Report No. 1 of the Board of Education was submitted by W. D. Gleaton. Only that part of the report authorizing the trustees of Wofford College to borrow \$85,000 was read to the Conference. The report in its entirety was adopted. (See report.)

Superannuate Endowment.—Dr. B. R. Turnipseed, of the Upper South Carolina Conference, was introduced and addressed the Conference in behalf of the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

Leave of Absence.—Paul T. Wood and Charlton DuRant were granted leave of absence.

Question 17, What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected deacons? was called and Glenn Edward Parrott having stood an approved examination on the prescribed course of study, upon examination and passage of character, was elected deacon.

Walter Vance Jerman, already a deacon, having stood an approved examination on the prescribed course of study, upon examination and passage of character, was advanced to the class of the third year.

Question 1, Who are admitted on trial? was called, and Robert James Allen and Peter Stokes, Jr., having stood an approved examination on the prescribed course of study, and being recommended by the Committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial.

Introductions.—Rev. J. H. Lanning, of the North Carolina Conference, and Dr. Carl Miller, of the local Presbyterian church, were introduced.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY—EVENING SESSION

of these historic institutions by making it possible for them to render an even more efficient service; therefore be it

Resolved, That the South Carolina and Upper South Carolina Conference appoint a joint commission consisting of four members from each Conference—two preachers and two laymen—who shall be nominated by the new Board of Christian Education, these nominees being in no way connected with either institution; who shall make a most careful and minute study of the situation with reference to the education of our girls with a view to determining whether or not any plan might be worked out which would improve the already splendid and efficient service being rendered by these two institutions; and that said commission bring in a report with any recommendations they may care to make at the next session of the Conferences.

Resolved Second, That this resolution shall be effective only when the Upper South Carolina Conference shall have adopted one of similar nature.

G. F. Kirby offered the following resolution which was adopted:

The Associated Press in its dispatches in the newspapers of South Carolina of November 16th under rather conspicuous headlines carried the following reference to a part of the proceeding of the South Carolina Annual Conference in session at Mullins, S. C.:

"Rev. M. G. West, who has held a pastorate at Kershaw for the last year, was 'located', or turned out of the Conference. Officials would make no explanation other than that the minister was located."

The foregoing is wholly misleading, and is calculated to do real damage to Brother West; and is a reflection upon both the honesty and intelligence of the South Carolina Conference.

The facts in the case are as follows:

1. Brother West was not pastor at Kershaw, but rather of the West Kershaw charge, in that part of Kershaw county west of Camden.

2. It was distinctly stated on the Conference floor that not a breath of suspicion could be brought against the Christian character of Rev. M. G. West. In fact his character already had been officially passed.

3. The location of Brother West was wholly on the ground of his apparent unsuitability for the work of an itinerant Methodist pastor, and this was so stated on the floor of the Conference by his Presiding Elder.

4. Brother West remains a local preacher in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, without a stain upon his Christian character, and is still privileged to exercise all the functions belonging to his order as a Local Deacon; the only difference between his former and present relation in the ministry is that now he is not a member of the South

Carolina Annual Conference as an itinerant preacher, and therefore not subject to its appointing power.

In the light of the foregoing, be it

Resolved: That we the members of the South Carolina Conference urgently request the Associated Press and the newspapers who published the dispatches to undo as far as possible the damage already done to Rev. M. G. West, by giving equal first page prominence to this whole explanation and resolution as was given to the erroneous news item referred to in the foregoing.

STANDING RULES OF THE CONFERENCE

A—District Conference Representatives—

The lay representation of the District Conference shall consist of three delegates from each charge, and the District Trustees shall be ex-officio members.

B—Presiding Elders—A Standing Committee on Nominations—

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be hereby constituted a standing committee to nominate the usual and regular committees of the Conference.

Resolved, That they be requested to meet on the day preceding each annual session of the Conference, in order to prepare nominations of such committees, and that they make their report at the beginning of the work of the first day.

C—Providing for Sacrament at Opening of Conference—

Resolved, That the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall be celebrated at the opening of our annual sessions.

Resolved, That pastors in charge where our Conference shall meet be requested to make provision for the Communion service hereby ordered.

D—Relative to Assessments—

Resolved, That the Commission on Finance be directed to make the distribution of the assessments to the several districts upon the basis of all salaries assessed the preceding year for preachers in charge, and that the Boards of District Stewards be requested to make the distribution to charges upon the same basis.

Resolved, That all moneys collected on the various Conference assessments be paid to the Conference Treasurer, and that the said Treasurer pay to each fund the amount due the said fund.

Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of our Conference funds until Conference meets each year, but that on call he may pay out such funds as he may have in hand for any board.

Resolved, That since most of the boards do not call for their funds until Conference, the Conference Treasurer may advance to the Board of Missions sufficient amount to meet payments due on appropriations to Conference Missions at the end of each quarter, the final pro rata required by our law to be made at the end of the Conference year, provided the same privilege be granted the other boards for their special needs.

Resolved, That the time-honored custom of raising at least one-half of our Connectional and Conference collections in the spring of each year shall be continued.

Resolved, That a statement of collections be enclosed with the remittance to the Treasurer at Conference, and that the Secretary of the Conference be instructed to prepare and send out suitable blanks for such, along with blanks for statistical reports.

Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer be required to give bond for ten thousand dollars as security for the faithful performance of his duties.

Resolved, That the Commission on Finance shall appoint at each annual Conference a committee of three of its members to audit the books of the Treasurer.

E—Checks to be Sent Directly to Claimants—

Resolved, That the Board of Finance be instructed to mail the checks for claimants directly to the said claimants.

F—Laymen to Take Charge of Finances—

Resolved, That our laymen be urged to take entire charge of all Church finances.

G—Appropriation by Board of Missions—

Resolved, That the Board of Missions render to this Conference a full and itemized report of all appropriations of the domestic missionary funds, and the settlement of the same, and that these reports be published in full in the Minutes.

H—Reports from Mission Charges—

Resolved, That blanks with questions covering the information needed by the Board of Missions be prepared and sent out by the Board, and that each preacher serving a charge receiving aid from this Board be required to fill out said blank and present same to this Board.

Resolved, That no charge can or will be considered for continued appropriation unless the data called for above be rendered to this Board, and that the Board withhold final settlement until satisfactory explanation be made of any failure to render the report required.

Resolved, That the preachers in charge of the missions, and their Presiding Elders, be requested to supplement the written report with such oral statement before the Board as they may deem necessary.

I—Privilege of the Floor Extended Members of Boards—

Resolved, That the lay members of the various Boards of this Conference shall have ex-officio the privilege of speaking on all questions concerning the business of their respective boards, open to debate before the Conference.

J—Reports From Trustees—

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of each educational institution under our patronage be required to report upon the institution, annually, to the Board of Education of this Conference.

K—Failure of Undergraduates on Examinations—

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Conference that the official character of an undergraduate who has failed to pass the required examination shall not be passed by the South Carolina Conference until the Com-

mittee of Examination shall have investigated the reasons for failure and recommended his continuance in the class.

L—Sermon to Undergraduates—

Resolved, That on the opening afternoon of our Conference sessions, a sermon before the undergraduates of the body be preached, and that the Board of Education shall regularly nominate the preacher to deliver the same.

M—Memoirs—

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be requested to appoint persons to write memoirs of preachers dying during the year in the interim of Conference.

N—Printed Minutes Official—

Resolved, That the printed Minutes, bound every four years, with autographed signatures of the Bishops presiding and of the Secretary of the Sessions, be the official record of the South Carolina Conference, to be presented to the General Conference for examination.

Resolved, That the Secretary transcribe the journal and such other facts as may be necessary to comply with the regulations of the General Conference in a suitable book of record.

