Tyler Berg had 18 points and a career-high 12 rebounds for his second straight double-double in leading Wofford to a 68-64 victory over East Tennessee State tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

With ETSU heading to the Atlantic Sun Conference next season, tonight's game represented the final regular-season meeting as SoCon rivals between the Terriers and Buccaneers.

ETSU was the only league team Wofford had yet to beat since it began SoCon play in the 1997-98 campaign. The Terriers were 0-8 against the Bucs and had lost nine straight overall to ETSU since an 81-76 win in Johnson City in the 1995-96 season.

Berg recorded the fourth double-double of his career as Wofford (10-10, 3-6) won its second straight game. With seven regular-season games remaining, the Terriers have surpassed last year's win total of nine.

Wofford was ahead by six points early, 20-14, before ETSU went on an 18-6 run to take its largest lead of the game at 32-26 on a Dillion Sneed layup with 4:03 left before the intermission. Tim Smith, who had a game-high 28 points, had six points while Travis Strong hit two 3-pointers during that run. Strong finished with 13 points.

The Terriers answered with a 22-9 spurt, covering the close of the first half and start of the second half, to take a 48-41 lead on an Adrien Borders 3-pointer with 16:29 to play.

The Buccaneers (6-14, 2-8) closed within 57-55 on a Sneed layup with 5:39 left, but that would be close as they would get the remainder of the contest.

A Berg dunk off a baseline feed from Greg Taylor gave Wofford a 65-58 lead with 55 seconds to play. After a pair of free-throws from ETSU's Ben Rhoda, the Terriers' Sam Daniels threw a baseball pass downcourt to a streaking Borders for a layup to give the Terriers a 67-60 advantage with 37 seconds remaining.

A layup by Smith with three seconds left provided the final margin.

"Tyler Berg was terrific," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "Our team is playing with a great deal of confidence.

"We were really good defensively tonight (ETSU shot 39.1 percent). Adrien Borders is playing well and really helping our team lock in on some things. Our ball handling down the stretch was nice."

Borders scored 14 points to give him 974 in his career. He is 26 points shy of becoming the 36th player in Wofford history to reach 1,000 points. Borders also had a team-best six steals as the Terriers forced 21 Buccaneer turnovers.

Eric Marshall scored 10 points to give the Terriers three players in double figures.


Sneed had a career-high 19 rebounds as ETSU held a 48-34 advantage on the boards. Sneed also added nine points before fouling out with 17 seconds to play.

"We did some good things," ETSU coach Murry Bartow said. "We just weren't as efficient as we needed to be.

"Defensively, we did what you need to do to win. We had 10 steals and outrebounded them."

The Terriers host Davidson Monday at 7 p.m. while ETSU continues on the road Monday with a 7 p.m.

Subject: Davidson men's basketball takes thriller from Wofford

After trailing by 11 points with under three minutes to play, the Wofford basketball team had a chance to win on its final possession before Davidson held on for a 70-66 victory in a regionally-televised contest tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

The Wildcats (16-7, 12-0) have won 11 in a row while extending their SoCon regular-season winning streak to 20 games. Davidson snapped a three-game losing streak at Wofford, winning in the Benjamin Johnson Arena for the first time since February 1999.

Jason Morton scored 20 points for the Wildcats while Brendan Winters added 18. Winters made five 3-pointers for the second straight game. He had three treys in scoring 12 of the Wildcats' opening 15 points of the second half, enabling Davidson to break a 33-33 tie at the intermission and take a 48-36 lead with 13:56 to play.

A 3-pointer by Conor Grace gave Davidson a 66-55 lead with 2:51 to play.

An Eric Marshall 3-pointer with 2:27 remaining cut the Wofford deficit to 66-58. Tyler Berg, who posted his third consecutive double-double with 10 points and a career-high tying 12 rebounds, then grabbed an offensive board and scored on the putback to make it a 66-60 game with 1:25 left.

