Wofford College quarterback Jeff Zolman has been named the Southern Conference Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in Saturday's season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry.

Zolman becomes the first Terrier in Wofford's six seasons of league play to receive that weekly honor. The college has previously had just defensive player and freshman of the week selections.

The sophomore from Dayton, Ohio, came off-the-bench to rush for 106 yards on six carries, including an 82-yard touchdown run for Wofford's longest play from scrimmage since an 87-yard Lamond Smith scoring run at Newberry in 1994.

Zolman completed 4-of-6 passes for 49 yards, including a 26-yard strike to Jesse McCoy to set up a six-yard J.R. McNair scoring run on the next play. Zolman led the Terriers to three first-half touchdown drives as Wofford built a 35-0 lead at the intermission.

Western Carolina middle linebacker Rod Dunlap was selected as the SoCon Defensive Player of the Week while VMI tight end Donnie Johnston was the Freshman of the Week.

Dunlap helped Western Carolina open its season with a 23-3 win at Liberty. He had 10 tackles, a sack, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery, and an interception. His forced fumble led to a Catamount field goal and a 3-0 lead early in the game. Dunlap's interception came on Liberty's first drive of the second half and also set up a field goal. He picked up a sack and a fumble recovery in the fourth quarter.

Johnston had a touchdown reception and a crucial two-point conversion reception in the Keydets' 27-24 win at Charleston Southern. An offensive tackle throughout preseason camp, Johnston was switched to tight end just a week before the season opener. Johnson had a 12-yard reception for a score midway through the second quarter.

Also receiving consideration for Freshman of the Week honors was Wofford halfback Corey Dunn, who rushed for 72 yards on nine carries against Newberry.

- •Wofford is looking to start a season with a 2-0 record for just the third time since 1983. The previous two occasions (1990, 1991) resulted in the Terriers advancing to the NCAA playoffs (Division II).
- •South Carolina State Head Coach **Buddy Pough** faced Wofford last season when he was an assistant coach at South Carolina in the Gamecocks' 38-14 win over the Terriers.
- •The South Carolina State contest begins a stretch of three consecutive road games for Wofford. The Terriers will next be at Georgia Southern (Sept. 21) and Maryland (Sept. 28) before returning home to face Chattanooga (Oct. 5). With the open date last week, Wofford does not have a home game the entire month of September.

A Look Back

Sophomore quarterback **Jeff Zolman** came off the bench to rush for 106 yards, including an 82-yard touchdown run, as Wofford defeated Newberry, 48-0, in the season opener for both teams at Gibbs Stadium in Spartanburg, S.C.

Wofford took control of the game on its opening series as a 53-yard **Jesse McCoy** touchdown run capped a three-play, 72-yard drive just 1:25 into the contest. **Todd Rhoden's** extra-point attempt was blocked as the Terriers led 6-0.

Wofford extended its lead to 8-0 at the conclusion of Newberry's opening series when **Shaun Bennett** blocked a **Brandon Carnes** punt with the ball rolling out of the end zone for a safety.

Zolman's 82-yard score gave the Terriers a 28-0 lead with 5:03 to play in the first half en route

to a 35-0 margin at the intermission. A native of Dayton, Ohio, Zolman finished with a teambest 106 yards on six carries as 14 different Wofford rushers totaled 476 yards on the ground.

The Terriers outgained the Indians by a 558-to-132 edge in total offense while holding a 26-to-7 advantage in first downs.

McCoy's second touchdown of the game, an 11-yard run with 44 seconds left in the second quarter, gave Wofford its 35-0 lead at the half.

Tony Jefferson and Teddie Whitaker posted their first career interceptions for the Terriers. Wofford also recorded three sacks.

Nearly one out of every six males on the Wofford campus play on the football team.

The Wofford student body of 1,100 is divided equally between 550 males and 550 females. This year's Terrier football roster has 88 players. With roughly 300 student-athletes on campus, more than 25 percent of Wofford's student body is on an athletic team.

Academic Dominance

In each of the last two years, Wofford has led the way in placing members on the Verizon Academic All-District team, which combines Division I-A and I-AA members in a five-state region.

Wofford and Florida tied for the most selections last season with four. To be eligible, a player must have a 3.2 cumulative GPA.

The Terriers provided the backfield on the team as halfback **Ben Foster** and fullback **J.R. McNair** were chosen along with offensive guard **Eric Nash** and outside linebacker **Chase Corn**.

In the 2000 campaign, Wofford had six players on the team while no other school had more than three.

The Head Coach

Mike Ayers, Wofford College's all-time winningest coach, is in his 15th year on the Terrier sideline.

Now with 82 victories, Ayers broke the previous school mark of 77 wins (**Conley Snidow**, 1953-66) with last year's 35-10 win over Charleston Southern.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Ayers was named the 2000 SoCon Coach of the Year from the league coaches and media after guiding the Terriers to a 7-4 record and Top 25 national ranking.

Ayers is also a two-time Kodak Region Coach of the Year after leading the Terriers to NCAA playoff appearances in 1990 and 1991.

Hello Neighbor

The 2002 campaign marks the 23rd consecutive year that Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers** and his offensive coordinator and neighbor **Wade Lang** are together in football.

Ayers and Lang not only have their offices side-by-side, they also live across the street from each other.

In 1980, when Ayers came to Wofford as an assistant coach, Lang was in his sophomore year. When Ayers left for the defensive coordinator position at East Tennessee State in 1983, Lang joined him in Johnson City as a graduate assistant before being elevated to a full-time position in 1985.

They both returned to Wofford in 1988 when Ayers was named the Terriers' head coach. He brought Lang with him as the quarterback coach. Lang then took over the offensive coordinator duties in 1990.

A Presidential Flavor to the Wofford Staff

Retired Wofford College President **Dr. Joe Lesesne** is in his second season on the Terrier football staff as a volunteer assistant coach working with the tight ends.

Lesesne retired in 2000 after a distinguished 28-year tenure as just the ninth president in the 148-year history of Wofford.

Lesesne is no stranger to football. Upon arriving at Wofford in 1964 as a history professor, he served four years (1965-68) as an assistant football coach for the Terriers under Head Coach **Conley Snidow** and later **Jim Brakefield**. Lesesne also coached one season at Abbeville (S.C.) High School.

Lesesne is teaching a course in South Carolina history this fall.

Future Coach?

If he'd like to follow **Joe Lesesne** from the president's office to the football coaching staff, current Wofford President **Bernie Dunlap** does have a football background.

Dunlap earned All-Area honors as a starting fullback for Columbia (S.C.) High School as well as receiving a varsity letter as a halfback at the University of the South.

Future Schedules

The Terriers will open the 2003 season on Aug. 30 at Air Force, coached by 1960 Wofford graduate **Fisher DeBerry**.

Did You Know?

- •An anonymous donor committed \$100,000 toward the creation of an endowed scholarship in honor of Wofford Head Coach **Mike Avers**.
- •Ayers is a black belt in karate and an accomplished sketch artist.
- •Now in his sixth SoCon season at Wofford, Ayers ranks in a tie for second with East Tennessee State's **Paul Hamilton** in league seniority behind Appalachian State's **Jerry Moore** (14 years).

Strength of Schedule

- •The Wofford football team annually plays one of the toughest schedules in the nation for a Division I-AA member. This year's slate is highlighted by a Sept. 28 game at defending ACC champion Maryland.
- •Playing at Clemson and South Carolina last year, Wofford was the nation's only I-AA team to face a pair of bowl teams.
- •The Terriers had four I-AA playoff teams on their 2000 schedule in addition to Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe.
 - •In 1999, Wofford was one of just three I-AA teams to face two I-A opponents.
- •The 1998 campaign saw the Terrier schedule ranked as the eighth-most difficult in the nation with the 11 opponents combining for a .563 winning percentage.

- •Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.
- •With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.
- •Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.



Wofford's Zolman is also the lone southpaw among the quarterback trio.

The Real McCoy

Halfback **Jesse McCoy** is a big-play weapon in Wofford's offense.

The 1999 SoCon Freshman of the Year averages 9.1 yards each time he touches the ball from the line of scrimmage in his career.

McCoy had five carries for 74 yards (14.8 avg.), including scoring runs of 53 and 11 yards, in the season opener against Newberry. He also added a 26-yard reception to set up another Terrier score.

McCoy became the first player in Wofford history to go over 100 yards rushing and 100 yards receiving in the same game when he ran for 114 yards on nine carries and had three receptions for 115 yards and two touchdowns in a 40-31 win over Western Carolina in the 2000 campaign.

McCoy's 7.23 career per carry average is a Wofford record, surpassing the previous mark of 7.03 held by former quarterback great **Shawn Graves** (1989-92).

The Best of McCov

The top four rushing performances of **Jesse McCoy's** collegiate career have seen him average at least 12.4 yards per carry in those contests.

Dominating the Trenches

Nose tackle and preseason All-America **Nathan Fuqua**, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first three years, is already Wofford's career leader in tackles for loss (40).

Fuqua (6-foot-2, 285 pounds) displayed his ability to play at any level with dominating performances in last year's contests at Clemson and South Carolina.

A senior from Danville, Ky., Fuqua had the upperhand on former Clemson All-America center **Kyle Young**. Fuqua also drew postgame praise from USC Head Coach **Lou Holtz** for his performance against the Gamecocks.

Going for It

It's well documented that the entire field is four-down territory for Wofford.

The Terriers were 21-of-33 (63.6 percent) on fourth-down attempts last season. Wofford was also 15-of-27 (55.6 percent) on fourth downs in the 2000 campaign and 24-of-39 (61.5 percent) in 1999.

Wofford even converted a fake punt on a 4th-and-19 at its own 19-yard line in a game a few seasons ago.

Good Genes

Starting outside linebacker **Chase Corn** is a third generation Wofford football player.

Corn's father (**Buddy Corn '76**) and grandfather (**Wade Corn '50**) as well as uncle (**Skip Corn '73**) played football for the Terriers.

Familiar Names

Sophomore wide receiver **Shiel Wood** is the son of former Wofford athletic director and now Senior Vice-President **David Wood**.

The elder Wood was a football standout at Elon and a former assistant coach at Catawba.

Seeing the Ball

Isaac Goodpaster, the Terriers' leading receiver a year ago, is legally blind with 20/200 vision as he suffers from macular degeneration.

Goodpaster posted a team-best 25 catches for 422 yards (16.9 avg.) and two touchdowns last season.

He had a 15-yard touchdown catch at Clemson and a season-high five receptions at South Carolina.

Magic Numbers

•Wofford has a 49-2-1 record in the 52 games under Head Coach **Mike Ayers** in which the Terriers have allowed 16 or fewer points.

