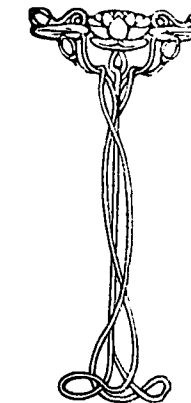

UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

FIRST DAY— WEDNESDAY

Clemson Methodist Church,
Clemson, S. C., November 7, 1945.

Opening. Following the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper by Bishop Purcell, assisted by L. E. Wiggins, B. L. Kilgo, B. R. Turnipseed, E. R. Mason, R. L. Holroyd, G. H. Hodges, District Superintendents, and E. W. Hardin, pastor, the Bishop called the thirty-first session of the Upper South Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, to order.

Roll Call. The roll was called by H. O. Chambers, Secretary of the last Conference, and it was revealed that 146 clerical members and 73 lay delegates were present.

Question 1. Who are elected: Secretary? Treasurer? Statistician? H. O. Chambers was elected Secretary with the following assistants: M. B. Patrick, T. C. Cannon and B. H. Tucker. J. T. Frazier was elected Statistician with Rex V. Martin, T. L. Bryson, J. W. Tomlinson, V. O. Taylor and J. G. Stroud, assistants.

Bar of the Conference. E. W. Hardin moved that the bar of the Conference be the main floor of the sanctuary. Carried.

Hours of Sessions. Upon vote the hours of meeting were fixed as follows: Morning, 9 to 12:50. Afternoon: Meet at three and adjourn at will. Evening: meet at seven and adjourn at will.

Presentation. Major S. Maner Martin was introduced to the Conference and presented two gavels to the Bishop for use during the Annual Conference at Clemson. He made appropriate remarks giving some of the history of the gavels. Bishop Purcell accepted the gavels and also mentioned a gavel that he held in his hand which had been presented to him.

Nominations. L. E. Wiggins, Secretary of the Bishop's Cabinet, presented nominations for vacancies on Boards, Commissions and Committees as follows:

Motion. J. R. T. Major moved that the report on the Orphanage be made the order of the day Thursday at 11 A. M. Carried.

Questions 6 and 16 were called:

Question 16. Are there formulated complaints against any ministerial member of the Conference? The names of the District Superintendents were called one by one and the answer was: "Nothing against them."

Question 6. What are the reports of the District Superintendents as to the status of the work within their districts? L. E. Wiggins, B. L. Kilgo, B. R. Turnipseed, E. R. Mason, R. L. Holroyd and G. H. Hodges reported for their respective districts.

Announcement. The Chair recognized Dr. W. K. Greene for an announcement relative to the report of the Special Committee on Adequate Support of the Ministry, which report was distributed to the Conference.

Order of the Day. Dr. W. K. Greene moved that consideration of this report be made the order of the day for Friday morning at 10 o'clock, which motion after being seconded, prevailed.

Motion. J. O. Smith moved that following the order of the day on Thursday the question of the Conference Council be presented to the Annual Conference. This motion prevailed.

Leave of Absence. H. C. Ritter was granted leave of absence to conduct the funeral of one of his members.

Adjournment. The Conference voted to adjourn after which Bishop Purcell pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY—MORNING

November 8, 1945.

Opening. G. W. Burke, Chairman of the Board of Evangelism, conducted the opening worship at 9 A. M. Hymn 402 was sung. Prayer was offered, after which Saint Matthew, 17th chapter, was used as a basis for the address of Brother Burke. The worship service was closed in the singing of 279, "God of Grace and God of Glory."

Announcement. The Bishop announced that unless there was objection roll call would be dispensed with and that all who were absent at the roll call last night would notify the Secretary, in writing, of their presence. Absentees reporting: Clerical, 13; Lay, 26.

Matter of Privilege. E. W. Hardin, pastor of Clemson Methodist church, presented J. P. LaMaster, chairman of the Board of Stewards, who extended greetings and welcome to the Upper South Carolina Conference. Mr. LaMaster then presented Dr. Franklin Foole, President of Clemson College, who brought words of welcome in behalf of the college. Dr. S. J. L. Crouch, pastor of Fort Hill Presbyterian church and President of the Clemson Ministers Association, was presented and extended words of welcome from the Association.

Introductions. P. B. Holtzendorf, secretary of the Clemson Y. M. C. A.; John Pinckney, rector of the Episcopal church; Harold Cole, pastor of the Baptist church; Harold Townsend, secretary of Baptist Student Work, and H. T. Heyward, assistant Y. M. C. A. secretary, were presented to the Conference.

Privilege. E. W. Hardin asked that Major S. M. Martin, Dr. D. W. Daniel, Major W. W. Klugh, Mr. I. L. Keller and Mr. A. B. Bryan be presented to the Conference. These were the only remaining charter members of the Clemson Methodist church.

Privilege. J. S. Edwards called attention to the fact that John D. Holler was the pastor during the construction of the present building.

Introduction. The Bishop introduced Dr. E. C. Nash, Business Manager of the Christian Advocate, who spoke concerning this great paper.

Paper by Bishop. Bishop Purcell read a portion of a paper dealing with the Crusade for Christ. He read, also, the headings of the paper which included Epworth Orphanage, Southern Christian Advocate, Colleges, Rural Work, City Work, Chaplains, World Service, Southeastern Jurisdictional Council, Local Indebtedness and Lake Junaluska.

Introduction. The Bishop called Mr. C. E. Miller, representing the Publishing House, and after briefly reviewing several books, introduced him to the Conference. Mr. Miller presented to the Conference a check for \$2,762.55 to be applied to the fund for our retired ministers.

Presentation. Bishop Purcell called to the chancel the Methodist chaplains present. The following responded and were presented to the Conference: M. E. Boozer, Joel E. Cannon, C. H. Sullivan, S. R. Glenn, J. W. Cooley and T. H. Vickery.

Order of the Day. The hour having arrived for the order of the day D. A. Clyburn presented a resolution favoring a Joint Council. (See Resolution.) After offering the resolution D. A. Clyburn moved its adoption. Speaking against the resolution were B. B. Black, H. O. Chambers and J. R. T. Major. Speaking in favor of the resolution were D. A. Clyburn, J. O. Smith and L. D. Gillespie. The vote was taken, 45 voting for and 122 against, thus defeating the resolution.

Recess. A five minute recess was taken. The Conference reconvened.

The Bishop led in singing "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

Retired Ministers. The Bishop read the names of the retired ministers as follows: S. H. Booth, J. C. Cunningham, G. F. Clarkson, J. C. Diggs, W. A. Fairy, W. S. Goodwin, A. E. Holler, D. E. Jeffcoat, O. A. Jeffcoat, W. B. Justus, D. W. Keller, W. C. Kelley, J. B. Kilgore, R. O. Lawton, L. P. McGee, J. R. T. Major, J. M. Meetze, J. W. Neeley, T. C. O'Dell, A. Q. Rice, D. R. Roof, R. E. Sharpe, Foster Speer, R. E. Stackhouse, A. M. Trawick, P. B. Wells and R. W. Wilkes. The Bishop then directed that the following be added to this list: J. C. Roper, W. T. Moore, J. D. Holler, and J. B. Connelly. After the passage of character of the entire list all were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications for the retired relation.

Appreciation. B. L. Kilgo spoke words of appreciation of J. R. T. Major, retired, who has served the Pisgah and Mount Pleasant charge during the past year.

Order of the Day. Thursday 11 A. M. having been set as the time for the report of the Orphanage, Dr. W. D. Roberts, Superintendent of Epworth Orphanage, was presented. He made a report on the affairs of the orphanage generally.

Chambers in Chair. Bishop Purcell invited H. O. Chambers to occupy the chair while he was absent from the room.

A. L. Gunter, Field Agent for Epworth Orphanage, was presented by the Bishop. Dr. Gunter spoke concerning the enlargement program of the institution.

The Bishop resumed the chair.

Resolution. G. W. Burke presented a resolution concerning Epworth Orphanage. (See resolution.) It was adopted.

Question 19. Who are received on trial? was called and answered as follows: H. R. Reynolds, who had appeared before the proper committee and whose examination was approved.

Question 20. Who remain on trial? was called and answered: James Larry Ashley, Joe Woodrow Giles, Major Clyde Hendrix, James Adelbert Merchant and Victor M. Ross. These having met the Disciplinary requirements and having their characters passed were advanced to the class of the second year.

Question 26. Who have been elected deacons? was called and answered: William Ralph Carter, John Grady Forrester, Denver Steadly Lee, and William Harold Smith having met the Disciplinary requirements were elected to Deacon's orders and advanced to the third year. Ralph W. Atkinson, E. P. McWhittrr and R. M. Phillips not being before the committee remain in the class of the Second year. Marwin Earle McCullough was elected to Elders orders but remains in the class of the second year until he can assume the vows of full connection.

Question 34. Who have been received by transfer? was called and answered: Hawley Barnwell Lynn as of April 1945, a deacon from the Western North Carolina Conference. He was advanced to the class of the third year and elected to elder's orders. J. L. Stokes, II, an elder from the Western North Carolina Conference, and J. M. Copeland, an elder from the South Carolina Conference.

Report of the Board of Education No. 1. L. D. Gillespie presented Francis T. Cunningham, Secretary of the Board, who asked that the printed report handed to the members of the Conference be considered as Report No. 1. L. D. Gillespie presented W. L. Mullikin who spoke to the report. Dr. W. K. Greene spoke concerning Wofford College while Dr. W. L. Buffington represented Paine College, Augusta, Georgia. Dr. J. Emerson Ford, Editorial Secretary of General Board of Education, was then presented and he addressed the Conference.

Motion. The Bishop suggested the need of extra sessions of the Conference and J. E. Merchant moved that a session be held immediately following the Historical address this evening. Motion prevailed.

Reference. A. C. Holler presented a resolution which without reading was referred to the Board of Education.

Adjournment. After sundry announcements the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. J. Emerson Ford.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY—EVENING

Opening. Immediately following the meeting of the Historical Society the Conference was called to order by Bishop Purcell.

Election. On nomination of the Statistical Secretary, J. Grady Forrester was elected as assistant statistical secretary for Greenville District.

Committee on Minutes. T. F. Reid reported that the minutes of last evening and the morning session of today had been examined and found correct.

Report of Board of Education. F. T. Cunningham submitted report No. 2 and it was moved that it be received as information. (See report.)

A report on **Christian Literature** was submitted through the Board of Education asking that \$1,800 be appropriated to the Southern Christian Advocate; this was designated as Section No. 1. Section No. 2 relative to a fund to be raised for the Advocate building and asking that the churches be asked for \$7.50 for each service person was read. F. C. Beach moved that the part of Section 1 relative to the \$1,800 appropriation for the Advocate be referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance. This motion prevailed. L. D. Gillespie acting for the committee withdrew the section of the report relative to the \$7.50 for service men. He then moved the adoption of the balance of the report and this was carried. (See report.)

Presentation. Bishop Purcell presented Dr. J. Marvin Rast, President of Lander College, who addressed the Conference. Dr. W. K. Anderson, Secretary of Ministerial Supply, and Dr. Mack B. Stokes of the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, were introduced to the Conference and spoke concerning their work.

Introduction. Dr. Edmund Chambers, Missionary to Poland, and Dr. Jack R. McMichael, Executive Secretary of Federation of Social Service, were introduced to the conference. Dr. E. W. Stodghill, Director of the Student Loan and Scholarship Fund, was introduced and spoke concerning this fund.

Report of Commission on Group Insurance. H. C. Ritter presented the report of this commission. See report. Adopted.

Report of Commission on World Service and Finance. T. F. Reid submitted Report No. 1 which report see. Adopted.

Adjournment. After announcements the Conference adjourned with the benediction by J. H. Brown.

THIRD DAY—FIDAY—MORNING SESSION

November 9, 1945.

Opening. C. O. Bell conducted the worship service, opening with the hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty," following the singing of which by the Conference, he read from 9th chapter I Corinthians for the Scripture lesson. Paul Kinnett led in prayer. Brother Bell then spoke on the theme, "What Is Your Motive in the Ministry?"

Report of Committee on Minutes. Bishop Purcell called for the report and the committee reported the minutes correctly kept.

Introductions. E. W. Hardin presented Dr. Deets Pickett who was introduced to the Conference. The Bishop called Chaplain J. M. Copeland, Rev. Hawley Lynn and Dr. J. L. Stokes forward and introduced them to the Conference.

