FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Central Methodist Church,
Spartanburg, S. C., October 20, 1954.

Memorial Session—The Memorial Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, was called to order by Bishop Costen J. Harrell of the Charlotte Area in Central Methodist Church, Spartanburg, S. C., at 2:00 P.M. October 20, 1954. An order of worship prepared for the service was used. Mrs. W. C. FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING

Wofford College Chapel,
October 20, 1954.

Opening—The one hundred and sixty-ninth session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, was called to order by Bishop Costen J. Harrell, of the Charlotte Area. The hymn, No. 248, "Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross," was sung

followed by prayer, which was led by T. F. Reid. Special music was provided by a male quartette.

Record of Attendance—Bishop Harrell introduced Acting Secretary, W. C. Stackhouse, who moved that the attendance be recorded on cards prepared for the purpose and that these enrollment cards constitute the official record of attendance. Cards were distributed and gathered up, showing that there were 406 ministerial members, including those on trial and Approved Supplies, and 272 lay members present.

The next item presented was pertaining to the Standing Resolution concerning the payment of **two percent of salaries**. The item of travel and expense fund is to be included in the total upon which the two percent is to be paid. Adopted.

The sentence beginning on line nine and the rest of the paragraph was deleted except the last sentence which was changed to state that a minister on trial who is discontinued may request a refund of the amounts he has paid in on this fund. Adopted.

Book on Sidney Lanier—Adlai C. Holler was recognized to make a statement on behalf of R. E. Sharp, who was unable to attend Conference on account of the illness of his wife. R. E. Sharp has had the book of Essays on Sidney Lanier, by Dr. Henry Nelson Snyder reprinted and wants every member of the Conference, both clerical and lay, to have a copy. Copies were available at the doors.

Report of the Board of Evangelism—The report of the Board of Evangelism was presented by J. F. Lupo. Dr. Walter C. Gum, superintendent of the Richmond District, Virginia Conference was presented and spoke to the report, after which it was adopted.

Motion—C. O. Bell moved that J. F. Lupo be relected Conference Director of Evangelism, this being a nomination from the Board of Evangelism. He was elected.

Methodist Publishing House—Bishop Harrell presented Mr. A. R. White, Manager of the Richmond Branch of the Methodist Publishing House. Mr. White addressed the Conference briefly and presented to Bishop Harrell a check for \$6,434.61 as the South Carolina Conference's share in the profits of the Publishing House. This check was turned over to Adlai C. Holler, Chairman of the Board of Conference Claimants to be used in payment of pensions to retired ministers and their widows.

Board of Pensions—Dr. A. T. McIlwain, Executive Secretary of the Missouri Corporation, of the General Board of Pensions, was introduced to the Conference. He spoke of the work of the Board of Pensions and its payments to the South Carolina Conference. He commended the South Carolina Conference for its liberal support of the pension program.

The Chair—S. D. Newell was called to the chair during a temporary absence of Bishop Harrell.

Board of Temperance—H. C. Ritter presented Rev. Howard McLain of the Christian Action Council, who brought greetings to the Conference, after which R. B. Way presented the report of the Board of Temperance. Adopted (see reports).

Temperance Address—H. C. Ritter presented Rev. Norman Lovein, Superintendent of the Valdosta District, South Georgia Conference, who spoke on the subject, "The Dangers of Beverage Alcohol."

Privileged Matter—E. E. Glenn was recognized by Bishop Harrell for the purpose of making some introductions to the Conference. Mr. M. L. Meadors, Sr., was introduced and on behalf of Central Metho-

Amendment—An amendment was offered by W. W. Fridy that such report be made available 24 hours prior to the opening of Conference. This was accepted by G. A. Baker.

Substitute Motion—R. C. Griffith moved that the report be placed in the hands of the delegates at least 30 days before the opening of Conference. Seconded.

Vote on Substitute—Not carried.

Vote on original motion as amended—adopted.

Jenkins Orphanage—Rev. Paul G. Daniels, president of Jenkins Orphanage, was introduced to the Conference. Following a short talk an offering was made amounting to \$316.59 for the institution he represented.

Leave of Absence—Granted to T. F. Evatt to attend funeral; to T. L. McMinn to return to military duties; to W. T. Waters to attend a wedding; to L. W. Shealey to attend a funeral; to V. R. Hickman to attend a funeral; to M. W. Lever to deliver an address in Gaffney.

Change of Conference Date—A motion was made by H. L. Kingman to change the date of the Annual Conference from October to August. Adlai C. Holler spoke to the motion at the request of Dr. Kingman.

Motion to delay action—A. F. Ragan moved that action on this motion be deferred for at least one year and placed on the agenda for next Annual Conference. Seconded.

Perfecting Original Motion—H. L. Kingman agreed to accept a suggestion of S. D. Newell that the words "or as near thereto as possible" be inserted in the motion designating a specific date for Conference.

Vote—A vote was taken on the motion to defer action for a year and it was not carried.

Vote on the original motion as amended—It was adopted (see Resolutions).

Nominations from Board of Missions—C. LeGrande Moody made nominations for Trustees of the Belin Fund (see nominations). They were elected.

Motion by Conference Trustee—B. L. presented to Bishop Harrell to be consecrated as a Director of Religious Education. Following the impressive service of consecration the Conference joined in singing the last two stanzas of the above named hymn.

Introductions—Dr. Wilson O. Weldon and Rev. Charles D. White of the Western North Carolina Conference were introduced.

South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Trustees, Inc.—Welborne Summers presented Report No. 1 which was ordered to the record without reading. Report No. 2 was read and received as information (see reports).

Standing Rules—J. Emerson Ford moved that the Standing Rules be suspended for the purpose of immediately considering a proposed change in Section A., paragraph 10. The Conference voted unanimously to suspend the Rules.

Standing Rules—J. Emerson Ford moved that in place of Section 10, in Article A. **General Regulations:** that the following be placed: "10. No one shall serve on two Disciplinary administrative boards of the Annual Conference at the same time." and that a new paragraph, numbered 11, be added as follows: "11. No one shall serve on two Boards of trust elected by the Annual Conference at the same time." That all succeeding paragraphs be numbered correctly. Approved.

Cokesbury Conference School—The report of the special Committee set up in 1953 was read by F. C. Beach and adopted (see reports).

Town and Country Commission—The time for the order of the Day having arrived, Bishop Harrell recognized J. V. Murray, Chairman of the Town and Country Commission for their report. Following a statement by J. V. Murray, Hawley B. Lynn read the report in which two district superintendents were to be added to a committee named in the report for the purpose of studying and possibly setting up a Credit Union for the ministers of the Conference. Report adopted. (See report.)

Credit Union Study Committee—Bishop Harrell named J. O. Smith and P. E. Cook to the committee set up by the report just adopted.

World Service and Finance—Reports No. 1 through 13 were read by H. O. Chambers and adopted. (See reports.)

Conference Treasurer—Geo. A. Beach, Conference Treasurer, made a brief report which was received as information. His full report was ordered to record. (See reports.)

Appreciation—A. D. Betts moved that Mr. Geo. A. Beach be commended for the excellent work that he is doing as Conference Treasurer. Motion adopted.

Greetings—The Secretary read words of greetings from Chaplain S. R. Crumpton, now in Korea; Chaplain W. G. Smith, Jr., now in Pakistan; and Chaplain A. C. Holler, Jr., now in Alaska.

Acknowledgment—C. L. Woodard moved that words of greetings be sent from the Conference to all Chaplains whose membership is in the South Carolina Conference. Adopted.

Privileged Matter—J. Marvin Rast moved that all ministers who are absent from the Conference because of illness be sent appropriate words of remembrance by the secretary. Adopted.

Adjournment—Following announcements the benediction was pronounced by C. E. Warren.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Wofford College Chapel.

Opening—The afternoon session was called to order by Bishop Harrell. F. C. Beach was recognized as the President of the Historical Society.

Historical Society—F. C. Beach called the Historical Society to order. A. D. Betts presented a report from the **Committee on Micro-Filming of the Advocate**. Report adopted. (See reports.)

Nominating Committee—A. D. Betts gave the report of the Nominating Committee naming W. F. Harris as speaker for the 1955 session and Woodrow Ward as alternate. They were elected.

Financial Report—F. C. Beach read the financial report and it was ordered to record. (See reports.) Dues to the American Historical Society of \$10 were ordered paid. Motion that a delegate have his expenses paid to the American Historical Society meeting at Lake Junaluska. Adopted.

Publication of Journal and Yearbook—The report was made by G. S. Duffie and ordered to record. (See reports.)

The Chair—During a temporary absence from the chair by Bishop Harrell, Adlai C. Holler presided.

Group Insurance—The Commission on Group Insurance reported through H. C. Ritter. Approved and ordered to record. (See reports.)

Board of Hospitals and Homes—C. O. Shuler presented reports Nos. 1, 2 and 4 from the Board of Hospitals and Homes, which were ordered to the record without reading. Reports Nos. 3, 5 and 6 were read and approved. (See reports.)

Board of Conference Claimants—T. H. Vickery presented reports

Nos. 2 and 3 from the Board of Conference Claimants. Adopted. (See reports.)

District Conference Journals—T. H. Vickery reported for the Committee on District Conference Journals. Adopted. (See reports.)

World Peace—D. S. Lee made the report for the Commission on World Peace. Adopted. (See reports.)

South Carolina Fellowship of Churches—H. L. Kingman made a motion relative to the formation of a Council of Churches in South Carolina. The Motion was adopted (see Resolutions).

Exchange of Fraternal Greetings—A motion relative to such exchange between the South Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the South Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction was amended by A. D. Betts to include the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. Adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Moving Day—E. K. Garrison moved that Wednesday, November 3rd, be set as moving day. Adopted.

Special Days—R. B. Shumaker read the report from the Committee on Special Days. It was ordered to record. (See reports.)

Question 37, Who have been transferred out? was answered by Bishop Harrell as follows: Harmon Eric Tillman, Jr., to the Mississippi Conference. Leo Rippey, Jr., an elder to the Western North Carolina Conference, September 15, 1954. Thomas Fant Steele on Trial in the first year to the North Carolina Conference, September 15, 1954.

Question 36, Who have been received by transfer? Bishop Harrell announced, Earle Franklin Luncford, Jr., an elder from the N. Alabama Conference, February 1, 1954. Ray Maxwell Allen, an elder from the Western North Carolina Conference, October 15, 1954.

Christian Vocations—E. W. Hardin made the report from the Commission and announced that R. N. DuBose is the new chairman (See reports.)

Personal Privilege—Adlai C. Holler moved that the 1954 Journal and Year Book be dedicated to the memory of the late George K. Way. By a rising vote the motion was unanimously adopted.

Motion—On motion of Adlai C. Holler, the Conference gave a rising vote of thanks to W. C. Stackhouse for the splendid work that he did in preparation for the Conference session following the untimely death of George K. Way, Secretary of the Conference.

Appreciation of Bishop Harrell—J. Emerson Ford moved that we express to our Presiding Bishop our great appreciation for the wise guidance and careful consideration of all matters which were before the conference. Dr. Ford put the motion which was adopted by a rising vote.

Words of Appreciation—Bishop Harrell spoke words of appreciation to the Conference, and of J. F. Trammel, Secretary of the Cabinet, and Adlai C. Holler, Secretary of the Conference, the Bishop said, "They are not green, they are just new."

Adjournment—The Secretary reported that all business had been completed, except that which was to be attended to at the evening service and on Sunday morning. Following the singing of the doxology, the benediction was pronounced by J. Emerson Ford.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY EVENING

Bethel Methodist Church
Spartanburg, S. C., October 23, 1954

Opening—After an organ prelude, W. W. Fridy, pastor of the Church, led the opening part of the service, in which he extended a welcome to the Conference, and invited those interested to inspect the new building at its conclusion. Bethel's new Church was used a year ago last Sunday for the first time. The congregation joined in singing the hymn, "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing," which was followed by a Responsive Reading, The Apostles' Creed and The Gloria Patri. The choir sang an anthem, "The Voice of One Crying in the Wilderness." Following a prayer which was led by S. D. Newell, Bishop Harrell presented Dr. R. Wright Spears, who was to bring the Ordination message after the singing of "Saviour, Like a Shepherd Lead Us." Dr. Spears read John 15:12-18 and spoke on the subject, "Actors in The Drama of God."



REPORTS**BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS
REPORT NO. 1**

1. We request that the Annual Conference fix forty-eight dollars per service year as the rate for annuity payments to retired ministers. That the annuity rate for widows be seventy percent of the rate of her approved years of service. That the rate for dependent children of deceased ministers be twenty-five per cent of the father's annuity rate. That we follow the **Discipline** of 1952, paragraphs 1619, 1620, and 1621 in our payments.

2. We further request the Annual Conference to fix the rate payable for years served as an Approved Supply Pastor at thirty dollars per service year and that paragraph 1631 of the 1952 **Discipline** govern such cases.

3. We recommend that the minimum amounts payable to retired ministers, including retired Approved Supply Pastors, be \$300 per year and that of widows, including widows of Approved Supply Pastors, be \$240 per year.

4. We further recommend that the minimum amount paid to dependent children be \$100 per year and that \$200 be the minimum provided that the dependent child remain in college for four years.

**BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS
REPORT NO. 3**

1. We request that an appropriation be made that will give the Board of Conference Claimants \$173,275, and that this sum be apportioned to the charges of the Conference on the basis established in continuing resolutions.

2. That where a new charge is formed by a combination of churches already established, the district superintendent shall work the adjusted amounts to be asked for the Conference Claimants Fund according to the method established by the Conference. If the church or charge is

new, the basis will be an agreement with the charge and the district superintendent, but not less than ten per cent of the current salary paid the pastor by the charge itself.