Following a pair of Kenny Grant free-throws, a 3-pointer by Adrien Borders trimmed the Terrier deficit to 68-63 at the 1:04 mark. The Terriers then forced a turnover in the backcourt which led to another Marshall trey, making it a 68-66 Davidson lead with 46 seconds remaining.

Berg then blocked a Grant jumper and grabbed the board to equal his career-high in rebounds set in the Terriers' previous game, a 68-64 Saturday win over East Tennessee State.

Wofford raced the ball upcourt. Freshman Drew Gibson drove to the basket and drew contact as his shot fell short. Moron grabbed the defensive rebound and was fouled immediately. His two free-throws with less than two seconds to play provided the final margin.

"This is certainly a terrific win," Davidson coach Bob McKillop said. "Our message to the team today was that Wofford will not quit. We knew it was going to be a war and what a game it was.

"(Wofford forward) Sam Daniels makes four 3-pointers. Adrien Borders is a world-class athlete. They're a dangerous team, especially if you add (injured All-SoCon forward) Howard Wilkerson."

Borders' 18 points gave him 992 in his career, moving him within eight points of becoming the 36th player in Wofford history to reach 1,000 career points.

Davidson was outrebounded for just the second time in its last 23 SoCon games. The Terriers held a 36-35 edge on the boards. The Wildcats shot 49.0 percent for the game with Wofford at 39.1. Davidson hit 13-of-24 3-pointers (54.2 percent).

"We did everything right in the closing minutes to give ourselves a chance to win," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "Adrien Borders showed great leadership on both ends of the floor.


"I thought we did a nice job on the glass. Credit Davidson. They did a few more things than us to get the win."

Grace had a season-high 11 rebounds to go with nine points for Davidson. Grant had 10 points and nine assists.

Marshall scored 14 points for Wofford while Daniels added 12 off his four 3-pointers.

The Terriers forced 15 Davidson turnovers while committing just nine, but lost their seventh game by five points or less.

Both Wofford and Davidson return to action Saturday with regionally-televised contests. The Terriers are at Furman in a 4 p.m. CSS contest, while the Wildcats host Georgia Southern at 2 p.m. on FSN South.

Adrien Borders became the 36th player in Wofford history to reach 1,000 career points in the Terriers' 75-58 loss to Furman this afternoon in Greenville, S.C.

Borders reached the milestone when he hit a free-throw to convert a 3-point play with 3:31 remaining in the game. It gave him eight points in the contest and exactly 1,000 in his career.

Furman, the SoCon's top 3-point shooting team, hit 11-of-21 attempts behind the arc while shooting 50.9 percent overall.

The Terriers (10-12, 3-8) opened the game with a 13-6 lead following five consecutive points by Drew Gibson.

The Paladins (14-9, 7-4) closed the first half with a 20-3 run, keyed by back-to-back 3-pointers by Ben Earle and a trey from Eric Webb, to take a 39-29 advantage into the locker room at the intermission.

The SoCon leader in turnover margin and assist/turnover ratio, Wofford had 11 turnovers to just four assists in the opening 20 minutes. The Terriers had five turnovers in the second half to finish with 16 in the game.

A Tony Carter 3-pointer gave Furman a 54-38 lead with 13:53 to play. Wofford could not get closer than 11 points the remainder of the contest.

"We had bad movement on the offensive end," Terrier coach Mike Young said. "We didn't get Tyler Berg involved.


"Furman gets a lot of the credit. Some of our problems were because of them, but we caused a lot of our own problems. We didn't play well. This effort was not good enough."

Sam Daniels topped Wofford with 11 points while Berg and Gibson each added 10 points. Berg had four rebounds as his streak of three consecutive double-doubles came to an end.

Jeff Tarr, playing with a jaw that's wired shut, grabbed a team-best six rebounds in 17 minutes off the bench.

Earle and Webb both hit four 3-pointers to top Furman with 14 points apiece.

