SPARTANBURG, SC – Wofford had two players rush for over 100 yards each and the Terriers piled up 413 yards on the ground in posting a 34-24 win over NAIA-member Georgetown (Ky.) College on Saturday night in the season opener for both teams.

Michael Hobbs rushed for 115 yards, Gabriel Jackson added 104 yards and Corey Dunn ran for a pair of touchdowns in leading the Terriers to their fifth consecutive home-opening win. Dunn scored on a 3-yard run midway through the first quarter to stake Wofford (1-0) to a 7-0 lead. The Terriers extended the lead to 14-0 when Alex Love blocked a Georgetown (0-1) punt and Kyle Horne recovered in the end zone for a touchdown. Jackson rushed for 88 yards on four carries in the first quarter alone.

The Terriers extended their lead to 21-0 when Aaron Johnson scored on a 2-yard run with 9:49 remaining in the half.

Georgetown earned its first touchdown with 6:11 left in the second quarter when quarterback Jeff Smith hit David Penland on a 52-yard pass. The Terriers took the ensuing kickoff and drove 72 yards with Brandon Berry scoring on a reverse with 3:51 left in the half. Wofford kicker Nick Robinson missed the extra point to leave the Terriers with a 27-7 lead.

Georgetown cut the lead to 27-14 at halftime when Jeff Smith threw 20 yards to C.R. Rohrbough for a score with 37 seconds left.

The Tigers drew to 27-17 on their opening drive of the second half as Micah White converted a 33-yard field goal. Wofford was stopped on downs on each of its next three possessions, failing to convert on fourth down on each occasion.

Georgetown closed to within three points at 27-24 with 5:59 left in the game when Smith threw his third touchdown pass of the contest, hitting Adam Russell from 3 yards out. The Terriers then drove 70 yards in 11 plays as Dunn scored on a 6-yard run with 1:43 left in the game. Dunn carried five times for 33 yards on the drive, including a crucial 7 yard run on a fourth and three from the Georgetown 31.

A desperation pass by Smith was intercepted by the Terriers' Brian Ford at Wofford's 8 yard line and the Terriers were able to run out the clock by taking a knee on the final three plays of the game.

Wofford quarterback Josh Collier, making his first career start, completed 4 of 17 passes for 35 yards. Smith finished 26 of 41 for 271 yards and three touchdowns. He was sacked twice and intercepted twice.

"We faced a heckuva football team," said Wofford head coach Mike Ayers. "Those guys know how to win and they know how to play for championships. They tested us and that will make us better. We were challenged. We had opportunities that we wasted but I'm proud of our kids and proud of our effort. The coaching staff did a good job in getting the team ready to play."

Wofford will travel to West Virginia to take on the Big East club next Saturday night at 6 p.m.

**The Story Line:** Wofford will visit West Virginia on Saturday, Sept. 10 for a 6 o'clock kickoff at Mountaineer Field at Milan Puskar Stadium . . . Wofford enters the game ranked 22nd in the Sept. 5 NCAA Division I-AA poll by The Sports Network . . . The Terriers are coming off a season-opening 34-24 win over Georgetown, Ky. . . . West Virginia also won its opener, posting a 15-7 win at Syracuse on Sunday, Sept. 4.

The Coaches: Wofford head coach Mike Ayers (Georgetown, Ky. '74), the winningest coach in school history, is in his 18th season with the Terriers and has a record of 111-80-1... He is in his 21st year as a college head coach with an all-time record of 122-101-2 that includes a three-year stint as the head coach at East Tennessee State from 1985-87... Ayers has earned Southern Conference Coach of the Year honors five times in the last five years, being so honored by the league coaches in 2000 and 2003 and by the media in 2000, '02 and '03... Over the last three years, Ayers has led the Terriers to a 29-8 overall record and an 18-5 league mark including a conference championship and an appearance in the Division I-AA national semifinals in 2003.