3. Retired Ministers Day shall be observed in the churches in the interest of conference claimants on a Sunday in December or some suitable date. If an offering be taken for the benefit of conference claimants, it may be credited on the apportionment to the charge for the Conference Claimants Fund.

4. It is recommended that under paragraph 1623, Section 6(a), of the 1952 **Discipline**, that each institution or organization to which a minister is appointed with annuity responsibility shall pay according to this section 12 times the annuity rate for such minister. This fund to be paid to the Conference treasurer for the benefit of Conference Claimants, quarterly.

5. Special Conference Claimants. We recommend that as provided in paragraph 1631 of the 1952 **Discipline**, the Conference provide pensions for approved supply pastors, their widows and dependent children. Contributions made by supply pastors on the two per cent fund and other funds as collected for this purpose to be used as a reserve in preparation for such claimants. The rate shall be payable as set forth in the **Discipline**.

6. The Board of Conference Claimants is the Committee on Proportional Payment as set forth in the **Discipline** of 1952, paragraph 1613, Section 8.

7. We recommend that the service years of chaplains be credited as recommended by the Board of Pensions and the executive secretary of the Methodist Commission on Chaplains. That contributions not be required from chaplains where they are serving without annuity credit.

8. The Board recommends that special appointments be listed in the Conference Journal as follows:

(1) With annuity claim (a) upon this Annual Conference or (b) upon a general board, or agency, or institution of The Methodist Church.

(2) Without annuity claim upon the Annual Conference Par. 1618 (4) 1952 **Discipline**.

**BOARD OF EDUCATION
REPORT NO. 1****Report of the Executive Secretary, Conference Year 1953-1954**

One coming into the staff of the Board of Education of the South Carolina Conference cannot but be impressed by the fact that here is a Conference agency with a splendid tradition of service to and through the local churches, the colleges, homes and communities. It is a program

with special interests and emphases during the year but also one with sustained promotional planning and projecting of plans for improved Christian educational procedure throughout the church.

OUR TRAINING PROGRAM. The South Carolina Conference ranks high among the Conferences of the Methodist Church in Christian Workers' Schools and Classes. During the year we enrolled 7,572 workers in our schools and gave a total of 6,094 credits. These totals set a record for our Conference, exceeding by more than 1,000 the enrolment and credits of last year. Our people are alert to the training program of our church. An important aspect of it this year was the conducting of eight schools for rural churches of the Charleston District, with Mrs. E. D. Lewis, of Charlotte, North Carolina, as instructor.

STUDENT CENTER. The 1953 Annual Conference provided for the purchase of a two-story brick residence at 628 Bull Street, Columbia, to be used by the Board of Education as a Methodist Student Center at the University of South Carolina. The Conference resolution provided for the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference to hold title to the property for the use of the Board of Education, and provided for an initial payment by the Board of Education of \$8,500.00 and the negotiating of a loan for the remainder of the \$25,000.00 purchase price to be amortized with interest at 5% in a period of 15 years in monthly payments of \$130.00. The Wesley Foundation Board of Directors of Columbia is carrying forward a valued program at the Center, with the Rev. Robert K. Marshall as Director. The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the South Carolina Conference, which has given generous support to this project, contributed this year \$2,222.93. Mission Specials of local churches of the Conference have contributed during the year \$3,549.02. With such support the mortgage can be lifted much earlier than in the period planned.

THE SUMMER PROGRAM. The 1954 summer opportunities offered by the Board of Education were extensive, including: a Golden Age Assembly, a Young Adult Assembly, a Conference for Adult Workers With Youth, two Youth Assemblies, Pastors' School, a Laboratory School, three Intermediate Camps and a Senior Camp at Camp York, and participation in various schools and conferences at The Methodist Assembly at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina.

THE DISTRICT EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCES. The District Educational Conferences held in September were participated in by a large number of church workers of every district. In the assembly period they featured the Youth Emphasis of The Methodist Church, with forum and group discussion.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOLS. Vacation Church Schools are being held in more than 65% of the churches of the South Carolina Conference. The careful planning on the part of the district directors and their associates and their promoting under the direction of the Conference Director of Children's Work of the 37 Institutes over the Conference account for the access of interest and efficiency in this important field.

RACE RELATIONS DAY. The churches of the Conference have contributed in observance of Race Relations Day \$4,538 to date. There will likely be more reported when the books of the Conference Treasurer are closed. Both the observance and the offering are vital phases of our Christian Education program. By Conference action the offering is directed to Paine College, Augusta, Georgia.

YOUTH CAMP PLANS. The Committee on Camp Location of the Board of Education has held frequent sessions during the year looking toward the purchase and development of a camp site for the youth of the Conference. At two of these meetings the Committee had the counsel of Miss Elizabeth Brown, Camp Consultant of the General Board of Education. Two explorations were made with Miss Brown of a prospective site in Greenville County. It is generally agreed that a Conference-owned youth camp which would meet the needs for a Christian camp program is much to be desired.

CHURCH SCHOOL RALLY DAY. Church School Day was authorized by the Annual Conference to be observed on March 21, with appropriate program and with a contribution of 2% of the pastor's salary to be sent to the Conference Treasurer in support of the program of the Conference Board of Education. Programs were sent to the churches in advance of the observance day. The Church School Rally Day offerings constitute the larger part of the operating budget of the Conference Board of Education. Many churches place this contribution in their local budgets.

Church School Rally Day offerings to date (October 5) total \$21,520.10. The money yet to come in on this year's contributions will press toward the 100% mark.

Goals, Points of Emphasis for 1954-55

1. The Youth Emphasis—cooperation with the General Board of Education plan for a Conference-wide program for recruiting, training, and motivating adult workers with youth.
2. Cooperative support of the Paul B. Kern Youth Center building

project at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina.

3. Planning sessions for all District Staffs of the Board of Education.

4. Continued support of the Columbia Wesley Foundation Center with mission specials from local churches of the Conference.

5. Eight Christian Workers' Schools in small churches of the Orangeburg District.

6. Promotion Day for high school seniors to be observed in May rather than in October before they are scattered to schools and colleges, the armed services, and jobs.

7. Each local church to plan for a Fall Training night for new church officers, preferably during Religious Education Week.

8. Each local church Commission on Education set up a budget on Christian Education providing for systematic training of its leaders and for equipment of its various departments.

APPRECIATION. The Executive Secretary is indebted to many for counsel and assistance.

We of the staff are ever conscious and ever appreciative of the capable leadership of the Conference Board of Education. Into the program go many hours of careful planning by the Board. To the Board, and in particular, to the splendid leadership of its president, the Rev. Francis T. Cunningham, we and the Conference are indebted.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ADULT WORK

The report on adult work this year needs to be made under three headings: I, Evaluation of Progress; II, Needs; III, Recommendations. The evaluations are made on the basis of oral reports received, impressions gained from sessions in District Educational Conferences, summer assemblies, subdistrict council meetings, local church visits, and from personal correspondence requesting guidance or literature.

I

DISCERNIBLE PROGRESS has been made in adult work in our Conference at several points which indicate that:

A. More of our church school leaders are taking seriously their responsibilities for learning in Christian living and leadership. Response to district, local church and area opportunities for leadership education, when those activities are well planned and promoted, indicate that adult leaders do want to learn to fulfill their appointed tasks.

B. An increasing number of churches and individuals are facing the need for adult council planning.

C. Increasing use of guidance literature, especially job manuals.

D. Leadership training schools are providing more courses for training adult workers.

E. Young Adult groups are giving more attention to the selection of study materials to suit their special needs rather than choosing a teacher and leaving all selection to him.

F. A few more churches are giving attention to the needs of OLDER PERSONS in the local church.

The enrollment of our Golden Age Assembly continues at around 40. We could take care of up to 60 persons. We have around one-third new people each year. The unanimous and enthusiastic expressions of appreciation and gratitude for this activity make it an experience that any worker in the program covets.

G. **Improvements in teaching procedures** are being observed, reported and reflected in district meetings, in the inquiries being received and in the literature being used.

II

PRESSING NEEDS which have become apparent in our contacts with leaders of adult work in local churches, districts and subdistricts are:

A. Instruction and information for local church leaders of adult groups as soon as possible after their election each Fall.

B. Quarterly planning in local churches by the adult council. Three or four 1½ hour sessions a year could make all the difference.

C. Family Life Education. More study groups, particularly young adult groups, should study in the area of Christian family worship and discipline.

D. District and local church emphasis upon programs and opportunities for the older adult.

E. Young adult organizations in more rural churches. The transformation of rural church leadership where young adult groups have been organized point up this need in other rural churches.

F. More classes in standard training schools for the officers of the adult division, and for officers and teachers of adult classes.

III

RECOMMENDATIONS TO MEET THESE NEEDS are suggested in many cases by the description of the need itself. Several other suggestions affecting the whole church have been made to the Executive Secretary and will be contained in his report. In addition, I recommend:

A. The urgent promotion of Sunday evening fellowship groups for adults in every church that is large enough to have a Methodist Youth Fellowship.

B. Arousing the concern of every pastor for the older people in each congregation.

C. Selection of a Superintendent of Home Members in every church and provisions made for less active adults.

D. The organization of a young adult group in every rural church having as many as 50 adults and 45 children in the church school.

E. An institute for officers and teachers in the adult division or a Bible Conference at least every other year in each district.

Let me express my appreciation to this Board for the joys of this fellowship we have together in helping people find clear and deepening insights into Christian living; for the rewards of seeing leaders discover and use more effective ways of witnessing to their faith, and for support which I have sensed during these years from the members of this body.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE METHODIST STUDENT MOVEMENT

We started out this year with the purpose of setting up effective Campus-Church Relations Committees for every student group under our concern. Though it will take some time for all of these committees to gain true functional effectiveness, we now have such committees for every campus except Erskine, where there is no church with which to set up a committee; Anderson Junior College, where there are very few Methodist students, most of them commuters, and Newberry.

Our organizational plans in Charleston and Spartanburg have worked better than we had dared hope. There is one committee now supervising the program for students at The Citadel, the College of Charleston and at the medical and nursing schools. So far, the schedules of the latter two have allowed for little program or contact.

THE CAROLINA-COLUMBIA STUDENT CENTER is proving a real asset in the projection of the program at Carolina and Columbia College. While the work is not really a year old yet, the outlook is good for a richer ministry to the students of these two schools.

THE WINTHROP CAMPUS-CHURCH RELATIONS COMMITTEE is actively engaged in plans for an expanded student center, or a new one on another site.

THE CLEMSON WESLEY FOUNDATION, by more careful planning and determined promotion, is enlisting larger groups of students than before. Clemson is one place where the Methodist Church is in the forefront because of its leadership and its advantageous location.

SUMMER CHURCH ACTIVITIES, such as camps, caravans and work camps enlisted a considerable number of our students. Both in our own Conference camps and in the program of the church at large, our students gave leadership and received training in Christian service.

FIVE STATEWIDE EMPHASES BRINGING OUR MOVEMENT TOGETHER this year were:

1. The State Planning Retreat at Camp Cherokee. Some creative planning was done for the statewide program and for the state student conference, which meets February 18-20 at St. John Church, Rock Hill.
2. The State Student Conference, held last February at Wofford, was carefully directed by the student leaders, and characterized by some very enriching features.
3. The Spiritual Life Retreat last Spring had its capacity enrollment of 42. It was held at Sky Valley retreat center near Hendersonville. The week-end of attention to devotional reading, private and group prayer, and discussions on deepening the spiritual life was a stirring experience to share with the student leaders from the various campuses.
4. The Student Regional Conference at Lake Junaluska was also attended by a good group of our South Carolina students. This is considered "top-level" training for new campus officers.
5. The Quadrennial National Student Conference meeting at Law-

rence, Kansas, during the Christmas holidays was an impressive gathering with a rich and moving program. The director was privileged to participate in this conference, along with 37 student and counsellor delegates. The New Year's Eve program of the conference, with its emphasis on religion in art and the 60-piece student-assembled orchestra and 500-voice choir was an unforgettable experience.

I should like to close with an expression of profound confidence in the thinking and earnest devotion of the Christian students in our church. They make one want to be a better Christian, to be a more adequate leader, and to give more completely of his goods, his abilities and his energies.

I also wish to express my appreciation to the Committee on College and University Religious Life of our Conference Board of Education for their avid concern for extending the ministry of our church to every campus.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF YOUTH WORK

Working with youth and adult workers with youth, particularly during these days of the Youth Emphasis, has been my high privilege. It has been my prayer that all that we have done will improve and extend the quality of the ministry of the Church to young people, especially through the program of the MYF in the local church.

A major portion of the work is conducted through planning meetings. In some respects the most important of these is the Conference Youth Council which does a major portion of planning for the year's work, with special emphasis on the youth assemblies. In addition to working with the Conference Council, I had planning meetings with the District Directors of Youth Work and the District Directors of Intermediate Work.

As was recommended last year, Adult Workers with Youth were to receive a major emphasis during the year. One district experimented with a district meeting for Adult Workers With Youth in which I participated. I provided leadership for three local church meetings of Adult Workers With Youth. In accordance with the recommendation last year to provide special training for adult resource persons, we had a series of five meetings scattered through the Conference to which we invited from six to ten leading Adult Workers With Youth from each district. Rev. Wallace Chappel, of the General Board of Education, provided leadership for this series of meetings which were well attended and provided an unusual opportunity for consideration of the entire youth program.

The Adult Workers With Youth Conference in June was held in cooperation with the Young Adult Assembly. Miss Virginia Henry, from the General Board of Education, met with us this year.

In accordance with the recommendation of last year that we provide further training for Adult Workers With Youth who work in the sub-districts, a series of district meetings for subdistrict Adult Workers With Youth were planned. Three adults from each subdistrict were invited to the meetings at which time the program and philosophy of the

subdistrict were discussed. These meetings were successfully held in nine of the districts.