Report of Board of Hospitals and Homes. M. E. Derrick submitted Reports Nos. 1 and 2, without reading, to the record. (See reports.) Report No. 3 was read and adopted. (See report.)

Report of Committee on Town and Country Work. This report was read by W. G. Newman and was adopted.

Question 26. Who have been elected deacons as local preachers? was called and answered, No one.

Question 28. Who have been elected elders as local preachers? was called and answered, None.

Question 31. Who are readmitted? was called and answered, No one.

Question 32. What preachers coming from other churches, have had their orders recognized? was called and answered, No one.

Question 33. Who have been received from other churches as traveling preachers? was called and answered, No one.

Question 35. Who has been transferred out? was called and answered: John W. Shackford, an elder, to the Virginia Conference.

Question 36. Who have had their Conference membership terminated? was answered, C. N. Potts, by withdrawal.

Question 38. Who are the supernumerary ministers, and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation? was called and answered, None.

Question 39. Who are granted sabbatical leave? was called and answered, No one.

Question 40. What ministers have been retired? was called and answered by the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial

Qualifications as follows: Recommend that the following be retired: S. H. Booth, J. C. Cunningham, G. F. Clarkson, J. C. Diggs, W. A. Fairy, W. S. Goodwin, A. E. Holler, D. E. Jeffcoat, O. A. Jeffcoat, W. B. Justus, D. W. Keller, W. C. Kelley, J. B. Kilgore, R. O. Lawton, L. P. McGee, J. R. T. Major, J. M. Meetze, J. W. Neeley, T. C. O'Dell, A. Q. Rice, D. R. Roof, R. E. Sharpe, Foster Speer, R. E. Stackhouse, A. M. Trawick, P. B. Wells, R. W. Wilkes, J. B. Connelly, J. C. Roper, W. T. Moore and John D. Holler. The report was adopted by the Conference. The Bishop asked that all retired brethren stand. John D. Holler, J. C. Diggs, O. A. Jeffcoat and John C. Roper responded.

Question 17. Who are the accepted supply pastors? was called and answered: R. M. Tucker, C. J. Goodson, A. W. Baker, M. L. Greer, W. A. Horne, E. W. Lybrand, E. M. Heape, E. L. Johnson, T. L. Chapman and R. C. Emory. After their names were called their characters were passed and they were approved as Accepted Supply Pastors.

Question 18. What accepted supply pastors now under full-time appointment are taking the conference course of study? was called and C. J. Goodson was continued in the class of the second year and A. W. Baker in the class of the first year.

Question 16 was again called and the character of Joel E. Cannon was passed and it was voted to receive him into full connection as he had met the Disciplinary requirements.

Introduction. Dr. D. L. Betts, missionary from Brazil, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Motion. J. E. Merchant moved that the afternoon and evening sessions of the Conference be considered business sessions. Motion prevailed.

Question 21. Who on trial are discontinued? was called and answered, No one.

Order of the Day. The consideration of the Report of the Special Committee on Adequate Support of the Ministry was the special order of the day for 10 o'clock. That hour having arrived the report was taken up. The report was presented by Dr. W. K. Greene, Chairman of the Committee, who gave an analysis of the report.

Motion. J. Foster Lupo offered the following resolution: (1) Due to the short time this Conference has had to consider this report, and (2) due to the important and far reaching matters with which this report deals, (3) I move that action on Section I be postponed until the next session of the Conference. The motion was lost.

Action on the Report. After discussion by several members of the Conference it was voted to consider the report by sections. Section I was before the Conference and was adopted. Section II was presented. A motion was made that the section in the Standing Rules relative to the manner of setting the salaries of the District Superintendents be rescinded. This motion prevailed. The Recommendations of this committee were referred to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance by vote of the Conference. Section III was presented and by vote of the Conference the recommendations of the Committee on items 1-7 were adopted. Item 8 of this section was adopted. Section V of the report was adopted by the conference.

Expense. The expense of the Committee was \$22.05 which was paid by C. P. Hammond of Spartanburg.

Appreciation. J. E. Merchant moved that the committee be given a vote of thanks for its work and this was carried.

Jenkins Orphanage. Bishop Purcell introduced Rev. P. G. Daniel who presented the claims of the Jenkins Orphanage for colored children. An offering amounting to \$117.92 was taken.

Report of Board of Lay Activities. The report of this board was made by LeRoy Moore, Conference Lay Leader. (See report.) It was adopted.

LeRoy Moore introduced Dr. H. R. Sims, President of Winthrop College, who addressed the Conference.

Report of Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference. This report was presented by J. W. Lewis. (See report.) It was adopted.

Report of Board of Publication and Year Book. This report was presented by J. Walter Johnson. (See report.) It was adopted.

Introduction. Dr. Howard P. Powell, pastor of Dilworth church, Charlotte, was introduced to the Conference.

Appointments. M. E. McCullough, Director of Student Religious Work at Michigan State College, had his appointment authorized by vote of the Conference; by vote in like manner Dr. A. C. Outler was appointed to Yale University as Professor in the Divinity School.

Report. D. A. Clyburn presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. (See report.) Report adopted.

Advocate. The question of the Advocate building was transmitted by the Board of Education to the Conference. After being spoken to by Dr. D. D. Peele and others an amendment prevailed that the Conference join in and cooperate with the Advocate building program leaving to each church the matter of raising its quota.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY—AFTERNOON

Opening. G. W. Burke announced Hymn 379, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," and called on C. W. Allen for the prayer. He then introduced Dr. H. P. Powell, pastor of the Dilworth Methodist church, Charlotte, N. C., and Director of Evangelism in the Western North Carolina Conference, who spoke on "The Motive of Evangelism." Hymn 268 was sung in conclusion.

Bishop Purcell introduced Edmund Chambers, who went to Poland in 1923 as a missionary and was for 57 months a prisoner in Germany. Following his address the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. Edmund Chambers.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY—EVENING

November 9, 1945.

Opening. G. W. Burke was in charge of the worship service using Hymn No. 244. Prayer was led by Chaplain J. M. Copeland. Dr. H. P. Powell was presented and spoke from Acts 6:4. Closing the service Hymn 287, "A Charge to Keep I Have," was used. Bishop Purcell then expressed the Conference's appreciation of the messages of Dr. Powell. The Bishop led the conference in directed prayer and meditation.

Business

Class of the Third Year was called. Clyde Alston Brooks, Michael Fryga, Woodfin Grady Newman, and Voigt O. Taylor having appeared before the committees, their characters were passed and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

Class of the Fourth Year. George Russell Cannon and Albert Smith Harvey having met the Disciplinary requirements, their characters were passed and they pass out of the classes. The Bishop announced that the deacons and elders would be ordained on Sunday afternoon at 2:30.

Adjournment. Following a motion to adjourn L. C. Turbeville pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY—MORNING

November 10, 1945.

Opening. G. W. Burke presided. He announced that during the night Brother W. H. Polk, pastor at Central, S. C., had passed away. The Conference stood for a moment in respect to his memory. James G. Stroud led the devotions, announcing Hymn 278, "Lead On, O King Eternal." C. L. Harris led in prayer. Brother Stroud selected a passage from Saint Luke, chapter five, and gave a devotional talk.

Report of Committee on Journal. The Committee reported that the journal is correct.

Advocate. Dr. J. M. Rast presented a motion as a substitute for the report of the Board of Managers of the Southern Christian Advocate: "Resolved that the Upper South Carolina Conference join the South Carolina Conference in the erection of the building planned for the Southern Christian Advocate. That we undertake to raise \$51,000 for this purpose in a manner to be prescribed by our District Superintendents and carried out by them in their several districts between January 1 and the following March 15." This amendment was adopted.

Invitation from Wofford College. Dr. Walter K. Greene presented two letters of invitation. One was for the Annual Conference to be held at Wofford the week preceding the third Wednesday in next September. There was also an invitation for the holding of the Pastor's School at Wofford next summer. This matter was referred to the District Superintendents.

Question 16. Are there formulated charges against any ministerial member of the Conference? was called. The ministers' names were called one by one in open conference and the answer was: There is nothing against them.

Report of the Board of Education. A resolution from the South Carolina Conference was presented. (See report.) C. E. Peele spoke against the proposal. LeRoy Moore moved that it be tabled. Upon vote of the Conference it was tabled.

Report of Board of Temperance. J. Hertz Brown presented the report of the Committee on Temperance without reading. (See report.) Prof. A. M. Taylor spoke to the report.

Motion. J. Hertz Brown moved that January 20-27 be observed as Temperance Week. Carried. Mr. Brown requested that a Director of Temperance be appointed for each district.

Offering. Dr. B. R. Turnipseed rose to point of high personal privilege asking that an offering be taken for the men who are retired at this Conference. An offering was taken amounting to \$201.72. Dr. Roper requested that he not be included and that his portion be given the family of Brother W. H. Polk.

Motion. M. E. Derrick moved that the Secretary be instructed to send a message of sympathy to the family of W. H. Polk.

Board of Evangelism. The report was read by J. T. Gregory. (See report.) After some discussion Items 1 to 7 were adopted. Item 8 was a recommendation, that the conference order \$2,500 appropriated to the Board. After discussion by J. S. Edwards and B. B. Black the Crusade Council offered \$1,200 and the Board of Missions and Church Extension offered \$600. This was accepted and acted as a substitute for Item 8, a previous appropriation from the Board of World Service and Finance of \$700 having been made to this cause.

Question 22.— Who are admitted into full connection? was called. William Ralph Carter, John Grady Forrester, Denver Steadly Lee, William Harold Smith and Hawley Barnwell Lynn having met the Disciplinary requirements were called to the altar where the Bishop addressed them, after which he administered the vows. After the assumption of the vows they were received into full connection upon a standing vote of the Conference.

Personal Privilege. E. W. Hardin made sundry announcements.

Question 44.— What is the report of the Conference Treasurer? was called and George A. Beach made his report. (See report.)

Report of Commission on World Service. Reports 2, 3, and 4 were read and separately adopted. Reports 5 and 6 were read and separately adopted.

Question 47. Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? was asked. Dr. Walter K. Greene of Wofford College invited the Conference to meet at Wofford College provided the meeting be set so as to close the Sunday before the third Wednesday in September. This matter was left in the hands of the District Superintendents.

Introductions. James Allen, W. O. Weldon and A. D. Betts were introduced to the Conference.

Presentation. The Bishop presented Mrs. L. L. Hardin, President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Upper South Carolina Conference, after which he called Dr. B. R. Turnipseed to the chair while he was absent from the Conference. Mrs. Hardin addressed the Conference.

Bishop Purcell reassumed the chair.

FIFTH DAY—SUNDAY—AFTERNOON

November 11, 1945.

Opening. Bishop Purcell presided and announced Hymn 527, "For All the Saints, Who From Their Labors Rest," which was sung by the Conference. J. H. Brown led in prayer.

Question 37. What ministerial members have died during the year? was called and answered: J. M. Steadman, J. L. Daniel, George C. Leonard, W. F. Gault and W. H. Folk. Their memoirs were then read by A. E. Holler, T. C. Cannon, Dr. H. N. Snyder and E. R. Mason respectively. L. E. Wiggins announced that W. H. Polk's memoir would be read at the next Annual Conference. A. E. Holler read the memoirs of Mrs. J. H. Manley, Mrs. M. B. Kelley and Mrs. Emma King Fildy.

Ordination. Hymn 226, "O Jesus, I Have Promised," was sung. The Bishop then called for the names of those to be ordained Deacons. T. C. REPORTS

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

I. The report of the special committee for a study of Adequate Support of the Ministry, and passed to your Board to guide it in its recommendations for the ensuing year, has been used as a basis for all plans which it covers.

II. We request the Annual Conference to fix \$25.00 as the annuity rate for retired ministers for the ensuing year. That the schedule for widows be 70% of that rate, and for dependent children be 25% of that rate.

III. We incorporate in this report Section III, pages 35 and 36 as a part of this report with the following exceptions:

(a) That in paragraph 5 instead of the penalty for non-payment withholding all annuity payments, that not over 25% of the pension for any one year be withheld within a year, but this to continue until all obligations to the Claimant's fund are satisfied.

(b) That section 8 which is a referral paragraph be omitted.

1. That, for the conference year, 1945-1946, the apportionments for the Conference Claimants' fund be distributed to the several districts and charges on the basis of a fixed percentage of the total funds raised in the several charges during the conference year, 1943-1944, exclusive of funds raised for building and improvement purposes and for the payment of debt (principal) on church and parsonage buildings and grounds.

