JOURNAL, 1900.

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in its ninety-fifth (since reorganization the thirty-sixth) annual session at St. James Methodist Episcopal Church, at Darlington, S. C., Wednesday, December 12, 1900, at 9 o'clock A. M., the Rev. Bishop J. N. Fitzgerald, D. D., LL. D., in the chair.

The Opening Exercises were conducted by the Bishop. He read the 4th Psalm and the 4th chapter of the 2d Epistle of St. Paul to Timothy. The Bishop led the Conference in an appropriate and touching prayer. Hymn 720 of the Church Hymnal "Children of the Heavenly King" was lustily sung by the Conference and the visitors.

The Sacrament of our Lord's Supper was celebrated; the Bishop led this beautiful service and was assisted by the Presiding Elders and Dr. Homer Eaton, of the Methodist Book Concern of New York. The services were impressive and spiritually helpful.

By request of the Bishop the Secretary of the Conference called the roll, and 110 members responded to the roll call. On motion of E. B. Burroughs, J. B. Middleton was re-elected Secretary by acclamation. By permission, he nominated the following assistants: J. W. Moultrie, W. R. A. Palmer, W. S. Thompson. The nominations were concurred in.

For Statistical Secretary, J. S. Thomas was nominated by M. M. Mouzon and was unanimously elected to the office. He nominated as his assistants: W. G. Valentine, T. J. Clarke, J. C. Martin, J. S. Whitaker. Concurred in.

For Treasurer, W. R. Jervay was nominated by C. R. Brown and was unanimously chosen by acclamation. His assistants are: J. W. Dore, G. W. Cooper, G. J. Davis, F. L. Baxter.

On motion of J. W. Moultrie the Bishop was requested to read the appointments to-night if practicable to do so. The benediction was pronounced by the Bishop after the singing of the doxology.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY—SECOND SESSION.

The session began at 3.30 o'clock, Bishop Fitzgerald presiding. Prayer was offered by J. A. Brown. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

On motion the Epworth League adjourned its session. The Bishop resumed the chair.

W. R. A. Palmer, on behalf of the Conference, presented to the Secretary, J. B. Middleton, a beautiful gold-headed ebony cane, highly polished, ferule of the finest steel and appropriately engraved, for past services and as an expression of love. Dr. Palmer excelled himself in this duty assigned him, and expressed the greatest pleasure in "caning a man" for the benefit of the Conference. The Secretary responded, expressing sincere gratitude and the hope of future service until death ensues. Bishop Fitzgerald also added his tribute of "well done" to the Conference and to the Secretary.

Dunton, president of Clafin University, was introduced and addressed the Conference in a few timely remarks, after which he submitted his annual report of Clafin University and the noble work that he is doing. The report was full of information and was inspiring to all present. Dr. M. C. B. Mason, Secretary of the F. A. & S. E. Society, was introduced and delivered a thrilling address, touching the work of the Society. A collection amounting to \$25 was taken as a twentieth century thank offering.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION.

We, your Committee to whom were referred the claims of the Church Extension Society, beg to report that it is with much pleasure we review the progress of the Church Extension Society, and recognize in it a force indispensable to our success. Its achievements have been marvelous in the history of our Church, and it meritoriously takes its place in the column of the auxiliaries of our Church. It is perhaps less than thirty-five years since it was launched upon the sea of experiment, and so thoroughly satisfactory to the Church are the results that to-day it is regarded as an indispensable part of its machinery upon which a great deal depends. Its own splendid record has many times exceeded the most sanguine expectation of its promoters.

Its history is not in books, but in brick and mortar, wood and granite in the progress of civilization stands for anything, then the Church Extension Society, in the development of our own Methodism, has its memorial in a thousand churches, and is building more than two a

day. Our newly acquired territory, with its inviting possibilities, gives new opportunities for church aggressiveness that must carry with it increase and responsibilities. The Church is on the rising wave of a high tide, and must keep abreast of the increasing population if it would anchor in the haven of glorious possibilities.

The South Carolina Conference has been a liberal recipient of the favor of the Society, but we have not been loyal in appreciation nor given it the consideration it demands. We too often present its claim without comment, and pass it as a merely nominal claim with perhaps no greater object when considered at all, than to prevent blank reports in our statistical tables. With the same amount of energy thrown into this claim as into others, we would bring to it corresponding results that would be glorious in their effect. The general Committee of the Church Extension Society has asked the Church for \$335,000 for the ensuing year to meet the present demands, which are very conservative, considering the urgent appeals constantly made upon the Parent Board. Our own Conference will be asked to raise \$635 and is authorized upon this contribution to draw \$300.

The spirit of aggressiveness, denominational pride and the urgent appeal for help from the Church should be a sufficient incentive to duty. Your Committee notes with much regret the fact that a large amount of loans granted the South Carolina Conference are still due the Society, which greatly handicaps the operation of the Society in the interest of other needy claims, and continues to increase its embarrassment, for not only is the Society hampered in its work but also in the use of its means.