In accordance with the recommendation to the Board last year, the Conference Youth Council sponsored the training of fellowship teams from the districts. Eight teams selected by the District Directors were trained in a week-end meeting held in Columbia. The fellowship team idea has real possibilities for extending our training to local churches.

Our Conference this summer had one Caravan Team. The Caravan Planning Meeting was well attended by local churches and so far as we are able to determine, the Caravan rendered unusually fine service this summer.

During the year on an experimental basis, we have had an MYF page in the Advocate. This project has received favorable comments over the Conference and I believe should be continued and expanded.

We have continued to distribute the various free and charge materials from the Board of Education. We have also distributed the leaflets interpreting the work of the various other Boards and Agencies of our Church. Particularly have we tried to present materials of the Board of Missions so that the young people would be acquainted with the tremendous need and with the tremendous variety of vocational opportunities under the direction of the Board.

In response to requests, we have also made available paper for "MYF News" and "MYF Bulletins" and MYF Name Tags. A playlet entitled "Go Ye" written by Mrs. Ralph Shumaker of Bishopville, was mimeographed and was made available to district, subdistrict, and local churches for their presentation.

South Carolina's contribution to the Methodist Youth Fund continues to grow steadily. The increase this year was encouraging, making a total of \$12,717.19. With increased cooperation with the Woman's Society in the promotion of the Methodist Youth Fund, it seems reasonable that giving will continue to increase. The increase in giving has, of course, resulted in an increased check-back to the Annual Conference. This sum of money amounts to \$1,704.99 for next year's expenditures.

The attendance at the youth assemblies was most gratifying this year. Both assemblies were filled to overflowing and it was with great difficulty that we were able to take care of all of the delegates who attended.

Interest in the Conference camping program continues to grow. This summer we conducted an experiment in the use of Bible reading in the camp program. This aspect of the program was discussed with Miss Elizabeth Brown, Camp Consultant from the General Board of Education, prior to its usage. Each day each small group of campers met together for a Bible reading period. Each person read from his own Bible the designated chapter from the Gospel of St. Mark. Following the reading, the campers came together with the counselors and questions and observations were raised concerning the scripture which they had read. An attempt was made to secure genuine Bible reading as contrasted with Bible teaching. Counselor preparation was directed toward making it possible for the camper to actually read and discuss for himself the biblical material rather than receiving a lecture on its meaning. It was our hope that this practice would encourage young

people to read the Bible for themselves in their homes. It was most favorably received by the young people, representing a high point in their own evaluation of the total camping experience.

I would like to express my appreciation to that tremendous corps of youth workers; both in the local church, in the district, and in the subdistrict who have labored in the interest of youth. To those who have worked in the assemblies and in the camps, we owe our deepest gratitude.

**CONDENSED REPORT
OF
CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF CHILDREN'S WORK**

Conference Calendar

During the year, children's work has shown a steady, healthy growth in all areas. Early in the year, District Directors met with the Conference Director, and together they worked out a well rounded program of activities. Major objectives were adopted and placed on the Conference calendar, where they were given wide publicity.

Vacation Church School Institutes

As a result of careful planning and preparation on the part of the District Directors and their associates, 37 institutes were held. In these, valuable training was made available to churches in every district. As a result, 377 churches reported vacation church schools, with an enrollment of 28,662 pupils and workers.

Children's Building Fund

In our final report on the "Children's Building Fund" at Lake Junaluska, we may take pardonable pride. On a quota of \$5,000.00 the children's division of the South Carolina Conference paid \$6,030.39. Those who have visited that building will recall the lovely appointments in the recreation and assembly room. All furniture in that room, except the large conference table and chairs in the rear of the room, were the gift of children in the South Carolina Conference.

Coaching Conference

With the growing interest in local church training schools, the need for more accredited instructors has become apparent. Early in the Spring, 21 selected workers were invited to meet in Orangeburg, and worked for accreditation, under the leadership of Miss Margie McCarty, of the General Board of Education. Several have already become accredited and are available for instructors in Children's Work.

Leadership School

Another training opportunity came to 13 children's workers from the South Carolina Conference, eight of whom are accredited or working toward accreditation as Laboratory School Instructors (this course can be had only at Lake Junaluska). This was made possible by offerings from vacation church schools, thus expanding this needed phase of our training program.

Laboratory School

The Laboratory School affords the finest training opportunity offered by the Board of Education. That these schools are growing in popularity and effectiveness is shown by the increased enrollment each year. The most recent one, held in Charleston, enrolled 109. Three schools are on the calendar for 1955, namely, Sumter, Orangeburg and Greenville. Our goal is, a Laboratory School in each district in the Conference during a quadrennium.

Day Camping

Day camping for juniors offers another opportunity for service that is growing in popularity and satisfying experiences. The South Carolina Conference is just beginning to expand in this area and needs trained leadership. We would like to see the program enlarged to include training in this area.

Conclusion

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to work with the Board of Education. The fine fellowship with Christian workers, both in the Conference and in other sections, and the many opportunities for service and enrichment have contributed to my own personal growth in children's work. To my associates in the districts and to the staff, I would like to express my sincere appreciation.

Recommendations

The Director of Children's Work respectfully makes the following recommendations:

1. That a schedule be worked out whereby three or four Laboratory Schools will be held each year, the goal being "one in every district during a quadrennium" and further that they be held on a district-wide basis, the participating churches to assume responsibility for the travel and entertainment of the instructors plus incidental expenses, the funds to be secured by registration fees or, if they prefer, by apportionments. The Board of Education will assume the responsibility of securing the instructors and paying the honoraria.
2. That the opportunity be offered each district and associate director, once during a quadrennium, to attend a Laboratory School on a scholarship or part scholarship, the money to be derived from vacation church school offerings. In order to keep abreast of the trends in Christian education, they need refresher courses. Some feel that they cannot afford the expense of attending these schools. I would like to show our appreciation by making it possible for them financially.
3. That we continue to send to Lake Junaluska, on a part scholarship basis, the quota allotted the South Carolina Conference, where they may have specialized training in "Seminars for Laboratory School Instructors," looking toward more accredited instructors in that area.
4. That we make provision for training leaders in "Day Camping for Juniors," with the possibility of holding a Coaching Conference for those who are interested in becoming leaders and counselors in that field.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF COLUMBIA COLLEGE

General Condition of the College

The past year has been a happy one for the Columbia College family! The students, faculty, and alumnae have cooperated in many ways to achieve a successful year. The administrative staff has worked together to show considerable improvement in the overall program of work for the college.

Our audit shows that we have operated for the second year without a deficit. Exhibit B, Sheet 2 of our audit gives the information that our net income from current operations for the fiscal year ending July 31st, was \$10,449.85, as compared with a net income last year of \$11,832.33. This is such a slight margin of safe operation that we continue dissatisfied and we work diligently toward a day when we may enjoy a net income from current operations that will be much more comfortable.

The student enrollment has increased about 100 students over last year. In order to accommodate additional students the college increased its indebtedness this year by about \$100,000.00, that we might build a new dormitory to accommodate 48 students. Also, additional rooms were added to Fleming Hall and an apartment house across the street from the college was purchased, making room for additional students totaling 80.

Enrollment

Our enrollment continues to increase sharply each year. From a full-time enrollment of 187 students in the 1951-52 session, we have moved to 471 for this session. A faculty study and a survey by staff members of the General Board of Education indicate that we have reached the saturation point, enrollment wise, so far as our campus facilities are concerned.

It is encouraging to note that already a number of paid room reservations are in hand for the 1955-56 and 1956-57 sessions. It is safe to state also, that had we had facilities this year, the college could have admitted at least 100 more students. Statistics on enrollment for the current year are as follows:

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF
WOFFORD COLLEGE
1953-1954**

It is my pleasure to submit the annual report of the President of Wofford College for the academic year 1953-1954. This was the one-hundredth year of Wofford's continuous existence. It was a year fraught with tremendous significance and great potential for this institution.

Our Centennial Year was notable for two principal reasons. First, normal college activities proceeded apace. Christian emphasis and sound scholarship — hallmarks of the Wofford way — were again in evidence. Enrollment increased over the previous year and the academic performance of students improved somewhat. Faculty instruction remained at a high level of competence and campus morale was reasonably good.

There was a full quota of social, athletic and other extra-curricular activities for the students during the past year. Many improvements and renovations were made to various buildings on the campus. Most significantly, however, the religious life of the college was deepened

and a Christian atmosphere pervaded the entire community. It is our firm conviction at Wofford that unless a church-related college is in itself a miniature Christian community, it has failed in one of its supreme purposes.

Yes, last year was marked by the normal activities of a college year on our campus. But it was not just another year. It was our Centennial Year. One hundred years ago this institution opened its doors to young men of South Carolina who desired a Christian education, because of the benevolence of an itinerant Methodist preacher, Benjamin Wofford. And this year we have celebrated the one-hundredth anniversary of this historic event.

The Centennial year has been celebrated in two distinct ways. First, Wofford has throughout the year held some twenty-five or thirty meetings of regional and national learned societies, professional organizations and other groups on its campus. This year-long series of celebrations has pointed up our one-hundredth birthday by focusing nationwide attention upon Wofford's tradition of academic excellence and Christian values. A complete list of these meetings is furnished later in this report. These celebrations were highlighted by a great Centennial Convocation on April 30 and May 1, 1954, on the campus, which was attended by several thousand friends of the college from all over the nation. The Centennial celebrations will culminate with the holding of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church on Wofford's campus during October 19 to 24, 1954.

A birthday is not only a time for celebration, but also a time for re-assessment and planning for the future. With this in mind, the Wofford Board of Trustees voted unanimously to embark upon a \$1,300,000 Centennial Development Program over a period of the next five years. This program, decided upon after detailed consultations with professional experts, is desperately important to the college in order that it may retire its existing indebtedness and prepare for increased enrollments which are already upon us.

We hope to meet our Centennial Development goal by appealing to individual alumni, Methodists, Spartanburg citizens, friends and others. No appeal is being made directly to the churches, nor is the official machinery of the church being used in the campaign, although hundreds of church leaders, our own Bishop Harrell among them, are lending valuable assistance through their own efforts in this campaign. Wofford's Board of Trustees felt that the churches themselves are already doing all they can officially for their two colleges through the College Maintenance Fund. Already more than \$365,000 has been pledged in this Development Program in the Spartanburg area alone; regional campaigns are just beginning throughout the state. I urge every Methodist in South Carolina to give his support to the Wofford College Centennial Development Fund, for on its success the very future of our beloved institution hangs.

A final word of introduction to this past year's activities. The college came within \$3,402.34 of balancing its expenditures with its income during the 1953-1954 academic year. This is the best fiscal record Wofford has made during the past six years. This means that with a total annual expenditure of \$716,285.12, we have virtually balanced our budget. This was made possible by the increased financial support from

the South Carolina Conference through the College Maintenance Fund and the beginnings of the Centennial Development Campaign. For this increased aid, all of us at Wofford are heartened and grateful.

Finally, let this college president, just completing his sophomore year, thank the many friends of Wofford for their unfailing kindness to him. It has been a joy and inspiration to work with the Wofford trustees, faculty members, students, alumni, friends and the many thousands of Methodists throughout the state toward the building of a great Christian college. I believe that we are engaged in the most important work in the world. I am further convinced that although Wofford's first one hundred years have been superb in every respect, an even greater future lies ahead.

I cannot close this introduction without reminding the entire constituency what an irreparable loss it suffered in the untimely death on September 13, 1954, of Robert Marsden Carlisle, Chairman of the Wofford Board of Trustees. All who love this school will forever owe a tremendous debt to this able administrator, tireless worker and Christian gentleman, who gave so much of his life to his Alma Mater. My own personal and official grief is still inconsolable. This college is fortunate indeed to have a man like Dwight F. Patterson available to succeed Mr. Carlisle as Chairman of its Board of Trustees.

Every effort is constantly being made to secure additional funds for Wofford. This college must not only retire its indebtedness and operate on a balanced budget. It must constantly modernize its facilities and increase the salaries of its underpaid instructors. Furthermore, Wofford must prepare for the continued onslaught of additional students upon its academic walls. The increased birth rate of the early 1940's will be felt by the colleges in the late 1950's, and we at Wofford must be prepared adequately to take care of our share of these additional students. The material resources of this institution must be increased if Wofford is to fulfill its great mission of service to its church and its state.

**SPECIAL REPORT AND RESOLUTIONS FROM THE PRESIDENTS
AND BOARDS OF TRUSTEES OF COLUMBIA AND
WOFFORD COLLEGES**

WHEREAS, Columbia College has nearly tripled her enrollment during the past three years and now is operating with a capacity student body and has a considerable number of students applying for admission in 1955-56 and 1956-57 and it is clear that many more students will be available for admission to colleges by 1960, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the college have announced plans for a ten-year program of expansion involving approximately \$2,000,000.00 to be used for several buildings including gymnasium, classroom building, fine arts building, and faculty apartments, and,

WHEREAS, a campaign has already been begun in the City of Columbia to raise a considerable sum of money in the first phase of Columbia's expansion program, and

WHEREAS, during the past two years buildings costing approximately \$314,000.00 have been erected on the campus at heavy financial burden to the college,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we therefore request the South Carolina Annual Conference, meeting in Spartanburg, S. C., October 20-24, 1954, to grant to Columbia College permission to enter into a financial campaign throughout the Conference in 1955.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD that this campaign will not assign quotas to the churches, nor take up special offerings in churches, nor will anything be done that might interfere with the present generous College Maintenance Fund program, but it will elicit the moral support and backing of churches and church leaders in conducting this campaign among individuals within the Conference.

The Methodist Church has from the beginning had an interest in higher education, and that interest is still a major concern. Now more than ever the place of the small, independent, church college in our world is taking on greater significance.

South Carolina Methodism has followed in this early tradition, and continues to consider as one of her major responsibilities the training of young men and young women for tomorrow's world.