O—Unified College Agency—

Resolved, That the plan of unified college agency for the financial interests of our colleges, adopted by the Conference of 1912, and recorded in the Minutes for that year, page 31, be affirmed, with the exception that the Commission of Education be composed of the Presidents of Wofford, Columbia and Lander Colleges, respectively, and one member each from the two Conference Boards of Education, the representatives of these boards to be chosen by their respective boards.

P—Ministerial Loan Fund—

Resolved, That an annual assessment of \$1,500 be made to establish and maintain a "Ministerial Loan Fund," and that of the amount realized 20 per cent. be given the General Board of Education for connectional purposes, and the remaining 80 per cent. to be used only on recommendation of our Conference Ministerial Aid Committee to aid students for the ministry, and young men and young women in preparation for missionary work, in our own institutions, said fund of 80 per cent. of annual proceeds to be the property of the South Carolina Conference, and to be administered by said Conference as above prescribed.

Q—Epworth Orphanage Sunday—

Resolved, That our Sunday Schools, as far as may be practicable, set apart one Sunday in each month as "Epworth Orphanage Sunday," the

Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer be required to give bond for ten thousand dollars as security for the faithful performance of his duties.

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Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be requested to appoint persons to write memoirs of preachers dying during the year in the interim of Conference.

N—Printed Minutes Official—

Resolved, That the printed Minutes, bound every four years, with autographed signatures of the Bishops presiding and of the Secretary of the Sessions, be the official record of the South Carolina Conference, to be presented to the General Conference for examination.

Resolved, That the Secretary transcribe the journal and such other facts as may be necessary to comply with the regulations of the General Conference in a suitable book of record.

O—Unified College Agency—

R—Epworth League Anniversary—

Resolved, That the Epworth League Anniversary be held during our Conference sessions along with the other important interests of our Church.

S—Report from Southern Christian Advocate—

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the Southern Christian Advocate be required to report upon that publication annually to the Board of Christian Literature of this Conference.

T—Anniversaries of Boards—

Resolved, That the Chairmen of the Conference Boards shall constitute a standing committee on Anniversaries of Boards, and that the several nights of the Conference shall be allotted in order to the respective Boards.

U—Emergency Fund—

Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer be requested to retain out of the proceeds from the assessment for Minutes each year a sum sufficient to maintain an Emergency fund of at least \$200.00 to pay for trials and other emergency expense, said funds to be paid out on the order of the Conference or by a majority of the presiding elders in the interim of Conference.

V—Rules of Order—

Resolved, That the South Carolina Annual Conference adopt as the rules governing its procedure the Rules of Order used by the General Conference so far as applicable. (1925.)

W—Group Insurance—

Resolved, That our Conference Board of Finance be authorized to contract each year with some approved insurance firm to provide Group Insurance for an amount not exceeding \$2,000.00 for each clerical member of this Conference including those on trial and supplies (while in service), and said Board shall request from the Budget Commission an assessment sufficient to meet the premium each year. (1925.)

X—Board of Managers, Pastors' School—

Resolved, That the Conference, in creating a Board of Managers for the Pastors' School, provide for the change quadrennially of not more than two of its members. (1926.)

Your Board has sought during the present session of the Conference to survey its field and work out, as fully as possible, a comprehensive program for the future. We face our task with a deep sense of its magnitude and of our responsibility. We are determined not to lose the values of programs promoted by the three former boards, but to build upon these in the full assurance that our educational needs will be met more fully.

We desire to emphasize especially our attitude and purpose respecting young people's work. Communications have been received from the Epworth League Board and from leaders among the young people. These communications, and the fine spirit behind them, have been appreciated. The Board desires to go on record as committing itself and its employed staff to a continuance and expansion in every possible way of the splendid programs carried on in the past. We are determined, as soon as practicable, to provide for an employed director of young people's work. While present financial conditions make that impossible, the officers of the Board will devote much of their time to young people's work, counseling with the Epworth League leaders in the preparation and execution of the enlarged and unified program.

planning to carry forward, in every possible way, the effective program which has been developed through the past several years.

We wish to express our appreciation of the faithful and effective work done by the former boards under the leadership of Rev. A. D. Betts, Conference Superintendent of Sunday School work; Rev. J. G. Ferguson, Epworth League Secretary; Rev. George K. Way, Extension Secretary; and Miss Mary Lemmon, Elementary Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The kind of literature one reads has a very potent effect upon character and conduct. The Methodist Church has not only been a consistent advocate of good literature, but has encouraged and assisted in its production and distribution since the days of John Wesley. The early Methodist preachers were not content "to spread Scriptural holiness over these lands" by the preached word alone, but recognized a staunch ally in the printing press, and Bible, Hymn books, books on devotion, Christian fiction and Christian biography, tracts, periodicals and magazines were ardently distributed among our people by our preachers.

The moral reforms accomplished during the past century owe a great debt to the printing press, and proved many times that "The pen is mightier than the sword." Who will ever measure the effect upon slavery of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," and the effect upon the liquor and brewery business of "Ten Nights in a Bar-room," or the power for civic righteousness of a press that speaks out clear and strong.

These agencies can also be used to tear down and destroy. This country is witnessing today the power of the printed page to befog, undermine and destroy the confidence of the American people in the achievements of the Prohibition cause. These antagonists know that what a people read constantly, however untrue it may be, many of these will eventually believe. Consequently, they are making every effort to exploit the reading public. The same holds true with regard to the enemies of the home in their advocacy of the disregard of the sanctity of the marriage vow. The counters of many of our drug stores and newsstands are burdened with the most vicious kinds of books and magazines, the reading of which on the part of our people will tend to undermine their sense of decency and morality. Many of these publications are of such a nature they cannot be shipped through the mails but must be distributed by freight or express. We call upon our people to wage a relentless warfare upon these sources of mental infection and corruption and to turn more loyally to the reading and distributing of our splendid publications. Our Publishing House which this year is observing its 75th anniversary, now ranks among the leading publishers of religious and devotional books not only in our country, but in the world. They carry a fine line of Cokesbury publications, a display of which can be seen in the Book Room. They have arranged a circulating library for the convenience of our preachers, and we trust they will avail themselves of its privileges.

We wish to call special attention to our Christian Advocate, the Layman, Missionary Voice and our own Southern Christian Advocate. We heartily approve of the plans made by the Board of Managers for securing a wider circulation of this splendid paper and earnestly call upon our people to do their best to reach the goal of fifteen thousand subscribers this year. Never was there a more imperative need for this wider circulation, and never was our Southern Christian Advocate more worthy of such. We heartily approve the request of the Board of Managers for an appropriation of \$4,000. We congratulate Dr. E. O. Watson on the fine paper he is giving us and request his reappointment as Editor.

REPORT NO. 1 OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

Your Board presents the following summary of the reports of our institutions of learning:

Wofford College.—Number of students enrolled this year, 342; number of students enrolled in summer school, 230; number of special and graduate students, 41; number of professors and instructors, 25; value of grounds, buildings and equipment, \$742,075.07; amount of insurance carried, \$350,500; income for the year, \$134,830.41; loan fund, \$86,814.84; amount of endowment, \$701,299.65. There is a decrease in income this year of \$24,250.01. Andrews Field House valued at \$40,000 is still carried by the college. There is a total indebtedness of \$81,635.17. Approval is asked for consolidating all indebtedness in one long time loan at a low rate of interest. Trustees and faculty work together to maintain high religious and intellectual standards. The moral and religious condition of the campus is reasonably good. Number of ministerial students is 47.

Columbia College.—Number of students enrolled this year, 347; number of professors and instructors, 25; total income, \$114,532.54; value of grounds, buildings and equipment, \$563,800.54; indebtedness, \$126,000; endowment, \$261,684.28, which is an increase of \$39,965.44 over last year. Number of volunteers for Christian service, 19. There is a fine intellectual and spiritual atmosphere.

