CONFERENCE JOURNAL.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY.

METHODIST CHURCH, MARION, S. C., December 15, 1880.

The South Carolina Conference convened in its Ninety-Fifth Session at
 nine o'clock, A. M.

On motion of Wm. C. Power, Hugh A. C. Walker was called to the chair,
 and, after conducting the opening religious exercises, he briefly addressed the
 Conference, announcing the death of Bishop Doggett, who was to have presi-
 ded over the body at this session.

The Secretary of the last session called the roll; and one hundred and
 twenty-nine clerical, and twelve lay members answered to their names.

An election of permanent officers resulted as follows:

 ary Secretary, were read and appropriately referred.

On motion, R. N. Wells was appointed to convey to Mrs. F. J. Pelzer, Treasurer of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society, any moneys forwarded by auxiliary societies through members of this body.

Ariail, J. C. Stoll, J. W. McRoy, H. J. Morgan, W. Thomas, D. D. Dantzler, S. Jones, E. T. Hodges, G. H. Wells, W. L. Pegues, J. C. Davis, J. A. Porter, W. Carson, T. P. Phillips, W. D. Kirkland, T. W. Munneryn, and W. W. Mood were called, and their characters examined and passed.

The Conference then adjourned with the doxology and the benediction.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY.

METHODIST CHURCH, MARION, S. C., December 16, 1880.

The Conference met at the appointed hour, President Shipp in the Chair.

After devotions conducted by R. Franks, the roll was called, and the Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

A paper from the Trustees of Columbia Female College was referred to the Committee on Education.

L. D. Palmer, Business Manager of the Publishing House having been introduced, addressed the Conference, showing that gratifying progress has been made in funding the debt of the House in 4 per cent bonds, and that the business of the House is yielding a good profit.

The Report of Dr. J. B. McFerrin, Agent of the Publishing House was read, and referred to the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

A communication from Dr. O. P. Fitzgerald, Editor of the CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE was read, and referred to the same committee.

A letter from Rev. J. Watts was read to the Conference.

A contribution of \$31.75 from the Greenwood Sunday-School for our Mission in Mexico, and one of \$12.39 from the Camden Sunday-School for Domestic Missions, were handed over to the proper officers, with instructions to give them the desired directions.

On motion of A. J. Stokes, it was resolved that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to receive and acknowledge contributions to Foreign Missions from Societies and from individuals, at any time.

Dr. J. O. A. Clark addressed the Conference.

On motion, Dr. Shipp was requested to furnish, for publication in the *Southern Christian Advocate*, a copy of his response to Dr. Clark's address on yesterday.

The following resolutions, the order of the day, were adopted:

Resolved, 1. That the vote on applications for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, for re-admission into the traveling connection, and for the location of a member (unless located by his own request) shall in this Conference be taken by ballot.

2. That each ballot cast under the above resolution, shall have on it "Aye," or "No."

3. That a committee of three members, two clerical and one lay, appointed by the Chair, shall take charge of the ballots, retire, and immediately count the same, and report the result to the Body.

The Committee on the case of G. W. Whitman reported a trial necessary, and that J. T. Kligo had been appointed to conduct the prosecution.

The following were appointed to try the case: P. F. Kistler, J. A. Mood, J. W. McRoy, J. A. Porter, J. W. Murray, J. L. Sifly, R. P. Franks, J. B. Traywick, L. M. Hamer.

W. Martin was appointed to preside, and A. J. Stafford to act as Secretary.

On motion of R. C. Oliver, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be requested to cull from the Journal, for publication in the Minutes, all standing resolutions of the Conference.

Under Question XX, resumed, H. A. C. Walker, R. L. Harper, G. W. Gatlin, J. W. Murray, J. H. Zimmerman, G. T. Harmon, S. J. Hill, L. Wood, H. W. Whitaker, J. M. Carlisle, J. T. Wightman, R. C. Oliver, R. D. Smart, J. W. Tarbourx, I. J. Newberry, J. C. Counts, J. T. Kilgo, W. S. Martin, J. K. McCain, A. P. Avant, A. W. Walker, J. B. Wilson, J. F. Smith, R. R. Dagnall, B. M. Boozer, W. Smith and W. W. Duncan, were called, and their characters examined and passed.

S. B. Jones having been called to the chair, the name of A. M. Shipp was called, and his character was examined and passed.

Rev. J. J. Ransom, Missionary to Brazil, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interest of his work.

The Conference suspended business for the annual session of the Legal Conference, after which.

The President resumed the Chair, and the Conference adjourned with the doxology and the benediction.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY.

METHODIST CHURCH, MARION, S. C., December 17, 1880.

The Conference met at the usual hour, the President in the Chair.

After religious services, conducted by Manning Brown, the Minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The chair announced a communication from Bishop Pierce, transferring G. J. Griffiths from the South Georgia Conference to this Body.

