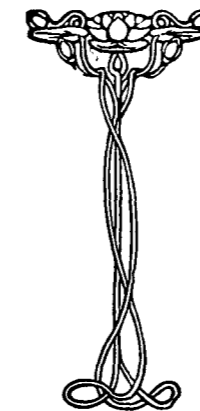

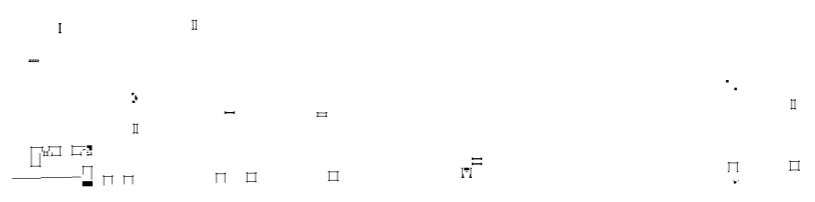

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

Bethel Methodist Church,
Chester, S. C., November 11, 1942.

Opening. The Upper South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church convened in its twenty-eighth session in Bethel church, Chester, S. C., November 11th, 1942, at 7:30 p. m., Bishop William T. Watkins in the chair. Hymn No. 402 was sung; Dr. B. R. Turnipseed led in prayer; after which the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Bishop, assisted by R. F. Morris, E. R. Mason, W. L. Mullikin, and L. E. Wiggins.

Address. Bishop Edwin F. Lee was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Roll Call. The roll was called by L. E. Wiggins, the Secretary of the last Conference, and 143 clerical and 59 lay delegates answered to their names.

Organization. R. L. Holroyd was elected Secretary, with H. O. Chambers and M. B. Patrick, assistants. J. T. Frazier was elected Statistician, with Rex V. Martin, J. G. Hipp, J. W. Tomlinson, G. T. Hughes, T. L. Bryson, and J. G. Stroud, assistants.

Motion. On motion of L. E. Wiggins it was decided that hereafter only the roll of absentees be called.

Bar of Conference. The bar of the Conference was fixed to include the main auditorium of the church.

Hours of Meeting and Adjournment. On motion of C. E. Peele the hours for meeting and adjournment were fixed as follows: Meet at 9:30 a. m. and adjourn at 1 p. m.; meet at 3 p. m. and adjourn at will; meet at 7:30 p. m. and adjourn at will.

Announcement. Bishop Watkins announced changes in the printed program of the Conference as follows: Bishop Lee to address the Conference Thursday morning; Dr. W. K. Greene to address the Conference on Thursday evening; a session of the Conference on Friday evening.

Adjournment. The Conference adjourned with the Benediction by Bishop Lee.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY

November 12, 1942.

Opening The Conference convened at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Watkins in the chair. Hymn No. 2 was sung. Bishop Lee addressed the Conference.

The Publishing House. Mr. C. E. Miller of the Publishing House was introduced and spoke to the Conference. He presented a check from the Publishing House amounting to \$1,313.59 for the Retired Ministers of our Conference.

The Christian Advocate. Dr. E. C. Nash, Business Manager of the Christian Advocate, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the general organ.

Order of the Day—Lay Activities. The Bishop recognized LeRoy Moore, Conference Lay Leader, who introduced Dr. Charles C. Sherrod, President of the State Teachers' College of Tennessee and Conference Lay Leader of the Holston Conference, who addressed the Conference.

Conference Lay Leader. Dr. J. E. Ward nominated LeRoy Moore as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected, thereby answering Question 27.

On motion of J. C. Roper the Conference thanked the Committee for its work in the publication of the book.

Wofford Meeting. Dr. H. N. Snyder announced a Wofford Supper Meeting at Hotel Chester on Friday evening at 6:30 o'clock.

Adjournment. After announcements Conference adjourned with the benediction by L. D. Gillespie.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION

November 13, 1942.

Devotional. After the devotional led by Rev. O. W. Lever the Bishop called the Conference to order.

Report of Committee on Minutes. Bishop Watkins called for the report of the Committee on Minutes of the previous session. They reported that minutes had been examined and found correct.

World Service and Finance. Bishop Watkins called for the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance. The report was not yet ready, but Dr. H. W. McPherson, representing the General Board, was introduced and addressed the Conference. Dr. W. K. Greene, president of Wofford College, was also presented and addressed the Conference on World Service. At the request of the General Board Bishop Watkins made a statement on the same subject.

Chaplains. Chief Pharmacist Mate O. J. Kirkpatrick was introduced to the Conference and directed the attention of the Conference to the great need for chaplains in the Navy.

In Chair. The Bishop called L. E. Wiggins to the chair while he attended a board meeting.

The Southern Christian Advocate. Dr. D. D. Peele was presented and represented the Southern Christian Advocate.

South Carolina Fellowship of Churches. Dr. J. W. Shackford presented the plans for the organization of a South Carolina Fellowship of Churches. Motion was made and carried that this Conference participate through the proper representatives.

Greetings. Greetings from the Baptist Convention of South Carolina were received. As the Convention had adjourned before the greetings were read the editor of the Southern Christian Advocate was requested to mention this fact in his columns and the Conference reporter carry this in his report of the session.

Report of Investigating Committee. The committee appointed to decide whether a trial is necessary in the matter of J. M. Mason, reporting through B. R. Turnipseed, declared a trial necessary.

Method of Procedure. The Bishop pointed out the three methods of procedure in the matter of a trial. The Conference voted to appoint a committee of thirteen elders as the trial committee in accord with Paragraph 637 of the Discipline. Bishop Watkins appointed F. C. Beach as chairman and H. O. Chambers as secretary of the trial committee. Members of the committee were appointed by the Bishop

as follows: W. B. Garrett, J. A. Barrett, J. L. Singleton, D. A. Clyburn, A. M. Doggett, D. W. Smith, W. H. Lewis, W. M. Owings, O. A. Jeffcoat, O. W. Lever, F. C. Owen, M. M. Brooks and J. F. Lupo. Counsel for the Conference, L. D. Gillespie.

Executive Session Announced. The Bishop announced that immediately after the address of Dr. C. C. Norton the Conference would go into Executive session.

Historical Address. A. E. Holler, President of the Historical Society, introduced Dr. C. C. Norton, who delivered the historical address, using as his subject, "The Observance of the Sesquicentennial of the Founding of the Annual Conference."

Executive Session. The Conference, at this juncture, went into Executive session.

Request from South Carolina Conference. The South Carolina Conference sent a request through Bishop Watkins that the credentials and standing of Rev. W. V. Dibble be restored.

Statement by W. V. Dibble. W. L. Mullikin requested that W. V. Dibble be allowed to make a statement to the Conference. This request was granted and he read a statement to the Conference.

Motion. A motion was made by W. L. Mullikin that the request of the South Carolina Conference be granted. The motion was seconded by E. R. Mason, and R. F. Morris, J. C. Roper, J. W. Johnson, W. H. Polk, W. A. Duckworth and G. W. Burke spoke in favor of the motion. P. L. Bauknight spoke in opposition. A paper was presented containing the names of stewards of Central Methodist church of Spartanburg favorable to the restoration of credentials and standing.

Ballot. After he had stated the question the Bishop directed a secret ballot on the question. The ballot was taken and counted. The count showed 171 Ayes and 9 Noes.

Restoration of Credentials. The secretary, in the name of the Conference and by the direction of the Bishop, restored the credentials of W. V. Dibble.

Benediction. After various announcements the benediction was pronounced by W. V. Dibble and the session stood adjourned.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY—NIGHT SESSION

November 13, 1942.

Opening. Conference convened at 7:30 p. m., Bishop Watkins in the chair. The opening devotions were conducted by E. W. Hardin.

Epworth Orphanage. W. D. Roberts, Superintendent of Epworth Orphanage, was presented and addressed the Conference.

Board of Education. The Board of Christian Education rendered a verbal report of its work through Dr. H. N. Snyder, A. L. Gunter, A.

R. Broome, Miss Caroline Cannon, Bishop Watkins, and Dr. H. W. McPherson of the General Board.

Question 28, What is the report of the Conference Treasurer? was called. George A. Beach, Conference Treasurer, rendered his report, and it was ordered to the record. (See Reports.)

Question 8, Who are supernumerary? was called, and answered, No one.

Question 9, Who are retired?, was called. The name of J. L. Singleton was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the retired relation. J. B. Chick, supernumerary, was referred to the committee for the retired relation.

Motion. B. L. Kilgo moved that Item 3 in the report of the Commission on Pension Plan (page 78 of 1941 Journal) be referred to the Committee on Standing Rules. Carried.

Question 11, Who are admitted on trial? was called. Ralph W. Atkinson, Joel E. Cannon, Michael Fryga, William Grady Newman, Voight O. Taylor, Clyde Alston Brooks, E. T. McWhirter, having met the requirements of the Discipline, and having been recommended by the Board of Ministerial Training and the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, were admitted on trial.