2. That, in succeeding years, the apportionments for the Conference Claimants' Fund be distributed to the several districts and charges on the basis of an annual fixed percentage of the total funds raised in the several charges during the preceding conference year, exclusive of funds raised for new buildings and for the payment of debt (principal and interest) on church and parsonage buildings and grounds.

3. That the Conference, provided no laws of South Carolina prohibit its so doing, require, for the benefit of its annuitants, each active member of the Conference in the effective relation to contribute annually to the Conference Claimants' Fund an amount equivalent to one per cent of his total current annual cash salary. ("Total current annual cash salary" means salary regardless of the source from which it comes.)

4. That the above required contribution be paid quarterly to the treasurer of the Conference, by each active member of the Conference in the effective relation, immediately after each Quarterly Conference of of his charge.

5. That, in case the member fails to pay the required contribution by the close of the conference year, he shall be considered in debt to the Conference Claimants' Fund to the extent of the amount of his required contribution plus a penalty of ten per cent of the amount due, compounded annually, and, upon retirement, shall receive no annuity payment until his obligation to the Conference Claimants' Fund shall have been satisfied.

6. That the Conference authorize the Board of Conference Claimants to pay annuity and relief benefits quarterly, provided that the fourth quarterly payment be made at the close of the conference year.

7. That Veterans' Day be observed in the churches of the Conference on one of the two Sundays before Christmas in the interest of conference claimants and that an offering be taken in each charge for the conference claimants, which shall be credited on the apportionments distributed to the several charges for the Conference Claimants' Fund.

8. That the recommendations of the Special Committee to the Board of Conference Claimants be referred to that Board for its consideration and action.

IV. We request that an appropriation to the several districts and charges be made which will give the Board of Conference Claimants \$41,720.00. This sum being needed to make the payments of the schedule listed above in paragraph II.

V. That for the Conference year 1945-1946, the apportionments for the Conference Claimants' Fund be distributed to the several districts and charges on the basis of 4.34 of the total funds raised in the several charges, during the Conference year, 1943-44, exclusive of funds raised for building and improvement purposes and for the payment of debt (principal) on church buildings, parsonages, and grounds.

VI. Stabilization Fund. The stabilization fund for the Jurisdiction which amounts to one-half of one percent of the current salaries paid to pastors is included in the above estimate and will be paid from total funds collected.

VII. We request that the Commercial Bank of Chester and the Palmetto Bank of Laurens be designated as depositories for funds of the Board of Conference Claimants.

VIII. Special Request. Mrs. W. A. Rogers, a widow of the late Rev. W. A. Rogers, in extreme age has withdrawn from the Methodist Church, but makes a claim for aid from our Board. She is not entitled to anything under the existing law, but the Board of Conference Claimants has voted to pay her \$200 for the current year and to pay her at the rate of \$50.00 per quarter so long as she lives. This amount to be paid from emergency funds carried by the Board and not according to the service year schedule set up in our Board. We request the Annual Conference to accept this plan and thus settle the issue.

IX. That the Board of Conference Claimants be the Committee on proportional payment as set forth in the Discipline 1944, section 1613, paragraph 6, and keep permanent records of any defaults in payments.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT GREENE

I have the honor to present to the Board of Education of the Upper South Carolina Conference the following report:

The Present Situation

When we consider the fact that Wofford has come through four years of tragic war, has maintained its standards, and in spite of a depleted student body, has not incurred any debt, we can justly view the present status of the College with pride and satisfaction.

With regard to the academic year, 1945-46, we shall probably experience our greatest difficulty in the financial operation of the College since the declaration of war in 1941. Our budget will not contain another emergency fund similar to the fund of \$11,148.00 that was raised in the two South Carolina Conferences and spent during the fiscal year just closed.

Now that peace has come to a broken and bleeding world, it will be difficult to forecast what effect this will have upon our College for 1945-1946. There will doubtless be no immediate return of any large body of our former students now serving in the Armed Forces. Some, if not all, of the members of our faculty who are on leave will return to the campus. If the Armed Forces continue to draft eighteen-year-old boys to serve as occupation troops, we shall continue to have a limited enrollment of students. There are indications, however, that a substitute will be found for the proposed military conscription in peace time.

In the light of the above circumstances, I earnestly and respectfully request the Board of Education to appropriate \$12,000 to Wofford College for the conference year, 1945-1946. This is the appropriation you so graciously made during the year just closed.

Counseling of Students

Professor C. E. Cauthen has been appointed counselor for returning veterans. We have published a booklet explaining what Wofford has to offer the returning veteran, and Professor Cauthen will be available for counsel and advice to them throughout their college course.

At the present time, I am working out a plan of counseling for all our students. An adequate counseling system is one of the most important aspects of a well-organized institution and one that has been generally neglected in all our colleges.

Aeronautics, Radio Communications

We are planning for the years ahead the introduction of two correlated groups of theoretical courses in Aeronautics and Radio Communications. These are being planned in cooperation respectively with the Palmetto Air School and Radio Station WSPA.

It is toward the perpetration of the imperishables and imponderables of the spirit that Lander College is dedicated. This is its "raison d'être." Standing today upon the threshold of a new peace, girded with seventy-three years of hallowed ministry to God and man, and with abounding faith, Lander College is ready for untrod paths of Christian leadership. Ours has already been termed the era of atomic energy. But if it be not fundamentally the era of Christian enlightenment and empowering, all other releases of energy bode nought but ill.

Because Christ is the Master of the church college we have hope, always hope of a better day for the college, both church and State, hope for a better society, the divine social order Christ came to establish. In Sir Walter Scott's study at Albstorf, visitors may see his journal with its last entry: "Tomorrow we shall . . ." Sir Walter wrote, but there he stopped. After the last entry of our faith and hope, our confidence is that by the power of God who works with us in our highest endeavors, tomorrow we shall enter into a larger life.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF YOUTH WORK

Many centuries ago Diogenes, the Greek philosopher, said, "The foundation of the State is in the education of its youth." The Christian education of youth today is imperative for the foundation of a Christian world in a post-war era; it must be increased and intensified so that millions more may be reached with religious training.

Much care, thought, study, prayer and planning have been given by the Youth Division of the Board of Education to the program of youth work in the Conference during the past year, in the effort to reach, stimulate, and to enlist for Christ the youth and adult workers.

It has been our purpose this year to serve as many local churches as possible, which we have been able to do by various kinds of service. Since, like many other conferences, we had to omit from our program the Assemblies and Institutes, we tried to take something of the Assembly inspiration to the local societies of youth.

The Director of Youth Work has taught courses for youth in nine training schools, thus reaching two or more hundred with Christian teaching.

Five weeks in the spring were spent visiting the sub-districts where twelve hundred or more were presented with the objectives in "Youth's Part in the Crusade for Christ" and the Methodist Youth Fund.

"Evangelism for Youth" was presented at the six District Preachers' Meetings the first of the year.

The Director has served in several local churches during Youth Activities Week and in Youth Revivals. She has been invited to speak at Workers' Council Meetings, Sub-district Meetings, and at Sunday morning and evening services, Youth Fellowship Meetings, and at various other occasions.

Five of the eight weeks of the Caravan service within the Conference the Director was Counselor for the Caravan team which so ably served Shandon, Abbeville, Newberry, North Augusta, Easley, Green Street, Columbia, and Pleasant Hill. One week was spent in training at Lake Junaluska. Three exceptionally strong, beautiful Christian young women brought new life and meaning to churches and their youth.

Various meetings of the Board of Education, of the Youth Conference Council, Student Conference and others have been attended.

Many youth and adult workers have sought aid and guidance through correspondence which is a further evidence of increased interest and concern.

This has been a full and rich year in the Master's service, and so I submit this report of the year's activities. I wish to acknowledge with sincere appreciation the loyal support and cooperation of all young people and their adult leaders who have worked so faithfully to promote the youth work throughout the Conference.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF CHILDREN'S WORK

It is our aim in the work of the Children's Division to better train teachers for their tasks and to help both children and teachers to grow in the Christian life.

In order to do this we have had a full year's activities for children's workers. There were thirteen specialized training classes for workers with children this year. The Director of Children's Work taught eight of these courses. Two hundred and twenty-three credits were earned. Special emphasis was given to the home and church. The course, "The Home and the Church Working Together for Children," was taught in seven places in our conference.

This year the Vacation Church School Institutes were held during the sub-district meetings in April and May. There were twenty-seven of these Institutes with an attendance of about 350. In addition to this, two-day Institutes were held at Columbia, Lander, and Winthrop Colleges. Many of these girls rendered effective service in Vacation Schools over our conference.

Reports from Vacation Church Schools have proved this to be a most successful year in this respect. A total of 155 schools were held with an enrollment of 7802. The Director worked in eight of these schools. We tried to make these Vacation Schools a vital part of the Crusade by using this opportunity to reach more children.

We were sorry that due to war conditions that our Christian Workers' Assembly had to be cancelled. But in view of this, we have made an effort to reach more local churches through personal contacts. Besides the sub-district meetings and the training schools, the Director has visited between 25 and 30 churches, speaking at Workers' Conferences, church services, teaching classes, and demonstrating with visual education.

Interest is increasing in our Fellowship of Study. We feel this is a very important way of helping children's workers grow. And we realize that only a growing teacher can successfully teach a growing child.

Much service has been rendered through the office of the Board of Education in correspondence, sending of material, and counseling.

Early in the year the Director spoke on "Evangelism with Children" at the six District Preachers' Meetings in our conference.

The Director is grateful for the opportunity of attending the Conference on Christian Education at Nashville, Conference on Recreation and Summer Agencies at Atlanta, and the Leadership School at Junaluska.

We are planning our program for next year in cooperation with The Crusade for Christ with the emphasis, "More Children—Better Teaching," giving special attention to evangelism with children. We pray that God may bless our efforts to better serve children, their parents, and their teachers.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ADULT WORK

Whatever may be said of the importance of our work with the various age groups in the Church, it is certain that the success of every Church endeavor is dependent on the Christian experience and consecration of adults. This brings the work with adults in the Church to a place of importance not heretofore realized. And, incidentally, it causes one who works in this field to recognize his limitations.

Since I serve a busy pastorate, my time as Director of Adult Work in the conference is very limited. I have thought it best to emphasize one particular phase of the work each year, rather than try the impossible, namely, to work in every area of adult work.

This year, since we held no summer assemblies, we could not have our Christian Workers' Assembly. Therefore, I have practically confined my work to training. One of our most serious responsibilities now is the preparation of the local church for the returning veterans. During this year I have taught the new course, "The Church and Demobilization," in four of our large area schools and in one charge class, reaching well over one hundred-fifty adults. I have also taught the course on Worship in another area school.

It is my fervent hope that the day will come in our conference when we can employ a full time worker with adults.

REPORT NO. 3REPORT OF STATE DIRECTOR OF METHODIST STUDENT
WORK

Since the last meeting of the Upper South Carolina Conference, the program of the Methodist Student Movement has been carried forward without interruption. Two "Retreats" of the state officers have been held, in November and April, at which time the activities of the state-wide program were planned. A newspaper for the Methodist students of South Carolina was one result of these "Retreats." The newspaper, "Student Stairways," was published during the last school year by the Washington Street Church Wesley Foundation and is being published during the current year by the Methodist girls of Lander College. The paper has fostered the state-wide program as well as offering a channel for the exchange of ideas and news among college campuses of the state.

The South Carolina Methodist Student Conference was held at Main Street Church, Greenwood, with Lander College as host, February 16-18. The number of delegates was limited to fifty by ODT regulations, but, in spite of this handicap, a very satisfactory conference was held under the leadership of the conference dean, Dr. C. F. Nesbitt. The conference speaker was Dr. Mack Stokes, of the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, and Dr. Henry Nelson Snyder was the banquet speaker. The following student officers were elected

for one year: Miss Adelaide Adams, Winthrop, president; James Smiley, The Citadel, vice-president; Curtis Gatlin, Newberry, secretary; Miss Nora White, Lander, treasurer; Miss Betty Lou Brockington, Carolina, publicity; Miss Beverly Carlisle, Winthrop, representative on the Upper South Carolina Conference Board of Education; J. O. Murray, Clemson, representative of the South Carolina Conference Board of Education; Miss Idonia Whittle, Columbia, representative from Upper South Carolina Conference on the Inter-Conference Commission on Student Work; Miss Anne Galloway, Columbia, representative from the South Carolina Conference on the Inter-Conference Commission.

Miss Adelaide Adams, president of the South Carolina Methodist Student Conference, attended the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, which met in August at Adrian, Michigan.

