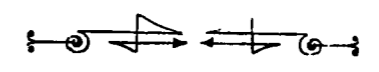

City Hall, Darlington, S. C., Dec. 14, 1904.

The South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened its One Hundred and Nineteenth session in the City Hall, Darlington, S. C., this morning at 10 o'clock, Bishop A. W. Wilson presiding.

The opening devotions, including the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, were conducted by Bishop Wilson, assisted in the sacrament by W. C. Power, W. W. Jones, J. W. Humbert, and J. B. Traywick.

The roll was called by the secretary of the last session, and 166 clerical and 13 lay members reported present.

E. O. Watson was elected secretary with W. L. Wait and A. E. Holler, assistants. A. J. Cauthen was elected recording secretary. S. H. Zimmerman was elected statistical secretary, with R. E. Turnipseed, J. H. Noland, D. W. Keller, and A. N. Brunson, assistants.

On motion of P. F. Kilgo, hours of meeting and adjourning were fixed:—meet at 9:30 A. M.; adjourn at 1:30 P. M.

The bar was fixed to include the first floor.

The report of the Presiding Elders, standing committee on nominating committees, was read and adopted, as follows:

Reports and communications were referred as follows:—General Sunday School Board to Sunday School Board; Book Agents and Publishing House to committee on Books and Periodicals; General Epworth League Board to Epworth League Board; General Board of Missions to Board of Missions; Sabbath Observance to Sabbath Observance.

Question 20. Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? was called and the character of superannuates and supernumeraries examined and passed and their names referred to the committee on Conference Relations.

The names of A. J. Cauthen and O. A. Darby were called, and upon announcement of their death during the year, their names were referred to the committee on Memoirs.

The Presiding Elders were called, their characters examined and passed and reports rendered of their work. C. D. Mann asked for a committee to investigate charges of maladministration preferred by him against J. S. Beasley. Bishop Wilson ruled that as no previous notice had been given of such charge to be preferred action was barred under the discipline. The character of J. S. Beasley was passed.

Question 2. Who remain on trial? was called, and Samuel D. Bailey, D. English Camak, J. Percy Inabnit, Otis A. Jeffcoat (D), John Benjamin Kilgore, Samuel Calhoun Morris, Charles Leroy McCain (D), Clarence Edward Peele, Charles Wesley Ray (E), Walter Pinckney Way, Lemuel E. Wiggins and John N. Wright (E), were called, their characters examined and passed, and, being approved in examination upon the prescribed course of study, they were advanced to the class of the second year.

Under Question 3, Who are discontinued? Norman Lander Prince, on account of ill health, and Marvin B. Whittaker, pursuing studies in Vanderbilt University, were discontinued at their own request.

Under Question 8, What traveling preachers are elected deacons. Marvin Auld, Phillip C. Garris, W. Lester Gault, Geo. T. Harmon, Jr., and Walter S. Henry were called, their characters examined and passed, and upon approval by committee in prescribed course of study, they were elected deacons, and advanced to the class of the third year. G. W. Dukes and J. LaVance Tyler, already deacons, upon passage of character and approval in examination, were advanced with the above to the class of the third year.

Under Question 7. Who are the deacons of one year?—Thos. L. Belvin, Samuel O. Cantey, Sam T. Creech, Archibald E. Driggers, Joseph Alexander Graham, William H. Murray, John Ivy Spinks, and John T. Macfarlane were called, their characters examined and passed, and being approved in examination upon the prescribed course, they were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

G. Emory Edwards, James T. Fowler, Levi L. Inabinet, John Manning, and John B. Weldon, not before the committee for examination, were continued in the class of the third year.

Question 10. What local preachers are elected deacons? was called and Charles M. Peeler and Thomas Burnett Owen, being duly recommended, were elected local deacons.

Question 14. What local preachers are elected elders? was called and James Clark Abney, being duly recommended, was elected a local elder.

Question 20. Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? was resumed and the character of elders in Charleston, Columbia, and Florence districts examined and passed.

On motion of E. P. Taylor, R. E. Stackhouse was substituted for John E. Carlisle on committee on Books and Periodicals.

The Knights of Pythias of Darlington and the Darlington Guards extended invitations to the Conference to use their hall and armory.

Announcements were made and the Conference adjourned with the doxology and the benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY.

City Hall, Darlington, S. C., Dec. 15, 1904.

Conference was called to order this morning at nine thirty o'clock, Bishop Wilson in the chair.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

On motion of E. O. Watson, the Conference expressed its thanks to the Knights of Pythias of Darlington, and the Darlington Guards for the use of their hall and armory tendered on yesterday.

On motion of R. A. Child, A. C. Latimer was substituted for G. Lang Anderson on the committee on District Conference Journals.

Question 20. Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? was resumed and character of elders in Greenville, Marion, Orangeburg, Rock Hill, Spartanburg and Sumter Districts examined and passed.

C. D. Mann was referred to the committee on Conference Relations for the superannuated relation, and A. E. Holler and W. C. Power for the supernumerary relation. W. A. Kelly was left in the hands of his presiding elder.

Question 10. Who are located this year? was called and T. M. Dent was located at his own request. J. D. Frierson, left by last Conference in the hands of his presiding elder for investigation, was called and the announcement made that the committee of investigation found a trial not necessary. On motion of his presiding elder, J. D. Frierson was located on the ground of inefficiency.

Question 19. Who have died the past year? was called and upon announcement of the death of S. Lander, A. B. Earle, and T. B. Reynolds, their names were referred to the committee on Memoirs.

Question 5. Who are readmitted? was called and Jas. A. Duncan and H. C. Mouzon were readmitted.

The report of the General Board of Education was read and referred to the Conference Board of Education.

The Committee on Conference Relations reported making partial answer to questions 17 and 18, as follows:

Bishop Wilson resumed the chair.

Question 1. Who are admitted on trial? was called and Charles C. Derrick, Leo. D. Gillespie, R. E. Sharpe and Thos. B. Owen having stood approved examinations before the committees were received on trial.

Rev. Richard Carroll of the Industrial School for negroes in Columbia was introduced and addressed the Conference.

The committee on Public Worship announced that the Sunday School anniversary would be held this evening in the City Hall at 8 o'clock.