Dating back to the final game of the 2000 campaign (a 24-6 win at Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe), Wofford has allowed a total of just 33 points in its last six wins (5.5 per game).

 $\bullet Wofford\,has\,won\,27\,consecutive\,games\,when\,holding\,a\,halftime$ lead.

The Terriers' last loss when leading at the break was a 20-16 defeat to Elon in 1995. Wofford held a 9-3 halftime edge that night.

Honorary I-A Members

The Maryland contest will represent Wofford's seventh game in the last five years against a Division I-A opponent.

The Terriers' first game in that stretch was a 29-27 loss at Marshall in the 1998 season finale. Wofford saw its bid for an upset over the Herd fall short when a 29-yard field goal was blocked with just over three minutes to play.

The Marshall Plan

Prior to becoming the dominant program in Division I-AA, Marshall had to wait five years to win its first Southern Conference game after beginning league play in 1977.

With 18 victories in its opening five years of SoCon membership, Wofford is well ahead of schedule on "The Marshall Plan."

Gibbs Stadium

Wofford's football stadium is the second youngest facility in the Southern Conference.

With a capacity of 13,000, Gibbs Stadium opened in October 1996. Only Chattanooga's Finley Stadium (1997) is newer.

The Terriers have a 17-10 home record (.630) since moving into Gibbs Stadium.

Zolman Makes History

Wofford quarterback **Jeff Zolman** made history when he was named the SoCon Offensive Player of the Week following his 106-yard rushing performance in the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry.

Now in their sixth season of SoCon play, the Terriers had never had a SoCon Offensive Player of the Week selection.

Wofford had previously received six Defensive Player of the Week awards and seven Freshman of the Week honors.

First Picks

Outside linebacker **Teddie Whitaker** and free safety **Tony Jefferson** recorded their first collegiate interceptions in the win over Newberry.

Jefferson, a sophomore backup to All-SoCon performer **Matt Nelson**, was playing his first game on defense after being at halfback his freshman season.

Team Efforts

Fourteen different Terriers had at least one carry as Wofford rushed for 476 yards in its 48-0 victory over Newberry.

The Terriers rushed for 272 yards and had 354 in total offense in building their 35-0 halftime lead.

Rising Through the Ranks

Wofford College is in its eighth season on the Division I-AA level.

The Terriers previously competed for seven years in Division II (1988-94). Prior to 1988, Wofford was an NAIA member.

Scheduling Quirks

- •Wofford is playing its first-ever 12-game regular season.
- •The Terriers' opening four contests are night games.

The Terriers will then have just one contest (Nov.9, at East Tennessee State, 6 p.m.) in the remaining eight under the lights, albeit domed lights.

•With an open date and three straight road games, Wofford does not have a home game in the month of September.

South Carolina's Team

South Carolina State will represent the seventh in-state opponent that Wofford will have faced in the last two years.

During that time, the Terriers have played Clemson, Charleston Southern, The Citadel, South Carolina, Furman, and Newberry.

The SoCon's Big Foot

Wofford punter Jimmy Miner will contend for All-America honors this fall.

After topping the SoCon and ranking eighth nationally in Division I-AA last year with his average of 42.0 yards, Miner had a 43.0 mark on three boots in the season-opening victory over Newberry.

The two longest punts of Miner's career came in last year's 13-0 win at The Citadel, when he had 67 and 68-yard efforts on the way to a 47.9 average on seven attempts.

Former South Carolina Head Coach **Jim Carlen** was in attendance and commented that he had never seen a punter impact a game like Miner did that afternoon in Charleston.

Miner also had a 43.5 mark on six punts at Clemson.

Who is This Guy?

Wofford's final extra point in the Newberry game was converted by walk-on **Jay Harvey**. A native of Barnwell, S.C., Harvey was a late addition to the Terrier roster and is not listed in the team's media guide.

Harvey is the first junior college transfer to play for **Mike Ayers** in his 15-year tenure at Wofford. However, there is an asterisk attached to that status.

Harvey was a soccer player when he attended Spartanburg Methodist College the last two years. SMC does not have a football team.

Harvey did enjoy a successful placekicking career at Barnwell High School. He was 114-of-120 on extra-point attempts and 20-of-24 on field goals with a long of 47. Harvey was a three-time All-Region placekicker and an All-State selection as a senior. He was also named to the 1999 North-South All-Star Game.

Recapping a Night of Defense

Wofford's season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry was highlighted by a stellar performance from its defensive unit:

- The Terriers limited the Indians to just three first downs and 39 yards of offense in building a 35-0 halftime lead.
- •For the game, Newberry had just seven first downs, 84 yards rushing, and 132 yards of offense. Wofford also forced three turnovers.
 - •Newberry's longest possession lasted six plays and 3:12 on the clock.
- •The Indians' longest drive of the game was 24 yards on their final series of the game. The possession stalled at the Wofford 39-yard line with two seconds to play. It represented the only time Newberry crossed midfield. The Indians had previously not advanced past their own 49-yard line, with that series being a three-and-out.
- •Wofford forced Newberry into a three-and-out on nine of 15 possessions, not including a one-play series when time expired in the first half.

What to Call?

Wofford had 26 running plays and 12 passes in the first half of the season opener against Newberry.

After building a 35-0 lead at the intermission, the Terriers ran the ball on 35 of their 36 snaps in the second half. The lone attempt in the air was a fourth-quarter shovel pass from **Jonathan Carey** to **Mike Jones** that fell incomplete.

Quick Strikes

Five of Wofford's seven scoring drives against Newberry were accomplished in five plays or less, with an eight-play drive taking just 1:54 and a 10-play drive lasting only 3:46:

Sophomore quarterback Trey Rodgers scored on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 remaining in the third quarter for Wofford's game-winning touchdown in a hardfought 7-6 victory at South Carolina State tonight in Orangeburg, S.C.

The Terriers improve to 2-0 for the first time since 1991 and only the third time since 1983. Wofford has allowed a total of just six points in its opening two games. S.C. State drops to 2-1.

Rodgers' touchdown, the only second-half points allowed by the Bulldogs this season, capped an eight-play, 32-yard drive that was set up by a 13-yard Jesse McCoy punt return. Jay Harvey's successful extra-point attempt gave Wofford the 7-6 lead.

The Terrier defense and special teams were the story in the first meeting between Wofford and S.C. State since 1977.

Jimmy Miner, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first two seasons and a preseason All-America, averaged 47.4 yards on five punts. Two of those kicks were downed by Steve Hoover at the Bulldog one-yard line, forcing S.C. State to start two of its final three series deep in its own territory. The Bulldogs average starting field position for the game was their own 15-yard line, including the 9-yard line on four second-half possessions.

"We played a very good team tonight," Wofford Head Coach Mike Ayers said. "The kicking game was really big.

"The defense was outstanding. We knew before preseason camp started that the defense would be able to step up and carry us. Our conditioning is better than it's ever been and it paid off tonight.

"This win gives us a lot of confidence facing a tough challenge in Statesboro (Wofford opens the SoCon season next week at Georgia Southern)."

S.C. State took a 6-0 lead with 13:57 to play in the first half on a five-yard Derek Watson scoring run. The South Carolina transfer had a 40-yard carry on his first rushing attempt before the Terrier defense held him to just nine yards on his next seven attempts. He also had two receptions for eight yards.

The Bulldogs outgained the Terriers by a 332-to-225 margin. McCoy was Wofford's top ground gainer with 79 yards on eight carries. His 37-yard run on a 2nd-and-9 at the Terrier 30 helped Wofford run out the clock on the game's final possession. J.R. McNair added 74 yards on 16 attempts.

S.C. State quarteback Reese McCampbell rushed for 118 yards on 24 carries while completing 15-of-20 passes for 157 yards.

This Week

•The Wofford College football team opens its sixth season of SoCon play when it travels to Statesboro, Ga., to face Georgia Southern.

After closing league play against each other last season, the Terriers and Eagles meet again in their annual SoCon opener. Last year's Sept. 15 contest in Spartanburg was played on Nov. 24 due to the postponement resulting from the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Wofford and Georgia Southern are scheduled to meet each year in their opening league game.

- •Wofford has opened a season with a 2-0 record for the first time since 1991 and just the third time since 1983. The two previous occasions (1990, 1991) resulted in the Terriers advancing to the NCAA playoffs (Division II). Wofford has not been 3-0 since winning its opening five games in 1991.
- •Georgia Southern has won all five meetings with Wofford since the Terriers began SoCon play in 1997. Previously, the teams split a pair of games in the early 1980s. The Eagles hold a sixgame winning streak in the series and a 6-1 overall lead.
- •Following an open date on Sept. 7, Wofford is in the midst of three consecutive road games. The Terriers were at South Carolina State last week and head to Maryland next Saturday before returning home to face Chattanooga on Oct. 5. Wofford does not have a home game the entire month of September.

The Head Coach

Mike Ayers, Wofford College's all-time winningest coach, is in his 15th year on the Terrier sideline.

Now with 83 victories, Ayers broke the previous school mark of 77 wins (**Conley Snidow**, 1953-66) with last year's 35-10 victory over Charleston Southern.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Ayers was named the 2000 SoCon Coach of the Year from the league coaches and media after guiding the Terriers to a 7-4 record and Top 25 national ranking.

Ayers is also a two-time Kodak Region Coach of the Year after leading the Terriers to NCAA playoff appearances in 1990 and 1991.

Hello Neighbor

The 2002 campaign marks the 23rd consecutive year that Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers** and his offensive coordinator and neighbor **Wade Lang** are together in football.

Ayers and Lang not only have their offices side-by-side, they also live across the street from each other.

In 1980, when Ayers came to Wofford as an assistant coach, Lang was in his sophomore year. When Ayers left for the defensive coordinator position at East Tennessee State in 1983, Lang joined him in Johnson City as a graduate assistant before being elevated to a full-time position in 1985.

They both returned to Wofford in 1988 when Ayers was named the Terriers' head coach. He brought Lang with him as the quarterback coach. Lang then took over the offensive coordinator duties in 1990.

A Presidential Flavor to the Wofford Staff

Retired Wofford College President **Dr. Joe Lesesne** is in his second season on the Terrier football staff as a volunteer assistant coach working with the tight ends.

Lesesne retired in 2000 after a distinguished 28-year tenure as just the ninth president in the 148-year history of Wofford.

Lesesne is no stranger to football. Upon arriving at Wofford in 1964 as a history professor, he served four years (1965-68) as an assistant football coach for the Terriers under Head Coach **Conley Snidow** and later **Jim Brakefield**. Lesesne also coached one season at Abbeville (S.C.) High School.

Lesesne is teaching a course in South Carolina history this fall.

Future Coach?

If he'd like to follow **Joe Lesesne** from the president's office to the football coaching staff, current Wofford President **Bernie Dunlap** does have a football background.

