# JOURNAL.

## FIRST DAY—FIRST SESSION.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., NOVEMBER 24, 1915.

The South Carolina Conference met in Silver Hill Methodist Episcopal Church on the above date, in its one hundred and eleventh (111) session. Since re-organization the fifty first year (51) of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church for 1915—1916, Bishop F. D. Leete, D. D., L. L. D., presiding. Hymn 560 "And are we yet alive" was sung. After which a tribute of respect was paid by the Bishop to Dr. J. E. Wilson and other brethren of the conference who died during the year.

The Bishop then called upon Dr. Dunton who led the Conference in a very touching and sympathetic prayer, which was followed with an address that was uplifting and fitting by the Bishop, who also led in a very feeling prayer. "Jesus lover of my soul" was sung. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the District Superintendents, Drs. Dunton, Clemons and others.

A morning offering of \$19.00 was taken for the retired preachers of the conference. "Praise God from whom all blessings flow" and "Blest be the tie" were sung at the conclusion of the Lord's Supper.

Dr. J. L. Grice was elected Secretary. Assistants, see page 2. Rev. I. L. Hardy was elected Statistical Secretary. Assistants, see page 2. Rev. J. C. Martin was elected Treasurer. Assistants, see page 2.

It was voted that a telegram of sympathy be sent to Mrs. J. E. Wilson. It was also announced that Bishop Moore had passed away. The Conference arose and prayer was offered by Bishop Leete. It was voted that a telegram of sympathy be forwarded to the deceased Bishops family.

A motion was made by G. W. Cooper and carried that the Morning Sessions begin at 9 o'clock and adjourn at 12:15 P.M. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. R. E. Jones.

## FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Bishop was in the chair. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved. The Special Committees were read by Dr. Burroughs. See pages 3 and 4.

The list of Districts having been completed, the Rev. D. J. Saunders presided by assignment of the Bishop. Mr. Lewis O. Hartman, Supt. of the Foreign Dept. of the Board of Sunday Schools, M. E. Church was introduced and spoke in a happy manner concerning the work. After which the conference adjourned.

## SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Devotional Exercises were led by the Bishop. It was a Spiritual feast to all. "Rejoice in the Lord" was sung.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved. The delinquents on the several Districts were called and reported as follows. (Inserted in lists of Districts above.)

Dr. J. P. Wragg, Agent of the American Bible Society was introduced to the conference and spoke concerning his work. Dr. R. E. Jones was introduced and made some announcements. A draft of \$2,574 was announced by the Bishop as having come from the Methodist Book Concern.

The 4th Question was resumed and Rev. A. G. Kennedy, Supt. of the Beaufort District passed in character and reported the work of the District. The Bennettsville District was called and Rev. H. C. Asbury passed in character and made his report. The Charleston District was called and Rev. J. W. Moultrie passed in character and reported the work of his District.

Dr. Henry L. Wriston, Secretary and Manager of the Methodist Ministers Relief and Trust Insurance Association was introduced and spoke.

## Courses of Study:

Class—1st year, Daniel S. Curry passed and advanced to 2nd year. Duncan R. McTeer was continued.

The following advanced to 2nd year with their marks: Morris B. Eaddy 87½, Jas. W. Taylor 92½, T. J. Pendergrass 75½, Samuel M. Brown 75, Jas. W. Butler 77½, Robt. R. Williams 80, King D. Hough continued in same relation, Abraham Mack 90, Clayton B. Brown 77, Isaac Wiley continued, Solomon Pearson advanced to 2nd year.

Devotional Exercises were led by the Bishop. It was a Spiritual feast to all. "Rejoice in the Lord" was sung.

Dr. J. P. Wragg, Agent of the American Bible Society was introduced to the conference and spoke concerning his work. Dr. R. E. Jones was introduced and made some announcements. A draft of \$2,574 was announced by the Bishop as having come from the Methodist Book Concern.

The 4th Question was resumed and Rev. A. G. Kennedy, Supt. of the Beaufort District passed in character and reported the work of the District. The Bennettsville District was called and Rev. H. C. Asbury passed in character and made his report. The Charleston District was called and Rev. J. W. Moultrie passed in character and reported the work of his District.

Dr. Henry L. Wriston, Secretary and Manager of the Methodist Ministers Relief and Trust Insurance Association was introduced and spoke.

A motion was made by Dr. C. C. Jacobs that the District Superintendents be permitted to withdraw the names of those candidates from each of their respective Districts who failed and that they be given credit for their work.

In the matter of selecting District Superintendents, the Bishop asked the advice of the conference by way of having each member and probationer of the conference write the names of six persons thought to be suitable men for District Superintendents and submit them to him.

Greetings from the Methodist Episcopal Church South were received and reciprocated by the conference. A Resolution was offered by Rev. J. A. Brown, (See resolutions.) The Conference decided to re-assemble at 3 P. M. Announcements were made and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. E. C. Clemons.

#### SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotionals were conducted by the Bishop. After which he called to the chair Dr. J. A. Brown.

The minutes of the 2nd Day Morning Session were read and approved.