Announcements were made and conference adjourned with the doxology and the benediction by Bishop A. Coke Smith.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY.

City Hall, Darlington, S. C., Dec. 16, 1904.

Conference was called to order at ten o'clock this morning, Bishop Wilson in the chair.

The opening devotions were conducted by J. W. Humbert.

The roll of absentees was called, and 10 clerical and 4 lay members, not present at previous sessions, reported present. On motion, roll call was dispensed with for the remainder of this Conference session.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Jas. A. Campbell was referred to the committee on Conference Relations for the superannuated relation.

The following reports were read and adopted:—Committee on Sabbath Observance, Sunday School Board, Committee on Temperance, Bible Cause Board, and Committee on District Conference Journals.

Report No. 2 of the Committee on Conference Relations was presented and adopted, making further answer to minute questions 17 and 18:—

Question 17. Who are supernumerary? A. E. Holler and W. H. Wroton; 18. Who are superannuated? C. D. Mann and B. H. Rawls. Dr. W. R. Lambuth, Missionary Secretary, was introduced to the Conference.

Question 12. What traveling preachers are elected elders? was called and James G. Huggin, Loring P. McGhee and Barnwell Rhett Turnipseed having completed the prescribed course of study, upon passage of character, were elected elders. John W. Bailey, already an elder, completed the course of study with the above. Emmett F. Scoggins, not before the committee of the fourth year, and F. Emory Hodges not approved in examination by that committee were continued in the class of the fourth year.

Question 4. What traveling preachers are admitted into full connection? was called, and Marvin Auld, George W. Dukes, W. Lester Gault, Geo. T. Harmon, Jr., Walter S. Henry, and J. LaVance Tyler, having stood approved examinations in the prescribed course, upon passage of character and satisfactory answer to the disciplinary questions, were, after an address by Bishop Wilson, admitted into full connection. Phillip C. Garris, of this class, not present, was continued on trial in the class of the third year.

The following resolution was presented:

RESOLVED,—That the entire management of the Southern Christian Advocate be placed in the hands of a Board of seven managers,—four clerical members of the South Carolina Conference and three laymen—to be elected quadrennially by the Conference and to have the power to fill all vacancies in its organization occurring in the interim of elections.

The Board shall have the power to elect the Editor or Editors of the Advocate, contract for the publication of the paper, or form a stock company for its publication, and otherwise take entire control of the management of the paper as trustees of the Conference,—provided that it shall in no case involve the Conference in any pecuniary liability.

The Board shall be elected at this session of the Conference and shall assume its duties at the ensuing session.

A memorial from Orangeburg District relative to the publication of the Minutes was read and referred to the Committee on Minutes.

RESOLVED, 1.—That the South Carolina Conference hereby petitions the College of Bishops to arrange the meeting of this Body to convene not later than the first Sunday of December.

2. That Bro. A. J. Cauthen be instructed to forward this paper to the secretary of the College of Bishops in time for their consideration at the May meeting.

The report of the Trustees of the Williamston Female College was read and referred to the Board of Education.

John O. Willson, President of Williamston Female College, presented the offer of C. A. C. Waller, President of the Corporation holding the Williamston Female College property, tendering the property of said corporation to the Conference, with attached terms and conditions to the South Carolina Conference.

The tender with attached conditions is as follows:

To the South Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South:—In accordance with the terms of an agreement bearing date Jan. 14, 1903, a copy of which is hereto attached as a part hereof, we beg to offer you the property of the Williamston Female College, of Greenwood, S. C., which is incorporated under the laws of South Carolina. This offer is made in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in the said agreement attached. We respectfully ask your consideration and acceptance of the same pursuant to the terms and conditions of said agreement. In this connection, we think it advisable to say that in order to complete the building it was found necessary to borrow twenty thousand dollars and to secure the same to place a first mortgage on the entire property of the corporation. In addition to this sum, the corporation owes a note for materials of three thousand dollars, which will mature Nov. 1, after date. To meet this indebtedness the corporation has notes and subscriptions amounting to some twenty-two thousand dollars. These notes and subscriptions mature in instalments; part has already been paid, to wit: about six thousand dollars, which has been applied as a credit on the mortgage indebtedness. The remaining unpaid portion will be so applied as collected. The value of the property owned by the corporation amounts to fifty-two thousand dollars.

In accepting this proposition we request that you formulate some definite plan looking to the liquidation of any balance which may remain of this indebtedness after applying collections for subscriptions and notes, and we offer our services to co-operate with you to this end.

SECOND.—The name of the proposed corporation is Williamston Female College, of Greenwood, S. C.

THIRD.—The place it proposes to have its headquarters is Greenwood, S. C.

FOURTH.—The purpose of the said corporation is to purchase and own a site in the town of Greenwood, State of South Carolina, and erect thereon suitable buildings and equipments, and there maintain perpetually an institution for the education of white women and girls, primarily. The property to be offered to the South Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South, on the sole condition that it shall use and maintain the same perpetually thereat as a first class college for the above purposes here mentioned, and if said Conference declines to accept the said property on said conditions then and in that event to remain under the control of this corporation for said purpose.

FIFTH.—The names and residences of all managers, trustees, directors, or other officers are as follows: C. A. C. Waller, Greenwood, President; Dr. S. Lander, Williamston, Director; J. B. Attached Proposition to the Board of Trustees of Williamston Female College.

GENTLEMEN: In the matter of the removal of the Williamston Female College to Greenwood, S. C., the Committee in charge, in behalf of the town of Greenwood, beg leave to submit the following proposition:—Greenwood will furnish mutually satisfactory lot, not to exceed fifteen acres; will erect thereon a modern, up to date building costing not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, of sufficient capacity to accommodate not less than one hundred students, and will purchase the apparatus, laboratory, library, college and household furniture and furnishing, cabinet of minerals and fossils, musical instruments, shelving, cases, etc., equipments, etc., of the present institution from the owners or owner, at four thousand dollars.

The title to the above property to be in a corporation known as the Williamston Female College, of Greenwood, S. C., in fee simple, to be incorporated under the laws of South Carolina.

