Conference in 1997-98. In recognition of his contribution to the Terriers, Young was promoted to associate head coach in August 1998.

Young came to Wofford in 1989 after serving as a graduate assistant for one year at Radford. He was also an assistant at his alma mater for two seasons before moving on to Radford.

Young was honored in 2001 as America's Best Dressed Assistant Coach in a national contest conducted by www.collegeinsider.com.

- Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).

- Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).

- Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

- With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.

- Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.

- Wofford ranks No. 1 among national liberal arts colleges in "operating efficiency," providing a quality education while spending relatively less.

In the 2000 NCAA Division I Graduation Rate Report, Wofford was the only school in the nation to rank in the Top 10 in all four categories: overall student-athlete graduation rate as well as those for the football, men's basketball, and women's basketball teams.

"There are no junk courses at Wofford that we could see, and we would certainly match its course of study with that of any school in the Ivy League."

A Youthful Staff

The Wofford men's basketball coaching staff is the youngest in the country in a national study conducted by Radford University.

The average age of the four Terrier coaches is 29.8. Radford is second at 30.0.

Head Coach **Mike Young** is 39 and the graybeard on the staff. Assistant coaches **Jimmy Allen** (31), **Alex Peavey** (25), and **Mark Prosser** (24) are next in line.

Women Beware

Wofford College assistant men's basketball coaches **Alex Peavey** and **Mark Prosser** have been named to "College Basketball's 50 Most Eligible Bachelors and Bachelorettes" list by www.collegeinsider.com.

Wofford is the lone school to have two representatives in the bachelor category.

Peavey, a repeat selection from last year, is in his third year at Wofford. Prosser, the son of Wake Forest coach **Skip Prosser**, is in his first season with the Terriers after graduating from Marist last spring.

"I've tried desperately to get both of them dates," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "They choose instead to spend so much time in the office. They might be staying bachelors for awhile."

Finding the Net

- Wofford averaged 94.7 points while shooting 54.9 percent, including 46.7 (35-of-75) from 3-point range, in a recent three-game winning streak over Davidson, VMI, and Chattanooga (Feb. 3-10).

- The Terriers scored at least 90 points in three consecutive games for the first time since competing in Division II in Feb. 1993.

- Wofford's 76.2 season scoring average is its highest in eight years of Division I play.

- Wofford is 8-2 when shooting at least 50.0 percent and 9-4 with at least a 44.6 percentage.

- The Terriers shoot 48.5 percent in going 3-4 in league home contests, compared to a 44.3 mark in posting a 4-4 SoCon road record.

- Wofford has shot at least 50.0 percent in 10 games this season with eight of those occasions being at home. The Terriers have a 51.1 field-goal percentage in the Benjamin Johnson Arena and 42.3 on the road.

- Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) from behind the arc in its 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2), representing a season-high in 3-point percentage.

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** were a combined 9-of-13 on treys that night.

Schedule Difficulty

- The RPI and Sagarin Ratings ranked Wofford's non-conference schedule this season as the most difficult in the nation out of 327 Division I programs.

The Terriers played at Auburn, Clemson, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, South Carolina, NC State, and Virginia.

- In their opening 12 games last year, the Terriers played at Memphis, Clemson, Nebraska, NC State, and Georgia Tech. Wofford also played host to South Carolina.

- The RPI rankings, which take into account Division I games only, determined that Wofford's pre-Christmas schedule in 2000-01 was the most difficult in the nation. The Terriers had road games at Georgia Tech, South Carolina, Boston College, Alabama, Clemson, and Vanderbilt. Wofford was also home for William & Mary.

- According to the Sagarin Ratings in the 1999-00 season, Wofford played the nation's third toughest pre-Christmas schedule. Only Iowa and Temple faced more difficult slates.

Preseason Honors

Wofford point guard **Mike Lenzly** is a consensus preseason All-SoCon selection. He received honors from the league coaches in addition to several preseason publications.

A 6-foot-3 southpaw from Jonesboro, Ga., Lenzly has been an All-SoCon selection in each of the last two campaigns.

Lenzly posted Wofford's first-ever triple-double with 21 points, 12 assists, and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 victory over Chattanooga during the 2000-01 season.