Dunlap earned All-Area honors as a starting fullback for Columbia (S.C.) High School as well as receiving a varsity letter as a halfback at the University of the South.

Future Schedules

The Terriers will open the 2003 season on Aug. 30 at Air Force, coached by 1960 Wofford graduate **Fisher DeBerry**.

Did You Know?

- •An anonymous donor committed \$100,000 toward the creation of an endowed scholarship in honor of Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers**.
- •Ayers is a black belt in karate and an accomplished sketch artist.
- •Now in his sixth SoCon season at Wofford, Ayers ranks in a tie for second with East Tennessee State's **Paul Hamilton** in league seniority behind Appalachian State's **Jerry Moore** (14 years).

Strength of Schedule

- •The Wofford football team annually plays one of the toughest schedules in the nation for a Division I-AA member. This year's slate is highlighted by a Sept. 28 game at defending ACC champion Maryland.
- •Playing at Clemson and South Carolina last year, Wofford was the nation's only I-AA team to face a pair of bowl teams.
- •The Terriers had four I-AA playoff teams on their 2000 schedule in addition to Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe.
 - •In 1999, Wofford was one of just three I-AA teams to face two I-A opponents.

- •Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

The Three-Headed Monster at Quarterback

All three of Wofford's sophomore quarterbacks (Trey Rodgers, Jeff Zolman, Jonathan Carey) could see action. The Terrier coaches simply go with the hot hand.

In each of the opening two games, the quarterback standout that night came off-the-bench:

• After Rodgers started the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry, Zolman received SoCon Offensive Player of the Week honors when he rushed for 106 yards on six carries, including an 82-yard touchdown run. He also completed 4-of-6 passes for 49 yards in directing the Terriers to three first-half touchdown drives as Wofford built a 35-0 lead at the intermission.

Zolman's 82-yard touchdown run represented Wofford's longest play from scrimmage since **Lamond Smith** scored on an 87-yard carry at Newberry in 1994.

•Playing in relief of Zolman in the 7-6 win at South Carolina State (Sept. 14), Rodgers scored the Terriers' game-winning touchdown on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 left in the third quarter.

Giving Opponents a Melvin

The career-high 168 yards rushing by Melvin Jones against Appalachian State last year is even more impressive when considering how the Mountaineers earlier that season contained a pair of recipients of the Walter Payton Award (the Division I-AA equivalent of the Heisman Trophy). Statistical Oddities

- •The seven points scored in the win over South Carolina State represented Wofford's lowest point total in a victory since a 7-6 decision over Gardner-Webb in the 1977 season finale.
- •The six points allowed by the Terriers this season is their lowest point total surrendered after the opening two games of a campaign since 1948, when Wofford began the year with 6-6 and 0-0 ties against Hampden-Sydney and Northwestern State, respectively. The Terriers set a national record that year by opening the season with five consecutive ties.

The Real McCoy

Halfback Jesse McCoy is a big-play weapon in Wofford's offense.

The 1999 SoCon Freshman of the Year averages 9.1 yards each time he touches the ball from the line of scrimmage in his career.

McCoy's 7.31 career per carry average is a Wofford record, surpassing the previous mark of 7.03 held by former quarterback great Shawn Graves (1989-92).

In two games this season, McCoy has a team-high 151 yards rushing on just 13 carries (11.6 avg.) to go with a reception for 26 yards.

A senior from Acworth, Ga., McCoy is also being utilized on punt and kick returns.

McCoy became the first player in Wofford history to go over 100 yards rushing and 100 yards receiving in the same game when he ran for 114 yards on nine carries and had three receptions for 115 yards and two touchdowns in a 40-31 win over Western Carolina in the 2000 campaign.

The Best of McCov

The top four rushing performances of Jesse McCoy's collegiate career have seen him average at least 12.4 yards per carry in those contests.

Dominating the Trenches

Nose tackle and preseason All-America **Nathan Fuqua**, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first three years, is already Wofford's career leader in tackles for loss (42).

Fuqua (6-foot-2, 285 pounds) displayed his ability to play at any level with dominating performances in last year's contests at Clemson and South Carolina.

A senior from Danville, Ky., Fuqua had the upperhand on former Clemson All-America center **Kyle Young**. Fuqua also drew postgame praise from USC Head Coach **Lou Holtz** for his performance against the Gamecocks.

Going for It

It's well documented that the entire field is four-down territory for the Terriers, who are 2-of-4 on fourth-down conversions this year.

The Terriers were 21-of-33 (63.6 percent) on fourth-down attempts last season. Wofford was also 15-of-27 (55.6 percent) on fourth downs in the 2000 campaign and 24-of-39 (61.5 percent) in 1999.

Wofford even converted a fake punt on a 4th-and-19 at its own 19-yard line in a game a few seasons ago.

Good Genes

Starting outside linebacker **Chase Corn** is a third generation Wofford football player.

Corn's father (Buddy Corn '76) and grandfather (Wade Corn '50) as well as uncle (Skip Corn '73) played football for the Terriers.

Familiar Names

Sophomore wide receiver **Shiel Wood** is the son of former Wofford athletic director and now Senior Vice-President **David Wood**.

The elder Wood was a football standout at Elon and a former assistant coach at Catawba.

McCoy and Jones Among SoCon's Best; Chasing 2,000 Career Yards

Seeing the Ball

Isaac Goodpaster, the Terriers' leading receiver a year ago, is legally blind with 20/200 vision as he suffers from macular degeneration.

Goodpaster posted a team-best 25 catches for 422 yards (16.9 avg.) and two touchdowns last season.

He had a 15-yard touchdown catch at Clemson and a season-high five receptions at South Carolina.

Magic Numbers

•Wofford has a 50-2-1 record in the 53 games under Head Coach **Mike Ayers** in which the Terriers have allowed 16 or fewer points.

Dating back to the final game of the 2000 campaign (a 24-6 win at Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe), Wofford has allowed a total of just 39 points in its last seven wins (5.6 per game).

 $\bullet Wofford\,has\,won\,27\,consecutive\,games\,when\,holding\,a\,halftime$ lead.

The Terriers' last loss when leading at the break was a 20-16 defeat to Elon in 1995. Wofford held a 9-3 halftime edge that night.

Honorary I-A Members

The Maryland contest will represent Wofford's seventh game in the last five years against a Division I-A opponent.

The Terriers' first game in that stretch was a 29-27 loss at Marshall in the 1998 season finale. Wofford saw its bid for an upset over the Herd fall short when a 29-yard field goal was blocked with just over three minutes to play.

The Marshall Plan

Prior to becoming the dominant program in Division I-AA, Marshall had to wait five years to win its first Southern Conference game after beginning league play in 1977.

With 18 victories in its opening five years of SoCon membership, Wofford is well ahead of schedule on "The Marshall Plan."

Gibbs Stadium

Wofford's football stadium is the second youngest facility in the Southern Conference.

With a capacity of 13,000, Gibbs Stadium opened in October 1996. Only Chattanooga's Finley Stadium (1997) is newer.

The Terriers have a 17-10 home record (.630) since moving into Gibbs Stadium.

What to Call?

After attempting 12 passes with 26 rushing plays in the first half of the Aug. 31 season opener against Newberry, the Terriers have run the ball on 90 of 94 snaps over the last six quarters.

Zolman Makes History

Wofford quarterback **Jeff Zolman** made history when he was named the SoCon Offensive Player of the Week following his 106-yard rushing performance in the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry.

Now in their sixth season of SoCon play, the Terriers had never had a SoCon Offensive Player of the Week selection.

Wofford had previously received six Defensive Player of the Week awards and seven Freshman of the Week honors.

First Picks

Outside linebacker **Teddie Whitaker** and free safety **Tony Jefferson** recorded their first collegiate interceptions in the win over Newberry. Those are also Wofford's only two picks this season.

Jefferson, a sophomore backup to All-SoCon performer **Matt Nelson**, was playing his first game on defense after being at halfback his freshman season.

Rising Through the Ranks

Wofford College is in its eighth season on the Division I-AA level.

The Terriers previously competed for seven years in Division II (1988-94). Prior to 1988, Wofford was an NAIA member.

Scheduling Quirks

- •Wofford is playing its first-ever 12-game regular season.
- •The Terriers' opening four contests are night games.

The Terriers will then have just one contest (Nov.9, at East Tennessee State, 6 p.m.) in the remaining eight under the lights, albeit domed lights.

•With an open date and three straight road games, Wofford does not have a home game in the month of September.

South Carolina's Team

South Carolina State represented the seventh in-state opponent that Wofford has faced in the last two years.

During that time, the Terriers have played Clemson, Charleston Southern, The Citadel, South Carolina, Furman, and Newberry.

The SoCon's Big Foot

Wofford punter **Jimmy Miner** made his case for All-America honors this fall after a dominant performance in the 7-6 win over South Carolina State:

- •A 47.8 average on five attempts with four of his kicks downed inside the 9-yard line
- •His last two punts were downed at the 1-yard line and came prior to two of S.C. State's final three possessions
- •Two other punts went 55 and 58 yards
- •The average starting field position for S.C. State in the game was its own 14-yard line, including the 9-yard line on four second-half possessions
- •For the season, while kicking in wet weather in both games, he has a 46.0 average on eight attempts

Miner topped the SoCon and ranked eighth in Division I-AA last year with his average of 42.0 yards.

The two longest punts of his career came in last year's 13-0 win at The Citadel, when he had 67 and 68-yard efforts on the way to a 47.9 average on seven attempts.

Former South Carolina Head Coach **Jim Carlen** was in attendance and commented that he had never seen a punter impact a game like Miner did that afternoon in Charleston.

Miner also had a 43.5 mark on six punts at Clemson.

Harrison High Connection

Terrier punter **Jimmy Miner** and halfback **Jesse McCoy** were prep teammates at Harrison High School in Kennesaw, Ga.

Ben Foster, a three-year starter at halfback and former Wofford student body president, is also an alumnus of Harrison. Foster graduated from Wofford this past year.

Who is This Guy?

Wofford's game-winning extra point in the 7-6 victory over South Carolina State was converted by walk-on **Jay Harvey**.

A native of Barnwell, S.C., Harvey was a late addition to the Terrier roster and is not listed in the team's media guide. He was filling in for injured placekicker **Todd Rhoden** (hip flexor). Harvey also converted the Terriers' final PAT in the season-opening 48-0 win over Newberry.

Harvey is the first junior college transfer to play for **Mike Ayers** in his 15-year tenure at Wofford. However, there is an asterisk attached to that status.

Harvey was a soccer player when he attended Spartanburg Methodist College the last two years. SMC does not have a football team.

