

FIRST DAY-WEDNESDAY

Opening.—The One Hundred and Forty-Seventh Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in Central Methodist Church, Florence, S. Statistics.—W. A. Beckham gave statistics answering Questions 24-42. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Closing.—A lelegram of greetings from the Preachers' Daughters Club of Columbia College was read and the Secretary instructed to make a suitable reply. Announcements were made, the doxology was sung, and Conference adjourned with the benediction by D. A. Phillips.

FIFTH DAY—SUNDAY—MEMORIAL SESSION

November 6, 1932.

Your Committee on Bible Cause begs leave to make the following report:

There has never been an age when there was a greater need for a new inoculation of the Bible. The morale of our people here in the home land, as well as in lands beyond the sea, is such that as a Church we cannot stress too highly the need of the teachings of the Bible.

As ministers, coming before our people week by week, with the opportunity of recommending reading material, let us not underestimate the privilege that is ours in introducing people to the values which the Bible holds.

The American Bible Society has an enviable record in making the Bible widely available across the earth. In 1931 it issued millions of copies of the Scriptures in nearly two hundred languages, and distributed them in upwards of fifty different countries without which our mission work would be seriously handicapped. More Bibles were distributed in China last year than in any year of evangelical effort in that country.

The American Bible Society is happy to cooperate with the pastors of the South Carolina Conference in their efforts to create a Bible reading constituency.

The American Bible Society has chosen December 4 as "Universal Bible Sunday." We therefore urge every pastor to observe December 4, or as near thereto as practicable, as "Bible Sunday," call attention to

the great work which the American Bible Society is doing, and do everything in their power to call our people back to the study of God's Word.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION-REPORT NO. 3

Your Board has sought to discharge fully its responsibilities during the year, and we are happy to report continued progress. Without attempting to recount in detail the activities of the Board, we respectfully call attention to the following matters.

Schools and Colleges

Inasmuch as the Educational Commission has reported to the Conference the present conditions of our institutions, we refer to that report for statistics. We would call particular attention to the importance of keeping before our people the claims of our three colleges—Columbia, Lander and Wofford. They deserve continued patronage and financial support. The cause of higher education should be stressed constantly.

We call attention to the present status of Carlisle School. While, by Conference action, the school is not to be operated directly by the Conferences, the property is held by a board of trusters and may be lassed by them or disposed of otherwise as they may determine. At present the school is leased to Col. J. F. Risher under terms agreeable to the trustees and your Board. We urge that the interest of the school be kept before our people, and that those in charge have the

sympathetic cooperation of our pastors and laymen. The trustees are now adjusting the unsecured obligations of the school, and when they have completed their work, a report and recommendations will be given to the Conference by this Board. If and when these adjustments are made, the indebtedness will have been reduced to such a sum that the Carlisle property will be worth several times more than the obligations.

Training

An increasingly important phase of our educational program is leadership training. We call attention to the wice variety of classes, schools, conferences, and other agencies of training. We would emphasize the opportunity of the paster in his own charge as the leader of training classes. The Pasters' School is continuing its fine service, and we urge every paster to attend the next session.

Your Board would express appreciation of the cooperation which has been received from the Board of Lay Activities. Contributions have been made in the sum of \$275 for training courses during the year, and arrangements have been made for a continuance of such assistance.

Missionary Education and Extension

Our benevolent enterprises are seriously threatened. Intelligent liberality is urgently needed. The problem of increasing gifts is essentially an educational problem. Missionary education, not as a spasmodic, occasional emphasis, but as a continuous process, is the only hopeful agency. This Board offers its assistance in every possible way to the end that the liberality of our people may express their personal and vital and intelligent interest in the building of the Kingdom.

We have unreached territory, and undeveloped churches. During this year some experimental surveys have been made, followed by training classes and other types of activity. In this enterprise we have had the cooperation of the Board of Missions and we express appreciation to that Board for the aid given. It is our purpose to continue, in every possible way, similar types of work, in the hope that these activities may list the level of all our churches along all lines.

The Conference Program and Its Support

We feel that it is unnecessary to call attention to the importance of the educational program. Surely it is well understood that the whole future of the Church is dependent very greatly upon effective educational endeavor. We would point out the fact that this Board stands ready to give assistance to every pastor and every church in every possible way. The Board neither could nor would attempt to hand down a program. This Board is an agency for aiding local leavers in the development of their educational work. We believe that the work in the past has been of such high order that its worth is clear to all.

Moreover, your Board has administered its work economically. No funds have been expended except as need required, and often lack of funds has hindered the best results. The Board has been able to reduce its operating budget for 1933 by nearly \$2,000. This has been necessary because of reduced income. In addition to the budget for

operations, the Board must make provision for an inherited indebtedness, and stands in need of an increased income. The support of the work is imperative. This can come through increases in collections on Conference appropriations, Sunday School Day, and Missionary Offerings. We call special attention to the regular fourth Sunday offerings and Sunday School Day.

Your Board would again express appreciation of the fine cooperation which has been given its staif members throughout the year, and would ask for continued assistance in the development of a really strong pro-

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The going away from us, by death, of our loved President, Rev. Walter I. Herbert, gives us profound sorrow. We miss his noble spirit and his wise leadership.

This is the fiftieth year of the organic work of the Board of Church Extension in our Church. During these years the South Carolina Conference, through its Board of Church Extension, has donated \$65,000 to aid 267 churches and \$9,500 to 44 parsonages. The General Board has donated \$18,400 to churches and \$1500 to parsonages in this Conference. The General and Conference Boards have loaned \$172,500 to our churches and parsonages.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Your Board of Christian Literature has endeavored to promote the success and circulation of the Southern Christian Advocate by having its members write articles relative to its attractive features. Furthermore, at the most of the District Conference, the Conference Organ was represented by an address from a member of the board as well as its editor.

We congratulate the editor, Dr. E. O. Watson, upon the high standards and cheerful tone maintained in the face of reduced income and curtailed help. His reappointment as editor for the next Conference year is recommended. The board desires to register its belief—that Christian periodicals should maintain high standards in advertisements as well as in editorials.

We also commend our general organs, the Christian Advocate, the World Outlook and the Methodist Layman, for their excellency and continued improvement. In reference to them, we would quote the statement that Wesley made to a preacher who boasted that he read only the Bible: "If a man reads only the Bible, he will soon cease to read that." To that may be added his other expressed belief: "It cannot be that the people should grow in grace unless they give themselves to reading."

The committee for the Commission on Spiritual Life has enjoined: "Place Christian Literature in the homes of our people. People are reading, but what?"

As an evidence that quite a few of our most youthful members are reading that which contributes to morbid sentimentality, altention is directed to one outcome of an exchange, arranged by the editors of the Haversack, whereby its readers might codnuct correspondence with adolescents of other lands. Southern boys and girls (no older than 12) discussed the physical attractions of the opposite sex so freely with their foreign correspondents that it brought a protest from the head of a German school, who stated that both he and the boys under his supervision were puzzled and embarrassed by the subjects broached and the questions asked.

We believe, however, that the very calibre of such a magazine as the one publishing the exchange and that of other literature, sponsored by

the General Board of Christian Education, will in time prove an effective antidote to the enticements of frivolous publications. The Epworth High Road is, without doubt, the best young people's periodical in the country. It is eagerly read by our young people of both high school and college age.

Your board was pleased to see on hand the usual book display of the Publishing House, and to have its interests represented by L. P. Alfriend.

For economical and higher reasons the selective taste should be employed in purchasin gbooks at any time. But in times like these, our people should be reminded that it is not a same retrenchment to constantly deny themselves the society of a good blok, which as Milton proclaimed, is "the precious life-blood of a master spirit."

The board's responsibility for holding an anniversary has been met by the securing of Dr. Boone Moss Bowen, of Emory University, as the speaker.