Some claims are of so long standing that the Society finds that it will be necessary to enter legal proceedings in some cases to bring about a settlement. when, perhaps, a few efforts well organized and timely put would avert such a course and save the Church from shame and embarrassment.

Your Committee would urge that Pastors and Presiding Elders bring the matter of Church indebtedness with increased attention to the congregation as a debt of importance that should be settled in a business way and not allowed to stand open indefinitely. The amount asked this year is a little less than 1½ cents per member. The following statistics will show our contributions to the Church Extension Society as compared to that of a few other societies of the Church:

We gave last year for Missions a little less than 5 cents per member; and for F. A. & S. E. about 4 cents per member, while for Church extension we gave only 3-10 of a cent per member or 30 cents for every one hundred members. We think it deserves a better consideration at our hand than this, and believe that the discrepancy is due only to a lack of interest and system. We therefore recommend that the pastor assess each member of his Church 2 cents, and that the best efforts consistent with discipline and pastors work be put forth in the year of 1901 in the interest of our full assessment, and that we renew our pledge of support in the interest of Church extension.

"More students in our schools, more money for our schools, more young people in our churches, more conversions in our schools and churches, more Christ every where," should be our motto for the twentieth century.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY AND THE CHURCH.

Your committee submits the following report:

If we would have powerful minds we must think; if we would have faithful hearts we must love; if we would have strong muscles we must labor; and these attributes include all that is of much value in this life.

The United States of America is a great country. Our national domain extends from the seat of the perpetual snows of the Lakes on the North to the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico on the South; from the stormy shores of the Atlantic on the East to the unruffled bosom of the Pacific on the West, and includes the largely unexplored territory of Alaska in the extreme northwest, Porto Rico and Hawaii in the tropics and tentatively the Philippine Islands in the Eastern Hemisphere. The territory of our country embraces within its scope the occupied space from the centre of the earth to its surface and thence to the visible heavens.

With a few changes the words of Reginald Heber are peculiarly appropriate:

"Beneath our feet and o'er our heads to us our God has given,
Beneath us lies the countless dead, above us is the heaven.
Death rides on every passing breeze and lurks in every flower;
Each section has its own disease; its *perils* every hour."

The resources of our country, with its cosmopolitan population, are vast, sublime, and practically unlimited. They are above us in the heavens, in electrical form, in magnetic force and in aerated power, with the feathered tribes thrown in. They are on the earth in animal and vegetable form as varied as the temperature of our climate, with man thrown in. They are under the earth in liquid and mineral shape with fishes added. The United States of America is not a mere aggregation of territory or organized States under a compact offensive and defensive, but it is a nation, the American nation. Heterogeneous in its population, it is true; unequal in its appendages, and Jacob-like a supplanter and halting in its application of law to the condition and need of its citizens; and yet a great nation. It may be fittingly termed the Protestant nation of the New World. A nation with all of the functions of a highly civilized and Christianized government, well developed and robust in form and character.

The principles upon which our government is founded are broad, deep, flexible and extensive. Our government is unique in its structure—an imperium en imperio—Republican in form and Democratic in her institutions and polity. Our country is destined to become a great empire, retaining for a time at least its Republican form and maintaining its Democratic institutions, and it will eventually rival China, our antipode in extent of territory and density of population. The territory over which our flag now floats is easily capable of sustaining a population of 500,000,000, and when by treaty or some other agency, British America on the North, Mexico and Central America on the South, and

all of the adjacent Islands and the Philippines are acquired and incorporated in our national domain, with a corresponding increase in its population, our country will present to the astonished world the greatest modern empire, with its territory largely contiguous and the densest population on the face of the Globe. The climate of our country is as varied as the zones in which it lies. The perpetual cold of Alaska is well balanced by the semi-tropical heat of Florida; and the cutting winds of the Atlantic are tempered by the gentle zephyrs of the Pacific and the warm waters of the Gulf stream. The contiguity of our country's territory—Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico and the Philippines excepted—with its accessibility, variety of soil and products; with its hospitable shores laved by oceans, and its rich and fruitful valleys drained by majestic rivers and inland seas, greatly enhances its possibilities of supplying every nation under heaven with its products—while for home consumption of man and beast there will be the greatest abundance of the necessaries, the comforts and the luxuries of life.

The graneries of Europe and Asia are to-day largely in the West. The manufacturing industries of the East supply in large measure the machinery and manufactured goods in Christendom, while the North is becoming the clearing house of the world, and the South, unrivalled in her staple product, is still engaged in the laudable enterprise of clothing the naked world.

The possibilities—not to say probabilities—are that in the next half century of our national life the products of brain and brawn of our country will be practically unlimited, provided, always, that we have at the seat of our National Government the proper administration with just sufficient centralization to check internal revolution in any section of our country from any source whatever. An administration that will exercise a healthy control over the heterogeneous population until they are properly assimilated and become thoroughly indoctrinated with the genius of American institutions and a loyalty that is the legitimate progeny of American liberty.