All of the subscribers to receive stock in this proposed corporation in an amount equal to the number of shares subscribed; the shares to be of the par value of fifty dollars each, payable one-fourth in cash and balance by notes of subscribers, in one, two and three equal instalments, yearly, on Nov. 1, 1903, 1904, 1905 without interest until

after maturity. Then to bear interest at the rate of eight per cent., and the stock to be assigned as collateral to secure the payments of the subscriptions.

The management of the institution to be under the entire control, supervision and direction in every part and detail of Dr. Samuel Lander as long as the South Carolina Conference permit him to retain the management thereof, and the certificates of stock shall contain a provision obligating the holder thereof to vote the same for this purpose.

The charter of the proposed corporation shall contain full provisions fixing and defining the character and purpose of the institution which it is designed to conduct; and among other things shall provide that the same shall be exclusively for the education of white people, primarily for girls, but with the privilege, if desired, and the management so determine, for boys also.

The property shall be offered to the South Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South, at its next session on the sole condition that it shall be used and maintained perpetually in Greenwood as a first class college for white pupils, under the control of the said Conference. If the said Conference decline to accept the said property on the above conditions, then, in that event, the stockholders of the said corporation shall remain in control of the said college. These conditions are to be carried out by appropriate and suitable instruments of writing as may be determined upon.

Dr. Samuel Lander to give his entire influence to the institution, and to conduct and manage it exclusively as long as he remains connected therewith.

The above proposition is made subject to the ability of the committee to raise by subscription the funds required.

By unanimous resolution of the committee on Jan. 14, 1903, we ask the name to be "Lander College."

Signed by committee of Greenwood citizens and accepted by Trustees of Williamston Female College.

Concerning the tender of this property, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

RESOLVED, That this Conference is sincerely grateful to the City of Greenwood and vicinity for the line property tendered to this body for the use of the Williamston Female College, and hereby accepts the same on condition that the debt now due shall be paid in the next two years.

Fuller Lyon, to publish for four years the Southern Christian Advocate fully equal in mechanical execution and quality of paper now used, at an annual subscription price of one dollar, giving bond for the proper execution of the contract, and to allow the preachers the usual ten per cent. discount.

C. D. Mann presented a charge of maladministration of discipline against J. S. Beasley. Bishop Wilson ruled the charge as barred by the statute of limitation. C. D. Mann gave notice of appeal from the ruling.

The report of the committee on Minutes was read. On motion of S. H. Zimmerman the resolution of this report requiring a contract for delivery of Minutes within thirty days of the adjournment of Conference was amended by the insertion of the words "February 1." On motion of H. B. Browne the report was amended to provide for the payment of One Hundred dollars annually from the Minute fund for the purchase of an adding machine until same be paid for. The report as amended was adopted.

The following resolution was adopted:—

WHEREAS, The inaccuracies in the published minutes of our annual Conference sessions have been a source of great humiliation therefore, RESOLVED, First, that each Presiding Elder appoint an auditing committee of three to whom the preachers in his district shall submit their reports for revision on the first day of Conference. V. REPORTS.

EDUCATION.

We no longer apologize for church schools, nor do we have to defend Christian Education. The manhood and womanhood our colleges stand for have attracted yearly a larger and larger attendance.

This increased patronage embarrasses those who have to meet the requirement of large numbers with present equipment. The question that must be answered now is, shall we grow with this growth, or shall we deny entrance to only a limited number?

We cannot build colleges upon resolutions nor establish them upon mere endorsement. The benevolence of the church for her schools is of little value unless it begets beneficence. It is a cause for regret and disappointment that our colleges appeal in vain to the liberality of the church. We have laid ourselves liable to the charge of trifling with this sacred trust. When the Methodists of South Carolina invest millions of dollars for commercial purposes and only a few hundred for their educational institutions, they do themselves irreparable harm.

The establishment of the Columbia College with larger equipment cannot be optional with the church. The demand of our daughters upon the church for education is a divine command for larger equipment. Should the walls of our college at Columbia stand unfinished, those who pass by will mock us, saying, "There are those who began to build and were not able to finish, not because they did not count the cost, but because where their means abounded their illiberality did much more abound." Unfinished walls will be a finished monument to our illiberality. Let no such disgrace threaten us.

The demands of our boys are no less imperative than of our girls. Wofford College puts manhood above cotton factories, oil mills and all other commercialism, and she hesitates not to ask that some of the money thus invested shall be directed to the making of the man rather than his clothes. Nowhere have we received such large dividends from invested funds as that produced by our schools. The necessity is before us to enlarge the endowment of Wofford and to complete the work commenced for the Columbia College. The crisis is such that delay on the part of either would be disastrous. Our ability to put both colleges upon the high plane of usefulness to which they are appointed is not to be questioned. We give to the agents of Columbia and Wofford the assurance of all possible support.

In the division of the undirected 20th Century Fund we recommend that Wofford and Columbia share alike in the net proceeds. ,

Again do we commend the Correspondence School, and rejoice at its success. Too many of the young men of our conference have not availed themselves of the advantages of this school. We recommend that the chairman of each committee on examination, at the beginning of the year shall urge the undergraduates who are to be before him to take the correspondence course.

WOFFORD COLLEGE.

The President's report shows that there are three hundred and seventy-seven students upon the campus. The Freshman Class is divided into three divisions, which fact adds very greatly to the labors of the professors. To meet the demand for efficient service the teaching force must be increased. The board of trustees report the expenses of the college within the income. The trustees are requested to have five thousand copies of Pres. H. N. Snyder's report as rendered to the Board of Education, published for distribution.

COLUMBIA COLLEGE.

The trustees report that, authorized by the Conference in its last session, they considered the various offers made, and after due consideration, accepted the land given by Mr. F. H. Hyatt, as most suitable and desirable for location of the college. To this gift was made another of twenty acres by Col. J. T. Sloan, of Columbia. The two tracts being contiguous and in the suburbs of the city. Let the thanks of the Conference to these gentlemen for their gifts be extended through the secretary of this body. The trustees further report that the new building as planned and contracted for will be at a cost that complete of \$89,000—a building attractive in style and commodious in its appointments. The president reports that the present college building is full to its utmost capacity, and that they have been forced to turn several girls away for lack of room. The work being done is most satisfactory.

We request the board of trustees to furnish annually to the board of education a financial report of the institution.

LANDER COLLEGE.