Question 15, Who have completed their studies? was called. (a) Class of the First Year: George Russell Cannon, Albert Smith Harvey, having completed their studies, were advanced to the Class of the Second Year. (b) Class of the Second Year: William Harry Chandler, Joseph Claude Evans, John Gerald Hipp, William Franklin Moore, Jr., Robert M. Phillips, having completed their studies, were advanced to the Class of the Third Year. (c) Class of the Third Year: William Reuben Bouknight, Dennis Roy Dickerson, Clarence Poe Parker, David Whitehead Reese, Jr., James Gideon Stroud, having completed their studies, were advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year. (d) Class of the Fourth Year: E. Wannamaker Hardin, William Wallace Fridy, having completed the required studies were presented with Diplomas.

Adjournment. The Conference adjourned with the benediction by J. R. T. Major.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY—MORNING SESSION

November 14, 1942.

Opening. Conference convened at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Watkins in the chair. The opening devotions were conducted by the Bishop. J. L. Singleton led in prayer.

Minutes. The Committee on Minutes reported through P. L. Bauknight that the minutes of both sessions on yesterday had been examined and found correct.

Group Insurance. The report of the Commission on Group Insurance was presented by the Sifting Committee through J. M. Younginer. On motion of J. A. Barrett and L. D. Gillespie, respectively, items 2 and 3 were ordered stricken from the report. The report, as amended, was adopted. (See Reports.)

Historical Society. The Conference recessed for a meeting of the Historical Society.

The Conference reconvened.

Question 9, Who are retired? was called. The name of A. M. Trawick was called and referred to the Committee for the retired relation.

Fellowship of Churches. The Bishop announced the Committee on the Fellowship of Churches as follows: J. W. Shackford, F. C. Beach, L. D. Gillespie, W. L. Mullikin, A. C. Holler. The committee was confirmed by the Conference.

The Report of the Board of Lay Activities was read by B. L. Kilgo, and adopted. (See Reports.)

Motion. A. E. Holler moved that a collection be taken and placed in the hands of the Treasurer for the purposes of defraying the expenses of retired ministers to the next session of the Annual Conference. Carried. The collection amounted to \$84.02.

The Committee on Conference Relations recommended that R. O. Webb be restored to the active list, and that J. B. Chick be continued in the supernumerary relation.

Introduction. Mrs. L. L. Hardin, Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

The report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was presented by J. A. Barrett.

B. B. Black moved to strike out the \$12,250 apportionment for the Local Church and substitute for this amount, \$8,000.

After much discussion, the following amendment was offered by J. R. T. Major:

Resolved:

1. That it is the judgment of this Conference that the Executive staff of the Conference Board of Christian Education be reduced from four to three.

2. That the money saved by changing the number of paid workers be shifted to the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

3. That the matter of formulating and adopting the policies and program of the Board be deferred until the new Executive Secretary shall have had time to study the question for himself.

The amendment was adopted. On motion of R. F. Morris the report as a whole was adopted.

REPORT ON THE LOCAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

The following report indicates the fact that in our conference we are reaping the results of the splendid leadership of our staff and

the good work of our pastors and church school workers during the years that have passed.

One hundred sixty-one Vacation schools were held during the year, 7714 pupils were enrolled, and 1300 workers gave leadership to these schools; 19 schools were held in churches where none was held last year; 100 workers with children were enrolled in a Fellowship of Study.

Three hundred sixty-eight young people attended the two youth assemblies held at Lander College; two Youth Caravan Teams visited 14 points in the conference during the summer, and rendered fine service; 295 Intermediates attended the three camps held during the summer. Our conference was well represented at the State Student Conference held in Charleston, the National Methodist Student Conference held at the University of Illinois, and the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The Adult Assembly which was held at Lander College proved to be most helpful to those who attended. As a testimonial to its value, practically every delegate left a written statement of his decision to be a better Christian, and more faithful worker.

World Service offerings show an increase of nearly \$1,000.

Training schools and classes were held in many churches and areas; 2887 leadership training credits were awarded during the year. On a basis of membership, it appears that our conference led the entire church in the matter of training credits earned by workers. We think this most significant.

Our staff has rendered excellent service, and did much to make this good report possible. We consider ourselves fortunate in having such a high type of leadership. We are grateful for the fine service that has been rendered by our outgoing Executive Secretary, Dr. A. L. Gunter. He has made a signal contribution to the work of Christian Education in our conference.

SOUTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1942 session of the South Carolina Pastors' School was held at Columbia College, June 22-27, 1942. Due to the change from a two-weeks school to the six-day session, only three courses were offered: The Philosophy of Religion, taught by Dr. E. S. Brightman; The Church and the New Order, led by Dr. Ralph E. Diffendorfer; and Ritual and Congregational Worship, taught by Dr. Nolan B. Harmon.

There were two hundred and thirty-two persons enrolled in the school, with one hundred and fifty-six receiving credits. The distribution of credits was as follows: Upper South Carolina Conference, ninety-two; South Carolina Conference, sixty-five. While fewer credits were awarded, necessarily, because of the short school, the enrollment was much higher than that of the 1941 session.

The treasurer's report shows that the receipts for the expenses of the school amounted to \$1,000. These funds came from two sources: \$200.00 from the Commission on Courses of Study, and \$800.00 from the conference appropriation. The total expenses of the school were \$676.43, leaving a balance of \$323.57.

Program plans for the 1943 session are in the making. At this writing it is impossible to offer the entire list of courses and instructors.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS OF SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

The Southern Christian Advocate has had a year marked by distinct gains. It closed its fiscal year with 10,214 subscribers, approximately 1,000 more than last year. The peak in subscriptions was reached on April 23, 1942, with 11,445 subscribers.

During the year the outstanding property debt on the Advocate of \$1,444.34 has been liquidated and the business of the paper has been put on a cash basis. This was made possible by a campaign for that purpose put on by the various districts of the conferences.

The board wishes to express its appreciation to our Bishop, our District Superintendents, our Preachers and local leaders for the very fine subscription campaign of February and March of this year. This campaign resulted in the largest paid up live subscription list within many years. During this period four districts in the state went beyond their quota of subscriptions. Many others approached their quota

very closely. We believe that a similar campaign put on with the same enthusiasm as this year will result in a circulation approximately 13,000. We commend the custom of some pastors who work their subscription list so as to make them all expire in a single month, thereby finishing up at one time this phase of their ministerial activity.

We must express our deep appreciation for the liberal manner in which all our people responded to the call of The Advocate in the cause of debt retirement. The amount received surpassed our anticipations.

We respectfully make the following requests:

(1) That the months of January and February be set apart as heretofore for the circulation campaign on the same quota basis as of last year; that is, 8 per cent of the membership of the charge reported at Annual Conference. That extraordinary endeavor be made during the campaign months to attain District Advocate quotas of subscriptions in every district.

(2) That the conference appropriation for The Advocate be not less than for the year 1941.

WOFFORD COLLEGE

The increasing needs of the various branches of the nation's armed forces have created a grave situation for the church-related college for men. It is, therefore, more imperative than ever that our Conference renew its pledge of support to Wofford College in its Promotion Program that is designed to meet such vital needs as: (1) the improvement of the grounds; (2) the renovation and rehabilitation of the dormitories; (3) the remodeling and enlargement of the main building; (4) the installation of a central heating system; (5) the enlargement of the Library and Science Building; (6) the erection of a Students' Activities Building; (7) an increase in the members of the teaching staff; (8) an increase in endowment; and (9) the establishment of a Faculty Annuity System.

In setting forth this summary of the vital needs of the college, it is clearly recognized that not all of them are capable of immediate accomplishment. However, the re-affirmation of our pledge of cooperation, in this critical hour, with our beloved college in the ultimate achievement of its objectives will strengthen the hands of its officials and inspire them to lead Wofford forward in even greater constructive Christian service to our church and nation.

Statement from President Greene

Since I have been at Wofford only two months, I shall make no comment on the statistical report given above. From the study that I have been able to make so far of our present situation, I wish to present the following matter for your serious consideration.

There are many vital needs of the College. They may be summarized as (1) the improvement of the grounds, (2) the renovation and rehabilitation of the dormitories, (3) the remodeling and enlargement of the Main Building, (3) the installation of a central heating system, (5) the enlargement of the Library and the Science Building, (6) the erection of a Student Union and an Administration Building, (7) an increase in endowment, (8) a Faculty Annuity System and, (9) additional members for the teaching staff.

The invisible element—the tone, spirit, and atmosphere—that exerts such a potent influence in a Christian liberal arts college is, in my judgment, very powerful here. The visible element, however,—the physical plant and its surroundings—is in striking contrast with the invisible, and I esteem it a high privilege as well as a profound obligation to lay this matter upon the conscience of devoted Methodists and loyal Alumni.

I accepted the Presidency of Wofford College with the firm belief that in the Christian liberal arts college lies a sure foundation of hope for the preservation of the freedom of the human spirit. I accepted it with the deep conviction that the very welfare of our beloved church is intimately interwoven with the training of Christian leaders in our church-related colleges. I accepted it on faith that the friends and alumni of Wofford would respond generously to the needs of our beloved College, and I believe they will do so if given the opportunity.