With her public school system perfected, so as to include the compulsory attendance upon its session of nine months annually of all her children and youths between the ages of 6 and 18 years, and with a code of equitable laws so administered as to destroy in their incipiency the spores, germs and bacteria of socialism, anarchism, nihilism and mob law in any and all forms, and establish in every section of our country law-and-order leagues for the maintenance and perpetuity of good government; under such conditions we say with freedom of religious faith and worship, with equal and impartial rights to all and special privileges to none, there is no apparent reason why our country should not, in a diversified and peaceful industry; in the wealth and intelligence, in the culture of her citizens, in the stability of her institutions, in the physical, moral and intellectual development of the laboring classes, in the happiness of all her people, rival if not surpass in magnificence, grandeur, glory and peace the kingdom of Israel under the resplendent reign of Solomon.

This is no utopian dream, but the possibilities of a people who fear God and work righteousness. "For righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."

That we have not, as a nation reached the high plane of excellence contemplated by the declaration of independence, the National Constitution, and especially the Book of God, is painfully apparent. That we are yet upon the lower slopes of complete autonomy is a deplorable fact. That our country, the asylum for the oppressed of all lands, is not a safe model, in the administration of her laws for other nations, even in semi-barbarism, is humiliating in the extreme to every patriot. But this fact, this condition, unpleasant though it be, must not be ignored,

connived at or condoned; it must be recognized, admitted, remedied. We report to you not as partisans but as patriots; not as negroes but as *men*. "Men whom the lust for office does not kill: men whom the spoils of office cannot buy, men who possess opinions and a will, men who love honor, men that will not lie." Men who in return for the freedom enjoyed and the protection afforded, owe our first allegiance to the nation.

We are citizens of the great American nation, for it is so constituted in the bond, and whatever of State enactments or administration, or both, we should ever keep in mind the bald fact that the whole is greater than a part.

During the war of 1895 between China and Japan the apparent thought of nearly every Chinaman was, "What can I get out of the war?" On the other hand the Japanese was inspired by the lofty and noble ambition, "What can I give to the war?" Under this impulse every Japanese who could do so honorably released himself from his obligations and returned home in defence of his country, while others divided their earnings monthly and contributed largely to the home government for its defence. The civilized world is well aware of the result of these two lines of thought—selfishness and parsimony on the one hand, and patriotism and loyalty on the other. Ex-President Harrison has recently declared that "A true allegiance has its root in love. And since kings have ceased to be the State and constitution have put brides upon rulers; loyalty has a better chance; institutions have no moods. Since constitutional government has been fully established in England 'the King can do no wrong,' the cabinet must answer to the country. There is a love in English hearts and respect in all hearts for the good and venerable woman who for so long has been the Queen of England, born of her personal virtues, but she is loved by Englishmen more for what she personifies, the government and the glory of England. She is never for a party, always for the State; party management is left to the ministry."

The measure of a true American is his loyalty to the flag of his country. The war is on in our country, a war against oppression, dishonesty and mob rule; and favorable to the supremacy of the law, and there is no neutral ground upon which a single citizen, whether foreign or to the manor born may find standing room. He that is not with us is against us, and he that is not an advocate of law and order in their primal and continuous effect upon the body politic is the enemy of his country and the destroyer of its government, peace and prosperity. Our American institutions are in peril by the "new woman movement." A movement so called, which is especially pernicious and mischievous, in that its tap root is in the home, where it encounters life at its very source and poisons it at its foundation head. It has entered the Sanctuary of the most high God and set up its standards in the holy place. Assisted by some well meaning but deluded men, it seeks under a popular delusion to set aside the traditions, customs and laws of the past centuries; is determined to abrogate the laws of church and State, and to review the mandates of St. Paul delivered under divine inspiration. And yet "the movement," so called, is based upon nothing definite. Some time ago a woman of England made the assertion that "marriage is a failure." This was not a new assertion when advanced by this woman; but it was one which had not been made for some time, and therefore it had a certain amount of freshness about it. It attracted the attention of scores of people, and enabled some of them by tongue and pen to earn something. This inflated bubble was pricked, then other subterfuges, such as the immorality of man, especially the negro, and the inequality of woman was exploited and exploded. Now the foremost thought with a large class of people is "the inequality of

the sex." And the new woman movement seems to be a movement to unsex woman and to dethrone and remove her from the lofty pedestal which she now occupies in the heart of every manly man. This movement, as such, is mischievous in its incipency, degrading in its tendency, and if successful will be deplorable in its results. The dethronement of the American woman from the high pedestal which she now occupies, as our queen and the rightful sovereign of our homes and rulers of our children, to compete with "the boys" in the quagmires of political partisanship, corruption and speculation, in State and church, is too horrid to contemplate by a patriotic American who seeks the perpetuation of his country's welfare and the stability of the Church. For the womanly home there is absolutely no substitute. Language, which is but the crystalized thought of nations, tells the story. Home without woman is unknown to human speech. The military officer has his "quarters," the sea captain his "cabin," the herdsman his "ranch," the student or clerk his "room" or perhaps, his "den;" associated men have "clubs," "societies," "lodges." Woman only has "home" and man as associated with her. American homes for American women and American women for American homes should be the watchword of the day, until the high noon of the millennial. Let woman rule in State and church if you will, but let her throne be the heart of her husband; her womanly virtues the coronet she daily wears, her children the sparkling jewels in her diadem, and love the scepter that she wields. The jury box and the ballot box should never be manipulated by women in church or State.