The Methodist Student Movement has attempted to strengthen the work with Methodist students on the campuses of South Carolina colleges. There are three Wesley Foundations in our state. Miss Caroline Cannon is director at Winthrop, Miss Anne Thomas is director at Washington Street Church (Columbia College and Carolina), and Rev. E. Wannamaker Hardin is director at Clemson. The Methodist student work on the other college campuses is under the leadership of faculty members who give freely of their time and talents in directing the activities of the Methodist students.

I. CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We earnestly commend to the Churches and Church Schools of our Conference our own Methodist Literature as being of the highest type to be found anywhere in our country and also as the best fitted to the program of the Methodist Church.

To this end we urge the wider circulation of The Southern Christian Advocate, The Christian Advocate, The Upper Room, The World Outlook, and our Methodist Church School literature.

2. THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Report of the Board of Managers

During the last conference year the Southern Christian Advocate has continued its effective service to all phases of the general program of the Church. Conference boards are finding the Advocate's columns a useful means of promoting the interests committed to their care. In this way the paper is serving week by week the causes of Education, Evangelism, Missions, Church Extension, Temperance, Finance, religious literature—in fact, every interest to which we as a Church are committed.

With reluctance we yielded to the wish of Dr. J. C. Guilds that,

after many years as weekly commentator on the Sunday School lesson, he be relieved of this work. He had rendered valuable service in this capacity and his many readers shared our regrets at his quitting. As successor to him, Professor W. W. Weber is doing an excellent piece of work in sustaining the recognized value of this column for spiritual and intellectual insight. A new column of quoted comments contributed by Rev. W. B. Garrison is enriching the paper and rapidly winning favor among our readers. The Crusade for Christ has been brought to the minds of our readers during the year through articles by members of our own conferences and by leaders of national and international reputation. Of no small value is the use our own people make of the paper for the exchange of information and for discussion of matters of peculiar and limited interest. In all these fields the Advocate is finding areas of useful service and feels it is thereby serving the Church and the Kingdom.

The circulation of the paper has suffered a decline of about 400 from that of last year. As of October 1, 1944, the figures are 11,164; for the same date this year, 10,741. This is a good circulation and our obligations for the faithful work in securing it are gratefully expressed to Bishop Purcell, the District Superintendents, and pastors.

Expense in the press room has been abnormally high this year. The cost of replacing worn out and broken machinery absorbed the normal net profits for the year. Our finances are, therefore, on practically the same level as they were last year.

For the ensuing conference year we respectfully recommend that:—

(1) An appropriation of \$1,500 be made to sustain the work of the Advocate. This is the amount appropriated for this purpose last year.

(2) Through the Advocate the Church take note of the service its young men and women gave in deciding the issues of the great war recently and happily ended. To this end we recommend that

(a) the 110th volume (1946) be officially named as "Memorial volume," and that

(b) the paper be sent for one year into every home that furnished a member to serve in uniform.

(c) the plans, heretofore discussed, to erect a building on the Advocate property be carried out with a dedicatory feature memorializing the sacrifice of our youth.

(d) To this end, we recommend that an intensive campaign be put on to raise an amount of \$100,000.00 to erect and furnish such a building and to care for pressing needs in the printing plant; that preliminary preparation for this campaign begin at once, the more intensive work being done between January 1, 1946, and the following March 15.

(e) We further recommend that each church accept as its part in the campaign the amount of \$7.50 for each of its members who was in uniform; of this amount \$1.50 be used to pay for one year's subscription to the paper for the family of each service man, and \$6.00 to be used in paying for the building.

(f) That a special memorial number of the Advocate be issued

during the year, containing the name of each church in the state with its service roll.

(3) That a circulation of 10% of the membership be accepted as the goal for the year, and that the efforts to reach this be made contemporaneously with the building campaign.

CONCERNING RACE RELATIONS DAY

Paine College at Augusta, Georgia, represents the historic efforts of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in helping to provide leaders for the Negro people. Throughout its long history it has served this purpose in a most interesting and constructive way. It is continuing to do this under the difficult conditions prevailing at the present time, serving not only as a training center but also as a laboratory of better relations between the white and colored people.

The work at Paine College is related to the Methodist Church through the Board of Missions and Church Extension. It is also listed as one of the institutions by the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church to receive funds secured through the observance of Race Relations Day. By agreement with this Board, Paine College is to cultivate the Upper South Carolina Conference and, if the conference approves, receive the offerings raised on this day.

Now, Therefore, Be it resolved by the Board of Education of the Upper South Carolina Conference that we urge the pastors of this conference to observe Race Relations Day, February tenth next, and wherever possible take a voluntary offering for Negro Work; and, further, that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these offerings to the Treasurer of the General Board of Education at Nashville ask that they be directed to the work at Paine College.

RESOLUTION, COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Resolved:

1. That a commission of twelve be named, to be known as The Commission on Higher Education, as follows: The Presidents of the three colleges, one member of the Board of Trustees of each of the colleges, and six others, three from each of the two Annual Conferences, to be appointed by the presiding Bishop, due care being given to the selection of both ministers and laymen. REPORT OF BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Another year has gone into the history of Methodism, and today we stand face to face with what might prove to be the most glowing year among all years of Methodist progress. Your Board of Evangelism is deeply conscious of the tremendous magnitude of the responsibilities which confront us as we come to launch this, the greatest phase of the Crusade for Christ, viz, the year of Evangelism.

We need not tell you that soul-winning is the primacy of the Church of God. Nor do we need advise you that we as a church have failed in a deplorable way to bring men to the saving knowledge of a redeeming Lord.

That much has been done in many particulars in by-gone years to enhance the work of the church is a source of genuine joy to us, but as long as men die in sin we can but be conscious of our appalling failure to evangelize. Need we say that it is not improbable that while we are about the prosecution of a great church program, we shall within the shadow of the church lose our own and the souls of people for whom we are responsible?

Whatever else may be said, to bring men to God is our one all absorbing concern.

To say that the ultimate end of every thing we do is to win people to Christ is to speak the truth, and yet it is possible that we shall become so general here that soul-winning as such may be buried beneath an avalanche of generalities so as to make personal evangelism the unknown quantity.

Methodism today faces the alternatives of going after the lost or losing her own soul and come to an inglorious end. Her destiny is now resting with us. She can not subsist upon her glorious past. Nor can she thrive upon day dreaming. Either she must revive the altar fires and perpetuate the spirit that made her a church or yield her place under the sun to a group of "Cults" who will go after people. To bemoan our loss of over 400,000 in a quadrennium is to confess a failure. Empty pews, the absence of prayer meetings, the growing decline in Church School attendance, the comparatively small number of accessions to the church; these and other things disturb us. To deny their existence in an effort to be optimistic is foolish; to be content is sin. As another has said, "Wreaking blood, crowded cemeteries, crying children, widows and orphans," are formidable pleaders. May we add, every soul held within the grip of sin; every human being who is held enthralled by wickedness cries out to Methodism for the hand of compassion.

To let them go by unnoticed, hence unserved, means that if Methodism fails to accept her God-given responsibility, God will raise up a Church which will respond.

Your Board of Evangelism earnestly solicits the assistance of every pastor and layman in the Conference to the end that every individual within the scope of our church responsibility shall be brought to know Christ as the Saviour from sin.

With impassioned zeal may our church go in the name of Christ the Redeemer.

May God grant us power as we, in his great name, push out into the deep this year.

We beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That in each and every organization through the Conference and local churches, soul-winning shall be, not only a point of emphasis but the dominant concern.

2. That, inasmuch as one of our chief problems is that which has to do with absentee members, we shall cooperate in the matter of assimilating the membership.

3. That Evangelistic Institutes be held in each district at the earliest possible date following this session of the annual conference.

4. That each pastor together with the aid of the Conference Board of Education and the Board of Evangelism, if practicable, have a school of Evangelism in his charge with a view of training his people in the art of soul-winning.

5. That an Evangelistic Clinic be held for all the preachers in one of the cities of this Conference, the time and place to be determined after consultation with the District Superintendents.

6. That the director of Evangelism, G. W. Burke, be appointed to

lead the work of the Crusade for Christ this year and that he be given clerical help.

7. That wherever possible, missions shall be established in non-churched areas, the Board of Evangelism working with District Superintendents and pastors of respective areas.

8. That the Conference order an appropriation of \$2,500 with which to finance the work of Evnagelism.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON GROUP INSURANCE

We report the death of four ministers during the year who were insured in our Group Policy. Their death claims amounted to \$5,500.

During the year we secured an increase of \$500 coverage on the lives of our members, giving us a maximum of \$2,500. We did this without asking for an increased appropriation from the Conference. Each minister getting the increase has to pay \$5.00 additional, with the premium costing \$25.00 each.

We recommend that the premium payments be made as follows: \$15.00 before January 1st and \$10.00 before July 1st. We ask all members who can conveniently do so to pay the full amount of \$25.00 at the beginning of the year. We urge all members to pay promptly, and advise that we can not carry an unpaid balance over from one year to another.

Your Commission recommends that the ministers of this Conference join in securing a Group Hospitalization policy, with all of the premiums to be paid by the participating ministers. Your Commission offers its services in effecting such a policy. We submit information and application blanks to the ministers of the Conference for their consideration. We specify that there is to be no connection between our life insurance policy with the Prudential Insurance Company and the hospitalization policy with some other Company.

We report all indebtedness for the year paid in full and a balance of \$1,663.60.

I respectfully submit the following report for Epworth Orphanage for the Conference year 1944-45.

We have cared for during the year 328 children. Our present enrollment is 276.

The health of our entire family has been excellent. All known preventive measures have been taken, and routine check-ups made on the physical condition of every child.

The educational and spiritual life of our children has received very careful and constant attention.

The work of the various departments has been carried on with a fair measure of success.

The farm, despite adverse weather conditions, has produced well. Besides producing a sufficient quantity of vegetables and food crops to supply the needs of our family, we have been able to sell a considerable number of hogs and quantities of milk, eggs and vegetables. From January 1st to date the sales from the farm have amounted to \$12,785.39. Of this amount \$7,890.19 was received from the sale of hogs.

Our people continue to give liberal support to the work at Epworth. Even though the Mother's Day offering this year was directed to our Building Fund, the total amount received from churches and church schools for this Conference year amounted of \$103,412.40. \$56,136.00 of this total was contributed on Annual Orphanage Day. The amount spent for maintenance was \$98,216.24.

We wish to express deep appreciation to our Bishop for his splendid cooperation and help; to our district superintendents and pastors for the service they have rendered the children at Epworth by keeping their needs constantly before our people. We are profoundly grateful to every contributor who has furnished the necessary funds with which to carry on at Epworth.

We would not close this annual report without thanking God for His loving kindness and tender care which have been over us throughout the year.

This is the fiftieth report of Epworth Orphanage made to an Annual Conference (the twenty-fifth made by me). We think it fitting that a brief review of the accomplishments of these fifty years be made at this time.

As you know, the present 30 acre campus was purchased in 1895, and also a nearby farm of 110 acres, for the total sum of \$6,600.00. \$5,700.00 of this was raised by the citizens of Columbia. Eighteen

years ago we sold the farm, and with a portion of the receipts bought a farm of 882 acres, six miles east of the city near Caughman's Pond. The balance of the money was placed in our Endowment Fund.

On the 30 acre campus, then about a mile beyond the city limits, there was only one building—a residence which was remodeled and named the "Coleman Home," in honor of R. L. Coleman who gave the first \$1,000.00 towards the establishment of Epworth.

The total value of the farm and campus has grown from \$6,600.00 to \$600,000.00.

The Orphanage began its work on January 20, 1896, when three orphan children were admitted. In all, Epworth has cared for more than 2,000 homeless, dependent children. I have been privileged to know personally and intimately 1,380 of them.

To tell the story of Epworth fully would be to tell the story of every one of these lives which were found, in most cases, homeless and neglected, by you ministers here today and your predecessors who served the Methodist Church in South Carolina since 1896. Numbers of these children ate their first square meal, heard the first kind word spoken, learned their first prayers, heard their first Bible story, and owned their first Bible at Epworth.

Methodism in South Carolina during the past half century has taken many forward steps and has accomplished much, but it is my honest opinion that in no department of our church work have we accomplished more for the Kingdom of God than in taking these hundreds of homeless, helpless, dependent children, and giving them physical care, mental and spiritual guidance, and placing their feet upon the highroad of life. The road ahead for most of them was completely blocked. Through the help of faithful men and women, both living and dead, the barriers were removed and these orphan children were sent on their way with strength and training enough to cope with the difficulties which they, like all of us, have met on the upward road.