By request the name of the Williamston Female College shall hereafter be Lander College, in honor of the lamented founder, the late Dr. S. Lander.

The Lander College was moved from the town of Williamston to the city of Greenwood in September, and the opening attendance has passed the expectation of its authorities. The new building erected by the citizens of Greenwood and presented to this Conference adds more than fifty thousand dollars to our college property. The thanks of this Conference are due and are here given to the citizens of Greenwood for their gracious and munificent gift.

During the summer, Dr. Samuel Lander, founder and president of this college, died.

The College stands to-day as an expression of the life, character and purpose of Samuel Lander. A more extended notice of Dr. Lander and his work has been made by the committee on Memoirs.

FITTING SCHOOLS.

The prosperity attending our Fitting Schools is gratifying. Because of the crowded condition of the Wofford College Fitting School, we would advise the Trustees to consider the erection of another dormitory.

EPWORTH ORPHANAGE.

To the South Carolina Conference, assembled in Darlington, Dec. 14th, 1904:—

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS AND TRUSTEES OF THE EPWORTH ORPHANAGE FOR 1904.

ANNUAL REVIEW.

During the nine years of the life of the Orphanage the Lord has evidently regarded it with loving favor, but no year during its history has it been more generously supported. We are again called upon to gratefully acknowledge the abundant mercies and blessings bestowed upon our orphan family by the Father of the fatherless. No bequests or legacies have come into our possession during the year, but the steady flow of contributions from various sources has been sufficient to meet all of the current expenses of the Orphanage and to make considerable material improvement. We are glad to state that we have been unusually successful in operating the plan of special support, which means a monthly pledge of five dollars for the support of one of the orphan children. The special support list has increased one hundred per cent. during the year. The success attained through this organized effort on the part of Sunday schools, churches, charges and individuals, largely accounts for the fact that we were able to pass through the stringent summer months without serious embarrassment. Barring the fact that we appointed a set time for "Labor Day" offerings, and called attention to Thanksgiving day offerings in favor of the Orphanage, we have not been under the necessity of making any public appeal for the means necessary to meet the current expenses. While we have had but a small amount of money at any one time, our friends will be glad to know that for practically two years, we have been able to meet all expenses incurred by the Orphanage any day during this time.

The Lord has literally answered our prayers. "Give us this day our daily bread." The Superintendent has been able to attend nearly all of the District Conferences, and to visit a goodly number of the charges of the Conference, in the interest of the work, but we have had no special agent in the field aside from this.

During the year, 24 children have been admitted into the Orphanage and 23 have gone out. One of those dismissed has secured a paying position, 3 have been received into good homes, one has entered Columbia College through the assistance of an uncle, the remaining 18 have been returned to relatives.

There are now 108 inmates. The financial condition is better than ever before. Rev. S. A. Nettles has offered \$2,500, with which to build a home; \$1,250 has been paid.

The provision made for the children, and the kind but firm discipline of the Orphanage management is evidence to them that they are the object of our love and care, and their deportment has been gratifying.

FARM.

The dry weather in the spring and fall prevented the garden from yielding as abundantly as formerly, but still the vegetable crop has been very helpful in supplying us with food for table use. The field crops have yielded well again this year, corn, oats, potatoes, peas and a small amount of cotton have been raised.

Everything has been gathered and housed. The products from the farm will be sufficient to supply horses and hogs and to provide provender for the cattle. All of the hauling for the orphanage is done by our own teams. We find this to be a great saving in the way of expense, as we are building a good portion of the time and the cost of putting material on the ground would be considerable if we did not have teams of our own.

The boys help to do all the farm and garden work, and make themselves useful generally. The larger boys are specially helpful as teamsters.

MARBLE AND PRINTING OFFICE.

These industries have been quite as successful as formerly. The public patronage has been fairly good, and a sufficient amount of work has been given to keep the helpers in these departments constantly employed. A number of the boys are trained in these branches of industry, and are becoming qualified for useful service. Some of them evidence a special fondness for the work, and are developing rapidly.

HOUSE KEEPING.

The girls are divided into sets, and are on duty in each department a month at a time.

They are taught the duties of general house keeping, and the aim is to teach them to be home makers. They are trained to sew, cook, laundry, put the homes in order and perform the duties of the dining room.

BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year, the Woman's Building, which was nearing completion at the time the last annual report was made, was finished and occupied in February.

This building is a gem, not only as to looks, but also as to its convenience and comfort. Not until it was completed were the duties of the cook and dining rooms performed with ease and comfort, especially during the winter season. The new steam laundry plant was installed in the early part of the summer. This arrangement enables us with our own force, to do all the washing for the institution in a few hours and generally at the first of the week. Located near the laundry a well has been drilled to the depth of 175 feet, which furnishes an abundant supply of water, not only for the laundry, but for the whole orphanage. The steam power is used to do laundry work, pump water, cut wood, and run the printing presses.

These improvements are labor savers, and have enabled us to dispense with outside help costing about twenty dollars per month. Some of our buildings have been repaired and retouched with paint and white wash brushes, which has added materially to their durability and good appearances. The Nettles Home was begun in the latter part of October; the brick walls are now up and wood work is being done.

When this home is finished, it will increase our capacity for the admission of the fatherless little ones twenty-five per cent.

SCHOOL.

The Epworth Orphanage graded School was raised by the members of the Board at their June meeting two grades making a school of ten grades. The work that is now being done has never been so satisfactory. The children are more studious than ever before and the teachers are greatly encouraged. Prof. Nabers and his assistants, Misses Beasley, Godley and Wharton are doing faithful service, and the results of their labors are plainly manifest in the mental and moral development of the children.

CHURCH.

The purpose of the Epworth Orphanage is not only to feed, clothe and educate the children committed to its care, but its highest aim is to so train them that they may become Christian boys and girls. We are grateful for the fact that there are some grounds for congratulations.

Morning worship, preaching, prayer meeting, the Sunday school, Temperance and Missionary meetings all exert their influences for good upon the Orphanage family. About all the children in the institution are now members of the church, and are daily being instructed in the things which make for their peace.

HEALTH.

The health of the Orphanage family has been very good. There have been no contagious diseases to contend with, and not one case of fever.