Wofford continues on the road Monday with an 8 p.m. game at Elon. The Terriers and Paladins meet again next Saturday in the makeup of a Jan. 29 game that was postponed due to a winter storm. Tip-off is 7 p.m. in the Benjamin Johnson Arena.

pointer. Taylor then recorded his third steal of the game and drove in for a layup to give Wofford a 70-65 advantage with 1:09 remaining in regulation.

A pair of Draper free-throws cut the Wofford edge to 70-67.

After the Terriers missed a pair of free-throws with 32 seconds left, Berg grabbed the offensive rebound and sank a free-throw to build the Wofford lead back to 71-67.

Following a missed 3-pointer by Draper, Drew Gibson grabbed the defensive rebound and made a free-throw to extend the Terrier margin to 72-67 with 22 seconds to play.

"We had a lot of players have some really good performances," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "Tyler Berg was terrific.

"We knew we could win this game, and we did enough things to get us over the top. Eric Marshall was great and did an outstanding job on the boards."

Draper had 20 points for the Cougars while Jeff Horowitz posted a double-double off the bench with 15 points and 10 rebounds. Stanley Jackson totaled 13 points, seven rebounds, six assists and three steals.

"Our effort was there," College of Charleston coach Tom Herrion said. "Unfortunately, we were not able to get the win.


"Credit Wofford. They made their shots when they had to. We had our opportunities but weren't able to make our shots when needed. Jeff Horowitz was outstanding."

The Cougars shot 41.2 percent for the game but were just 6-of-23 (26.1 percent) from 3-point range, including 2-of-12 in the second half and overtime combined.

The game was tied 36-36 at the half.

Wofford improves to 8-0 when shooting at least 50.0 percent from the field and 8-1 when outrebounding its opponent.

The Terriers host Furman Saturday at 7 p.m. in the make-up of the Jan. 29 weather postponement. The Cougars are also home Saturday, taking on Virginia Commonwealth at 6 p.m. as part of Bracket Busters.

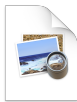

Eric Marshall scored a season-high 25 points, 23 in the second half, as Wofford rallied from a seven-point deficit in the final 5:42 for a 77-70 victory over Furman tonight in Spartanburg, S.C.

The teams were meeting for the second consecutive Saturday. Tonight was the make-up of a Jan. 29 weather postponement.

In winning their third straight game and fifth in the last seven, the Terriers (13-12, 6-8) moved over .500 for the first time this late in the season in their 10 years on the Division I level. Wofford began Division I play in the 1995-96 campaign.

The Terriers shot a season-high 60.0 percent (27-of-45) from the field, the third straight game they have shot at least 53.6 percent. Wofford is 9-0 this season when shooting a minimum of 50.0 percent.

It was the second straight season-high performance for Marshall, who scored 21 points in Thursday's 87-83 overtime win versus College of Charleston.

Wofford 6-foot-2 point guard Byron Fields recorded all four blocked shots in the game, including a pair in the final 18 seconds to preserve the Terrier victory. Fields added a season-high six rebounds to go with five points, five assists and just one turnover.

The Paladins (15-11, 8-6) took their largest lead of the game at 61-54 on a jumper in the paint by Moussa Diagne with 5:42 to play. Wofford then outscored Furman 23-9 the remainder of the contest.

Diagne topped the Paladins with a career-high 24 points. He also tied Nicholas Sanders for team-best rebounding honors with seven. Sanders scored 11 points while Eric Webb added 10.

A Tyler Berg 3-point play off a layup and free-throw gave Wofford the lead for good at 68-65 with 1:43 remaining. The Terriers extended their advantage to 70-65 on a driving layup by Marshall just before the shot clock expired with 37 seconds left in the contest.

Diagne's jumper with 26 seconds to play pulled Furman within 70-67.

Berg, who was 4-of-4 at the line in the final 25 seconds, hit a pair of free-throws to extend the Terrier lead to 72-67 with 25 seconds remaining. Fields then blocked a layup attempt by Robby Bostain. After a pair of Berg free-throws made it a 74-67 game, Fields blocked a Bostain 3-point attempt.