Harvey did enjoy a successful placekicking career at Barnwell High School. He was 114-of-120 on extra-point attempts and 20-of-24 on field goals with a long of 47. Harvey was a three-time All-Region placekicker and an All-State selection as a senior. He was also named to the 1999 North-South All-Star Game.

Recapping a Night of Defense

Wofford's season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry was highlighted by a stellar performance from its defensive unit:

- •The Terriers limited the Indians to just three first downs and 39 yards of offense in building a 35-0 halftime lead.
- •For the game, Newberry had just seven first downs, 84 yards rushing, and 132 yards of offense. Wofford also forced three turnovers.
 - •Newberry's longest possession lasted six plays and 3:12 on the clock.
- •The Indians' longest drive of the game was 24 yards on their final series of the game. The possession stalled at the Wofford 39-yard line with two seconds to play. It represented the only time Newberry crossed midfield. The Indians had previously not advanced past their own 49-yard line, with that series being a three-and-out.
- •Wofford forced Newberry into a three-and-out on nine of 15 possessions, not including a one-play series when time expired in the first half.

Trey Rodgers scored on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 remaining in the third quarter for Wofford's game-winning touchdown in a hardfought 7-6 victory at South Carolina State.

Rodgers' touchdown, the only second-half points allowed by the Bulldogs this season, capped an eight-play, 32-yard drive that was set up by a 13-yard Jesse McCoy punt return. Jay Harvey's successful extra-point attempt gave Wofford the 7-6 lead.

The Terrier defense and special teams were the story in the first meeting between Wofford and S.C. State since 1977.

Jimmy Miner, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first two seasons and a preseason All-America, averaged 47.8 yards on five punts. Two of those kicks were downed by **Steve Hoover** at the Bulldog one-yard line, forcing S.C. State to start two of its final three series in the shadow of its own goal line. Two other punts were downed inside the 13-yard line.

The Bulldogs' average starting field position for the game was their own 14-yard line, including the 9-yard line on four second-half possessions.

S.C. State took a 6-0 lead with 13:57 to play in the first half on a five-yard **Derek Watson** scoring run, the only points the Terriers have allowed in their opening two games.

McCoy was Wofford's top ground gainer with 77 yards on eight carries, including a 37-yard run on a 2nd-and-9 at the Terrier 30 to help Wofford run out the clock on the game's final possession. J.R. McNair added 76 yards on 15 carries.

The Spartanburg Touchdown Club will honor Wofford punter Jimmy Miner and special teams standout Steve Hoover at its Friday luncheon as the Terrier Players of the Week for their performance in Saturday's 7-6 victory at South Carolina State.

Miner, a two-time All-SoCon selection and a preseason All-America, averaged 47.8 yards on five punts with four of his kicks going inside the 14-yard line. His final two punts were downed at the 1-yard line and came prior to two of S.C. State's final three possessions.

A Dean's List student, McNair ranks third on the Terriers in rushing with 98 yards (4.9 per carry), including a touchdown, in the opening two games. Among his myriad of campus and community organizations, McNair is a member of the Wofford Campus Union as an at-large delegate while also serving as its chaplain. He created a web site for the Girl Scouts/Piedmont Area and took part in the Feed the Children project, in which 450 meals were provided. McNair also serves as president of Wofford's Gospel Choir.

Senior halfback Jesse McCoy rushed for a game-high 114 yards and scored both Terrier touchdowns, the last on a fourth down, 1-yard pitch from quarterback Jeff Zolman with 3:55 to play, to lift Wofford to a 14-7 Southern Conference victory over No. 8 Georgia Southern Saturday night at Paulson Stadium in Statesboro, Ga.

The Terriers' first-ever win at Paulson Stadium also snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for Georgia Southern (1-2, 0-1), who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State. Wofford (3-0, 1-0), picked to finish seventh in the preseason by the league coaches and media, is off to its best start since 1991.

McCoy's 114 rushing yards, his fifth career 100-yard game, was the most by an Eagle opponent since Furman's Louis Ivory gained 122 on Nov. 3, 2001. Zolman added 74 yards on the ground, 54 coming on a pivotal 3rd-and-3 play from the Wofford 43-yard line midway through the fourth quarter to highlight the Terriers' game-winning drive.

Zolman also added a 20-yard completion to Isaac Goodpaster on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16-yard line earlier on that series. A sophomore from Dayton, Ohio, Zolman was 6-of-9 in the air for 40 yards as he played the entire game.

The Terriers' combined rushing effort of 269 yards ran past the Eagles' 234, making it the first time in 75 games that GSU's offense had been outrushed by an opponent other than Furman.

Wofford has allowed a total of just 13 points in three games this season (4.3 per contest).

McCoy opened the scoring with 4:08 left in the first quarter on a 30-yard touchdown run, giving the Terriers a 6-0 lead which would last the remainder of the half. The scoreless half for Georgia Southern was its first at Paulson Stadium since the East Tennessee State contest in 1996 - a span of 78 games.

Georgia Southern's offense tried to jump-start its efforts in the second half, relying on freshman fullback Jermaine Austin, who finished with a team-best 97 yards on 20 carries. Sophomore quarterback Trey Hunter scrambled for 91 yards on 24 attempts.

The Eagle offense finally found the endzone to grab a short-lived lead at the beginning of the fourth quarter when Zzream Walden took a pitch for a 2-yard scoring run on a 4th-and-goal play to give Georgia Southern a 7-6 lead.

After forcing Georgia Southern's next drive to end at the Terrier 39-yard line with 8:28 to play, Wofford used a 10-play, 81-yard drive to punch across the game-winner.

Zolman connected with Goodpaster for the 20-yard completion before his 54-yard keeper on a 3rd-and-3 at the Terrier 43 put the ball at the GSU 3-yard line. After the Eagle defense held the Terriers on three consecutive goal-line plays, McCoy took a Zolman pitch around the right side and walked into the Eagle endzone untouched for a 12-7 Wofford lead. Zolman then ran for the two-point conversion to extend the Terriers' cushion to 14-7.

The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 - a span of 67 home contests.

Wofford will venture outside the SoCon next week when it travels to Maryland to face the defending ACC-champion Terrapins. Kickoff is 6 p.m. in College Park, Md.

This Week

•The Wofford College football team, fresh off the momentum of one of its biggest wins in school history, will face a Division I-A opponent for the seventh time in the last five years when it travels to College Park, Md., for its first-ever meeting with the University of Maryland. The contest will also represent the second straight season the Terriers have faced an ACC foe.

In this week's Division I-AA Top 25 polls, Wofford is ranked No. 19 by The Sports Network and ESPN/USA Today. Both rankings represent the Terriers' highest position in a I-AA poll since joining those ranks in 1995, and its first appearance in the Top 25 since holding the No. 25 position in the 2001 preseason poll.

The Terriers opened last year at Clemson and took a pair of leads, including a 14-7 margin at the close of the first quarter. Wofford still trailed just 24-14 late in the third quarter before the Tigers pulled away for a 38-14 victory.

Wofford also hung tough with South Carolina last season before falling by an identical 38-14 score to the Gamecocks.

•At 3-0, Wofford has posted its best start to a season since 1991. The last two times the Terriers won their opening three games (1990, 1991) they advanced to the NCAA playoffs (Division II).

•The Maryland game will close a stretch of three consecutive road contests for Wofford. Including a Sept. 7 open date, the Terriers do not have a home game in the month of September. Wofford returns home for the first time since Aug. 31 when it hosts Chattanooga next Saturday.

A Look Back

Zolman added 74 yards on the ground, 54 coming on a pivotal 3rd-and-3 play from the Wofford 43-yard line midway through the fourth quarter to highlight the Terriers' game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive.

Zolman, who was 6-of-9 in the air for 40 yards, had a 20-yard completion to **Isaac Goodpaster** on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16-yard line earlier on that series. His keeper set up McCoy's go-ahead score. Zolman then ran for the two-point conversion to extend the Terriers' lead to 14-7.

The Head Coach

Mike Ayers, Wofford College's all-time winningest coach, is in his 15th year on the Terrier sideline.

Now with 84 victories, Ayers broke the previous school mark of 77 wins (**Conley Snidow**, 1953-66) with last year's 35-10 victory over Charleston Southern.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Ayers was named the 2000 SoCon Coach of the Year from the league coaches and media after guiding the Terriers to a 7-4 record and Top 25 national ranking.

Ayers is also a two-time Kodak Region Coach of the Year after leading the Terriers to NCAA playoff appearances in 1990 and 1991.

Hello Neighbor

The 2002 campaign marks the 23rd consecutive year that Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers** and his offensive coordinator and neighbor **Wade Lang** are together in football.

Ayers and Lang not only have their offices side-by-side, they also live across the street from each other.

In 1980, when Ayers came to Wofford as an assistant coach, Lang was in his sophomore year. When Ayers left for the defensive coordinator position at East Tennessee State in 1983, Lang joined him in Johnson City as a graduate assistant before being elevated to a full-time position in 1985.

They both returned to Wofford in 1988 when Ayers was named the Terriers' head coach. He brought Lang with him as the quarterback coach. Lang then took over the offensive coordinator duties in 1990.

A Presidential Flavor to the Wofford Staff

Retired Wofford College President **Dr. Joe Lesesne** is in his second season on the Terrier football staff as a volunteer assistant coach working with the tight ends.

Lesesne retired in 2000 after a distinguished 28-year tenure as just the ninth president in the 148-year history of Wofford.

Lesesne is no stranger to football. Upon arriving at Wofford in 1964 as a history professor, he served four years (1965-68) as an assistant football coach for the Terriers under Head Coach **Conley Snidow** and later **Jim Brakefield**. Lesesne also coached one season at Abbeville (S.C.) High School.

Lesesne is teaching a course in South Carolina history this fall.

Future Coach?

If he'd like to follow **Joe Lesesne** from the president's office to the football coaching staff, current Wofford President **Bernie Dunlap** does have a football background.

Dunlap earned All-Area honors as a starting fullback for Columbia (S.C.) High School as well as receiving a varsity letter as a halfback at the University of the South.

Future Schedules

The Terriers will open the 2003 season on Aug. 30 at Air Force, coached by 1960 Wofford graduate **Fisher DeBerry**.

Did You Know?

- •An anonymous donor committed \$100,000 toward the creation of an endowed scholarship in honor of Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers**.
- •Ayers is a black belt in karate and an accomplished sketch artist.
- •Now in his sixth SoCon season at Wofford, Ayers ranks in a tie for second with East Tennessee State's **Paul Hamilton** in league seniority behind Appalachian State's **Jerry Moore** (14 years).