The temperance question, or the prohibition of the liquor traffic, is a living burning question that imperils the safety of our country. In a recent speech before the English Army Temperance Association, Lord Wolseley said:

"There are yet some battles to be fought, some great enemies to be encountered by the United Kingdom, but the most pressing enemy at present is drink. It kills more than all our newest weapons of warfare, and not only destroys the body but the mind and soul also."

The Commander-in-Chief in India, Sir George White, holds the same views. And yet this pernicious—not to say infernal—system and hellish traffic has a place in the fundamental laws of our State, and is licensed by our National Government. That "the most humane and enlightened government on the face of the earth," should continue for so long to legalize an agency that is so fraught with such inconceivable woe to unnumbered millions of the human race would be an inexplicable mystery, were it not for the well known fact that National, State and municipal legislation is largely controlled by the liquor dealers themselves, who find a ready auxiliary when occasion requires in the lavish use of their ill-gotten gains. The pitiful cries of starving children and the heart-broken prayers of ruined families of the United States fall on heedless ears, and to these are now to be added the children and families of Hawaii, Cuba and the Philippine Islands. Verily, our flag and our morals are making progress. There is a fearful waste of human life; the average murders now are 10,000 annually.

According to the *Chicago Tribune*, which prints a valuable but shocking annual summary of casualties in the United States, there were 5,759 suicides in the United States in 1894, as compared with the two previous years, in which there were, in order, 4,912 and 4,436. The murders were 10,509 in 1895, 9,800 in 1894 and 6,615 in 1896. There were 132 legal executions in 1895, 132 in 1894, and 126 in 1893. The number of murders, miscalled lynchings was 171 in 1895, and 194 in 1894.

It thus appears that during the last two years 326 people have been lynched, and during the past three years 26,915 persons have been murdered, 15,107 have committed suicide, and 390 have been legally

executed. The figures thus show a waste of life in the United States alone of 42,738 during the past three years. The loss of life in the year last passed, from the four causes named reached 16,562.

The census of 1890 showed about 900,000 deaths in the previous year, and we doubt not that between the imperfect enumeration of that year, and the increase of population since that date the annual deaths in the United States now reach about a million a year. While that rate of decease is startling, it touches one almost pathetically when he thinks of the causes of unnecessary death, and the chief cause is strong drink. Intemperance weakens the physical powers, incites men to murder, makes it apparently needful to execute murderers, in order to discourage others from that crime, decreases human physical resistance to disease, robs men and women of their due amount of food, promotes insanity, and in scores of ways ministers to human destruction. When men, and particularly women, contemplate the ruin inflicted by human consent, and by that device of all that is satanic—the liquor license system—it is veritably wonderful that society does not go en masse to forcibly arrest the traffic and burn down the saloon. Statistics that make men's blood curdle are accessible, which show that the great part of loss of life is quite unnecessary.

Mr. President: No one who looks around and sees the manipulation of accounts, the diversion of trust funds in Church and State, and the reported "looting" in the Phillipines and in China, by Americans, will accuse your committee of undue severity. Swindling and lying abounds, is colossal and national. A high authority declares that in spite of the activity of the authorities, food adulterators are growing bolder. A recent demand for chocolate was followed at once by a pronounced increase in the sale of mutton, tallow, low-grade sugar, shells of the cacao bean, sawdust and potato meal. A scarcity in honey, too, has brought forth a bogus product which defies detection of all but the experts. Much of the wine produced has never contained a drop of grape juice. Butter, colored and transformed by all sorts of cheap, fatty substances; tea, whose leaves are composed largely of strawberry and linden sandsage, and cheese made of potatoes unfit for market, milk in all qualities and all stages, and even sometimes of the blood from the slaughter house, are mentioned as instances of the deplorable debasement of food and drink. As to coffee, should all of the substances which pass through a coffee grinding machine during a year be written in alphabetical order, A would begin the list with acorns, and W would end it with wormwood, sprouts of which are sometimes used to give the debased coffee a slight aromatic, butter taste.