The names of the following elders were called, and their characters were examined and passed:

QUESTION XVII. "Who are supernumerary?" was answered as follows: R. W. Barber, B. M. Boozer, J. C. Counts, R. L. Harper, S. Jones, T. Mitchell and W. L. Pegues.

Under QUESTION XII, H. B. Browne, T. E. Gilbert, R. H. Jones, A. B. Lee, A. C. LeGette and E. G. Price were called, their characters were examined and passed, and they were elected to elder's orders. W. P. Meadows was called, and his character passed, but not having appeared before the Examining Committee, he was continued in the class of the Fourth Year.

The Committee on Publication of last year's Minutes reported a surplus of \$3.25 on hand, which was ordered to be paid to the present Committee on Minutes.

Under QUESTION XIV, Edward Pettus, a local deacon of four year's standing, was duly elected to elder's orders.

Under QUESTION VII, J. T. Pate, J. S. Porter and J. W. Tarbourx were examined, passed, and advanced to the class of the Fourth Year.

QUESTION VIII, was called, and J. W. Brown and W. R. Richardson were called, their characters were examined and passed, and they were elected to deacon's orders.

Under QUESTION II, "Who remain on trial?" J. W. Daniels, J. M. Friday, J. G. Graham, A. W. Moore, T. E. Morris, P. A. Murray and W. H. Wroton were called, and their characters having been examined and passed, advanced to the studies of the Second Year. B. G. Gues was called, and his character examined and passed, and, at his own request, he was discontinued.

QUESTION I was called, and T. B. Boyd, N. B. Clarkson, M. Dargan, A. A. Gilbert, W. M. Harden, J. W. Neely, T. McB. White, were admitted on trial.

Rev. T. P. Lide of the Baptist Church, was introduced to the Conference.

After the usual notices, the Conference adjourned with the doxology and the Apostolic benediction.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY.

MORNING SESSION.

METHODIST CHURCH, MARION, S. C., December 18, 1880.

The Conference met at the appointed hour, and after devotional services, conducted by J. W. Humbert, the President took the Chair, and the Minutes of yesterday's session were read and confirmed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That for the remainder of the session, speeches be limited to fifteen minutes.

The report of the Committee on the Bible Cause was read and adopted. The Committee on Education presented their report, which was amended and adopted. The Conference was called to special intercession in behalf of Bishop Wightman, the family of Bishop Doggett, and a distressed family requesting prayer. After singing hymn 619, Rev. W. Martin led the congregation in prayer. The Report of the Treasurer of Domestic Missions was received. Rev. J. J. Ransom addressed the Conference. The Joint Board of Finance submitted their Report, which was adopted; and the contributions to the several claimants were distributed in open Conference. The Committee on Minutes presented their Report, which was adopted. The name of T. Mitchell was called, his character was examined and passed, and he was made supernumerary. On motion, it was ordered that an afternoon session be held, beginning at four o'clock, and that O. A. Darby conduct the memorial services to night. The Conference then sang the doxology, and adjourned with the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference re-assembled at 4 o'clock, Wm. C. Power in the Chair. The devotions were conducted by S. Lander. The Minutes of the morning session were read and approved. The Report of the Sunday School Board was presented and adopted. Resolutions of sympathy with Bishop Wightman in his affliction were offered by H. M. Mood, and adopted by a rising vote. The Report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals was presented and adopted. The Treasurer of Foreign Missions presented his report. Under QUESTION XXX, Union was unanimously chosen as the place for the next session of the Conference. The Conference then adjourned with the doxology and the benediction.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Conference met at 7 o'clock, O. A. Darby in the Chair. The opening services were conducted by R. D. Smart and J. M. Boyd. The Chairman announced the object of the meeting, and called the name of Joel W. Townsend. J. W. Humbert read a memoir of the departed brother. A memoir of John R. Coburn was then read by S. Leard; after which, W. J. Capers read a paper in memory of F. Milton Kennedy. Warm and tearful tributes of affection were offered by a number of the brethren after the reading of the several memoirs, which were then adopted. S. A. Weber, of the special committee, read a memorial of Bishop Doggett, which was adopted. R. D. Smart referred to the interest of Rev. Dr. W. S. Plumer, deceased, in our economy and work; and, on his motion, the Secretary was requested to convey to the family of Dr. Plumer an expression of our sympathy in their great grief. At the conclusion of the memorial service, the Conference resumed its regular business, S. B. Jones occupying the chair. Under QUESTION X. N. Bowen Clarkson, Daniel DuRant, James M. Fridy, William M. Hardin, Thomas E. James, Jesse E. Rushton, and Robert Stork, local preachers of four years' standing, were elected to deacons orders. The presiding elder of Spartanburg District was authorized to employ Edgar L. Archer on such field as may need his services. Under QUESTION XX, resumed, the Committee of trial in the case of G. W. Whitman submitted the following report:—

After full deliberation, the Committee agreed upon the following verdict: Whereas, a charge of immorality has been brought against the Rev. G. W. Whitman, and whereas he admits the act as set forth in the specification, but pleads that he was mentally irresponsible at the time, the Committee, therefore, while they do not pronounce absolutely upon his uniform sanity or insanity, nevertheless cannot resist the conclusion that the act was immoral, and that he is therefore entirely unfit for the ministry. It is, therefore, adjudged that the said G. W. Whitman be, and he is hereby deposed from the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.—Signed by Paul F. Kistler, John W. McRoy, Jno. A. Porter, J. W. Murray, J. L. Sibly, R. P. Franks, J. B. Traywick, Lewis M. Hamer.