REPORT OF THE JOINT EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION

(Note: The Commission presented a majority report signed by Peter Stokes, Chairman, Fritz C. Beach, Secretary, J. Emerson Ford, A. L. Gunter, J. A. McCormack, Henry R. Sims, J. B. Rickets and S. M. Martin. A minority report was signed by G. A. Teasley and R. F. Morris. The following is the amended report adopted upon motion of Peter Stokes, J. Emerson Ford, George A. Teasley, J. C. Guilds, John W. Speake, G. E. Edwards and D. A. Phillips.)

Introduction

Your Commission, acting under the authority and instructions of the last sessions of the South Carolina and Upper South Carolina Annual Conferences, has sought to make an intimate and thorough s.udy of our educational situation in South Carolina with a view to recommending to the Conferences what, in the judgment of the Commission, ought to be the educational policy of Methodism in the state. No time nor effort has been spared by the Commission in seeking full information, and many meetings have been held for the consideration of information discovered and possible recommendations.

We desire to express our appreciation of the cordial and full cooperation of the officers of our institutions and the boards of trustees in making available to us all the information asked for and in assisting us in our offorts to get a complete picture of each institution.

From the first meeting of the Commission there has been among its membership the finest possible spirit of cooperation and a unanimous desire to face frankly, without bias, every problem. Every suggestion that has emerged has been tested thoroughly and the best solutions have been sought. There have been differences of opinion, of course, but unity of purpose has guided our deliberations.

The Commission would emphasize strongly the fact that it has conceived its task in terms of the conservation of all educational values in all our institutions, without sacrificing an institution or its splendid service in the past.

In harmony with the task given the Commission, the body of this report is divided into three main sections. The first consists of an emphasis upon the kind of higher education Methodism ought to make available in South Carolina. The second section deals with our present educational situation and incicates some of the specific problems facing us now. On the basis of these two sections, and after the most thorough study of every suggested solution, the third section contains the specific recommendations of the Commission for adoption by the two conferences.

Section I. The Kind of Higher Education Needed

Even a superficial study of conditions in higher education will make it perfectly obvious that we face the necessity of maintaining institutions fully accredited by the agencies which have been established for that purpose. Thus, a senior college, conferring regular academic degrees, must be "A" grade. This is a necessity for the sake of the gracuates of these institutions. An increasing number of college graduates pursue further study in universities. Graduates of non-accredited colleges cannot be admitted to full graduate standing on the strength of their college diplomas, and at best they are placed on probation for several months before being recognized as eligible for graduate degrees. Moreover, college graduates entering the teaching profession find it exceedingly difficult to secure positions unless their alma mater is an accredited institution. These two difficulties ought to emphasize sufficiently the necessity for fully accredited institutions. In addition, it is our conviction that Methodism cannot afford to provide any sort of higher education which cannot be called genuine by every test. Nothing less than the best is worthy of our Church.

The higher education which is provided by the Church ought to be available to the largest possible portion of our constituency. The cost must be sufficiently low to make it possible for parents to send their sons and daughters to college, and institutions should be provided in such numbers and at such points as to make attendance upon them reasonably convenient and economical. More students ought to be in college, and the Church should take all necessary steps to inspire

their attendance. At the same time the Church must not attempt to maintain more institutions or institutions of a higher academic status than can be supported adequately.

Minutes of the South Carolina Annual Conference

The Commission is convinced that there is, or should be, a distinctiveness in the church college which is more than is often implied by the term "church college." Without apology the church college should magnify religion and should relate itself to the organized religious life of the local community and to the area which it serves. All subjects should afford spiritual interpretations, and departments of religion, religious education, Bible, etc., should find special emphasis in these institutions of ours. It is not enough to have such cepartmentsthey must have a quality that sets them before students and the public as of first importance. The college must relate itself to the local church and to church life in general. Departments which deal with subjects of interest in local churches should be related definitely and vitally to the local church program. This should be done from two points of view-the actual educational values such relations will have for the college student, and the service which the college may thus render through the church.

Much thought concerning religious education in the past has stressed somewhat superficial relationships—as, for example, a mere exchange of credits through the Division of Leatership Training. The question goes vastly deeper, and has to do with the actual character of the training which the college expects to give. In religious education the most fundamental principles of philosophy, of theology, of psychology, of technique, are employed. There is nothing superficial about it, except as superficially-minded persons presume to deal with it. Primarily religious education deals with persons in their relations to God and man. Every relationship is a meeting place for fundamental issues. As the college definitely relates itself to student life and to the church, it will guide the student in practical experiences for future usefulness. All our educational forces—the college and the conference agencies must face the challenge and make certain the kind of education that will enrich the spirits of men and women no less effectively than it will give strength to body and mind. Without apology, the church college must teach religion.

Section II. Our Educational Situation and Emerging Problems

The Commission has examined thoroughly the condition of each of our institutions. The following summary reflects the present situation.

The most part the faculties of our colleges are for the most part

The members of the faculties of our colleges are for the most part well trained and are devoted to their task. Our investigation discloses that they are held in high esteem by the students.

In view of current criticisms of religious and moral conditions among students of today your Commission is gratified with the disclosures made by searching investigation of conditions in our own schools. We do not suggest that conditions are ideal, or that there are no weaknesses which need attention from faculties and trustees, but it is our

conviction that student life today compares favorably with that of preceding generations.

The financial exhibits are based on audits for 1932.

A. Carlisle School

The condition of Carlisle School was reported to the last sessions of the annual conferences, and the trustees were authorized to take steps to make settlement of the indebtedness by sale or otherwise. The trustees have lessed the school for the current year and will report the present condition to the Boards of Christian Education.

The recommendation of your Commission concerning Carlisle is given later in this report.

B. Columbia College

Enrollment of 4-year students, 300; decrease, 4. Special students, 10; decrease 20. (Note: Enrollment is in comparison with end of first semester last year. Other students en ering will change figures.)

Value of plant and compus, \$565,925.61.

Endowment, \$245,937.89.

Indebtedness, \$193,089.10.

Budget 1932-33, \$91,369.00; decrease, \$3,366.00.

Columbia is on the approved non-member list of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States, the indebtedness and lack of adequate on owment being the chief hindrances to full membership. In addition to keeping alive all present sources of income, income producing assets of the college should be increased in the sum of approximately \$300,000.00 to off-set indebtedness and attain required endowment. Should any of the present sources of income prove to be temporary or lose their income value, the needs for additional funds will be increased proportionally.

The grounds, buildings, and equipment at Columbia are in good condition. There is need for additional types of equipment, such as gymnasium, science hall, and infirmary.

Titles to the college property are in fee simple.

C. Lander College

Enrollment of 4-year students, 26%; increase 81. Special students, 63; decrease, 28. (Note: Comparison is present enrollment and that at end of first semester last year; other students will probably be enrolled.)

Value of plant and campus, \$380,605.10.

Endowment, \$167,501.49.

Incebtedness, \$169.174 43.

Budget, 1932-33, \$66,710.00; decrease, \$2,772.00.

Lander is on the approved non-member list of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States. The indebtedness and lack of adequate endowment are the chief hindrances to membership. In addition to keeping alive all present sources of income, income producing assets of the college should be increased in the sum of

approximately \$400,000.00 to off-set indebtedness and attain the minimum endowment required for senior college accreditation. Should any of the present investments lose their income producing value, the needs for additional funds will be increased proportionately.

Titles to the property are in fee simple, and there is no question of doubtful ownership or reversions.

The grounds, buildings and equipment are in fair to good condition. Chipley Hall is a splendid modern dormitory, well equipped. Other dormitory facilities are fair. Needs include improvements and some new types of equipment, such as a library building, swimming pool, central heating plant, etc.

D. Wofford College

Enrollment of 4-year students, 372; increase, 33; special or graduate students, 36; decrease, 19. (Note: Present enrollment is compared with that at end of 1st semester last year. There will probably be additions.)

Value of plant and campus, \$742,075.07.

Endowment (general), \$700,199.65. Endowment (loan fund), \$39,-798.11.

Indebtedness, \$135,294.28.

Budget, 1932-33, \$67,250.00; decrease, \$20,386.00.