Lander College.—Number of students this year, 322; number of professors and instructors, 26; value of grounds, buildings and equipment, \$379,517.99; amount of insurance, \$208,400; gross income, \$117,232.54; amount of indebtedness, \$95,119.21, a decrease of \$22,540.40 since last June; loan fund, \$8,621.02; endowment of \$530,186.52 which is made up as follows: Cash invested \$145,186.52, unpaid subscriptions \$110,000, assessment from the Conferences \$200,000, wills and legacies \$75,000. The religious atmosphere of the college is good.

Carlisle School.—Number of students enrolled, 63; number of professors and instructors, 6; gross income, \$36,314.86; amount of indebtedness, \$51,672.18; no loan fund; no endowment. The morale and religious tone of the student body is excellent.

Whereas the immediate needs and the requirements for the development of Wofford College are such as to demand additional funds, Therefore be it resolved by the South Carolina Conference:

That the Trustees of Wofford College are authorized to take all

necessary legal steps to perfect a loan to the amount of \$85,000, and to mortgage the property of the College to secure the same.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

In accordance with legislation at the recent session of the General Conference, it becomes our duty to make the final report of the South Carolina Conference Epworth League Board and turn its affairs over to the new Board of Christian Education. While this brings to us a twinge of sadness, yet we rejoice that such a large place is given to the work of our young people in the new Board, and that our Epworth Leaguers are to have an important part in that work.

The work of the Epworth Leagues has made splendid progress during the last decade and we commend to the Board of Christian Education the loyalty and devotion of the thousands of Epworth Leaguers who

are willing to give the best of themselves to the cause of Christ and His Church. In our association with them we have found that eagerness for service, devotion to duty and sacrificial spirit that have characterized movements for moral and spiritual uplift. We crave for them the opportunity to prove themselves in this new relationship. We deem it a privilege indeed to have had the responsibility of sponsoring so great a cause.

It has been the policy of our Epworth Leaguers to get their leaders from among their own numbers, and this has worked well. We believe that it is in accord with the purposes of those who gave us the Epworth League; and the results have proven its worth. Many of those who have been thus trained are entering fields of usefulness to the Church, both as laymen, missionaries and preachers. To all of this we have given our encouragement and support. We feel that the seed have fallen in good ground and that a worthwhile harvest will come to our beloved Church.

We believe that there was no group in our Church more interested in the proposed legislation merging the three Boards or more ready to put themselves where their efforts would count for the most for the advancement of God's Kingdom. This was demonstrated at the Epworth League Assembly held at Columbia College in June. When the purpose and work of the new Board was explained to them they immediately pledged their cooperation and loyalty to the Board of Christian Education. They are asking for a leader in the field, not for themselves alone, but for the whole field of young people, and pledging their means to make it possible. They are doing this so that their own efforts may count for the most in saving all of our young people to Christ and His Church. We feel that the Church could make no finer investment than that of granting the request of our Epworth Leaguers for a Young People's worker.

Notwithstanding the general financial depression, there was a larger attendance at the Conference Epworth League Assembly than there was last year. All of the districts and most of the Leagues had representative young people there and we believe it the best ever held.

Under the leadership of Henry Bennett, Jr., as president, and R. Bryce Herbert, as dean, the work of the conference is in a healthy condition. The Epworth League Board is grateful to Columbia College, not only for the use of her splendid plant for the holding of our Assembly, but for her interest in the Christian Education of our young women manifested by offering a scholarship to one of our Epworth Leaguers each year. Miss Estelle Dawsey of Aynor and Miss Frances McCullum of Broad Street, Sumter, are the holders of the two scholarships now in effect. Plans for the 1931 Assembly have already been made and our pastors can render no better service to the church than by seeing that the potential leaders of our young people have a chance to attend that Assembly.

For the three years that Dr. Dovel was in our mission field in Africa, he was supported by the South Carolina Epworth League Conference. They are still contributing liberally to missions and are looking for another worthy special to support. The Assembly was especially fortun-

ate in having as a visitor and speaker Mrs. Ethel Shuler Smith who is now a missionary in the Belgian Congo. Rev. E. O. Harbin represented the Central Office and he won the hearts of our Leaguers with his splendid leadership.

Three years ago Rev. J. G. Ferguson was employed by the Board as full time field worker; and to this task he has given himself unsparingly. He has won his way to the hearts of our young people and rendered a fine service. One regret of the Board is that it could not furnish him a well equipped office from which to do his work. Under his splendid leadership the work has gone forward. While there has been no phenomenal increase in the work it has been put on a firmer basis and the local chapters know better how to do their work. As he goes back into the pastorate, our best wishes go with him. While his work must be confined principally to his charge the conference will expect him to share the benefit of his experience in the Young People's work with the whole conference.

To our young people we wish to express our appreciation for the responses they have made to the call of the church, and the interest they have shown in things spiritual. We reaffirm our faith in our young people and their desire to do right. The Epworth League has formed a nucleus for leadership that has meant much to the church. As we lay down our task, we turn into your hands, who are members of the Board of Christian Education, the loyalty, devotion and high purpose of those who have taken for their motto, "All for Christ."

We have turned over to the Board of Christian Education our assets and our liabilities along with our records and a list of the volunteer workers. We also authorize our treasurer to turn over to the Executive Committee of the Board of Christian Education all funds on hand and receivable.

EPWORTH ORPHANAGE REPORT

To the Board of Managers of Epworth Orphanage.

Dear Brethren: I herewith submit my report as Superintendent of Epworth Orphanage for the Conference year 1929-30.

The work of the different departments at Epworth Orphanage has moved along in a very satisfactory manner despite the fact that we have had a very difficult year from a financial standpoint. We comment very briefly on the various phases of our work.

Spiritual Life. Careful attention has been given to the spiritual life of our children. The Bible is read and taught in our day school. We have a well organized departmental Sunday School. This year we had a Cokesbury Training School in which 103 credits were taken. Evening devotions are held in our church immediately after supper and a very large number of the larger children take their turn in conducting services. We have preaching every Sunday and practically every child who is old enough is a member of the church.

Health. Last year we had a better health record than during any

previous year. The year just closing has been even better. We have had fewer days of sickness than ever before.

School. Our school is doing an exceptionally high grade of work under the leadership of Mr. W. B. Carnes as principal. All of our teachers throw themselves whole-heartedly into their work and consequently are obtaining splendid reports.

Every year more of our larger boys and girls have manifested an interest in obtaining a high school education and the enrolment of our high school is greatly increased until this year we have 101. This is an increase of over 100% over the enrolment of ten years ago, while the increase in the population of the orphanage has been only 50%. Last June we graduated ten from our high school as follows: Mary Bell Cromer, Ollie Crim, Lena Dunlap, Gilbert Gross, Guy Hamlin, James Johnson, Jesse Johnson, Ethel Meacham, Frances Townsend, Cleo Wall, Claudia Wilson, and Rosine Wingate.

Print Shop. Not only does our print shop show a net profit, but our boys are being carefully trained in the art of printing.

Farm. This has been an excellent year with our farm and truck gardens. We have made a heavy crop of corn, beans, oats and hay. Our silos are full to capacity. Besides furnishing our tables with vegetables throughout the year we have canned about 2,000 gallons of tomatoes which will be more than enough to supply our wants for the winter. Our sweet potato crop was good. We have an ample supply for our family.

Dairy. Our dairy herd has produced well during the year. We have been occupying for the greater part of the year our new barn out on the farm. We have a well equipped plant in which we handle our milk in a most sanitary manner. We are making our own dairy feed, the only ingredient we purchase is cotton seed meal. We grind and mix the feed at the dairy.

Hogs. We have a splendid herd of hogs and with the ample pasturage which we have provided and the grain which we produce on the farm our meat is costing us very little.

Poultry. We have had a smaller flock of White Leghorns during this year than before, and, consequently, our egg production has not been as large. The flock is now in good condition.