I decline signing the above verdict of the majority, upon the ground of grave doubt as to the responsibility of the accused at the time of committing the act.

The President thereupon announced G. W. Whitman deposed from the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; and his credentials were surrendered through A. M. Chreitzberg and deposited in the archives of the Conference. Notice was given of an appeal to the General Conference.

The credentials of Thomas A. Way, local deacon, were surrendered to the Conference through T. G. Herbert. Permission was given to the Joint Board of Finance to correct the assessments for education. The Conference sang the doxology, and the president pronounced the benediction.

FIFTH DAY—SUNDAY.

MARION, S. C., December 19, 1880.

Religious services, conducted by members of the Conference and visiting brethren, were held in the Churches of the community, tendered to the body for the purpose. There being no Bishop present, the ordination of the several candidates was necessarily deferred.

SIXTH DAY—MONDAY.

METHODIST CHURCH, MARION, S. C., December 20, 1880.

The Conference met according to appointment, the president in the chair, and William C. Power conducting the opening devotions. The minutes of Saturday's afternoon and night sessions were read and confirmed. The Report of the Committee on Temperance was presented, amended, adopted and ordered to be published in the *Southern Christian Advocate*, with the request that all the papers in the State friendly to the cause publish it in their columns. The Statistical Secretary's Report was read. S. B. Jones was called to the chair. The Committee on the Manuscript of Dr. Shipp's History of Methodism in South Carolina presented their report, which was adopted, and ordered to be sent to all the Church papers throughout our connection, with request to publish it. On motion of S. Lander, the Conference by a rising vote expressed their thanks to Dr. A. M. Shipp for his able and impartial presidency over the body. QUESTION XXXI was called; and the appointments for 1881 were read. Section IV, appointments. President Shipp resumed the chair. The Joint Board of Finance was announced. On motion of J. T. Wightman, it was

Resolved, That the Conference endeavor through the Sunday-schools and otherwise than by public collections to raise \$1,500 the ensuing year, (over and above the regular annual assessments by the Board at Nashville,) preparatory to sending a Missionary to some foreign field, and ever after endeavor to support such missionary.

On motion of S. B. Jones, it was ordered that the royalty due from the publishers of the *Southern Christian Advocate* be turned over to the editor to procure contributions for the paper.

On motion of R. D. Smart, the Conference passed resolutions of thanks to the citizens of Marion for their hospitality to the pastors of the Churches for their courtesy, and to the various railroad companies for their kindness.

On motion of J. B. Traywick, Rev. W. W. Duncan was requested to furnish for publication in the [Nashville] *Christian Advocate* and the *Southern Christian Advocate*, a copy of his sermon to the under-graduates.

No further business appearing, the Conference adjourned *sine die*, the session closing with the doxology and the apostolic benediction.

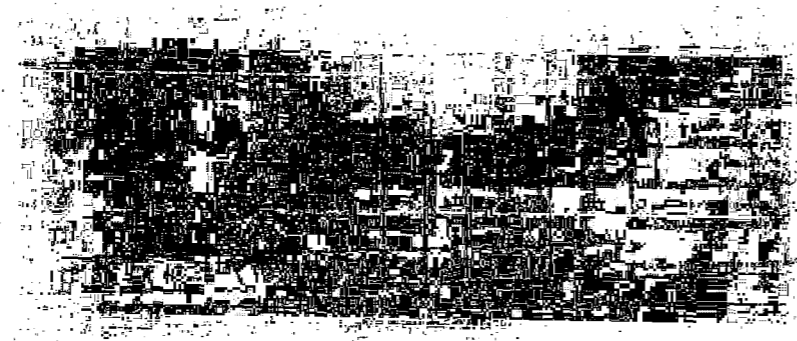

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions of the South Carolina Conference held their annual meeting in Marion, S. C., December 14th, 1880. During the past year the Board granted aid to twenty-two weak circuits, and had under their supervision five missions; namely, St. Paul's, Edisto, Columbia City, Scranton and Spartanburg City Mission.

The formation of the following new missions was recommended: Charleston District St. Stephen's Mission; Greenville District, Greenville City Mission. With reference to our foreign missions, we cannot do better than quote the language of our Missionary Secretary, Dr. A. W. Wilson:

"It will be seen that our affairs are, for the most part, in an encouraging condition. Increase has been made in nearly all our fields of operation, and the promise is better than at any previous day. The only exception to this remark is in the case of our mission in Brazil. It is not difficult to account for this. Our efforts in that country have been tentative, and in making the experiment, we have not provided the conditions necessary for success. Making no question of the sufficiency of the gospel, and its fitness for that or any other people, we can express our conviction that so soon as we shall inaugurate a more decisive policy, indicative of our purpose to occupy the ground permanently, and shall provide men and means sufficient therefor, we shall realize gains as large and rapid as we have made in our other missions."

