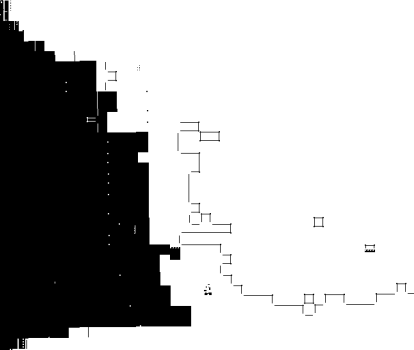

MINUTES

OF THE

SEVENTIETH SESSION OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPIS- COPAL CHURCH, SOUTH.

HELD IN CHARLOTTE, NORTH CAROLINA, BEGINNING ON
WEDNESDAY MORNING, NOVEMBER, 25TH, 1857.

The Conference met, Nov. 25, at nine o'clock, A. M., in the Court House, and was opened with the exercises of a Prayer-meeting, conducted by Rev. Robert Paine, Presiding Bishop.

The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll and one hundred and three members answered to their names.

Paul A. M. Williams was elected Secretary, and the usual committees appointed for the session. The Conference continued its sessions during Thursday, Nov. 26th, Friday Nov. 27th, Saturday, Nov. 28th, Monday, Nov. 30th, Tuesday, Dec. 1st, Wednesday, Dec. 2nd, and Thursday, Dec. 3d, Bishop Paine presiding.

Its daily sessions were opened with the customary religious services.

After the usual Disciplinary Questions had been answered and the reports of the various literary and benevolent institutions connected with the Conference had been received, and the other usual business of the Conference had been transacted, the

Conference adjourned with the Benediction from the Bishop on Thursday, at half past nine o'clock, P. M.

Their characters were strictly examined by calling over their names severally before the Conference.

QUESTION XII. *Who have died this year?*

Charles S. Walker was born in Charleston, S. C., on the 22d Jan., 1815. At the Young Men's Prayer-meeting he was brought to know himself a sinner, and to feel his need of a personal interest in the Saviour. He was happily converted to God on the 30th September, 1830. In the ardour of his early love he gave himself fully to his Master's work, and ere he had attained his legal majority, in the freshness of his youth he forsook the house of his father to encounter the toil and privation of a Methodist Preacher's life. He was admitted on trial into this Conference in the beginning of 1834, and sent to Black Swamp Circuit. In 1835 he travelled the Walterboro circuit. In 1836 and '7 he laboured on the Pocotaligo mission; in 1838 on the Rockingham circuit; in 1839 on the Combahee and Ashepoo mission; in 1840 on the Black River circuit; in 1841 in Fayetteville; in 1842 in Yorkville; in 1843 in Brunswick circuit; in 1844, '45 and '46 on the Black River and Pee Dee mission; in 1847 on the Wadesboro circuit; in 1848 on the Black River and Pee Dee mission; in 1849 and '50 on the Darlington circuit; in 1851 and '52 on the Wadesboro circuit; in 1853 on the Newberry circuit; in 1854 on the Abbeville station; in 1855 he was made Supernumerary and stationed in Spartanburg; in 1856 he was Agent for Wofford College, and at our last Conference was appointed for the present year to Spartanburg circuit. He entered upon the duties of his last appointment with his accustomed zeal and devotion. Indeed the fidelity with which he endeavoured to perform his duties was probably the cause of his death. For several years he had complained of an affection of the throat, and his exposure to the severe weather of the last winter in

meeting his engagements on his circuit brought on an attack of which he died on the 18th January last.

He was a man of stern integrity, sound judgment, and high moral courage, and to those qualities may be added great simplicity and purity of character. In our Conference he was an efficient member of the Joint Board of Finance and the confidence reposed in him by his brethren was shown, by his election as a Trustee to two of our institutions of learning. His well-spent life was followed by a peaceful death. In his last illness, he gave assurances of an unshaken trust in God, and he has left to his family and to the church the richest legacy—the remembrance of his virtuous life, and unspotted character.

CONFERENCE INSTITUTIONS, RESOLUTIONS, COMMITTEES, Etc.

SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SOCIETY,

AUXILIARY TO THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST
EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This Society shall be denominated "The Missionary Society of the South Carolina Conference, Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South."

Article II. The object of this Society shall be to assist the Parent Society to extend its Missionary labours in the United States and elsewhere.

Article III. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, two Vice Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and nine Managers, who shall be annually elected by the Society, all of whom shall be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Article IV. At all meetings of the Board of Managers it shall require five members to form a quorum.

Article V. The Board shall have authority to make By-Laws for regulating its own proceedings; and shall annually submit a report of its transactions and funds to the Society; and shall inform the Conference of the state of its funds.

Article VI. The Treasurer shall hold the funds of the Society, subject to the Drafts of the Bishop, in accordance with the Second Article of the Constitution.

Article VII. Each subscriber paying \$1 annually shall be a member of this Society; and the payment of \$10 shall constitute a member for life.

Article VIII. The Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held sometime during the session of the Conference, at the discretion of the Board of Managers.

Article IX. The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer shall be ex officio members of the Board of Managers.

Article X. At all the meetings of the Society, the President, or in his absence, one of the Vice Presidents, or in the absence of both Vice Presidents, such member as shall be appointed by the meeting shall preside.

Article XI. The Minutes of each meeting of the Society shall be signed by the President and Recording Secretary.

Article XII. The Constitution shall not be altered, but by a vote of two-thirds of the Annual Conference, at the recommendation of the Board of Managers.

BY LAWS.

I. The Managers shall meet annually, at such places as may be appointed for the Annual Conference, on the day previous to its sitting.

II. At all meetings of the Board, the President, or in his absence, the Vice President, or President *pro tem.*, shall take the chair at the hour appointed; shall preserve order, and appoint committees; and shall, also, have authority to appoint extra meetings of the Board.

III. The Secretary shall keep a correct journal of the minutes and proceedings of the Board, and attend all its sittings when practicable, and, in case of absence, transmit the records of the Board to the place of meeting.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a correct account of receipts and expenditures, which shall be submitted with the necessary vouchers to an auditing committee to be appointed by the Board at each annual meeting.

V. The Board shall hold a meeting on a day not later than the seventh of the Conference sessions, at which the Treasurer shall be required to furnish a statement of the funds; and the Board shall thereupon notify the Presiding Bishops of the amount for which Drafts may be made the ensuing year.

The Board of Managers held their annual meeting in accordance with the First By Law of the Society. The Board met in the Town Hall at Charlotte, N. C., at nine o'clock, A. M., of Tuesday, Nov. 24th. The following is an abstract of the Reports of the different Missions presented to the Board.

Cooper River Mission, served by Rev. G. W. Moore, who reports 11 preaching places, 603 in full membership, 240 on trial, and 370 catechumens.

Pon Pon Mission, served by Rev. W. C. Kirkland, who reports 13 plantations served, 484 members in full connection, 120 on trial, 165 catechumens, among a population of 1500.

St. George's Mission, served by Rev. Abram Nettles, who reports 10 plantations served, 6 preaching places, 103 colored in full connection, 110 on probation, and 114 catechumens, 33 whites in full connection, and 24 on probation.

Society Hill Mission, served by Rev. I. P. Hughes, who reports 5 preaching places, 16 plantations served, 6 whites and 113 colored in full connection, and 62 colored on probation, 330 catechumens, among a population of 2500.

Beaufort Mission, served by Rev. J. R. Coburn, who reports 6 churches, 267 in full connection, 98 on trial, and 239 children catechised.

Edisto and Jhossee Mission, served by Rev. Charles Wilson, who reports 9 plantations served, 7 preaching places, 581 church members, 43 on probation, and 150 children catechised.

Congaree Mission, served by Rev. N. Talley, who reports 13 whites in

full membership, and 2 on trial, 349 colored in full connection, 68 on trial, and 292 catechumens.

Upper Broad River Mission. A Mission to the whites, and reported as a field of promise.

St. Andrew's Mission, served by Rev. A. R. Danner, who reports 145 blacks in full connection, 205 on trial, 18 whites in full connection, and 70 colored catechumens.