We have had only one case of sickness that we felt was serious and the sick one is rapidly recovering. We feel that we have reasons to be profoundly grateful to the Giver of all good for His abundant mercies and loving favor. The lives of all have been spared, health and strength have been given, and food and raiment have been supplied; and we feel that we can adopt the language and sentiment of the Psalmist, when he said, "Bless the Lord O! my soul, and forget not all of his benefits."

The work and administration of the Superintendent, Rev. W. B. Wharton, and his coadjutors, are highly commended.

The presiding Bishop is requested to appoint Rev. W. B. Wharton as Superintendent of the Orphanage for another year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The time has come when the absolute reasonableness, the scientific basis of the Sabbath rest should be clearly set forth. The fourth Commandment is not the expression of God's arbitrary will, but is grounded upon the spiritual, intellectual and physical needs of man. "The Sabbath was made for man," because man needs the Sabbath to conserve his highest interest for time and for eternity. Of course, our reports can but barely indicate this true line of thought and conviction. Just a few pertinent expressions of great thinkers and leaders, however, may well be quoted here. Says Josiah Strong, "The Sabbath is the bulwark of a vital Christianity, and a vital Christianity is the bulwark of the nation." Justice Strong declares, "The Sabbath no man can doubt, contributed largely to the formation of that character which has helped us so much in our history, and which has been the admiration of the world." Said the superintendent of a great railway, "We find that when our men continue to work every Sunday, they finally cease to be men, and become mere machines."

One said, "I have not had twenty Sundays in twenty years, but what I have had to work in the mill; and the worst result is, not that I am broken in health, though only forty, but that, when one works every Sunday night along, all the good there is in him just runs out." It therefore behooves the philanthropist, concerned for the highest type of manhood, to foster the Sabbath rest. It behooves the patriot, who longs for the best citizenship, to advocate this mightiest of all

forces to uplift the man behind the ballot. It behooves all who value the Christian home, and love the souls of men, to make the most of this God given day.

Your Committee offers the following resolutions: 1. That we, the members of this Conference, both clerical and lay, will seek to guard more zealously than ever, both by precept and example, the Sabbath rest of our people. 2. That we will do so, positively, by directing our people to a full use of the day in Christian activities and devout waiting upon God. 3. That we will do so, negatively, by discountenancing the use of the Sunday trains, Sunday mails, and other so-called "necessities" of our modern life, and that we will use all our influence especially towards the discontinuance of Sunday excursion trains, and towards the minimizing of the labor in our cotton mills on that day. We believe that only thus will we at once discharge our duty both to God and man.

Your board warmly commends to the members of this Conference the manifest duty of presenting to all our congregations the claims of the American Bible Society, as one of the institutions of the Church in an exalted and vitally connectional sense. It deserves to be supported adequately as a mighty weapon in defense of the truth and its propagation in papal no less than pagan and Christian lands.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The evil of intemperance and its consequent woes have been so often and so vividly portrayed in reports and resolutions by committees that every phrase employed in depiction and denunciation has become commonplace and stereotyped, and the reports treated as a perfunctory discharge of an enjoined duty.

A sacred observance of our assumed vows and a faithful and conscientious discharge of duty are the only means of accomplishing practical results.

The attitude of our Church regarding the use and sale of liquors is clearly and firmly set forth in the following paragraphs from the Discipline:

Page 93, chapter v.

Par. 214. "Let all our preachers and members faithfully observe our General Rule which forbids drunkenness, or drinking spirituous liquors, unless in case of necessity."

Par. 216. "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for such sale, from becoming bondsmen for any person as a condition for obtaining a license, and from renting property to be used for such sale. If any member shall violate any of the provisions of this paragraph, he shall be deemed guilty of immorality; nevertheless, in the case of a member who shall sign a petition for such sale, or shall become a bondsman for any person engaged in such traffic, or shall rent property to be used for such sale, it shall be the duty of the pastor to deal with such offender as provided for in Chapter VII., Sec V., Par. 299, page 126. This paragraph shall not apply to persons who are acting under instructions or decrees of any court, or who are acting as officers of the law."

Your Committee is painfully impressed that the Church is powerless to successfully combat this great evil so long as the members of the Church, in utter disregard and violation of their vows and obligations, lend their support to it by using liquors as a beverage and voting to sustain the traffic.

A faithful compliance with the provisions of our Church law by every member is strongly urged.

We are persuaded to believe that, if the patronage of the members of the churches of the various denominations was withdrawn from the selling agencies, by whatever name known, the business would become so unprofitable as to cause its discontinuance.

We commend those agencies which contribute to the building of a sentiment for temperance, law and order in our State—the Christian Temperance Workers, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the South Carolina Temperance, Law and Order League, "The Christian Temperance Worker" and wish them God-speed in their efforts.

We commend the original bill introduced in the legislature by Senator Brice, of York County, allowing the people of a county the opportunity to vote out dispensaries where they have been established; but we express our unqualified disapproval of the imposition of the arbitrary tax imposed upon those counties which choose to avail themselves of the privilege. We earnestly appeal for the repeal of that amendment.

Brethren, let us engage actively, consistently and unceasingly against this great evil.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS.

It is gratifying to your board to report, after careful consideration, that there has been marked advancement in missionary interest and liberality throughout the Conference during the year now closing. Our Domestic Mission charges, possibly with a few exceptions, give evidence of steady growth, and we have reason to believe that in the near future a number of these will be self supporting.

We regret to report that our Missionary organ, *Go Forward*, is not so widely circulated as it deserves to be, and the Board urges every preacher in charge to make an earnest effort to place the paper in every Methodist home.

We most heartily commend the action of the General Board of Missions in organizing a training school in the city of Nashville, Tenn., to continue for two months for the benefit of our domestic missionaries and for others who may wish to attend.

The board recommends that March 31, June 30, and Sept. 30, be fixed as dates for payments to be made on appropriations to the several Domestic Missions; and also that the Conference Treasurer continue to make monthly reports through the *Southern Christian Advocate* of the amount collected for missions, and that he remit monthly to the Treasurer of this Board the amount in hand for Foreign Missions.

We call special attention to the following resolutions: Resolved, That the Board of Missions will consider no request for an appropriation for a charge unless a written report from the charge is before the Board, stating the amount paid for the preacher in charge during the current year.