We must preserve the noble heritage and cherish the traditions of a great liberal arts college. We must go forward in even greater constructive Christian service.

WOFFORD COLLEGE DAY

The colleges for men are facing such a crisis today as they have never before faced. Their student bodies are melting away under the call to service in the armed forces of the nation. Our own Wofford is showing the effects of this call in a decreased enrollment, particularly in its upper classes, and with the passage of the new draft law, reaching down to take youths of eighteen and nineteen, it seems certain that Wofford will contribute to the battle lines at least seventy-five per cent of her student body. This means such a loss of income as will

make it virtually impossible for the college to carry on in this hour of our country's need. The church itself will suffer in its future service if Wofford should not be kept actively at work in offering in these trying days opportunities for ministerial training and the preservation of the spiritual values of our Christian education of youth.

The Board of Education, therefore, recommends that January 10, 1943, be designated as Wofford College Day. We further recommend that the South Carolina Conference, under the leadership of the Bishop and the Cabinet, develop and carry through plans for the financial relief of our college in the present emergency, using Wofford College Day for raising funds for the current needs of the institution.

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of Lander College, Greenwood, South Carolina, in official session at Lander College on October 9, 1942, after thorough investigation of the college buildings and furnishings were convinced that said buildings and furnishings are in need of immediate renovation and replacement and that upon such improvement depends to a large degree the ability of Lander College to keep pace educationally with institutions of similar rank and service—it was unanimously resolved that this urgent project be provided for by increasing the bonded indebtedness for this specific purpose.

WHEREAS, the Lander College Board of Trustees in official session in Columbia, South Carolina, on October 15, 1942, received and considered from all angles the findings of said Executive Committee in reference to said improvements, did unanimously approve the plan as outlined; and does hereby submit to the South Carolina Conference and the Upper South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, at their next annual sessions the proposal that Lander College be authorized to increase its bonded debt to \$50,000.00 to enable the college to make said necessary improvements, and at the same time liquidate outstanding bonded indebtedness.

A RESOLUTION

That the Board of Trustees of Lander College, Greenwood, South Carolina, be and it is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to procure a loan for an amount not exceeding Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars, and at such a rate of interest as to the Board of Trustees of Lander College may appear just and reasonable, such loan, together with the interest thereon, to be repayable in ten (10) equal annual installments after the date thereof; and that the said Board of Trustees of Lander College be and it is hereby authorized, em-

powered and directed to secure the payments of the said loan by the pledge, assignment and hypothecation of all, or so much as may be necessary annually, of the sums and amounts annually appropriated to Lander College by the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church and the Upper South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church; that as further security for the payment thereof, the said Board of Trustees of Lander College is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute in the name of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church and the Upper South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church any and all notes or bonds, together with a first mortgage, deed of trust, covering the following described property:

All that lot or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Town of Greenwood, County of Greenwood, State of South Carolina, containing twenty-four (24) acres, more or less, bounded on the North by other lands of Lander College acquired from the estate of Dr. John O. Willson; East by Crews Street; South by Durst Avenue, and West by Stanley Avenue, with the exception of 66-100ths of an acre, more or less, located at the corner of Durst Avenue and Lawson Street, upon which lot there has recently been erected the President's Home.

Together with all and singular the rights, privileges, hereditaments and appurtenances to said premises, belonging or in anywise incident or appertaining.

That the issue of the bonds on the 1st day of November, 1925 in the amount of Ninety Thousand (\$90,000.00) Dollars, of which there are outstanding approximately Twenty-six Thousand (\$26,000.00) Dollars shall be refunded and paid in full from the proceeds of the loan hereby authorized.

We recommend the adoption of the foregoing Resolution.

We call on every pastor and church official, every parent and every loyal Methodist of South Carolina to join us in giving active cooperation in the program of the Advance.

Report Number 12

The Board of Education recommends to the Annual Conference the following objectives for 1943, that:

1. Every church organize and develop its educational program according to the provisions of the 1940 Discipline.

2. In harmony with the Discipline the program of Christian Education in our Conference be built around the needs of our people and that in every district the District Staff, consisting of the District Superintendent, the District Directors and their associates, along with the Conference Staff, seek to locate the areas of greatest religious need. The Board of Education desires to cooperate with the other Boards in the Conference in meeting the religious needs of our people.
3. Every church school organize a Board of Education and a Workers' Conference as provided in the 1940 Discipline, and that regular meetings be held.
4. The Annual Conference adopt for 1943 the same quota rate for Church School Rally Day used heretofore (2 per cent of pastor's salary) and that every charge continue its contribution on that basis—and that this day be observed March 7 or March 14.
5. That the Conference cooperate fully in the Christian Education Advance; that each district and each church set an average goal of 23 per cent net increase over present church membership, both for church membership and church school enrollment and attendance, for 1943 and for the following three years; and that the working forces of each church be fully organized to this end.
6. Every church make adequate provision for training its workers through standard classes where possible and informal training such as institutes, assemblies, conferences, non-credit classes, and the Fellowship of Study for children's and adult division workers.
7. That every church having college and high school students observe Student Recognition Day with conditional offering. (See resolution on Student Recognition Day.)
8. Every church observe Methodist Student Day, and Race Relations Sunday, with offerings as provided for in the Discipline and that funds be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer.
9. Every church school be urged to use the new Methodist Church School Record System, and that accurate reports be required for all Quarterly and Annual Conference records.
10. Where needed every charge provide for its pastor's expense to the Pastors' School.
11. During 1943 we continue to emphasize adult work, giving special attention to the organization of Young Adult Fellowships and Adult Home Departments in the local church.
12. Each district endeavor to use one or more Youth Caravan teams within its bounds during the summer of 1943.
13. Every church send one or more young people to the Youth Assemblies and to the Conference Intermediate and Senior Camps.
14. Each local church youth division adopt the Methodist Youth Fund as its mission special for youth and receive pledges for it.
15. The Adult Assembly and Children's Workers' Conference be held jointly in June.
16. The plan of Missionary Education of Children be followed in every church and that expanded or additional sessions be held for mission study.
17. Every church provide for children a summer program which

will answer their war-time needs, and that vacation church schools be used as a part of this program.

18. Every church school observe Christian Education Week in 1943.
19. As many of the above objectives as possible be included in the educational program of each local church for 1943.

CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

3. We recommend that the charges of the Conference use the Lenten season next spring to carry out, as far as is practical, the Evangelistic program as outlined by the Commission of Evangelism of our Southeastern Jurisdiction, as follows:

First week—Community survey;

Second week—Prayer meetings.

Third and Fourth weeks—Evangelistic preaching;

Fifth and Sixth weeks—Conserving results through personal work and training for Church Membership.

4. We recommend that each local church strive to have a constant evangelistic relationship with its own members who are in the armed service of our Country.

FELLOWSHIP OF CHURCHES

Resolution

Whereas steps are being taken to organize a state-wide fellowship of churches to be known as "The South Carolina Fellowship of Churches" with the following Purpose, Principles and Policies:

Article I. Purpose

The purpose of the South Carolina Fellowship of Churches is:

1. To promote fellowship and mutual understanding among the followers of Christ constituting the several Communion of South Carolina.

2. To serve as a medium of interchurch advice and counsel on matters affecting the progress of Christianity in the State.

3. To associate the Communion in such joint service as may achieve more effectively the objectives of the Christian religion.

Article II. Principles and Policies

1. The fellowship shall exist as a voluntary association, and shall be without mandatory power in relation to the bodies choosing to make use of it as a channel of counsel and of joint Christian expression.

2. The complete autonomy and corporate integrity of each Communion shall be mutually respected and safeguarded in all relations involving interdenominational fellowship and action.

3. The membership of the Fellowship shall be composed by direct action of each Communion, either by election, appointment, or nomination, as each body may determine; and additional members shall be elected at large as hereinafter provided.

4. Each cooperating Communion shall be permitted three representatives on the Fellowship for the first ten thousand or less communicant members, and two for each additional twenty thousand or major fraction thereof up to fifty thousand, and beyond that there shall be one for fifty thousand, or major fraction thereof, provided that a number not to exceed twenty per cent may be elected at large by the Fellowship.

5. In relation to other interchurch bodies within both state and nation, the South Carolina Fellowship of Churches will work under its own autonomy.

Therefore be it resolved by the Upper South Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church:

1. That the Conference approves the purpose, principles and policies of the proposed South Carolina Fellowship of Churches.

2. That we appoint our resident Bishop as one member and request the Bishop and the District Superintendents to nominate for election by the conference seven other representatives to serve for the next two years as members of the South Carolina Fellowship of Churches.

EPWORTH ORPHANAGE REPORT

To the Members of the Upper South Carolina Conference.

Dear Friends:

The Trustees of Epworth Orphanage beg to submit the following report covering the operation of the Orphanage for the Conference year beginning November 1, 1941, and ending October 31, 1942.

During the year our services have been extended to 375 children, with an average daily number of a few more than 300. There has been more movement in our population than usual due to improved economic conditions, and the general spirit of unrest prevalent among people.

The health of our family continues excellent. No deaths during the year, no case of serious illness. We continue to carry out a well planned health program, with special emphasis on preventive measures.