Our Conference Board of Missions, impressed with the conviction, that the South Carolina, the mother of Conferences, and once the leader in missionary enterprises, can and should do more for the cause of missions, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board recommend to the South Carolina Conference to take steps toward supporting a South Carolina Conference missionary in some foreign field, and that the Conference endeavor through the Sunday-schools, and otherwise than by public collections, to raise \$1,500 the ensuing year, (over and above the regular assessment by the Board of Missions at Nashville,) preparatory to sending a missionary, and ever after endeavor to support such missionary.

It is with great pleasure that we note the progress the woman's missionary societies are making in their work. While we rejoice at the success attending these agencies throughout our connection, we mention, we trust with no unhallowed pride, that the women of the South Carolina Conference bear the banner in this grand march for the conquest of the kingdoms of this world to Christ.

The cause of missions in its domestic and foreign departments is commended to the prayers and liberality of the Methodists of South Carolina.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report that they have had under careful review this department of the Church, and are happy to state that the Conference institutions were flourishing during the past year. Yet the Committee feel constrained to urge the members of the Conference and the Church to a more vigorous liberality in providing educational advantages for the vast number of neglected children, especially of those within the purview of the Church. The civil department and every religious denomination are putting out new energies in this direction, and it becomes the Methodist Church of South Carolina, on which, as one of the largest Churches, rests a corresponding responsibility, to take an advanced position along the line of this educational movement. Let us, as a Conference, see to it that we encourage our people to send their children to the schools and colleges under the patronage of the Church. The future demands it; Rachel, weeping for her children, demands it; God himself demands it. Let us be up and at work. A man who holds a miser's grasp upon money, deprives his child of something more life giving than the bread which sustains him. God forbid that a man should be found within the bounds of the Methodist Church in South Carolina who is willing to deprive his child of an education in order that he may grow fat on the blood of his offspring. The best bequest of fortune is character. That man whose liberal mind founds a college, or builds an academy, or makes an endowment, or who even contributes his mite, does more for the well being of society, than he who wastes hoarded millions on luxuries, only to leave to his family the hereditary blight-spots of crime. We cannot give up the support of our colleges. The Committee would most earnestly urge every member of the Conference to renewed efforts in sustaining the institutions committed to our care.

I.—WOFFORD COLLEGE.

The President of Wofford College makes a favorable report to the Board of Trustees. The Institution has entered upon its twenty-seventh year. One hundred and fifteen students have been enrolled. The Trustees, under the advice

of the Faculty, modified during the year the old four-year collegiate, by introducing the university school system of classes, now so favorably worked in the higher universities of America and Europe. The Faculty feel assured that the practical results will fully vindicate the propriety and wisdom of the change; and they think it will best meet the existing wants of pupils coming from different parts of the State. The standard of scholarship will be maintained, but will be adapted to the material furnished to the College. The different chairs of the College and Preparatory Department are filled by a President and seven Professors of ability and long sustained experience. The Trustees have expressed themselves anxious to command a sufficient amount of funds to meet the current expenses of the College, and to put the buildings in suitable repair. The College cannot possibly be kept open without the sympathy and support of the Conference. The moral tone and gentlemanly deportment of the students have been well sustained during the year. The College has been more flourishing during the past session than at any other since the war.

II.—COLUMBIA FEMALE COLLEGE.

The President of the Board of Trustees of Columbia Female College represents this institution as successful beyond expectation. One hundred and seventy-two pupils were in attendance during the year, more than half of whom were boarders in the institution. The College opened this year twenty-five per cent. better than it did last year. Its patronage extends to several States. The College has a full Faculty, and every facility equal to the present demands of female education. The dining hall and domestic department have been conducted with great satisfaction by the President and his accomplished wife. The Trustees were able during the year to reduce the rate of interest on the bonded debt, and to cancel some of the bonds. If the College were relieved of this encumbrance, the Trustees would be able to repair the building and to supply it with new furniture. But they feel called upon, first, to use all available means in reducing the debt until it be paid up.

III.—COKEsbURY CONFERENCE SCHOOL.

The Cokesbury School has entered upon its forty-eighth scholastic year. Thirty-eight students were matriculated. The local patronage is, to some extent, regulated by the public school fund. The number of boarding pupils has increased. The Rector of the school, Mr. J. P. Pritchard, is highly endorsed by the Trustees. The school deserves the patronage of the Conference and throws itself back upon the sympathy of the Church, and points to its past record as a high claim upon the Conference. The moral conduct of the young men has been carefully watched over.

The amount raised for education during the present year was \$3,026.20; of which the Columbia Female College received one-fifth, and Wofford College the remainder.