West Virginia head coach **Rich Rodriguez** (West Virginia '86) is in his fifth year with the Mountaineers and has a record of 30-21-0 . . . He is in his 13th year as a college head coach with a record of 74-57-2 . . . Rodriguez spent the 1988 season as the head coach at Salem College and posted a 2-8 record despite the fact that the college had announced it was dropping football at the end of the season . . . He then spent seven seasons as the head coach at Glenville State, posting a 43-28-2 record with four conference championships and two NAIA playoff appearances . . . Rodriguez was the offensive coordinator at Clemson in 1999 and 2000.

Series vs. West Virginia: This will be first meeting ever between Wofford and West Virginia.

Wofford Players of the Week: Offense: Corey Dunn, a 5-11, 205-pound senior from Lexington, KY (P.L. Dunbar) rushed 15 times for 94 yards and two touchdowns in leading Wofford to a 34-24 win over Georgetown on Saturday night . . . Dunn scored Wofford's first touchdown of the night on a three-yard run with 6:21 to play in the first quarter . . . He also tallied the last touchdown of the night on a six-yard run that cemented the win for the Terriers . . . With a slim 27-24 lead, The Terriers started at their own 30 and drove 70 yards in 11 plays . . . Dunn picked up seven yards on a crucial fourth-and-three during the drive . . . He carried five times for 39 yards on the drive . . . Defense: Jim Thurman, a 6-2, 214-pound senior inside linebacker from Hixson, TN (Red Bank), recorded seven tackles, a half-sack, forced one fumble and had a pass breakup against Georgetown on Saturday.

About West Virginia: Though Wofford and West Virginia have never met on the gridiron, the two schools do share a common history . . . While their tenures did not overlap, both teams have been members of the Southern Conference . . . West Virginia was a member of the SoCon from 1950-1967 and won eight conference championships . . . Wofford joined the SoCon prior to the 1997 season . . . The Terriers won the SoCon football title in 2003 . . . Among the top Mountaineers to have earned All-SoCon honors were Chuck Howley who went on to earn MVP honors in Super Bowl V, becoming the first defender and the first player from a losing team to earn the honor . . . Current WVU associate athletic Director Garrett Ford was a two-time All-SoCon running back . . . Former Mountaineer and Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee Sam Huff is another WVU athlete who starred in the Southern Conference. . . . The Mountaineers are members of the Big East Conference and have won two straight Big East championships and played in a bowl game in each of the last three years and in seven of the last nine years . . . WVU dropped a 30-18 decision to Florida State in the 2005 Toyota Gator Bowl.

**Noting the Georgetown game:** Wofford opened its season with a 34-24 win over NAIA-member Georgetown College on Sept. 3 . . . Wofford rushed for 413 yards, the most in a season-opener since gaining 476 against Newberry in 2002 . . . Two Terriers cleared the 100-yard hurdle as sophomore Michael Hobbs gained a careerhigh 115 yards and Gabriel Jackson picked up 104 yards including 88 in the first half . . . Senior Corey Dunn collected 94 yards on 15 carries and scored twice including a six-yard run with 1:43 left in the game to cement the win . . . Sophomore quarterback Josh Collier made his first career start and completed four of 17 passes for 35 yards.

**Hobbs exceeds '04 total:** With 115 net yards in the season opener, sophomore Michael Hobbs exceeded his rushing total from his freshman season . . . Hobbs had 15 carries for 104 yards as a freshman . . . Against Georgetown, Hobbs picked up 115 yards on 21 carries.

**Terrier Tales:** Wofford's 17 pass attempts against Georgetown were the most by the Terriers in a game since Oct.

12, 2002 when Wotford attempted 22 passes . . . It marked the most pass attempts in a span of 28 games . . . Wofford's 74 rushing attempts matched the 2004 season high of 74 set against Elon on Oct. 9 . . . Josh Collier completed four passes against Georgetown in his first career start . . . In 2004 as a reserve, he completed four passes the entire season . . . Left guard Derek Tiller led all Wofford offensive linemen with 29 knockdown blocks against Georgetown . . . He also graded out at 90.4 percent for the game . . . Inside linebacker Justin Bell led the Terriers with eight tackles against Georgetown . . . That is the same number of tackles he had during the 2004 season . . . Halfback Gabriel Jackson's 104 yards rushing against Georgetown marked his second career 100-yard game behind last year's career-best 170-yard effort against The Citadel.