Under the great dome of the National Capitol, and within ear-shot of the chief executive and the supreme judiciary of the nation, and in the presence of representatives of every civilized nation on the face of the globe, a Senator boasts of being an active and interested perpetrator of murder, robbery and fraud. "We killed 'em, we cheated 'em, we purposely disfranchised 'em, and we have no apology to make for it." Are the reported words of the modern swash-buckler flaunted in the face of civilization and christianity in the closing days of the Nineteenth Century. This boorish man, the Senator from a great and sovereign State, with—rhetorically—parts of the mutilated bodies of American voters in his pockets as *his* credentials, declares it a virtue to ravish the constitution and by violence, to deprive American citizens, who stood and stand for the integrity of the Union, of their just rights. And, Mr. President, this infamous declaration, failed to evoke even a mild protest from the American Senate or a gentle rebuke from its presiding officer. This man, this product of our American civilization has ravished the constitution and "committed the usual crime;" but for him there seems to be no remedy. So let him be pilloried in the history of

the Nineteenth Century for the benefit of the coming generations of the new century, and let his utterance be *his* salutatory to them. The shameless villians who ruin hundreds at a stroke, laugh at law as they ride by their victims in princely drags; so our Carters, Steadmans, Alvords et al., are multiplied by the hundred. These stars in our financial and political world are decidedly out of place. A display of stripes would be to them more deserved. The friendless bread thief, the ignorant purloiner, is sent to the chain gang as a stripe wearer, after an august Court in awful pomp has made inquisition. But what of these men and their accomplices? The law is vindicated in the helpless. This condition, this monstrosity, obtains notwithstanding a large and ever increasing number of genuine Christians in all the Churches, who abide in the truth, love God and work righteously.

It is painful to state, that in many, perhaps a majority of the churches of this Southland, are thousands of lynchers, many of whom are communicants of the various denominations. It is fearful to contemplate the fact that not one of these violators of law has ever been or probably ever will be cited to trial before a civil or ecclesiastical tribunal, especially the latter, for his crimes, where a negro is the victim. The churches cannot, dare not denounce lynching in its most horrid form or summon to trial, or convict or excommunicate a lyncher if brought to trial. The tone of vital godliness, the moral sense, the Christian ethics of the day is at such a low ebb, that no minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ in this Southland would dare cite to trial this class of persons whose hands are reeking with human blood, and who periodically approach the table of our Lord in commemoration of His suffering and death, and who participate in the ordinary religious worship. Gracious God; what feasts! The defaulters, the lynchers, and the jury and ballot box manipulators are the heroes of the communities, often the officials of the church and the leaders in social circles.

The spirit of commercialism dominates the country in all of its avenues and circulates in its life blood. This same spirit occupies some of the chief seats in our Churches and Conferences, so that we are dangerously near the verge of bargaining for positions. One step further and our Conference ballot box will be contaminated and our elections become a mockery and a sham.

The rendition of comic songs such as "Old Dan Tucker" "Sally is the Gal for Me," and "The Bob Tail Hoss," under different synonymims, from what was *formerly* "the sacred rostrum," is cheered to the echo by the laity, led on by the ministry, because, forsooth, "it is done for the cause of Christian education." And these renditions are either preceded or succeeded by the administration of the Holy Communion from the identical chancel with shoutings of "grace, grace unto it." And this is now part of the curriculum for the instruction of our babes. We protest in the name of high Heaven. What solemn mockery is this. It is significant that the sessions of Conference of former days were seasons of refreshing and waves of revival influence in the respective communities; but now the base of great men and great Conferences is, financial. And so, our Peters offset a revival effort with a biscuit contest. Our Pauls, balance their camp-meetings with a grand excursion. Our Marys substitute a necktie entertainment for a devotional hour with Jesus, our Marthas have adopted an artistic cake-walk in place of class meetings and not to be out-done our James are exploiting a sugar dish contest, and our Moses and Aarons are auctioning household goods from the rostrum of our high sanctuary—and all of this is done for the cause of missions to the heathen. Oh missions! Oh missions! what crimes are committed in thy name with the approval of the elect.

The war in China with its results, are we believe to be the reaction

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incident to Mr. Dole and the children of the missionaries to the Sandwich Island and the annexation of Hawaii. And while in common with humanity and christianity we rejoice in the relief of our missionaries and their families from what seemed certain death, yet your committee believes that China, Japan and all eastern countries, will in future close their hearts if not their doors against our forms of propagandism, being apprehensive of the subversion of their ancient organized forms of government and the substitution therefor of our western civilization with its inherent evils. Hawaii, we believe, will in future be the stone of stumbling and the rock of offence to true missionary enterprise and sincere christian propagandism. This is a fearful but a just arraignment of Protestant Christianity and Christianity in earnest. The "earnest" of the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man is woefully lacking in all sections of our country and in our section it is almost an unknown quantity. The elements of Christian brotherhood is dissolved, the mob holds complete sway, law and order are in contempt and violence in all forms is supreme. Oh God, the iron operated by Protestant Christianity hath entered our souls. The Church and the State in organic form dare not denounce lynching without apologizing for so doing, provided the victim of the most refined cruelties has one drop of negro blood coursing in his veins. And Nineteenth Century civilization and Nineteenth Century Christianity are equally impotent to enforce the laws enacted by themselves. Our Southland is deluged in blood. Reform is needed at the fountain head—the Church—for "judgment must begin at the House of God; and if it begins at us, what must the end be? If the righteous is scarcely saved where will the ungodly and the sinner appear." We close as we began. If we would have powerful minds we must think. If we would have faithful hearts, we must love. If we would have strong muscles we must labor, and these attributes include all that is of much value in this life, and white supremacy is not conducive to the supremacy of law.