Strength of Schedule

- •The Wofford football team annually plays one of the toughest schedules in the nation for a Division I-AA member. This year's slate is highlighted by Saturday's game at defending ACC champion Maryland.
- •Playing at Clemson and South Carolina last year, Wofford was the nation's only I-AA team to face a pair of bowl teams.
- •The Terriers had four I-AA playoff teams on their 2000 schedule in addition to Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe.
 - •In 1999, Wofford was one of just three I-AA teams to face two I-A opponents.
- •The 1998 campaign saw the Terrier schedule ranked as the eighth-most difficult in the nation with the 11 opponents combining for a .563 winning percentage.

- •Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.

Zolman Goes the Distance in Terrier Victory

After seeing a platoon at quarterback in its opening two contests, Wofford received its first complete game of the season in its 14-7 win at Georgia Southern.

Jeff Zolman went the distance in leading the Terriers to victory. The sophomore southpaw rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries while completing 6-of-8 passes for 40 yards.

On Wofford's fourth quarter game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive, Zolman had a 20-yard pass to **Isaac Goodpaster** on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16-yard line. He then added a 54-yard carry to the Georgia Southern 3-yard line to set up **Jesse McCoy's** go-ahead score.

Wofford's other sophomore quarterbacks, **Trey Rodgers** and **Jonathan Carey**, could very likely see game action at Maryland. The Terrier coaches simply go with the hot hand.

In each of the opening two games, the quarterback standout that night came off-the-bench:

•After Rodgers started the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry, Zolman received SoCon Offensive Player of the Week honors when he rushed for 106 yards on six carries, including an 82-yard touchdown run. He also completed 4-of-6 passes for 49 yards in directing the Terriers to three first-half touchdown drives as Wofford built a 35-0 lead at the intermission.

Zolman's 82-yard touchdown run represented Wofford's longest play from scrimmage since **Lamond Smith** scored on an 87-yard carry at Newberry in 1994.

•Playing in relief of Zolman in the 7-6 win at South Carolina State (Sept. 14), Rodgers scored the Terriers' game-winning touchdown on a 4th-and-goal carry from the 2-yard line with 2:42 left in the third quarter.

Giving Opponents a Melvin

The career-high 168 yards rushing by **Melvin Jones** against Appalachian State last year is even more impressive when considering how the Mountaineers earlier that season contained a pair of recipients of the Walter Payton Award (the Division I-AA equivalent of the Heisman Trophy). The Real McCoy

Halfback **Jesse McCoy** is a big-play weapon in Wofford's offense.

The 1999 SoCon Freshman of the Year averages 9.1 yards each time he touches the ball from the line of scrimmage in his career. He has 2,726 combined rushing and receiving yards on 299 touches. He has 1,948 career yards rushing and needs 52 to reach the 2,000 mark.

McCoy's 7.5 career per carry average is a Wofford record, surpassing the previous mark of 7.0 held by former quarterback great **Shawn Graves** (1989-92). Graves is college football's all-time, all-division rushing quarterback with 5,128 yards and 72 touchdowns.

McCoy has a team-high 265 yards rushing on just 23 carries (11.5 avg.) to go with two receptions for 28 yards.

A senior from Acworth, Ga., McCoy is also being utilized on punt and kick returns.

McCoy became the first player in Wofford history to go over 100 yards rushing and 100 yards receiving in the same game when he ran for 114 yards on nine carries and had three receptions for 115 yards and two touchdowns in a 40-31 win over Western Carolina in the 2000 campaign.

The Best of McCoy

The top five rushing performances of **Jesse McCoy's** collegiate career have seen him average at least 11.4 yards per carry in those contests.

Dominating the Trenches

Nose tackle and preseason All-America **Nathan Fuqua**, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first three years, is already Wofford's career leader in tackles for loss (43).

Fuqua (6-foot-2, 285 pounds) displayed his ability to play at any level with dominating performances in last year's contests at Clemson and South Carolina.

A senior from Danville, Ky., Fuqua had the upperhand on former Clemson All-America center **Kyle Young**. Fuqua also drew postgame praise from USC Head Coach **Lou Holtz** for his performance against the Gamecocks.

Going for It

It's well documented that the entire field is four-down territory for the Terriers, who are 3-of-6 on fourth-down conversions this year.

The Terriers were 21-of-33 (63.6 percent) on fourth-down attempts last season. Wofford was also 15-of-27 (55.6 percent) on fourth downs in the 2000 campaign and 24-of-39 (61.5 percent) in 1999.

Wofford even converted a fake punt on a 4th-and-19 at its own 19-yard line in a 1992 game against Newberry.

Good Genes

Starting outside linebacker and medical school bound **Chase Corn** is a third generation Wofford football player.

Corn's father (**Buddy Corn '76**) and grandfather (**Wade Corn '50**) as well as uncle (**Skip Corn '73**) played football for the Terriers.

The youngest Corn is also the lead vocalist and guitarist for The Senators, a rock band that recently cut its first demo album.

Familiar Names

Sophomore wide receiver **Shiel Wood** is the son of former Wofford athletic director and now Senior Vice-President **David Wood**.

The elder Wood was a football standout at Elon and a former assistant coach at Catawba.

Seeing the Ball

Isaac Goodpaster, the Terriers' leading receiver a year ago, is legally blind with 20/200 vision as he suffers from macular degeneration.

Goodpaster posted a team-best 25 catches for 422 yards (16.9 avg.) and two touchdowns last season.

He had a 15-yard touchdown catch at Clemson and a season-high five receptions at South Carolina.

A native of Mt. Sterling, Ky., Goodpaster has two receptions for 28 yards this season, including a key 20-yard grab on a 3rd-and-13 play from the Terrier 16-yard line on the game-winning 81-yard drive in the fourth quarter of Saturday's 14-7 win at Georgia Southern.

Honorary I-A Members

The Maryland contest will represent Wofford's seventh game in the last five years against a Division I-A opponent.

The Terriers' first game in that stretch was a 29-27 loss at Marshall in the 1998 season finale. Wofford saw its bid for an upset over the Herd fall short when a 29-yard field goal was blocked with just over three minutes to play.

Magic Numbers

•Wofford has a 51-2-1 record in the 54 games under Head Coach **Mike Ayers** in which the Terriers have allowed 16 or fewer points.

Dating back to the final game of the 2000 campaign (a 24-6 win at Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe), Wofford has allowed a total of just 46 points in its last eight wins (5.8 per game).

•Wofford has won 28 consecutive games when holding a halftime lead.

The Terriers' last loss when leading at the break was a 20-16 defeat to Elon in 1995. Wofford held a 9-3 halftime edge that night.

•The last two times the Terriers opened 3-0 to start a season (1990, 1991) resulted in a trip to the NCAA playoffs (Division II).

The Marshall Plan

Prior to becoming the dominant program in Division I-AA, Marshall had to wait five years to win its first Southern Conference game after beginning league play in 1977.

With 19 victories in its opening five years and one game of SoCon membership, Wofford is well ahead of schedule on "The Marshall Plan."

Terriers Versus The ACC

The Wofford football team distinguished itself very well in last year's season opener with Clemson:

- •Wofford's 276 yards rushing against Clemson represented the second-highest total surrendered in the three-year tenure of Tiger Head Coach **Tommy Bowden**. It was surpassed only by the 286 yards posted by Virginia Tech in 1999.
- •Buoyed by a 204-yard rushing performance, Wofford outgained Clemson by a 219-to-211 margin in the first half. The Terriers also held an 18:27-to-11:33 edge in time of possession.
- •The Terriers built first-half leads of 7-0 and 14-7. Wofford still trailed just 24-14 with 10 seconds left in the third quarter.
- •Wofford posted four sacks and an interception against Heisman Trophy candidate **Woodrow Dantzler**. The Terriers had three of their sacks in a five-play sequence of the third quarter. Dantzler was also held to 55 yards rushing on 13 carries.
 - •The Terriers forced a total of three Tiger turnovers.
- •Wofford's performance produced the first boos in Death Valley during the Bowden era.

The Friendly Skies

Wofford's charter flight to College Park, Md., will represent just the fourth time in the Terriers' 113-year football history that they have flown to a game.

The only previous flights for the Wofford football team were a 1990 trip to Clinton, Miss., to face Mississippi College in a Division II playoff game, and trips to Lehigh and Louisiana-Lafayette in the 1998 and 1999 seasons, respectively.

Remember Us?

•Maryland Offensive Coordinator **Charlie Taaffe** saw plenty of Wofford and Head Coach **Mike Ayers** during his head coaching stint at The Citadel (1987-95).

Competing in Division II at the time, the Terriers upset the Taaffeled I-AA Bulldogs by scores of 15-12 and 20-6 in the 1991 and 1993 seasons, respectively.

Overall, Taaffe had a 6-2 record as a head coach versus Wofford. Seven of those eight meetings were with Ayers on the opposing sideline.

•Wofford Athletic Director **Richard Johnson** and Maryland Head Football Coach **Ralph Friedgen** are also connected as they were together at The Citadel during the 1970s.

Friedgen was an assistant coach under **Bobby Ross** and **Art Baker** from 1973-79. During that time, Johnson was a basketball player for the Bulldogs (1972-76) prior to beginning a nine-year tenure as an assistant under then head basketball coach and now Athletic Director **Les Robinson**.

Johnson is in his first full year as athletic director after a 17-year run as Wofford's head men's basketball coach (1985-02).

Wofford Defense Steals Show at Georgia Southern

The following are notables from the Terriers' 14-7 victory at Georgia Southern:

- •Wofford's first-ever win at Paulson Stadium snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for Georgia Southern, who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State.
- •The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 -- a span of 67 home contests.
- •Jesse McCoy's 114 rushing yards were the most by an Eagle opponent since Furman's Louis Ivory gained 122 on Nov. 3, 2001.
- •Jeff Zolman's 54-yard run and McCoy's 47-yard carry were the longest rushing plays against Georgia Southern since Ivory went 73 yards against the Eagles on Nov. 4, 2000.
- •The Terriers' combined rushing effort of 269 yards ran past the Eagles' 234, making it the first time in 75 games that GSU's offense had been outrushed by an opponent other than Furman.
- •The scoreless first half for Georgia Southern was its first at Paulson Stadium since the East Tennessee State contest in 1996.

Zolman and McCoy Make History

Prior to this season, Wofford had never had a SoCon Offensive Player of the Week selection. The Terriers have since garnered the award twice in the opening three games.

Jeff Zolman made history when he was named the SoCon Offensive Player of the Week following his 106-yard rushing performance in the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry.

Jesse McCoy captured the honor after his 114 yards rushing and two touchdowns in the 14-7 win over Georgia Southern.

Thurman Receives Freshman Honor

Inside linebacker **Jim Thurman** received SoCon Freshman of the Week honors following his 13-tackle performance in Saturday's 14-7 win over Georgia Southern.