Wofford is a full member of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States and is fully approved by the Association of American Universities. This means that Wofford graduates are admitted to full graduate standing in any university.

The endowment of the college is sufficient to off-set indebtedness and still leave a margin of more than the \$500,000.00 minimum set by the standardizing agencies, provided there are no losses from endowment investments.

The endowment, however, does not permit very much needed expansion through improvements in buildings, erection of new buildings and additions to faculty.

The titles to Wofford property are in fee simple.

E. Problems

In the course of our investigations and in the light of the conditions already mentioned, certain outstanding problems have emerged. These demand careful attention. We have not sought to bring before the conferences an exhaustive list of problems, but there are a few which merit consideration.

1. Finances. The most obvious immediate problem is that of finances. Our institutions are crippled by debts too large to carry, and are hindered by lack of current income for satisfactory operation. The present financial condition is due, in part, to the general economic situation; but also is due to the absence of effective financial policies. The college trustees and officers have sought earnestly to discharge their responsibility for maintaining their institutions, and they have found funds lacking. In the hope that conditions would improve, they have

permitted deficits by continuing a program which current income would not sustain. At various times the conferences have authorized morgages or bonds. The net result, as indicated earlier in this report is that liabilities are fast overtaking assets and the institutions are saving under the weight of debt, which prevents desirable expansion.

To pay the present indebledness and meet minimum endowment requirements for our three senior colleges, there is immediate need for about \$700,000.60, to which should be added at least \$300,000.60 for improvements and greatly needed new buildings. Thus, to run three "A" grade senior colleges the sum of \$1,000,000.00 will be required, in addition to all present sources of income.

The minimum endowment is not needed merely to meet requirements of accrediting agencies. It is imperative for the sake of the first-class colleges. No college can operate solely upon the income from students. At least \$25,000.00 additional annual income for each institution will be required for successful operation. This must come from endowment and donations. It requires \$500.000.00 at 5 per cent to meet the need. Up to \$10,000.00 annually, equivalent to endowment of \$200,000.00, may come from church appropriations. The remaining \$15,000.00 annually must come from invested funds of at least \$300,000.00, over and above all intebledness.

Your Commission would point out the seriousness of any situation in which the principal of endowment funds is used for current operations. It is the judgment of the Commission that endowment or trust fonds should be held inviolate.

Securing and maintaining an adequate and well trained faculty is a part of the financial problem. Teachers must be paid enough to justify their expensive training. Their willingness to teach for low salaries is worthy of commerciation and gratitule, but there are limits beyond which such a policy is far from economical.

2. Student Body. A second important problem facing our institutions today is that of securing and holding adequate student bodies. In the main, our colleges have maintained an enrollment which compares favorably with that of other schools. But of the 2,300 Methodists in the colleges of South Carelina last year, only about one fourth were in our own institutions. Many reasons might be given for that condition, but the important thing for us is to consider whether we are ministering to our constituency if all other colleges in the State average almost as many Methodists as to our own schools. Important also is the fact that for every Methodist youth in college there are several whom no college serves.

Closely connected with attendance is the further problem of ability to go to college. The increase of unpaid student accounts is a serious fact. No inconsiderable portion of deficits during the past few years is due to these accounts. Almost every year large amounts are charged off as worthless. This is vasily more than a financial problem. The effect of non-payment and cancellation upon the beneficiary is the more important question.

3. Competition. One of the most serious of all our problems is that

of competition. In South Carolina, Methodism is competing with itself in the higher education of young women. Such competition is suicidal and wasteful. To be sure, there are enough young women to fill both institutions, but in too many instances both institutions compele for the same students, while neither has access to a vast number who ought to be reached. Some type of cooperation, or coordination, is needed to give to our institutions a united appeal to all potential students.

Section III. Recommendations

Your Commission recommends:

1. That Carlisle School be discontinued as a church school and that the trustees be retained to hold, lesse, sell or otherwise dispose of the property to the best advantage of the creditors.

2. That the Boards of Christian E. ucation of the South Carolina and the Upper South Carolina Conferences be empowered to devise and lead in an educational campaign designed to instruct our people more adequately as to the place and importance of our colleges, but that no general financial campaign be undertaken until the financial condition of our people is improved.

3. There are some changes and adjustments which it might be wise from time to time to make, but the time for at opting and putting these changes into operation is during the interim between the close of the school year and the beginning of another. Since it is impractical to have a called session of the Conferences, there should be a body to regrescrit the Conferences with some measure of authority. We, therefore, recommend that the Joint Educational Commission be continued, either with its present personnel or with such change or changes in its personnel from each Conference as the Board of Christian Education may recommend and the Conference approve; and that the Commission shall have authority to cooperate with the Board of Trustees of each of our institutions, when requested by the trustees to do so, and to make such changes and adjustments as may from time to time appear wise; provided that no change or adjustment touching any institution shall be made unless and until it is approved by the Board of Trustees of that institution and also by the Joint Educational Commission, each body voting separately.

Conclusion

In conclusion your Commission would express the conviction that South Carolina Methodism faces an educational task almost unlimited in its possibilities. Our constituency is large, and many parents are able, under normal conditions, to send their sons and daughters to college. We believe that, with the united support of Methodism in the State, the future is bright with promise.

The effect of non-payment and cancellation upon the beneficiary is the more important question.

3. Competition. One of the most serious of all our problems is that

of competition. In South Carolina, Methodism is competing with itself in the higher education of young women. Such competition is suicidal and wasteful. To be sure, there are enough young women to fill both institutions, but in too many instances both institutions compele for the same students, while neither has access to a vast number who ought to be reached. Some type of cooperation, or coordination, is needed to give to our institutions a united appeal to all potential students.

Section III. Recommendations

Your Commission recommends:

1. That Carlisle School be discontinued as a church school and that the trustees be retained to hold, lease, sell or otherwise dispose of the property to the best advantage of the creditors.

2. That the Boards of Christian Education of the South Carolina and the Upper South Carolina Conferences be empowered to devise and lead in an educational campaign designed to instruct our people more adequately as to the place and importance of our colleges, but that no general financial campaign be undertaken until the financial condition of our people is improved.

3. There are some changes and adjustments which it might be wise from time to time to make, but the time for acopting and putting these changes into operation is during the interim between the close of the school year and the beginning of another. Since it is impractical to have a called session of the Conferences, there should be a body to represent the Conferences with some measure of authority. We, therefore, recommend that the Joint Educational Commission be emtinued, cither with its present personnel or with such change or changes in its personnel from each Conference as the Board of Christian Education may recommend and the Conference approve; and that the Commission shall have authority to cooperate with the Board of Trustees of each of our institutions, when requested by the trustees to do so, and to make such changes and adjustments as may from time to time appear wise; provided that no change or adjustment touching any institution shall be made unless and until it is approved by the Board of Trustees of that institution and also by the Joint Educational Commission, each body voting separately.

Conclusion

In conclusion your Commission would express the conviction that South Carolina Melbodism faces an educational task almost unlimited in its possibilities. Our constituency is large, and many parents are able, under normal conditions, to send their sons and daughters to college. We believe that, with the united support of Methodism in the State, the future is bright with promise.

great difficulty in meeting the necessary expenses incurred in caring for our large family of 327 orphan children. Despite the fact that we have made every possible reduction in expenditures, we find it very difficult to continue to operate at full capacity. It would seem a great pity to close our doors against any needy orphan child so long as we have a vacancy. Yet, we cannot continue to care for as many children as we have unless our people open their hearts and respond to the many appeals made through our Suncay schools and churches in behalf of these children. We have reduced our daily per capita cost to the lowest of any orphanage of our size operating in this section of the country.

We believe our children at Epworth Orphanage are well cared for. Their physical, mental and spiritual life is being carefully looked after. They are being trained to work and are taught lessons of orderliness and obedience.

The health of our children throughout the year has been excellent.

The school continues to do a very high quality of work. Every effort is being made to inspire the children to greater efforts in developing their minds. This year the high school enrollment has reached 109. This indicates that a very large percentage of the children are taking advantage of the school opportunities offered at the orphanage.