The financial needs of our two colleges are as great as in any time of their history. Now that Wofford and Columbia are engaged in special efforts to undergird their stability, we earnestly covet the prayers and support of the Methodists of this State. The two efforts vary slightly in their approach, but the purposes and the needs behind them are the same.

So, jointly as representatives of our two colleges we commend the program of each to the people of this State.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST ADVOCATE

In many respects, the South Carolina Methodist Advocate and the Methodist Center have completed a most successful year. We shall attempt to describe in brief fashion the progress made in both institutions.

The South Carolina Methodist Advocate

The Advocate now goes into slightly more than 18,000 Methodist homes in South Carolina. This corresponds with a subscription rate of 17,166 at the same date last year.

Because of the increase in subscription rates, the Advocate was able

to purchase its first piece of newly-reconditioned printing machinery. We now have a 12 x 18, fully automatic, Kluge job press at work.

The net operating income for the Advocate this year totals \$7,567.42. Part of this was used in the purchase of the new equipment described above. The balance has been used to improve the cash position of the Advocate to the point that, **for the first time in many, many years, the Advocate can pay its bills on time and take advantage of certain cash discounts.** Our working capital is still below what it should be, but it has improved vastly over the previous fiscal year. We hope that the year 1954-55 will be one in which the Advocate will not have to borrow from the bank just prior to the annual subscription campaign in order to keep its business on an operating basis.

The Advocate's financial condition has been further improved during the year by reorganizing the Methodist Center's financial structure, including rental rates and air conditioning, so that the Center is no longer a financial burden on the Advocate. The Methodist Center should be completely self-supporting during the coming year (including charges for depreciation) if rental occupancy remains high.

The Methodist Center

Following the approval of the Annual Conference in 1953, the Methodist Center during the year has completely reorganized its financial structure. Rental rates have been raised. The building has been completely air conditioned. The mortgage held by the Liberty Life Insurance Company of Greenville, S. C., was paid off and a new mortgage held by Epworth Children's Home put into effect at a reduction in interest charges from 4½ per cent to 4 per cent. This mortgage will run for 15 years payable in monthly installments.

During the year the building has been painted throughout. A maintenance system that has the floors waxed once a month, windows washed twice a year, and blinds cleaned once a year has been installed.

At the moment the Center is fully rented, the last vacancy having just been taken by Columbia College (at the church rental rate) for its fund-raising campaign office.

The audit for the Methodist Center shows a loss of \$439.39 for the Center. This results from instituting depreciation charges on the building which this year amounted to \$4,837.50. If the books had been audited on the basis of former years, the Center would have shown a profit of approximately \$4,400. Even with depreciation, the building should be able to begin paying off its short-term loan to the Advocate in the ensuing year.

The Trustees have approved the purchase of a new or reconditioned folding machine for the press room. This machine will cost about \$4,000. Tentative approval was also given to the purchase of a new linotype machine at a cost of about \$12,000. This latter purchase will be made after the subscription campaign in February 1955 provided the Methodist Center at that time is able to pay back part of its short-term loan due the Advocate. Final approval of this purchase will rest with the executive committee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we therefore request the South Carolina Annual Conference, meeting in Spartanburg, S. C., October 20-24, 1954, to grant to Columbia College permission to enter into a financial campaign throughout the Conference in 1955.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD that this campaign will not assign quotas to the churches, nor take up special offerings in churches, nor will anything be done that might interfere with the present generous College Maintenance Fund program, but it will elicit the moral support and backing of churches and church leaders in conducting this campaign among individuals within the Conference.

The Methodist Church has from the beginning had an interest in higher education, and that interest is still a major concern. Now more than ever the place of the small, independent, church college in our world is taking on greater significance.

South Carolina Methodism has followed in this early tradition, and continues to consider as one of her major responsibilities the training of young men and young women for tomorrow's world.

The financial needs of our two colleges are as great as in any time of their history. Now that Wofford and Columbia are engaged in special efforts to undergird their stability, we earnestly covet the prayers and support of the Methodists of this State. The two efforts vary slightly in their approach, but the purposes and the needs behind them are the same.

So, jointly as representatives of our two colleges we commend the program of each to the people of this State.

We hope that the year 1954-55 will be one in which the Advocate will not have to borrow from the bank just prior to the annual subscription campaign in order to keep its business on an operating basis.

The Advocate's financial condition has been further improved during the year by reorganizing the Methodist Center's financial structure, including rental rates and air conditioning, so that the Center is no longer a financial burden on the Advocate. The Methodist Center should be completely self-supporting during the coming year (including charges for depreciation) if rental occupancy remains high.

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The purchase of a new folder and a new linotype machine outlined above may take two years of Advocate earnings. Beyond this, the Advocate must set aside earnings from several years in order to purchase a new printing press which will cost approximately \$25,000. The success of this program will in large measure depend upon the continued support of the ministers and laymen of the South Carolina Annual Conference. The enthusiastic support we have met on every hand these past two years, despite a subscription price increase, encourages us to believe that this program of purchasing new machinery will meet with success.

Plans are also underway to purchase a press camera and construct a darkroom to increase the Advocate's picture coverage. A total of \$170 has been contributed by friends of the Advocate for this purpose, and further amounts are in sight.

Recommendations

1. The Trustees of the S. C. Methodist Advocate and the Methodist Center respectfully request the cabinet to reappoint the Rev. J. Claude Evans as editor and manager for the year 1954-1955.

2. The Trustees respectfully request that the annual support stipend from the World Service Commission of \$7,000 be continued for the year 1954-1955.

3. Finally, it is requested that the month of February be set aside by the Conference for the annual Advocate subscription campaign.

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM
REPORT NO. 1**

This is a great day to be alive! This is a great day for evangelism! We are deeply grateful to our heavenly Father who has called us into his service. Words are inadequate to express the appreciation of your Board of Evangelism for the cooperation, help and encouragement of our bishop, district superintendents, pastors, and laymen. Whatever we have been able to do during the year has been made possible because we have had such splendid cooperation from everyone.

The white population of South Carolina is increasing very fast. Many new industries are coming into our state. Our cities are growing. The rural areas are likewise attracting many people from other sections of America.

"Our nation is in the period of its greatest growth in history. In 1950 there were 19,000,000 more of us than in 1940. No figures are yet available since 1950, the estimates for increasing population in our country from 1950 to 1960 are for thirty million people. Four million new persons entered our country in 1953. Many of these do not believe in God, or religion, or our constitution. These could become a serious threat to our form of government and could likewise disrupt our school system and become a threat to our churches. A new baby is born every eight seconds for a total of more than 3,500,000 new children every year.

"Families are getting larger again and not only is America expanding numerically but it is on the march. Over 70,000,000 people moved between 1940 and 1950. Twenty-eight million moved far enough to change church membership. Thirteen million changed their home state in the greatest migration in history. One-half of us are not today where we were in 1940. Few young people today complete their schooling in the communities where they were born." (From "Outreach", Board of Evangelism, 1954, page 76.)

Early in this Conference year your Board of Evangelism made its plans to give all possible aid to our churches and people in this emergency. Your Board feels very heavily its responsibility. It was our desire to do everything possible to encourage and strengthen the large number of souls whom we had reached in the United Evangelistic Mission. So it was in this spirit that our year's work was planned and in this report we wish to lift up some of the things to which we have given major emphasis, as well as the results which we have obtained.

Districts set up meetings or retreats. Early in this Conference year according to plan, district meetings or retreats were held in all of the districts of the Conference and a day was spent in considering the program and objectives of evangelism for the year. Practically all our ministers made definite plans for their work. The results speak more eloquently than words and show conclusively that a well-defined program carefully followed yields great dividends.

Local church Commissions on Membership and Evangelism. Your Board has attempted to help every pastor and local committee with its work. More than 10,000 pieces of choice literature, the very best

that could be provided, have been distributed over our state in the various meetings which we have held. This, we believe, has played a very vital part in helping each local church to come to grips with the functions, duties, and responsibility of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

State-wide Evangelistic Rally. This meeting was held at Shandon Church, Columbia, on January 28. It was preceded by a retreat at Main Street Church which was attended by the bishop's cabinet, the out-of-state speakers, the Board of Evangelism and district secretaries of evangelism. The attendance upon this state-wide meeting was perhaps the largest we have had. More than 1200 people were present, and the impact of this meeting has been felt in every Methodist church in our state, and echoes of it have reached clear across our Church.

"Go To Church" campaign. According to plan our Conference entered enthusiastically into the "Go To Church" campaign from January to Easter. On January 1, the voice of our Bishop, Costen J. Harrell, was heard in a special message prepared for this purpose on practically all of the fifty-one radio stations of South Carolina. Some of the stations used the bishop's message by request a second time. It was used in local churches and group meetings. Perhaps, at no other time has any bishop of our church reached so many people at one time with one message. The bishop's message was followed on the first of February by a message from each of the eleven district superintendents. Each superintendent spoke in person or by transcription to his constituency over the various radio stations in his own area. This same theme was followed on the first of March by a message from the district secretaries in the same manner and we wish to take this opportunity to express our gratitude and appreciation to all of the radio stations of South Carolina for their excellent cooperation and the free time which they gave us. Our special thanks go to Mr. Dan Crosland of WCRS in Greenwood for his invaluable assistance in helping to arrange for these state-wide broadcasts.

The achievements speak for themselves. We believe that this publicity helped in a very large way in the "Go To Church" campaign.

Gains for the year. We are most grateful that God has honored the labors and efforts of all workers and that during the year 6,149 have been added to the Church on profession of faith and from other churches. We are most grateful that there have been only 7 barren charges in our Conference this year. Every other charge reports addition by profession of faith. There are 12 charges which have added 50 or more members by vows or from other churches. These are: Cherokee and John Wesley in Charleston; College Place, Main Street and Shandon in Columbia; Main Street, Greenwood; Grace, North Augusta; Buncombe Street, Greenville; Saint Johns, Rock Hill; Central, Florence; Bethel, Spartanburg; and Trinity, Sumter.

New Churches. Last Annual Conference we reported that we had received \$1,665.56 from Mr. Herbert Wayne, a balance left over from the United Evangelistic Mission. At that time we pledged to use this amount to help sponsor churches in those areas where surveys indicated new churches were needed. We are proud to report that we

have fulfilled our pledge and we have helped to sponsor eight new churches within the bounds of our Conference with these funds and one other church is now in the process of formation. Doubtless, other churches have been organized in which we did not have a part. Certainly we trust that this is true.

Finally, your Board again wishes to give every assistance possible not only to our pastors but to the local churches in its work. With this in mind, your Board has prepared a booklet entitled "Annual Program and Suggested Plans" which we wish to distribute at this time. This pamphlet will be available to all of our churches for use during the year.

In conclusion, we wish to express again our very deep debt of gratitude to all of you for the help which you have so willingly given. We covet your prayers that 1954-1955 may be the greatest year our church has ever known. It is our firm belief that when we have done our best in the field of evangelism that we shall have little trouble with the rest of the program of our church. If when men and women are thoroughly committed to Christ, the Church may expect to share largely of their time and of their wealth and of their prayers and there shall be no lack of funds for the extension of God's Kingdom.

**BOARD OF EVANGELISM
REPORT NO. 2**

1954-1955

ANNUAL CONFERENCE ACTION

RESOLVED,

1. That the Commission on Membership and Evangelism be organized in every local church as soon after Conference as possible, and that they be supplied with the program as adopted by the Annual Conference.

2. That each local church work out its own program and that emphasis be given to the plans for the charge at the first quarterly conference and each district superintendent to give guidance and help as may be needed.

3. That systematic efforts be made in the bounds of every charge to discover prospects for church membership and wherever possible that complete surveys be made.

4. That we shall continue to give every help possible to charges needing guidance and assistance that there may be no barren charge or church within our Conference.

5. That special evangelistic preaching services be held in every church during the year.

6. That we endorse the "Go To Church" campaign from January to Easter and during this period cultivate inactive members and seek to win them to Christ and his Church.

7. That we shall give emphasis to the State-wide Evangelistic Rally in Columbia January 26-27.

8. That all our pastors enlist consecrated laymen whom they can recommend for certification and that these certified laymen be used as much as possible during the period of the "Go To Church" campaign. It is further recommended that the names of all certified laymen be given to the district superintendent in the district in which they reside.

9. That we strongly recommend the Builder's Club for each of the districts of our Conference and that we continue to give support in the formation of new churches.

10. That every church and charge seek to have a minimum net gain of 10% in membership during the year 1954-1955.

11. That careful training be given to children and young people's classes to be received on Palm Sunday and that instruction be given to ALL persons received into the church.

12. That a careful follow-up be made on all members received, that they may be assimilated adequately into the life of The Methodist Church.

Report from Epworth Children's Home

Last year Epworth cared for a total of 294 children, with an enrollment at present of 256. During the year, 38 children were admitted and 55 dismissed. At the present time all available spaces are taken, with the exception of ten vacancies which will be filled as soon as the Dantzler Home remodelling is completed.

During the calendar year of 1953, we gave a total of 90,712 days of institutional care at a cost of \$2.70 per day. This is a yearly per capita cost of \$984.11.

At the present time we have a staff of more than 40 people. In addition to these, several doctors—surgeons and specialists—give us much free service.

The health of the children continues to be good. Our children are under the close supervision of a well-trained nurse who supervises the infirmary. They are checked for weight, have regular trips to the dentist, and have their chests X-rayed regularly. We have one regular dentist and one physician regularly employed, and they are always available and are most cooperative. In addition to this, the Columbia and Baptist hospitals and many Columbia physicians and surgeons give us much free service.

The campus religious life continues to be under the capable direction of Rev. Joe W. Giles. Our church carries a full program of religious activities and it is one of the most important phases of our program.