DB Colby Harris missed the opener after suffering a concussion during training camp and is not expected to play this week . . . OT Davy Olmsted continues to recover from arthroscopic surgery on a knee during preseason camp and is getting closer to returning to the field.. . . Senior free safety Shaun Bennett tore his right Achilles tendon early in an Aug. 21 scrimmage and is out for the year . . . Bennett was attempting a comeback from a torn left Achilles tendon that he suffered in last year's preseason and cost him the entire 2004 season . . . Junior halfback Demetrick Swindler, a 5-10, 175-pound junior halfback, suffered a torn ACL on Aug. 22 and will miss the 2005 campaign . . . TE Justin Pinckney had knee surgery before the season started and is not expected to play this year.

**Bethay on Buchanan Watch List:** Wofford senior nose tackle Katon Bethay (Milton, Wis.) is one of just 16 players in NCAA Division I-AA named to the preseason Buchanan Award Watch List . . . Bethay, a 6-2, 285-pound senior, was ranked by The Sports Network in the preseason as the number four defensive tackle in the nation . . . Bethay was fourth on the team with 71 tackles in 2004 while earning second team All-Southern Conference honors as well as CoSIDA Academic All-District accolades.

**Terriers on TV:** Wofford will make four TV appearances during the 2005 football season . . . The SoCon opener with Georgia Southern on Sept. 17 will be televised live from Gibbs Stadium on Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS) . . . The Oct. 22 home game with Appalachian State will also be carried live by CSS . . . The Terriers will appear on South Carolina Educational TV on Oct. 29 when they visit The Citadel . . . The Nov. 12 contest at Furman will be carried live nationally by College Sports TV (CSTV).

Terriers in the polls: Wofford fell one spot in the Sept. 5 edition of *The Sports Network* I-AA poll . . . Ranked 21st in the preseason poll, the Terriers are #22 this week . . . This marks the 37th consecutive TSN poll in which the Terriers have been ranked, dating back to Oct. 21, 2002 . . . Senior Corey Dunn collected 94 yards on 15 carries and scored twice including a six-yard run with 1:43 left in the game to cement the win . . . Sophomore quarterback Josh Collier made his first career start and completed four of 17 passes for 35 yards.

**About Georgia Southern:** Georgia Southern is the nation's most successful NCAA Division I-AA football program . . . The Eagles have six national championships (1985, '86, '89, '90, '99 and 2000) . . . GSU is 38-8 all-time in postseason games, also an NCAA record, as is its eight championship game appearances . . . Since joining the Southern Conference prior to the 1993 football season, the Eagles have won or shared the conference championship in eight times in those 12 seasons . . . Those eight league titles are tied for third all-time in SoCon history behind Furman's 12 championships and Duke's 10.

Scouting The Eagles: Georgia Southern enters Saturday's game with a 1-1 record following a 23-20 home loss to McNeese State on Saturday... The Eagles won their season opener on Sept. 3 by posting a 41-38 overtime win at Northeastern...GSU scored the go-ahead touchdown with 1:08 remaining in the game against McNeese State but a holding call nullified the score ... A subsequent sack pushed GSU out of field goal range and it was unable to convert a fourth-and-35 ... Jermaine Austin rushed for 129 yards to mark his 25th career 100-yard rushing game ... QB Jayson Foster added 108 yards on the ground ... The Eagles are averaging 382.5 yards rushing per game and 430.5 total offense yards ... The Eagles enter Saturday's game with the SoCon's top two rushers ... Austin is averaging a league-best 164.0 YPG while Foster is rushing at a 125.0 clip ... GSU's Dan Jordan leads the SoCon with a 41.7 punting average ... LB John Mohring is second in the SoCon with 22 tackles through the first two games.

**Wofford, Georgia Southern share 3-year supremacy:** Over the last three years, Wofford and Georgia Southern have posted the Southern Conference's top records... Both teams are 18-5 in conference games over the last three years... Over that period, the Terriers are 29-8 overall and Georgia Southern is 27-10... Furman is 24-12 (16-7 SoCon) over the last three years while Appalachian State is 21-13 (16-7 SoCon).