Our school has had a most satisfactory year. Our faculty of well prepared, devoted teachers is doing most excellent work. The following boys and girls graduated from our high school last June: Elizabeth Atkinson, Annie Hazel Bell, Willie Davis, Edith Fogle, Annelle Johnson, Jacqueline Johnson, Lucile Keels, Annie Ruth Leonard, Hilda Raines, Annie Laurie Rush, Katherine Sinclair, Louise Thomasson, Marilyn Wise, M. F. Ball, Billy Cook, Milton Hodges, E. C. Keels, Thomas Poston, Albert Smith, Charles Turner, Graydon Waits.

Much emphasis is placed upon the religious training of our children. All of the older children are encouraged to take their turn in conducting evening devotions, and they take an active part in the devotional exercises of the various departments of the church school and the Epworth Leagues. Daily Bible reading is practiced by a very large number.

Vocational training in the various departments has received careful attention. The print shop continues to do excellent work and to furnish training to eight of our boys. The farm, dairy, livestock and poultry departments are all in excellent condition. This has been an unusually good year with us in hog raising. In addition to producing ample meat for our large family, we have sold \$5,000.00 worth of hogs. Our dairy herd has produced sufficient milk for the children, and we have sold a surplus of \$500.00 worth. The sale of calves and cows has amounted to a little more than \$600.00.

We have made some very much needed repairs on several of our homes, rebuilding several bathrooms where the old ones were in very bad condition and altogether inadequate. Other buildings on the campus are now badly in need of repairs.

The financial support given Epworth Orphanage this year by our churches and church schools has been the best in the history of the home. We began the year by putting into operation the suggested quota plan, adopted by both of our Annual Conferences at their last sessions. The plan has worked admirably. Practically all of our congregations made a definite effort to pay the amount suggested as their part. The majority reached their quotas and many went far beyond. As a result, the total amount contributed to Epworth Orphanage for this Conference year to date is \$81,000.00. We are greatly indebted to Bishop Watkins for recommending that we use the quota plan. The splendid response given by our people makes it possible for us to report to the Conference that we have not only paid our operating expenses to date, but have paid off an accumulated deficit brought over from previous years, and today we are happy to announce that we have no indebtedness of any kind.

We give thanks to our Heavenly Father for His tender, watchful care over our large family of orphan children, and we extend our most hearty thanks to Bishop Watkins, our District Superintendents, and all of our Preachers, as well as to everyone of our supporting constituency for their splendid service to the children now at Epworth Orphanage.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Board of Lay Activities of the Upper South Carolina Conference would respectfully submit to you the following report:

The year 1941-42 has been one of the most successful years that has ever been enjoyed by the Board of Lay Activities of the Upper South Carolina Conference. I think that this success can be explained by two or three different facts. In the first place, our people have been more church-minded in the last year than heretofore. This attitude is evidenced by the general increased interest in the various activities of the church. In the second place, our people are understanding the program of the Board of Lay Activities in a clearer way and appreciate more than ever the opportunities that are presented for more efficient church service through this channel. This is not peculiar to our own conference, but we find that it pervades the connection generally.

Laymen's Day was observed by our churches on February 22nd and the program prepared by the General Board entitled "Methodist Men and the Mission of the Church" was used almost entirely wherever the day was observed. I am glad to report that approximately eighty (80 per cent) of all of the congregations observed the day either on the date designated or near that time. It should be noted in this connection that the service for the most of the churches was in charge of the laymen of the local charge. We think that this fact is very significant in that it is an evidence of the growth of Methodist leadership in the average church congregation of this area of our work.

We are planning to do even better in observing the day during the coming year. Our goal will be a laymen's program for every church in the conference and the cultivating period to that end will begin at an early date. The 21st day of February has been appointed by our executive board as the date for Laymen's Day this coming year.

A Laymen's Council of the two conferences of this state was held at Columbia College June 8-10 of this year. It was more or less experimental with us but the prospects for real constructive service in this particular field are very bright. Because of transportation difficulties, our attendance was not as large as we had hoped for, yet the council was a success and I believe fruitful results have and will continue to manifest themselves. Serious minded Methodist laymen from both conferences gathered together for three days with the single purpose of better equipping themselves in the work of their church. Subjects of timely interest having to do with the church and its opportunity were studied and discussed in an intelligent and beneficial manner. We had several prominent leaders of the Church from without our bounds as guest speakers and they assisted in leading the discussions that were had during the forum hour of each session. It was the unanimous thought of the council that we should plan to have even a better session next year. Every effort possible will be exerted to this end and our people will be informed later, after all the plans have been worked out.

From the advanced reports that have been released so far, it is evident that our conference is closing a very successful year's work. We are truly grateful for the opportunity of sharing in this splendid achievement. During the coming year, it shall be our purpose to make even a greater contribution to the Church than we have yet made and to that end our Board pledges itself to cooperate with all the agencies of the Church in carrying on the work of the Kingdom in the most efficient manner possible. There is yet much to be done and during these days of unprecedented opportunity we must not be satisfied with anything less than our best efforts.

Much has been said with reference to the present-day conditions of our world. Much more could be said. Evil in all of its forms apparently is rampant and unrestrained. In the making of a better world and a more decent place in which to live, the Christian people of this country and of other lands have on them a tremendous responsibility. We call upon every member of our church to stand up and be counted when issues between right and wrong are at stake. It is needless in this report to catalog all of the conflicts that exist between a righteous church and an evil world. Our people know them and we would only call attention to the clear-cut duty of every loyal Christian during these perilous days.

We cannot refrain from giving expression of our appreciation to every pastor and lay leader of the church for the fine cooperation that we have had from them during the year. Our work would have been hardly worthwhile and certainly far less effective were it not for the whole-hearted support that we have enjoyed from preacher and laymen alike. For this we are truly grateful.

As objectives that we should like to attain during the year just ahead, we would name as follows:

1. That our churches adopt the budget system with reference to finances. In order to raise the budget, we strongly recommend an every member canvass at the beginning of the church year.
2. It is earnestly hoped that each congregation will accept the full askings in so far as our Benevolences are concerned.
3. We ask that the matter of stewardship in all of its phases be emphasized throughout the year.
4. Due to the increased cost of living, which is now so evident, we wish each Board of Stewards to consider seriously a substantial increase in pastors' salary.
5. That the pastors and lay leaders cooperate with us to the fullest extent in observing Laymen's Day on February 21st of this conference year.
6. That the pastors and lay leaders cooperate in an intensive "Go To Church Campaign" in every church and charge throughout the conference.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We make the following recommendations:

1. With our nation engaged in a total war that calls for the highest degree of industrial and military efficiency, we deplore the wastage and loss to our war effort resulting from the wide-spread use of alcoholic beverages by many soldiers and civilians in defense industries. We are opposed to the sale of beer in military encampments and of all intoxicating liquors near military posts. We urge upon Congress the speedy enactment of temperance legislation as a war measure essential to our national defense. We deplore the use of the national flag in advertising liquors. We commend our Senators and Representatives in the Congress who are supporting temperance legislation.

2. With the conscription of our young men for military service, we recognize the urgent need of safeguarding them from immoral conditions in communities where they may be stationed. We call upon all officers of the law to suppress vice and maintain wholesome conditions throughout our State.

3. We again enter a vigorous protest because of the failure of the State Legislature to repeal the liquor laws. We insist that the new Legislature heed the mandate of the 1940 referendum, and enact laws to suppress the traffic in alcoholic beverages. We urge all Chris-

tian citizens to vigilance in following the temperance record of legislative and law enforcement officers, and to support worthy candidates who are committed to this cause.

4. We urge upon our people the duty of supporting the enforcement of all liquor control laws now in effect; and we call upon all public officials to enforce such laws.

5. We call attention to the laws of our Church forbidding the use and sale of intoxicating liquors by members of the Church; and urge all Methodists to abstain from the use and sale of such beverages.

6. We recognize the corrupting influence in state and nation of the sale and reading of salacious literature. We urge Christian citizens to work for the suppression of this vile traffic.

7. We recognize the menace to public morals of the gambling spirit. Gambling is being carried on publicly in many places in the state. We urge the enforcement of laws against all forms of gambling. We commend the action of the State Legislature in defeating the proposal to legalize pari-mutuel betting.

8. We deplore recent legislation permitting commercialized amusements on the Lord's Day in communities where military posts are located. We do urge the Legislature not to renew this legislation upon its expiration next May.

9. We recommend that the last week in January be used for the observance of Temperance Week in every local church in the Conference with an educational program in the church school and a temperance sermon by the pastor.

10. We recommend that Methodist people and churches co-operate with the Federated Forces for Temperance, the South Carolina Council on Alcohol Education, and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in promoting temperance education and legislation.

11. We call attention to the legal responsibility of the State Department of Education and all public school teachers and officials for the effective teaching of temperance in all public schools. We recommend that local churches conduct classes on alcohol education for church school and public school teachers.