We request the appointment of Rev. P. F. Kilgo as Conference Secretary of Missions.

IN MEMORIAM.

Memoirs of Preachers Who Died During the Year 1904.

REV. OSGOOD A. DARBY, D. D.

Osgood Andrew Darby, D. D., was born in Charleston, S. C., Sept. 17, 1828 and died at Magnolia S. C., March 10, 1904. These dates mark the beginning and ending of the earthly life of this good man but the influences which made and the forces which he set at work during his ministry pass far beyond these simple periods of time. While heredity is not a guaranty of character, good or bad, it is a factor which cannot be ignored. Every man is what he is in no inconsiderable measure, because those through whom he has descended were what they were. The moral forces of ages past enter into every life, modified by the individual will, and overruled or guided by divine grace if that grace is sought, but potent still because God has thus ordained it; making sin the more to be dreaded because of its entail of evil upon the coming generations and righteousness the more to be sought because its blessed influences flow down the future, bearing their freight of good to thousands yet unborn.

Osgood Darby was well-born. His parents were gentle-folk and Christians. The charm of his good breeding was evident in all his bearing among men. The marks of his gentle birth were in his face: to see him was to recognize a gentleman. His home training and the associations of his early life added to these inherited qualities. He was born and brought up in Charleston, a city famous for its high ideals of gentility, and at a time when this was, possibly, even more marked than it is to-day. All these influences fell upon a nature peculiarly sensitive to them, and to the day of his death that delicate sense of honor, and thoughtful regard for others that made beautiful the life of the "old time gentleman" were as native to him as the form of his body or the color of his eyes.

The primary and high schools of his native city, Cokesbury Conference School, and the South Carolina Military Academy furnished him his technical education, but to such an observant and receptive mind as his a thousand other influences entered into his training and equipment for his work.

He was religious from his childhood. His mind was never poisoned and his life marred by that fatal heresy that declares that "a young man must sow his wild oats." He sowed none and consequently had no harvest of evil to reap in his old age. While still a boy he gave himself publicly to the service of God in old Trinity Church, Charleston, in the Sunday School of which he had been brought up. Very early the call to the ministry came to him, but like many another, he hesitated, not because he undervalued the ministry or regarded the work as undesirable, but because he feared himself unfitted for so great a calling. After long and earnest prayer, the question was at last settled by him and settled forever. He was not tortured by doubts and fears lest he was mistaken in his course, but he gave himself from that time fully to this one work.

In December, 1851, at the session of the Conference in Georgetown, he was received on trial into the traveling connection, and sent as junior preacher to Orangeburg circuit. For thirtythree years he served circuits, stations and Districts, and for nine years was President of the Columbia Female College,—in all of which he rendered faithful and efficient service. He represented his Conference in the General Conferences of 1878 and 1882. The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on him by Trinity College in 18—.

In estimating the work and worth of a minister of the gospel, the personality of the man enters as a large factor. The character of the preacher and his life as seen and judged by men give emphasis to, or subtract from, the truth which he preaches from the pulpit. No truth that Osgood Darby ever uttered as a preacher was negatived by his life as a man. He was honest in his dealings and honorable in all his intercourse with men. Gentleness and firmness were beautifully blended in him. He never stirred up strife, was ever ready to make concessions for the sake of peace where no principle was involved, but he stood like a rock against compromise of what he deemed essential. He made no boasts of high attainments in grace, but he walked humbly with God, and men took knowledge of him that he had been with Jesus. Those most intimate with him knew the deep and steady flow of his devotion to God.

Dr. Darby was never a malcontent. His life was the fruit of a sweet and contented spirit. He was never ready to charge unworthy motives to others. He was no mock-martyr suffering imaginary wrongs at the hands of conspiring men. He did not look upon the world as perfect or upon men as faultless, but he threw the cloak of charity over the faults of his fellows and judged as leniently as truth would allow the conduct of all of his brethren. He accepted work given to his hand and did it faithfully. He was never self-seeking. He was not indifferent to the honors which came to him and he valued them as expressions of esteem from his brethren, but

he never sought preferment, nor did he murmur when others were put in places he had filled. Possibly the severest test to most men is to decrease without growing sour and discontented. Who ever heard Osgood Darby complain that he was not appreciated and was being pushed from places he deserved. He grew old as gracefully and as sweetly as he had risen to place and prominence among his brethren. He went to the smaller charges to which he was assigned in his later life, with the same cheery, devoted spirit in which he had gone to the largest he had ever filled.

Dr. Darby was not a great preacher as the world calls great; he did not aspire to be. He knew his powers and did not affect those he did not possess. He sought to know the mind of the Spirit through the written word and to interpret it to men. He had a genuine experience of grace in his own heart and this spoke in all his work as a preacher. There was in what he said the ring of genuineness that could not be mistaken. But so large were his sympathies, so human and real his interest in men, so full the confidence those who knew him had in him that his life spoke more powerfully than his words.

Dr. Darby was greatly loved because he was a great lover. He loved men. One may be a philanthropist in theory and yet not love men as individuals; but it was not so with Osgood Darby. That subtle sense which almost every one possesses detected, when in his company, the presence of a friend. To be confidential with him seemed as natural as to love him. He thought well of his fellowmen because he himself was conscious of high motives. He trusted men because he was himself reliable; he believed men because he himself was truthful.

No blot mars the record of half a century of life as an itinerant Methodist preacher. His brethren everywhere are ready with a "well-done" to pronounce upon his finished labors.

His death came suddenly as it had come to his wife ten days before. For nearly forty-six years they had lived and labored together in the Master's service and their lives had become as one. After an illness of only a few hours Mrs. Darby died. His friends thought he bore up under his sorrow heroically—and he did; but only he knew the agony that separation brought. Underneath a calm exterior his strong heart bore a burden which it could not long sustain. In a moment the overburdened heart gave way and he fell beneath the sorrow he had striven bravely to bear, and the spirit of our brother passed through the darkened door of death to the land beyond and to the reward of the faithful.

REV. ANDREW JACKSON CAUTHEN.