Resolved, 1. That \$1,000 be assessed for education during the coming year, of which, the first \$3,000 raised, shall be appropriated to Wofford College, and the balance, if any, to the Columbia Female College.

Resolved, 2. That the Rev. C. H. Pritchard be appointed to preach the next annual sermon before the under-graduates of the Conference.

The Committee recommend to fill the vacancy on Committee of Third Year, Rev. J. B. Campbell vice Rev. W. P. Mouzon, resigned.

The Committee respectfully request the President of the Conference to make the following appointments: Whiteford Smith and W. W. Duncan, Professors in Wofford College; J. W. Dickson, Professor in Columbia Female College; A. M. Shipp, Professor in Vanderbilt University, and S. Lander, President of Williamston Female College.

REPORT ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals are happy to report a very general improvement in the condition of our publishing interests. The debt which has so long been a source of embarrassment to the Publishing House at Nashville, has been materially relieved by conversion into four per cent. bonds, saving in interest, \$1,460 annually to the Church.

From the exhibit before us we have no fears for the future safety of our Publishing House. With \$51,286 yet to be met by cash on bonds, the remaining indebtedness of the House will be \$235,207. The interest on this sum will be \$9,408 per annum. The profits of the House now average \$25,000 per annum, an amount sufficient to meet the interest and gradually diminish the principal of indebtedness, so that within ten or fifteen years, we may reasonably hope to see this institution erect.

The periodicals brought to our notice are all so well known that we deem it unnecessary to speak of their particular merits.

The **QUARTERLY REVIEW**, edited by Dr. T. O. Summers, deserves a more extensive circulation, and its claims should be pressed upon that class of readers to whom it is adapted.

The **NASHVILLE ADVOCATE** is an excellent family religious paper. Our Sunday-school periodicals are well adapted to the use of our church, and all of these have this recommendation, that they are solidly Methodist, and perfectly adapted to the wants of the Church in which we are laboring, and on which we are dependent for the bread of life.

No report is before us as to the **SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE**; but we learn from the publishers that the list of full paying subscribers is but little in excess of 3,000, about 100 copies being sent to preachers at half price. At least 5,000 copies should be sent out weekly within the State, after which, and not before, the subscription price may be reduced.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That we heartily approve the management of the Publishing House at Nashville, under the administration of the Rev. Dr. McFerrin as Agent, and L. D. Palmer, Esq., as Business Manager.

2. That we will continue to press the claims to patronage of the **SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE**.

3. That we will endeavor to have our Sunday-school Periodicals used in all our schools.

Resolved, 2. That the American Bible Society affords the best means to accomplish this purpose.

Resolved, 3. That we will co-operate with its agents, by aiding them, to the best of our ability, in this Godly work.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee will not attempt to present a detailed history of the crimes, distress and expense of intemperance. The records of the churches and of our civil courts, as well as the experience of every community, and of many families throughout our country, must satisfy every thoughtful person, that for a long time past, the ravage of this evil have been untold and fearful beyond expression, working ruin in all these relations of life. The liquor trade has assumed such immense power that it exerts a very considerable influence upon the government of both Church and State.

The sad effects of this state of affairs have become so generally and keenly felt, that we find, on the part of the truly conservative and public-spirited people everywhere, a determination and demand that there shall be a change—that the liquor traffic and drunkenness, as far as possible, shall be prevented. The great practical question presses upon us as a conference, what can be done to secure this change so urgently demanded, to save the souls of men and the civilization of our country from this threatened ruin.

This a matter that should be first considered in its religious aspect. The Church should lead off in the great reformation. Drunkenness and liquor traffic should not be allowed in any shape or degree within the pales of the Church. The law of the Church should be strictly enforced against all offenders in this regard, irrespective of persons. The pulpit should prudently, but plainly and earnestly, proclaim against this evil, and, with all possible tenderness and persuasion, warn the young against its seductive influence.

Next to the Church the State stands bound to protect its citizens against this intolerable and growing evil. Some of the State Legislatures, it seems, have already moved in the matter in response to the appeals of the people. But your Committee cannot fail to deplore the peculiar indifference that seems to have controlled the present Legislature of South Carolina in regard to this matter.

Surely considerations of public good, greater even than the peace of an election day, or the protection of minors—considerations that reach every day and every class and age of our people, demand legislation.

We need, also, in this great work of reformation the help of a sound and strong public opinion against intemperance. To this public sentiment the pulpit can largely contribute.

It is also urged by your Committee, that the evil of intemperance be most carefully guarded against in the family, by banishing all wines and liquors from the sacred precincts of home. It is sad to realize that on account of a custom still prevalent of using liquors at the social board, many of our young men who are generous and noble-hearted, are victimized to the habit of drink, and go down to ruin.