12. We report the following receipts and expenditures: Balance from last year \$46.53, contributions by local churches \$160.74, from the Conference Treasurer \$71.50, total receipts \$278.77. Expenditures: Travel, postage, printing, etc. \$8.38, to Federated Forces for Temperance \$125.00, to the State Council on Alcohol Education \$75.00, to the General Board of Temperance \$50.00. Total expenditures \$258.38.

13. We make the following nominations for District Secretaries of Temperance: Anderson District, B. S. Drennan; Columbia District, W. F. Harris; Greenville District, B. B. Black; Greenwood District, L. D. Bolt; Rock Hill District, J. C. Roper; Spartanburg District, M. K. Medlock.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Your Commission on World Service and Finance submits the following as its report:

1. The following amounts have been apportioned to our Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance: For World Service, \$51,040.88; General Administrative Fund, \$1,738. Total, \$52,778.88.

2. We recommend a Conference Budget of \$67,625, to be distributed among the various causes as follows:

3. The total budget, for World Service, General Administrative Fund and Conference Work, distributed by Districts, is as follows.

This represents a pro rata basis of 56.16 per cent of the total budget for Conference work and 43.84 for World Service.

4. The apportionment for Bishops' Fund is an amount equal to 2¼ per cent of the pastor's salary.

5. The apportionment for Conference Claimants is an amount equal to 5 per cent of the pastor's salary.

6. We recommend the observance of Veterans' Day, with a free-will offering in every church for our retired preachers, on the Sunday before Christmas, or as near thereto as practicable.

7. We are recommending in the above budget an increase in the apportionment for the Board of Temperance in order to place the Conference more solidly behind its work, and in lieu of special offerings in the churches when Temperance Day is observed.

8. We recommend the rescinding of the action taken last year in the adoption of Report No. 6 of the Board of Education (page 62, Year-book) in which each church was asked to pay the Board of Education one dollar for each student enrolled in any college.

9. In order to equalize the load of World Service and Conference Work apportionments to the ability of the charges to pay, enable the weaker charges to more adequately support their pastors and at the same time to enlarge our total support to Benevolences, we recommend:

(1) That special offerings be kept to the minimum and that major emphasis be applied on the acceptance and payment in full of World Service and Conference Work apportionments.

(2) That World Service Sunday offerings be sent through the District Superintendents to the Conference Treasurer, and that such offerings may be applied on acceptances.

(3) That our stronger charges be given an opportunity to assume a larger part of the "load" of Benevolences, more nearly on the basis of the operating budgets of the respective charges, and that District Superintendents, Conference and District Lay Leaders and Boards of District Stewards call in other leading laymen for counsel in making more equitable and effective distribution of askings to the charges, in keeping with Paragraph 837 of the Discipline.

10. During the past ten years the salaries of our pastors were drastically reduced. During the past two years the cost of living has greatly increased. We call this situation to the attention of all of our churches and recommend that a systematic effort be made to increase pastors' salaries, and especially in charges paying less than twenty-five hundred dollars per year. We urge that the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders co-operate with the District Superintendents in arranging group meetings as soon as practicable after Conference adjourns, inviting all Lay Leaders and Boards of Stewards to attend, and that this matter shall be presented by the District Superintendent and District Lay Leader in the most effective manner possible.

11. The officers and members of the Commission on World Service and Finance will hold themselves in readiness to be of any possible assistance in working out these matters, if called upon to do so.

12. Paragraph 839 of the Discipline requires that all Treasurers handling funds for Conference causes be bonded in approved companies. It appears that many of our Treasurers are not so bonded.

We recommend that the Conference hereby instruct each Board, Commission or Committee handling funds have its Treasurer properly

bonded, reporting that fact to this Commission, and have each Treasurer's records audited within the next forty days.

13. It has been brought to the attention of your Commission that the Commission on Group Insurance is carrying some \$800 in arrearages on the account of preachers who have failed to pay their part of the cost of their own insurance. This Commission has agreed to help the Commission on Group Insurance to carry out the instructions of the Conference that these men now in arrears be required to pay up or have their policies cancelled.

STANDING RULES**Organization and Procedure**

The Conference shall convene at the hour appointed by the Bishop the first day, and at the hour decided upon by the Conference on the other days. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall conclude the opening devotions.

In parliamentary practice the rules of the General Conference shall be followed as far as practicable in the proceedings of the Annual Conference.

All reports of boards and committees and all resolutions shall be in triplicate.

All notices shall be handed to the secretary and shall be read by him at the proper time.

The Conference Statistician shall procure and distribute to the pastors suitable blanks for making reports to the Conference Treasurer and the Statistical Secretary. Reports of the pastors shall be handed to the Conference Statistician not later than the morning session of the first day of the Conference.

The Conference Committee on Program shall provide a place on the Program of the Annual Conference for the meeting of the Historical Society. A morning hour is preferable, or the evening preceding the first session of the Conference.

The District Superintendents shall furnish the Statistical Secretary a copy of the askings and acceptances of the various charges of the districts when so requested by the Statistical Secretary.

There shall be held annually a District Conference in each district and four Quarterly Conferences in each pastoral charge. In addition to the provisions made by the Discipline, there shall be two delegates to the District Conference from each pastoral charge elected by the Quarterly Conference. The president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in each local church shall be a member of the District Conference. Delegates to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Quarterly Conferences of their respective charges.

Salaries of the District Superintendents shall be fixed and distributed to the pastoral charges of the districts by the District Stewards. On this basis the Quarterly Conference shall pay the salaries of District Superintendents.

Boards and Committees

The District Superintendents shall constitute a committee on nominations. All quadrennial boards and committees shall be elected or appointed at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference. Committees ordered by the conference shall be appointed by the chair unless otherwise specified.

At the session of the Annual Conference next preceding the General Conference a committee of seven shall be appointed to whom shall be referred all memorials, resolutions, and suggestions, properly coming before the General Conference, or the Jurisdictional Conference.

This committee shall recommend to the Annual Conference the disposition to be made of all memorials, resolutions, and suggestions referred to it. This shall be a Committee on Memorials.

At the session of the Annual Conference next preceding the General Conference a committee composed of two delegates to the succeeding General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference, and one other clerical member shall be appointed by the Bishop. This committee shall be a Committee on Standing Resolutions, and is instructed to study existing standing resolutions, and make any revisions required by the action of the said General Conference. All resolutions or motions affecting our Standing Rules shall be referred to this committee for their study and recommendation. This Committee shall report to the Annual Conference succeeding the General Conference.

The following Annual Conference Committees shall serve for one year:

Public Worship, District Conference Journals, Sabbath Observance, and Accepted Supply Pastors.

The Committee on Conference Entertainment shall consist of the District Superintendents.

The Committee on Accepted Supply Pastors shall have six members selected from the Committee on Ministerial Training and the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Conference Board of Ministerial Training shall have six members.

The Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications shall have twelve members.

The Annual Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension shall consist of one layman from each district and an equal number of ministers, and five at large, and two young men and two young women nominated by the Annual Conference Youth Organization.

The Annual Conference Board of Education shall consist of one layman from each district and an equal number of ministers, and four youth members as provided for in the Discipline.

The Annual Conference Board of Temperance shall consist of six ministers and laymen as follows: Two men, two women, and two young people under twenty-five years of age.

There shall be an Annual Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes composed of three ministers and four laymen, two of whom shall be women.

There shall be an Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism consisting of twelve members, one layman from each district and an equal number of ministers.

The Annual Conference Board of Conference Claimants shall have twelve members, viz., six ministers and six laymen.

Boards of Trust and Management

No one shall serve on two boards of trust or management at the same time.

In the Conference Board of Education there shall be a section designated as The Committee on Nominations for Schools and Colleges.

No member of a board of trustees or of a college faculty shall serve on this committee.

Memoirs

District Superintendents are requested to appoint suitable persons to prepare memoirs of ministers and ministers' wives who have died during the year. These persons are to be appointed in the interim of the Annual Conferences, and with the chairman shall constitute a Committee on Memoirs. The Committee on Memoirs is requested to limit the memoirs of ministers to five hundred words, and memorials of deceased wives of ministers to one hundred words each. A Memorial Service shall be provided for by the Program Committee of the Annual Conference. This service shall be presided over by the Bishop, or by an elder appointed by him. All memoirs and memorials read at this service shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference unless otherwise ordered.

The Southern Christian Advocate

The four members of the Board of Managers of the Southern Christian Advocate to be elected by this Conference, shall be elected quadrennially upon the nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations. One new clerical and one new lay member of this Board of Managers shall be elected quadrennially. The management of the Southern Christian Advocate is requested to send to each pastor every six months the mailing list of the subscribers of his charge.

Orphanage Days

The Conference requests that each church school set apart one Sunday in each month as Orphanage Sunday and that a collection be taken on that Sunday for Epworth Orphanage. The Conference also requests that two days of special emphasis be observed for the support of the Orphanage, Mother's Day and Annual Orphanage Day.

Conference Program Committee

The Bishop is requested to appoint a Committee on Program for the Annual Conference in advance of the session of the conference, and the committee is requested to print the program in The Southern Christian Advocate at least thirty days before the meeting of the conference.