"They (the Terriers) played against West Virginia, Auburn, Virginia Tech and NC State, and I'm not so sure that in all those games they didn't have the better backcourt. That's how much I respect those two players (Mike Lenzly and Lee Nixon)."

Greg Taylor, a transfer from the University of South Carolina, is sitting out this season per NCAA transfer rules.

The 6-foot-5 guard will have two years of eligibility with the Terriers.

Taylor signed with **Eddie Fogler** at USC after a highly decorated prep career at Hillcrest High School in Simpsonville, S.C.

Wofford won five of its last six Monday games and was 6-3 overall on that day, including a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2). Wofford is 4-6 on Saturday, 1-1 on Tuesday, 1-0 on Wednesday, 0-1 on Thursday, 0-1 on Friday, and 0-2 on Sunday.

The Charity Stripe

- The Terriers have a 74.1 free-throw percentage in eight SoCon road games and a 57.8 mark in seven league home contests.

- The Terriers shoot 70.7 percent in their 12 wins and 66.8 in the 14 losses.

- Wofford was a season-high 90.9 percent (20-of-22) at the free-throw line in the 60-59 win at Furman (Jan. 11), just one game after shooting a season-low 40.0 percent (6-of-15) in an 88-79 loss to the College of Charleston (Jan. 6).

Terriers Make Mark in Post

Three of Wofford's top four post players (**Tyler Berg**, 57.0 percent; **Howard Wilkerson**, 53.7; **Sam Daniels**, 50.9) are shooting over 50 percent on the season. The trio (Berg, 58.9; Wilkerson, 55.6; Daniels, 52.1) increases its field-goal percentage in SoCon play.

One or the Other

Either **Mike Lenzly** (15.8 ppg) or **Lee Nixon** (15.2 ppg) has topped Wofford in scoring in all but six games this season.

The Terriers are 10-10 with Lenzly or Nixon as the leading scorer and 2-4 with someone else setting the pace.

SoCon Tabs Nixon

Lee Nixon was named the SoCon Player of the Week after leading the Terriers to a 79-77 victory at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

Nixon scored 27 points in the Terriers' first-ever win over a Big East opponent. He was 7-of-13 from the field, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. He also added a pair of free-throws in the final minute to preserve the victory.

The 27 points equaled the second-best game of Nixon's career.

What a Victory Means

- The Terriers (12-14) are in pursuit of their first .500-plus record in eight years on the Division I level.

Wofford's previous best mark was 14-16 during the 1999-00 campaign. The Terriers' non-conference schedule annually ranks among the nation's most difficult.

- A win would allow the Terriers to equal their highest SoCon win total in six seasons of league play. Wofford posted 8-8 marks in the 1998-99 and 1999-00 campaigns.

Back to White Shoes

The Terriers will be sporting white shoes the remainder of the season after dropping their last four SoCon games after switching to new black shoes.

Keeping Busy

Sidelined for the season by a knee injury, sophomore guard **Justin Stephens** sat at the scorers' table for the Jan. 20 home game with East Tennessee State and played the Benjamin Johnson Arena music through the Terriers' computerized sound system.

Stephens also served as the official scorer at the Feb. 10 Wofford women's basketball home game versus Furman.

Young Sports Bow Tie

Wofford coach **Mike Young** will take part in the national "Jim Phelan Bow Tie Day" tribute when he wears a bow tie during the home game with The Citadel.

College basketball coaches nationwide, including the likes of **Rick Barnes** (Texas), **Bob Huggins** (Cincinnati), and **Kelvin Sampson** (Oklahoma), will also be sporting bow ties in honor of retiring Mount St. Mary's coach **Jim Phelan**. A bow tie has been the signature look for Phelan, who is the only person to coach 49 years at one school and coach over 1,300 career games. Phelan ranks third in wins on the all-time Division I chart with 829.

"I have never met Coach Phelan but any man that can coach this game for 49 years and win over 800 games has certainly earned a great deal of respect," Young said. "As a tribute to him, I will wear my first and only bow tie while coaching a game."

Baby Watch

Wofford coach **Mike Young** became a father for the second time when his wife, Margaret, gave birth to **Robert Davis Young** (six pounds, 15 ounces), on Jan. 9 at 12:08 p.m.