Our farm, dairy herd, hogs and chickens go a long way toward providing the necessary articles of food for our children. We could not continue to operate without them.

The work that Epworth Orphanage is doing merits a more liberal support from the Methodists of South Carolina.

BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 1

Dr. W. G. Cram, General Missionary Secretary, reported that the budget expenditures for 1932 were more than a half million dollars less than that of 1929. At the same time he reported that not one missionary had been called home, and for this latter fact we are grateful to God.

Dr. Cram also reported that the autonomous churches set up in Korea, Mexico and Brazil were moving forward with every encouragement of success, and that in Cuba, Europe, Africa and China the work is moving forward with encouraging results.

he the home field the work of our schools has been encouraging even though drastic reductions have had to be made in appropriations. Likewise all of our home mission work is producing large results.

On recommendation of the Joint Committee on Cooperation of the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Missions a careful survey was made early in the year of two mission charges, viz. Jamestown and St. Matthews Circuit. In the Jamestown charge it was found that there are 194 homes, 223 church members, 380 non-church members and

that 190-one half of the non-church members-prefer the Methodist church.

On the St. Matthews circuit, as a result of the survey, a new church was built. These surveys were made under the circuiton of the Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education. From these experiments it is shown that such surveys are valuable to the pastor, to the Board of Christian Education, and to the Board of Missians, in carrying forward the work. It is therefore recommended that the Joint Committee on Cooperation continue its enforts in this direction, and that early in the conference year a survey be made in each charge receiving aid from the Mission Board.

It is further recommended that these surveys be made after careful preparation, and at a minimum of cost; also that these surveys be made under the general supervision of the Board of Christian Education.

We earnestly commend the Kingdom Extension effort which will be put on during the months of January and February. Never before has such an effort been more urgen; than at this time.

The work of Rev. C. B. Burns, Marine Pastor at Parris Island, is heartily commended.

It is a matter of much regret that only 85% of the appropriations made to our mission charges could be paid.

The Board nominates the Rev. W. V. Dibble as Conference Missionary Secretary and requests the Bishop to make this appointment.

BOARD OF MISSION-REPORT NO. 4

Fiftieth Anniversary of Paine College

The General Conference in 1930 ordered the Church at large to give right of way to this celebration, in the year 1933. The action of the General Conference is as follows:

"We recommend as follows:

"1. That the President and Trustees of Paine College, in cooperation with the General Board of Missions, be, and they are hereby authorized, to inaugurate a cultivation program, to the end that our people may be better informed of the work done by this institution and of the pressing needs for encowment and larger financial support.

"2. That, subject to the approval of the General Board of Missions with respect to the (a) urgency and (b) timeliness as to the plans of the Board and the amount necessary to be raised, the president and trustees of Paine College, in cooperation with a commission to be appointed by the General Board of Missions, be authorized and empowered during the year 1933 to solicit funds for the endowment of Paine College.

"3. That the General Board of Missions be authorized to name a commission, to be known as the Jubilee Commission, to cooperate with the President and Trustees of Paine College in the preparation of a program designed to properly observe, the year 1933, the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of this institution.

Surveys have been made and the Jubilee Commission has been organized with Bishop Warren A. Candler as Honorary chairman.

Complying with a request from the General Board of Missions, we neminate the Chairman of our Board of Missions, Chairman of the Board of Christian Education, the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society, the Conference Missionary Secretary, and the Secretary of the Conference Board of Missions, who shall constitute a Conference Commission to serve with the Jubilee Commission.

Having considered carefully the work and needs of Paine College, and in keeping with the General Conference action, we recommend hearty cooperation on the part of our Conference.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg to submit the following

We wish first of all to restate with emphasis the preamble to our report of last year:

Whereas we view with alarm the increasing disregard on the part of church members, touching the observance of the day, which mems so much to the life of the church; few regard the claims with any degree of seriousness. There are many factors in this dangerous presedence: the highway and the automobile are the handmaidens for developing an easy conscience. Furthermore, the places of amusement and resorts are bidding for the patronage of Sabbath desecrators.

Whereas, the law of the Sabbath is one law upon which God places more emphasis than upon the laws of murder or adultery, as it was the first great gift to the infant race: God's Day—second, God's Book, and the third—God's Son. If the Day is ignored, the Book will be lost, and when the Book goes—the message of the Son will be lost.

Be it therefore resolved, that our Conference by precept and example—keep the Sabbath Day.

- 1. By observing the law of the country, touching the Day.
- 2. By observing the law of the Church, which is clear and explicit.
- 3. By giving it the emphasis it deserves, in that a disregard to its claims will bring inevitable wreck to our civilzaton.
- 4. By urging our people to do likewise with a passion the cause deserves.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE 1932

To the South Carolina Conference:

The Board of Managers has decided to put subscriptions back to \$2.00 per annum and, for the present, drop the quota idea asking all to their very best. The flat price of \$1.50 per annum which was made a special offer for the year 1932, and which was in effect from 1928 to 1931 conditioned upon reaching ten per cent of membership cannot be maintained with a subscription list of les sthan ten thousand. While this was more than reached in 1928 as a result of the first special

effort conditioned upon quota, in the removal of the quota condition for the past year it has proven unsatisfactory.

We respectfully request, as essential to the successful continuance of the Southern Christian Advocate:

First, that the South Carelina and the Upper South Carolina Conferences fix December 18 as Southern Christian Advocate relief day, on which day in every congregation the needs of the Advocate shall be presented and a voluntary offering taken, a call for which shall be five cents (5c) for each member of the church; and that where this cannot be taken at all of the churches on the one day it be done at the earliest date possible and in no case later than January 15, the contributions resulting from such effort to be used for paying off current indebtelness, the payment of which is necessary to the continuance of the Advocate, the Advocate agreeing to furnish one year's subscription for each five dollars contributed, to be sent to such person or persons as the church may designate

Second, since the Advocate can do, if regularly distributed, a considerable volume of job printing beyond what it has been doing, but being limited as a church institution not paying taxes to the work of and for the church, we urge the organizations of the church, individual preachers and laymen in special service to give the Advocate office opportunity to bid on such jobs as they may have. The organizations, Boards and Institutions of the Church by doing this can greatly aid in successfully meeting the situation in which we find ourselves.

We respectfully request the presiding Bishop of the South Carolina Conference to appoint Rev. E. O. Watson Editor of the Southern Christian Advocate.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your committee on the Spiritual State of the Church beg leave to submit the following report:

We are glad to report that during the year 2,139 persons have been received into the Church on profesion of faith in Christ and there has been a met increase of 1,184 to the total membership of the church. We note with pleasure that a large number of conversions have been reported from several charges. These facts are encouraging and we have every reason to be thankful to our Father for this increase in His Kingdom, and yet, as we study the field we are convinced that there is much to be done if we are to witness the establishment of the Kingdom of our Christ. Therefore, in order that we may unitedly enter upon the most important task and glorious privilege we make the following recommendations:

Recommendations

1. That the pastors as leaders of the Church of Christ realize the slupendous necessity of deepening their own spiritual lives. To be a Christian preacher is not enough with which to meet the acute problems of the age. We believe that the revival of tomorrow will be possible largely as a result of evangelistic fervor on the part of the preacher in charge who becomes burdened for the saving of the lost souls under his care.

2. That our preachers hold revivals in each church of the Conference; that Sunday School evangelism, personal evangelism, and home visitation evangelism be combined with these efforts. God has blessed Methodism during the days of her stress of evangelism; He will bless

her again in these methods.

3. That public worship be enriched throughout the Church. Men are hungering after (eep spirituality. This hungering may be satisfied by uniting the soul with God. Too often our worship services in the Church fail to lift the soul to its Maker. We call upon the pastors to make the services of the Church conducive to worship.

4. That special attention be directed to the homes of our people. We urge that each home have definite plans for daily devotions and

giving thanks at meals.