Each pastor is urged to consult with the official family of his church in the formation of the program for the conference year. In this way the program can be made a means to an end; namely, meeting the deep needs of the people of the congregation and the people of the community for whom the church is responsible.

MEMOIRS

REV. NORMAN AUTIN PAGE

The Rev. Norman Autin Page was born in Mercer county, Penn., August 20, 1879. He was the son of John McEwen and Sarah Orwig Page. He received his education in the public schools of Amelia county, Virginia; Hogue Memorial Academy, Blackstone, Va., and Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va.

Brother Page was reared in a Christian home, by devoted, pious, Godfearing parents and when he was fourteen years of age he gave his heart and life to God and united with St. John's Church, Amelia county, Va. Immediately thereafter he became convinced of a very definite "call to preach." Being unwilling to disobey the heavenly vision, he applied for license to preach, and having been licensed, he was admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference in 1897. He was ordained deacon in 1902 and Elder in 1907.

He received the following appointments in the Virginia Conference: West Hanover Ct., 1899; Student at Randolph Macon College, 1900-1901; Richmond Ct., 1901-1903; North Bedford Ct., 1904-1905; Middle Bedford Ct., 1906; West Campbell Ct., 1907-1910; Gilmartin and Brighton, 1911; Crittenden, 1912-1914; Churchland and West Norfolk, 1915-1918; Stuart, 1919-20; Asbury, Richmond, 1921-1922; Assistant Superintendent of the Virginia Conference Orphanage, 1923-1924; Supernumerary, 1925.

In the autumn of 1925 he transferred to the Upper South Carolina Conference where he served the following appointments: Clover, 1926-1929; El Bethel, Spartanburg, S. C., 1930-1931; Williamston, 1932-1934; Pacolet Ct., 1935-1936; Grace, Pickens, 1937-1938. It was while serving at Grace, Pickens that his health failed him and he was forced to retire from active duty, taking the superannuate relationship at the conference session of 1938.

On October 17, 1904, he was happily married to Miss Mary Virginia Walker. One child, John Walker Page, was born of this union. Mrs. Page was a real helpmeet to him during all the years which followed and graced the parsonage homes which they occupied.

Norman A. Page was one of the most devout men in our ministry and he was also one of the most studious. Wherever he served he was loved, not alone by the most cultured among his congregations but by the poor and the underprivileged as well. In the home and in the church he demonstrated Christianity. The discouraged, the suffering and the broken-hearted sought him for his wise counsel and were comforted and sustained by his prayers. Sinners were led to Christ by his preaching and by his daily living. He was a wise and a trusted pastor. His brethren in the ministry admired him as a sincere, loyal and devoted fellow worker and friend. Ten churches and parsonages were erected or remodeled under his leadership and he was skillful in composing differences which arose in churches which he served. Here is one who has not lived in vain.

His last days were spent in the home of his brother in Spartan-

burg, S. C. There on November 30, 1941 he fell on sleep, peacefully. His devoted wife and son survive him. On December 2, 1941 he was buried in Oakland cemetery. The following ministers officiated at the funeral, viz, the Rev. F. C. Beach of the Upper South Carolina Conference and the Rev. Jas. B. Douglas of the Virginia Conference.

Brother Page was possessed of the gentleness which is found in truly courageous hearts. He was unwavering in his loyalty to home, family, friends, his nation, his church and his God. Always, he was keenly interested in those things which make for a better world. He was ready to invest time, effort and money to bring such things to pass. When his strength had failed and he was no longer able to serve, he never lost interest in the ongoing of the Kingdom affairs. He bore his bodily ailments with patience and courage, and, despite his affliction, he welcomed with joy the visits of friends. Those who came went away with renewed courage and faith.

He faced the end of his earthly journey with the same quiet faith in Christ, and with the same unflickering courage, with which he had always faced life's problems and responsibilities. He believed with the unknown writer:

"Life is a duty—dare it;
Life is a burden—bear it;
Life is a thorn crown—wear it;
Only thus comes victory.
'Though it break thy heart in twain,
'Though the burden bear thee down,
Close thy lips and stand the pain,
First the cross and then the crown."

Today he wears the crown of victory among those who have overcome.

JESSE FRANCIS FORD

Rev. J. F. Ford, pastor of Glendale-Beaumont charge, died at his post of duty! He was in the midst of evangelistic services in the Beaumont church when he was taken ill. He preached twice on Sunday, October 11, and was stricken Monday afternoon and died the next afternoon in the Spartanburg General Hospital.

The funeral services were conducted Thursday afternoon in the chapel of the J. F. Floyd mortuary by Rev. R. L. Holroyd, pastor of Central Church, Spartanburg, Chaplain T. O. Hall of Camp Croft, and the writer. The interment was in the Greenlawn Memorial Gardens of Spartanburg.

Jesse Francis Ford was born in Crawford county, Georgia, April 29, 1882. He was the son of Francis Marion and Mary E. Ford. Brother Ford was educated in the public schools of Georgia and the Atlanta Theological Seminary. He was converted and joined the Congregational Church in 1902, and licensed to preach in 1906. His ordination was recognized by the South Georgia Conference of the

Methodist Church in 1908; and after serving several charges in the South Georgia Conference, was transferred to the Upper South Carolina Conference in 1923 and has served the following charges in our conference: Campobello 1924-1927; Lockhart 1928-1929; Inman Mills, 1930-31; Limestone Street, Gaffney, 1932-1933; Pomaria 1934; Lonsdale-Newry 1935-1938; Clifton 1939-1940; Glendale 1941; Glendale-Beaumont 1942.

On August 6, 1905, he was happily married to Miss Ada Malissa Durden, who has been a devoted companion and cheerfully shared with her husband the responsibilities of the pastorate. They have one son, Henry Francis Ford. Brother Ford is survived by his wife, Mrs. J. F. Ford; one son, Henry F. Ford of Glendale; his mother, Mrs. Mary E. Ford of Atlanta, Ga.; two sisters, Mrs. Will Ruffing of Yeatsville, Ga., and Mrs. Ann Mathews of Atlanta; and three brothers, Joe A. Ford of Thomaston, Ga., Frank Ford of Atlanta, and C. D. Ford of Miami, Fla.

Brother Ford was a church builder, a strong preacher, a diligent pastor, an enthusiastic administrator of the program of the church, a zealous evangelist, a devoted husband, a loving father, and a consecrated man of God.

It has been said that you can trace the pilgrimage of Abraham by the altars he built. We may trace the itinerancy of Brother Ford by his building enterprises. He built the parsonage at Springfield, repaired the parsonage at Lawton, finished the church and parsonage at Mauk, finished the church at Kite, built a new church and repaired another on Dublin charge in the South Georgia Conference. The parsonage at Landrum, the social hall and class rooms in Limestone Street, Gaffney, the social hall and class rooms in both Converse and Central on the Clifton charge, the improvements on the Beaumont church and the class rooms and the rearranged church auditorium at Glendale are monuments to his memory in our conference.

Certain sermons linger in our minds and hearts. I shall never forget a sermon preached by Brother Ford in a revival meeting in the Cowpens church in 1939. His text was Romans 1:16—"For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation." He was a conservative-progressive preacher. He believed in the great convictions of Jesus Christ, and he preached them with a freshness that was both inspiring and challenging.

He was a diligent pastor and an earnest evangelist. In one of his charges he invited me to go with him to an open air service. He was making an effort to reach the unreached people of the community. During the six years that I have been on the district I have never seen the church and community stirred as it was during that meeting. Brother Ford literally gave himself and all he had to that campaign for souls, and God crowned his ministry with great success.

J. F. Ford believed in the Methodist church and was an enthusiastic administrator of the program of the church. No part of the work of the kingdom escaped his deep interest. People grew in the grace of church loyalty under his consecrated ministry.

Brother Ford was a home-lover. He was a devoted husband and a kind father. His parsonage home was a place of prayer, study and Christian living.

Above all he was a consecrated man of God. He knew the Lord as his personal Savior and Master, and found great joy in serving people in the spirit of Christ. We cannot think of him as dead. Indeed, he is not dead—he has slipped away to be with God in the city not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens. The words of Jesus are inspiring: "I am the resurrection and the life: he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: And whosoever liveth and believeth in me, shall never die." His body sleeps in beautiful Greenlawn Memorial Gardens, but Brother Ford has received his heavenly appointment and is busy about the Father's work in heaven. He has preceded us to that better land, and we shall greet him again in the morning of that eternal day.

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

"With saints enthroned on high,
Thou dost thy Lord proclaim.
And still to God salvation cry,
Salvation to the Lamb."

**HISTORICAL ADDRESS:
BEGINNINGS OF THE METHODIST CONFERENCE IN SOUTH
CAROLINA**

Dr. Clarence Clifford Norton

Immediately after his election to the office of General Superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Church at the Christmas Conference in 1784, Bishop Asbury made his first journey into the South. He had determined to establish the newly formed church in the fields that had already known something of the Methodist movement from the visits of Wesley and Whitefield. The Bishop entered South Carolina at Cheraw on Thursday, February 17, 1785. He was accompanied on this first visit to the State by Jesse Lee, Woolman Hickson and Henry Willis.

