JOURNAL 1893.

BENNETTSVILLE, S. C., January 13th, 1892.

The eighty-seventh session (since reorganization, the twenty-eighth) of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened at Bennettsville, S. C., St. John's church 9 a. m. on the above date, the Rev. Bishop Jno. M. Walden, D. D. L. L. D., in the chair. Conference opened with singing the 521st hymn of the Hymnal, and the 1st Chron. 17th chapter, and the first chapter of the 2nd Epistle of St. Peter was read by the Bishop, Revs. L. Arthur, C. C. Scott and D. M. Minus led the Conference in prayer. The sacrament of our Lord's Supper was celebrated, interspersed with singing. Bishop Walden conducted the exercises assisted by the Presiding Elders, the Revs. J. McLeod and J. C. Hartzell, D. D. Hymn 843 was sung and quite a large number availed themselves of the opportunity of renewing their covenant with God, testifying of the love of Jesus and the work of the Holy Spirit. The Secretary of the last session was requested to call the roll, and seventy-seven members responded. See roll.

Nomination for a secretary being in order J. B. Middleton was nominated by W. G. Deas, and elected by acclamation. The following assistants were nominated by the secretary: J. N. Carter, Wm. M. Hanna, T. J. Clark, C. R. Brown. Recording Secretary, J. N. Carter.

On motion of J. L. Grice, C. C. Scott was elected Statistical Secretary. He nominated the following

assistants : R. L. Hickson, J. E. A. Keeler, A. E. Quick, J. C. Martin, J. H. Johnson, and J. L. Grice. They were confirmed by the Conference. On motion of E. B. Burroughs, W. R. Jervay was elected Conference Treasurer. The Presiding Elders nominated the following list of Special Committees. See list. The nominations were confirmed. On motion of L. Arthur, a committee was appointed on the relation of Episcopal Methodisms, as follows : W. G. White, E. C. Brown, A. Middleton, E. B. Burroughs, L. Arthur. The following were appointed committee on Epworth League : R. L. Hickson, W. M. Hanna, C. R. Brown, H. M. Murphy, and J. L. Grice.

On motion of F. D. Smith, it was voted to meet at 9.30 A. M., the first half-hour to be observed in devotional services, and to adjourn at 1 P. M.

On motion of C. C. Scott it was voted that the bar of the conference be within and including the eight tier of pews from the chancel.

The Revs. J. C. Hartzell, D. D. Secy, of the F. A. and S. E. Society, C. N. Grandison, President of Bennett Seminary, J. W. C. Bowen, D. D., Field Sec. of the Missionary society, J. H. Stewart, of the A. M. E. Zion Church, and E. O. Watson of the M. E. Church, South, were introduced to the Conference.

On motion reporters were appointed as follows : For The News and Courier, S. S. Butler; for the South-western Christian Advocate and Greenville News, E. B. Burroughs; for the Pee Dee Educator, W. G. White. The Bishop addressed the conference in the interest of the church work in general and the duty of each individual minister while at conference.

The Committee on Orphan Asylum requested that they be permitted to defer their report until the afternoon session, granted. Dr. J. W. E. Bowen addressed the conference eloquently and earnestly in the interest of the missionary cause. On the suggestion of the Bishop, the time was extended indefinitely. Instructions concerning the statistics were

given by the Bishop. It was voted to adjourn to meet at 3 P. M. for a statistical session. It was noted that all moneys for the Orphanage and Woman's Home Missionary society be paid to the Treasurer of the conference. On motion C. C. Scott was substituted on the committee of the 3rd year, instead of B. F. Witherspoon. A. Middleton was appointed to conduct the opening exercises this afternoon. The minutes were read and approved. On motion Conference adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

FIRST DAY.—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference met pursuant to adjournment ; the Bishop Rev. J. M. Walden in chair. The devotional exercises were conducted by A. Middleton. The roll of the Districts was called and a number of the preachers handed in their reports, and collections for the benevolences.

The report of the committee on Orphan Home at Orangeburg, was presented to the Conference ; discussed lengthily and in all its bearings and on motion the report was adopted.

