Experience the Forest

Drs. Savage and Steinmetz (Psychology) collaborated for interim this January. With ten students, they explored forest environments in various settings in North and South Carolina, learning about many facets including ecology, timber management, and psychological benefits of spending time in forests.

The first week's adventures took place at the South Carolina Coast, where the group stayed at the Hobcaw Barony. On-site, they learned from local research experts about saltwater intrusion and its stresses on trees, as well as ecology of the maritime forest. One day was spent at Bull's Island, where the group saw how hurricane Hugo in 1989 had changed the forested landscape. On the return trip to Wofford, the group was treated to a tour of a longleaf pine forest where

they learned more about the management perspective as well as appreciating the beauty of these

majestic trees. Congaree National Park was the second week's destination, where everyone was enchanted by the mystical qualities of the floodplain forest. The final field trip, to Pisgah National Forest, included a hike through the snowy landscape, decorated with icicles, as well as a fascinating visit to the Bent Creek experimental forest.

The course also incorporated case studies of individual trail journeys, research into different world forests, a day of making paper from tree bark, and creative projects by the students including original short stories, surreal drawings, video, and art made with materials collected from all the landscapes that were visited.