Your Committee offer the following resolutions:

1. That it is the sense of this Conference, that the time has certainly come when the law of the Church should be promptly and more fully enforced, as the Discipline directs, against the members of the Church who drink or sell liquor.
2. That this Conference, representing the spiritual interest of more than one hundred thousand souls in this State, and having the good of the whole population of the State at heart, is pained to say that the Legislature has heretofore seemed indisposed to legislate for the suppression of the manufacture and sale of liquor, and does assure that honorable body that it is ready to approve and sustain the most stringent legislation for the prohibition of the liquor traffic.
3. That it is the sense of this body, that no Christian can, with propriety, vote for any man for public office who drinks to excess, is engaged in the liquor traffic or uses liquor or favors its use in order to secure election to office.
4. That the preachers of this Conference give the subject of intemperance its proper prominence in the pulpit.
5. That it is urged upon all Christians to take a certain and firm stand against intemperance, and do all they can to unify and harmonize a sound public opinion against it.

A vote of thanks was given to Rev. Ellison Capers for the presentation of the Episcopal seal of his father, Bishop W. Capers.

The President of the Society was authorized to deliver to Dr. A. M. Shipp, historian of South Carolina Methodism, such documents in the archives of the Society as he may need.

REPORT ON HISTORY OF SOUTH CAROLINA METHODISM.

The committee appointed to receive the manuscript of the History of Methodism in South Carolina, prepared at the instance of this body by the Rev. A.

M. Shipp, D. D., beg leave to report that they have inspected the manuscript as carefully as their time would permit, and are unanimous in the conviction that it is in every way worthy alike the dignity of the subject and the hearty endorsement of the Conference.

The plan runs back to the first settlement of the State, embracing in its general outline the civil and religious history of those early times; then coming down through later periods it weaves into the biography of the heroes of the Church, those brilliant achievements which make the History of South Carolina Methodism as fascinating as romance.

Two points strike the committee with special force:

The work sets forth in a strong light the contribution which Methodism has made to the civilization of the commonwealth, not only in the lives of her great and good men, but also in bringing vast masses of the population under the enlightening laws of the moral world.

The other point is, that it presents Methodism as a witness for Christ in South Carolina.

It will be seen by this record that the purity, zeal, and power of the Church have sprung into more vital activity all her sister denominations in the State.

The publication of this History cannot but create profound gratitude to God for the marvelous work which He has wrought, and excite the Church still to advance the kingdom of the Blessed Lord.

The author has spared no industry in collecting material. He has carefully sifted his data, corrected discrepancies, and furnished a true, living and inspiring narrative extending through one hundred years down to the memory of men still living. The work has been to him a labor of love; and he has generously made it the property of the Conference.

The Committee suggest that the time of publication be left to the discretion of the author, and that the profits of the publication be invested by the Legal Conference who shall use the interest thereof in aid of the Conference Collection.

Resolved, 1. That the Conference hereby expresses its hearty thanks to the Rev. A. M. Shipp, D. D., for the preparation and generous disposition which he has made of his History of Methodism in South Carolina.

2. That a committee be appointed and empowered to act for the Conference in consultation with the author, on the publication of the History at such time and place as they may deem most expedient.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

It was a happy thought that expressed the wants of the Church and the world when the Sunday School idea received life in the minds of Mr. Wesley, Robert Raikes and others of their day. The idea seems to have possessed the fulness of a revelation to the Church prophetic of the wonders subsequently wrought out and credited to the Sunday School movement.

More than this, the growth of this great plan for saving the children, announces clearly the presence of God and His blessing as a companion thought all along through the years until to-day. The Great Shepherd of the sheep has never withdrawn His help from the organization; and, consequently, success has crowned the entire enterprise.

Moreover, the universal Church agrees upon the value of the Sunday School to the world, so that, whatever dispute there may be as to the author or the date of the first Sunday School, the idea itself has long since become the common property of the Church. This being so, it may be affirmed that wherever Christianity has been embodied in distinct organization, whether in Christian lands or in the far off fields of heathenism, the primal idea moves grandly along with the announcement of the Gospel of our common Saviour. The idea reaches the sublimity of suggestion in the term "International," used to designate our Sunday School lessons. There is more than a mere subordination of the Sunday School idea to the wants of the Church; but Christianity, as a whole, seems agreed that this grand movement in behalf of the children shall bind together all hearts that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity, and make the entire Church a unit in spirit and aim and effort and achievement.

The Board recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. That feeling profoundly thankful to Almighty God for His blessing upon the Sunday School work in our midst, we commit ourselves more fully to this great interest for the incoming year.

2. That this Conference heartily endorse and recommend for use in all our schools our excellent Sunday School periodicals as prepared by Dr. Cunningham.

3. That our preachers be requested to give greater prominence to the Sunday-school interest in their public ministrations of the word.

The Board recommend the appointment of Rev. R. C. Oliver as Conference Sunday School Secretary for the ensuing year.

MEMOIRS.

REV. F. MILTON KENNEDY, D.D.

BY REV. W. T. CAPERS.