The following Board of Trustees were nominated and elected: A. Middleton, L. M. Dunton, J. E. Wilson, Mrs. Dora Bulkley, C. C. Jacobs, J. L. Grice, Mrs. S. A. Chaplin, Mary B. Clafin, Eva Penfield, E. B. Burroughs, Mrs. I. E. Lowery, C. C. Scott, Mrs. L. M. Dunton and A. G. Townsend.

Minutes read and approved. J. W. Bosen was appointed to conduct the devotional exercises in the morning. Notices were given of the meeting of the evening, and the conference adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY.—MORNING SESSION.

Conference met at 9.30 A. M., Bishop J. M. Wal-Welden in the chair. The devotional exercises were conducted by J. W. Brown. The roll of absentees was called and 24 responded. The Bishop addressed the conference on the subject of prayer.

The following ministers were introduced to the Conference: Revs. J. M. Freeman, D. D., Ass't Sec. S. S. Union, R. O'Connell and A. A. Newson, of the N. C. Conference. The Statistical Sec'y. called the list of charges for reports.

The 13th Question was taken up. The Orange-burg District was called and A. C. Dutton, the P. E., passed in character and reported the work under his charge.

A proposition from J. B. Middleton and L. M. Dunton in relation to the addition to the main building at Clafin University was submitted. Dr. J. C. Hartzell addressed the conference in the interest of the F. A.

and S. E. Society and the proposition named. The paper was adopted.

Dr. J. M. Freeman addressed the conference in the interest of the S. S. Union and T. Society. Preambles and resolutions in relation to missionary appropriations were on motion of J. B. Middleton referred to the committee on missions. On motion it was voted that the committee on Sunday School include the subject of tracts.

A committee on resolutions was appointed as follows: R. L. Hickson, M. M. Mouzon, F. E. McDonald, W. H. Jones, N. T. Bowen.

The Rev. D. E. L. Parks of Gammon Theological Seminary was introduced. The Bishop addressed the conference on the importance of sustaining Clafin University as a center of religious and intellectual influence. Rev. J. C. Weston was appointed to conduct the morning devotions. Announcements were made. The minutes were read and approved. The long metre doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

JANUARY 13th, 1893.

Conference met at 9.30 a. m., the presiding Bishop in the chair. The devotional exercises were conducted by Dr. S. A. Keen. The Bishop addressed the conference in reference to the work of the standing and special committees, and also in relation to the pastors' duty to the Sunday Schools and the Epworth League. On motion J. A. Brown was substituted on conference stewards instead of J. H. Johnson.

FREEDMAN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION.

Your committee esteem it a pleasure to have the privilege of presenting you the following report as expressive of what we believe to be the effects of the great work of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Society: The proportions assumed for the physical, intellectual and moral good of our people by this society is incalculable. We see:

1. The unique adaptation of the plan to the great need brought about by the inability of the State to fully educate her children.
2. The moral good produced by the Christian influences of these educational centres of the church.
3. The wholesome effects brought to bear upon the mind and sentiment of the community, thus unifying thought and blotting out sectional differences as the offspring of prejudice and race hatred.
4. The spirit of devotion, endurance, fortitude and heroism manifested by the noble corps of teachers who have thus come to our rescue.
5. The magnificence of the work accomplished through these devoted instrumentalities.
6. The wisdom of the plan.
7. The gratitude of our hearts to God for the bless-

ings vouchsafed to this work.

8. The ever increasing growth and interest manifested from year to year.

9. Our prayers for the continuance of God's blessings upon the work so nobly prosecuted thus far.

10. Our solicitude and prayers that the richest blessings of divine grace may rest upon those who by their princely gifts make it possible for such a system to exist.

11. The great awakening among our people to obtain a better education. More than nine thousand of our youth annually crowd the spacious halls of these buildings, and the number will be much greater in the near future, from all indications. The marvelous increase of the material and financial interest of the Society is another encouraging feature of the work, the receipts during the quadrennium just closed, namely, from 1887 to '91 were \$981,197, an advance of more than \$350,000 over the previous quadrennium. This includes collections from all sources, of course. The last year was the most remarkable in the history of the Society.