**Terriers vs. nationally-ranked opponents:** Since the start of the 2002 season, Wofford is 8-6 against nationally-ranked Division I-AA opponents . . . The highest ranked team the Terriers have defeated in that time period was #6 Georgia Southern by a score of 20-14 on Sept. 20, 2003 . . . Wofford also defeated the ninth-ranked Eagles 14-7 in 2002.

Last meeting vs. Georgia Southern: Eighth-ranked Georgia Southern posted a 58-14 win at home over third-ranked Wofford on Sept. 18, 2004 . . . The Eagles (2-1, 1-0) rushed for 313 yards in the game as Brandon Andrews rushed for 113 yards and three touchdowns while guarterback Chaz williams rushed for one score and threw for two more . . . The Eagles jumped out to a 38-0 halftime lead snapped Wofford's 11-game regular season winning streak . . . It was the Eagles' first win over the Terriers since 2001 . . . The defeat was Wofford's first in the SoCon since Nov. 16, 2002 and just the third league loss since the start of the 2002 campaign . . . DB Alex Love blocked an Eagle punt in the third quarter for the fourth punt block of his career . . . It set up a 7-yard Mike Jones touchdown run to cap a 7-play, 50-yard drive . . . Wofford sophomore quarterback Josh Collier made his collegiate debut when he entered the game in the fourth quarter . . . He tossed a 15-yard touchdown pass to Colby Harris, who had three receptions for 45 yards in the game . . . Gabriel Jackson had a 47yard run to set up the score . . . Terrier quarterbacks combined to complete 8-of-12 passes for 71 yards.

Hall of Fame Night: Saturday before the Georgia Southern game, three former Wofford athletic standouts will be inducted into the Wofford College Athletic Hall of Fame . . . Former Wofford basketball standouts Stephon Blanding '90 and Brenda Jackson '94, as well as All-America golfer Darrell Brown '86, have been selected by a committee of the Terrier Club Board of Directors as the 2005 inductees into the Hall of Fame . . . Also being inducted are Gordon Orr as an honorary letterman and Cleveland Harley '50 as the Distinguished Serve Award recipient . . . The ceremony will take place at halftime of Saturday night's game.

Noting the West Virginia game: Wofford dropped a 35-7 loss at West Virginia on Sept. 10 . . . The Terriers trailed 28-0 before Michael Hobbs scored on a one-yard run with 2:05 to play in the third quarter . . . The score was setup by a 48-yard pass from Josh Collier to Shiel Wood that gave the Terriers a first and goal at the WVU 13 . . . OLB Derek Newberry suffered a grade 3 concussion less than two minutes into the game and was taken off the field on a stretcher . . . Newberry remained overnight in Morgantown for observation and is expected to miss the Georgia Southern game on Sept. 17 . . . Freshman punter Chris Tommie averaged 44.3 yards on six punts with four of those punts covering 50 or more yards including a season-long 60 yarder . . . The Terriers were held to 78 yards rushing, marking the fewest rushing yards in a game since being held to 88 yards by Air Force in the 2003 season opener.

**SoCon Stat Leaders:** Wofford's Michael Hobbs is fourth in the SoCon with 77.5 yards rushing per game . . . Brian Kemp is second in the conference in kickoff return average at 21.0 per game . . . Chris Tommie's 40.7 punting average is third-best in the SoCon . . . Brian Ford's 17 tackles is tied for eighth in the league . . . Derek Newberry is tied for the league lead with one fumble recovery.