Prince William's Mission, served by Rev. Wm. Hutto, who reports 9 plantations served, 7 preaching places, 4 whites in full connection, and 172 colored. On trial 35 colored and 150 catechumens.

Santee Mission, served by Rev. J. T. DuBose and Caspar E. Wiggins, who report 22 preaching places, 804 colored in full connection, 384 on trial, and 310 catechumens.

Sampit Mission, served by Rev. Thos. Mitchell, who reports 8 plantations served, 140 members in full connection, 22 on trial, and 350 catechumens, among a population of 1200.

Black River Mission, served by Rev. J. W. Miller, who reports 10 preaching places, 1359 in full connection, 100 on probation, 467 catechumens, among a population of 3000.

Liberty Chapel Mission, served by Rev. John A. Mood, who reports 7 plantations served, 7 preaching places, 25 whites and 163 colored in full connection, 66 colored on trial, and 75 catechumens. He also reports 1 Sabbath-school for the whites, with 1 superintendent, 4 teachers, 25 scholars, and 30 volumes in the library.

Black Mingo Mission, served by Rev. G. W. Stokes, who reports 9 plantations served, 6 preaching places, 8 whites and 265 colored in full connection, 47 colored on trial, and 200 catechumens.

Waccamaw Mission, served by Rev. J. R. Minick, and J. L. McGregor who report 12 preaching places, 39 whites and 504 colored in full connection, 7 whites and 88 colored on trial, and 239 catechumens.

Upper Waccamaw Mission. This mission is principally to the whites, and was served by Rev. G. K. Andrews, who reports 119 whites, 42 colored in full connection, and 10 whites on trial, 1 Sabbath-school, with 1 superintendent, 6 teachers, 40 scholars and 6 volumes in library.

Richland Fork Mission, served by Rev. A. L. Smith, who reports 43 whites and 265 colored in full connection, 23 whites, 70 colored on trial, and 150 catechumens.

Graniteville Mission is a mission for the whites; was served by Rev. W. W. Mood, who reports 95 whites and 1 colored in full connection, a Sabbath-school with 8 officers and teachers, 65 scholars and 200 volumes in library.

Tiger River and Enorce Mission, served by Rev. John Finger, who reports 6 preaching places, 25 plantations served, 200 colored in full connection, 124 on trial, and 500 catechumens, among a population of 4000.

Upper Santee Mission, served by Rev. W. Carson and S. Owens, who report 8 public churches, 83 whites and 569 colored in full connection, 3 whites and 56 colored on probation and 200 catechumens.

Jocassee Mission, to the whites, served by Rev. L. Scarbrough, who reports 13 preaching places, 115 whites in full connection and 20 on trial.

Walhalla Mission, served by Rev. J. H. Zimmerman, who reports 100

honoured to be a co-worker with God. It has not pleased Him to employ angelic agency for the conversion of the world. No flaming Seraphim are the preachers of salvation, but men of like passions with ourselves. Bound together by the ties of a common origin, the sharers of the sad effects of a dire apostasy, pilgrims alike through the same wilderness, and objects of the same atoning sacrifice, we are permitted and exhorted to strengthen the bonds of our brotherhood by aiding in the deliverance of our fallen race. Even Christ himself assumed the nature of the sinner that he might become his Saviour, the "minister of the true tabernacle which the Lord pitched, and not man." And from the day of his ascension until now, the same human nature has been the chosen agent in human conversion. Peter in Jerusalem, and Paul in Athens, and Augustine in Africa, and Luther in Germany, and Calvin in France, and Wesley in England, and Asbury in America, all have been partakers of the same common nature with ourselves. Their ministry, which God made eminently successful, was the same ministry with ours. And we may anticipate the like results if we manifest the same fidelity and zeal. Though we have this treasure in earthly vessels, yet it has pleased God to manifest his glory through them in a constantly increasing crowd of rejoicing converts. The fields white unto the harvest still invite the reaper's hand, and he that reapeth, receiveth wages and gathereth fruit unto life eternal.

During the year just closing 27 missions have been served by this Society, under the ministry of 33 Missionaries, who report a church membership in full connection and on probation of 1,266 whites, and 11,026 colored persons; while 190 white children are taught in Sunday-schools, and 6,682 colored children are regularly catechised. The Board recommend the division of the Combahee and Ashepoo mission, and the establishment of a new mission in the Shelby District, to be called the John's River Mission.