During these fifty years Methodist men and women, boys and girls, have contributed to the work at Epworth. Think not of these dollars as being gifts to some indefinite, though worthy, object. But rather think of them as being invested in human life, in the eternal co-human character. Helpless little hands were extended for much needed help. All along through the years Godly men and women and children have responded to their pleas. In every nook and corner of South Carolina, in every state of the Union, and in every part of the globe, strong, upright, God-fearing men and women who know no home save Epworth are rendering their full measure of service as citizens and as soldiers. Every dollar invested in the boys and girls who have passed through Epworth during the past half century has produced dividends too great to be calculated by any interest table. None of us know accurately the value of human life. It may be that any one of the two thousand children who have been cared for at Epworth is worth every penny that has been invested in the institution for these fifty years. Surely if that child were mine he would be worth all that, and more. If you invest in the stock of any commercial or industrial enterprise you do so with considerable un-

certainty as to the value your stock will have in the future. In fact, it may become altogether worthless. However, if you invest in the stock of youth you can't lose, for human values never will decline as long as time shall last, and will reach their peak in eternity.

For the last fifty years Epworth has made a large contribution to the state, to society, and to the Kingdom of God, through its service to the dependent orphan child. We have large plans for the future for rendering greater service to a larger number. Dr. Gunter, our Field Representative, will have a report on the progress of these plans.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Dear Brethren:

We wish to report on the activities of your Board during the past year. Though we have been handicapped to some extent on account of curtailment in transportation, we have had a busy year and much has been accomplished in all six districts in furthering the cause of the Church and cooperating in the promotion of its program. Harmony and a fine spirit have characterized our Board membership and the contribution that we may have made has been due to a singleness of purpose on the part of each member.

We had a splendid observance of Laymen's Day again this year. Though it was not one hundred per cent perfect throughout all the churches, we feel that this goal was nearer realized during the year than it has ever been before. The subject as suggested by the General Board was: "The Church Meeting Its Responsibility: for Ministerial Supply to the Homeland, to the World," a very fitting subject to

be used in promoting the spirit of the Crusade. During the coming year the subject will be "Evangelism" and we take this opportunity to urge both minister and layman alike to the united effort of a conference-wide observance of the day to the end that the subject matter of the program may permeate the congregation of each local church.

We have been vitally interested in the finances of our Church and have not missed an opportunity of assisting in every way possible in the various money raising campaigns that are so necessary to the growth and progress of the Church. It has been especially gratifying to note the increasing number of church debts that have been liquidated during these prosperous days along with the plans and preparations that are being made for new or improved church buildings that will soon be under way when necessary materials become available.

But even more have we watched with interest the growing increase in the contributions that have been made to World Service. Our Board has been deeply interested in this particular phase of the Church program and few opportunities have been lost in cultivating a responsive attitude on the part of our people towards an increase of "Acceptances."

The Crusade for Christ has been and continues to be Methodism's all-inclusive schedule of accomplishment in our Conference as it does throughout the Church. The Board of Lay Activities is on record in an enthusiastic and unanimous endorsement of every feature of the program. In those phases that were first considered and that have reached such a successful fruition, our Board endeavored to make its contribution. Our pledge is now renewed that we will continue to work in a cooperative way, putting forth our combined efforts when and wherever our service may best be used to the end that this program shall be a Crusade in deed and in truth and not merely another campaign.

The growth of the Sunday school, both in numbers and in usefulness, shall have our attention and active support, not only for the period of the Crusade, but throughout the succeeding years that are to follow. We deeply appreciate the importance of a revival of interest and concern in this, one of the most important agencies in the life of the Church.

Too, we are looking forward to 1947, when the matter of stewardship cultivation and promotion shall be our responsibility and opportunity to render a distinct service to the Kingdom during that period of the Crusade. Already preparations are being made and plans formulated by our General Board so that when the time arrives we shall be ready to accomplish the task that has been assigned to us.

Though we feel that substantial progress has been made in our work, we are conscious of the fact that there is much to be done. Kingdom service never paid more attractive dividends than at the present time. We earnestly enlist the devoted and whole hearted support of our Church loving people everywhere in the continuous

effort of achieving a world order based on those lasting principles that characterize the life and teachings of the Son of Man.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE REPORT

The war now ending has brought a new material power greatly exceeding anything known before. Its limited employment for destructive purposes has left mankind aghast, illustrating once more that material forces are hostile to life unless brought under humane control.

It is a time to recall that man was made to have dominion over the works of God's hands who has put all things in subjection under his feet.

We believe that Temperance is the means to that end, dealing broadly with control of material forces for better living for all peoples, by teaching to handle them skillfully, to think about them justly and to discover their beneficial uses; that the nation which first becomes pre-eminent in the control of this new force will be the

nation which establishes Temperance among its people; and that this belief is justified by the recent experiences of nations that have thought and practiced otherwise.

We do not limit the operation of Temperance to the use of beverage alcohol, but we consider that it would be unwise to disregard the relation between increasing consumption of beverage alcohol and increasing social disintegration which is manifesting itself in juvenile delinquency, disrupted domestic relations, crimes of dishonesty and violence, low esteem of public office and public trust, the spread of special privilege, the inability of opposing interests affecting the public to compose their differences short of breakdown into non-function or violence, the impairment of basic Christian institutions such as the home, marriage, and the Sabbath.

We emphasize as probable results of the identical causes the indifference of ruling political factions, local, state and national, to the social injury that is coincident with increasing beverage alcohol consumption. While immense public revenues roll in from a business that makes thousands victims of the disease of chronic alcoholism, little if any of that revenue is being devoted to discovery and removal of the underlying causes of the disease, or to the treatment and rehabilitation of the sick, or to the regulation, restriction and eventual outlawing of the trade in the injurious materials.

We urge close scrutiny of the attempted defense of what is called moderate drinking of beverage alcohol. It is said that any habitual user may at any time become a compulsive drinker, not as a result of duration of use or quantity used but because of his or her susceptibility to damage. If so-called moderate use may lead to compulsive drinking, we hold that it is not defensible.

We lay emphasis on the spreading relation between government and the commerce in socially disintegrating influences, which is applying with success the strategy of making government its partner in business. This is accomplished through the representatives of the people by directing into the public treasury such a substantial income from taxes upon the business as to induce government to condone and even to promote it rather than restrict and remove the cause of social injury.

Recent high official comment has called attention to South Carolina statutes under which taxation now exacts millions annually from the public as a tribute to the liquor trade, while nothing is provided for defense against its evils. This is the same people who once said to another enemy, "Millions for defense but not one cent for tribute."

The resort to this strategy of a common interest in taxation is national in scope and is not limited to the beverage alcohol industry. It has become the strategy also of race track gambling. A recent editorial in a popular national weekly stated that one and a quarter billion dollars was bet on horse racing in 1944 and that there would be more in 1946; that the legal status of horse racing has been put beyond argument by "cutting government in on the take;" that "nineteen states, having legalized pari-mutuel machines, now depend on

tax revenue from this source to the extent of some \$60,000,000 a year;" which was described as a "standard of fiscal morality." This is the system of public revenue that was repudiated long ago along with the public lottery because it is profoundly immoral and destructive of democracy, because it induces government to encourage that which government should control and destroy for the public good.

While divorce is sanctioned in every other state and authorities announce a national average of one divorce for every five marriages, South Carolina continues to grant no divorce. But there are militant advocates of change in the law in South Carolina. They can give no assurance that the evils which exist in divorce states will not prevail in South Carolina if change is made, or that there would be any less domestic instability. The attempted relief of some individuals from unhappiness of uncertain cause will be undertaken at disproportionate cost if thereby the evils of commercialized divorce are imported into South Carolina.

We regret the doubts that some church members entertain with reference to regulatory law. The liquor trade has promoted propaganda against all restriction of its activities. Its design has been to bring the conception of regulatory law into disrepute. It appears to seek a freedom that is not under the law. It would be a law unto itself.

It should be remembered that prohibitory law is one of the oldest agencies for modifying human conduct. It is first encountered in earliest memorable experience, fortified by a switch or the back of a hair brush. The prohibitions of Sinai are fundamental in our civilization which is the hope of the world today, which admits them to be valid after four thousand years. The device is as old as the distinction between the right things that promote life and the wrong things that tend to retard and destroy it. Justice has always carried the sword as well as the balances.

It should also be remembered that no prohibitory law has ever achieved perfection; that this long after Sinai men still worship strange gods and steal and kill; that democratic regulation for the common good is always unpopular with the influential individual to whom might is right; and that "every principle of law which obtains had first to be wrung by force from those who denied it."

We believe that beverage alcohol is the inveterate foe of religion for the reason that it deadens the delicate moral governors which are the agents of the spirit.

It is encouraging that science is directing its powers towards solution of the beverage alcohol problem. We commend to inquiry the work of the School of Studies on Alcohol at Yale University. Its publications are making available lectures and articles by its faculty and others eminent in science. A similar school in Juniata College in Pennsylvania held its first session this year.

Faithful work under great difficulty has gone forward by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the South Carolina Council on Alcohol Education, the Federated Forces for Temperance and Law

Enforcement and the new organization called Alcoholics Anonymous which has published a book of deep insight and high purpose. Other organizations and many individuals are carrying on and are ready for concerted advance.

The Lord is in his holy temple. It is according to nature that social injury brings social discomfit. The mounting yield of social damage from beverage alcohol is even now weighing with depressing heaviness upon the people as time increases the aggregate of that damage. The reckoning is approaching.

The scientific approach to the problem of beverage alcohol may be indispensable. An effective program of education in the schools is a vital objective. But nothing can dispense with the contribution which the church alone can make. Nor can the church be effective without concert of its entire resources lay and clerical. Its aid is especially needed by those whom life's pressures have driven to the lesser false encouragements because they have had no experience with the true riches of the spirit which religion alone can reveal.

We urge organization in each church and church school for the cause of Temperance in accordance with the Discipline, realizing that we are facing two opposing masters and that this is the day of decision.

Nothing will, or indeed can, promote the cause of Temperance more than a vigorous and sustained program of evangelism throughout the church. We quote a recent statement: "It is faith in the living God which has accounted for more recoveries from the disease of alcoholism than all the other therapeutic agencies put together."

BY-LAWS, BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

Article I.—Membership

Membership of the Board of Trustees of the Upper South Carolina Conference shall consist of such members and for such terms of office as prescribed by the Discipline of The Methodist Church.

Article II.—Meetings

1. The annual meeting of the said Trustees shall be held during the period of the Annual Conference of the Upper South Carolina Conference on such dates and places as may be designated by the Chairman.

2. Special meetings of the said Trustees or any Committees thereof may be held on call of the Chairman at such place or places as he

may designate at any time or upon written request of a majority of the said Board.

3. Notices of meetings shall be written and mailed to the respective members of the Board or Committees thereof with such advance notice as may be practical. No failure of or irregularity of notices of any regular or call meetings shall invalidate such meetings on any proceeding thereat.

4. A quorum at any meeting of the said Board shall consist of a majority of the members thereof. A majority of such quorum shall decide any question that may come before the meeting.

5. The order of business at the annual meeting and as far as possible at all other meetings of the Board shall be:

1. Calling of roll
2. Reading and disposal of any unapproved minutes
3. Annual reports of Officers and Committees.
4. Election of Officers
5. Unfinished business
6. New business
7. Adjournment.

Article III.

Business and property of the Board shall be under the control and management of the said Board unless by a majority on motion duly recorded, the same may be referred to Committees duly elected or appointed. Any vacancies of such Committee or Committees may be filled by the Chairman for the unexpired term. No member of the Board or any officer thereof shall receive compensation for their services as such except as hereinafter provided.

IV.—Officers

1. Officers of the Board shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, a Treasurer, who shall be elected for one year and shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

2. The Chairman shall preside at all meetings, shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Board, shall sign or countersign all contracts, checks and other instruments of the Board for which he is duly authorized and shall perform all such other duties as are incident to his office or are properly required of him by the Board of Trustees. In the absence or disability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall exercise all his functions.

3. The Secretary shall issue notices for all meetings of the Board or Committees thereof, shall attend and keep their minutes, shall have charge of the Board's books, records and all papers, instruments of writing pertaining thereto, shall sign with the Chairman such instruments as require such signature and shall make such reports and perform such other duties as are incident to his office or are properly required of him by the Board.