Injury Report: RB Gabriel Jackson did not play against West Virginia while nursing a sore hamstring... He is expected to be back at full strength against Georgia Southern on Sept. 17... Derek Newberry will miss the GSU game after suffering a grade 3 concussion against West Virginia... OT Davy Olmsted dressed for the West Virginia game but did not see action... He should be available this week against Georgia Southern as he continues to recover from arthroscopic surgery on a knee during preseason camp and is getting closer to returning to the field.... Senior free safety Shaun Bennett tore his right Achilles tendon early in an Aug. 21 scrimmage and is out for the year... Bennett was attempting a comeback from a torn left Achilles tendon that he suffered in last year's preseason and cost him the entire 2004 season... Junior halfback Demetrick Swindler, a 5-10, 175-pound junior halfback, suffered a torn ACL on Aug. 22 and will miss the 2005 campaign... TE Justin Pinckney had knee surgery before the season started and is not expected to play this year.

**Bethay on Buchanan Watch List:** Wofford senior nose tackle Katon Bethay (Milton, Wis.) is one of just 16 players in NCAA Division I-AA named to the preseason Buchanan Award Watch List... Bethay, a 6-2, 285-pound senior, was ranked by The Sports Network in the preseason as the number four defensive tackle in the nation . . . Bethay was fourth on the team with 71 tackles in 2004 while earning second team All-Southern Conference honors as well as CoSIDA Academic All-District accolades.

**Terriers on TV:** Wofford will make four TV appearances during the 2005 football season . . . The SoCon opener with Georgia Southern on Sept. 17 will be televised live from Gibbs Stadium on Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS) . . . The Oct. 22 home game with Appalachian State will also be carried live by CSS . . . The Terriers will appear on South Carolina Educational TV on Oct. 29 when they visit The Citadel . . . The Nov. 12 contest at Furman will be carried live nationally by College Sports TV (CSTV).

Terriers in the polls: Wofford was included in the "also receiving votes" category of both *The Sports Network* and the ESPN/SportsTicker poll on Sept. 12 . . . That ended a string of 37 consecutive weeks that Wofford had been ranked among the nation's top 25 football teams . . . The Terriers were ranked 21st in the preseason poll and #22 on Sept. 5 . . . Wofford's streak started on Oct. 21, 2002 . . . Wofford's 37-week streak was the SoCon's longest . . . Georgia Southern (20 weeks) and Furman (16 weeks) now own the league's longest streaks . . . Montana currently has the nation's longest streak at 93 consecutive weeks dating back to 1998.

Wofford Football Illustrated: The weekly TV highlights show, hosted by WSPA-TV sports anchor Todd Summers and featuring Wofford head coach Mike Ayers, airs each Sunday at 12:30 p.m. on WASV, UPN 62 in the Upstate of South Carolina . . . Wofford Football Illustrated airs three times each week on Comcast Cable in Charleston, SC at 1 p.m. and 10 p.m. on Wednesdays and 9:00 p.m. on Thursdays.

**Around the SoCon:** After an 8-1 week of non-conference play on the first weekend of the season, SoCon teams met with less success this past weekend . . . Wofford, Appalachian State and The Citadel all lost to NCAA Division I-A opponents . . . Elon defeated Savannah State and Chattanooga

moved to 2-0 with a 21-18 win over #21 Jacksonville State . . . Western Carolina leaped into first place in the SoCon with a 41-21 win over Furman.

Love to block kicks: Wofford senior defensive back Alex Love blocked a punt against Georgetown that resulted in Wofford's second touchdown of the game . . . The block was the sixth of Love's career . . . In 2004, Love blocked a punt against Georgia Southern and a field goal attempt against Furman . . . In '03, the special teams standout blocked a punt that was recovered for a touchdown against South Carolina State in the season opener . . . He also added a blocked punt against Appalachian State . . . As a freshman in 2002 Love blocked a punt against Furman.

On Wofford's previous series, Johnson ran up the middle from five yards out to even the game at 14-14 with 8:19 remaining. The Terrier defense, with All-America free safety **Matt Nelson** making the tackle on each play, then forced a three-and-out from the Eagles to set the stage for the game-winning drive.

**Jesse McCoy** rushed for a game-high 114 yards and scored both Terrier touchdowns, the last on a 4th-and-goal carry from the 1-yard line, to lift Wofford to a 14-7 victory over No. 8 Georgia Southern.