The public schools of Columbia are providing splendid training for our children and youth. The school officials cooperate with Epworth in every way. Staff and public school teachers alike look with favor on this part of our program, since there is every evidence that it produces a wonderful opportunity for growth and development of each student.

The campus athletic program was discontinued during the year. It was the thinking of the Board of Trustees that our youth ought to be given this added opportunity to participate in the regular activities of their own school. This, they believe, will add much to their social growth and development.

A campus recreation program has been added to the campus life. It is under the direction of a very capable leader and it consists of activities in the new recreation building, campus recreation, recreation in the cottages, participation in community recreation, and a program for the training of leaders. The new swimming pool also adds much to this part of life on the campus.

A business manager has been added to the staff of Epworth. It was thought to be essential by the Board of Trustees since there are so many details of program and business for which the Superintendent is responsible.

The addition of a Social Service Department is, perhaps, one of the most outstanding achievements made during the year. The Board of Trustees authorized the organization of this Department with three workers. During the year the workers have been secured and their work is getting under way. It is already proving to be of great help in providing better service to the children, youth, and families in need of help from Epworth.

The building program is considered complete. During the year the recreation building and swimming pool have been constructed. The small portion of roads left unfinished because of the removal of old buildings have now been completed. The landscaping of the campus is well under way and will be completed within the next few years.

We are deeply grateful to our District Superintendents, pastors, and all of our people for the constant, substantial support you have given

to your Home for children. For current support, we have received from the churches this year, through October 26, \$234,159.44, broken down as follows:

THE METHODIST HOME FOR THE AGING

We have moved rapidly toward the establishment and operation of the South Carolina Methodist Home for the Aging. Since the Annual Conference, on October 24, 1953, gave authority to the chartered Board of Hospitals and Homes to purchase and operate a Home, the Edgewood Sanitorium, Inc., Orangeburg, S. C., property was purchased on November 2, 1953, from Dr. Orin R. Yost for \$105,000.00. As of October 9, 1954, a total of \$30,544.22 has been paid on the property leaving a balance of \$74,147.62 with interest. As of October 19, 1954, the income is as follows:

We have thirty residents in the Home with a capacity of forty until further renovations are made. The charge per month is \$100.00 for normal care. 30% of the residents are assisted by the Home. One-tenth of the residents are non-Methodists.

There are twelve white staff members—including the superintendent and infirmary nurses—and five colored. These can care for the larger number of residents. The above does not include the doctors who render efficient service to the Home.

We do not take nursing care patients, but do have a ten bed licensed infirmary where those who need such service after they have become residents are cared for. The general health of the Home is fair. We lost one resident by death due to a stroke.

The buildings are being kept in good repair and the grounds in attractive condition. Improvements are being made all along. Most of our buildings are very adaptable to the use made of them. We consider our chapel where service is held each Sunday morning as a very important part of our Home. The services are well attended by the residents and staff members. Visitors are always welcome.

We feel ourselves very fortunate in being able to operate this first year in the black. We are ever grateful to one and all who have contributed individually or through the church and her organizations to the support of the Home.

We deeply appreciate the fine leadership of the ministers along with a number of laymen who have led the people to give their support, backed by the enthusiasm of a large number of individuals and groups who have visited us. We cordially invite more individuals and groups to visit the Home to see just what the Methodist Home is doing for those who need such loving care during their sunset years of life. We believe when this is done, we will get sufficient support to finish paying for the property and to operate in a progressive manner.

Copies of the audit have been given to the World Service Commission and to the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES REPORT

Stewardship of Possessions Program

The Conference Board of Lay Activities followed the program which was adopted by the last Annual Conference and recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities. The Conference Lay Leader was elected Conference Director of Stewardship and the Conference Joint Commission on Promotion and Cultivation held two full day training sessions. Supplies were purchased from the General Board of Lay Activities and each district held a district wide training course for District Directors and local Church Directors. These meetings were well attended by both lay and ministerial representatives from the Charges.

Evidence indicates that there has been a noticeable spiritual and financial benefit realized. The Conference reports will show increases in Mission Specials, preachers' salaries, and other activities as well as the healthy condition of most local church budgets. The reports from districts show that few churches have moved beyond the initial promotional steps of the program. It is the consensus that the plan offered by the General Board of Lay Activities has not failed but that too few churches have so far given the plan an adequate trial. We therefore make the following recommendations:

1. That the program as outlined and adopted last year be continued.
2. That we accept as our goal a stewardship training and visiting program in every local church.
3. That where needed, new or additional personnel be selected for positions of directing and training who are enthusiastic, energetic and resourceful tithers.
4. That this program work through and with the assistance of the pastor in charge.
5. That we urge the local churches to make liberal use of the printed material and other aids available.
6. That a greater use be made of Bishop Harrell's book, **Stewardship and the Tithe**, through study courses, church school classes and other church organizations.

Methodist Men's Clubs

Our quota for the quadrennium is 184 Methodist Men's Clubs. We now have 122 chartered Methodist Men's Clubs. This means that we lack 62 of reaching our quota for the quadrennium. The Board of Lay Activities has accepted this as its goal for the year and recommends to the Conference that we organize and charter not less than six clubs in each district during the Conference year.

Charge Lay Leaders

The Board of Lay Activities again calls attention to the fact that charge lay leaders need not be chairman of official boards. This permits more flexibility in the selection of lay leaders best qualified to carry out the duties of lay leader with the further advantage that they will have more time to function adequately if they do not occupy the dual position.

Laymen's Day

We recommend that Laymen's Day be observed in every charge on the fourth Sunday in February. That the district superintendents and pastors be requested to fix this date on their calendars and that the day be kept clear for this purpose. That the charge lay leader report to the district lay leader on the observance of Laymen's Day by his charge.

Meeting of the Board of Lay Activities

We recommend that a meeting of the district Board of Lay Activities be held in every district on some convenient date to be fixed by the district lay leader in January or February; and that this meeting devote its attention to stewardship cultivation and other activities of his year's program.

Laymen's Conference at Lake Junaluska

We recommend that each charge lay leader attend the Jurisdictional Laymen's Conference at Lake Junaluska, July 28-31, 1955. We urge Methodist Men's Clubs to send representatives to this important conference, and that the charges and clubs provide for a portion, if not all, of the expenses of their delegates to this conference. Through the years this conference has devoted its program to inspiring and informing Laymen of the work of the church. We recommend that pastors and district Boards of Lay Activities lend every effort to encourage attendance to this inspiring conference.

Program of Action Presented to Charge Lay Leaders

We recommend that a copy of these objectives be sent to every charge lay leader in the South Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Our people are responding better each year to the missionary appeal of their church. We are giving more money, studying more, more prayers are being said and recruitment done. To all who are doing this we give our hearty thanks and feel confident that increasingly our people will say with Wesley, "The world is our parish."

November 14th is a very important date and it is hoped that the cause of Korea will be presented to every congregation, for we know that wherever the story of this heroic people's need is told there will be a hearty and liberal response. Let every congregation be sure that it does its full part. Adequate literature and rice bags for offering should be ordered immediately.

Attendance at our District Missionary Institutes has continued to grow. Our institutes this year will be held December 6-10. Dr. James Ellis and Mrs. Niles Clark will be our principal speakers. We are most appreciative of the fine work done among us by our missionaries who have spoken while home on furlough. It is hoped that our churches will make increasing use of them.

Many of our churches have active Commission on Missions and it is our goal to have such in every church. Our district missionary secretaries have given able leadership along this line, as they have in every field in which we have called upon them.

Every church should have a Church School of Missions. Our study book for the coming year, **Crowded Ways**, is one of the best in recent years and presents a field that all need to make a matter of vital concern. We need to see that children and youth are provided for in our plans of missionary education. Let us make more use of the fourth Sunday in the church school, widely circulate **World Outlook** and other missionary publications, use the fine motion pictures and slides now available, see that more missionary sermons are preached. In too many areas of the world it has been truthfully said, "Missions retreated and communism walked in." Our people are more interested than ever before and it is up to us to feed that interest with challenging information.

We are not building new churches as we should. There needs to be a better organized effort both to locate and build new churches. Some districts are using the **TEN DOLLAR CLUB** plan to good effect. The funds of our church extension section of our Board of Missions are

nothing like adequate to meet our needs. It would be well to consider the advisability of having such a conference wide effort as "One Day's Pay for Church Extension" or some similar plan.

We commend our Conference Commission on Christian Vocations for the fine meeting held at Wofford College last spring. It is hoped that the appeal for Church Vocations is being constantly put before our people and that the local church Committee on Christian Vocations is active in enlisting and helping to train our youth.

REPORT ON ADVANCE MISSION SPECIALS 1953-54

During the Conference Year 1953-54 the Methodist of the South Carolina Conference gave to Advance Mission Specials a total of \$115,557. This is an increase of \$14,686 over the previous year. Giving by districts was as follows:

Districts showing the largest gain over last year were Columbia, Marion, Orangeburg and Rock Hill. In many districts every church has a special and in practically every district every charge has at least one. To Bishop Harrell for his able leadership in this matter, to our faithful district superintendents and pastors and to our generous and loyal laymen we express our deep appreciation. South Carolina Methodism is well at the head of the list in giving to Advance Specials, The Week of Dedication, and other calls from the mission field. We wish to call attention to the various areas in which you may select your Advance Specials for the coming year.

Foreign Specials

Last year we had as our goal the raising of \$25,000 for the building of Wesley Church in Porto Alegre, Brazil. Approximately \$15,000 has been secured. It is hoped that the remainder will be given as quickly as possible as these worthy friends are dependent upon us and praying that we will soon enable them to complete their church. As soon as this has been raised we are asked to contribute \$10,000 toward the erection of a new church at Sorocaba, Brazil. Just as we have Rev. D. L. Betts at Porto Alegre, we have another South Carolina Missionary at Sorocaba.

He is Rev. Cyrus B. Dawsey, Jr. The local congregation has recently built a parsonage and is laboring sacrificially to build a new church. With the help from their South Carolina brethren they will be able to do so, just before Bishop Cyrus Dawsey retires. What a fine way to honor this great missionary from our state!

"You doubled the efficiency of Rev. Joe Maw's program when you sent him the much needed truck." This statement of appreciation came from Bishop Newell Booth of the Elizabethville Area, Belgian Congo. Bishop Booth asks that this year we raise at least \$2,000 for the Social Service Center at Kindu. Here we have a fine worker who is hampered by a lack of funds. Many of our churches will want to take a \$100 share in the support of this work. Since Brother Maw is from our state, we will want to contribute \$1,000 for the purchase of much needed equipment for the agricultural center there. Our trained and consecrated workers must be aided by essential equipment. Bishop Booth will be our speaker in our District Missionary Institutes in the fall of 1955. Let us hear his call for aid in the needy area he serves.

We rejoice that more and more of our churches are assuming the support of our missionaries. Our record in this field is most commendable. While the Board of Missions urges that churches accept at least a \$1,200 share, shares as small as \$800 can be secured. The full cost of supporting a missionary and his family is \$4,800.

The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief should receive many of our smaller specials. These include gifts to emergency areas such as India, Korea, etc. A church may write for information and designate its gift anywhere it chooses. We wish to stress the importance of securing homes for refugees. Miss Elizabeth Lee is now heading up this vital task and will be happy to give you any information you desire.

We must do something about aiding in the building of a Christian college in Alaska. Our people there are desperately in need of such an institution and we are hoping that several of our churches will respond to this worthy plea.

Conference Specials

Methodism is not adequately meeting the challenge in the areas surrounding the Savannah River H-Bomb Project. We have built a few new churches but the situation cries out for better response. Let us not allow this wonderful opportunity for growth to slip from us. Local groups are loyal and sacrificial but cannot meet the need unaided. More churches should include this as one of their specials. While the population in this area is not as congested as a year ago, there are still many, many more than ever before and communities are growing. There are some that have no church and if Methodism could step in and take the lead our growth would be assured. Let us place this important field upon the hearts of our people.

During the past year a Methodist Student Center has been purchased adjoining the campus of the University of South Carolina. This is a wonderful step and a fine program is now being carried forward. The remaining indebtedness on this lovely and useful property is \$11,000. It is hoped that enough churches will respond to this need to enable the debt to be removed this year.

For several years the Methodist students at Winthrop College have

centered their religious activities in a small cottage adjoining the campus. This cottage is now far too small and antiquated to properly meet the needs of this fine group of young women. Students cannot be asked to stand out in the yard or on the porch in winter weather. There just is not sufficient room. The local committee has approached the matter from every angle and determined that the only solution is the building of a new center. The sum of \$12,000 must be raised; this is in addition to funds already secured. The youth of our colleges are more interested in religion than in many years. We are fortunate to have fine directors of our work and we simply must see that adequate facilities are provided.

Year after year we have asked that something be done to help our negro brethren at John's Island. Why is it that we do not heed their plea? They are doing so much with the little they have. The General Board of Missions has done all it can for them and has asked our conference to accept them as a mission special. Funds are desperately needed to maintain this rural center that ministers to the total life of our needy brethren. The Woman's Division would be glad to supply additional workers were there adequate facilities for them to use. It is up to the Methodists of South Carolina to help these who cannot help themselves.

District Specials

Every district should have an active District Board of Church Location and Building. It is hoped that more of our districts will follow the plan of organizing the Ten Dollar Club. The idea being the members are to contribute ten dollars each time a new church is built provided too many calls are not made each year. With the rapid growth of our population it is essential that Methodist churches be built. Outside help is always needed and when promptly and liberally provided advantage can be taken of strategic opportunities. Our Conference Board of Missions has but a small amount to appropriate each year, far below the needs for our rapidly developing area. Let special emphasis be given to this vital phase of need.