The Youngs have a three-year-old daughter, Cooper, who is a fixture at Wofford home games in her Terrier cheerleading uniform.

Senior guard **Lee Nixon** had two heights this year for the Wofford basketball team.

Nixon stands 6-foot-4 with his hair shaved or in cornrows. When he sported the afro, Nixon increased to 6-foot-8.

The Staff

The following is an inside look at Head Coach **Mike Young's** three assistants:

- Jimmy Allen** is in his first season at Wofford after serving the last six years at Navy, helping guide the Midshipmen to a pair of Patriot League championships and NCAA Tournament berths.

Allen, like Young, is an Emory & Henry graduate who also coached at his alma mater upon his graduation.

- Alex Peavey** is in his third year with the Terriers after working with the basketball program at Virginia Commonwealth.

He is the son of **Marion Peavey**, a 1965 Wofford graduate and former executive director of the NCAA Foundation.

- Mark Prosser**, son of Wake Forest Head Coach **Skip Prosser**, joined the Terriers after graduating from Marist this past spring. He played for the Red Foxes before a knee injury ended his career. He then served as a student assistant coach.

The Trickle Down

The SoCon hiring a new commissioner last year resulted in Wofford naming a new head basketball coach.

With **Danny Morrison** leaving his Wofford senior vice-president position to become the SoCon commissioner, **David Wood** was promoted from athletic director to Morrison's vacated role.

Head Basketball Coach **Richard Johnson** was then promoted to athletic director with the Dec. 3 announcement that he would coach the Terriers just through the remainder of the 2001-02 season.

In his first official day as athletic director, Johnson made his first coaching hire. He tabbed longtime assistant **Mike Young** to take over the head coaching duties effective at the close of the campaign. Young is in his 14th year overall at Wofford.

Morrison hired Johnson to be Wofford's basketball coach in 1985.

Athlete Extraordinaire

Sophomore guard **Adrien Borders** was the SoCon Freshman of the Year in outdoor track last season and an All-SoCon performer.

Borders placed second at the SoCon Championships in the triple jump (over 50 feet) and long jump (more than 24 feet). He also competed well as a sprinter.

The Lilburn, Ga., native is averaging 9.0 points after scoring at a 4.8 clip last year.

Stephens Sidelined for the Season

Wofford guard **Justin Stephens**, an All-SoCon Freshman team selection last season, will be sidelined for the remainder of the year after sustaining a knee injury in the first half of the Nov. 24 game at Clemson.

Stephens placed third among SoCon rookies last season with a 12.4 scoring average, with that mark increasing to 14.1 points in league action. He also topped all SoCon freshmen in assists (3.2 apg) while ranking 10th overall as he started all 29 games.

Stephens played in just two games this season and is eligible for a medical hardship year.

In his first collegiate game, he garnered attention when he outplayed heralded freshman and eventual NBA lottery pick **Dajuan Wagner** of Memphis. Stephens outscored Wagner (19-18) while totaling more assists (6-4) and blocks (1-0). He also had the same number of steals (2) and rebounds (1) while recording one less turnover (2-3).

Freshman Sensation

Freshman **Tyler Berg's** 10.0 points per game average is the highest by a Wofford center since the 1993-94 campaign (**John McGinnis**, 12.6 ppg).

In consecutive victories over Chattanooga (Jan. 20) and Georgia Southern (Jan. 27), Berg averaged 18.5 points while shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) from the field.

Berg is a close second on the Terriers in rebounding (4.8 rpg) while placing third in scoring (10.0 ppg). He has a team-high 57.0 field-goal percentage, including 58.9 in SoCon action. He also tops Wofford in blocks (25) and is second in free-throw attempts (81).

Berg made a bid for All-Big East honors as he totaled 15 points and seven rebounds against both Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

More Berg

After being poked in the eye in a Jan. 4 practice and having surgery the next day for a lacerated eye lid and tear duct, **Tyler Berg** was doubtful for the Jan. 6 Charleston game.

However, he sported a pair of protective goggles and responded with a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field), including four dunks. He also had six rebounds in 19 minutes.