The Terriers' first-ever win at Paulson Stadium also snapped a string of 29 consecutive regular season home wins and 20 straight Southern Conference home victories for the Eagles, who last dropped a league contest Nov. 2, 1996 to East Tennessee State.

The seven points was the lowest scoring total for a Georgia Southern team at Paulson Stadium since being shutout 21-0 by Troy State on Nov. 14, 1992 -- a span of 67 home contests.

The Wofford defense limited the Eagles to 234 yards rushing and 257 total.

McCoy's 30-yard touchdown run with 4:08 left in the first quarter gave Wofford a 6-0 lead that stood until the fourth quarter.

Zolman added 74 yards on the ground, 54 coming on a pivotal 3rd-and-3 play from the Wofford 43-yard line midway through the fourth quarter to highlight the Terriers' game-winning 10-play, 81-yard drive.

Zolman had a 20-yard completion to **Isaac Goodpaster** on a 3rd-and-13 from the Terrier 16 earlier on that series. He later added his keeper to set up McCoy's go-ahead score. Zolman then ran for the two-point conversion to extend the Terriers' lead to 14-7.

### Blanding, Brown and Jackson selected to Wofford Athletic Hall of Fame; Orr and Harley receive special awards

Former Wofford basketball standouts Stephon Blanding '90 and Brenda Jackson '94, as well as All-America golfer Darrell Brown '86, have been selected by a committee of the Terrier Club Board of Directors as the 2005 inductees into the Wofford College Athletic Hall of Fame.

Gordon Orr is this year's Honorary Letterman while Cleveland Harley '50 is the Distinguished Service Award recipient.

Induction ceremonies will take place Sept. 17, prior to the Wofford football team's 7 p.m. home game versus Georgia Southern

The Hall of Fame recognizes "those former athletes and coaches who, by outstanding athletic achievements and service, have made lasting and significant contributions to the cause of sports at Wofford College, the Spartanburg community, South Carolina and the nation."

Blanding places 12th on Wofford's career scoring list with 1,454 points. He was a four-year starter and three-year team captain.

A native of Sumter, S.C., Blanding ranked fourth nationally in Division II when he averaged 13.1 rebounds as a junior in the 1988-89 campaign. He led Wofford in scoring, rebounding and field-goal percentage as a sophomore. Blanding was named the NAIA District Six Player of the Week after averaging 27.3 points and 11.6 rebounds in leading the Terriers to a 3-0 record.

Blanding averaged a team-best 10.9 rebounds while scoring at a 12.1 clip his freshman year. He also topped the Terriers that season in blocked shots (38), field-goal percentage (61.0) and free-throw percentage (76.3).

Blanding closed his Wofford athletic career as a defensive end for the football team in the 1990 season, helping lead the Terriers to the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Brown was a two-time NAIA All-America and a three-time participant in the NAIA National Championships, placing fifth as a sophomore and third his senior year. The Woodruff, S.C., native was the 1985 and 1986 NAIA District 6 Medalist. He helped lead Wofford to the 1986 District 6 title.

Jackson is the Wofford women's basketball career rebounding leader (1,076) and No. 5 all-time scorer (1,537 points). She's the lone Wofford player to reach the 1,000 mark in both career points and rebounds. In fact, no other Terrier women's player has 1,000 boards. Jackson also ranks second in career steals (237).

A native of Abbeville, S.C., Jackson tied the Wofford single-game rebounding record with 20 against Newberry (Jan. 8, 1992). Her career rebounding average of 10.3 is nearly a full board better than the next closest player (Wofford Hall of Fame member Meg Hunt, 9.4, 1980-84). Jackson posted three of the top five single-season rebounding averages in Terrier history.

Jackson ranks fifth in career scoring average at 14.8 points, including a career-best 16.4 her senior year when she helped lead Wofford to the 1994 NCAA Division II Tournament. The Terriers had a 71-35 record in her four years on campus.

The Honorary Letterman Award recognizes those non-lettermen who through their dedicated service and loyal support have been instrumental in the growth and development of Wofford's athletic program.