In reviewing the operations of the year, the Board unite with the Society in devout thanksgiving to God for the abundant blessings which have crowned their labors.

JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE.

The Board held their usual meetings during the Conference session, and with the concurrence of the Conference adopted the following Financial Plan, and also the Assessments to be raised by the different stations, circuits, and missions of the Conference as follows:

FINANCIAL PLAN.

1. It shall be the duty of the Board, after ascertaining the whole amount of claim against them, annually to apportion the same to the several circuits and stations in the Conference district, and each preacher having charge of a circuit or station, shall furnish his successor with the amount apportioned to his charge.
2. Each preacher shall make all necessary efforts to collect the amount apportioned to his charge by the Board.
3. The preacher in charge of each circuit shall (at the close of the Conference year) fix the first appointment for his successor at the church nearest the Parsonage, (or place of boarding) and shall allow him thereafter at least one week to arrange for the year; during which time, (the day to be fixed the preceding year, by the preacher and stewards,) the stewards shall hold the first meeting at the Parsonage, or place of boarding, at which it shall be the duty of each steward to attend.
4. Each Board of stewards, respectively, shall ascertain the whole claim against the circuit for the current year, both for quarterage and travelling expenses, as definitely as possible; and they shall then make an estimate of the family expenses of the preacher, or preachers of the circuit, including servant's hire and house rent, (if a house be rented) and the entire claim against the circuit for the current year shall be apportioned to the several congregations composing the circuit forthwith; each congregation being notified immediately the amount it is expected to collect.
5. The stewards shall divide the congregations composing the circuit among themselves, and shall make all necessary efforts to collect the amounts apportioned to them.
6. It shall be the duty of the stewards to open subscription books in each congregation, to meet the current claim; and they shall, also, cause public collections to be taken up, if they deem it necessary, for the same purpose.
7. The stewards shall settle with the preachers quarterly, and to this end, the subscriptions shall be taken in quarterly instalments.

8. The Conference collections for the support of our superannuated preachers, widows and orphans of preachers, and to meet the claims of preachers deficient in quarterage, shall be taken up in each congregation, as early in the year as practicable.

9. The Board of district stewards shall be a standing board for four years; provided nevertheless, that should any vacancy occur in the Board, such vacancies shall be supplied by the Quarterly Conference; and each district steward shall be charged with collecting the amount apportioned for the Presiding Elder, to the circuit or station where he resides.

10. The Board of district stewards shall be charged with the work of supplying the district Parsonage with suitable furniture, and shall be authorized to take up collections for this object, in their respective charges.

11. Each member of the Joint Board, and more especially the Chairman thereof, shall feel it his duty to be active in endeavoring to improve the financial condition of the church, by correspondence with the stewards of the several charges, by public addresses to the church at suitable times, or in any other way he may deem best.

12. The circuit stewards shall make arrangements early in the year, if they deem it necessary, to receive from the congregations assigned to them respectively such provisions as they may be able to give, for the support of the preacher's family; which shall be delivered at the Parsonage at market prices, and shall be placed to the credit of the church, sending it as family expenses.

13. The Board of stewards on their respective charges, are requested to cooperate with the ministers laboring among them, in securing the amount the charge has been requested to collect as Conference collection, by public application to our wealthier members, and if necessary, by public collections in the respective congregations.

14. The respective Boards of stewards shall have authority to retain any surplus Conference collections, to meet the deficiencies, if any, in the current expenses in the charge where it is collected.

15. The Missionaries are requested to solicit donations for the benefit of the superannuated preachers, the widows and orphans of preachers, together with the deficient effective preachers of the Conference from the quite membership of the church under their care.