Support. For the first half of the conference year the monthly contributions were very good. For the past six months there has been a considerable falling off in the amounts sent in by our Sunday schools and churches. At the same time, the number of appeals made to the orphanage to take in needy children has greatly multiplied. It is a sad fact that the self-same cause that makes the applications for children increase, likewise is responsible for the decrease in the amount of money contributed to the orphanage to help care for needy children. We issued an urgent appeal to our churches and Sunday schools for a liberal Work Day offering. The response was remarkably liberal considering the financial depression, both real and imaginary, which surrounds us. Our people are to be highly commended for responding to the needs of the orphanage and contributing \$20,000 at Work Day.

Despite this liberal response to the Work Day appeal, we find ourselves at the close of the year with a deficit of \$15,000. Of course, this deficit must be met.

In the face of the conditions which are surrounding us now we are forced to reduce our expenses by doing less for the children under our care. A committee from the Board of Managers has met with the Superintendent, and has gone carefully over every expenditure of the orphanage, and has made cuts everywhere possible. It has always been the policy of the orphanage to keep out of debt for running expenses. We must adhere to this policy by cutting our expenses to where they can be met by our income.

We are still wedded to the idea that if our Sunday schools will systematically contribute to the orphanage monthly our financial problem will be solved. We are sure that 140,000 Methodists can care for 320 children even during a period of depression such as we are facing now. We call upon our preachers, Sunday school superintendents and orphanage representatives to exert themselves in behalf of the orphan children even during a period of depression such as we are facing now.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

We understand that our Committee rightly interpret the word "Evangelism" to mean "The winning of souls," "bringing men to Christ." The Evangelistic church or preacher has other phases of work to be sure, in carrying out our Lord's Command, "Go ye . . . and preach the gospel to every creature." But all that is done must lend itself to the great purpose of bringing souls to the personal knowledge of Christ as a Saviour. These thus won must also hear the same command and from heart to heart the work must go on till "every creature" is reached.

We are hearing these days none too often that the one great prerequisite for this work the "power" one receives by "the Holy Ghost coming upon" him. Whether one is dealing with an individual or a congregation in order to succeed he must have this power. Our religion is a holy religion. Jesus himself said "tarry" till He comes. "The promise of the Father." This does not underestimate either native or acquired ability but it calls for the Spirit's power upon it all. Whatever talent one has must be saturated with the Holy Ghost; must be consecrated, sanctified.

The whole life of the Christian must be used in his efforts to be a soul winner: his conduct; what he says and how he says it. He cannot be off his guard at any time or in any way. The one thing required by the one who is approached is real confidence in the one approaching. So when one is at work or at play he must be "lead of the Spirit," he must abide in Christ.

We hear much about a good mixer. A man who is a good mixer has a splendid and extra-ordinary opportunity for winning souls. Friendliness and popularity growing out of it, open many doors of usefulness. This good mixing quality must be consecrated. If it is not it becomes a curse to the man who has it and to the people he serves. A good

woman said to a minister, her pastor, "Will you please speak to my husband. He would not hear Mr. — because of the questionable jokes he told." That was a mixer alright, but he was abusing his opportunity. A foul joke does not come out of a Holy Ghost cleansed heart. On the other hand there was a minister who was on a fishing trip. As they sailed together over the lake the preacher was able to point his fellow to Jesus who won much on the sea of Galilee and he brought him to Jesus. This was the late Dr. J. A. Clifton.

Being with, going with, associating with men—mixing with men—is one thing and leading them to Christ is another. When we go fishing we can leave our preacher clothes at home but we cannot, must not, leave our garments of righteousness.

Ones ability to attract men thus becomes at once a temptation to one man to relax in soul life and he loses his opportunity, to another it becomes a great responsibility and he uses it for the salvation of others.

If we are to have an evangelistic church we must have an evangelistic ministry, if we are to have an evangelistic ministry we must have clean men—the cross burned out by the fire of the Holy Spirit.

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Hospital Board has given careful attention to all matters before it. The report of the General Board was before us, showing gratifying progress in the hospital interest. Dr. S. H. C. Burgin spoke to us of the hospital cause and gave us valuable advice and information; of which and his address before the conference we express appreciation.

A report from the board of trustees of the McLeod Methodist Hospital states that the relation between the hospital and the board has been dissolved in accordance with the action of the Conference in November 1929. This was by mutual consent and with mutual esteem. The board did not expend the Golden Cross funds in its hands, and put the accumulated funds at the disposal of the Conference. These consisted of a bond (1,000) bearing 6% interest semi-annually, and a savings account (\$1,838.33) bearing 4% quarterly. We recommend the passage of resolutions as follows:

1. The trustees of the McLeod Methodist Hospital are dismissed from further service and tendered our thanks for the service rendered.
2. That a board of three, consisting of D. A. Phillips, J. P. Attaway, and B. Hart Moss, are authorized to take charge of the funds turned over by the trustees of the McLeod Methodist Hospital, keep them invested, collect the interest, and add to the principal, and hold it as a hospital fund until further orders from the Conference, together with any other funds which may become available for the same purpose from Golden Cross enrollment or other sources.
3. That the chairman of the Hospital Board see that the cause of Golden Cross enrollment be properly represented at the district meetings.
4. We recommend that the Hospital Board appoint an executive committee from its members to investigate possibilities of establishing a patronizing relation between some hospital and the Conference; and that it shall have power to form such a relation; provided that such relation shall be only temporary until approved by the Conference; and shall involve the Conference in no financial obligation until so ordered by the Conference.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

To the President and Members of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

Dear Brethren: Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits its annual report as follows:

General Conference Legislation

The last General Conference made some changes in the program of the work and organization of the Board of Lay Activities to which we direct your attention.

1. The scope of work is enlarged to include "Training of Church Officers," in cooperation with the Board of Christian Education.

2. The Charge and Church Lay Leaders and the Chairman of the Stewardship Committee are made members of the Quarterly Conference, being elected by the Quarterly Conference.

3. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders are members of the District Conference.

4. The District Board of Lay Activities is required to meet with the District Stewards in the interest of the Benevolences and to plan the Lay work for the year.

5. The Board of Stewards is made responsible for the work of lay activities in the charge and the local church under the direction of the pastor and lay leaders.

Stewardship

We recommend that the program of stewardship education be continued along the lines used during the past quadrennium; Stewardship revivals, sermons, lay programs on stewardship, stewardship pageants, the distribution of literature and stewardship study classes

in Pastors' Schools, Standard Training Schools, and in Organized Bible classes in the Sunday school.

Benevolences

According to the instructions of the General Conference, the Board of Lay Activities will continue its efforts to promote full payment of all Benevolences, but under the direction of the Commission on Benevolences. Success has attended our work in this regard in the past and we urge the entire lay organizations, including the Board of Stewards of each church to cooperate earnestly in the plans outlined and adopted for this work. We must go forward in this endeavor until all our people are informed concerning the great causes represented in the Benevolent dollar and gladly bring their offerings as an act of worship and an investment in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.

Men's Work

We urge our pastors and Lay Leaders and especially the Board of Stewards to study carefully the needs of men in the local congregation for spiritual culture and development and to cooperate in the plans that shall be worked out by the General Board of Lay Activities in cooperation with the Board of Christian Education for the inspiration and enlistment of the men of the churches.

Methodist Layman

We recommend the Methodist Layman not only as an official organ of the Lay Board, but also as a religious magazine for the men of the Church and in particular for the members of the Boards of Stewards. This paper will prove invaluable to the stewards in their new responsibility. We pledge ourselves to secure a wide circulation of this paper and set as our goal, a subscription from each lay leader and member of the board of stewards.

Laymen's Day

We concur in the plan of the General Board for the observance of "Laymen's Day," using as the theme for the day "The Way to Spiritual Power," and we ask that the Conference designate a day for this purpose. We pledge our best efforts to secure on this day a service conducted by laymen in every church of the Conference.