4. The Treasurer shall have custody of all funds and securities of the Board, shall indorse for collection all checks, notes and other ob-

ligations payable to the Board and deposit the same to the credit of the Board of Trustees of the Upper South Carolina Conference in such bank as the Finance Committee may designate, shall sign all receipts and vouchers for payments made to the Board jointly with the Chairman. He shall sign all checks, bills of exchange and other instruments in writing. He shall keep full, true, and accurate accounts and records of all moneys and securities received and paid to or by him on account of the Board and render statements thereof annually and whenever required by the said Board. He shall give a surety bond for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum and in such company as the Board may require.

Article V.—Finances

1. The moneys, funds, and securities of the Board shall be deposited in such bank or depository as the said Board may designate and be withdrawn therefrom by checks duly signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the Chairman of the said Board.

2. Surplus funds of the said Board may be invested in such loans, securities or real properties and under such conditions as may be approved by the Finance Committee.

Article VI.—Committees

The Chairman of the Board shall appoint the following Committees:

1. A Finance Committee, consisting of not less than three and not more than five members whose duties it shall be to supervise the expenditure and investment of all funds belonging to the Board provided loans from surplus funds may be made only on the security of a first lien, upon the home or combination of home and business property or business property, provided no such loan shall exceed sixty-five (65%) per cent of the appraised value of the property offered as security for said loan. The Board shall not make any loan to any member of this Board.

Loans upon the security of real estate shall be made only upon written application of the borrower setting forth the amount and terms desired, the security offered and such other information as the Finance Committee may deem necessary.

No loan shall be made upon the security of real estate until at least two qualified persons selected by the Finance Committee shall have submitted a signed appraisal of the real estate offered as security for such loan.

The Finance Committee shall be charged with the duty and responsibility of submitting annually and at such times between annual meetings as may be necessary for the information of the Board on request of Chairman a complete audit of all trust funds, securities or moneys of any kind belonging to or under the control of the Annual Conference and administered by this Board, which said audit shall be made by an Accountant preferably a Certified Public Accountant chosen by the said Finance Committee and the findings of such audit shall be published in the Conference Minutes.

2. A Real Estate Committee consisting of not less than three and not more than five members shall be appointed by the Chairman whose duties it shall be to have charge and supervision of all real estate owned or controlled by the said Board of Trustees.

3. The Chairman of the Board shall appoint such additional committee or committees as the workings of the Board may require

The Chairman of the Board shall be ex officio member of all committees of the said Board and shall preside at meetings thereof, but shall not be entitled to vote on any questions under consideration except in the case of a tie vote.

Article VII.

Any clauses, or sentences or provisions of these By-Laws that may be inconsistent with the Discipline of The Methodist Church shall be invalidated and the provisions of the said Discipline shall control, but such invalidation of the section, sentences or provisions of these By-Laws shall not, in any manner be construed as, effect the remaining articles or the sub-divisions thereof.

These By-Laws may be amended or invalidated at any regular meeting of the said Board provided that notice of such amendment or invalidation shall be filed with the Secretary of the said Board prior to any regular meeting and ten days notice of such shall, together with a copy of the proposed change or changes, be mailed to each member of the Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Realizing the great need for closer unity in developing the rural constituency the Commission on Town and Country Work wishes to recommend:

First, that in the year of Evangelism in the Crusade for Christ continued emphasis be placed on evangelism among the boys and girls, youth and adults in the homes and through the Sunday school and from the pulpit. That in order to make this effort effective the Commission on Town and Country Work has approved a survey to be made before January 1 relating definitely to the needs of the town and rural churches.

We urge each rural minister to cooperate by filling out survey sheets which will be furnished, and replying promptly so that further steps may be taken on the information gained from the survey.

The Commission on Town and Country Work will promote a series of district wide rural institutes in each district during February, conducted by Dr. A. J. Walton, to which all pastors of Town and Country churches and all rural laymen are invited.

The Commission on Town and Country Work further recommends that Town and Country ministers investigate and follow as far as possible the Group Ministers Plan as approved by our Church. And that as far as possible rural ministers within easy driving distance plan for group meetings in rural churches using fifth Sundays or other available dates for such meetings.

As far as it is feasible it was suggested that laymen from town and city churches make themselves available as speakers in rural churches.

The Commission on Town and Country Work would be very grateful for the cooperation of all of the Boards as outlined in Paragraph 1232 of the Discipline.

**COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE
REPORT NO. 4**

Information and Recommendations

1. The apportionment for Episcopal Fund is an amount equal to 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent of the pastor's salary.
2. In order to equalize the load of World Service and Conference work apportionments to the ability of the charges to pay, to enable the weaker charges to more adequately support their pastors and at the same time to enlarge our total giving to benevolences, we recommend:
 - (a) That special offerings be kept to a minimum and earnestly request no quotas be suggested; that major emphasis be placed on the acceptance and payment of full askings on World Service and Conference apportionments.
 - (b) That World Service Sunday offerings be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, and that such offerings be applied on the acceptances.
3. That the District Superintendent, when making apportionments to the several charges, take into consideration the pastor's salary for the last Conference year and the membership reported to the last Annual Conference and let these be the bases for the apportionments.
4. That the District Superintendents appoint a committee of at least six members, one-half of whom shall be ministers and the other half laymen from the Board of District Stewards, who shall assist the District Superintendent in making any adjustments in the apportionments which seem fair and just.
5. In accordance with the Discipline, the Commission recommends that the treasurer of each Board be bonded for an adequate amount and that the bonds be deposited with the president of the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference.
6. The Commission recommends that the apportionment to the Clemson College Church be paid by the Conference Treasurer directly to the Church Treasurer instead of to the pastor, as formerly.
7. It has been brought to the attention of this Commission that some of our ministers are delinquent in the payment of premiums to Group Insurance. The Commission recommends that in the future, any minist-

ter who is delinquent for a period of 90 days be automatically dropped from the group.

8. The Commission recommends that the Conference Treasurer pay the amounts apportioned for the General Administrative Fund and for Jurisdictional Fund on a percentage basis as are other items in the General and Conference Budget.

9. The total budget for World Service, General Administrative Fund, Jurisdictional Fund and Conference Work, distributed by districts, is as follows:

11. (a) That an assessment be made for Conference Claimants that will net \$41,720.00 to be distributed to the Claimants.

(b) That one-half of one per cent for the Stabilization Fund to be used by the Missouri Corporation is included in the above figures.

(c) That a Veteran's Day offering be taken December 16 or 23 and the amount received shall be applied on the apportionment to the charge for Conference Claimants.

The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends:

1. That \$4,500.00 be fixed as the salary of each district superintendent for the conference year.
2. That \$500.00 be fixed as the amount allocated to each district superintendent in order to provide for his travel and office expenses for the conference year.
3. That for the conference year 1945-1946, apportionments for the District Superintendents' Fund be distributed to the several districts and charges on a basis of 3.12 per cent of the total funds raised in the several charges during the conference year 1943-1944, exclusive of funds raised for building and improvement purposes and for the payment of debt (principal) on church and parsonage buildings and grounds.
4. That the Treasurer of the Conference, as far as practicable, remit monthly to each district superintendent one twelfth of his annual salary, and one twelfth of his annual travel and office expense, provided that the twelfth payment of his salary and expenses be made at the close of the conference year.
5. That the treasurer of the Conference be granted authority by the Conference to borrow the funds necessary to make the above payments possible.
6. That the treasurers of the several charges remit to the treasurer of the Conference, monthly if practicable but at least immediately after each Quarterly Conference, the funds raised for the District Superintendents' Fund.

**RESOLUTION
EPWORTH ORPHANAGE**

Be it Resolved:

1. That we record our conviction that Epworth Orphanage can and will meet with complete success in her efforts to secure a renewed and enlarged physical plant to cost from \$400,000.00 to \$500,000.00.
2. That our laymen in every district be given an opportunity to make liberal contributions to this building fund during the next two months: November and December, 1945, thus taking advantage of a tax situation which enables them to give liberally with less actual cost to themselves than will be possible in 1946.
3. Since it will be manifestly impossible for the Field Representative to furnish the leadership necessary to contact these laymen in all districts of the two Conferences in so short a time, that the responsibility for setting up such meetings and arranging for solicitations be primarily in the hands of district superintendents, the Field Representative giving all possible aid in each district.
4. The total goal will call for an average district contribution approximating \$40,000.00, hence we suggest that this figure be set as a minimum goal in every district, it being understood that all building funds received from individuals and from Mother's Day offerings be credited on each respective district goal.

**RESOLUTION
PARSONAGES AND PARSONAGE FURNISHINGS**

Passed at Conference of 1944

Because of the well-nigh unavoidable inconveniences to the Methodist ministers' families and the local parsonage committees at moving time, we, the P. W. (Pastors' Wives) Club of the Spartanburg District, wish to present the following resolutions regarding the furnishings of the parsonage by the local church:

Whereas, there seems to exist an earnest desire on the part of both parties concerned to arrive at a more definite understanding as to the articles of furniture which shall be found in every Methodist parsonage.

Be it resolved:

- First, that the parsonage building be in good repair, with running water and sewerage; and with facilities for heating each room.
- Second, that a certain amount of money be put in the church budget to be used for repairs and upkeep of the building.
- Third, that the parsonage be furnished with rugs and all the necessary heavy furniture, including a modern cook stove, electric refrigerator, or its equivalent, and comfortable beds with either new or renovated mattresses.

Fourth, that good, workable shades be at the windows, and a monetary provision be made for the purchase of curtains.

Fifth, that the minister's family shall furnish their own bed covering, pillows, linen, silver, china, cooking utensils, baby bed, and all other personal items desired for their comfort.

Finally we, the pastors' wives of the Spartanburg District, pledge ourselves to take care of our parsonage homes and furnishings to the best of our ability; and to leave both homes and premises clean when moving.

Note: The above resolutions were formulated by a committee composed of Mrs. Francis T. Cunningham, Mrs. L. L. Hardin, Mrs. Henry T. Gramling, and Mrs. W. Harry Chandler. They were then approved by the Pastors' Wives Club of Spartanburg District; and they were presented to, and unanimously endorsed by, the annual conference last November, in Greenwood.

STANDING RULES

Organization and Procedure

The Conference shall convene at the hour appointed by the Bishop the first day, and at the hour decided upon by the Conference on the other days. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall conclude the opening devotions.

In parliamentary practice the rules of the General Conference shall be followed as far as practicable in the proceedings of the Annual Conference.

All reports of boards and committees and all resolutions shall be in triplicate.

All notices shall be handed to the secretary and shall be read by him at the proper time.

The Conference Statistician shall procure and distribute to the pastors suitable blanks for making reports to the Conference Treasurer and the Statistician. Reports of the pastors shall be handed to the Conference Statistician not later than the first morning session of the Conference.

There shall be an Historical Society organized according to the Discipline of The Methodist Church. The Conference Committee on Program shall provide a place on the Program of the Annual Conference for the meeting of the Historical Society. A morning hour is preferable, or the evening preceding the first morning session of the Conference.

The District Superintendents shall furnish the Statistician a copy of the askings and acceptances of the various charges of the districts when so requested by the Statistician.

There shall be held annually a District Conference in each district. In addition to the provisions made by the Discipline, there shall be two delegates to the District Conference from each pastoral charge elected by the Quarterly Conference. The president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in each local church shall be a member of the District Conference. Delegates to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Quarterly Conferences of their respective charges.

Salaries of the District Superintendents shall be fixed and distributed to the pastoral charges of the districts by the District Stewards. On this basis the Quarterly Conference shall pay the salaries of District Superintendents.

Boards and Committees

The District Superintendents shall constitute a committee on nominations. All quadrennial boards and committees shall be elected or appointed at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference. Committees ordered by the conference shall be appointed by the chair unless otherwise specified.

At the session of the Annual Conference next preceding the General Conference a committee of seven shall be appointed to whom shall be referred all memorials, resolutions, and suggestions, properly com-

ing before the General Conference, or the Jurisdictional Conference. This committee shall recommend to the Annual Conference the disposition to be made of all memorials, resolutions, and suggestions referred to it. This shall be a Committee on Memorials.

At the session of the Annual Conference next preceding the General Conference a committee composed of two delegates to the succeeding General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference, and one other clerical member shall be appointed by the Bishop. This committee shall be a Committee on Standing Resolutions, and is instructed to study existing standing resolutions, and make any revisions required by the action of the said General Conference. All resolutions or motions affecting our Standing Rules shall be referred to this committee for their study and recommendation. This Committee shall report to the Annual Conference succeeding the General Conference.