16. The Presiding Elders shall constitute a standing committee, to ascertain the names of claimants, and the amount of claim each has upon the funds managed by the Board, which information shall be placed in the hands of some member of the Board, during the first or second session of the Conference annually.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report, in part: That a tender is made to the S. C. Conference, of the Davenport Female College, located at Lenoir, Caldwell co., N. C., to be held by the Conference in the same way in which the other Literary Institutions of the Conference are held. A handsome building, costing \$10,000, on an imposing site, has been erected and paid for, and is nearly ready for service. The section of country where the College is located is flourishing and beautiful, and it is anticipated that a large patronage can be commanded. Application for a charter will be made to the Legislature of N. C. next winter. The

Committee on Education, after an interview with the gentlemen representing the College, take pleasure in recommending for adoption by the Conference, the following resolutions—viz:

Resolved, 1st. That the So. Ca. Conference of the M. E. Church, South, regarding with great interest the progress of liberal education, on christian principles, in the upper counties of No. Ca., hereby accept the tender of the Davenport Female College, at Lenoir, N. C., as one of the Literary Institutions under its control and patronage.

Resolved, 2nd. That the following members of the Conference and lay gentlemen be, and they are hereby constituted a Board of Trustees for the Institution aforesaid—viz:

Prof. A. M. Shipp, P. F. Kistler, Jas. S. Ervin, H. H. Durant, A. G. Stacy, the P. E. of the Shelby District, the Preacher in charge of Lenoir Circuit; and John Rutherford, J. C. Harper, Edmund Jones, James Harper, S. P. Dula, and Azor Shell.

Resolved, 3d. That the Board of Trustees thus constituted are hereby instructed to secure in the charter of incorporation, a section securing to the So. Ca. Conference the right of filling all vacancies that may hereafter occur in the seven first named members of the Board, by nomination and election by the South Carolina Conference.

The Committee beg leave also to inform the Conference that by a unanimous vote of the stockholders of the Spartanburg Female College, the stock has been transferred to the Board of Trustees, to be held hereafter in trust, for the purpose of sustaining a Female College in Spartanburg under the control and patronage of the So. Ca. Conference. As an amendment in the Charter of incorporation will be necessary, the Committee recommend for adoption the following Resolution—viz:

Resolved, That this Conference concur with the Board of Trustees of the Spartanburg Female College, in applying at the present session of the Legislature of South Carolina for an amendment in the Charter, placing the Institution on the same footing with the other Literary Institutions under the supervision and patronage of the So. Ca. Conference.

The Committee on Education beg leave respectfully to report:

That they have condensed from the several statements and reports submitted to them the following summary of the condition and prospects of the institutions of learning, patronized by the S. C. Conference.

I. WOFFORD COLLEGE. This Institution completed the third year of its operations, in July last. At the commencement held at that time, there were six young gentlemen graduated; and the occasion was one of special interest. The number of students at present matriculated and in the Preparatory Department amounts to ninety. The permanent fund of the College, which is judiciously invested, is \$65,000. The prospect of distinguished usefulness for the College, is flattering. The government is mild but firm; and the conduct as well as the scholarship of the undergraduates, is commendable. A gracious revival of religion during the past year brought into the communion of the church a number of the students—some of them young men of the highest promise. The Spring Term begins on the 3d Wednesday of January, and the 2d Wednesday

2. THE COKEBURY SCHOOL. In this School, which is an Academy of the highest grade, there have been in attendance during the past year, eighty students. Of these nine are beneficiaries on the Holloway foundation. These are sons of superannuated, deceased, and other Preachers of this Conference. The resignation of the former Rector was received during the past Summer; and in his place the Rev. S. B. Jones was elected. His well known administrative talent, and his activity and devotion to his duties, are the pledge of enlarged prosperity to the School. He is assisted by the Rev. J. W. Wightman, A. M., Classical Teacher, and A. Turpin in the English Department. The Charter of Incorporation being about to expire, application has been made to the Legislature for a renewal.

3. THE CAROLINA FEMALE COLLEGE. This Institution is located in Anson Co., N. C. Its Faculty of Instruction is composed of the following officers: viz—Rev. T. R. Walsh, President; M. J. B. Gillam, Prof. of Natural Science; Mrs. M. Mendenhall, Assistant Instructor; Miss J. Graham, Music; Miss S. A. Little, Assistant in Music. The average number of pupils in attendance the past year has been about 58. The course of instruction is ample, and the progress of the young ladies, satisfactory. A vigorous effort has been recently set on foot, for the relief of the financial embarrassments of the College,—upwards of four thousand dollars having been subscribed by six gentlemen of the vicinity. It is hoped by the Committee that this movement will be speedily and entirely successful; and that a career of enlarged usefulness awaits the College.