The 14th Question was called and Dr. M. M. Mouzon was passed in character and made his report. The hymn "God moves in a mysterious way" was sung.

Rev. C. C. Scott made a motion that the Secretary of the Conference confer with the Secretary of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, in conference assembled here, and if allowable by the Railroad Company, try to make arrangements to combine the number of traveling certificates used by the ministers and delegates to the two conferences in securing reduced rates, should we fail to secure the required number in our Conference.

The 14th Question was resumed and Rev. B. S. Jackson District Supt. of the Greenville District was passed in character and reported his work.

The Orangeburg District was called and Dr. E. B. Burroughs was passed in character and reported the work of his District.

The Spartanburg District was called and Rev. J. S. Thomas Superintendent of the District reported his work after having been passed in character. Announcements were given and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. L. Grice.

#### THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Bishop Leete led the devotions. Hymn "On Christ the solid rock I stand," was sung. Several brethren offered prayers. Hymn, "By and By when the morning comes" was sung. Bishop Leete read Phil. 4th chapter, "Hymn, "Rejoice in the Lord" was sung and emphasized by the Bishop who then led in a fervent prayer.

Minutes of the previous session were read and approved. It was voted that the hour 10:30 A. M. be fixed as the time to take the first ballot for delegates to the General Conference and that 11:30 A. M. to-morrow be fixed for Memorial Services.

On motion the following persons were continued in Studies of the 2nd year: D. R. McTeer, E. D. Generette, Green Livingston, Samuel M. Miller, Henry J. Kirk and Meloney Newman.

In studies of the 4th year the following persons were graduated and elected to Elders Orders: Benj. I. Bradford, J. C. Armstrong. Virgil C. Dimery was requested to go before the Committee on Examinations. In the case of Rev. W. G. White, it was voted that he be re-admitted to the conference.

Question 12 was called. Who have been elected to Deacons Orders as Local Preachers? It was moved and carried that S. M. Miller be elected to Deacon's Orders. The same action was taken in the cases of D. C. Bruce, Calder J. Junior, Alexander Knox, Charles R. Ross and Daniel S. Curry.

A motion was made and carried that the Conference stand adjourned Sunday night after the reading of the appointments.

Question 1 answered, Yes.

Question 2. Virgil S. Johnson and Henry L. Stewart were transferred from the Florida Mission Conference back to the South Carolina Conference.

Question 3. Who have been re-admitted? W. G. White.

Question 4. Who have been received on conditions? None.

The hour for the order of the day having arrived, hymn "Come Thou Fount," was sung, and the Bishop spoke relative to the type of man needed for the General Conference. After which prayer was offered by Dr. D. D. Martin. Sam. M. Miller was admitted to the Conference. It

was asked that the full members of the Conference sit together. The tellers appointed were: A. E. Quick, I. L. Hardy, L. G. Gregg, B. C. Jackson and W. B. Romans.

It was moved that the ballots be counted in open conference. When the first ballot was taken and counted, it resulted in the election of Drs. C. C. Jacobs and L. M. Dunton. Isaac Myers moved that the Conference adjourn to meet at 2:30 P. M. Carried. Announcements were made and notices given. Benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

### THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Devotionals were conducted by the Bishop. The minutes were read and approved. It was moved and supported that the same tellers be continued. They were called forward and after prayer by the Bishop another ballot was taken, resulting in the election of Dr. J. W. Moultrie. Tickets were arranged and another ballot taken which resulted in the election of Dr. M. M. Mouzon. It was moved and carried that the election of the reserves be left for the next session.

On motion by J. W. Moultrie the hour for the Endowment Services was fixed for 10:30 A. M. instead of 11:30 A. M.

Resolutions were read by J. B. Taylor and after adoption were referred to the committee on Education.

A draft for \$300.00 was received from the Board of Conference Claimants, presented by Dr. E. C. Clemons.

A. D. Harris asked to be placed on the retired list. It was granted. The Bishop asked Dr. N. T. Bowen, Sr. to take the chair. It was moved that the reports of committees be read. Agreed. The committee on Young Peoples' Work was submitted.

At his own request, Rev. S. A. King was placed upon the retired list, and his case was referred to the Board of Conference Stewards. It was voted that H. H. Matthews be permitted to enter the retired relation and that his case be referred to the Board of Conference Stewards.

Dr. Grice gave some wholesome information relative to the Minutes of the last session of the Annual Conference held in Columbia.

A resolution was offered by C. C. Scott, touching the publication of the minutes (See Resolution). A motion was made to adjourn. Carried. The Benediction was pronounced by H. H. Matthews.

### FOURTH DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Devotionals were led by the Bishop. "Alas and did my Saviour bleed" was sung. Prayer was offered by several of the brethren. Gal. 6 chapter was read by the

Bishop as the morning lesson. Minutes of the previous session read and approved.

Resolution by J. A. Brown touching Endowment Day presented and carried.

Resolution offered by Dr. Burroughs touching the administration of Bishop Leete presented on behalf of the Cabinet, carried. (See Resolution).