The following Annual Conference Committees shall serve for one year:

Public Worship, District Conference Journals, Sabbath Observance, and Accepted Supply Pastors.

The Committee on Conference Entertainment shall consist of the District Superintendents.

The Committee on Accepted Supply Pastors shall have six members selected from the Committee on Ministerial Training and the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Conference Board of Ministerial Training shall have six members.

The Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications shall have twelve members.

The Annual Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension shall consist of one layman from each district and an equal number of ministers, and five at large, and two young men and two young women nominated by the Annual Conference Youth Organization, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the members of of the General Board residing within the bounds of the Annual Conference.

The Annual Conference Board of Education shall consist of one layman from each district and an equal number of ministers, and four youth members as provided for in the Discipline.

The Annual Conference Board of Temperance shall consist of twelve ministers and laymen as follows: Two men, two women, and two young people under twenty-five years of age, and six ministers.

There shall be an Annual Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes composed of three ministers and four laymen, two of whom shall be women, and any member of the General Board residing within the bounds of the Conference.

There shall be an Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism consisting of the District Superintendents, one pastor and one lay member from each of the districts, such members of the Jurisdictional Board as may reside within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the Secre-

tary of the Spiritual Life of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

The Annual Conference Board of Conference Claimants shall have twelve members, viz, six ministers and six laymen, elected according to the provisions of the Discipline.

Boards of Trust and Management

No one shall serve on two boards of trust or management at the same time.

In the Conference Board of Education there shall be a section designated as The Committee on Nominations for Schools and Colleges. No member of a board of trustees or of a college faculty shall serve on this committee.

Memoirs

District Superintendents are requested to appoint suitable persons to prepare memoirs of ministers and ministers' wives who have died during the year. These persons are to be appointed in the interim of the Annual Conferences, and with the chairman shall constitute a Committee on Memoirs. The Committee on Memoirs is requested to limit the memoirs of ministers to five hundred words, and memorials of deceased wives of ministers to one hundred words each. A Memorial Service shall be provided for by the Program Committee of the Annual Conference. This service shall be presided over by the Bishop, or by an elder appointed by him. All memoirs and memorials read at this service shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference unless otherwise ordered.

The Southern Christian Advocate

The four members of the Board of Managers of the Southern Christian Advocate to be elected by this Conference, shall be elected quadrennially upon the nomination of the Conference Committee on Nominations. One new clerical and one new lay member of this Board of Managers shall be elected quadrennially. The management of the Southern Christian Advocate is requested to send to each pastor every six months the mailing list of the subscribers of his charge.

Orphanage Days

The Conference requests that each church school set apart one Sunday in each month as Orphanage Sunday and that a collection be taken on that Sunday for Epworth Orphanage. The Conference also requests that two days of special emphasis be observed for the support of the Orphanage, Mother's Day and Annual Orphanage Day.

Conference Program Committee

The Bishop is requested to appoint a Committee on Program for the Annual Conference in advance of the session of the conference, and the committee is requested to print the program in The Southern

Christian Advocate at least thirty days before the meeting of the conference.

Each pastor is urged to consult with the official family of his church in the formation of the program for the conference year. In this way the program can be made a means to an end; namely, meeting the deep needs of the people of the congregation and the people of the community for whom the church is responsible.

MEMOIRS

JOSEPH LUTHER DANIEL

Born of goodly parentage, and being the son of James W. and Eliza Anderson Daniel of Mt. Gallagher, Laurens County, Joseph Luther Daniel was destined to become one of the outstanding ministers of Methodism in South Carolina. He was born August 16, 1867, and had the very best educational advantages of his day. Endowed with a keen intellect he soon manifested his ability as a scholar in school and college. After finishing high school, he entered the Sub-Collegiate Department of Wofford College in January, 1889. The following year he entered the college proper and graduated in 1891 with an enviable record, having made distinction in every study in every department, every year he was there. He was the only member of his class that made such a record.

Dr. Daniel joined the Methodist Church at the age of thirteen and was genuinely converted six years later in a revival meeting. At the time he was planning to study medicine, but the Divine Call to preach was so clear and strong that he had to abandon the idea of practicing medicine. He strove to compromise the matter by working in Sunday schools and prayer meetings, but there was no peace until he unconditionally surrendered and accepted the work divinely allotted him. He was licensed to preach in Seneca in 1887 at the age of twenty. Graduating from Wofford College in 1891, he taught school for one year and was then admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference in 1892; ordained a deacon in 1894, and an elder in 1897. He served the following charges: Bucksville Circuit; Centenary; Seneca and Walhalla; Cokesbury Circuit; Lowndesville Station; Summerville Station; Mullins Station; Grace, Union; (Upper South Carolina Conference after 1914) Main Street, Abbeville; Central, Newberry; First Church, Lancaster; Buford Street, Gaffney; Batesburg; Greer Memorial; First Church, Winnsboro; Retired 1933.

Dr. Daniel was not only a good pastor, but was also a strong and earnest preacher. With keen and analytical mind he thought things and situations through to their logical and ultimate conclusions. After having arrived at such conclusions, he had deep and abiding convictions and would unhesitatingly and fearlessly stand by them, though he might be in the minority. He was generous and liberal toward others in their convictions and beliefs and never tried to force his own upon them. He had great respect for personality wherever it was found, whether in high or low, rich or poor, learned or unlearned. He was a man who detested sham or hypocrisy in any shape or form. He was often plain spoken in his rebukes and denunciations of the various forms of evils, but always there was the tone of love and sympathy toward those who were caught in the throes of sin. In his preaching he always sought to turn men from the ways of death to the ways of light and life. Thus he pointed men to Jesus with a moral and spiritual earnestness and clarity which few men

possessed. It is no wonder therefore, that he always carried good reports each year to Conference, touching every phase of the church's program.

Our Annual Conference has made large use of the talents of this gifted man, by placing him on many important boards, committees, and commissions. On each of them he served with marked ability. Erskine College honored herself by conferring upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1920.

It was at the Annual Conference, meeting in Newberry in 1923, that I first met Dr. Daniel. He was on the Committee on Admission for Applicants into our Conference, and I was an Applicant. I remember him very distinctly as he inquired about the fitness and qualifications of each one of us. He was kind, considerate, and sympathetic as he counseled with us about the High Calling of the ministry of our Lord. He had an exalted conception of it himself and desired most earnestly that his younger brethren would likewise exalt it.

Dr. Daniel was thoroughly grounded in those great, fundamental, and cardinal doctrines of our holy religion. His preaching showed painstaking preparation. Not only were his sermons characterized by clarity of thought and expression, but also showed evidence of prayer and the presence of the Holy Spirit.

On December 24, 1891, Dr. Daniel was happily married to Miss Lula Smith, daughter of Dr. John R. and Mary Cowan Smith, of Laurens County. To this union were born two children, Dr. J. McTyeire Daniel of the University of South Carolina, and Frances Marion (Mrs. S. C. Paysinger) of Newberry. These, with the beloved widow and three grandchildren, remain to mourn his earthly passing.

For forty-one years our friend and beloved brother was an active minister in this state, and eleven more years a retired minister. Thus for more than half a century he was a Methodist minister. During the latter years his health had gradually failed him, until at last, God called him to "a land of pure delight where saints immortal reign." The end came in the Providence Hospital in Columbia, December 2 1944.

Funeral services were conducted from the daughter's home in Newberry, 11 A. M., December 4th, by the Revs. L. P. McGee, T. C. Cannon, H. C. Ritter, and J. A. Estes; the latter being the pastor of the First Baptist church.

REV. J. M. STEADMAN

John Marcellus Steadman, son of Col. J. M. and Henrietta A. Spann Steadman, was born May 15, 1866, in Lexington County, S. C. He was of sturdy Scotch-Irish ancestry who bore their part in the American revolution.

After the usual preparatory training in the common schools of the country he attended Leesville College under the presidency of the late Rev. John Emory Watson, who at that time was among the state's great teachers. These school and college days marked only the beginning of his education. He was a diligent and painstaking student all his after life or as long as his health permitted. He took his A. M. degree from Wofford College; he took the Chautauqua Course; and also a course in New Testament Greek, and English Bible in the Boston Correspondence School of Theology.

Brother Steadman was licensed to preach by the Leesville Quarterly Conference July 19, 1885. He was received on trial into the South Carolina Conference the following December in Columbia. His classmates were E. B. Loyless, A. F. Berry, E. O. Watson, T. C. O'Dell, J. F. Anderson, A. M. Attaway, T. C. Ligon, W. I. Herbert, John Owen and D. A. Calhoun. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop H. N. McTyeire at Spartanburg in 1887, and was ordained Elder by Bishop John C. Keener at Camden in 1889. He served the following charges: Junior preacher on the Newberry Circuit, with M. M. Brabham, 1886; Parkville Mission 1887-8; Greenwood Station 1889; McCormick 1890-93; Lancaster Station 1894-95; Cumberland Mission, Charleston, 1896-99; Yorkville Station 1900; Lancaster Station 1901-2; Buford Street, Gaffney, 1903-05; St. George Station 1906-09; St. Matthews Circuit 1910-13; Clemson College 1914-17; (Upper S. C. Conference 1915) First Church, Laurens, 1918; Greenville District 1919-22; Central Newberry, 1923-26; Edgefield and Trenton, 1927-30. His last appointment was Leesville 1931-33. Here he closed his 48 years of active ministry, at the same place where he was licensed to preach.

Brother Steadman's ability and splendid judgment were recognized by his appointment to Boards and Committees of responsibility. He served eight years on the Committee of Examination, four years on the Board of Education and was secretary of the Legal Conference ten years.

A writer of unusual strength he prepared the Sunday School Lesson for the Southern Christian Advocate and Epworth Orphanage Record for some years. He contributed to the Quarterly Review and also was the writer of "Pen Points," a column of pithy and pointed sayings carried in the Southern Christian Advocate for some years.

He was enthusiastic in his work and zealous in every good cause. His sermons were always prepared with a great deal of care and delivered with much force and effectiveness. In his younger days he was a successful revivalist and many were led to Christ through his preaching. He was a good pastor, kind, sympathetic and considerate of all classes.

His ministry was characterized by humility and modesty. He always thought things through before forming an opinion and was ever ready to give a reason for his convictions; and in his quiet and unassuming way stood by them.

He was loyal to his church, its doctrines and polity and when need called for it he was a defender of the faith in no uncertain tones. In his judgment the appointments were the expression of the Divine Will for each minister to accept unquestionably as from the great Head of the Church and he had little patience for any preacher who seemed disgruntled about his appointment.

After retirement in 1933 Brother Steadman made his home in Ridge Spring, S. C., and was happy when called upon to fill a vacant pulpit. Failing eyesight was a great cross for him to bear. His wife and others read to him much to his delight; but when he got in contact with the National Association for the Blind which furnished records of books that could be operated on a victrola he fairly beamed with pleasure. In his later years he was a great sufferer and was an invalid for some years.

On November 21, 1887, he married Miss Elizabeth Briggs Kennerly, the daughter of Dr. J. C. W. Kennerly and Myra Watson Kennerly of Edgefield county. Their children are as follows: John Marcellus, Jr., Atlanta, Ga., Wallace Wendell, Ridge Spring, S. C., Bonneau Kennerly, Richmond, Va., Mary Walker and Myra (Mrs. T. C. Watson), Florence, S. C. Their children bear witness to their parents' Christian training and loyalty to the church of Christ.

Mrs. Steadman passed away June 7, 1939.

The soul of Brother Steadman had a joyous release from his long bodily suffering April 26, 1945. His funeral was held in the Methodist Church, Ridge Spring, S. C., and was conducted by his pastor, the writer, assisted by B. L. Kilgo, District Superintendent, H. O. Chambers and O. J. Owens. His worn out body was laid to rest in the family plot in Batesburg, S. C. A modest, brave, good man has gone to his reward after nearly 60 years as a Methodist preacher.

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease;
And, life's long warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.
Soldier of Christ, well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages run,
Rest in thy Saviour's Joy."

WILLIAM FORNEY GAULT

William Forney Gault, son of the late Z. W. Gault and Mrs. Frances Madora Holmes Gault, was born at Wilkinsville, Cherokee County, S. C., September 14, 1880.