4. THE SPARTANBURG FEMALE COLLEGE. This Institution has enjoyed another year of prosperity. The average number of pupils has been one hundred. Their intellectual advancement has been satisfactory. The government of the College has been easy and pleasant; and during the year a gracious religious influence has been realized. The President, Mr. Tucker, having resigned his post, in pursuance of an intention to visit a distant part of the United States, the Rev. Dr. Charles Taylor has been elected to fill the vacancy. The Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Jane T. H. Cross have consented to serve in the Faculty; and Prof. Hanes, from Va., fills the Chair of Mathematics and Natural Science. Prof's. Blaisdale and Saunie have charge of the Music Department. The College will resume its exercises on the last Wednesday in February. The Board of Trustees respectfully ask the appointment of the Rev. H. H. Durant, as Agent.

5. THE COLUMBIA FEMALE COLLEGE. The Committee take pleasure in reporting the progress towards completion, of the splendid edifice now in course of erection, in a fine location in the city of Columbia. The

building has been enclosed and roofed, and presents already an imposing appearance. The Executive Committee deserve high praise for the energetic and yet cautious and well-considered measures they have adopted, in carrying on this important enterprise, in which posterity no less than the present generation, hold so precious an interest. To complete the building according to the contract, nearly \$7000 will still be needed. To the liberality of the friends of Female Education, this Institution is earnestly commended. The Committee on Education trust that no effort will be spared in pressing on this noble undertaking to a successful and early completion; and that the gratifying success of the Agent during the past year may only be the augury of still larger success in the year to come. The trustees ask the re-appointment of the Rev. W. Martin, as Agent.

6. THE DAVENPORT FEMALE COLLEGE. This Institution which the S. C. Conference has taken under its patronage during the present session, will be ready to open its doors for the reception of pupils in the course of the ensuing year. It is located on a commanding site, in the suburbs of the beautiful village of Lenoir, Caldwell Co., N. C., and will furnish educational facilities to an important section of the Conference district. The Rev. H. M. Mood, A. M., has been elected to the Presidency. In this judicious choice the Committee heartily concur: and they commend the College to a liberal patronage.

The Committee beg to remind the Conference that the term during which the clerical members of the Board of Trustees of Wofford College hold office, having expired, a new election is proper during the present session.

It will appear from the foregoing statements, that the Methodist Church within the bounds of the S. C. Conference, is moving on to occupy a position worthy of her means and responsibilities, in the important work of mental training under religious control. It is due to the numbers and wants of the membership and friends of the Church, that this auspicious movement, so worthily begun, and so manifestly sanctioned by God's gracious approval and blessing, should be vigorously sustained. As these educational facilities are now so amply provided for the rising generation, so every encouragement should be given by the preachers of the Conference, to the members and friends of the church to avail themselves of advantages second in importance to religion alone. We should take pains to spread all proper information among the people, in regard to these Literary institutions. A high and liberal spirit should be cultivated. Persons of wealth should be encouraged to make provision in their wills, as well as during their life-time for the perpetuity of the educational enterprises, by which our beloved country, while moving on in the path of secular prosperity, may become great in the possession of a generation in which the virtues of religious character, and the cultivation of the mind and manners, may keep pace with improvement in outward circumstances. The cost of education will be repaid a thousand fold in the civil, social and religious advantages secured by it. The golden fruitage will amply remunerate the tiller's toil.

The Committee beg to offer for adoption by the Conference, the following Resolutions :

Resolved, 1. That the members of the S. C. Conference regard with feelings of deep gratitude to God the success which has attended the educational enterprises of the Church, thus far ; and pledge themselves to a cordial support of the Literary Institutions patronized by the Conference.

Resolved, 2. That the Bishop presiding at the present session be, and he hereby is requested to re-appoint these members of the Conference who are at present connected with the Schools and Colleges.

A COURSE OF STUDY.