Work was opened at Georgetown and Charleston. In Charleston an old Baptist meeting-house which had fallen into disuse was obtained as a preaching place. In this building Asbury and his fellow-preachers took turns preaching. Here they continued from February 24 until March 10th, preaching morning and evening. Asbury comments that he found a great dearth of religion in Charleston and that the people showed few signs of being moved by his preaching.

After this preliminary opening of Methodism in South Carolina, Asbury moved on in what was destined to be a life-time itineracy over the Nation. Jesse Lee returned to his appointment at Salisbury, North Carolina. This left the task of establishing Methodism in South Carolina to Henry Willis, Woolman Hickson, John Tunnell, and Beverly Allen. Tunnell was in the West Indies when appointed to Charleston, but came immediately to his new appointment. Beverly Allen was appointed to Georgia by the Christmas Conference, but arriving in Charleston late in June he decided to remain in South Carolina. He joined with Mr. Hickson in forming the Pee Dee Circuit, which extended from Georgetown in South Carolina to within ten miles of Salisbury, North Carolina. Mr. Tunnell joined with Mr. Willis in forming the Santee Circuit, which extended from the Santee River to within ten miles of Charlotte, North Carolina. A third circuit was formed which began at Dutch Fork, above Columbia, and embraced upper South Carolina. In the work of the third circuit the regular preachers were assisted by James Foster, who had been a Methodist preacher in Virginia, but had retired in South Carolina after a failure in health. In forming these circuits the first preachers in South Carolina traveled about one hundred miles a week, preaching daily whenever they could gather a few people together. Thus they did not remain in the population centers, but from the beginning were itinerants, covering the whole State.

Bishop Asbury in his work as General Superintendent held conferences with his preachers annually. The time and place of these conferences were determined by the Bishop. As the work and membership of the Church grew, the number of conferences also grew,

for no legal boundaries of conferences were fixed before the General Conference of 1796. At first, Bishop Asbury met the preachers of a given area in a conference and passed on to another area and so on until he had covered American Methodism. At the conclusion of this annual tour, the proceedings of the various conferences were compiled into one general minutes, which covered the entire work.

The first conference with the preachers of the South Carolina area convened in Charleston on March 22, 1787. Bishop Coke joined Bishop Asbury at this conference, which was probably held in the newly-finished Cumberland Street church. No minutes were kept of this first conference—in fact, no minutes were kept of any of the earlier conferences. We may conclude from Asbury's journal that the meeting was harmonious, and the preachers exchanged sentiments freely. Bishop Coke spoke to the conference on the duties and qualifications of a deacon. We may venture the conjecture that Bishop Asbury stressed the sacrificial glory of the ministry when he preached to the conference on the text, "I had rather be a door-keeper in the house of my God than to dwell in the tents of wickedness." The routine business of this first conference included the reports of the preachers and the appointments.

In the early conferences the business was gradually organized according to a pattern of procedure. Stith Mead gave the following synopsis of the procedure of the Conference of 1792:

"First Day.—Four elders and four deacons, who composed the conference, were present, and four other preachers who had business with it—in all twelve. One was received into full connection, and, together with a local preacher, was elected to deacon's orders; one located; two were admitted on trial; two of the preachers were called on to relate to the Conference their religious experience, and then the body adjourned until next day.

"Second Day.—Three of the preachers were examined by the Bishop before the Conference, first of their debts, second of their faith in Christ, third of their pursuit after holiness. Bishop Asbury preached from Deuteronomy v. 27: 'Go thou near, and hear all that the Lord our God shall say; and speak thou to us all that the Lord our God shall speak unto thee; and we will hear it and do it.' Hope Hull preached from I Corinthians 1, 23, 'But we preach Christ crucified.' In the afternoon Stith Mead was called on to relate his experience to the Conference. In the evening the appointments were read out.

"Third Day.—All were examined by the Bishop as to their confession of faith and orthodoxy of doctrine; two were found to be tending to Unitarianism. The Bishop requested all the members of the Conference to bring forward as many texts of Scripture as they could recollect to prove the personality of the Trinity, and especially that of the Holy Ghost. The two preachers recanted their errors, and were continued in fellowship. Bishop Asbury preached from Titus ii, 1, 'But speak thou the things that become sound doctrine,' and was followed by Hope Hull from I John iv, 17, 'Herein is our love made per-

fect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment; because as he is so are we in the world.' Deep feeling pervaded the audience; the sacrament was administered; the services were continued until near sundown; many sinners were awakened, and ten souls were converted.

"Fourth Day.—Three were ordained elders, and two deacons, after which Conference adjourned about ten o'clock."

It is important that we have this brief description of the procedure of the conference of 1792, for this is the historic date that we celebrate as the sesqui-centennial of Annual Conferences in American Methodism. This date also commemorates the first General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of America. It was at the General Conference of 1792 that the status of the Annual Conference was made legal in ecclesiastical jurisprudence. In the Discipline of that year it was stated that there should be annual conferences which should include not fewer than three nor more than twelve circuits. The order of business was stated in eighteen questions. The discipline referred to these conferences as District Conferences, but the term Yearly Conferences was adopted in 1796, and in 1816 the name Annual Conference was established.

The examination of the preacher in the early Annual Conferences of South Carolina was a matter of great importance. Asbury examined each man individually and many probing questions on the preacher's moral and spiritual life were asked. Education was not so important a qualification as piety, zeal and ability to win souls. In these matters Bishop Asbury applied the same rigid test to his preachers that he adhered to in his own life. At the conference of 1795, he complained to James Jenkins, an elder, that he was sorry to note that Brother Jenkins has only covered his district (which included the entire state) three times. The Bishop expressed regret that the elder did not get around quarterly. Jenkins replied that if he had been quartered, and each part made to travel, he might have done it.

The reports of the early conferences indicate slow progress. Beginning with a membership of 3,075 whites and 141 colored members in 1787, the first sixteen years showed a net increase of 3,588 white members and 1,639 colored. However, between 1802 and 1808, the membership more than trebled, due to a great revival period with a leadership of religious fervor that has seldom been equaled in our history.

The financial reports of pioneer conferences were meager. The preacher's salary was fixed at \$64.00 per year. In 1800 it was increased to \$80.00, and in 1816 to \$100.00. The preachers prided themselves on preaching, not for money, but for the glory of God. They rarely mentioned money to their people. "To get men to cease from drunkenness, horse-racing, gambling, and Sabbath-breaking, to secure their conversion—this was the objective at which they aimed. They said little, and that little always timidly, about the religious use of money, and thus our forefathers in the ministry prepared the way for their own banishment from the work they loved so well."

When a minister married in the early days it was usually necessary

for him to locate. Thus young men were discouraged from marrying. Bishop Capers relates in his Autobiography the incident of a gifted and devout young man who was refused ordination and admission into full connection at the conference of 1811, because he married. One minister in opposing the young man offered the following argument:

"A young man comes to us and says he is called to preach. We answer, 'I don't know.' He comes a second time, perhaps a third time, even a fourth time, saying, 'A dispensation of the gospel is committed unto me, and woe be to me if I preach not the gospel.' Then we say to him, 'Go and try.' He goes and tries and can hardly do it. We bear with him a little while, and he does better. And just as we begin to hope he may make a preacher, lo, he comes again to us, and says, 'I must marry.' We say to him, 'If you marry, you will soon locate: go and preach.' 'No, I must marry, I must marry.' We say to him, 'A dispensation of the gospel is committed to you, and woe be unto you if you preach not the gospel.' 'But, no,' he says, 'I must marry.' And he marries. It is enough to make an angel weep!"

The missionary interests of the early conferences of South Carolina were largely confined to the Indians and the Negroes. In a sense, all the early preachers were missionaries, for they all were appointed to wilderness territory to open up new work. From time to time preachers were appointed to preach to the Indian tribes, and occasionally Bishop Asbury preached to them. On one occasion, his audience met his attempts to minister to their spiritual needs with howls of laughter. The good Bishop took some comfort in one Indian's explanation that that while he himself knew that Asbury was talking to the Great Spirit the other Indians were unaware to whom he addressed his remarks.

Preaching to the Negroes was attended by considerably more success than missionary efforts among the Indians. Indeed, before Bishop Capers organized his "Mission to the Slaves" the number of Negro members of the Methodist Church increased until by 1839 the Negro membership in South Carolina outnumbered the white. This condition continued until 1864.

There were no more heroic missionaries than the preachers who left the seaboard, going into the West to open up new circuits. Tobias Gibson, who was admitted into the South Carolina Conference in 1792, was representative of these men. In 1799 he volunteered to go as a missionary to the Natchez settlement on the Mississippi. This involved a long and perilous journey. He traveled six hundred miles to the Cumberland River, where he obtained a canoe and paddled himself down the Cumberland into the Ohio and thence to the Mississippi. A journey of about seven hundred miles down the Mississippi brought him to Natchez. In the new field he covered a large area of work, journeying a number of times as far as Cumberland Settlement, six hundred miles from Natchez. Such men as Tobias Gibson did not live long. Within five years after coming to the Natchez country he died in his labors, before he had reached his thirty-third birthday.