We ask that June 28, 1931, be designated as Laymen's Day for the South Carolina Conference and that services on this day in all churches be arranged for and conducted by the Laymen.

Spiritual Life

The laymen wish to assume their part in the program of the observance of the Nineteen Hundredth Anniversary of Pentecost and to this end we pledge the lay organization to cooperate with the Bishop, the presiding elders and our pastors to bring about higher spiritual life in the church.

Leadership

We earnestly plead for the sympathy, encouragement and leadership of our Presiding Elders, and Pastors, in inspiring and training the lay organization for its task. We have only one desire and that is to serve as best we can in advancing the work of our great church in the cause of Christ.

In Appreciation

We wish to record our sincere love and appreciation for our Bishop, Presiding Elders and Pastors and pledge to them our loyal support in all their labors for our church.

MINISTERIAL LOAN FUND

Whereas, recent changes in the law of the Church seem to make adequate provision, under the supervision of the Board of Christian Education, for a loan fund to aid in the education of candidates for the ministry, your Conference Loan Fund Committee, in order to close up all matters committed to it, submits the following recommendations for adoption by this conference.

1. That all preachers indebted to this fund, who have been in active service as long as four years, shall have their accounts settled in full.
2. That those, who have not yet served four years, shall have their accounts settled one-fourth each year for four years, when the account shall be considered settled in full.
3. That the accounts of all these, who have not come into the active ministry, shall be turned over to the Conference Board of Christian Education for settlement, and that those who are now pursuing their studies shall have the benefit of this provision as to all amounts borrowed through this scholastic year.
4. That all funds now in the hands of the treasurer, and any that may be paid in, shall be transferred to the Conference Board of Christian Education.
5. That the now existing Conference Loan Fund Committee be discontinued after the close of this session of the Conference.

REPORT NO. 1 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

We are beginning the work of a new quadrennium in the field of Missions, under a new order by action of the recent General Conference.

1st. A new financial plan has been agreed upon to which your Board has endeavored to adjust itself and which we trust will meet with the loyal and earnest support of our people. "The whole plan is divided into two sections: Namely, apportionments for General Conference benevolent work of \$2,000,000 and a free will offering, called the Kingdom Extension offering, to be taken in January and February for \$1,200,000 for the whole Church. This free will offering includes Missions, Church Extension, Christian Education and Hospitals. The collection is to be taken after a church-wide cultivation, promoted by askings. In the face of increasing local needs of funds for carrying on the Conference Commission on Benevolences." The askings for General benevolences were reduced by the General Conference, and by request your Board has conformed to this reduction in its Conference our missionary work as well as the General work of our church, it will appear evident to you that there must be increased energy on the part of our presiding elders, pastors, and laymen in bringing our membership to an increasing liberality in their free-will offerings; and whenever possible to establish "Specials" through church organizations and individuals. We confidently believe that adequate funds will be provided by our loyal membership if properly cultivated and canvassed. We cannot too strongly emphasize the fact that the task of cultivating the church belongs to our local leaders, and especially to our preachers. Let us consecrate ourselves anew to this task.

2nd. We call your attention to the fact that the "General Conference laid great emphasis upon the fact that the spiritual life of our people must be improved and that we must give ourselves seriously to a nation wide evangelistic movement. The unchurched masses of our country present one of the most fruitful fields for evangelistic and missionary efforts, and we must do our utmost to see that the Gospel is preached and that a great evangelistic movement is engendered among our people." The General Conference provided for a Spiritual Life

Commission to cooperate with the Committee on Evangelism of the Board of Missions. It is highly important that wise and practical plans be made by such cooperation, looking to a wide spread revival resulting in the conversion of the unsaved, and the deepening of the experience of those who are already Christians.

In view of the foregoing facts, your Board of Missions recommends:

1. That we as a Conference and as individuals, pledge our most enthusiastic support by prayer and work during the coming year to the plans provided for carrying on of the work of the Kingdom.
2. That we endeavor to secure one hundred per cent of the apportionment assigned to our Conference, and our full quota of the free-will offering.
3. That we make special effort to bring our people to the Missionary Institutes, and enlist large study classes.
4. That the every-member canvass be given special attention.

REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE

The South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session at Mullins, S. C., November 17th, 1930, rejoices that our General Conference at Dallas, Texas, in May, 1930, directed that the evils of Sabbath desecration and the rewards of Sabbath Observance be increasingly emphasized and illustrated in all our Church work, and that constant effort be made to secure a Sabbath rest for every toiler.

A Sabbath day kept holy is an absolute necessity for the spiritual, industrial, political, and financial safety and progress of every family and nation.

Our American founders made strict Sabbath a vital part of the whole life of our country in its making. And America in her growth mightily illustrated the truth of God that immeasurable blessings will come to strict Sabbath keepers.

We rejoice that our Congress, Courts, Legislatures, City Councils, banks, and many stores generally suspend on Sunday, a Godly habit inherited from America's Christian pioneers.

But we look with amazement and fear upon the fact that our great interstate commerce, the greatest in the world, goes on every day, including Sunday, regardless of God's Sabbath, setting a bad example for our children and for the commerce of the world.

We are distressed that millions of our working men are being constrained against their conscientious convictions to work for profit on the Sabbath day, in order to hold their jobs on the week days; and we are distressed at the spiritual blindness that causes many businesses to run for profit on the Sabbath. The prince of deceivers is constantly trying to teach us the error that Sabbath-breaking is a necessity. These conditions are perilous for our Church and country.

We urge our people and all people to a stronger faith in the truth that Sabbath desecration in any business is ruinous for all concerned,

and that strict Sabbath observance brings inestimable blessings. We beg all parents and business men to remember that God commands them to see to it that their children and employees have rest from labor on the Sabbath day.

We believe that our country's widespread Sabbath-breaking is in some measure the cause of the general law-breaking and home-wrecking.

We urge that Congress enact laws that all workmen in our Interstate Commerce, and in the District of Columbia, be allowed Sunday as a rest day from labor, except in emergency instances of necessity and charity; as is now the law for postal clerks, rural route carriers, judges, clerks of court, senators, congressmen, all government clerks, members of our army and navy, and all governmental schools, teachers and pupils.

No nation, state or city has any moral right to license Sabbath-breaking in any business; and to do so is to invite calamity for all concerned, as sacred and profane history proves.

We direct that a committee composed of Dr. C. F. Wimberly, J. H. Danner and R. Leo Carter, cooperate with other like committees or agencies, and with our General Conference Committee on Temperance and Social Service in crusading for a Sabbath day's rest for every toiler in every line of business; and that they express our sentiments appropriately to our Congress, Legislature, City Governments, and to the commercial organizations of our country.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

The Southern Christian Advocate has during 1930 suffered from the business depression that has not only held our state but the entire country. It has been hard to keep the circulation up especially in communities where textile employees were working on small part time and even in the country districts where prices of products have been discouraging. In the face of these circumstances we are gratified to find that while there has been a loss in subscriptions the total subscription list now stands at 9,179 which compared with November 1, 1929, 11,281, is a loss of 2,102, but we note that at that time 3,642 of the 11,281 subscribers were being carried without having been paid for or definitely charged to any account. If these had been cut off then the subscription list would really have been less than the figure at which it now stands—9,179. There are, however, a number of these that have not been regularly renewed but the management is using every effort to secure such renewal.

Detailed financial statements have been submitted to the Board of Christian Literature.

The Board has held its regular meetings and a number of special

sessions during the year and has with unusual care devoted itself to looking after the interests of the Advocate, working out plans whereby there may be no deficit for another year.

Rev. E. O. Watson has been reelected as editor of the Advocate and Mr. L. J. Davis has been reelected as business manager.

The Board reaffirms the circulation plan of 1928 as to the general plan that shall govern the circulation during 1931. This plan will be found printed in the published Minutes of 1929, page 83, and all these items a, b and c are reaffirmed. In place of item d we recommend the following: That February 1, 1931, be fixed as date for an aggressive campaign for subscriptions and that this campaign be carried forward until every charge has reached its full quota. Item e is reaffirmed.