"We've been in a lot of close games and we have a lot of confidence right now," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "We feel great about one another and great about our team.

"Eric Marshall is a special guy. He's got something in him offensively and we've seen that the last two games. Byron Fields takes a lot of pride in his defense. He made some big-time plays down the stretch.

"The early non-conference schedule is for moments like these tonight. We were composed when we were down seven. It was a great atmosphere (the Terriers had a season-high crowd of 3,011) and we'll need that again Monday for Senior Night."

The Paladins shot 51.9 percent in defeat. Furman, the SoCon leader in both 3-pointers per game (9.3) and percentage (40.7), was just six-of-18 (33.3 percent) behind the arc. The Paladins did hold a 23-22 rebounding edge.

"They (the Terriers) shot a tremendous percentage," Furman coach Larry Davis said. "Give them credit.

"We didn't do what we needed to do from a defensive standpoint down the stretch. We had our chances the last five minutes but just didn't get it done."

Berg had 18 points, one shy of a season-high, for the second straight game. He also added a team-best seven rebounds. Adrien Borders scored 14 points. He had eight consecutive points and 10 in an 11-6 Wofford spurt to close the first half as the Terriers led 35-32 at the intermission.

Marshall had the Terriers' first 15 points in the second half, which represented all of Wofford's points until a running jumper by Drew Gibson with 9:40 remaining.

The Terriers led 48-41 before Furman countered with a 20-6 run, keyed by seven points from Bostain, over a 9:36 period to take their largest lead of the contest at 61-54 on Diagne's jumper.


Jeff Tarr, playing with a fractured jaw that's wired shut, had eight first-half points off the bench for Wofford.

The Terriers close their home season Monday with a 7 p.m. contest versus Georgia Southern. The Paladins host College of Charleston Wednesday at 7 p.m.

Wofford center Tyler Berg has been named the SoCon Men's Basketball Player of the Week.

A junior from Mt. Holly, N.C., Berg averaged 19.3 points and 11.0 rebounds, including two double-doubles, in wins over College of Charleston, Furman and Georgia Southern. He shot 64.5 percent (20-of-31) from the field and 81.8 (18-of-22) at the free-throw line.

Berg scored a season-high 22 points while grabbing a career-best 14 rebounds in last night's 81-79 overtime win over Georgia Southern. He tallied six points in the extra period. The 22 points were one shy of a career-best 23 he scored as a freshman in a victory over Georgia Southern.

In Saturday's 77-70 win versus Furman, Berg's 3-point play with 1:43 remaining broke a tie game and gave Wofford the lead for good. He was also four-of-four at the line in the final 25 seconds to preserve the victory.

Berg totaled 18 points and 12 rebounds in Thursday's 87-83 overtime decision over College of Charleston. He secured the win with a pair of free-throws with seven seconds left.

It's the third SoCon Player of the Week award for Wofford this season. Injured All-SoCon forward Howard Wilkerson was a back-to-back recipient in December.

Wofford has won four in a row and six of its last eight. The Terriers (14-12, 7-8) are assured of their first .500 or better season in 10 years on the Division I level.

Wofford closes the regular season Saturday with a 7 p.m. contest at Davidson.



Wofford All-SoCon forward Howard Wilkerson and Terrier assistant coach Matt Allen are among the 10 players on the Men's All-Benjamin Johnson Arena Team, honoring the 25th anniversary season of Wofford's home basketball facility.

Those eligible for the team have played for Wofford since the Benjamin Johnson Arena opened in January 1981. Voting was conducted by fans at each home game as well as via the Internet and fax.

Former Terrier great Greg O'Dell (1987-92) received the most votes. An Academic All-America selection, O'Dell is the Terriers' third-leading career scorer with 2,208 points.

Wilkerson was a 2003-04 All-SoCon selection and a two-time SoCon Player of the Week this year before being sidelined for the season with a knee injury (Jan. 17).

Allen is in his first season as a Wofford assistant coach. He earned team Most Valuable Player honors as a senior when he led the Terriers to the 1994 NCAA Division II Tournament. He scored 1,057 points in his career (1990-94).