Charting the Boards

- Wofford is 9-1 when outrebounding its opposition and 3-13 with the opponent grabbing more boards.

- Wofford holds a 35.2-34.1 rebounding margin over the opposition in its 12 wins. The 14 defeats see the opponent with a 39.6-33.2 edge on the glass.

- Point guard **Mike Lenzly** (5.2 rpg) ranks No. 20 in the SoCon in rebounding and holds a slight edge over freshman center **Tyler Berg** (4.8 ppg) in their battle for the team rebounding lead by virtue of 11 more boards (136-125).

- In SoCon play, Berg has nearly as many offensive rebounds (30) as defensive (36).

The Fab Three

The Terriers have three freshmen in their rotation with all three rookies often on the court at the same time.

Center **Tyler Berg** averages 10.0 points and 4.8 rebounds with forward **Howard Wilkerson** (5.7 ppg, 4.2 rpg) and guard **Byron Fields** (2.5 ppg, 1.2 rpg) also major contributors.

Berg, Wilkerson, and Fields combine to give Wofford 18.2 points and 10.2 rebounds per game from the freshman class.

Berg and Wilkerson top Wofford in field-goal percentage at 57.0 and 53.7, respectively. Those marks increase to 58.9 and 55.6 in SoCon play.

SoCon Stats

- Wofford is tied for the SoCon lead (Charleston) in assist/turnover ratio (1.09).

The Terriers are fourth in the league in assists (16.0 apg) while committing the second-fewest turnovers per game (14.7).

- The Terriers are third in the SoCon with an average of 8.2 3-pointers per game.

- Wofford is third in the league, just .002 from the lead, in limiting its opponents to a 32.8 shooting percentage behind the arc.

The 1,000-Point Club

Mike Lenzly and **Lee Nixon** have become the 34th and 35th players, respectively, to reach 1,000 career points at Wofford.

Lenzly accomplished the feat in a Dec. 21 win over King while Nixon reached the milestone at the College of Charleston (Jan. 18).

Future Terriers

The Wofford men's basketball program has announced the signing of 6-foot-3 point guard **Curtis Ingram** and 6-foot-4 wing **Eric Marshall** to National Letters-of-Intent.

Ingram, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, averaged 16.8 points, 6.4 rebounds, and 6.1 assists last year in earning first-team All-Conference and All-Northeast Ohio honors. He was also third-team All-State.

"Curtis has a big, strong, football-type body in a point guard," Wofford coach **Mike Young** said. "He has a good, compact stroke and will add a real element of toughness to our team."

Marshall, a Grovetown, Ga., native, received first-team All-State accolades last year for Greenbrier High School. He averaged 21 points, nine rebounds, and five assists in earning team Most Valuable Player honors.

"I saw Eric play a lot," Young said. "He possesses the type of skills that we look for in perimeter players. He is an outstanding shooter and we like his size. Eric is a strong player and will be very good for us defensively."

A 20-Minute Game?

Wofford is 12-1 when holding a halftime lead, 0-12 when behind at the intermission, and 0-1 when tied. The Terriers' only loss when leading at the break was against Appalachian State when Wofford held a 34-31 advantage.

The Fork Union Pipeline

Head Coach **Mike Young** played one season at Fork Union (Va.) Military Academy and refers to longtime FUMA coach **Fletcher Arritt** as one of his coaching mentors.

Surprise, Surprise

After being picked sixth in the preseason by the SoCon media and fifth by the league coaches, Wofford is in position to finish third in the South Division by virtue of its season sweep of Chattanooga.

Davidson Notables

•Wofford's 54.0 field-goal percentage in the 98-82 win over Davidson (Feb. 3) represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot at least 50.0 percent against the Wildcats.

The last time it occurred was Davidson's previous visit to Spartanburg, nearly two years to the day when the Terriers shot 55.8 percent in an 83-73 victory (Feb. 5, 2001).

•Wofford's 98 points marked its second-highest scoring game in six SoCon seasons, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over Chattanooga in the 2000-01 campaign.

•The Terriers' 13 3-pointers, including a 9-of-18 mark in the opening 20 minutes to build a 52-30 halftime lead, equaled a season-high. Wofford also had 13 treys in a 79-77 win at Virginia Tech (Dec. 2).