With leading tackler **Robert Mathis** sidelined by injury, Thurman played the final 59 snaps in the game.

Statistical Oddities

- •The seven points scored in the win over South Carolina State represented the lowest point total in a Wofford victory since a 7-6 decision over Gardner-Webb in the 1977 season finale.
- •The 13 points allowed by the Terriers this season is their lowest point total surrendered after the opening three games of a campaign since 1948, when Wofford also allowed 13 points in a rather memorable campaign.

The Terriers set a national record that year by opening the season with five consecutive ties.

Rising Through the Ranks

Wofford College is in its eighth season on the Division I-AA level.

The Terriers previously competed for seven years in Division II (1988-94). Prior to 1988, Wofford was an NAIA member.

Scheduling Quirks

- •Wofford is playing its first-ever 12-game regular season.
- •The Terriers' opening four contests are night games.

The Terriers will then have just one contest (Nov.9, at East Tennessee State, 6 p.m.) under the lights in the remaining eight, albeit domed lights.

The SoCon's Big Foot

Wofford punter **Jimmy Miner**, a two-time All-SoCon selection, has made his case for All-America honors this fall:

- •In the 7-6 win at South Carolina State, Miner had three of his five kicks downed inside the 9-yard line with his last two punts being placed at the 1-yard line. Another kick resulted in field position at the Bulldog 14-yard line. S.C. State began two of its final three possessions at its own 1-yard line.
- •The average starting field position for S.C. State in the game was its own 14-yard line, including the 9-yard line on four second-half possessions.
- •Miner's first punt in the 14-7 victory over Georgia Southern was downed at the 4-yard line. The average starting position for the Eagles in the game was their own 26.
- •Miner has averaged 47.8 yards in each of the last two games. He had five punts at South Carolina State and six versus Georgia Southern.

For the season, while kicking in wet weather in two of his three games, he has a 46.8 average to place first in the SoCon and fifth nationally.

Miner topped the SoCon and ranked eighth in Division I-AA last year with his average of 42.0 yards.

The two longest punts of his career came in last year's 13-0 win at The Citadel, when he had 67 and 68-yard efforts on the way to a 47.9 average on seven attempts.

Former South Carolina Head Coach **Jim Carlen** was in attendance and commented that he had never seen a punter impact a game like Miner did that afternoon in Charleston.

Miner also had a 43.5 mark on six punts at Clemson.

Who is This Guy?

Wofford's game-winning extra point in the 7-6 victory over South Carolina State was converted by walk-on **Jay Harvey**.

A native of Barnwell, S.C., Harvey was a late addition to the Terrier roster and is not listed in the team's media guide. He was filling in for injured placekicker **Todd Rhoden** (hip flexor). Harvey also converted the Terriers' final PAT in the season-opening 48-0 win over Newberry.

Harvey is the first junior college transfer to play for **Mike Ayers** in his 15-year tenure at Wofford. However, there is an asterisk attached to that status.

Harvey was a soccer player when he attended Spartanburg Methodist College the last two years. SMC does not have a football team.

Harvey did enjoy a successful placekicking career at Barnwell High School. He was 114-of-120 on extra-point attempts and 20-of-24 on field goals with a long of 47. Harvey was a three-time All-Region placekicker and an All-State selection as a senior. He was also named to the 1999 North-South All-Star Game.

Terriers Allow Season-High in Points

The seven points allowed by Wofford in its 14-7 win over Georgia Southern represented a season-high total surrendered by the Terrier defense.

Wofford ranks second in Division I-AA scoring defense, allowing just 4.3 points per game. Opponents have totaled 13 points in the opening three contests.

Avoiding the Turnovers

Wofford has committed just one turnover in its last two games. The lone miscue in that stretch was an interception on a desperation pass off a fake field goal attempt on the final play of the first half in Saturday's 14-7 win at Georgia Southern.

- •Starting quarterback **Jeff Zolman** is the Terriers' second-leading rusher with 187 yards on an 8.5 per carry average. He's also completed 66.7 percent of his passes (10-of-15) for 89 yards.

Traveling Terriers

After playing just two games (Chattanooga and Western Carolina) out of state last season, Wofford will cross the Palmetto border for six of its seven road contests this fall.

The Terriers will take the field in the states of Georgia, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee during the 2002 campaign.

Ouick Strikes

Long known for its ball-control attack, Wofford has had just two scoring drive longer than eight plays this season with the most time-consuming drive being just 3:55.

The Terriers' game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive versus Georgia Southern equaled its longest of the year in terms of plays and was the longest in time of possession. The 81 yards trailed only the "drive" that resulted from a one-play **Jeff Zolman** 82-yard touchdown run against Newberry.

Five of Wofford's seven scoring drives in the season opener against Newberry were accomplished in five plays or less, with an eight-play drive taking just 1:54 and a 10-play drive lasting only 3:46.

Trey Rodgers scored on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 remaining in the third quarter for Wofford's game-winning touchdown in a hardfought 7-6 victory at South Carolina State.

Rodgers' touchdown, the only second-half points allowed by the Bulldogs this season, capped an eight-play, 32-yard drive that was set up by a 13-yard **Jesse McCoy** punt return. **Jay Harvey's** successful extra-point attempt gave Wofford the 7-6 lead.

The Terrier defense and special teams were the story in the first meeting between Wofford and S.C. State since 1977.

Jesse McCoy rushed for a game-high 114 yards and scored both Terrier touchdowns, the last on a 4th-and-goal carry from the 1-yard line, to lift Wofford to a 14-7 victory over No. 8 Georgia Southern.

The Terriers' first-ever win at Paulson Stadium also snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for the Eagles, who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State.

The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 -- a span of 67 home contests.

The Wofford defense limited the Eagles to 234 yards rushing and 257 total.

McCoy's 30-yard touchdown run with 4:08 left in the first quarter gave Wofford a 6-0 lead that stood until the fourth quarter.

Benton was on the field for all but one of Georgia Southern's 74 offensive snaps. Playing just outside his hometown, the senior from Savannah, Ga., totaled a career-best 16 tackles. Included in that total were two stops for a loss with one sack. Benton now tops the Terriers with 29 tackles on the year.

The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 - a span of 67 home contests. The scoreless first half for Georgia Southern was its first at Paulson Stadium since 1996.

The Terrier defense also limited the Eagles, the nation's top rushing team entering the game at 435.0 yards per contest, to just 234 yards on the ground and 257 in total offense.

Chris Downs ran for 147 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries to lead defending Atlantic Coast Conference champion Maryland to a 37-8 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 44,098 in College Park, Md.

The Terrapins (3-2) have won 10 of 11 at Byrd Stadium while the Terriers, ranked No. 19 in Division I-AA, drop to 3-1. Wofford was also playing its third consecutive road game.

Maryland coach Ralph Friedgen and his players spoke all week about how much they thought of the Wofford program, and those feelings intensified during the game.

"They never quit, that team," Friedgen said. "They fought hard and, I tell you what, our guys have a lot of respect for them.

"Wofford is a very scrappy, tough team. I thought our defense played exceptionally, especially in the first half."

Maryland took a 3-0 lead on its opening series of the game as Nick Novak converted the first of his three field goals on the night, a 39-yard effort just 3:10 into the contest.

The Terriers then drove 55 yards in seven plays on their first possession before a fumble gave the Terrapins the ball back at their own 25-yard line.

"It (the fumble) was huge," Wofford head coach Mike Ayers said. "If we knock that in, the complexion of the game is completely different.

"The thing we were looking for offensively was confidence," Ayers said. "We were moving it and executing, and we dropped a pitch. You can't do that against a good team like Maryland.

"I'm still very proud of the effort, especially on defense. We played with a lot of heart tonight."

Jeff Zolman hit Marcus Gilmore with a 17-yard completion on Wofford's opening snap. Zolman also had an 11-yard pass to Curtis Nash on the drive. Zolman completed 5-of-7 passes for 44 yards on the night.

After a Novak 43-yard goal with 10 seconds left in the first quarter gave Maryland a 6-0 lead, the Terrapins reached the end zone for the first time on a Downs six-yard run with 9:57 to play in the first half to take a 13-0 lead. Maryland eventually took a 20-0 halftime edge on a Josh Allen one-yard run with 14 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

The Terriers got on the board when Trey Rodgers came off-the-bench to direct an 18-play, 92-yard drive covering 8:02 on the clock. Ben Mungin had three carries for 25 yards on the possession, part of his team-best 43 yards on the ground. He also added a seven-yard pass

reception.

Melvin Jones capped the drive with a two-yard scoring run to cut the Maryland lead to 30-6 with 11:44 remaining. The extra-point attempt was missed.

The Terriers scored again just 32 seconds later when Anthony Jones sacked Maryland quarterback Scott McBrien in the end zone for a safety and Wofford's final points on the night.

Maryland outgained Wofford by a 390-to-210 edge in total offense.

Wofford returns to SoCon action next Saturday when it hosts Chattanooga at 3 p.m. in a regionally-televised contest (CSS) from Gibbs Stadium.

Blackburn, a senior from Marysville, Ohio, graded out at 89 percent and had four knockdown blocks. The Terriers reached the end zone at Maryland with an 18-play, 92-yard drive covering 8:02.

Nelson totaled a team-high 18 tackles, including 12 solo stops. For the season, the junior from Grove City, Ohio, tops Wofford with 44 tackles. He received All-SoCon honors last season when his 114 tackles represented the highest total by a Wofford player since 1987.

Nelson has been instrumental in the Terriers topping the SoCon in total defense (276.2 yards per game). Wofford also tops the league while ranking fifth nationally in pass defense, allowing just 91.2 yards per game. The Terriers are also 12th in Division I-AA in scoring defense, surrendering an average of 12.5 points each contest.

This Week

•The Wofford College football team, ranked No. 20 by The Sports Network and ESPN/USA Today, returns home for the first time in over a month when it hosts Chattanooga in the Terriers' regionally-televised (CSS) Homecoming contest. Kickoff was moved from the original 1:30 p.m. start time to 3 p.m.

Since opening the season with an Aug. 31 home game versus Newberry, the Terriers had an open date followed by consecutive road contests at South Carolina State, Georgia Southern, and Maryland. Wofford did not have a home game in the month of September.

Wofford will be looking to avenge a 29-26 loss to the Mocs last year in Chattanooga. Trailing 22-11, the Terriers scored a pair of touchdowns in a 5:43 span of the fourth quarter to take a 26-22 lead with 1:14 remaining. However, Chattanooga responded with a six-play, 83-yard drive to score the winning touchdown on a 21-yard **Chuck Spearman** scoring pass to **Jason Jones** with just 20 seconds to play.

•Chattanooga's victory last year broke a two-game Wofford winning streak in the series. The Mocs still hold a 6-2 overall lead. Since the Terriers began SoCon play in the 1997 campaign, Chattanooga has won three of five meetings.