His first schooling was in his native county; after which he attended Leesville High School and later graduated at Leesville College in the class of 1909. His was the high privilege, and yet should be the heritage of every child, of early training by pious parents, and the atmosphere of a Christian Home. With such an environment we are not surprised that the young boy was converted and united with the church at eleven years of age. Nor are we surprised that the Heavenly Father honored this humble home by calling one of her sons to the holy work of the ministry. Nor even more are we surprised that the boy, as Samuel of old, knew the voice that called and was ready to answer, "Speak Lord, thy servant heareth."

His ministerial course was as follows:

Brother Gault was licensed to preach by the Spartanburg District Conference in May 1912; was Admitted on Trial into the Annual Conference at the session held in the autumn at Anderson, Bishop John C. Kilzo, presiding. Ordained Deacon by Bishop Collins Denny in 1915, and Elder by Bishop W. A. Candler in 1917.

The following were his pastorates: Buffalo and Green Street, Union, 1912-14; Green Street, 1915-16; Limestone Street, Gaffney, 1917-18; Bethel, Union, 1919-20; O'Neal Street, Newberry, 1921-24; Judson, Greenville, 1925-28; Bethel, Anderson, 1929-32; Piedmont, 1933-35; Lowell Street and Cambridge, 1936-39; Lowell Street, Greenwood, 1940, until his translation, 1945.

On December 28, 1916, Brother Gault was married to Miss Melvina Colson of Union, who through the years was a true help-meat and co-builder with him of a happy Christian home. Their children are: Frances Melvina (deceased, 5½ years of age); Mrs. H. G. Bledsoe, nee Mary Colson Gault, and Marjorie Ruth Gault; also one granddaughter, Frances Marylin Bledsoe. These, with the mother, are making their home in Greenwood.

In brief, this is the visible record of his life, and yet it is only an outline. Time and space limits tremendously a real expression of this good man and faithful minister of Christ. A number of splendid and fitting tributes have appeared both in our Advocate and local papers concerning our Brother. Among others we mention one by "Uncle" Jimmie F. Davis of Greenwood (age 94 and lately deceased). The other by the Rev. E. P. Bell of the South Carolina Conference, who for at least one year served as Junior Preacher under Brother Gault. These, as far as words can convey, came nearer to evaluating this life that went about doing good.

And good he was; actively good. He was deeply conscious of his personal relation to his Lord. This consciousness was founded in faith, and Will Gault's faith was no speculation. Christ was no myth to him, but a divine Person, related to him in a human form of manifestation, which was not on the utterance of the Divine compassion

and the assertion of the Divine authority. He recognized Christ as the Elder Brother and Divine Master—his Master for time and eternity; his inmost soul felt and knew the holy Presence. Such was his faith, he took Christ to be the absolute Lord of his life; he gave himself up; he attached himself, in inviolable fealty, to the Master; Christ's will became his law. The Bible, to him, was the Word of God. He received it at its face value. This Word, made flesh, was the finale of his faith, the basis of his hope and the guide of his life.

Wonderfully and well he was able to translate this passion of his in pulpit, visitation, among his friends, throughout his community, at his own fireside; he simply majored in securing the approbation of his great Master. He knew the Master would come; when, where and how seemed of lesser import. No doubt he expected some warning but it might be otherwise; He might come suddenly, unannounced. So the years sped on but the faithful servant never flags. Years brought only a more ready obedience and a more hearty diligence. The Master becomes more and more to him, until it seems that he can never do enough to show his love; the loins are girt about with truth, and the whole armour is kept in readiness for any service. The first watch is over; the second watch is ended; it is the third watch. And the Master is at the door, coming silently, unannounced and now He is knocking.

"He died at his post," as William Crook was wont to sing at the Memorial services, while the Conference wept and shouted. So we say today in grateful and loving memory of our friend and brother. William Forney Gault preached his last sermon on Sunday, January 28, 1945. On Friday evening of that week he met with his board of stewards to perfect plans for the raising of Askings on The Crusade for Christ. Saturday morning as he was walking into the post office the attack struck him and he fell on sleep. He who was ready for any call was just as ready for this final summons. The Lowell Street church membership, where he was entering his tenth year of service as pastor—I have an idea that for continuous service this is a record in our Conference—out of love and appreciation for their pastor, carried through the Crusade the following week, going beyond the Asking.

On Monday, February 5th, from the Church that he loved and that devotedly loved him, services were conducted by the writer, assisted by the Revs. F. C. Beach, B. H. Harvey, A. M. Doggett, T. L. Bryson and W. H. Beiers of the Baptist church. His body was carried to Union, S. C., and placed by the side of little Frances Melvina who through the years had waited in the Father's House for his homecoming.

"It is not death to die,
To leave this weary road,
And midst the brotherhood on high
To be at home with God."

"Let me die the death of the righteous and let my last end be like his."

GEORGE CLARK LEONARD

(March 2, 1866—October 23, 1945)

Of good, substantial Spartanburg county stock, George Clark Leonard, son of John Perry Leonard and Martha Jane Cathcart Leonard, was born near Reidville on March 2, 1866. A farmer boy he was, and to the end of his days he loved the land.

Nearby country schools and the Reidville high school furnished his early training. At the age of fourteen he joined the church, and was licensed to preach in 1888, twenty-two years old. For the next two years he was studying and teaching in the Greer high school, and in 1890 conducted a country school in Laurens county.

In the first days of October 1891, he entered Wofford College as a Freshman at the mature age of twenty-five. It was here that I first met him as his teacher, being only one year older than my student. I found him an earnest, intelligent, competent student, doing his work in English in a highly satisfactory way, eager to learn, a discriminating reader of the best books, an independent thinker, taking nothing for granted, and a writer of clear, forceful English. He proved to be the kind of student a teacher enjoys having in his classes.

He was graduated in June 1895, celebrating happily only last June with his classmates, the fiftieth anniversary of his graduation as a member of one of the most noteworthy classes ever to finish at Wofford. No man among them was more honored and loved by them than George Leonard, not only because he was older than the rest of them but because of their confidence in his spiritual sincerity and in the fundamental integrity of his character. When they would call him "Old George," it was an affectionate recognition of these qualities.

He joined the South Carolina Conference in the December following his graduation from college, and a few months later, February 12, 1896, was married to Miss Eva Ballenger of Greenville county, who made for him every parsonage home a place where the gentle kindnesses and graces abode that gave comfort and strength to the preacher as he went about his great tasks.

Minister Circuit 1895, Fountain Inn, Little Rock, Conway, McColl, Abbeville, Gaffney, Anderson District, Rock Hill District, St. Paul (Greenville), Grace (Union), Inman & Gramling,—and then superannuation in 1933. Between these years, 1895 and 1933, are bare dates and place names in the Conference minutes, and as such they do not mean much. But behind them is the record of a dedicated man's giving of himself unstintedly to the sacred service of making other men better and his church a more effective agency for keeping them better,—a wise and good man, always very much concerned about his Father's business.

I learned this afresh as we sat together for a full two hours in my study only a few days before his untimely passing. Of recent years we frequently had such talks, talks possible only to men who out

of the intimacies of long and tried friendship, dare to think out loud, so to speak, with one another. This George Leonard was doing as once more he made the charges he had served, and this review of his past was not only rich in anecdote and incident but also revealing of the kind of preacher and pastor he had been,—a kindly, tolerant, consecrated man was telling me about himself and his work in the vineyard of the Lord. If the finances of the charge were in a muddled state, he straightened them out; if repairs on the church or a new parsonage on a Sunday School room were needed, he would set about building and re-building. A practical man he was in the affairs of the Kingdom as he was in his own affairs.

Then, with insight and understanding of the people with whom the preacher must deal, if he would serve them well, he would give incident after incident, often relieved with touches of rich humor, and illustrating how he tried to bring the conflicting elements of his all too human flocks into a unity of spirit and purpose, and I knew that George Leonard was wise in ways of shepherding his flock for the service under the Great Shepherd of all flocks. A pastor he was in the original sense of this historic word.

I found, too, that he not only preached to his people, but also, what is better, from them. This is to say, he knew their troubles, their burdens, their sorrows, their sins even,—the things that made life all but intolerable for them,—and instead of interpreting the global affairs of a distraut universe from the pulpit, he brought the healing of the gospel to them just where they were, where they lived and suffered, in their homes, shops, stores, and on their farms. Yes, he was the bearer of an evangel to his people, whose every face, and name, and heartache he knew. This is practical preaching, and it was his kind of preaching.

Then, finally, we came round to that topic to which all thoughtful men must come,—the strains and stresses and disturbances to which certain terrifying experiences subject them in life, putting to the test the very foundations of faith. Quietly, firmly George Leonard asserted that he had deep and unshaken in his own heart the faith he had preached to other men. Though his going was sudden and violent he was ready, and somewhere in his Father's House he knew that the companion of his long journey was waiting to welcome her itinerant home again where there would be no more violence to body or soul, but only the peace that passeth all understanding.

Pastor, presiding elder, Wofford trustee for thirty-one years, member of other important boards of the church, he earned the accolade of "well done, good and faithful servant."

WILLIAM HENRY POLK

"On any morning—

Think of stepping on shore and finding it heaven,
Of taking hold of a hand and finding it God's hand,
Of breathing new air and finding it celestial,
Of feeling invigorated and finding it immortality,

Of waking up and finding it home."

Such must have been the experience of our dear friend and brother, Rev. William Henry Polk, at that early morning hour on November 10, 1945. At midnight he had been talking to his wife, and at one o'clock she found that his spirit had slipped away while he slept. He had just completed his fifth year on the Central charge, and on Thursday had gone over to Clemson to make his report of the year's work. He could well have said, "A good year, Bishop," for it had been one of the best in his long ministry. In a few short hours after he had made his report of the year's work he was called into the presence of the Great Shepherd and Bishop of souls to whom he gave the report of his life's work. Certainly he must have heard the glad words from the Saviour's lips, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of thy Lord."

Funeral services were held in Mt. Zion church, Central, Monday morning, November 12, conducted by the writer, assisted by Rev. M. T. Wharton, Rev. J. C. Revis and Rev. Mr. Mitchell, the latter two being fellow ministers from the other churches in Central. His body was taken to Columbia where it was laid to rest in Elmwood cemetery. Assisting at the grave were Rev. B. L. Kilgo and Rev. J. R. T. Major.

William Henry Polk was born at Islandton, S. C., June 23, 1876, of Scotch and English ancestry. He was the son of James K. and Alice Blake Rice Polk. His mother was a sister of the late Dr. John A. Rice, a member of the South Carolina Conference and President of Columbia College. He had the advantage of being reared in a Christian home, and as a child attended church and Sunday school at old Cross Swamp church. It was here and in that religious home that the influences played upon his young life which helped to make him one of God's true noblemen.

Brother Polk was converted and joined the Church as a child and very early in life felt the call to preach. Unlike many others he yielded without resistance, counting it a high honor to be commissioned as a messenger of the King. To him a call to preach meant a call to prepare. Limited means necessitated his working his way through school and college. His education was obtained at Varnville high school, the Morrison Academy and Wofford College, from which institution he was graduated in 1907.

While he was still in college, in 1905, he was licensed to preach, and two years later in the fall of 1907, he was admitted on trial into

the South Carolina Conference at its session held in Gaffney. He has served the following charges: Spartanburg City Mission (as supply), 1906; Glendale, 1907-10; North Spartanburg, 1911-14; West Main Street, Rock Hill, 1915-17; Waverly, Columbia, 1918-21; (Chaplain in U. S. Army, July 3, 1918-Jan. 3, 1919); Fountain Inn and Owings, 1922-25; Greer Memorial, 1926-29; Batesburg, 1930-33; Winnsboro, 1934; Great Falls, 1935; Jonesville, 1936-39; Central, 1940-45.

In every one of these charges he gave the very best that was in him and God richly blessed his labors. He never rested until each charge met every obligation placed upon it. He was an evangelistic pastor and maintained the enviable record for years of receiving on profession of faith an average of more than one for every Sunday he preached. He was successful especially as a builder of churches. New buildings were erected by him at Glendale, Drayton, Beaumont, Owings and Fountain Inn. In almost every case these churches were built, paid for and dedicated during his pastorate. He united in his ministry the qualities of a good preacher, a sympathetic pastor and a saintly character. Everywhere he served he was greatly beloved because of his warm, sympathetic soul. He was no place-seeker and was happy in his work wherever he was sent.

For the last twenty years of his life his parsonage home and his work were shared by a true helpmeet. On December 28, 1925, he married Mrs. Ida B. Ott Evans, who with two step-children, Mr. J. Fred Evans and Mrs. W. A. Cauthen, survives him. They are content for they know where to find him and some day they expect to clasp hands with him again.