•The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Road Warriors

Wofford had five road wins this season, including a 4-4 mark in the SoCon, after posting just one away victory for all of last year (66-64 at College of Charleston).

WOFFORD VS. THE CITADEL

Game 4 -- Wofford 79, Virginia Tech 77 December 2, 2002 Blacksburg, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 27 points to give Wofford its first-ever victory over a Big East opponent as the Terriers defeated Virginia Tech, 79-77.

Wofford never trailed and built an 18-point lead before taking a 43-26 margin into the locker room at the intermission.

The Hokies, carrying a three-game winning streak that included a victory over Michigan, began the second half with an 8-0 run in just 1:08 to trim their deficit to 43-34. However, the Terriers would answer every run by Virginia Tech.

A Mike Lenzly 3-pointer extended the Wofford lead back to 13 points, 52-39, with 16:10 left. Lenzly, playing on a sore ankle, had 16 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists in 38 minutes as the Terrier backcourt was shorthanded with Justin Stephens sidelined.

The Hokies continued to chip away throughout the second half, cutting Wofford's edge to one at 58-57 on a Terry Taylor jumper with 8:34 remaining. The Terriers immediately answered with a Tyler Berg layup and Nixon trey to regain a six-point lead, before Virginia Tech closed the gap again to just two points, 69-67, on a Carlos Dixon 3-pointer with 4:30 to play.

A pair of Lenzly free throws put Wofford ahead 77-71 with 47 seconds remaining. Virginia Tech's Dimari Thompkins cut the lead in half with a 3-pointer. After a Nixon free throw stretched the margin to four points, Taylor made it just one with a layup and free throw with 16 seconds left.

Adrien Borders then helped preserve the game, drawing a charge with seven seconds to play. Nixon converted a free throw with .9 seconds remaining to provide the final margin.

The 27 points for Nixon equaled the second-best game of his career. He went 5-of-7 from 3-point range and 7-of-13 overall. Wofford was 13-of-23 (56.5 percent) behind the arc.

Berg tallied 15 points and seven boards. Virginia Tech was led by the 6-foot-8, 285-pound Taylor, who had a double-double of 21 points and 10 rebounds.

The game was a successful homecoming for Wofford Head Coach Mike Young, who grew up in Radford, Va., just outside of Blacksburg.

Game 7 -- South Carolina 70, Wofford 59 December 16, 2002 Columbia, S.C.

Wofford built a six-point second-half lead before the University of South Carolina rallied for a hardfought 70-59 victory before a crowd of 10,028 at the Carolina Center in Columbia and a regional television audience.

Already without standout guard **Justin Stephens**, sidelined for the season with a knee injury, Wofford also played without starting forward **Grant Sterley**. The senior was a last-minute scratch due to food poisoning. Freshman **Howard Wilkerson** made his first collegiate start as the Terriers often had three freshmen on the court at the same time.

Trailing 27-24 at the intermission, the Terriers opened the second half with an 11-2 run, keyed by five points from **Sam Daniels**, to take their largest lead of the night at 35-29 on an **Adrien Borders** layup with 16:19 to play. Borders topped Wofford with 13 points and a career-high eight rebounds. Daniels scored all 10 of his points in the second half.

The Gamecocks scored the next 13 points to regain a 42-35 margin with 12:54 remaining. **Lee Nixon** then hit a 3-pointer and a running jumper to cut the Terrier deficit to 42-40 with 12:18 to play. Nixon had nine points while playing all 40 minutes.

Wofford was still within five points, 50-45, after a **Tyler Berg** free-throw with 8:35 remaining.

USC then scored the next 11 points to build a 16-point lead before the Terriers again answered. A 12-4 run, sparked by consecutive 3-pointers by **Mike Lenzly** and capped by a Borders trey, pulled Wofford within 65-57 with 2:08 to play.

"It's a good thing we prepared for Wofford tonight because, if we hadn't, we would have lost the game," South Carolina Head Coach **Dave Odom** said. "Every team that Wofford has played similar to us, they have taken it straight down to the end.

Game 9 -- No. 24 NC State 86, Wofford 71 December 29, 2002 Raleigh, N.C.