1. Resolved, That in order that the Society may more effectively prosecute its noble mission, we will endeavor to collect every cent of the \$2,000 apportioned to our conference as a whole and to each charge severally.

We cannot too highly commend the Claffin University and the good work she is doing in providing higher education for our youth in literature, science, and the mechanical arts, and would urge the importance of selecting and sending the most gifted and promising youth of the State to enjoy the advantages of this Institution, where they may be prepared to go out as teachers and benefactors of their people.

We also commend the Gammon School of Theology to young men who feel called to the ministry, and would recommend that as far as possible our young men be required to spend one year at least in this Institution before joining the conference on trial. We would suggest that two visitors be appointed to attend the next commencement and report the result of their observations at the next session of this confer-

ence. We unite in expressing our appreciation of the visit and encouraging words of Dr. Parks, and will be pleased to welcome him or any other representative from this school at the next session of this Annual Conference.

Your committee also desires to commend the work of the Board of Education in collecting and administering funds for the benefit of indigent students. We recommend that collections be taken in all our circuits and stations for this cause, and that Children's Day be made an occasion of special interest and a good collection raised for the Board of Education, and that it be forwarded promptly to Dr. C. H. Payne, No. 150 Fifth Ave., N. Y. City.

We heartily endorse the able article prepared by the Rev. J. W. E. Bowen, Ph. D., setting forth graphically the importance of Christian education among us and the attitude of the church on this important subject.

We look upon the founding at the National Capital of an American University as a scheme fraught with great benefit to the whole church and the nation, and we do give the Rev. Bishop John F. Hurst our hearty endorsement in his noble undertaking.

The reaper death has entered our ranks and cut down two of our members. Since the last session of our conference Father Chas. T. Hopkins departed this life at his home in the city of Greenville, S. C., March 20, 1892, in the 78th year of his age. He died tri-

umphantly, a complete victory over death and the grave.

He was born in the city of Charleston, S. C., and acquired an education that enabled him at the close of the war to engage in teaching in the public schools. He rendered valuable service in this capacity. He also served in the office of Trial Justice for several years with acceptability, and was held in esteem by all classes, hence it is not strange that the people mourned at his funeral as at the grave of an affectionate father. He was a member of the S. C. Conference for a number of years, filled several appointments with acceptability, an eloquent preacher and a mighty man in prayer. He has gone to his reward.

Barrel James was born in Sumter county, S. C., September 1st, 1838. He joined the M. E. Church and was converted June, 1859. He was elected to the Legislature, and filled the position with credit to himself and the State. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Claflin University several years. Bro. James was said to be a born leader of men. He was admitted to the traveling connection of the S. C. Conference in 1872, and spent the remainder of his life in the active work of the ministry. He filled 9 appointments with acceptability; Easily being the last. He died at his post. It seems that the Lord directed him to settle his temporal business on going to his last charge. His work is done, and it is *well done*; he departed this life Nov. 4th, 1892. He expressed his readiness and willingness, to depart and to be with Christ which is far better.

To the Bishops and Members of the South Carolina Conference:—

In response to a memorial presented to your body at the session held in Greenville Feb. 5 to 9, 1891, calling your attention to the importance of the establishment of our Orphan's Home and signed by Mrs. Dora Bulkley, Mrs. Levi Brown and several other influential women of our church, your body on the last day of the session appointed a Board of Trustees for an Orphan Home, consisting of the following members: L. M. Dunton, N. T. Bowen, C. C. Jacobs, G. W. White, A. Middleton, A. G. Townsend and E. B. Burroughs.

January 1st, 1892, the following communication was made by Dr. and Mrs. L. M. Dunton:

To the Bishop and members of the South Carolina Conference: Being profoundly impressed with the importance of establishing a place where the orphans of our deceased ministers, and of other members of the Methodist Episcopal Church can find a home and receive a Christian education and a trade, we have decided to make the following proposition:

We will give a lot valued at \$250 and \$500 in cash for the erection of a suitable building, provided a building is erected within two years, valued at not less than \$1500, and it is further provided, that if the property shall cease to be used for the aboved mentioned purpose the lot shall revert to the donors.