Full of years, with a lifetime of pure walk, steadfast faith and successful labor behind him, the Reverend Andrew Jackson Cauthen passed from our midst and joined the choir that sings the song of Moses and of the Lamb on April — 1904. His is a record that none of us can hope to surpass. Converted in childhood, uniting with the Church in early youth, licensed to exhort at the age of seventeen, to preach at eighteen, received on trial into our Conference December 26, 1848, when only nineteen years old—there was never a break in his effective relation until he was superannuated in December, 1903. His service was not only longer than that of any member of the South Carolina Conference, but it ranks with the best in the stations filled and the successes achieved. He was twelve years on Districts, five on Stations, thirty on Circuits, and eight on Missions, in the army and such like unusual appointments. The number of people converted and brought into the Church under his ministry was a great multitude. Many had passed into the heavens and were ready there to welcome him when he entered the city of God, and many more are still on the way. Who can hope to equal—much less surpass—so long and so splendid a record?

He was the son of Thomas and Nancy Cauthen, and was born in Lancaster County, S. C., September 6, 1829. He died at Ninety-Six, S. C. In his young manhood he married Miss Elizabeth Beckham, who still lives and pursues the modest and loving walk which brightened the home and rejoiced the heart of the departed. Ten children were born of this union, all living but one—two of whom are honored members of this body and one the wife of another gifted member of the South Carolina Conference.

Brother Cauthen was a good preacher. His sermons were well considered, spiritual, tender—and were delivered with earnestness and the unction of the Holy One. He was a faithful pastor—and here was one secret of his acceptability and success. He visited his people, knew their needs and ministered to all with a sympathy that knit their hearts to him and to his Lord. As an officer he was gentle but firm, and the Church enjoyed peace and prosperity under his wise and careful administration.

The Conference and Church will forget none of the traits of this good man whose departure we mourn but they will remember him most as a sweet singer in Israel. With a voice of rare compass and melody and a heart of deep feeling to modulate its tones and impress its divine meaning, it was an inspiration to hear him sing the gospel. Many a stubborn spirit yielded, many a sufferer was comforted, many a weak or discouraged struggler was strengthened as Andrew Jackson Cauthen sang the goodness of God and the glory of His grace. The

shining of his face, as he so sang, will never be forgotten and the refrain of his soft, sweet tones will linger until again we see and hear him and the redeemed singing "Great and marvelous are thy works, Lord God Almighty, just and true are thy ways, thou King of Saints."

REV. THOMAS B. REYNOLDS.

Rev. Thomas B. Reynolds was a native of Georgia, but moved to Edgefield County, this State, in the year 1809, and for the support of his family engaged in the mercantile business. Though quite successful in his business efforts he determined to yield to the conviction which had for some time been weighing upon his conscience, that he should give himself wholly to the work of the ministry, and at the suggestion of his presiding elder, he offered himself to the Florida Conference, where the Church was greatly in need of laborers. After laboring for seven years with increasing success, he, on account of the failing health of his devoted wife, was transferred to the South Carolina Conference, and was appointed to the Britton's Neck Circuit, which he successfully served for two years. He was then appointed to the Conway Circuit, which he served with pronounced acceptability for three years when on account of the continued feeble condition of his wife's health, and on account of his own need of a more invigorating climate he was appointed to the Pelzer Station, and then to the Williamston Circuit, where he ended his labors and his life.

Brother Reynolds was a consecrated itinerant preacher. His sermons were always orthodox, intensely spiritual, and eminently practical.

In brother Reynolds were beautifully blended the elements of the industrious, faithful pastor and the loyal, conscientious, earnest preacher of the gospel.

The last time the writer heard him preach his subject was the special providence which God exercises over his children. The sermon was clear, convincing and pathetic.

As his presiding elder for four years the writer is prepared to say that a purer man, a more conscientious pastor and faithful preacher he has never known.

REV. SAMUEL LANDER.

The subject of this sketch was born in Lincolnton, N. C., Jan. 30, 1833. He was the son of Rev. Samuel Lander, a local preacher, and Eliza Ann Lander, both natives of Ireland. They came to America because of persecution by Romanists. Reared in a pious

house. Samuel Lander was converted and joined the Methodist Church in early youth and ever lived a clean life.

He received his education in the Academy of his native town and at Randolph-Macon College, Virginia, from which latter institution he was graduated with first honor June 10, 1852. After graduation he first engaged in civil engineering, the meanwhile studying law. In a few years, however, he began teaching. He taught first in Catawba College, N. C., and then successively in Olin, N. C., Randolph-Macon College, Virginia, Greensboro Female College and High Point Female Seminary, North Carolina. During these years of his young manhood he was wrestling with the question of a call to preach. When to his mind the call was clear he yielded with that same spirit of devotion to duty which characterized him to the day of his death. He was licensed to preach March 30th, 1861. Feeling it his duty to enter the itinerancy he was received on trial into the South Carolina Conference in November, 1864.

His appointments were 1865, Lincolnton Female Seminary; 1866-67, Lincolnton; 1868-69-70, President of Davenport Female College; 1871, Spartanburg Female College; 1872, Williamston Circuit. At this latter place, by the unmistakable hand of Providence, he was led to establish the Williamston Female College. He remained at the head of this institution until the day of his death. How well he wrought is a matter familiar to us all. In addition to his work he served the Williamston Station in 1877-78-79, and the Williamston Circuit in 1885. He represented us in the General Conference in 1890 and 1894.

He was married to Miss Laura A. McPherson, Dec. 20, 1853. No married life could be more beautiful than theirs. They were the parents of eleven children, nine of whom still live.

Dr. Lander was a Christian gentleman in all his relationships. Tenderness, Christian charity, culture—these furnished the gracious atmosphere in which he moved and the qualities that drew men to him. And these elements so obvious to all who knew him, even slightly, were not the mere superficial adornments of character, but were the very essentials of his nature and were the beautiful flowering of a deep and noble manhood. It was these qualities that peculiarly fitted him for his chosen calling, that of the teacher. He was scholarly, accurate, thorough and methodical in his training of the young. He was truly cultured, and that culture had a contagious charm. In this fact is to be found the source of his influence and power over young women. Through his methods he trained them into a thoughtful and sober-minded womanhood. But in their education the personality of the man was more vital than methods. They saw in him the simple-hearted, trustful Christian, whose daily walk was beautiful. They recognized that Christ was both the pattern and power of his life and character.