Julius Hodge had 26 points and 11 rebounds to lead No. 24 NC State to an 86-71 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 10,780 in Raleigh and a regional television audience.

Lee Nixon and **Mike Lenzy** topped the Terriers with 15 and 14 points, respectively. Nixon added a team-best seven rebounds which also equaled a career-high for the senior guard. Freshman center **Tyler Berg** contributed 10 points off-the-bench.

A Nixon free-throw with 8:35 to play in the first half pulled Wofford within 20-15. However, Hodge then keyed a 13-2 NC State run which helped the Wolfpack to their 14-point margin at the intermission.

The Terriers shot just 37.0 percent, including missing all eight 3-point attempts, in falling behind 38-24 at the half. Wofford made 47.1 percent of its field-goal attempts in the second half in being outscored just 48-47.

N.C. State was 22-of-25 (88.0 percent) at the free-throw line while Wofford was just 14-of-23 (60.9 percent). The Terriers came into the game shooting 73.9 for the season at the charity stripe.

Clifford Crawford added 22 points for NC State, who entered the game having outscored its opponents by an average of 21.5 points.

Terrier freshman center **Tyler Berg** scored a career-high 22 points (10-of-13 from the field) after being listed as doubtful for the game. He had surgery the day before to repair a lacerated eye lid and tear duct after being accidentally poked in the eye during a team practice.

The Terriers fell behind 16-5 to start the game, before pulling within 40-39 at the intermission.

Wofford then took its first lead of the game less than a minute into the second half when **Mike Lenzy** hit a 3-pointer to make the score 42-40. The Terriers twice built the margin to four points, the last being 54-50 when **Lee Nixon** nailed a 3-pointer with 14:34 remaining. The Cougars, though, used a 15-5 spurt down the stretch to pull away.

Wofford shot 52.8 percent for the game, including 60.7 (17-of-28) in the second half. However, the Terriers were victimized by a 6-of-15 (40.0 percent) night at the free-throw line. Wofford also had 18 turnovers to just 10 for Charleston.

Troy Wheless led the Cougars with a career-high 26 points, including five 3-pointers.

Game 17 -- Wofford 73, Georgia Southern 70 January 27, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Lee Nixon hit a game-winning 3-pointer with 5.2 seconds to play while freshmen **Tyler Berg** and **Howard Wilkerson** had career-high scoring nights of 23 and 13 points, respectively, in Wofford's dramatic 73-70 Southern Conference victory over Georgia Southern.

A **Terry Williams'** 3-pointer gave Georgia Southern a 66-63 lead with 2:51 to play, before Nixon answered just 12 seconds later with a trey to tie the game. After Wofford's **Mike Lenzly** and Georgia Southern's **Julius Jenkins** traded layups, the Terriers took a 70-68 lead with 31 seconds remaining when Wilkerson made a pair of free-throws after being fouled on an offensive rebound. In addition to his career-high points, Wilkerson also had a career-best nine rebounds.

The Eagles tied the game at 70-70 on a Jenkins layup with 16 seconds to play, setting the stage for Nixon's long 3-pointer which provided the winning points. Georgia Southern had a final chance to tie but **Kordel Gibson** missed a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

Georgia Southern scored the game's opening nine points and twice led by 10 points, before Wofford battled back to take its first lead of the night at 35-33 on a pair of Wilkerson free-throws with 1:54 remaining in the first half. The Terriers eventually took a 37-36 lead into the locker room at the intermission.

Jenkins, the SoCon's leading scorer entering the game (23.6 ppg), was held to 4-of-14 shooting, including 2-of-8 from 3-point range.

Berg was 10-of-15 from the field and had 18 points at the half. He also had his first career 3-pointer. Lenzly just missed a double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Wofford held its one-point lead at the half despite shooting 40.0 percent compared to 57.7 for the Eagles.

Game 19 -- Wofford 98, Davidson 82 February 3, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

Just one game after scoring a career-high 32 points at UNC Greensboro, **Mike Lenzly** had 26 points, six rebounds, seven assists and no turnovers in leading Wofford to a 98-82 victory over Davidson.