5. That our ministry speak lovingly, and yet boldly, against all forms of vice and sin which seriously threaten the lives of our young people. We note the growing indifference of our people to the carditable, promiscous dancing, and unothical theaters. We urge our preachers to plead with the people to "seek first the Kingcom of God, and His righteousness"; and to avoid all forms of amusement which might be a reflection upon the Christ of the Church.

6. That the Lord's Day be kept as a holy day, and not as a holiday. More and more the Sabbath is being used as a day of pleasure and recreation. We urge our people to attend upon the ordinances of the

Church in this day of worship and rest.

7. That our young people be encouraged to attend the colleges and universities of the Church. Much harm has been done in undermining the faith of our young people in institutions where the Bible is not taught, or if taught, taught so as to destroy faith rather than to cultivate it.

8. That our Christian literature be placed in the homes of our people. We recommend the Southern Christian Advocate, the Methodist Layman, and the World Outlook.

9. That the membership of our people who move be followed up as a safeguard against lesing them. We note with alarm that many of our members are lost each year through moving.

10. That the Church place greater emphasis on training its membership for Christian service. We urge the integration of new members of the Church into the active life of the Church, and that workers avail themselves of the opportunity of attending the Training Schools available in our Church.

11. That March 5-12, 1933, be observed as a week of penitence, fasting and prayer.

12. That all activities of the current year be undertaken optimistically, realizing that the gates of hell cannot prevail against the Church which Jesus has purchased with His own precious blood.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Temperance

Temperance work has had rather rough sledding this year, owing to political activities involving the prohibition issue; but we are grateful that encouraging progress has been made in our Conference.

More clearly our people are coming to see the difference between prohibition and temperance. Prohibition forbids the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage; temperance is voluntary abstinence from its use because its use in any quantity as a beverage is injurious.

We believe prohibition is an aid to temperance, but, as we see it, the fundamental work of the church is creation of a temperance mind and heart. We must lead our people to see that drunkenness is a crime, and that all use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage tends to evil, and that our people should practice total abstinence, not because of fear, but for the love of righteousness. We emphatically declare we believe in prohibition; and just as emphatically we declare our belief that the presence of liquor is no excuse for drinking.

There is much talk of drinking among our young people and among our women, and not without some grounds; but we believe the charge is exaggerated. However it is up to our young people and to our women to protect their good name; and this can be done only by good character and right conduct.

Our Board has had a representative at each district conference. Work has been done in not less than ten counties. In several circuits every church has been visited. Quite a few temperance articles have been written and published in both the religious and in the secular press of our state. Scores of letters have been written and hundreds of miles have been traveled.

Besides the work done directly by the Board, we believe many pastors have been inspired in some measure to greater activity, and that the church is feeling her responsibility in this field as she has not for some time, and is undertaking to measure up with greater courage.

We hope another year to do work in every county in our Conference, and to enlist some of the best brains in our state.

We need and ask for the prayers and the cooperation of the ministry and the laity of our church.

Social Service

The church owes an obligation to the political, to the business and

to the social life of our people that she dare not set aside. Not that the church should enter into partisan politics, or should try to determine busines policies, or to dictate social customs; but she must make the impact of the spirit and teachings of Jesus felt in all life-else she fails. What a challenge to the leadership of the church! Are we equal to the task?

Since protection of our lives and our property, the maintenance of our schools, the requirement of taxes, laws that protect society against immeral influences, such as legalized gambling, wild speculation, public presitution, are dependent in large degree upon the sort of government we have, we should without fear or favor or prejudice try to meet our obligations as citizens in every respect.

So serious is the situation arising from the fact that multiplied thousanes of our people, from the poorest to the richest, are reaching out their hands for both private and public pap that it calls for the most earnest, intelligent and prayerful consideration. Our highways are lined with mon and women (white and black), and with boys and girls hitch-biking all over the country; thousands of young men and young women are clamoring for free scholarship; multitudes are receiving government and Red Cross aid and refusing to work. Shall this thing go on? Who dares call a halt?

This report would be incomplete without sympathetic mention of the hundreds of thousands of honest, industrious people out of employment and without means of livelihood. To deny these our unfortunate brethren needed help is to forfeit the right to call ourselves Christian or even humanitarian. But to stave off starvation in a time of emergency is not sufficient; every possible effort should be made to prevent such recurrences. And this cannot be done as long as profits are considered more important than human beings. And many believe our capitalistic syslem must be scrapped before permanent relief can be had. Certainly the church must set the pace in the conduct of its own affairs by the practice of equality, justice, mercy and brotherly kindness. Such gleams of light as are ours let us follow until the dawn of a better day.

We protest militarism, and believe our country should fight only to repet invasion and then as a last resort. We endorse the work of the peace conference and hope to see war outlawed. We believe our navy and army should be reduced until it is only an adequate police force.

We recommend:

1. That the conference approve the policy of the Board to carry on a Conference-wide temperance program of education and inspiration the coming year directed by its chairman.

2. That the Board be allowed to receive voluntary offerings for its w_{0} rk.

Hymn 1 was sung, Rev. W. A. Betts, led in prayer, Rev. G. W. Davis read a scripture lesson from the 52nd chapter of Isaiah.

Dr. J. W. Kilgo, of the Upper South Carolina Conference, addressed the Society on the subject "Some Things Belonging to Methodism." A rising vote was taken as an expression of appreciation to Dr. Kilgo for his splendid address.

Dr. W. C. Kirkland, First Vice-President, then presiding, called for the reading of the minutes of the last session, together with the Treasurer's report. The minutes were approved and on motion of Rev. G. W. Davis, th Treasurer's report was received as information.

On motion of Rev. W. J. Snyder it was ordered that the dues for this year be reduced to twenty-five cents instead of the regular amount of fifty cents.

Rev. J. H. Noland was elected as the speaker for next year, with Rev. R. H. Jones as alternate.

It was ordered by the Society that the class to be received into full connection at this conference be admitted as members of the Historical Society.

"Second: That the Society give to the Executive Committee, working with representatives of the Woman's Missionary Society, authority to work out plans for taking care of this interest of the Church.

"Third: That the bound copy of the minutes of the Woman's Missionary Society, presented by Mis. W. L. Wait, be given to the Woman's Section.

"Fourth: That this privilege is conditioned upon the adoption of similar resolutions by the Upper South Carolina Historical Society."

It was ordered by the Society that the necessary number of Historical addresses, now in the archives at Wofford College, be furnished Dr. W. C. Kirkland for the purpose of completing his four files; these to be bound at the expense of the Society; one to be placed in the archives, one in the Wofford College Library, one in Columbia College Library, and one in the Lander College Library.

An apportunity for presentation of gifts to the Society was given, and Dr. E. O. Watson presented a copy of "The Builders of Methodism in South Carolina." Rev. J. H. Danner presented a copy of the Daily Christian Advocate containing the minutes of the General Conference of 1884, which met in Philadelphia. Rev. W. A. Betts presented a

MEMOIRS

DR. DANIEL MELVIN McLEOD

Dr. Daniel Melvin McLeod needs no eulogy before any group of those who knew him.

A tremendous gap was made in the working ranks of our Conference when he pased to his final reward. He was born in Bishopville, S. C. October 1, 1866. His father and mother, William James McL. d and Amanda (Rogers) McLeod, were faithful members of the Mich. dist Church. With a very strong affection Dr. McLeod clung to the old home and home ties and often would sit and talk about the wonderful influences there. Under these strong Christian home influences the young boy grew and although not converted until years later yet hele seed were sown in his young life that told in character and high ideals in his riper days.

In 1886 he entered Wofford College with the Freshman class of that year. He had scarcely put foot upon the campus before he was recognized as a leader in the college circles. Frank, honest, straight forward, with a ready wit and quick reparte the boys were readily drawn to him.