Brothers Ian Chadwick (1997-01) and Seth Chadwick (1993-97) were named to the team. Both were four-year starters as Ian followed Seth to Wofford. The Terriers had a Chadwick in the starting lineup for eight consecutive seasons.

After being the 1997-98 SoCon Freshman of the Year, Ian Chadwick became a three-time All-SoCon selection. He was runner-up for SoCon Player of the Year honors as a senior. He remains the SoCon's career 3-point leader with 299.

Seth Chadwick started at point guard as a freshman on Wofford's 1994 postseason team. He then moved to shooting guard his final three seasons. He hit a single-game school record 11 3-pointers in a 97-72 win over Mercer (Feb. 15, 1997).

Ian (1,789 points) and Seth (1,292 points) rank sixth and 19th, respectively, on Wofford's career scoring chart.

Wayne Rice (1983-87) and Antoine Saunders (1983-87) represent the mid-1980s era.

In addition to scoring 1,593 points to rank eighth, Rice holds Terrier records for season (107) and career (289) steals.

Saunders holds Wofford assist marks for single game (15), season (210) and career (582).

James Blair (1979-83) and Mike Howard (1979-81) were teammates during the early days of the Benjamin Johnson Arena.

Blair ranks second on Wofford's all-time scoring list with 2,269 points. Howard is the last

Terrier drafted by an NBA team. He was a 1981 selection of the Washington Bullets. In just two seasons as a Terrier, Howard is 25th on the points chart (1,164).

Three-time All-SoCon point guard Mike Lenzly (1999-03) rounds out the squad.

Lenzly is Wofford's 17th-leading scorer (1,333 points) while also being the only player in school history to record a triple-double. He totaled 21 points, 12 assists and 10 rebounds in a 105-69 win over Chattanooga (Feb. 13, 2001) his sophomore year.

Ian Johnson scored 17 points off the bench as Davidson capped an undefeated SoCon season with a 61-45 victory over Wofford tonight in Davidson, N.C.

The SoCon South Division champion Wildcats (20-7, 16-0) won their 15th straight contest while snapping the Terriers' four-game winning streak.

Wofford (14-13, 7-9), the No. 5-seed in the South, begins SoCon Tournament play Wednesday at noon versus Elon. The winner of that game faces Davidson Thursday at noon in the SoCon Tournament quarterfinals.

The Terriers led 26-25 at the intermission and took a 27-25 lead when Tyler Berg opened the second half with a free-throw. Davidson then went on a 9-0 run for a 34-27 advantage on a Logan Kosmalski layup with 17:17 to play.

The Wildcats built their margin to 10 points before a dunk by Byron Fields pulled Wofford with 42-37 with 8:16 left. That would be as close as the Terriers would get as the Wildcats scored the next seven points to pull away.

"We battled our tails off," Wofford coach Mike Young said. "We did some things good enough to win but just came up short.

"We never got a series of shots to go down in the second half (Wofford hit just 34.8 percent of its field-goal attempts over the final 20 minutes). We also got a little careless with the ball."


Tyler Berg, the reigning SoCon Player of the Week, was the lone Terrier in double figures with 11 points and a team-high eight rebounds. He played just eight minutes in the first half as he picked up his second foul with 8:18 to play and sat out the remainder of the half.

After falling behind by five points early, Wofford used a 14-4 run to take its largest lead of the first half at 16-11 on a Fields layup with 8:44 left.

Davidson countered with its own 14-4 spurt for a 25-20 advantage. Wofford then scored the next six points to lead 26-25 at the intermission when Greg Taylor scored on a layup just before the first-half buzzer. Taylor and Adrien Borders both had six points to lead Wofford in the opening 20 minutes.

Wofford shot 35.8 percent for the game compared to 38.6 for Davidson. The Wildcats held a 40-30 rebounding edge.

The Terriers led by one at the half despite hitting just 36.7 percent (11-of-30) of their shots.