REPORT OF STERLING INDUSTRIAL COLLEGE,

This institution was established in 1896, with 15 students and with no school property whatever; it has since that time sent out 16 graduates from the College Preparatory Department. It has now an enrollment of 150 students. Of this number they are graded as follows: Senior Class 13; Second Years and Junior Class 12; First Years 25; Sophomore Class 1, and all the others are in the lower grades.

The property of this institution is now valued at \$3,000. It cost \$1,600, and \$1 500 has already been paid to the party from whom it was purchased. A liberal charter has been granted to the Trustees by the Secretary of State, and its diplomas are recognized and honored by the leading educators of Greenville and vicinity, also by the Superintendent of Education, and the Board of Examiners of several counties. It is now being patronized by students from three different States and several counties in this State. Too much credit cannot be given to Mrs. E. R. Sterling, of Poughkeepsie, New York, who has given several hundred dollars herself and through her friends for its permanent establishment. This institution is making lasting impression upon the hearts and minds of the people of both races in the Piedmont Belt of the State.

REPORT OF THE PAROCHIAL SCHOOL.

"Take this child and train it for me."

Rev. Wm. R. A. Palmer is the Superintendent of Emanuel Training and Classical Academy of Sumter, S. C.; its present enrollment is 105. Misses Alice McWillie, Louise Jacobs, Naomi Maxwell, of Clafin, and Miss Lottie Peterson, of the Graded School are the teachers. The fall exhibition of his school was held Thanksgiving evening. A large and appreciative audience assembled to hear the beautiful juvenile cantata. "The Happy Family of Father Time," which was meritorious, as art, music, literature and elocution. It was also a financial success and the people are still asking for its repetition. The Catechism of our Church is taught daily in this school; the graduating class consists of nine pupils graduates of the Lincoln Graded School last year; their studies are Latin, Higher Mathematics, Higher English and Sciences. The City Board of Education recognizes the school to the extent of allowing it a stipend every month; the advantage of this is plain, the school is regarded as an annex to the Public School and no discrimination will be made against any of our pupils who may apply for schools if they be competent. If we had similar Parochial Schools connected with all our churches, we would have no more young people in our churches of other denominations, to teach, who insist that their Catechism be studied. This is right, let us go and do likewise and save our young people for Methodism.

MISS A. F. McLEOD.

Just as she had grown into a beautiful young lady of 20 summers, Miss Annie Foster McLeod, the sweet spirited daughter of Rev. J. McLeod, departed this life to be with God. It was near midnight on August 6th, 1900, when the death angel called at the parsonage in Cheraw and relieved her of much suffering which she had endured for about three years. During her illness, her loved ones did all in their power to restore her to health, but it was the Master's good will to call her home. Annie was a true Christian, whose beautiful life adorned with many Christian graces, made her a favorite in her father's home, and with people wheresoever she went.

She professed religion when quite a child, but she was greatly quickened in spirit and renewed in faith while attending school at Claflin University three years ago. One of the things that made her such a bright Christian was her intense love for the Bible. She read it through again and again. And hastened to get through for the last time just a few weeks before she died. As the end drew near she sang and rejoiced all the while. Her favorite hymns which she sang during her last few days, were these: "When my life work is ended;" "On Christ the solid rock I stand." And when the shadows of death began to veil her mortal vision, she sang "Lead, kindly light." A little while before she departed, she laughed heartily and exclaimed, "Oh, Mamma, Mamma, Jesus is coming! He is coming! It takes him so long to get here, but he is coming!" "Oh Mamma, let me go, let me go!"—"I am going to sleep." What a consolation it is "that all must go this way."

She laughed again and with a sunbeam from the other world playing upon her countenance, she departed to be with Christ.

MRS. C. L. LOGAN.

Sister Rebecca Logan, the wife of the Rev. C. L. Logan, was born at Greenville, S. C., on the 17th day of June, 1863. She was the only daughter of Jackson and Mary Thompson. In early childhood Rebecca joined the Methodist Episcopal Sunday School and soon became a member of the Church. She was happily converted when but a child, and lived to the day of her death a bright and happy Christian.

For a number of years she was a teacher in the Sunday-school of John Wesley M. E. Church, in which position she exhibited all the traits of a model teacher. She attended the Greenville city schools, in which she received a good education. Among her teachers were the Revs. B. L. Roberts and L. M. Dunton. Her's was in the highest sense a Christian Education, the product of a model Christian home and a Christian school.

On the first day of June, 1880, she was united in marriage to Charles Lucius Logan; the Rev. I. E. Lowery officiating. With him she lived happily for seventeen years, six months and twenty-two days. To them were born nine children, five sons and four daughters.

Fully acquiescing in the appointments of the Church and Conference given her husband, our sister murmured not but rejoicing with her husband in all of his trials and triumphs in the itinerant ministry, until at three o'clock P. M., on Friday, 23d of November, 1900, she took her flight to glory.