The Board requests that each of the two Conferences make an appropriation of \$4,000 for the Southern Christian Advocate and begs to state that so long as the Advocate is carrying an original debt of \$16,000 on which it is required to pay monthly \$198 and since it has to carry at times interest on deficits for current expenses it is imperative that there be liberal support by our two Conferences if the Advocate is to live and prosper.

We call upon our Bishop, presiding elders and pastors and the various church organizations as well as upon our people heartily to support the aggressive efforts to secure a minimum of 15,000 subscribers to the Advocate. This number of subscribers will not only wipe out deficits in running expenses but every 1,000 subscribers adds \$500 as a possible increase in advertising income.

Our paper continues to occupy a leading position among Conference organs and holds the interest of our people. Never was there more imperative need for the widest circulation and never was our Southern Christian Advocate more worthy of such.

REPORT OF THE SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your Committee is glad to report that during the past year a total of 2,031 persons have been received into the Church on profession of their faith in Christ. A net increase of 704 in our total membership is very encouraging in view of the present conditions existing in the territory of our Conference.

We wish to call the attention of our pastors and people to the fearful tide of worldliness that pervades our section of the country, to the great detriment of the moral and spiritual welfare of our people. The present craze of gambling on games of various kinds, even on athletics, is undermining the integrity of many people. Our women are too much taken up with the bridge table and other useless and hurtful amusements, even to the point of gambling by playing for prizes. The motion pictures displayed in our midst are generally of a very hurtful nature. We hope that our Christian leaders will by precept and example warn

our people against these and all other sinful tendencies. We simply cannot take such diversions as cannot be taken in the name of the Lord.

It is time for us to place a renewed emphasis upon the habit of regular attendance by all our people upon the Sunday school, the public worship of the Church, and other forms of Church activity. Also the family altar is needed as never before in every Methodist home. Let our pastors lay especial emphasis upon this great aid to spiritual and moral development. The habit of private prayer is a thing of great importance, and the faithful shepherds of our flocks will see that our people are dealt faithfully with in this matter.

Methodism cannot afford to weaken on its evangelistic efforts. The times call for us to sound a clarion note in this matter. Our people need a Saviour who is able to save unto the uttermost. Jesus Christ must be the Saviour of our souls and the Lord of our lives. From every pulpit and in every Sunday school class we must lift up our Lord Jesus Christ.

We are grateful for the messages of Bishop Candler at this Conference, and the spiritual blessing which he has brought to us. We pray that as pastors and people we will be able to go back to our homes fired with a new zeal for the salvation of our folks and the training of all in Christian service. May the Lord give us a year of gracious revivals!

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The year now closing has been one of genuine progress in our Sunday schools, and we believe that the statistical reports made to this Conference will reflect an encouraging advance.

Our staff this year has consisted of Rev. Albert D. Betts, Conference Superintendent; Rev. George K. Way, Extension Secretary; Miss Mary Lemmon, Elementary Superintendent; and Miss Elizabeth Brailsford, Office Secretary. Each has worked faithfully at the task in hand and with excellent results.

The District Sunday School Conferences held in March and April were well attended, nearly one thousand of our workers being present. We were favored by the visits of Rev. A. W. Martin and Miss Mary Skinner, of the General Sunday School Board staff in Nashville, Tenn. The fine cooperation given by each of our presiding elders has been most helpful and is highly appreciated.

Sixteen Standard Training Schools and a large number of Cokesbury Schools have been held this year, and a total of 1,612 credits have been secured by our workers. Trinity, Darlington, led among the charges of this Conference with a total of 59 credits, Turbeville and St. Paul's, Orangeburg, tied for the second place. Bamberg and Orangeburg Mills charge led the Conference for the third consecutive year in the largest number of Cokesbury credits.

We gave our hearty co-operation to the Pastors' School, and nearly

100 Sunday school credits were secured there by our preachers. This worthy institution is proving to be a great blessing to our pastors, and a much more intelligent and whole-hearted support of our religious education efforts is resulting.

Special mention should be made of the steadily growing evangelistic efforts of our Sunday schools in leading their pupils to Christ and to membership in the Church. We are averaging about 1,700 pupils brought into the Church by vows each year, but our 4,278 officers and teachers ought to double that number by prayerful and earnest effort.

The recent United States census shows that the population growth for the past decade in the territory of our Conference was at a standstill. But during that time we have had a net increase in our Sunday school enrollment of approximately 4,000. But we would remind our workers that there are yet many without the fold whom we are under obligation to reach.

The proper grading of our Sunday school pupils is resulting from the increasing observance of Promotion Day every September. Its effect upon the quality of our labors is evident in the improved instruction of our children and young folks. Childhood and Youth Week has been much better observed this fall than for some years past. Out of this many real forward steps are being taken.

Your Board has turned over its office equipment, records and responsibilities to the new Board of Christian Education. Our Treasurer has been instructed to turn over his books and all funds in hand to the Treasurer of the Board of Christian Education upon order of the new Executive Committee.

REPORT OF BOARD ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

The constant activities of the powerful and well organized forces that are opposed to prohibition has brought this phase of the temperance question to a critical stage. A condition confronts us that should give the friends of prohibition profound concern, and should stir them to earnest effort in all possible legitimate ways to counteract the propaganda that is ceaselessly at work to undermine the Eighteenth Amendment and to rob the Nation of the fruits of a century of effort. The question of Temperance, while ever a moral question, need not be a political one. But if the enemies of prohibition and temperance insist that it shall be a matter of politics, there would seem to be nothing left to the moral forces of the Nation but to meet them and fight the battle for laws favorable to temperance on that ground. Our College of Bishops in their Episcopal address to the last General Conference well say: "The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, professes no political creed. . . . It gladly embraces within its membership men and women of all political parties and of all political creeds. . . . But the church does stand as the eternal enemy of unrighteousness of every name and every form. And we should let it be everywhere known that wherever any

institution or organization becomes the friend and patron of the liquor traffic, or encourages the violation of the Prohibition Amendment, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will be found in the future, as in the past, battling against iniquity and on the side of personal and public righteousness. As Christians and as Methodists we should let it be known that we stand for the enforcement of the Prohibition law in the state and in the Nation." We do not feel that our people should sacrifice their convictions on great moral questions to party regularity. We heartily concur in these expressions from our brethren of the Western North Carolina Conference: "The Nation must be taught that the party which willingly accepts a principle of action which is known to be evil in principle and in results is unworthy to be trusted with the reins of government. Let the moral forces of the nation make themselves heard upon the issues. Let the churches serve notice that the Christian forces will not be subject to the political dictation of men who have been corrupted by the insidious forces of alcohol. Prohibition has been a success wherever the moral forces of a community demand its enforcement. It has been a failure only where those make liquor, sell liquor and drink liquor in violation of the law and have joined with corrupt political bosses and prostituted officials to nullify the law. To turn the government of this state or nation over to a group whose chief political doctrine is traitorous destruction is unthinkable. It will be two years before another political convention will be held. Let the church speak her mind now and gird herself for a conflict which is inevitable." To do this more effectively let District and Church Boards of Temperance be formed throughout the Church according to disciplinary requirement.

We note with great satisfaction the efforts on the part of Textile Associations to improve conditions now prevailing in the Textile industry. Especially would we commend them for the avowed purpose of doing away with night work and lessening the evils of child employment. Only by cutting the ground from under them can we hope to forestall agitation and effort on the part of radical elements in the industry. We, also, look with approval upon all efforts to bring about better feeling and fuller understanding among different races, feeling that our Church as a whole can bring about a finer attitude in inter-racial matters. We urge all pastors to observe Race Relation Sunday in February, 1931, wherever feasible. We, also, recommend that the church place itself on record as being wholeheartedly against the great evil of lynching that seems to have taken on new life within the last twelve months. We heartily recommend those in authority in our nation and other nations for their effort on behalf of lasting world peace, and to free the nations from the burdens of needless Naval Armament.