In his Junior year Rev. Thomas H. Leitch, an evangelist, and his singer, Fred Marshall, conducted revival services in Central Methodis: church, Spartanburg, S. C., and during these services Dr. McLeed was clearly convered. Following this definite experience in his life ame the quiet but firm impression that he was called of God to preach the gospel. In June of 1890 he graduated from Wofford College with the degree of A.B. The following month he was granted license to greath and that fall entered the Theological Department of the Vanderoil: University in Nashville, Tenn. In the early summer of 1892 he completed the English course in theology and that fall joined the South Carolina Conference with eight others admitted on trial that year. His first charge was Sumter circuit where he served one year as Junior pastor. He served faithfully and most acceptably the charges committed to him. Among these are found such responsible points as Union, Chester, Sumter, Trinity, Charleston, Sumter District, Marion Station, Bethel Charleston, and his last charge which was Central Florence. Nineteen of his forty years in the Conference were spent in the caties-Sumter, Marion and Charleston.

January 10, 1900, he was married to Miss Bertie Guyton and to them nine children were born, all of whom survive him. His sterling worth in the Conference was constantly seen and felt. Often when questions being discussed on the floor of the Conference became somewhat tangled he has been seen to secure the floor and slowly but surely untangle the situation and make very clear the main points at issue. He had church law at his finger tips and tongue's end and often which he did not know the law exactly he would say "Reasoning from anal gy it should be thus and so" and usually it was exactly that.

Many grave duties were committed to him. For many years he held the very responsible position of chairman of the Board of Missions. He was treasurer of the Sunday School Board. Three times he was elected

a delegate to the General Conferenc, 1918, 1922 and 1930. H served as a member of the Commission on Constitution, a member of the Board of Education, and for a number of years as a trustee of Wofford College. In 1919 he was given the honorary title of Doctor of Divinity by the South Carolina University. We have had no truer man in our ministry. A man who loved his Lord, loved the work and loved his brethen and his church and in turn held their highest confidence. In the spring of his second year at Central, Florence, where he had greatly endeated himself to the entire membership, he was taken sick. The best medical aid was given him and everything that a loyal church could do for a faithful pastor was done but in spite of all efforts he steadily grew worse. Any one who knew Melvin knows with what splendid faith and uncomplaining courage he bore his suffering, and it is coubtless true that many who saw him through these months were lifted thereby to a higher conception of Christian for itude.

Realizing his inability to do further work, he asked for the superancuate relation which was granted him at the Conference held in Sumter November 12, 1931; but this relation he held for less than a month for on December 8, 1931, he passed to his eternal home.

REV. HUGH WALKER WHITAKER

Hugh Walker Whitaker was born in Hart County, Ga., March 9, 1849. He went to his eternal reward February 25, 1932. He was the son of Rev. and Mis. D. L. Whitaker, his tather being an honored local preacher. From that home of deep religious influence came three ministers of the Gospel. These were the Rev. Milrord Flavius Whitaker, deceased, of the Texas Conterence; the Rev. G. R. Whitaker, of the South Carolina Conference; and the Rev. Hugh Walker Whitaker, of the South Carolina Conference to whom we pay tribule in this memoir. Beside these there was one other brother, J. Tally Whitaker who died some years ago.

Brother Whitaker had deep religious convictions from childhood and at an early age was converted and joined the Methodist Church. Perhaps the humble minister who received him into the Church had little idea of the long years of fish service he would give the Church as a minister of the Gospel.

He, after such preparation as local school could give, attended the Cokesbury Conference School under that master teacher, George F. Round. He did not have the opportunity of continuing his education through College, but by hard study through the years prepared himself for a life of great usefulness in the Church. Brother Whitaker joined the Conference in 1871, and his first appointments were those of lunior preacher on the Newberry and Cokesbury circuits. His service extended through the period of prostration following the Civil War, and the terrible days of Reconstruction, and on, equally divided between the years at the closing of the nineteenth century and thirty-two years of this twentieth century. He was the oldest member of either the

South Carolina or the Upper South Carolina Conference, both in point of age and years of service, having sixty-one years to his credit. In all he served twenty-eight charges during the long period of his ministry, covering all parts of the State, preaching in every county save one, and serving two chargs in North Carolina. A large part of his ministry was spent in Newbery county, and in adjacent territory, where at last he fell on sleep, known and loved by all.

On September 24, 1874, he was happily married to Miss Nancy Carrie Sligh, of Newberry. Through his lon gministry this good woman who became his bride while he was serving his third appontment, stood fathfully by his side and shared the hardships of this heroic man of God. For ffty-nne years together they served in humble employ of the Church, giving themselves unstintingly to the service of their Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, never counting the cost, but together pouring out their lives in devotion to the Church.

Eight children, all surviving, blessed their union: They are Mrs. C. A. Shumpert, Mrs. O. H. Lane, H. D. and W. S. Whitaker of Newberry; G. W. Whitaker of Williston, Prof Paul Whitaker of Bamberg; Rev. M. B. Whitaker of Hawkinsville, Ga.; and Lander Whitaker of Augusta, Ga.

His appointments were as follows: Newberry Ct., Junior preacher, 1872; Cokesbury Ct., Junior preacher, 1873; Eilington Ct., 1874; Located at close of 1874; Readmitted, 1877; North Newberry Ct., 1878; North Laurens, 1879; Conwayboro, 1880; Lexington Fork, 1881-82; Fort Mill, 1883-84; Tradesville, 1885; Chesterfield, 1886-87; Cypress, 1888; R'dgeville, 1889-1890; Saluda Ct., 1891; Abbeville Ct., 1892-93; Westminister, 1894; Transferred to N. C. Conference at close of 1894; Cumberland, N. C., 1895; Silver City, 1896; Supernumerary, 1897-98; Transferred back to S. C. at close of 1898; Walhaila, 1999; Saluda (Butler), 1900-1903; Verdery, 1904; McCormick, 1905; Prosperity, 1966-1909; Hickory Grove, 1910; Rock Hill Ct., 1911; Ehrhardt, 1912; Swansea, 1913; Supernumerary residing at Greeleyville and rendering able service in that territory, including Johnsonville, 1914-18; Superannuate, 1919; Dorchester, 1920-21; Cottageville, 1922-23; Grever, 1924-25; Superannuate residing at Newberry, 1926-1932.

The reading of this list of appointments shows not only the length of his ministry, but the hardships necessarily endured. On many of these charges his income was small, and nothwithstanding the fact that he had a family to support, he never left a charge in debt. Some years he received les than \$200 yet he never complained, but cheerfully went to his task

The ministry of Brother Whitaker was one in obedience to the vows of his ordination. He never asked for any preference to be shown him in his appointments. He was an necessant worker. He always found much that needed to be done. During his long ministry he not only was a faithful preacher and pastor, but he also bult many churches and parsonages. He always left his field of labor a better place than it was when he found it. He placed great emphasis upon being at his appointments on time, seldom did he ever miss an appointment, the roads

might be almost impassable, and the weather conditions bad, yet when the hour came he was always at his post of duty ready to proclaim the word of God. Of necessity he was away from home much of the time, but he never complained about his work being hard, but rather found into in serving his Lord.

Brother Whitaker's first and greatest conception of the ministry was the salvation of the lost. He enjoyed revival meetings. During the days of the Camp Meeting he was in great demand for he was recognized in the Conference as a preacher of great power. Truly he walked with God, and everyone who heard him preach recognized him as a man to whom God had given rare gifts and power. He prepared his sermons with great care, yet often he laid aside his notes and trusted to the inspiration of the moment. He delivered his sermons with great force, and without fear or favor, yet with great love, so that he was able in a marvelous way to get hold of men lost in sin and win them to Christ. Verily he led multitudes into the kingdom.

One may travel anywhere in the State of South Carolina and it would be difficult to find a community where he is not known and where he is not remembered. The traces of his work and labor are still in evidence in many places. The writer has often heard it said that "Brother Whitaker was our Pastor once and everybody loved him, he was not only a good preacher, but one of the most gifted men in prayer we have ever known." He loved people wherever he went, and in turn people loved him.

After his superarmustion in 1926 he came back to spend his last days in the same county where he had spent his first days in the minstry. He had many friends n Newberry. Perhaps there were but few, even children, in Newberry who did not know him and who at some time in their lives had not received a blessing from his rich life. He was not only honored and loved by the Methodists of Newberry, but by peotle of all denominations.