Orr has become a fixture at Terrier home athletic events with his Carolina Trader line of Wofford apparel. Proceeds from each sale are earmarked for the Terrier Club. Over \$100,000 has been raised in scholarship support for Wofford student-athletes through Orr.

Also a 1989 Honorary Letterman, Harley is just the second individual to receive both special awards from the Wofford Athletic Hall of Fame. He has been an enthusiastic volunteer and generous supporter of Wofford for over 50 years.

In 1946, Harley was one of the founding members of the Terrier Club. He served the longest tenure of any Terrier Club president when he held office from 1962-70.

Harley and his wife, Curtis, created the Cleveland S. and Curtis R. Harley Endowed Scholarship Fund in 1997.

## Wofford 21, Georgia Southern 17 Saturday, September 17, 2005

SPARTANBURG, SC – Wofford fullback Michael Hobbs rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns and the Terriers gained 354 yards on the ground in defeating Georgia Southern 21-17 Saturday night at Gibbs Stadium.

Wofford (2-1, 1-0) became the first team in 59 games, dating back to November, 2000, to rush for over 300 yards against the Eagle defense.

Wofford quarterback Josh Collier rushed for a career-high 91 yards and scored his first career touchdown. Georgia Southern (1-2, 0-1), which rushed for 292 yards, was led by quarterback Jayson Foster who carried 15 times for 121 yards and one touchdown. Jermaine Austin, Georgia Southern's fullback, was held to 87 yards rushing, ending a streak of six straight 100-yard games dating back to last season. Austin also lost three fumbles on the night.

Georgia Southern scored on its first possession, taking the ball at the Wofford 32 following a minus-1 yard punt by the Terriers. GSU's Lynon Jefferson scored on an 11-yard run to put the Eagles up 7-0.

Georgia Southern's ensuing kickoff went out of bounds and the Terriers started at their own 35-yard line. The Terriers tied the game at 7 when Hobbs scored on a 4-yard run with 6:23 left in the half. The touchdown was the first of Hobbs' career.

Georgia Southern's Jayson Foster put the Eagles back in front 14-7 with 4:10 to play in the half when he scored on a 1-yard plunge.

Wofford tied the game early in the second half. Georgia Southern's Jermaine Austin fumbled on the second play of the half and Wofford defensive end Erik Hutchinson recovered at the GSU 40. Wide receiver Brandon Berry carried for 37 yards down to the 3 before being knocked out of bounds. Two plays later, Collier pushed the ball over from the 1 to tie the game at 14 with 13:28 to play in the third quarter.

The Terriers took a 21-14 lead with 7:41 to play in the third. Hobbs scored his second touchdown of the game on a three-yard run. Collier had kept the drive alive when he raced 27 yards on a third and two from his own 38.

Georgia Southern's Jonathan Dudley converted a 37-yard field goal with 7:50 to play in the game to pull the Eagles within four at 21-17.

With 6:03 left in the game, the Eagles appeared to have the Terriers stopped as Collier was dropped for a 1 yard loss on a 3<sup>rd</sup> and 3. But Georgia Southern was whistled for a personal foul that gave the Terriers a first down at the GSU 31. A.J. Bryant ended the drive when he intercepted a Collier pass with 4:50 to play, giving the Eagles the ball at their own 11.

Georgia Southern advanced across midfield but Wofford's Josh Smith forced a fumble from Austin with 2:04 left, giving the ball back to the Terriers.

Wofford drove to the GSU 34 before the Eagles stopped Collier on a fourth and inches and took over with 58 seconds left in the game. Foster completed one pass and took the Eagles to midfield but was sacked by Kyle Horne with 18 seconds left. Georgia Southern was able to get off one final pass that was incomplete.

The Terriers' first points of the game came on an **Hondre McNeil** sack of Moc quarterback **Cos DeMatteo** in the end zone for a safety. McNeil then sacked DeMatteo on Chattanooga's first two plays of the ensuing series to give him three sacks on the night.

SPARTANBURG, SC - Wofford fullback Michael Hobbs rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns and the Terriers gained 354 yards on the ground in defeating Georgia Southern 21-17 Saturday night at Gibbs Stadium.