The Board would here express its appreciation of the thoughtful courtesy of the Conference in suspending one of its rules in order to give the Board a special hour. We are grateful to Dr. Eugene L. Crawford for bringing to us Dr. Ben H. Spence of Canada.

TEXTILE INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE

Your committee respectfully reports:

Upon investigation we find that all the property of the Textile Industrial Institute has been sold and proceeds distributed among the creditors leaving a balance of indebtedness owing of \$155,0000 and several years interest thereon.

The question of the legal liability of the two Annual Conferences for these debts has been held in abeyance but now the creditors have indicated their desire to get the matter definitely closed.

Your committee met with the creditors and representatives from the Upper South Carolina Conference and a full discussion ensued in regard to these debts. The creditors were courteous and most kindly in their attitude but they were very firm and positive in stating their claims that these debts were full legal and moral obligations of the Church, credit having been extended upon their faith in its willingness to pay its obligations.

We informed them that a large proportion of our people felt no responsibility, legal or moral for these liabilities. We told them we had no power to bind this Conference and suggested that they make a definite proposition we could submit, as it would be impossible to pay their claims. They finally offered to claim no back interest and accept certificates of indebtedness bearing a small interest and payable in instalments over a period of six years. We pointed out the inability of the Conference to comply with above but they refused any better terms.

We respectfully submit above proposition without recommendation and request our discharge.

Betts presented a copy of the 1930 Methodist Quarterly Review, a complete set of "Daily Christian Advocates" published during the 1930 session of General Conference which met in Dallas, Texas, also from Mr. Fred S. Dibble, Orangeburg, S. C., a picture of the members of the South Carolina Conference in session at Orangeburg, S. C., the year 1875. Dr. C. F. Wimberly presented a copy of the "Minutes of the Methodist Church" from the years 1773-1813." Rev. S. O. Cantey presented from Mr. Duncan D. McColl, Bennettsville, S. C., an old copy of the "Doctrines and Discipline of the Methodist Church," dated 1792. Rev. L. T. Phillips presented from Mrs. Skinner the watch of Rev. Joel Townsend.

It was ordered by the Society that the class to be received into full connection at this Conference be admitted as members of the Historical Society.

The Society then adjourned with the singing of Hymn 556 and the benediction by Rev. W. A. Fairy.

MEMOIRS

REV. WATSON B. DUNCAN

A prince among men and preachers of the gospel was taken from us in the death of Dr. Watson B. Duncan, who died in the Florence Infirmary Sunday night, March 16.

Doctor Duncan was a man and preacher of rare and versatile gifts. We recall him as an earnest, bright boy of eight or ten years in the school of Rev. J. Emory Watson at Blacksburg. Even then he showed the mental eagerness that characterized him through life. His further preparation for college was as a pupil of his lamented and brilliant Brother, Rev. Whitefoord M. Duncan, of the South Carolina Conference, who, before entering the itinerancy, taught the Broad River Academy, and as a pupil again in the Blacksburg High School, of which Rev. J. A. White, of North Carolina, was principal.

He entered Wofford College and spent two years there taking the regular A. B. course. His eyesight failing he did not return to Wofford for the completion of his course but did supply work the remainder of 1887 for churches in a then neglected area around the city of Sumter, until the Conference session of 1887 held in Spartanburg, when he was admitted on trial and reappointed to the churches he had been supplying under the name of Oakland circuit.

The writer was then on Wedgefield circuit, an adjoining charge, and the two who had been school mates at Blacksburg, renewing their association and friendship, helped each other in protracted meetings, some of these being crowned with gracious results such as we have rarely seen in all the years of our ministry. We distinctly recall sermons preached then by our young friend and brother worthy of pulpit princes of long experience.

While denied the privilege of completing his regular college course, with improved eyesight, he eagerly applied himself to study, and a wide range of reading along definite and chosen lines. He was an omnivorous reader. His mind absorbed knowledge as a sponge absorbs water. No less marked was his creative faculty, exercised not only in the preparation of sermons of power, but of varied literary productions. He early brought out Twentieth Century Sketches being a volume of sketches of the preachers of the South Carolina Conference, and later a revised edition in 1914, which is a classic in its field, constantly used as a reference book. He was at the time of his death engaged in gathering the material for an up to date revision of these sketches including all who have entered either Conference since the division of South Carolina into two Conferences in 1914. He was also engaged in the writing of a History of Methodism in South Carolina having been requested by his Conference to perform this needed service. Other books from his pen are "Baptism," "Studies in Methodist Literature," "Our Vows," "Immortality and Modern Thought," and "Ideals of American Poets." His rare good humor and pleasing address made him in demand for popular lectures and addresses some of his themes being "Laugh and Grow Fat," "The Boy and the Billy Goat," "Matrimony and Ali-

mony" in the field of humor, and in more serious vein, "Education and Citizenship," "The Literary View of Life," "The Religion of a Young Man," "Religion and Patriotism," "The Kingship of the Optimist," and various addresses suitable to the several fraternal orders in which he held membership, such as the Masons, the Knights of Pythias, Woodmen, Odd Fellows, and Junior Order of Mechanics.

He contributed frequently to newspapers and magazines. His book reviews, long regularly published in the Southern Christian Advocate, were unsurpassed in clear, brief statement as to the character and contents of a wide range of books. His correspondence for the Columbia State and other papers reporting Annual and other Conferences of the Church was always accurate, comprehensive of all matters of importance and written in graphic, entertaining style.

A life-long student, he continued definite study after leaving college and by hard work in correspondence took the Chautauqua courses and the degree of A.B. from Polytechnic College, and also the regular M.A. degrees both from Erskine and Woford, and the degree of Ph.D., from Central University.

He loved people and they loved him. He was popular among all classes everywhere. His pulpit was a place of power. He fed the souls of Christians, aroused the conscience of the indifferent, and effectively brought sinners to Christ.

Born March 19, 1867, the youngest child of a large family of sons and daughters of J. D. F. Duncan and Dulcinea Hopper Duncan, he was from infancy under decided Christian and Methodist influences. Converted at the age of eleven, he never knew the sins or bore the scars of a prodigal. At fifteen he realized the call of God to preach the gospel and unhesitatingly responded beginning at once his preparation which never ceased through the years of youth or the forty-three after years given to the itinerancy. Ever he was adding to treasures new and old and bringing them forth to bless others.

Entering the Conference in 1887, he passed regularly the ordinations following completion of the Conference course of study, and was ordained deacon by Bishop John C. Keener at Camden, 1889, and Elder by Bishop John C. Granbery, at Darlington, 1891.

His appointments have been as follows: Oakland, 1888; Wedgefield, 1889; Cartersville, 1890; Timmons ville, 1891-2; Kingstree, 1893-5; Alendale, 1896-8; St. George, 1899-1900; First Church, Laurens, 1901-4; St. John's, Rock Hill, 1905-7; First Church, Sumter, 1908; Bethel, Charleston, 1909-12; St. Paul's, Orangeburg, 1913-15; Manning, 1916-17; Dillon, 1918-21; Cheraw, 1922-25; McColl, 1926-28; Lake City, 1929-30.

February 6, 1889, he was married to Miss Lizzie Huggins, daughter of Dr. Herman H. Huggins and his wife, Louisa Gary Huggins, of Manning. Their first child died in infancy. Surviving are his widow and three children, Watson Boone Duncan, Jr., of Lake City, Rev. Herman F. Duncan, pastor of Duncan Memorial Church, Charlotte, N. C., and Mrs. J. Olin (Elizabeth Louise) Horne, of St. George, S. C.