•At 3-1, Wofford has posted its best start to a season since opening the 1990 and 1991 campaigns with 4-0 records. Those two seasons also represent the last time the Terriers advanced to the NCAA playoffs (Division II). In five previous years of SoCon play, Wofford has never opened with a 2-0 mark.

A Look Back

The Head Coach

Mike Ayers, Wofford College's all-time winningest coach, is in his 15th year on the Terrier sideline.

Now with 84 victories, Ayers broke the previous school mark of 77 wins (**Conley Snidow**, 1953-66) with last year's 35-10 victory over Charleston Southern.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Ayers was named the 2000 SoCon Coach of the Year from the league coaches and media after guiding the Terriers to a 7-4 record and Top 25 national ranking.

Ayers is also a two-time Kodak Region Coach of the Year after leading the Terriers to NCAA playoff appearances in 1990 and 1991.

Hello Neighbor

The 2002 campaign marks the 23rd consecutive year that Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers** and his offensive coordinator and neighbor **Wade Lang** are together in football.

Ayers and Lang not only have their offices side-by-side, they also live across the street from each other.

In 1980, when Ayers came to Wofford as an assistant coach, Lang was in his sophomore year. When Ayers left for the defensive coordinator position at East Tennessee State in 1983, Lang joined him in Johnson City as a graduate assistant before being elevated to a full-time position in 1985.

They both returned to Wofford in 1988 when Ayers was named the Terriers' head coach. He brought Lang with him as the quarterback coach. Lang then took over the offensive coordinator duties in 1990.

A Presidential Flavor to the Wofford Staff

Retired Wofford College President **Dr. Joe Lesesne** is in his second season on the Terrier football staff as a volunteer assistant coach working with the tight ends.

Lesesne retired in 2000 after a distinguished 28-year tenure as just the ninth president in the 148-year history of Wofford.

Lesesne is no stranger to football. Upon arriving at Wofford in 1964 as a history professor, he served four years (1965-68) as an assistant football coach for the Terriers under Head Coach **Conley Snidow** and later **Jim Brakefield**. Lesesne also coached one season at Abbeville (S.C.) High School.

Lesesne is teaching a course in South Carolina history this fall.

Future Coach?

If he'd like to follow **Joe Lesesne** from the president's office to the football coaching staff, current Wofford President **Bernie Dunlap** does have a football background.

Dunlap earned All-Area honors as a starting fullback for Columbia (S.C.) High School as well as receiving a varsity letter as a halfback at the University of the South.

Future Schedules

The Terriers will open the 2003 season on Aug. 30 at Air Force, coached by 1960 Wofford graduate **Fisher DeBerry**.

- •An anonymous donor committed \$100,000 toward the creation of an endowed scholarship in honor of Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers**.
- •Ayers is a black belt in karate and an accomplished sketch artist.

About Wofford

- •Located in Spartanburg, S.C., Wofford is one of only five independent colleges and universities to have a Phi Beta Kappa chapter in the Carolinas (Davidson, Duke, Furman, and Wake Forest are the others).
- •Wofford is one of just three Division I colleges or universities to have the nickname Terriers. The others are Boston University and St. Francis (N.Y.).
- •Founded in 1854, Wofford has an enrollment of 1,100, making it the smallest school in NCAA Division I-A or I-AA football.
- •With 1,100 students, Wofford is the second smallest school in Division I. Only Centenary (La.) is smaller with 850 students. However, the Gentlemen do not field a football team.
- •Famous Wofford graduates include Carolina Panther owner and founder **Jerry Richardson** and Air Force Head Football Coach **Fisher DeBerry**.

A Tale of Three Quarterbacks

•The Wofford quarterback position is represented by three sophomores (**Jeff Zolman**, **Trey Rodgers**, and **Jonathan Carey**) who battle each week for the starting job. All three could very likely see action in a game with the Terrier coaches simply riding the hot hand.

•Zolman is the lone signal caller to turn in a complete-game performance, as his route-going effort led Wofford to its 14-7 win at Georgia Southern. The southpaw from Dayton, Ohio, rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries while completing 6-of-8 passes for 40 yards against the Eagles.

For the season, Zolman is 15-of-22 (68.2 percent) in the air for 133 yards. He is without an interception or touchdown pass. He is also the Terriers' second-leading rusher with 172 yards on 27 attempts (6.4 avg.).

On Wofford's fourth quarter game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive at Georgia Southern, Zolman had a 20-yard pass to **Isaac Goodpaster** on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16-yard line. He then added a 54-yard carry to the Eagle three-yard line to set up **Jesse McCoy's** go-ahead score.

•Rodgers came off-the-bench at Maryland and led the Terriers on an 18-play,92-yard drive covering 8:02. On the previous series, he had a 20-yard run on his first snap of the game.

•In each of the opening two games, the quarterback standout that night came off-the-bench:
After Rodgers started the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry, Zolman received
SoCon Offensive Player of the Week honors when he rushed for 106 yards on six carries, including

an 82-yard touchdown run. He also completed 4-of-6 passes for 49 yards in directing the Terriers to three first-half touchdown drives as Wofford built a 35-0 lead at the intermission.

Zolman's 82-yard touchdown run represented Wofford's longest play from scrimmage since **Lamond Smith** scored on an 87-yard carry at Newberry in 1994.

Playing in relief of Zolman in the 7-6 win at South Carolina State (Sept. 14), Rodgers scored the Terriers' game-winning touchdown on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 left in the third quarter.

•Wofford quarterbacks have completed 58.8 percent of their pass attempts (20-of-34) for 180 yards. The team's lone interception was thrown by holder **Shiel Wood** on a fake field-goal attempt.

The Terrier quarterback position has also combined for 250 yards rushing this season, an average of 62.5 yards per game.

Just Call Him Joe College...

Wofford fullback and Dean's List student **J.R. McNair** is extremely active on campus.

The Terriers' fourth-leading rusher with 139 yards (4.0 avg.), McNair is one of just five I-AA players to be named to the 2002 American Football Coaches Association "Good Works" Team, recognizing him for his community involvement.

McNair was also selected to the 2001 Verizon Academic All-District team.

•Jeff Zolman's older brother, Greg, was the starting quarterback the last two seasons at Vanderbilt.

Wofford's Zolman is also the lone southpaw among the quarterback trio.

- •As a freshman last year, fellow signal caller **Jonathan Carey** was the Most Valuable Player on Wofford's indoor track team.
- •Trey Rodgers is a local performer who earned South Carolina Player of the Year honors when he led Dorman High School in Spartanburg to the 2000 state title.

The Real McCoy

Halfback **Jesse McCoy** is a big-play weapon in Wofford's offense.

The 1999 SoCon Freshman of the Year averages 9.0 yards each time he touches the ball from the line of scrimmage in his career. He has 2,743 combined rushing and receiving yards on 305 touches. He has 1,965 career yards rushing and needs 35 to reach the 2,000 mark.

McCoy's 7.4 career per carry average is a Wofford record, surpassing the previous mark of 7.0 held by former quarterback great **Shawn Graves** (1989-92). Graves is college football's all-time, all-division rushing quarterback with 5,128 yards and 72 touchdowns.

McCoy has a team-high 282 yards rushing on just 29 carries (9.7 avg.) to go with two receptions for 28 yards.

A senior from Acworth, Ga., McCoy is also being utilized on punt and kick returns.

McCoy became the first player in Wofford history to go over 100 yards rushing and 100 yards receiving in the same game when he ran for 114 yards on nine carries and had three receptions for 115 yards and two touchdowns in a 40-31 win over Western Carolina in the 2000 campaign.

The Best of McCoy

The top five rushing performances of **Jesse McCoy's** collegiate career have seen him average at least 11.4 yards per carry in those contests.

Nose tackle and preseason All-America **Nathan Fuqua**, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first three years, is already Wofford's career leader in tackles for loss (44).

Fuqua (6-foot-2, 285 pounds) displayed his ability to play at any level with dominating performances in last year's contests at Clemson and South Carolina.

A senior from Danville, Ky., Fuqua had the upperhand on former Clemson All-America center **Kyle Young**. Fuqua also drew postgame praise from USC Head Coach **Lou Holtz** for his performance against the Gamecocks.

Giving Opponents a Melvin

The career-high 168 yards rushing by **Melvin Jones** against Appalachian State last year is even more impressive when considering how the Mountaineers earlier that season contained a pair of recipients of the Walter Payton Award (the Division I-AA equivalent of the Heisman Trophy). Seeing the Ball

Isaac Goodpaster, the Terriers' leading receiver a year ago, is legally blind with 20/200 vision as he suffers from Stargardt's disease.

Goodpaster posted a team-best 25 catches for 422 yards (16.9 avg.) and two touchdowns last season.

He had a 15-yard touchdown catch at Clemson and a season-high five receptions at South Carolina.

A native of Mt. Sterling, Ky., Goodpaster has two receptions for 28 yards this season, including a key 20-yard grab on a 3rd-and-13 play from the Terrier 16-yard line on the game-winning 81-yard drive in the fourth quarter of the 14-7 win at Georgia Southern.

Honorary I-A Members

The Maryland contest represented Wofford's seventh game in the last five years against a Division I-A opponent.

The Terriers' first game in that stretch was a 29-27 loss at Marshall in the 1998 season finale. Wofford saw its bid for an upset over the Herd fall short when a 29-yard field goal was blocked with just over three minutes to play.

•Wofford has a 51-2-1 record in the 54 games under Head Coach **Mike Ayers** in which the Terriers have allowed 16 or fewer points.

Dating back to the final game of the 2000 campaign (a 24-6 win at Division I-A Louisiana-Monroe), Wofford has allowed a total of just 46 points in its last eight wins (5.8 per game).

A pair of Chattanooga-area natives have been making their mark on the Wofford defense.

Inside linebacker **Jim Thurman** (Hixson, Tenn.; Red Bank High School) received SoCon Freshman of the Week honors after totaling 13 tackles in the Terriers' 14-7 win at Georgia Southern. A true freshman, Thurman then made his first collegiate start in the Maryland game and once again combined for 13 stops. He also had no missed tackles.

McMinn County High School graduate and Athens, Tenn., native **Brandon Ladd** is the Terriers' starting strong safety. He had an interception and fumble recovery in the victory over Georgia Southern while also combining for nine stops in the game.

Wofford Defense Steals Show at Georgia Southern

The following are notables from the Terriers' 14-7 victory at Georgia Southern:

•Wofford's first-ever win at Paulson Stadium snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for Georgia Southern, who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State.

•The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 -- a span of 67 home contests.