F. Milton Kennedy was born in the beginning of the year 1834. He was the youngest son of the Rev. Wm. M. Kennedy, who was for many years a distinguished member of the South Carolina Conference, and a pattern of Christian and ministerial excellence. The father's gifts and graces were transmitted to the son. By the will of the Father Almighty, the elements of a noble manhood were mixed in the bright boy. Left an orphan in early childhood, he was fortunate in his guardians and his surroundings, and in the pious care of an excellent step-mother. Obedient, spirited and affectionate, the lad "grew in wisdom and in favor with God and man."

Part of his education was conducted by Dr. James H. Carlisle, then in charge of a male academy in Columbia.

Converted in boyhood, he was licensed to preach at twenty years of age, and in November, 1851, was admitted into the South Carolina Conference.

His career in the ministry was a steady progress in mental and spiritual culture, in pulpit power, in practical sagacity, administrative tact, broad catholicity, and an intelligent and ardent devotion to the principles and aims of his denomination. His usefulness, therefore, increased with his years. His election to the General Conference in December, 1869, was the proof of the high esteem and confidence in which he was held by his brethren.

As a preacher and pastor, both in cities and in the country, as army-chaplain during the war, as secretary of this Conference, as presiding elder, and as editor of the *Southern Christian Advocate*, he served the Church with conspicuous ability. Wherever he was appointed, his work was well done, was performed faithfully, thoroughly, gracefully. His devotion to duty, his invincible determination to achieve the full measure of the service required, "winged the shaft that quivered in his heart," and dismissed—alas, too soon, we think—the soaring soul from the labors and loves of earth to the glorious activities and associations of Heaven. He was Assistant Secretary of the last General Conference, and also acted as Secretary of the hard-working Committee on Revisals. Day and night for a month he toiled on, so taxing his nervous force, that the result was paralysis, two years of comparative helplessness, but of meek and cheerful submission, and then, sudden death.

Dr. Kennedy was both beloved and honored. How many in the Carolinas and Georgia felt the pain of a personal bereavement when he "fell on sleep," February 5th, 1880.

His was a short life—so we call it. Counted by its number of years, it was short; but measured by the work, the worship, the growth and the achievements of the man by the character constructed, his was a full life-time on the earth.

Milton Kennedy was a noble man, for he was true, gentle, and kind. He was a courteous, high-toned genial gentleman. He was both witty and wise, playful and discreet; magnanimous and sympathetic. Everybody loved him; everybody trusted him. Truth was his theme in the pulpit; and to be true was the law of his life. He was not an erratic genius; he was a well-developed, well-rounded man. One hardly knew which most to admire, his common sense, his glowing rhetoric, his magnetic courtesy, his rippling humor, his rare judgment, his tender sympathy, his exquisite taste or his manly earnestness. He did not probably fulfil the mission of the great man; but, better than that, he fulfilled the great mission of man, he followed Christ, and became a "partaker of the Divine nature."

Now that he has gone from our sight, we delight to remember the piety of our precious brother. His desires were all harmonized with each other and with God; and as a lake, protected by mountains from disturbing storms, reflects the radiant sky, so his tranquil heart reflected the smile of the Father.

Let us cheerfully surrender him to immortality.

REV. J. R. COBURN.

Rev. John R. Coburn was born in Charleston County, September 18, 1799, and departed this life in Florence, S. C., September 29, 1880, in the 82d year of his age. He was soundly converted to God, and joined the Methodist Church at a camp-

meeting held at Cypress Church, Colleton County, S. C., in 1827. The year following, he was received on trial into the South Carolina Conference, and began his life-work as an itinerant preacher. In 1837 he married Miss Maria Daniels, of Georgetown, S. C., with whom he lived in peace and comfort until he was called to his reward on high. They reared a large family of children, the most of whom are still alive. He continued in the regular work of the ministry until 1877, when he was placed on the superannuated list. For over half a century Father Coburn was a faithful watchman on the walls of Zion. During the greater part of this time, he was a missionary to the blacks on our coast. In this work he was a model. His work called him oftentimes from the bedside of the dying negro, to the halls of the wealthy and worldly, but he remembered the admonition of the Saviour, "Be ye wise as serpents, and harmless as doves;" and was thus always enabled to maintain a character for prudence as well as piety and zeal. In the cabin of the slave, or the mansion of the master, he was alike earnest and faithful.

In such an extended ministry, and amid such scenes as a missionary to the blacks in former years was familiar with, his zeal and self-sacrifice must have been fully tested. But he showed the heroic Christian spirit under the most trying and adverse circumstances, and could say with Paul, "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God." He was humble. He was no aspirant. He was satisfied with a lowly place among his brethren. As a missionary to the slaves on our coast, he found much to do for his Master, and with this position he was content. In fact, he enjoyed this work, believing that he was "serving his generation according to the will of God." He never sought an appointment. He was ready to go anywhere.

Having this spirit, he could not be unsuccessful; and doubtless many of the children of Ham, besides others, have already welcomed him to the home of the blest and pure. Some may not appreciate the labors dispensed among our former slaves in former years; but all who are familiar with the evangelistic work done by our missionaries among the colored people, know that this work was greatly blessed of God. In the awards rendered by the Saviour in the day of final account, Father Coburn will have many stars in his crown of rejoicing.