Dr. Lander, preacher, teacher and Christian gentleman, has gone to his immortal inheritance beyond the things that concerned him here. He passed away in the town of Williamston, S. C., July 14th, 1904. But he lives here as well. Over this State, and indeed over the entire South, there are women upon whom have been stamped the fineness and strength of Samuel Lander's life and ideals. And so he will continue to live in lives made beautiful and noble because of the womanhood trained under his influence.

REV. ALLSTON B. EARLE.

The life of the Reverend Allston B. Earle was very short but very beautiful. From a child he was pure minded, kind-hearted, courteous, clean-living—in a word, a gentle youth in boyhood days, and a gentleman in all his after years. Handsome in person, graceful in manner, courteous in deportment, kind in spirit, cultivated in head and heart—true as steel to his fellows and to duty—he was a man to win and hold the affection and confidence of men. Saints and sinners loved him, his brethren in the ministry yielded all their hearts and trusted him to the uttermost.

He was the son of James P. and Anna E Earle, residents of Charleston, S. C., but staying in Greenville, S. C., at the time of his birth. He was born February 6, 1805. Piously reared he joined Trinity Church in childhood and he was converted at the age of fifteen years. Called in childhood to preach, he determined to prepare to preach. His education was secured at the schools of his native city and at Wofford College. He graduated June 15, 1887, married Miss Carrie V. Kirby of Spartanburg on the night of his graduation, and on the same day was appointed to Algiers Station, Louisiana. Returning at the end of the year he was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference November, 1887, and from that day until the fatal illness that ended his life on earth he labored successfully on charges of steadily increasing importance. When he finished his course on September 13th, 1904, he was serving Camden Station.

Brother Earle was a student. He made careful preparation for the pulpit, and he delivered his message earnestly and impressively. As a pastor he was diligent and sympathetic. Few men were so systematic in all the work required of an itinerant Methodist preacher. He was not a one-sided or one-ideal man. All his duties had his faithful attention and care. Naturally it follows that he built up believers and led sinners to Christ.

To us it seems that he was called away all too soon—but God knows best. Perhaps, nay not perhaps, but surely the gracious Father saw that there was enough of tribulations and trials, enough of earthly

rest and joy, and that it was time for the triumph of that city where God dwells with His people and they with Him. There, our brother is to-day—there we may meet him again. So we dare not murmur while we wait until our change shall come. By and by we shall meet and with him we shall be firm with the Lord.

Brother Earle leaves with us his devoted wife, who was a true helpmeet in his labors and the chief earthly joy of his life, and eight children who are worthy of their parentage. The son of the widow and the orphaned comfort them, supply all their needs and bring them and us finally to the land where there shall be no more death, neither sorrow nor crying—where the former things are passed away.

MRS. MARY A. GAMEWELL.

Mrs. Mary A. Gamewell, widow of the late Rev. W. A. Gamewell, was born May 26th, 1819, and died March 10th, 1904. Hers was a life by which Methodism was enriched. She was a woman of large influence. United with a beautiful, dignified, intellectual personality, was a splendidly poised character. She was thus eminently fitted for the prominent place she was called to fill as the wife of one who in his day was one of the leaders in this Conference. She lived the life of the righteous, and died the death of the righteous. Upon this motto, she formed and lived her life: "What doth the Lord require of thee, O man, but to do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with thy God;" Her end was perfect peace.

MRS. MARY MOOD.

After seventy-six years in this earthly life, more than sixty of which were spent in her Master's service, and fifty-one as the wife of an itinerant minister, Sister Mood entered into rest July 17, 1904. She died loving and trusting. Her pen, which once wrote so beautifully, is silent forever, save as her influence will live after her.

Born in a Christian home, which was a Methodist home, in the old Georgetown section, when Bishop Asbury planted seed, which our Divine Founder nourished, she was regarded as fitted for high service. That faithful itinerant, Rev. John A. Mood, sought her hand, and to him and God's service she wholly gave her heart, her cultured life, and consecrated character.

Her three children, Rev. R. A. Mood, Misses Mary and Josephine Mood, survive her.

MRS. CATHERINE SELINA HUTTO.

Mrs. Catherine Selina Hutto, widow of Rev. William Hutto, formerly Miss Bell, of Orangeburg, was born in that county, in 1832, and died at the home of Prof. Clinkscales, her son-in-law, on Wofford Campus, April, 1904. Her daughter, Mrs. Clinkscales, of Spartanburg, and Dr. Hutto, of Williamston, survive her.

It was beautiful to see her devotion to her children, and to watch the tenderness with which her last days were watched over by her devoted daughter.

She was long the subject of feebleness and affliction, but never murmured; her anchor was within the veil.

Fifty-two years ago she married Bro. Hutto, and with him now is reunited, sharing the throne that is granted to them who overcome.

MRS. MARY POWER BUCHANAN.

When, a few months ago, the *Southern Christian Advocate* announced sister Buchanan's death, the wide-spread sorrow told how lovingly, faithfully, and earnestly she had lived.

Born on July 13th, 1827, her earthly career closed in 1904, her seventy-eighth year.

She "lived the life of the consecrated child of God: ready always for every good word and work." Her life was, therefore, "an epistle known and read of all men," and as "a city upon a hill," she has ascended "to her Father and our Father, to her God and our God," for the Master has said, "where I am there shall also my servant be." The world is better by reason of her having lived in it. "God buries His workmen, but carries on their work."

MRS. RACHEL CATHERINE DARBY.

Mrs. Darby's maiden name was Gore. She first married a Mr. Withers. He having died, she, in 1858, married Rev. O. A. Darby, D. D., of this Conference, and with him shared in all the joys and sorrows of the itinerant life. Their devotion was beautiful.

She was ready for her sudden summons. Looking up, she said without a tremor, "O! Lord, forgive all of my sins, and save me for Jesus sake, Amen," then breathed her last. She entered upon her heavenly inheritance just a week before Dr. Darby's departure. "Lovely and pleasant in their lives, in their death they were not divided."

"Bright will their morn in Eternity dawn."

Death shall be conquered, its sceptre be gone."

Born May 17th, 1826, she died in June, 1904.