The Terriers' 54.0 field-goal percentage was their second-best effort of the year and their highest against a Division I opponent this season. It also represented the first time in 57 games that an opponent shot over 50.0 percent on Davidson. The previous time was the Wildcats' last visit to Wofford, an 83-73 Terrier win on Feb. 5, 2001.

The 98 points are the second-most by Wofford in its SoCon history, surpassed only by a 105-69 win over UTC (Feb. 13, 2001).

After falling behind 6-2 in the opening 4:12, the Terriers went on a 19-2 run over the next 5:21 to take a 21-8 lead at the 10:27 mark. Lenzly had six points in the spurt while **Grant Sterley** connected on a pair of 3-pointers on the way to scoring a season-high 10 points.

Wofford was 9-of-18 on 3-pointers in the opening 20 minutes and took a 52-30 lead at the intermission when **Adrien Borders** connected on a trey from the corner just before the buzzer to end the half.

Wofford took its largest lead of the game at 56-30 on a **Lee Nixon** jumper and Sterley layup to open the second half. Nixon scored 22 points.

Davidson made a run but could not get closer than nine points the remainder of the night. The Wildcats entered the game leading the nation in 3-pointers per game at 10.3 on 42.7 percent shooting, but were held to a 6-of-24 mark (25.0 percent) behind the arc.

Game 20 -- Wofford 94, VMI 93 (OT) February 8, 2003 Lexington, Va.

Lee Nixon scored 26 points, including a running jumper with 0.2 seconds to play to force overtime, while Sam Daniels hit a key 3-pointer in the extra period on the way to a career-high 19 points as Wofford took a 94-93 thriller over VMI in Lexington, Va.

The Terriers played shorthanded as starting forward Grant Sterley missed the game with a sprained ankle while point guard Mike Lenzly fouled out with 1:28 left in regulation.

The Terriers led 43-33 at the half and took their largest lead of the game at 50-35 on a Daniels trey with 18:05 to play. The Keydets got back in the game behind 70.8 percent (17-of-24) shooting in the second half. VMI took a 59-58 lead on a Radee Skipworth layup with 10:15 left.

VMI built their margin to as large as six points, 67-61, with 5:21 to play on a Tadas Mankevicius layup.

Nixon then answered with a 3-pointer and layup to begin a 10-2 Wofford spurt, capped by a Lenzly trey, that gave the Terriers a 71-69 lead with 3:23 left.

A Skipworth layup and two Richard Little free-throws put the Keydets on top 78-75 with 40 seconds to play. David Eaton tied the game for Wofford on a 3-pointer with 25 seconds remaining. It was the third trey of the game for Eaton who scored nine points in a career-high 20 minutes.

A Little baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds to play gave the Keydets an 80-78 lead. The Terriers advanced the ball to midcourt before calling timeout with 3.9 seconds left. Nixon then took the inbounds pass, drove to the basket, and banked in an eight-foot running jumper to force overtime.

After Wofford and VMI swapped baskets with four ties in the extra period, the Terriers took the lead for good at 91-88 on a Daniels 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining.

A Howard Wilkerson free-throw with 21 seconds left gave Wofford a 92-88 margin before a Little layup with seven seconds to play pulled VMI within 92-90. Nixon sealed the game with a pair of free-throws

to give Wofford a 94-90 lead. Little hit a 3-pointer just before the final buzzer to provide the final margin.

Wofford built its 10-point halftime lead by shooting 68.0 percent (17-of-25) in the opening 20 minutes.

Five Terriers scored in double figures. Wilkerson, starting in place of Sterley, had 12 points, one shy of his career-best. He also equaled a career-high with a team-leading nine rebounds.

Wofford shot 54.0 percent from the field for the second straight game.

Mike Lenzly equaled a career-high with 32 points, including 6-of-7 shooting on 3-pointers and 10-of-13 overall, to lead Wofford to a 92-83 victory at Chattanooga.

Lenzly also had seven rebounds and seven assists while playing all 40 minutes as the Terriers won at McKenzie Arena for the first time.

After Chattanooga took its first lead of the second half at 48-47 with 17:48 to play, Lenzly answered with three consecutive 3-pointers to put Wofford on top 56-48 with 16:28 remaining.