As a pastor's wife she measured up to the highest standard. Wherever she was known she was beloved by all, and was everywhere regarded as a model Christian woman. She left eight children, four boys and four girls to mourn the absence of a devoted mother.

It was but recently that sister Logan's mother was suddenly taken from her, and *more* recently her infant son, which sad affliction drew her away from earth to join them in pasture lands of eternal glory.

THE COMMITTEE.

EDWARD MISHAW PINCKNEY.

Edward Mishaw Pinckney was born in Charleston, S. C., in the year 1842; died at Camden, S. C., April 22d, 1900, in his 58th year of age. He was not sick at all, but had visited regularly the Rev. J. B. Thomas who was sick. He appeared to be in perfect health. On Sunday morning, April 22d, he went to St. Paul, his nearest church, which is about 6 miles distant from Camden.

He preached a sermon of rare beauty and great power from Ecclesiastes v: 4-5. Complained of being a little unwell, partook of a light supper, held family worship and retired. At 11 P. M. he died without saying a word. Bro. Pinckney possessed marked natural qualifications for the ministry. He was of dignified carriage and manly bearing, manifestly a courtesy which made him at home in the most polite society, and at the same time won the esteem of the man with the hoe. With a voice and manner admirably adapted to the pulpit and the platform, and in either of which he was at home, and a mind unusually strong in its powers of perception and analysis. Nor were his acquirements of a mean order. Beginning his ministry with no more than a common school education and four terms at Baker Theological Institute, of which he was one of the seven original students, he never lost zest as a student, and accumulated a vast store of information which he incorporated in his finished pulpit and platform production.

He was an excellent theologian, the great question of which he could discuss intelligently and boldly. He was reared in a home permeated by the pure atmosphere of Methodism by a sainted mother, and received spiritual training in Old Bethel Church, whose membership was composed of men and women who were saints of the Wesleyan type.

His Sunday School teachers were W. W. Wilbur, U. Sinclair Bird, C. H. Muckenfuss and others of that class of godly men, and his class leaders were Henry Pickenpack and Joshua E. Wilson, Sr., men renowned for their piety and integrity. He listened to preachers who belonged to the line of heroes of the Methodist pulpit in South Carolina. Under such circumstances and possessing the remarkable talents he displayed, he could have become nothing else when he answered the call of God and the church, than an able exponent of the divine word as interpreted by Methodism.

With all his talents, he was pre-eminent and untiring in revival work. His ministry in his last charge seemed to be one of preparation for his people and himself for a heavenly state, and his last sermon was perhaps the greatest that he ever preached. His hearers were deeply impressed and appreciated the greatness of the truths he so earnestly set forth—"vanities in divine service." He entered Baker Theological Institute Charleston, S. C., at its organization in 1865, and as a divinity student, did faithful mission work. His first work assigned him by the Faculty was at "Ryan's Mart," the old slave jail, on Chalmers Street, Charleston, and this work also included the slums of the lower part of the city.

In the year 1867, during vacation, he supplied Darlington Charge, and in his aggressive spirit organized new work at New Hope, DeWitts, Gully Arbor, Wilson X Roads and Sardis, August 16, 1867, he wrote me as follows: "Been to Cheraw, had a good time. 52 joined our Church. I labored very hard for them and thank God for permitting me to do something for Him. We are getting on very well here, Darlington, the Church is pretty warm."

Brother Pinckney entered the Conference on trial, Jan. 1869, and was admitted into full membership in 1871. He was appointed to the following charges: Darlington, Bennettsville, Camden, Charleston, Orangeburg, Columbia, Florence, Kingstree, Marion, Yorkville, Barnwell, Longtown, Jefferson and Rockspring. He also served a full term as Presiding Elder on the Greenville District

Peace to his ashes. We shall meet in the resurrection morning.

MRS. MARY JANE SPENCER.

Mrs. Mary Jane Spencer, wife of the Rev. Nathaniel Turner Spencer, was born in Charleston, S. C., July 16th, 1848, and died at her residence in Charleston on Wednesday, August 29th, 1900. By the death of her mother she, at two years of age, and an only brother, aged seven days, were left in orphanage. They were adopted by friends who treated them with parental affection and care. The little ones were sent to the very good schools that were run in Charleston for colored children of that day. She became a teacher in the public schools of her native city immediately after the civil war. She first met Mr. Spencer in 1861, and their overtures of love were reciprocal from first sight of each other, until after a courtship of six years, they were married by the Rev. A. Webster, D. D., at Centenary Church. Ten children were born to them, of which four, with two grand-children survive her.

Mrs. Spencer was converted at Centenary Church, and received in full membership in 1875 under the ministry of the Rev. T. J. Abbott, under whose ministry her husband was soon afterwards converted; and they both became bright and useful members of Centenary Church. In 1891, Rev. Spencer became a member of the South Carolina Conference, and remained in the effective pastorate until the close of 1899, when he took a supernumerary relation on account of Mrs. Spencer's ill health. During the years from 1891 to 1899 inclusive, Mrs. Spencer was constantly with husband, and faithfully assisted him in his pastoral labors at Yorkville, Gaffney, Manning, Kingstree, Washington and Ladson Circuit, Clio, Syracuse, and Washington and St. Jude Circuits, living on each charge excepting at Manning. As a pastor's wife she was greatly beloved by the people everywhere she was known. She was a most cheerful and devoted Christian—always delighted in singing hymns of praise, her favorite hymn being "He leadeth me."