To Central Church he proved a blessing beyond words to express. He was faithful until death, he lived his Church, and his prayer which he made on the last Sunday he attended church was one which many shall never forget. The pastor had preached on the text, "From henceforth let no man trouble me for I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus." After he finished he called on Brother Whitaker to pray. The old hero of the Cross, battle-scarred with sixty-one years of service back in prayer, and moved the whole congregation to tears by his murvelous prayer. We did not know that this was his last day with us, but he left behind such a batediction that we shall never cease to give God thanks for his days spent among us.

His last days were days of great peace and quietness yet he longed to be up and doing. He felt that there were appointments he must keep, that there was work for him to do. Until he lapsed at last into do p unconsciousness he was greatly concerned about the Kingdom. His mind was ever turning to the Annual Conference. Truly there was light about him in the evening time, and joy in his heart when the Muster called him home.

REV. THOMAS BURNETT OWEN

On February 22, 1853, at Hartlepool, Durham Co., England, Thomas Burnett Owen was born. He was the son of Mr. John Owen and Mrs. Mary Hannah Owen. As a child he was educated in private schools, and then as a youth studied for two years in Walworth College, Pierremont Crescent, Darlington, Durham Co., England. While yet in his teens, he came with his father to America, and settled on a farm in Sumter County, South Carolina.

The call to preach came in childhood, and it grew into an abiding conviction that this was to be his life work. He was licensed to preach by the Sumter District Conference held in Lynchburg, S. C., in 1895, Rev. T. J. Clyde being presiding elder. Serving as a local preacher for some years, he was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference held in Darlington in December 1904, Bishop A. W. Wilson presiding. At the same time and place he was ordained deacon.

Brother Owen's appointments were as follows: Johnsonville, 1902-3; Santuc, 1904-06; Gaffney Ct., 1907-9; Belmont, 1910-11; East Chesterfield, 1912-15; Liberty Ct., 1916. At the close of 1916 he took the supernumerary relation, and in 1922 he was superannuated. Impaired health and increasing infirmities of age compelled release from active service. For six years he lived at Wilkesboro, N. C., and in 1923 he came to Chesterfield, S. C., where he spent the remaining years of his life.

On February 14, 1882, he was married to Miss Elizabeth Broadway of Clarendon county, S. C. She died January 4, 1902. Of this union two children survive to mourn the loss of their beloved father: Mrs. N. G. Broadway of Manning, S. C., and Mr. Thomas Reynolds Owen of Sumter, S. C. His second marriage, May 4, 1902, was to Mrs. Nannie O. Poston of Johnsonville, S. C. At the time of his death she was very ill, and passed away less than a month after her husband on August 3rd, 1932.

An older brother, the Rev. John Owen, was a leader much beloved in our Conference. A nephew, the Rev. William C. Owen, was also a highly useful member of our Conference and was for several years a very effective member of the staff of the General Sunday School Board of our entire Church, at Nashville, Tenn.

Two brothers yet live: Mr. Alfred Owen of Wilmington, N. C., and Mr. R. N. Owen of Orangeburg, S. C. Three of his sisters are still living: Mrs. E. S. Booth, of Boston, Mass., Mrs. Margaret Dixon and Mrs. Lizzie Johnson of London, England.

After a serious illness of several weeks, Brother Owen fell on sleep in Sumter, S. C., where he had been carried for hospital treatment. The date of his translation was July 13, 1932, just after 4 p. m. The next day the funeral service was held in the home of his son, Mr. T. R. Owen in Sumter, and his body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Andrew Chapel, between Summerton and Pinewood. His presiding elder, Rev. J. T. Fowler, of Florence, conducted the services, assisted by Dr. C. C. Herbert of Sumter, Dr. Wm. G. Moore of the First Baptist church,

Rev. R. R. Tucker of Oswego, Rev. Geo. W. Davis, of Rowesville, Rev. G. L. Ingram of Pinewood, Rev. J. A. Campbell of Manning, and the writer.

A man of vital religious experience in Christ, and with strong convictions concerning "the faith once delivered unto the saints," Brother Owen faithfully served his Lord in the pulpit and pastoral ministrations. Under his watchful care many were led to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Patient in suffering, he forgot not to trust in Him who had been both Saviour and Guide through the years. His end was in peace, and his life was an untold blessing to his family and a host of friends. In Christ was his "sure hope."

"O Lamb of God who reignest,
Thou bright and morning star,
Whose glory lightens that new earth
Which now we see from far;
O worthy Judge Eternal,
When thou dost bid us come,
Then open wide the gates of pearl
And call thy servants home."

REV. SAMUEL D. BAILEY

Since the meeting of our Annual Conference at Sumter another link which bound the present to the past has been broken. Wednesday morning, August 17th, at New Zion Rev. Samuel D. Bailey of the Conference Class of 1903 passed from labor to rest.

Brother Bailey had passed his seventy-third birthday. He was born in Newberry July 29, 1859, and grew to young manhood in Lexington county. He was the son of Rev. James H. and Mrs. Sarah Boozer Bailey. He was educated in the schools of Lexington and at Leesville High School. In addition, he studied under private tutors.

On December 22, 1896, he was happily married to Miss Mary Campbell. For thirty-five years this happy union continued till it was severed by death. To these parents were born T. B. Bailey of Funiac Springs, Fla.; Mrs. E. R. Poston of Poston, S. C.; Mrs. Cecil Keels of Marion, S. C.; J. H. and Herbert Bailey, of New Zion, S. C.

After having served several years as a supply, Brother Bailey was admitted on trial in 1903. As pastor he served the following charges: Camdon, St. John's, 1896-97; Wateree, 1898; Sumter Ct., 1899-1900; I'axville, 1901; Bethany, 1902-3; Jefferson, 1904; Jordan, 1905-6; Magnolia St., Sumter, 1907; Hickory Grove, 1908-9; Rock Hill Ct., 1910; Branchville, 1911; Kershaw, 1912-15; Pinewood, 1916; McBee, 1917-19; Blenheim, 1920-22; Johnsonville, 1923-24; Mullins Ct., 1925-27; Jefferson, 1928-29; New Zion, 1930-32.

As a workman in God's Kingdom Brother Bailey refused to be hindered by physical disability. While serving the Johnsonville charge, he returned to his pulpit and pastoral cuties within two weeks following an

apoplectic stroke. At New Zion he went untiringly about his divides with his blood pressure far above normal. He was determined.

As a preacher of the gospel he belonged to the old order. He lived to preach the fundamental doctrines of Methodism. Under the liftence of his preaching many were led to Christ and into the membership of the church.

In the midst of trying and discouraging circumstances. Broker Bailey refused to become disappointed. His humor was the saving of his life. He lifted many burdons with his humorous jokes and disposed a great deal of gloom with his sunny smile and cheerful dispositoin.

His life was so gentle and the elements so mixed in him that nature might stand up and say to all the world, "This was a man."

As a friend his nature knew no such things as treachery or lack of fidelity. Brother Bailey was a true man.

His nature beamed with kindness, his heart was large and warm. He was kind and leved his friends as he did his own life. For his friends he always had a kindly smile and warm hand clasp. He bnew no district; he made no slight remarks about any one. He carried an open and tender feeling in his heart for his friends. If ever he lost a friend he never knew it. He believed that,

"Life offers no joy like a friend; Fullillment and prophecy blend In a throb of a heart like our own, A heart where we know and are known."

The funeral was conducted from Trinity Church, Sumter, Thursday afternoon, August 18, by the writer, with G. F. Kirby, Presiding El er of the Sumter District, S. O. Cantey, Presiding Elder of the Orangeburg District, M. L. Banks, Pastor of College Place church, J. H. Graves, Presiding Elder of the Marion District, and Dr. E. O. Watson, Editor of the Southern Christian Advocate.