For the Itinerant Probationers and Deacons of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be uniformly observed in all the Annual Conferences, as provided for by the late General Conference.

FIRST YEAR—The Bible as to *Doctrines*, with reference to Wesley's Notes, the Bible Dictionaries and Commentaries of our own publication; Concordance and Gaston's Collections of Sacred Scriptures, Wesley's Sermons, Fletcher's Appeal and Christian Perfection, English Grammar and Composition.

SECOND YEAR—The Bible as to *Ordinances or Sacraments*. Reference books the same as the first year. Watson's Life of Wesley, Bishop Watson's Apology, Fletcher's Christian Perfection, Methodist Discipline, Geography, Composition.

THIRD YEAR—The Bible as to *History and Chronology*. Reference books as before. The first and second parts of Watson's Institutes, Gregorie's Church History, Rhetoric, Written Essay, or Sermon.

FOURTH YEAR—The Bible generally, reference books the same. The third and fourth parts of Watson's Institutes, Powell on Apostolical Succession, Old Christianity contrasted with the Novelties of Popery, by Gideon Ouseley, Logic, Written Essay, or Sermon.

The foregoing course is considered obligatory upon the several classes of candidates. The following is for such as have ability, time and inclination to accomplish more—on which, or any part of it, such only as desire it should be examined:

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENT.—The Bible continued, Fletcher's Checks, Life of Dr. Eusebius, Mosheim's Church History, Dr. Eubank's Romanism, D'Aubigne's History of the Reformation, Butler's Analogy, Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Civil History; and if any desire to proceed still further, they can include in their course other sciences and the dead languages, aided by the best authors, and such private instruction as may be within their reach.

RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions were passed at different times during the session:
Resolved, That the first Friday in April and September next be observed as days of FASTING AND PRAYER to Almighty God for a general revival of religion within the bounds of this Conference, for an increase of labourers in the vineyard, and his blessing upon our Literary Institutions. And that our people be requested to assemble on those days at their respective places of worship.

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested at least six weeks previous to each Fast Day to give notice of them in the Southern Christian Advocate.

Resolved, That this Conference is deeply impressed with the importance of some form of receiving members into the Church in order to secure uniformity in the administration of Discipline as well as for other purposes, and that we respectfully request the attention of the ensuing General Conference to this matter.

Resolved, That the Preachers of the several charges procure the Record Books lately published at Nashville, and that the Presiding Elders be requested to use their influence to have this resolution carried into effect.

Resolved, That we take up in all our circuits and stations during the month of March next, collections to defray the expenses of our Delegates to the ensuing General Conference, and the amounts so collected be handed to the Delegate most convenient, and that any surplus remaining after defraying said expenses be handed to the Treasurer of the Joint Board of Finance.

Resolved, That an earnest effort be made by all the Preachers of this Conference to secure donations the present Conference year for the benefit of Carolina Female College, and if deemed expedient to take up collections for the same purpose, and that all sums collected be either forwarded to Rev. T. R. Walsh, or brought to the ensuing Annual Conference.

Resolved, That this Conference earnestly request the Examining Committees for the ensuing year to be more thorough in their examinations. And that the Committee for the first year address a letter to each member of the class calling his attention to the Course of Study, the necessity of application, and of a punctual attendance before the Committee at the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That this Conference takes pleasure in expressing its high appreciation of the ability with which the Southern Christian Advocate has been edited and managed by our respected friend, Dr. E. H. Myers, and pledges itself to a sustained and earnest effort to make the paper the foremost now published by the M. E. Church, South.

Resolved, That we have learned with great satisfaction that the Rev. W. M. Wightman, D. D., has consented at the special request of the family of the late Bishop Capers, to write the life of our honoured and deceased friend, so long a member of this Conference.

Resolved, 2. That we hereby heartily approve of this selection, and take

occasion to express the hope that the work will soon be presented to the public.

The Bishop presented the resolution of the Alabama Conference, memorializing the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be held in Nashville, in May, 1858, to expunge from the General Rules the following rule, to wit: "*The buying and selling of men, women and children with an intention to enslave them.*" The Ayes and Noes were called for, and upon the roll being called, 115 voted in the affirmative, and none in the negative.