Always be sure to designate the project you desire to receive your gift. We are happy that individuals, Sunday School classes as well as churches are now assuming specials and that many churches carry several specials. This is a fine achievement and we know that we will continue to move forward.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The Methodist Church has received her commission from Jesus Christ, our Lord, to whom we must look for wisdom and guidance in our effort to free the world from the destructive forces of evil that prey upon human life.

As followers of Christ and as Methodists, we unhesitatingly declare unending war upon the alcohol beverage industry and all other agencies that exploit human weakness for the sake of gain.

At the same time, we would give ourselves to creative and positive effort, through educational and evangelistic processes to produce a Christian social order. This involves the establishment of patterns of life in which alcoholic beverages have no place. The lives of all people need to be remolded by Christ, so that we shall find our satisfaction in His way of life. Every Methodist home and every Methodist Church should be a dynamic center of temperance training and activity.

Methodism is committed to the task of helping to destroy the alcoholic beverage industry. It is our purpose to limit and weaken the influence and power of the liquor traffic; to outlaw it, and deny it legal sanction; and, ultimately, to destroy it.

We recommend that this Conference hereby declare its whole-hearted support of the campaign for a county local option law for our

state. We urge the State legislature, at its next session, to enact a county referendum law which will give the citizens of each county the democratic privilege of determining whether or not alcoholic beverages may be sold within the county. We urge the Methodist people of our state to discharge their citizenship duties by participating in the local option campaign in their communities and counties. An aroused public opinion can make itself heard in the Legislative halls in Columbia. We commend all members of the Legislature who supported the county local option bills in the House or Senate, without crippling amendments.

We also commend the Legislature for providing funds for the salary and expenses of the State Supervisor of Alcohol Education in the public schools. Professor A. M. Taylor has been appointed to this office, having previously served in this capacity. In every community, Methodist people should ask the public school authorities to follow Mr. Taylor's directives in putting alcohol education into the public school curriculum.

We also commend the Legislature for having enacted a bill providing for the establishment of a State Rehabilitation Center for Alcoholics, and we urge the Legislature to provide the necessary funds for the establishment and operation of this center. We call attention to the increasing tax burden necessary to provide additional courts, jails, reformatories and rehabilitation centers—all necessitated by the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages.

We note 143 fewer deaths in South Carolina this year up to the last report than during the same period last year. We commend the State Highway Department, safety conferences, schools, and newspapers for their persistent efforts for safety. We especially cite *The State*, edited by Mr. Sam Latimer, for its contribution to the highway safety program. We recommend that our Churches join in this movement for safety. We are shocked by the terrible slaughter of people on the highways, much of it resulting from the use of alcoholic beverages.

We call attention to the alarming increase of delinquency, vandalism and crime by children and adolescent youth. The Church must redouble its efforts to provide Christian instruction and fellowship for the young. The Christian home must be re-established and parents given a new sense of their responsibilities.

We urge the State Legislature to revise and modernize the laws of the State under which juvenile offenders are tried and punished. There should be a state-wide system of juvenile courts. The criminal laws which provide the death penalty for certain crimes should be amended so that the death sentence will not be given to immature adolescent offenders. Reformation, and not vindictive punishment should be the State's aim in dealing with youthful criminals.

Our state and nation are responsible for allowing the corruption of children and youth by selfish interests that exploit human ignorance and weakness for the sake of gain. Drink, crime, horror, and sex are exploited on the moving picture and television screens, in radio programs, in cheap books, magazines, and comics. Unless the Christian people of this nation bestir themselves, the powers of evil will

undermine the social fabric of our nation. Christianity and modern paganism cannot co-exist. Will the followers of Christ sleep on for another generation, until it is too late?

In all our local churches, we recommend the appointment of a Temperance and Christian Action Committee, to be charged with the responsibility of developing an effective temperance program in the church.

We ask all our churches to observe Temperance Week, the first week in December, and to observe Commitment Day on Sunday, December 5. We recommend that a study course on alcohol problems be held in every church during the year.

We ask every church to make a generous offering for temperance or to put a specific amount in the church budget. Your board needs increased support with which to carry on a more effective program.

We recognize the contribution of the Christian Action Council in organizing and promoting the state-wide campaign for county local option. Under the leadership of the Reverend Howard McClain, Executive Secretary, the Council is becoming an effective agency through which the Churches can work co-operatively for civic righteousness. We are contributing to the support of the Council.

We are also contributing to the support of Fairview, a home for the treatment and care of alcoholics. We commend the Reverend Maxie Collins, Director, for his skillful and loving ministry to alcoholics.

We recommend that Methodist people give financial support to this young and growing institution, which is rapidly proving its success in dealing with alcoholics.

We recognize the important contribution which the Woman's Christian Temperance Union is making, under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. A. D. Betts, the President. Methodist women can serve the temperance cause by supporting the Union.

The General Board of Temperance of The Methodist Church in Washington provided program leaders for state-wide seminars on alcohol education, which was held at Columbia College in September. The General Board is asking for contributions from interested people in our state, and throughout the nation, for the purpose of producing an outstanding temperance film at an estimated cost of \$125,000. We urge generous contributions by many people.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Commission on Christian Vocations is pleased to report that its major aim for the conference year was successfully promoted and carried out. With the close cooperation of our resident Bishop, Bishop Costen J. Harrell, a Conference on Christian Vocations was held at Wofford College on March 5, 6, 7, 1954. A total enrollment of some 250 young people, both high school and college ages, was reached on this occasion.

The purposes of this conference were four-fold:

1. To inspire and challenge youth with the needs and opportunities in church vocations, and to interest youth in making a choice of a vocation within the church.
2. To give youth the opportunity for personal contact with leaders in the church who can give reliable information about the many vocations within the church.
3. To give youth the opportunity to counsel with the representatives of each of the chief vocational areas in the church and thus to arrive at a wise choice among the many vocations in which youth might serve the Kingdom of God.
4. To provide a fellowship in the South Carolina Conference for young people with the common purpose of life within the church.

We believe that these purposes were fulfilled and we are grateful to Bishop Harrell, to Wofford College, and to every person who shared in the planning and execution of this endeavor.

COMMISSION ON GROUP INSURANCE

Our Conference group insurance policy with the Prudential Insurance Company was amended early in the year to provide an increased coverage of \$1,000, and a maximum coverage of \$4,000. There are 327 members of the Conference who are insured in this policy with a total of \$1,240,500 insurance in force on the group. Our policy is designed to provide the greatest amount of life protection at the lowest rate. The policy also provides total disability protection up to sixty years of age.

All ministers as they are received into the Conference may become insured without medical examination within the next sixty days. However, no member of the Conference is eligible for insurance who is not in full-time employment in this State.

The annual premium dues of the ministers are to be paid in full on the first of January of each calendar year. However, each one has the option of paying one-half the amount on January first, and the other half on July first. All payments should be sent to Mr. George Beach, Treasurer, Columbia, S. C. The rate is \$10 per thousand on the amount for which one is insured.

Following retirement, the minister's dues are paid for him by your Commission, out of the funds appropriated by the Annual Conference. Superannuate ministers are not eligible for new or increased coverage, but are fully protected for the rest of life for the amount of their

**COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK
REPORT NO. 1**

There is an ever-growing interest in the program of the Commission on Town and Country Work. This fact reveals that the constructive program of the commission is now yielding a harvest in terms of our desired objectives, in the field of our operation.

The commission met twice this year, first in April, and again in September. Marked progress was definitely shown in the reports of the various committees.

(1) Information has been given to our constituency throughout the year, both through the press and by direct mail,—with reference to what is happening in the rural churches, and what is being offered to them by our commission.

(2) In cooperation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service, we have labored earnestly to achieve the goals we have set for this phase of our program. The church development program committee, and Mrs. Hoyt Bookhardt's committee have adopted the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference's recommendation that we follow the **Church Development Program**, sponsored by Emory University, and the Sears Roebuck Foundation, jointly. We commend this program to all rural and town churches in centers of population of 5,000, or less.

(3) With the assistance of the Board of Missions, our commission

will continue the splendid work already known generally as "The Berkeley County Parish". This type of service is highly recommended for other areas in our Annual Conference.

(4) We are highly pleased with the generous response to our commission's request previously that local churches, and charges, provide for "moving expenses" of our ministers from one pastoral charge to another; and, that the local churches include "travel allowances" in the church budget, either as a separate item, or add it to the salary account. Increasingly, this is being done, voluntarily, as a general practice throughout the Annual Conference, we are told.

(5) Our program of "Service Training" continues, and a large number of our ministers attended the Rural Church Conference at Clemson College in August, during Farm and Home Week. We were represented also at the jurisdictional Town and Country Church Program at Lake Junaluska in August.

(6) We rejoice to report that the Methodist Rural Fellowship is growing rapidly under the capable leadership of a great layman, viz., Mr. H. W. Perrow, Promotion Secretary. This is an organization for all Methodist members, and is in no sense competing with our Commission's program, but rather implements it.

THE COMMISSION RECOMMENDS:

(1) That every rural church will observe, "**Harvest Program**" before December 1. And, that a free-will offering be received, and applied upon, "The Bishop's Appeal for Korea," or the "Golden Cross Fund," as each congregation may choose.

(2) That "**Rural Life Sunday**" be observed on May 15 (Rogation Sunday), or as near that time as possible, and that an offering be received, to be applied upon the expenses of persons designated to attend the quadrennial Rural Work Conference, Bloomington, Ind., July 22-25, 1955. Here, we will face the future, and map plans for the next half-century in Rural Church Life and Work.

(3) That the recommended "Standards for Methodist Parsonages" (printed in the Annual Conference Minutes of 1950) be our present standard, in this matter.

**COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK
REPORT NO. 2**

The recommended "Standards for Methodist Parsonages" which were adopted by our commission are as follows:

(1) Methodist parsonage buildings should contain at least three bed-rooms, living room, dining room, kitchen, pantry, window shades and curtains (where curtains are needed). Where the church building does not provide a study for the pastor, a study should be included in the parsonage, said parsonage to be equipped with running water and sewage, and with proper facilities for heating the home.

(2) The parsonage should be furnished with rugs and all necessary furniture, including a modern cook stove; electric refrigerator, or its equivalent; an automatic water heater and comfortable beds with either new or renovated mattresses.

(3) The minister's family shall furnish their own bed covering, pillows, linen, silver, china, cooking utensils, baby bed, and all other personal items desired for their comfort.

(4) The ministers and their families are requested to take care of their parsonage homes and the furnishings to the best of their ability, and to leave both the home and the premises in good condition.

(5) Finally, these resolutions are to be read at the fourth and the first quarterly conferences in each pastoral charge of our Annual Conference.

RESOLUTION

Whereas at a meeting of the Town and Country Commission on September 21, 1954, the chairman of the Commission, Rev. John V. Murray appointed a special committee of four with the unanimous approval of the members present, to study the question of establishing a co-operative credit union for ministerial members of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church and bring a report to the Annual Conference.

And whereas said committee did study the question of organizing such a union, and did confer with leaders of other such co-operative unions, and did study the reports from Methodist co-operative unions in California and Virginia, and did note their outstanding success.

And whereas such co-operative credit union being a purely voluntary organization, imposes no obligation to join and involves the Conference in no financial responsibility.

And whereas the members of such co-operative unions are encouraged in the practice of thrift, are assured of emergency and other loans at reasonable interest rates on convenient repayment terms, and are able to profit while lending assistance to others.

And whereas the General Assembly of South Carolina in February, 1952, passed an act encouraging the formation and regulating the practices of co-operative credit unions, "for the purpose of promoting thrift among its members and to enable them when in need, to obtain for productive and provident purposes moderate loans of money for short periods and at reasonable rates of interest."

Therefore be it resolved that the Bishop be authorized to appoint a committee of this Conference consisting of eight members to study the matter further and if they deem it advisable, to effect the organization of a co-operative credit union for members of the South Carolina Methodist Conference.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

Your Commission on World Peace feels very keenly that the present world crisis is the Church's great opportunity to serve civilization. The atomic scientists are evangelistic in their pronouncements that whatever happens to mankind must not let another war get started. We thank God for the work that is being done in and through the United Nations Organization, but this organization needs the unrelenting and unceasing services of the Church. "It must be of the spirit if we are to save the flesh."

The Church has mobilized public opinion to a certain degree, yet we feel that the Church has not awakened to its possibilities, responsibilities and privileges. While there is at present no open warfare in progress we seem to sense the fact that even those who have their ears to the ground are uncertain of what may happen in the next twenty-four hours.

We have but to read our newspapers, or listen to the radio, to learn that our world is still an armed camp. The unity once manifest among our allies is broken. Even the unity of our nation has disappeared, and the crisis which the Church faces is, in many respects, greater than it was even a year ago.

We should not succumb to pessimism in a frank recognition of the state of affairs. Rather, the Church can now make, verily, must make, a more definite contribution toward world peace. The Church can no more save the flesh, much less the spirit, than could the military leaders win the war without coming to grips with the specific means of accomplishment. Just as winning the war meant factories, assembly lines, material, and strategy; so world unity demands study, work, organization, money, and planning.

Our great Church is committed to the ideal of world peace. Therefore your commission recommends that the stewardship of peace be kept ever before our people in precept and action by:

1. Vigorous support of the missionary work of our church as our our best means to world brotherhood.
2. Placing a course in the area of world peace in each training school of three or more classes.
3. Using outstanding and informed speakers in the field of world citizenship in our camps, assemblies, institutes, district conferences, annual conference, and pastors' schools.
4. Requesting the Bishop and his planning committee to secure Dr.

Charles Boss, Jr., or Dr. Ralph Sockman, or some other world peace advocate, to speak at the 1955 Annual Conference.

5. Each local church organizing according to the 1952 **Discipline**, paragraph 246 (9).

6. We reaffirm our opposition to any system of peace-time universal military training. In this we stand on the platform laid down by the General Conference in paragraph 2026, Section 8, in the **Discipline**.