Doctor Duncan was a distinguished member of our Conference, hold-

ing many responsible positions of leadership in which he will be sorely missed. The Columbia State well sums up the life work of Dr. Duncan saying: "There was not a better known, nor a more beloved pastor in South Carolina than Dr. Watson B. Duncan. Truly a Christian gentleman, staunch in his faith, tolerant, generous, kind, he was at the same time highly gifted. An able thinker, a thoughtful and entertaining speaker he was much in demand for sermons and addresses . . . In his passing South Carolina loses a noble son, and the Methodist Church loses a man who had served it well."

Funeral services conducted by Rev. E. K. Garrison, presiding elder of the Kingsree district, assisted by Revs. M. L. Banks and W. I. Herbert, were held at Lake City on Friday, March 18. The burial took place at Manning, S. C.

PHILIP ALCEMUS MURRAY

Philip Alcemus Murray was born at Pineville, South Carolina, on December 8, 1854. He was the son of Rev. John Wesley Murray and Frances Davis Murray, his father being an honored member of the South Carolina Conference.

After preliminary training in the public schools and at Cokesbury School, Brother Murray spent three years at Woford College, leaving there to become a teacher in the public schools.

On October 4, 1876, he was married to Miss Sallie Mulloy. To this union there were born three children who have survived both of their parents. They are Philip Alcemus Murray, Jr., Mrs. Kathleen Murray Page, and Mrs. Lillian Murray Womack.

He joined the church after professing religion when sixteen years of age. About that time he felt the call to preach, but sought to throw off the impression and enter into other lines of work. He taught school for several years and studied law. He finally yielded his life to the ministry, and entered the South Carolina Conference December 22, 1879. His early appointments were Waccamaw Circuit and Mission, junior praecher on the Bennettsville Circuit, North Laurens, Bayboro. After this he transferred for a short time to Florida. Subsequently he served McCormick, Branchville, Camden, Little Rock, Brightsville, Batesburg, and Beaufort. In 1898 he volunteered for service as chaplain in the Spanish-American war, having active service in Cuba with the Second Regiment of the South Carolina Volunteer Infantry.

In 1899 he returned from Cuba, and served as chaplain of the Charleston Port Society until 1907. In this work he dealt with sailors from all lands, holding services in the Port Society chapel, and otherwise ministering to the needs of these men.

Returning to the pastorate in 1908, Brother Murray served at Bishopville, Clemson College, South Florence, Rome, Marlboro, Cameron, and Walterboro. In 1923, because of ill health, he asked for the superannuate relation, thus ending forty-five years in active service. For six and one half years thereafter he lived in Cheraw with his daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Murray Page. His death occurred in Bennettsville,

at the home of another daughter, Mrs. Lillian Murray Womack, on June 28, 1930. His funeral was conducted in the Cheraw Methodist church. Sunday afternoon, June 29th, by Rev. J. T. Fowler, presiding elder, assisted by Rev. Peter Stokes, Rev. D. M. McLeod, Rev. S. O. Cantey, Rev. J. H. Graves, Rev. W. A. Beckham, Rev. T. W. Law, and the writer of this sketch. His body was laid to rest in St. David's cemetery.

During the years of his residence in Cheraw as a superannuate, Brother Murray was teacher of a large men's class. Among these men, as well as in his relations to the entire community, he was a man highly respected and loved, a man of firm convictions and fearless loyalty to them. As a friend and counselor, he stands out in this writer's memory. He was the preacher's loyal friend and his most helpful critic. On his seventy-fifth birthday, and the fiftieth anniversary of his entrance into the ministry, he occupied the pulpit at Cheraw for the last time.

Brother Murray was a man of deep faith in God and in man. He believed in the future and he lived for a better day. Physically, he has gone from us; spiritually he is alive. Many are the lives that will be richer through the years because of his touch.

REV. JOHN HAMILTON MOORE

The Rev. John Hamilton Moore, son of Mr. M. C. Moore and Mrs. Issaphena Moore, was born April 28, 1852, on what is known as Shooting Creek in Clay County, North Carolina. His father died when he was ten years old, and much of the responsibility for the family devolved upon him in his youth.

The conditions following the Confederate War made it a hard struggle even for mature men. It was especially hard for a mere youth, but he bore it manfully.

In giving an account of his conversion he said that he was converted in the revival that swept over the country after the Confederate war. He felt the call to preach very early after his conversion, but tried to overcome this by doing Christian work. At last he yielded, even though a grown young man, and attended Hicksville Academy, Hayesville, N. C. Here he almost completed the course of study offered. For two years he taught school.

First he was licensed to exhort, and later was duly licensed to preach. In October 1882 he joined the Holston Conference. When a portion of that Conference was annexed to the Western North Carolina Conference Brother Moore's membership came with it. In 1907 he was transferred to the South Carolina Conference.

His appointments for the thirty years of active service were as follows: Highlands Mission (N. C.), 1883; Pigeon River Ct., 1884; Cherry Street, Chattanooga, Tenn., 1885; Rogersville, Tenn., 1886-87; Bakersville, N. C., 1888-9; Hendersonville, 1890; Sulphur Springs, 1891-2; Ansonville Ct., 1893-6; Lenoir Ct., 1897; Elks Ct., 1898; Leicester Ct., 1899-1900; Macon Ct., 1901-2; Franklin Ct., 1903-6; Morven Ct., 1907; Reidville, S. C., 1908; Liberty Ct., 1909-12. Superannuated 1913-30.

He died at his home near McBee, S. C., on Thursday, October 30, 1930.

Brother Moore was twice married. On September 25, 1859 at Bakersville, N. C., he was united in marriage to Mrs. Lucy Elmira Green, daughter of Jeremiah Green and Mrs. Mattie Green. Four children blessed this union: Mattie Nell (died 1910), Mary Weaver Moore now of Bethune, George Frank Moore of Tampa, Fla., and Jerry H. Moore of Raleigh, N. C. Sister Moore died in Lenoir, N. C., October 31, 1897, and was buried at Marion, N. C.

On January 1, 1901, he was married to Miss Mary Ellen Mann of Franklin, N. C. She was the daughter of George P. Mann and Mrs. Lizzie Mann. To this union the following children were born: Ruth Moore of Florence, S. C., Mrs. Frank E. Gantt of Spartanburg, S. C., John Moore of McBee, S. C., Florence Moore of Greensboro, N. C., Ellen Moore of McBee, S. C., George Moore, Nina Moore, James Moore, all of McBee, S. C. Two of his sisters survive: Mrs. W. P. Patterson and Mrs. S. P. Waldrop of Hayesville, N. C. He leaves one step-son, Lawrence DeWitt Green of Marion, N. C.

It was in 1910 that his son, Jerry Moore, won fame and a prize in a boy's corn club by raising 226 $\frac{3}{4}$ bushels of corn on one acre of land at the parsonage of Liberty Chapel charge in Florence county, S. C. This is the world's record for a boy, and only once exceeded by a man.

His last years were spent in quietude on a small farm near McBee, S. C. He and his family were faithful attendants upon our McBee church. To his pastor and church he always gave his loyal and hearty support. To the end his faith in God was unwavering, and he yearned for the prosperity of Zion. He believed strongly that only by the power of the Holy Spirit and the atonement of Christ could men be redeemed and enabled to live holy lives.

His long and useful life of nearly eighty years has closed. After funeral services conducted in the McBee church on October 31st, his body was laid to rest in the cemetery at McBee, there to await the resurrection of the just. Rev. J. T. Fowler, presiding elder of the Florence District, had charge of the service, and he was assisted by Dr. D. M. McLeod, Rev. J. P. Inabnit, Rev. G. L. Ingram, and Rev. J. E. Cook, his pastor. His life was radiant with the presence of God and he wrought well in the vineyard of his Master.

"Life's labor done, as sinks the day,
Light from its load the spirit flies,
While heaven and earth combine to say,