In his old age he suffered much from the infirmities incident to this period of life. But he was patient and cheerful amid them all. He grew old gracefully, and as a Christian should, with submission to the Divine will. He enjoyed life even to the last. As he grew more feeble and became more subject to pains and weakness, he felt that his end was approaching. But there was no alarm or apprehension in view of death. He was ready—had been ready for many long years.

Though resigned to the will of God he expressed a "desire to depart and be with Christ." His last illness was short and painful. He was unconscious most of the time; but, when his mind was clear, he spoke of his confidence and hope as being strong and unswerving. The writer of this memoir, had a long and free conversation with him a little while before his death, in which he clearly indicated that he was waiting for the sound of the Master's chariot wheels. He died at the house of his son-in-law, Rev. John W. McRoy, Florence, S. C., and is interred in the Presbyterian churchyard of that place. His wife and several of his children were with him in his last hours, and he had all the attention he needed to make his dying bed as easy as loved ones could make it, and the presence of the Saviour whom he had loved and served for so many years, was a comfort and solace in the hour of his departure. Thus lived and died one whose life was a benediction, and whose death leaves the world poorer.

"Servant of God, well done!"

REV. J. W. TOWNSEND.

JOHN W. HUMBERT.

Rev. Joel Wilson Townsend was born in Marlboro County, S. C., the 19th of January, 1800, and departed this life in Cokesbury, S. C., the 14th of May, 1880.

He was awakened under the preaching of Bishop George in the year 1819, and soon after experienced a change of heart, and was received into the Church. Being called to the work of the ministry, he was licensed to preach in 1822, and admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference in 1823. He was an effective itinerant preacher for twenty years, doing service as a valiant hero in the cause of our blessed Saviour.

His educational advantages were limited, yet by dint of application, he acquired a fair English education, and became conversant with sacred and profane history and general literature. He was acquainted with standard works on Theology, but above all the Bible was his *vade mecum*.

With clear conceptions of gospel truth, and a personal experience of its life-giving power, he could "preach the Word" with telling effect; and there were many seals to his ministry.

From the year 1811 to the time of his death, he was superannuated ever maintaining his Christian integrity, and not by any means an idler in the vineyard, but laboring as his strength would allow, until within a few months of his summons from above.

In 1827, he married Miss Mary F. Acker, of Anderson County, by which marriage he had five sons and two daughters, all of whom are now living except one, viz: Joshua Milton, who fell during the late war. His eldest daughter is the worthy wife of Rev. J. L. Sily, of the South Carolina Conference.

In 1812 he lost his first wife, and in 1815 married Miss Maria Black of Abbeville Co., S. C., who preceded him a few years since to the better world.

During the latter period of his life, his home was in Cokesbury and vicinity, thereby availing himself of the South Carolina Conference School for his sons, esteeming the mental and moral training of his children a matter of the highest consideration.

His personal piety and relation to the family circle is thus expressed by his eldest son Francis Asbury, who says: "I can bear testimony as a humble witness of my father's devotion to the cause of his Master. He was scrupulously exact in his hours of devotion, never allowing anything to deprive him of the privilege of assembling his family at the altar of prayer, and when not able to be up would kneel on his bed and pray aloud with his family. Fasting and secret prayer was with him a confirmed habit. I knew of no man who was as systematic in every Christian duty as my father."

Early this year Father Townsend met with an accident which dislocated his left shoulder and doubtless hastened his end.

Though for several months afflicted in body, yet his mind and heart were kept in perfect peace, being stayed upon the Lord, and he seemed impressed that his days were well nigh numbered, saying to his pastor: "I feel that the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith, *I have done the best I could.*"

When asked what message he would like to send to his brethren of the Conference, he replied: "I shall not get there, but *hope to reach Emanuel's Land.*"

And while some friends were singing

"And when hoary hairs shall their temples adorn
Like lambs, they shall still in my bosom be borne,"

realizing that God was indeed his shepherd, he uttered the words, "I am borne in his bosom, *thankful! thankful!*"

Having requested his afflicted son with whom he was living, always to keep up the family altar; and having already given directions relative to his burial, as though he expected very soon to be called hence—how significant! that on the morning of the 11th of May, though almost speechless, our beloved father in Israel indicated that it was the hour for family worship, and while they were thus engaged, his own son leading in prayer, he lifted up his hands and presented himself a holy sacrifice which God, through Christ accepted. And from that family altar his joyous spirit ascended to join the blood washed through in songs of victory around the shining throne of the King Eternal.

* * The candidate for admission on trial and the several classes to be examined, and the members of the Examining Committees, are required to be present at the seat of the Annual Conference, at 9 o'clock on the morning of the day next preceding the day appointed for the meeting of the Conference, and enter upon the prescribed examinations.

NOTE.—The Standing Resolutions, which were ordered to be published, have been received from the Secretary.