7. We urge each minister of the South Carolina Conference to arrange a special service Sunday, October 31, 1954, or as early thereafter as is possible.

**COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE
REPORT NO. 1**

The commission desires conformity between the pastor's reports and funds actually received by the Conference Treasurer. In the past we have had instances in which money, in the hands of local and church treasurers has not been remitted in sufficient time for stated reports.

In order to effect more accurate reporting and accounting we recommend the following procedure:

1. Any church treasurer, or pastor, remitting funds to the Conference Treasurer shall use a prescribed remittance form.

2. This form shall show in detail the causes for which the remittance is made, and shall be made in duplicate and both copies sent to the Conference Treasurer.

3. The treasurer shall "receipt" the carbon copy and return to the sender.

4. Churches so desiring may have those sending remittances make a third copy for deposit in the church office, or with the pastor.

5. In making reports to the District Conference, and to the Annual Conference, our pastors are urged to make use of these "receipted" remittance forms.

6. In order to enable church treasurers and pastors to comply with this requirement, the Conference Treasurer shall furnish the necessary forms with carbon paper for making the "copy" of the report.

7. At the end of each three months the Conference Treasurer shall send to each District Superintendent a charge by charge report on payment of all items due to be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

8. In order to simplify the matter of making reports we urge our churches to designate one person from each charge (certainly from each church) to remit funds to the Conference Treasurer.

9. Thirty days before the convening of Annual Conference the Conference Treasurer shall send to each pastor an itemized statement of all funds received from his charge, and a carbon copy of each report to the District Superintendent.

10. We urge each pastor to check with his treasurer (or treasurers) before sending his report to the statistician, to see that all amounts reported as paid have been remitted.

Report No. 4

1. The Board of Conference Claimants is asking for an assessment of \$173,275.00 to be distributed to the claimants. This is 5% of the net total funds raised for the Conference year 1952-53.

2. We approve a minimum salary fund of .75 of the net total funds raised for 1952-53 as indicated above. This is in compliance with the minimum salary scale in the Conference Standing Rules.

3. We recommend that the District Superintendents and the District Stewards be allowed to make adjustments in salary items (District Superintendents, Conference Claimants, and Minimum Salary) where there is evidence of inequity in these items. However, no changes affecting the District totals may be made.

4. The Conference requires every active minister who is a member of the Annual Conference to pay 2% of his total cash salary to the Conference Claimants Fund. This applies to approved supply pastors.

5. The Episcopal Fund is an amount equal to 2% of the cash salary for the current year.

6. We approve the plan of the Board of Temperance to ask for a voluntary offering on Commitment Sunday. Funds derived are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the account of the Board of Temperance.

7. We recommend that Race Relations Day be observed the second Sunday in February, and that wherever possible, a voluntary offering be taken for Negro work. Further, the Conference Treasurer, in reporting these funds to the General Board of Education, shall ask that they be directed to Paine College.

8. We recommend that the offering for Church School Rally Day be an amount equal to 2% of the pastor's salary.

This Trust Fund now amounts to \$15,425.58 and is held in trust for payment of the claims of the following retired ministers: M. L. Banks, G. W. Dukes, Irvin Frye, C. C. Herbert, T. G. Herbert, J. T. Inabnit, G. L. Ingram, E. Z. James, W. R. Jones, G. F. Kirby, D. O. Spires, and J. B. Weldon. This money is invested in various Building & Loan Associations throughout the State and it

is increasing from year to year by the amount of interest which the fund earns. Disbursements from this fund are made by the Treasurer on vouchers signed by the Chairman and the Secretary of the Commission on World Service & Finance.

COKESBURY CONFERENCE SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

The Cokesbury Conference Institute Committee appointed by this Conference at its 1953 Session begs leave to report as follows:

Your committee was charged in the resolution, 1953 Journal and Year Book, page 145, to study all aspects of the Cokesbury property and to make recommendations regarding the same to the next Annual Conference.

That meetings of this committee have been held, the Cokesbury premises and property have been visited and inspected, and conferences with the superintendent of education for Greenwood County have been held.

At the 1918 session of the Upper South Carolina Conference, the following resolution of the Board of Education was offered and adopted:

"At the urgent request of the citizens of Cokesbury, the old school building with three and five-tenths (3.5) acres of land was reserved, and the Trustees recommended that they be authorized to sell the same for a nominal sum to the white citizens of the town of Cokesbury for school purposes; provided, if it ceases to be used for school purposes, it revert to the Church."

The records in the Clerk of Court's office for Greenwood County shows that: "G. F. Clarkson, F. T. Blackman, and T. L. Munneryn,

members of the Board of Trustees of the Cokesbury Conference School was empowered by the Upper South Carolina Conference", and for a consideration of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars conveyed to the Trustees of the Cokesbury School District No. 7, three and one-half (3½) acres of land, which includes the building. This deed is recorded in Deed Book 43 at page 58.

Your attention is called to the fact that the resolution authorizing the transfer of this property to the school district did not carry the reversionary clause as found in the resolution which provides that if it ceases to be used for school purposes, the property shall revert to the Church, however, the deed does use the word **empowered** by the Upper South Carolina Conference.

For quite some years this property has been used by Greenwood County for school purposes, but in the consolidation of school districts this property has ceased to be used as a school.

Your committee requested the county school authorities to release the property to the Conference, and the following letter from Mr. W. R. Dunn, Superintendent of Education, was furnished as the county's reply:

"At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of School District No. 50, held September 27, the Board passed a motion providing that if the Methodist Conference would set up a responsible agency to care for the Cokesbury School property and make provisions for the lease now held by the Masonic Lodge on a portion of the property, School District No. 50 would then convey its interest in said property to said agency, as set up by said Conference.

At a meeting of the County Board of Education, held September 29, the County Board gave its consent to the foregoing action of the Board of District 50."

It would appear to your committee that it was the intent and purpose then of the Upper South Carolina Methodist Conference to permit Greenwood County to use the property for school purposes, and when it ceases to be so utilized, the title would revert to the Conference.

It further appears to the committee that the department of education of Greenwood County feels that it has some interest or right to the property, and in view of this dual claim or interest in the title, your committee did not feel warranted in making recommendations regarding the preservation of the site for educational and historical purposes.

We are of the opinion that the title to the property now vests in the South Carolina Conference, and it should enjoy full control and supervision thereof.

WE THEREFORE RECOMMEND:

(1) That the committee appointed at the October, 1953 session of the Annual Conference be continued.

(2) That the Board of Trustees of this Conference be directed to take such action as may be necessary to clear the title to the property in accordance with the Resolution of the 1918 Session of the Upper South Carolina Conference.

(3) That the committee be directed to make a report at the 1955 Session of this Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MICRO-FILMING OF ADVOCATE

We your Committee to seek the micro-filming of the Southern Christian Advocate for the 19th century (1837-1900) beg leave to report that our task has been accomplished, and we did not go beyond the \$200 limit set by the Historical Society.

1. The Board of Managers of the Southern Christian Advocate gave hearty co-operation, and the negative produced belongs to the Advocate. Twelve sets of 16 films have been sold at \$128 per set to various libraries and institutions. So neither the Advocate nor the Historical Society are in debt because of the successful issue of this project.

2. One set of these micro-films is in the archives of the Historical Society at Wofford College under the care of our curator, Mr. Herbert Hucks, Jr., who has given invaluable aid to the enterprise. The Society does not have a reading machine in which to use the micro-films, but Wofford College Library does have one. Thus, both the library and the society can easily co-operate in the research projects which may arise from time to time.

3. The first film contains the full file of the Wesleyan Journal founded in Charleston in 1825, and after a year and a half was merged with the Christian Advocate of New York. Dr. J. Emerson Ford says that Wofford College has the only complete file of this early publication. The Southern Christian Advocate began publication in June 1837. We hope that the Board of Advocate Managers will have the micro-filming continued down to the present time.

4. We are greatly indebted to the Wofford Library for the loan of the Wesleyan Journal file; to the Library of Candler School of Theology at Emory University for the loan of six and a half years of the Advocate file which we do not have in this State; and to Dr. R. L. Meriwether of

the South Caroliniana Library at the University of South Carolina for having the micro-filming done through their facilities.

THE COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES REPORT NO. 1

Your committee recommends the following changes and additions to the standing rules of the Conference:

Under Section B, item 2, after the word "Conference" in line 2 add the words "including each preacher received from other denominations or by transfer", so that the item shall read: The Conference Secretary shall prepare a biographical sketch of each preacher received into full connection with the Conference, including each preacher received from other denominations or by transfer, this sketch to be printed in the Journal and Yearbook.

Section C. Nominations and Board Organizations. At the end of item I add: "Nominations to fill vacancies occurring during a session of the Annual Conference shall be made before adjournment of that session of the Conference.

Item 2. Delete the last sentence referring to the same matter.

Section D. Board of Missions and Church Extension. Delete the words: "And Church Extension" both in the title and the paragraph to conform to the new name of the board. In line 3 delete the word "other" and have it read: "Such additional members" rather than "such OTHER additional members."

Section E. Board of Education: Delete the word "other" from line 2, item 1 for the same reason mentioned above in Section D.

Section G. Board of Hospitals and Homes. Add item 2 to read: Until the session of the 1956 Annual Conference the Board of Hospitals and Homes, Inc., shall continue to operate the Methodist Home for the Aging under a resolution adopted by the Annual Conference in 1953 (See Journal 1953, pages 133 and 134.)

Section I. Board of Social and Economic Relations. There shall be a Board of Social and Economic Relations to be composed of 5 ministers and 5 laymen. (Par. 1559, 1952 Discipline.)

2. The Board shall make an annual report to the Annual Conference.

Section N. Benevolences and Other Funds. In line 3 after the word "and" add the word "other." After the word "funds" delete the words "Listed in N-5", so that the line shall read: "Conference claimants and other funds in accord with Par. 805 . . ."

Section Q. Support of the Ministry. Add the words: "And the Home for the Aging" after the parenthesis in next to the last line in item 11.

Rephrase the concluding sentence to read: ". . . on church and parsonage buildings and grounds, special funds (including building and endowment, not support funds) for Epworth Children's Home and for the Methodist Home for the Aging, and money raised for special mission purposes over and above any apportionment for benevolences."

Section R. Lay Delegates to the Annual Conference. Add at the end of item 1: "At least six weeks prior to the session of the Annual Conference" so that the amended item shall read: "Lay delegates and reserve lay delegates to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually in each pastoral charge at least six weeks prior to the session of the Annual Conference."

Add item 2 to read: "Each district superintendent shall transmit immediately the completed list of the lay delegates from his district in duplicate to the Conference Secretary."

COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES REPORT NO. 2

The committee has had before it a proposal to amend paragraph 2 of Section E Board of Education by exempting Wofford College and Columbia College from the requirement that one-fourth of the Trustees shall be changed every two years and that no Trustee shall serve for more than eight years consecutively, and also a proposal to amend paragraph 14 of Section A General Regulations by exempting members of the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference from the rule limiting tenure to not more than eight years consecutively.

The committee recommends non-concurrence in both of these proposals, in order that a thorough study may be made of the whole question of conference policy respecting boards of trust, the election and tenure of members of such boards, and other related questions for report to the 1955 session of the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The purpose of the Woman's Society of Christian Service as found in Paragraph 253, Article 2, of the Discipline is as follows: "The purpose of the Woman's Society of Christian Service shall be to unite all the women of the church in Christian living and service; to help develop and support Christian work among women and children around the world; to develop the spiritual life; to study the needs of the world; to take part in such service activities as will strengthen the local church and improve civic, community and world conditions. To this

end this organization shall seek to enlist women, young people, and children in this Christian fellowship, and to secure funds for the activities in the local church and the support of the work undertaken at home and abroad for the establishment of a world Christian community."

This purpose has been carried out in many ways throughout the Conference during the past year.

"To unite all the women of the church in Christian living and service" new societies and guilds have been organized, and at present there are 689 Woman's Societies of Christian Service and 133 Wesleyan Service Guilds. This leaves six unorganized charges and ten unorganized churches. The number of members in the societies and guilds is 32,072. Our goal for the year is: Every woman member of the church a member of the society or guild and an organization in every church. Will you help us reach this goal?

The Conference sent \$173,679.65 to the division treasurer "to help develop and support Christian work among women and children around the world." In this amount we share with the Woman's Division in the work in 28 countries, including the United States.

The spiritual life of the women of the Conference was enriched by the retreat held at Myrtle Beach October 7-8 under the leadership of Mrs. Margaret Henrichsen, an ordained Methodist minister of North Sullivan, Maine. This was a time of quiet meditation and renewed consecration which will permeate the inner life of the entire conference. During the past year there has been an increase in the number of prayer groups and in the observance of the Quiet Day.

The School of Missions and Christian Service was held at Columbia College August 16-20, "to study the needs of the world". This school was the largest one ever held in South Carolina and the courses were taught by excellent instructors who inspired the members of their classes to go home and teach others. The courses for the year are: **The City; India, Pakistan, and Ceylon; That They May Have Life; and Jesus' Teachings Concerning Women.** The church-wide study in which women will cooperate is: **Crowded Ways.**

Seminars were held in all the districts for the presentation of the entire study program, which includes the monthly program materials and the study materials for children and youth.

At our recent Executive Committee Meeting a committee was appointed to make a survey and to study the needs in rural areas in the conference to determine whether a rural worker is needed and where is the area of greatest need. Pray with us that we may know God's leading in this undertaking. The Town and Country Commission has pledged to cooperate in this matter.

Through Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities Methodist women have found many avenues of service and have taken part in "such service activities as will strengthen the local church and improve civic, community, and world conditions," such as: strengthening the church and community resources to combat the growing alcohol and narcotics evils in the state; cooperating with the Board of Temperance workshops in the seven districts where they were held; assisting the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the South Carolina Conference,

Central Jurisdiction, in their school of missions by providing scholarships for their women; sending a large offering to UNICEF following the "Tricks or Treat" Hallowe'en programs held in cooperation with the M. Y. F.; contributing generously of their time and money to the local church programs.