This generous gift of Dr. and Mrs. Dunton was duly and gratefully acknowledged, and the auxiliary societies of the W. and M. societies in the conference were requested to co-operate with the conference in raising money to meet the conditions of the donation.

Under the leadership of Miss Eva Penfield, Mrs. Dora Bulkley, Mrs. Chaplin and others, during the past year, a considerable sum of money has been raised. We feel that a sincere vote of thanks should be extended to these ladies for the good work they have done.

We are fully convinced that this Orphan's Home movement should be entirely under the direction and control of the South Carolina Annual Conference. Mrs. Gov. Claflin of Boston, has become greatly interested in the orphanage and has appealed to her friends in Boston and elsewhere, to aid in raising money for the enterprise. She has already secured \$1000, and continues to manifest a very earnest and generous spirit in helping forward the good work. We feel that in the providence of God the outlook is good for the establishment of a Christian home where the orphans of our deceased ministers and others, may have the blessings of a well ordered christian home and the opportunity of a christian education.

We recommend that an act of incorporation be secured for the Orphans Home of the South Carolina Conference Society of the M. E. Church to be legally domiciled and the home to be located at Orangeburg adjacent to Claflin University. The inmates of the home to be admitted to Claflin University, so they may have the benefits of literary and industrial training under such regulations as shall be agreed upon by the trustees of the home and the University.

We herewith submit a form of organization and recommend its adoption:

ARTICLE, 1. The name of this organization shall be the Orphans Home Society of the South Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church.

ART. 2. The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a Christian Home for the orphans of our deceased members of the South Carolina Conference, and such other orphans of members of the M. E. Church, in the State of South Carolina as can be accommodated and are chosen under such rules as may be adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Home.

ART. 3. There shall be a board of the trustees of fifteen members, of the M. E. church. A majority of whom shall reside in or near Orangeburg, and a part of whom may be women.

The first board of trustees shall be appointed by the South Carolina Conference and shall thereafter be self-perpetuating as the first meeting after their election by the conference, they shall be divided into 3 classes, their terms to continue 1, 2, and 3 years or until their successors are elected.

Five trustees shall be elected by the Board each year to fill vacancies.

ART. 4. There shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. There shall also be an executive committee of five, of which the President and Treasurer shall be ex-official members and who shall reside in or near Orangeburg, and shall have charge of the home under the direction of the Board of Trustees.

The Trustees shall make to the South Carolina Conference annually a full and detailed report of its proceedings including all receipts and expenditures.

ART. 5. The South Carolina Conference shall be

responsible for the maintenance of the home. The money to be raised by annual collections in each congregation, and by special contribution in money or supplies, or by bequests or any other forms of donations.

To further provide for a sufficient income the annual conference shall elect each year a conference President and one vice President from each P. E.'s District. Each pastor shall also co-operate in organization of an Orphans Home Society in each local church. The conference President shall devote her time as far as practicable to the interest of the society in the conference. Each District vice President will co-operate with the President in her own District, in the work of organizing societies in local churches.

The purpose of the local societies shall be to secure membership by the payment of one dollar annually or 10c. per month, for the support, maintenance of the home. Each local society shall report through its treasurer Jan. 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1, of each year to the District Vice President all moneys raised and such other information as may be required in the interest of the work.

The District Vice President shall promptly forward all money received to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees who will return vouchers for the same.

The Conference President and District Vice President shall be women and members of the M. E. church in South Carolina.

ART. 6. At each annual conference session there shall be held an orphans' home anniversary under the direction of the conference President and the District Vice President and at which the conference President shall preside.

The order of business shall be as follows: 1. religious exercises. 2, annual report of the Board of Trustees. 3, annual report of the conference President. 4, annual report from each of the District Vice Presidents. 5, one or more addresses. 6, appeals for annual membership and devotion. We expect that as far as practical representatives from local church societies shall attend these annual meetings.

ART. 9, These articles may be altered or amended by the annual conference upon the recommendation of the Board of Trustees.