Following the funeral his body was buried near that of his old friend, F. H. Shuler, in the cemetery at Sumter, where he rests from duties well performed and cays well spent, leaving to his family the imperishable inheritance of a good name, which is rather to be chosen than gold.

We might well sum up his characteristics in these words:

In the home, he was kind;
In society, courteous;
In work, fair;
Toward the sick, cheerfulness;
Toward the weak, helpfulness;
Toward the penitont forgiveness;
Toward the strong trust;
Toward God, reverence, faithfulness and love."

REV. WALTER ISAAC HERBERT

Walter Isaac Herbert was born at Abbeville, S. C., April 6, 1864. After sixty-seven years consecrated, forty-seven of which were given in service as a preacher of the gospel, he passed to his reward on high, a few minutes before midnight, August 16, 1932.

Character of such exalted stature and a life of such fruitful service as was given to the world by this consecrated men of God and preacher of the everlasting gospel, are not the result of accidental circumstances. Such come through a combination of heritage, home surroundings, education and consecration. These forces met in Walter Herbert giving him a splendid body, handsome and strong; a pure heart and a clean life; a clear, strong mind; all fully consecrated through grace to the service of God.

Walter I. Herbert was well born of a noble line of high minded, cultured religious parents, Rev. Thes. G. Herbert, an honored member of the South Carclina Conference, and Harriet Bryce, a lovely personality who inherited the grace of her forbears. His life was shaped in a decidedly and definitely Christian home. His educational advantages were of the best in the elementary and high schools of the communities in which his father served as paster or presiding eller. His college education was at Wofford, of which institution he was an A.B. graduate in 1885. To all these gracious influences he gave ready response and eagerly used all in preparation for the service to which in early youth he realized God has called him. There were no days of wan ering, no prodigal sen experiences, in his life. While he appeared filled with the spirit of his birth, none the less he had a clear and definite experience which he delighted to tell of acceptance of Christ as a personal Savior and of conscious acceptance by him.

Licensed to preach a few weeks after his graduation from Wofford College in June, 1885, he was recommended for admission on trial into the South Carelina Conference, and was received into the traveling connection, in which indeed he had been born, December 10, 1885, at Columbia, S. C. His first appointment was Spartanburg City Mission, but during the year, to meet a Conference emergency, he was transferred to Cheraw station which he served most acceptably for the full period allowed. Other appointments were Union, 1890-91; Laurens, 1892-94; Florence, 1895-98; Newberry, 1899-1902; Main Street, Columbia, 1903-6; Trinity, Charleston, 1907; Charleston District, 1908-11; Sumter District, 1912-13; Commissioner of Education, 1914-15; Cokesbury District, 1916-17; Bethel, Spartanburg, 1918; Men's Club for Soldiers, Columbia, 1919; Marion Station, 1920-21; Bennettsville, 1922-25; Darlington, 1926-29; Bishopville, 1930-32.

He served the Conference in many positions of responsibility and trust such as the Board of Missions of which he was treasurer for eight years; trustee of Cokesbury Conference School; trustee of Epworth Orphanage for some twenty-five years; Chairman of the Board of Church Extension for twelve years; President of the South Carolina Mistorical Society; Trustee of Lake Junaluska. At the request of the Woman's Missionary Societies he wrote the story of the work of the

Woman's Missionary Society in South Carolina entitled "Fifty Wonderful Years."

June 26, 1889, he was happily married to Miss Constance T. Furman, of Greenville, S. C., who has been to him a true help-meet and inspiration through all the years, herself a leader in Woman's Work and President for some years past of the Conference organization, and active in every good work. The devoted wife with eight surviving sons and daughters cherish the memory of devoted husband and noble father. These whether in the Christian ministry, in the home life, missionary service, professional employ, or as teachers carry forward the high ideals of ancestry, training and consecration to service. One son, Thomas Carlisle, lies in a solcier's grave in St. Mihiel, France. One daughter, Constance, died in infancy and beside her grave the father's was made. One son, Rev. James Furman Herbert, is a member of the North Carolina Conference. A daughter, Anne Elizabeth, is a medical missionary in China. Two daughters are home makers, Frances, Mrs. H. H. Lester, of St. Louis, Mo., and Sarah, Mrs. Hughes Roberts, of Chase City, Va. Two are teachers in the public schools of the State, Miss Harriett Bryce Herbert, in Sumter, and Miss Dorothea Furman Herbert, in Bishopville. There are two other sons, Walter Chesley Herbert, of Atlanta, Ga., and Henry Williams Herbert, a medical student. These all fulfill the hopes and carry forward the traditions of their fathers.

Whether as pastor, presiding elder, board member, or in whatever position, Walter I. Herbert was always true to his trust and faithfully and efficiently discharged every obligation imposed upon him. His preaching was definitely evangelistic, clear and strong. He lived the gospel he professed and preached. Precious is the heritage he leaves family and friends. He was an outstanding leader in his Conference and Church, and one of the most widely and best loved of the preachers of his generation regardless of denominational lines. He received freely of the heritage of ancestry, culture and grace, and freely gave all in the service for his Lord. He was unabating in energetic service to the very last. He worked up to the day of his planned and accustomed summer vacation to be spent at Junaluska and carefully arranged for his charge during the expected vacation. He entered upon it with delight and greatly enjoyed the few days at Junaluska before the sudden attack that hurled him to a Greenville hospital where an emergency operation was performed from which he did not rally. He loved life and delighted in its friendships, associations and opportunities of service. He would gladly have served on. But when the sudden summons came, he was ready. He met death, if death it be to pass to larger life, as calmly and as bravely as he had met the issues of life. Servant of God, well done. Burial was in Elmwood cemetery, Columbia, S. C. E. O. WATSON.

REV. HENRY LEE SINGLETON

Henry Lee Singleton, son of Miles P. and Martha J. Singleton, was born at Easley, S. C., April 4, 1868. His education was in the primary and grammar schools of the county from which he went to Leesville

College of which Prof. Lawson B. Haynes was then president. Later he attended Wofford College and im 1903 he took a lecture course at Vanderbilt in further preparation for his life work.

He had felt the call to the ministry in his youth and after his eighteenth year and though teaching school for several years was busily engaged in preparation for the work to which he was called and to which he gladly gave himself. He was licensed to preach in 1899. Ordination to deacons and elems order followed in the regular course, 1901 and 1903.

Charges served by him were: Marion Ct. and Mills, 1900; Loris and Little River, 1901; Mt. Carmel. 1902; Harpers, 1903-04; Bucksville, 1905-06; Blackstock, 1907-08; Lancaster Ct., 1909; Loris, 1910.

While serving the Bucksville charge, he was married, 1906, to Miss Mary Carolyn Butler, of the Camp Swamp section, near Loris. It was the writer's privilege, then his presiding elder, to perform the ceremony that united the lives of these two noble souls whose devotion to each other was a beautiful thing. Frequently in their parsonage home at Bucksville beside the beautiful Waccamaw River he enjoyed association with the happy young couple as with common hopes they projected their united lives into a future of expected service. Only a few years however did health allow Brother Singleton to continue regularly in the active service of the ministry. Broken in health, where many a man would have asked supermonutation, at the close of the year 1910, he took the supernumerary relation and struggled at such work as he was able to do to make a liwing without being placed upon the list of the superannuates. With communed and increasingly broken health, he took the superannuate melation at the Conference session in Mullins, 1930.

Through these twenty-two years he suffered greatly. Yet through all even as his Lord, was made perfect. As the body became weaker, the soul became stronger. At last the brave spirit was released from the suffering body and September 8, 1932, went home to God.

Brave heart, noble soul, he bore the disappointment of not being able to cary on in his loved employ as an active minister with patient faith. The memory of his genial spirit and pleasant companionship will linger long in the memory of those of us who knew him in the days of his active service.

Surviving are his widow and two daughters, Mrs. Worth B. (Lillian Lucille) Suggs, and Annie Lee.

Funeral services were conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. J. H. Graves, assisted by his pastor, Rev. Paul T. Wood. Burial was in the Patterson cemetery, Loris.