Her first attack of paralysis was on Sunday evening, October 24, 1897, when she had walked home from the home of a friend who had been stricken with paralysis on the same day or the day before. She suffered intensely for about two months, when in answer to prayer (it is believed) she began to improve; and although she became an invalid by the shock, she was soon able to walk and to use her right hand and to converse fairly well till within a few days of her death. The death of a grown daughter (Miss Florence) in the month of January, 1899, almost prostrated her, and her husband and relations feared that she could not endure the awful sorrow, but her firm and unfaltering trust in Jesus rescued her from what would have been the fate of most mothers similarly afflicted.

On the 24th of July Mrs. Spencer went to Bamberg, S. C. For two weeks she seemed to improve, but about the middle of August she was attacked by chills and fever, and her strength continued to fail until Saturday, August 25, while being brought from Bamberg to Charleston, she was at Branchville again stricken with paralysis, and lost consciousness. Although a physician of Branchville was summoned, and nothing was omitted that kind hands and medical skill could do at Branchville, on the train and in Charleston, she continued to sleep until Wednesday 29th, at 6 o'clock, p. m., she ceased to breathe.

She was carried to Charleston just in time to embark for heaven from the home she loved so dearly, surrounded by hosts of life long friends, her only brother and all of her children but one.

It was beautiful to see the intense devotion of her husband and children at her bedside, and especially to see little Ollie who so faithfully tried to nurse her mother back to consciousness, but being beckoned away by the gentler hand of Jesus, this devoted mother heeded not the voices of loved ones on earth, and so took her flight to a better country—a city whose foundations are garnished with all manner of precious stones."

Her funeral services were held at Centenary Church by Dr. A. G. Townsend, pastor, assisted by the pastors of the various city churches, six of their number acting as pall-bearers.

ALWILDA A. GORDON,

On the evening of the twelfth of November, 1900, just after the setting of the sun, the soul of Mrs. Alwilda A. Gordon, the faithful and efficient superintendent of Browning Home, Camden, S. C., took its flight from the Home in Camden for the Home on High.

The transition was as sudden as it was swift. Mrs. Gordon had been in poor health and under the physician's care for some months, but there was no thought or suspicion that the end was so near. Less than an hour prior to her death, she had been walking about the premises engaged in such light duties as she felt that her strength permitted.

Just a little while before the summons came for her to make her final report, she had looked into the room in which the students of the "Home" were engaged in lesson preparations, and with a nod and a smile as she looked at them she returned to her room. While resting in her bed room in the company of a couple of friends, the sudden summons came. She seemed to have fainted. Restoratives were applied and physicians summoned, but in spite of persistent efforts of the best and dearest of friends and the skill of physicians, she failed to revive, and the sad intelligence was given to teachers, students and other friends, that "Mrs. Gordon is dead."

The blow was a heavy one to the institution, and it will be a long time before it recovers from it. Mrs. Gordon was born in Maine, and was educated at the Conference Seminary of Kent's Hill. She married

when quite young and became a widow soon after. She desired to engage in missionary work in South America, but was prevented from doing so by failing health. For ten years she was engaged in work among the colored people under the auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as Superintendent of Browning Home.

She was a woman of much executive and administrative ability; of quick perception and great common sense. Her love for the Institution, of which she was the head, seemed to have been second only to her love for her Saviour. To it she gave ten of the best years of her life. She died in the prime of her life, being at the time of her death, in her fifty-fifth year.

The funeral services were held at the Browning Home in the presence of a large concourse of people, and were conducted by Rev. J. P. Robinson, assisted by Rev. J. B. Thomas, of the M. E. Church, and Rev. T. S. Williams, of the Baptist Church.

Her remains were borne from the Home to the hearse by former and present students, and in the presence of a large number of mourning friends were tenderly laid to rest in the cemetery of the people among whom she had labored and whom she loved so much. There she sleeps her long last sleep, waiting till the morning of the general resurrection, when, in company with her brothers and sisters in black, she will rise to meet her blessed Saviour.

"Sleep on, beloved, sleep and take thy rest;
Lay down thy head upon thy Saviour's breast;
We love thee well, but Jesus loves thee best—
Good night! Good night! Good night!

"Calm is thy slumber as an infant's sleep;
But thou shalt wake no more to toil and weep;
Thine is a perfect rest, secure and deep—
Good night! Good night! Good night!

Only "Good night," beloved—not "farewell!"
A little while and all His saints shall dwell
In hallowed union and invisible—
Good night! Good night! Good night!

Until we meet again before His throne,
Clothed in the spotless robes He gives His own,
Until we know—even as we are known—
Good night! Good night! Good night!