The Mocs countered with a 16-7 run to take a 64-63 lead. The teams then saw six lead changes before Wofford went on top for good, 71-70, on a Lenzly layup with 6:08 left.

Lenzly followed with his sixth and final 3-pointer to extend the margin to 74-70 with 5:26 left. Chattanooga closed to within two points on two occasions, the last time being 76-74 on an Aaron Morgan jumper with 3:27 to play. Lee Nixon then nailed a 3-pointer to extend the Terrier margin back to 79-74 with 3:08 remaining.

Wofford built its lead to seven points at 87-80 on a Lenzly layup with 1:01 remaining. Ashley Champion then hit a 3-pointer from the top of the key to bring the Mocs within 87-83 with 47 seconds left, but that would be as close as Chattanooga would get the remainder of the contest.

Wofford shot 56.9 percent from the field, its high game against a Division I opponent this season.

WOFFORD VS. THE CITADEL

Game 24 -- Wofford 114, Toccoa Falls 61 February 19, 2003 Spartanburg, S.C.

David Eaton and Jeff Tarr had career-high scoring nights while Wofford set a single-game school record with 16 3-pointers in a 114-61 win over Toccoa Falls.

Eaton tallied a game-high 22 points, including six 3-pointers, while Tarr had career-best totals of 14 points and seven rebounds. Grant Sterley equaled a career-high with 17 points while Byron Fields set a personal best with nine assists to go with eight points.

The Terriers posted their highest point total in a game since a 116-71 win over Warren Wilson on Jan. 23, 1989, a stretch of 394 contests. The 53-point margin also represented the Terriers' largest victory since a 110-49 win over Tennessee Wesleyan on Nov. 22, 1997.

Wofford scored the game's opening seven points and never trailed. Toccoa Falls did close within five points, 25-20, with 9:10 left in the first half. The Terriers then answered with an 18-4 run to pull away en route to a 56-33 halftime lead.

The highlight of the game for Wofford was Fields feeding Tarr for an acrobatic alley-oop slam midway through the second half.

Karim Souchu's 3-pointer with 20 seconds to play provided the go-ahead points as Furman rallied from a nine-point second-half deficit for a 69-66 victory over Wofford in a regionally-televised contest.

The Terriers were victimized by an 8-of-17 night (47.1 percent) at the free-throw line while being outrebounded 41-33, including 17-7 on the offensive end.

The teams were tied 32-32 at the half and were still deadlocked at 38-38 with 15:59 to play, when Wofford went on a 12-3 run to take its largest lead of the game at 50-41 on a 3-pointer from the corner by Adrien Borders.

Wofford still led 63-56 on a pair of Tyler Berg free-throws with 4:52 remaining, but Furman rallied to even the game for the sixth time at 63-63 with 1:43 left.

Lenzly hit a layup with 1:29 to play before making 1-of-2 free-throws at the one-minute mark to give the Terriers a 66-63 lead.

Nick Sanders nailed two free-throws to pull Furman within 66-65 with 45 seconds remaining. Following a Terrier turnover, Souchu hit the big trey to give the Paladins a 68-66 lead. Lee Nixon then drove to the basket for Wofford but his layup missed. Furman's Maleye Ndoye was fouled with five seconds left. After making the first free-throw, he missed the second. The Terriers raced downcourt but Lenzly's 3-point attempt at the buzzer fell short.

The Terriers shot 50.0 percent compared to 40.6 for the Paladins. In the second half, Wofford made 52.0 percent of his field-goal attempts while Furman was at 39.4.

College basketball coaches nationwide, including the likes of Rick Barnes (Texas), Bob Huggins (Cincinnati), and Kelvin Sampson (Oklahoma), will also be sporting bow ties in honor of retiring Mount St. Mary's coach Jim Phelan. A bow tie has been the signature look for Phelan on the sideline during his long and distinguished tenure. He is the only person to coach 49 years at one school and coach over 1,300 career games. Phelan ranks third in wins on the all-time Division I chart with 829.

"I have never met Coach Phelan but any man that can coach this game for 49 years and win over 800 games has certainly earned a great deal of respect," Young said. "As a tribute to him, I will wear my first and only bow tie while coaching a game."