Appointments during Bishop Asbury's life were made solely by the Bishop. Usually the preachers took their appointments without ques-

tioning this authority. There were times when Bishop Asbury was vexed, however, because of a disposition on the part of some in South Carolina to help him with the appointments. On January 29, 1804, he notes in his Journal: ". . . My mind has been deeply tried by my friends who wish me to derange appointments made in two circuits, that one station might be supplied. I do not sport with preachers or people; I judge for the Lord and His Church. I stand in the order of God as well as the appointments of men."

In 1791 when Bishop Coke brought Mr. Hammett from the West Indies to the Charleston conference, the newcomer demanded Charleston as his appointment. When Bishop Asbury refused to make this appointment, Hammett aroused a goodly number of Methodists in his interest. Bishop Asbury comments in his Journal: "I am somewhat distressed at the uneasiness of our people, who claim a right to choose their own preacher, a thing quite new among Methodists. None but Mr. Hammett will do for them. We shall see how it will end." The matter ended in a schism in the Charleston church, with Hammett building a new church and attempting to organize a new denomination. He carried portions of the congregations in Charleston and Georgetown into what he called the Primitive Church.

Although Bishop Asbury was supported by most of the preachers in South Carolina in his right to fix appointments, at the death of the Bishop, the Conference was ready for a change. Thus Bishop McKendree felt it a wise course to bring the Presiding Elders into secret meetings for consultation in making appointments. This was the beginning of the cabinet system. It should be understood, however, that the preachers accepted their appointments in the spirit of a militant church. In 1807, the Conference passed a resolution stating, "If any preacher should desert his station through fear in time of sickness or danger, the Conference should never employ that man again."

The personnel of the early Methodist Conferences in South Carolina challenges our deepest interest. The first Methodist preachers were "a peculiar people" in more than one sense. Dr. Lovick Pierce says they were shunned at first and generally denounced by world and Church alike. An early South Carolinian is quoted as saying, "If it were raining rattlesnakes and a Methodist preacher should come to my door, he should not enter the house." A few eccentrics like Lorenzo Dow did not help the reputation of Methodist preachers among those who considered them peculiar. When Dow made one of his journeys through South Carolina, a Baptist preacher who heard him preach describes this ecclesiastical oddity as follows:

"He wore an old half-red overcoat, with an Indian belt around his waist. He did not wear a hat, but had his head tied up with a handkerchief. Coming into the house he sat down by the fireplace for a few minutes and then all of a sudden jumped up and cried out: 'What will this babbler say? Those who have turned the world upside down are come hither also.' This was his text, and his talk was very much every way, for it appeared to me to run from Britain to Japan, and from the torrid to the frigid zone."

While Lorenzo Dow was no model for Methodist preachers of his day, they did not shun the reputation of being a peculiar people. They believed Christians should be separated from the world. The Discipline was their guide, and "no army officer ever regarded more strictly the army regulations than a faithful preacher his discipline."

Asbury introduced among the early American preachers the dress and habits of English Wesleyans. The preacher wore a strait-breasted coat and French pantaloons, which had recently taken the place of knee breeches. The hair was cut short, and no preacher of the early days wore a beard. Simplicity of dress was insisted on for both preacher and laity. The records of one quarterly conference show a complaint against a young probationer for wearing new-fangled suspenders, and forty years afterwards the same conference recorded a complaint against another for not wearing them.

It was a custom among Methodist preachers to rise in the morning at four o'clock, winter and summer. The first two hours were spent in prayer and reading the Scripture. After breakfast and prayers with the family the preacher rode to his appointments. He preached once or twice each day except Monday and held class-meetings wherever he went. Preaching appointments were scheduled ahead, and it was considered a matter of great importance to meet these appointments at the designated time. To do this, the circuit-rider often faced grave dangers on long journeys in a sometimes unfriendly wilderness. Excessive exposure in inclement weather, swollen streams, and hostile savages constituted only a portion of the difficulties challenging the pioneer preacher. His own people often would not receive him. Jesse Richardson, who traveled in the Carolinas in the latter part of the Eighteenth Century, tells how he rode one day through the snow until sunset, when he arrived at a house where he asked for shelter. The man of the house answered gruffly, "No, you cannot stay here, you are one of those lazy Methodist preachers, going about everywhere through the country, who ought to be engaged in honest work." Richardson offered to pay for a night's lodging, but was refused. The door was slammed in his face. The snow was falling as night came on. The circuit preacher sat on the doorsteps and began in a loud voice to sing the songs of Zion. The proprietor finally told him if he was cold he could make a fire in the yard. Richardson built such a fire that the frontiersman was afraid all his fuel would be consumed; so he ordered the preacher to put out the fire and come in the house. There he was permitted to lie on the cold floor without food or bedding until morning, when he continued his journey.

The young preacher who entered timidly upon his task was soon hardened to his responsibilities. An older preacher sometimes felt impelled to test his zeal. Bishop Capers tells how he was received on his first circuit by James Jenkins, who was then a local preacher. Capers reports the following conversation with Jenkins as his introduction to the work of a circuit preacher:

"Well, they have sent **you** to us for our preacher?"

"Yes, sir."

"What, you? and the egg-shell not dropped off of you yet! Lord, have mercy upon us! And who have they sent in charge?"

"No one, sir, but myself."

"What! You by yourself? You in charge of the circuit? Why, what is to become of the circuit? The Bishop had just as well have sent nobody. What can you do in charge of a circuit?"

Young Capers replied that he felt his inefficiency, but would be glad to work under Brother Jenkins' direction. At this the Local preacher stormed: "Did you ever; What, I, a local preacher take charge of the circuit? And is that what you have come here for? Why, man, you know nothing about your business. How can I take charge of the circuit? No, no; but I can see that you do it, such a charge as it will be; and if I don't, nobody else will, for these days the Discipline goes for nothing." At this the old preacher groaned deeply.

Many of the pioneer preachers of South Carolina were men of great power in the pulpit. In some instances it was not safe to judge their preaching ability by their physical appearance. The preaching of George Dougherty at the General Conference of 1804 affords an apt illustration of this point. It was announced that he would preach in one of the principal churches of Baltimore, and the members of the General Conference were there, not knowing who George Dougherty of South Carolina was. An old preacher who was in the congregation describes his experience as follows:

"At length I saw a tall, gaunt, one-eyed man, in rather shabby dress, enter and walk up toward the pulpit, and to my astonishment the awkward stranger entered it and went through all the motions preparatory to preaching. Mortification succeeded astonishment. Is it possible that this fine congregation is to be bored and mortified by this awkward, blundering backwoodsman? At length the preacher arose. The whole congregation seemed disappointed The preacher proceeded to read his hymn, and there was something hopeful in that part of the performance. He prayed, and I felt there was more in the preacher than I had supposed. He proceeded to his text and the sermon, and a few minutes sufficed to raise every head and fix every eye. Meanwhile, the preacher advanced in his discourse, rising higher and higher, till he carried the congregation, as it were, by storm."

Dougherty was also a good example of the pioneer preacher who was a serious student and attained some of the real earmarks of a scholar. In addition to knowing his Greek Testament, he studied in the fields of philosophy and science and often amazed scholars with his breadth of knowledge.

Other members of the first South Carolina conference who might be less scholarly were often great preachers none the less. James Russell, for example, could scarcely read when he was admitted into the Conference. Armed with a spelling-book and the Bible he went into the backwoods of South Carolina, and through diligence, perseverance, and deep consecration became one of the most effective of the frontier preachers. An early Church historian says of him:

"He might have offended fastidious ears, and would have had no attraction for those whose idea of preaching is that it should be 'faultless, icy cold, splendidly null,' but not so to those who heard him then. Camp-meetings were in their prime. Thousands flocked to them and James Russell was in his glory before a camp-meeting audience. With God's blue sky for his frescoed ceiling, with God's green earth for his carpeted floor, with rolling songs from a thousand happy lips for his grand organ, he had everything to inspire him. The very presence of evil only aroused him to grander deeds. In this conflict he was no trained swordsman with a rapier, but a giant with a mace, and hundreds fell beneath his blows."

At the beginning of the Nineteenth Century a great revival swept over South Carolina. At this time the Methodist preachers worked with an abandon that brought a great harvest of souls into the Church. Men like James Jenkins, George Dougherty, James Russell, Isaac Smith, Enoch George, John Mason, and a host of others, were responsible for giving Methodism in South Carolina a solid and durable foundation. They bequeathed to the conferences of our times a heritage both inspiring and challenging.

Today we face conditions very different in many respects from those in pioneer South Carolina. And yet the same task that inspired our forebears to sacrificial zeal, should stir us in this hour. There is sin in our land, and God needs prophets to cry out against it. There are lost souls who are ignorant of the grace of God, and we are called to be evangelists of the new birth. There is need of prayer, righteous living, and Christian brotherhood, and our brethren of the long ago call to us across a century and a half, bidding us go forward and conquer in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.