•Jesse McCoy's 114 rushing yards were the most by an Eagle opponent since Furman's Louis Ivory gained 122 on Nov. 3, 2001.

•Jeff Zolman's 54-yard run and McCoy's 47-yard carry were the longest rushing plays against Georgia Southern since Ivory went 73 yards against the Eagles on Nov. 4, 2000.

•The Terriers' combined rushing effort of 269 yards ran past the Eagles' 234, making it the first time in 75 games that GSU's offense had been outrushed by an opponent other than Furman.

•The scoreless first half for Georgia Southern was its first at Paulson Stadium since the East Tennessee State contest in 1996.

Terriers Making National News

•The Wofford football team was featured in the Sept. 25 edition of the *New York Times*.

The article was centered on the uniqueness of the Wofford program, including having the smallest enrollment of any Division I-A or I-AA member, to a former college president (**Joe Lesesne**) on the coaching staff, and a legally blind wide receiver (**Isaac Goodpaster**).

•Goodpaster will be featured later this week on CBS' *The Early Show*. A CBS crew from New York will be on campus Tuesday to spend the day with Goodpaster as well as interviewing several teammates and Head Coach **Mike Ayers**.

Turnovers, It's No Cliche...

In back-to-back road wins over South Carolina State and Georgia Southern, the Terriers committed just one turnover -- an interception by holder **Shiel Wood** on a desperation pass off a fake field goal at the close of the first half in Statesboro, Ga.

Wofford committed two turnovers at Maryland and is now a minus-one in that category for the year.

The Artful One

Jesse McCoy is an accomplished sketch artist whose portraits of his teammates and coaches have become legendary on the locker room greaseboard.

Zolman and McCoy Make History

Prior to this season, Wofford had never had a SoCon Offensive Player of the Week selection. The Terriers have since garnered the award twice in their opening four games.

Jeff Zolman made history when he was named the SoCon Offensive Player of the Week following his 106-yard rushing performance in the season-opening 48-0 victory over Newberry.

Jesse McCoy captured the honor after his 114 yards rushing and two touchdowns in the 14-7 win over Georgia Southern.

Thurman Receives Freshman Honor

Inside linebacker **Jim Thurman** received SoCon Freshman of the Week honors following a 13-tackle performance in the 14-7 win at Georgia Southern.

With leading tackler **Robert Mathis** sidelined by injury, Thurman played the final 59 snaps in the game.

Statistical Oddities

The seven points scored in the win over South Carolina State represented the lowest point total in a Wofford victory since a 7-6 decision over Gardner-Webb in the 1977 season finale.

South Carolina's Team

South Carolina State represented the seventh in-state opponent that Wofford has faced in the last two years.

During that time, the Terriers have played Clemson, Charleston Southern, The Citadel, South Carolina, Furman, and Newberry.

Rising Through the Ranks

Wofford College is in its eighth season on the Division I-AA level.

The Terriers previously competed for seven years in Division II (1988-94). Prior to 1988, Wofford was an NAIA member.

Scheduling Quirks

- •Wofford is playing its first-ever 12-game regular season.
- •The Terriers' opening four contests were night games.

Wofford has just one contest (Nov. 9, at East Tennessee State, 6 p.m.) under the lights in the remaining eight, albeit domed lights.

The SoCon's Big Foot

Wofford punter **Jimmy Miner**, a two-time All-SoCon selection, has made his case for All-America honors this fall:

- •For the season, while kicking in wet weather in two of his four games, Miner tops the SoCon while ranking third nationally with a 46.1 average on 21 attempts.
 - •Ten of Miner's 21 punts (47.6 percent) have gone at least 50 yards.
- •Eight of 21 punts have gone inside the 20-yard line with five inside the 10-yard line and three inside the five-yard line.
- •In the 7-6 win at South Carolina State, Miner had three of his five kicks downed inside the nine-yard line with his last two punts being placed at the one-yard line. Another kick resulted in field position at the Bulldog 14-yard line. S.C. State began two of its final three possessions at its own one-yard line.
- •The average starting field position for S.C. State in the game was its own 14-yard line, including the nine-yard line on four second-half possessions.
- •Miner's first punt in the 14-7 victory over Georgia Southern was downed at the four-yard line. The average starting position for the Eagles in the game was their own 26.
- •Miner had a 44.7 average on seven kicks at Maryland after recording a 43.5 mark on six attempts in last year's season opener at Clemson, his other game against ACC competition.
- •He topped the SoCon and ranked eighth in Division I-AA last year with his average of 42.0 yards
- •The two longest punts of his career came in last year's 13-0 win at The Citadel, when he had 67 and 68-yard efforts on the way to a 47.9 average on seven attempts.

Former South Carolina Head Coach **Jim Carlen** was in attendance and commented that he had never seen a punter impact a game like Miner did that afternoon in Charleston.

Who is This Guy?

Wofford's game-winning extra point in the 7-6 victory over South Carolina State was converted by walk-on **Jay Harvey**.

A native of Barnwell, S.C., Harvey was a late addition to the Terrier roster and is not listed in the team's media guide. He was filling in for injured placekicker **Todd Rhoden** (hip flexor). Harvey also converted the Terriers' final PAT in the season-opening 48-0 win over Newberry.

Harvey is the first junior college transfer to play for **Mike Ayers** in his 15-year tenure at Wofford. However, there is an asterisk attached to that status.

Harvey was a soccer player when he attended Spartanburg Methodist College the last two years. SMC does not have a football team.

Harvey did enjoy a successful placekicking career at Barnwell High School. He was 114-of-120 on extra-point attempts and 20-of-24 on field goals with a long of 47. Harvey was a three-time All-Region placekicker and an All-State selection as a senior. He was also named to the 1999 North-South All-Star Game.

A Collective Receiving Effort

Twelve different players have combined for Wofford's 20 pass receptions this season, with senior fullback **Melvin Jones** topping the team with three catches for 11 yards. Six other players are tied for second with two grabs.

Ayers Joins Wofford Broadcast Booth

With Wofford color analyst **Thom Henson** unable to make the Maryland game due to a previous commitment, an Ayers debuted in the Terrier broadcast booth.

Travis Ayers, the 18-year-old son of Head Coach **Mike Ayers**, drew positive reviews in his debut behind the mike. The younger Ayers is a freshman at Dickinson College in Carlisle, Pa.

There is no word yet on whether Coach Ayers threatened his son with a loss of spending money for any second guessing or critical comments on the air.

Familiar Names

Sophomore wide receiver **Shiel Wood** is the son of former Wofford athletic director and now Senior Vice-President **David Wood**.

The elder Wood was a football standout at Elon and a former assistant coach at Catawba.

It's not uncommon for Wofford Head Coach **Mike Ayers** to drive the team's equipment truck when it travels, or to personally powerwash the Terriers' blocking sleds when they need cleaning.

Traveling Terriers

After playing just two games (Chattanooga and Western Carolina) out of state last season, Wofford will cross the Palmetto border for six of its seven road contests this fall.

The Terriers will take the field in the states of Georgia, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee during the 2002 campaign.

Ouick Strikes

Long known for its ball-control attack, Wofford has had just three scoring drives longer than eight plays this season and just one longer than 3:55.

Against Maryland, the Terriers had their longest drive of the season in terms of plays (18), yards (92), and time of possession (8:02).

Wofford went 81 yards in 10 plays for its game-winning fourthquarter touchdown in the 14-7 win over Georgia Southern.

Five of Wofford's seven scoring drives in the season opener against Newberry were accomplished in five plays or less, with an eight-play drive taking just 1:54 and a 10-play drive lasting only 3:46.

Trey Rodgers scored on a 4th-and-goal carry from the two-yard line with 2:42 remaining in the third quarter for Wofford's game-winning touchdown in a hardfought 7-6 victory at South Carolina State.

Rodgers' touchdown, the only second-half points allowed by the Bulldogs this season, capped an eight-play, 32-yard drive that was set up by a 13-yard **Jesse McCoy** punt return. **Jay Harvey's** successful extra-point attempt gave Wofford the 7-6 lead.

The Terrier defense and special teams were the story in the first meeting between Wofford and S.C. State since 1977.

Jimmy Miner, an All-SoCon selection in each of his first two seasons and a preseason All-America, averaged 47.8 yards on five punts. Two of those kicks were downed by **Steve Hoover** at the Bulldog one-yard line, forcing S.C. State to start two of its final three series in the shadow of its own goal line. Two other punts were downed inside the 13-yard line.

The Bulldogs' average starting field position for the game was their own 14-yard line, including the 9-yard line on four second-half possessions.

S.C. State took a 6-0 lead with 13:57 to play in the first half on a five-yard **Derek Watson** scoring run, the only points the Terriers have allowed in their opening two games.

McCoy was Wofford's top ground gainer with 77 yards on eight carries, including a 37-yard run on a 2nd-and-9 at the Terrier 30 to help Wofford run out the clock on the game's final possession. J.R. McNair added 76 yards on 15 carries.

Wofford 14, Georgia Southern 7 Sept. 21, 2002; Statesboro, Ga.

Jesse McCoy rushed for a game-high 114 yards and scored both Terrier touchdowns, the last on a 4th-and-goal carry from the 1-yard line, to lift Wofford to a 14-7 victory over No. 8 Georgia Southern.

The Terriers' first-ever win at Paulson Stadium also snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for the Eagles, who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State.

The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 -- a span of 67 home contests.

The Wofford defense limited the Eagles to 234 yards rushing and 257 total.

McCoy's 30-yard touchdown run with 4:08 left in the first quarter gave Wofford a 6-0 lead that stood until the fourth quarter.

Zolman added 74 yards on the ground, 54 coming on a pivotal 3rd-and-3 play from the Wofford 43-yard line midway through the fourth quarter to highlight the Terriers' game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive.

Zolman had a 20-yard completion to **Isaac Goodpaster** on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16 earlier on that series. He later added his keeper to set up McCoy's go-ahead score. Zolman then ran for the two-point conversion to extend the Terriers' lead to 14-7.

Georgia Southern took a 7-6 lead at the beginning of the fourth quarter when **Zzream Walden** scored from two yards out on a 4th-and-goal play with 14:20 remaining.

Chris Downs ran for 147 yards and a touchdown to lead defending ACC champion Maryland to a 37-8 victory over Wofford before a crowd of 44,098 in College Park, Md.

The Terrapins won for the 10th time in 11 games at Byrd Stadium while the Terriers were playing their third consecutive road game.

"They never quit," Maryland Head Coach Ralph Friedgen said. "They fought hard and, I tell you what, our guys have a lot of respect for them. Wofford is a very scrappy, tough team."

A pair of **Nick Novak** field goals gave Maryland a 6-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Terriers threatened on their opening drive when they reached the Terrapin 25-yard line before a costly fumble.