14th Question was called. Retired preacher, G. W. Beckham, passed in character and was referred to the Board of Stewards. Same action was taken in the cases of the following: M. F. Black, Benj. Brown, John Burroughs, R. C. Campbell, A. W. Fuller, G. W. Gray, C. L. Logan, Jeremiah McLeod, J. B. Middleton, B. F. Miller, Thomas Sims, Polydore Witherspoon and J. W. Brown.

19th question. Withdrawn, D. H. Kears.

36th question. Where shall the next Conference be held? It was moved and carried that Florence be the seat of the next Conference.

Dr. Maveety was introduced to the Conference and made an address on the Freedmen's Aid work. Dr. L. M. Dunton followed this address by presenting his report on Claflin University.

The election of reserves delegates was taken up and the ballots cast showed 125 for each reserve as follows: J. S. Thomas, E. B. Burroughs and J. E. Page.

Resolution by Jas. A. Glenn touching the minutes and missionary names in the minutes read and adopted.

Resolution by W. H. Jones was referred to a committee on education. Resolution by C. C. Scott referred to the cabinet. (See resolution.)

Report of the Statistical Secretary, read and approved.

The Treasurers report was read and approved.

The report on the State of the Country was read, approved and referred to the Secretary for publication in the minutes.

A resolution of thanks to the Bishop, Secretaries, Treasurer, Pastor, Choir, and R. R., read and adopted.

Revs. A. E. Quick, R. L. Hickson, C. C. Scott, R. A. Cottingham and J. C. Martin, nominated for Trustees of Claflin University.

#### SUNDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Love Feast Services began at 10 A. M., conducted by Revs. S. A. King and Wiley Littlejohn. Many testified of the love of Jesus. Bros. C. C. Scott, W. S. Thompson, T. E. Taylor, N. H. Cornell, I. L. Hardy and Jonas W. Thomas were appointed to take the morning collection which amounted to \$45.35. Hymn "I love Thy Church, O God" was

heartily sung by the large congregation. The Apostle's Creed was repeated. Prayer by Dr. R. A. Cottingham. Lesson 48 was read from the Psalter, led by Dr. C. C. ## EDUCATION.

The Board of Education reports that 92 per cent of all the ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church who had college training, were found to have received it in our own schools. State institutions contributed only 4 per cent, and all other denominational colleges only 4 per cent. Of the men educated in the church schools, 22 per cent decided to enter the ministry while in college.

The influence of the denominational college in producing loyal and devoted laymen is about as great as in producing loyal and devoted ministers. Where the church college languishes, the church declines.

An investigation of the sources of our trained men for foreign missionary service through a period of five years showed that Northwestern University alone had given the church twenty-four missionaries while all the state institutions in the land, including the agricultural colleges, had given but thirty-one. Two of the smaller Methodist colleges had together given more than all the State Institutions. Your Committee therefore most earnestly endorses the denominational College as a necessity to the advancement and perpetuity of the interests of our Church.

The Board of Education has made a careful and exhaustive study of our denominational educational work and your Committee wishes to commend its interests to the South Carolina Conference and to the Church.

### FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

This Society above all others is and has been since its organization in 1866 the most helpful to us in our Educational work. We are pleased to note that the receipts of the Society show a steady increase during the quadrennium which we trust means an increased interest in education in the South. We also note with pleasure that the invested endowment of Claflin University is now \$39,150.30. This being the largest endowment of any of our Freedmen's Aid Colleges. We also note with pleasure that the South Carolina Conference leads all colored Conferences in amount raised for the Freedmen's Aid Society with the West Texas Conference a close second. In collections for Jubilee Fund we rank third.

Your Committee recommend a vigorous campaign in the interest of the Endowment Fund of Claflin University. We would also call attention to the fact that Claflin University had last year the largest enrollment of any of our Freedmen's Aid Schools, employs more teachers and with the exception of Clark University, has the most valuable property.

We wish to commend the awakened interest in Bible Study, Bible Teacher Training and Evangelistic Movements



calculated to increase and establish the moral and religious efficiency of the student body.

We most earnestly recommend our members to educate their children in our own Conference schools.

The Permanent Investment Conference Claimants Commission met in Silver Hill M. E. Church at 7-30 P. M. on the above date, and was organized by the election of the following officers: President, Rev. E. B. Burroughs; Secretary, Rev. W. S. Thompson; Treasurer, Prof. E. J. Sawyer.

On motion of Rev. H. C. Asbury, it was voted that each District be assessed \$1,200 payable in five equal instalments and that each District Superintendent apportion the amount to each charge and notify the pastor and members of said apportionments.

Whereas, we have full confidence in our people and believe that they will respond heartily to appeals for this claim as soon as we can agree upon a plan by which to give them full and proper information on the great need of this endowment, And,

Whereas, by action of the University Senate of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Claflin cannot be classed as a college until its collected endowment amounts to at least \$100.000 and that the time limit for raising this fund expires January 1st, 1916. And,

Be it further resolved, that two Sundays, to be known as Endowment Days shall be adopted on each charge for the year 1916, and that one of these shall be observed before the

Annual Commencement at Claflin, when all funds collected on said day shall be reported at Claflin.