Seventeen women from South Carolina attended the Fourth Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, held at Milwaukee, Wis., May 25-28. This number included a youth representative. This was the greatest church experience that has ever come in my life.

We learned that to thwart the evils around the world, as Methodist women see them, there is one paramount need. People! Workers for the foreign fields and workers for service in hundreds of places in the United States.

It was alarming to learn that during the last four years there has been a total loss of 279 commissioned workers while during that same period only 194 new missionaries and deaconesses have been commissioned. The need for personnel, both at home and abroad, is great beyond our ability to tell you.

As we think of this tremendous need we wish to express deep appreciation to Bishop Harrell and the Commission on Christian Vocations for the Christian Vocations Conference held at Wofford College, March 5-7. We are sure that seeds were planted which will bear fruit. The young people to fill the vacancies in the fields of service are in our homes, yours and mine, and we must help them to answer the call.

We are grateful for the two young women who have gone out from South Carolina this year to do special Christian service: Miss Rosa Ulsh, of Charleston, who attended the Christian Vocations Conference at Wofford, left in September for Africa to serve as an A-3, and Miss Jeannette Blakely, of Georgetown, is serving at the Wolff Settlement in Tampa, Fla., as a U.S.-2.

Advance has been made during the past year in our cooperative work with children, youth, and students. New interest is being expressed in the Methodist Student Center at Winthrop College by action of the Executive Committee providing for financial assistance to the Center. Offerings following one of our studies will provide some funds.

Women are finding joy in serving on official boards, committees and commissions in the local churches in larger numbers than in the past.

There is an ancient Syrian church in which hangs an old brass lamp. The lamp has almost one hundred arms. At the end of each arm is a cup with oil and a wick. At the close of the service, the people take a lighted wick from the lamp to light the way home through the night.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild have many more than a hundred arms. It is our hope and fervent prayer that at the end of each arm is a cup of oil and a lighted wick to guide others to Jesus Christ, the hope of the world.

**A STATEMENT CONCERNING SEGREGATION IN THE
PUBLIC SCHOOLS ADOPTED BY THE
ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

The recent decision of the United States Supreme Court concerning the segregation of the races in public schools affects in an especial way the Southern states. Since the population of the state of South Carolina is made up of 1,294,949 whites and 822,078 Negroes, 38-83/100 per cent of the total population being Negro, this decision and the manner in which the decision is to be put into effect are of deep concern to our people

There are approximately 15,000,000 Negro American citizens. Approximately 9,000,000 of these live in the South, where the proportion of the population ranges all the way from 12½% in Texas to 45% in the state of Mississippi. By contrast, no state north of the Potomac and the Ohio rivers has a Negro population of more than 8% of the total population, excepting the state of Delaware, where the Negro

population is 13% of the total, and these are border states. The Negro population in the North and West ranges from 7½% in Illinois and Missouri to .0004% in the state of North Dakota.

In the state of South Carolina we have cause to be proud of the very fine spirit of interracial understanding and goodwill which prevails, and we are proud of the success which we have had in working out our common problems between the races across a period of many years.

The recital of these facts is a clear challenge that we of this region of the nation, both white and Negro, shall with goodwill and resolution think through the issues that are definitely raised by the recent Supreme Court decision.

It should be noted that the cases pending in the Supreme Court have not yet been acted upon fully by the Court itself. As a matter of fact, the Court apparently for the first time in history has expressed an opinion in the cases before it without rendering a final decision. As we read this expression of the opinion by the Court, the Court has expressed the belief that the affording of equal but separate educational facilities for children of the two races does not comply with the constitutional requirement that all citizens shall have equal protection of the laws. The Court, apparently, in recognition of the grave consequences which might be involved in this opinion, has set the cases down for re-argument for the purpose of determining what the Court may do by way of final decision in the cases to implement its expressed belief.

It is our conviction that on our part these problems will not be resolved by hasty words or irresponsible sentiments but rather by a calm and patient consideration of all the factors involved and by a sincere desire to do what is best for all persons concerned.

We, members of the South Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, citizens of this commonwealth, representing 180,076 members in our local churches, reaffirm our belief in the inherent dignity of every individual and of every citizen's rights, regardless of race or social standing to the full benefits of a public school system. We declare anew our allegiance to Christian teachings applied to every area of human affairs. It is our Christian judgment that the primary question concerning any law devised by man is how it affects the persons involved in the place where they are, whether for good or ill, and we would deplore any action that would sow discord among our people and thereby retard the progress of public education throughout this region of the nation.

It is the judgment of this Conference that in situations where the minority race is present in large numbers, where the general sentiment of both races favors separate schools, and where the good of all is best served by separation, such voluntary separation is not contrary to the spirit and teaching of the Christian faith.

Authorities in South Carolina are giving continued and devoted consideration to the education of our Negro youth, and the progress the state has made in this field has been most praiseworthy. For this we are deeply grateful. According to the 1950 census, the Negro population of South Carolina was 822,078, which is approximately 39% of the

total population. During 1952-1953, there were enrolled in the elementary and high schools of the state 229,774 Negro students and 295,237 whites. In many communities the facilities now provided for those of the Negro race are superior to the facilities provided for the whites, this on account of the augmented building program of the last few years. Employed in these schools during the past scholastic year as teachers and administrators were 10,966 whites and 7,236 Negroes. This simple record is convincing witness that the state has undertaken seriously the task of providing full educational opportunity for all our people alike, and speaks eloquently of the sense of justice and of the Christian idealism that undergirds the whole.

Under the present system the relationship between the two races in this state has been characterized by co-operation and goodwill. We commend to our people and to all who must make decisions in the issues before us the following considerations:

1. It is generally recognized that racial problems are accentuated as two races, living side by side, approach equality in numbers. The question of integration in our public schools is no major problem in regions or communities where the minority group is less than 10% of the total population. The difficulties are multiplied many times when the minority approaches 20% or more. We believe that the Court will give careful and detailed attention to this phase of the matter in the hearing scheduled in December. It is apparent to us that an attempt to integrate the races in our public schools without regard to their relative numbers would work grave injustice to many innocent persons, and in the present instance we fear that the Negro would suffer most, as he has often when those far removed from his every-day problems have undertaken to speak in his name.

2. Consideration must also be given to the large number of Negro teachers and administrators in our public schools, lest they be denied leadership among their people where they have served so faithfully and effectively. There are 7,235 of them in South Carolina, devoted men and women of proven worth. It is worthy of note that the number of Negroes professionally employed in the public schools of South Carolina nearly equals the number employed in all the 31 states where segregation is not practiced. In the thirty-one states where segregation is not practiced there is a combined total of 10,248 Negro teachers and administrators in public schools, or 1.4% of the total number so employed. In South Carolina alone there are 7,236 Negro teachers and administrators in the public schools, or 37% of the total number so employed. In this phase of integration the South leads the nation. To imperil the Negro's position as teacher and administrator in our public school system would, we believe, do great injustice to him and to the cause of public education.

3. Self-determination should not be ignored in a question that so vitally affects a people's life. Drastic social change is not advisable or effective except by the desire and consent of the persons involved. We are convinced that the majority of neither race desires integration in the public schools at the present time. We are assured that this is likewise true in other states where the races approach parity in numbers.

Compulsory education, enforced by law, has been practiced in South

Carolina for many years. It is generally accepted without question, and on account of it illiteracy is being banished from among us. To compel a parent, whether white or Negro, to send his child to school, and at the same time to compel the child to live under conditions which the parents regard to be detrimental to his highest interest would, in our judgment, introduce problems of serious import. It is our belief that the question of racial integration in the public schools can best be resolved on the state or local level, and that serious consideration should be given by the Court to the background, sentiments and desires of the people in the different regions of our country.

4. We earnestly entreat all our people to exercise patience and forbearance, to refrain from hasty words, and in every circumstance to maintain the spirit of Him whom we call our Lord and Master. Let our white citizens respect in every way the person and inherent rights of the Negro. Let our Negro citizens believe in the genuine concern of their white brethren for their welfare and progress. The two races have lived as neighbors in this commonwealth for many decades. Let us labor and pray together that nothing—whether from without or within—shall disturb the harmony and understanding that has existed so long among us.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the above statement be spread upon the minutes of the South Carolina Conference, that copies be sent to the **South Carolina Methodist Advocate** and other church publications as may be determined, and to the governor and superintendent of public education in the hope that it may throw some measure of light on the issues that confront them.

JAMES HERBERT BELL

The day is ended, the task is done, a faithful soldier of the Cross has laid aside his earthly tabernacle for one not made with hands to join that innumerable throng in the city celestial, where there is no pain, no sorrow, no parting nor farewell.

On June 27, 1954, at his home in Charleston Heights, surrounded by loved ones and friends, the soul of James Herbert Bell entered into eternal rest.

Always kind, sympathetic and courageous, he fought sin and all its allies with a deep conviction and yielded no quarter in his efforts to obtain its downfall. He was forceful in his preaching, uncompromising in his belief, yet tolerant with those of differing opinions. He believed the gospel he preached and lived it daily in contact with his fellowmen. He was deeply endowed by nature and training with those fine qualities which made him not only a servant of his people, his church, and his community, but truly a great preacher of the doctrine of the Man of Galilee.

Born at Simpsonville, S. C., May 16, 1886, he was a son of C. W. and Nettie Vaughn Bell. He attended the schools of his native county and later enrolled in Holmes Bible School at Greenville to better prepare himself for a life of Christian ministry and unselfish service. Deprived of some of the finer educational advantages, he attended night school and worked days in order that he might be better prepared for the service to which he had been called and dedicated his life.

For 50 years Brother Bell was a member of the church, having joined when a youth of 17.

He was granted a license to preach by the Greenville District, November 14, 1914, and was admitted on trial into the Upper South Carolina Conference at Newberry, November 1, 1923. On October 29, 1925, Brother Bell was received into full connection with the Upper South Carolina Conference at Abbeville. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop Collins Denny at Laurens, November 9, 1924, and ordained an elder by Bishop Edwin Mouzon at Columbia, November 24, 1929.

He served appointments at Bleachery circuit, as a supply, 1920-23; Gordon Memorial, Winnsboro, 1924-27; Toxaway and Gluck, Anderson, 1928-31; Walhalla circuit, 1932-33; Van Wyck, 1934-36; South Easley, 1937-41; Gilbert, 1941-45; Swansea, 1946-49. At the conclusion of these long and fruitful pastorates, he was granted the retired relation at the 1949 Conference and with his wife went to Charleston Heights to live with his daughter, Mrs. J. A. Freeman, Sr.

Unselfish, yet charitable, he gave his best to whatever task was his. He was instrumental in the building programs of several of the churches of which he was pastor. His strong determination to see

a program through to its completion can be no better shown than in a unique gesture, while pastor at Swansea. A new parsonage was being constructed and in order to provide material for the building the old one was torn down. Brother Bell and his family vacated the parsonage and took up living quarters in the basement of the church until the new home for the pastor was completed.

On December 25, 1904, he married Miss Emma Jones of Hendersonville, North Carolina, a beloved wife, a devoted helpmeet and a gracious hostess. She with a daughter, Mrs. J. A. Freeman, Sr., of Charleston Heights, survive.

His life was rich in the fullest measure, in service to his Master, his church, his fellowman and in devotion to duty as he saw fit.

Truly his departure from this earthly life was a glorious home-going for a brave and victorious soldier of the Cross, who with the apostle of old could say in all humility: "For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth, there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day, and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

CHARLES SHUFORD FELDER

On June 24, 1878, the home of Charles Richard Felder and Mary Shuford Felder near Pinewood, S. C., was blessed by the arrival of Charles Shuford Felder. A great life began to ever feel the impact of God day by day because of the heritage which was his. Both of his grandfathers were preachers, Charles William Felder and Jacob Labore Shuford for whom he was named. The training he received in a Christian home, schools in Clarendon County, Carlisle Fitting School and Wofford College added strength and guidance to his life.

When he was 15 years old he surrendered his life to God and united with Andrews Chapel Church on the Santee circuit. Later he felt the call to preach and was licensed to preach at the Sumter District Conference held at Summerton in 1904. At Conference, he was assigned to supply the Wedgefield circuit. In December 1905 he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference in Spartanburg. He was ordained a deacon in 1907 at the Gaffney Conference by Bishop H. C. Morrison, and at the Abbeville Conference 1909, he was ordained elder by Bishop W. A. Wilson. For 44 years, he served in the active ministry and for three years as a supply, as a pastor mainly in the lower section of the state. He was loved by all ages, especially the older people whom his mother asked him to be thoughtful of, because she loved them and ministered to them. He had many friends throughout the Conference. He was a preacher of the old time gospel, sound in his theology, and unafraid to speak his convictions. He loved music and the hymns of the Church, which he enjoyed singing from his heart. He knew how to inspire and lead his people to build new churches and improve others. He loved his brethren of the ministry and knew how to work with them as well as his people to further the causes of the Church. He had a loyalty to his God and his Church which never wavered. He enjoyed wholesome fun. His hobbies were

gardening and raising chickens which he kept up to the very end for he loved to share with his neighbors.

On March 23, 1905, he married Miss Emma Edith Coskrey of Clarendon County. One daughter was born to this union, Mary Louise (Mrs. J. W. Price). Mrs. Felder died on June 29, 1908, leaving Mr. Felder with his daughter to rear. On January 4, 1910, Mr. Felder married Miss Annie Louise Coskrey, a sister of his first wife. To this union the following children were born: Charles Richard (deceased), William Coskrey, Annie Elizabeth (Mrs. J. C. Cottongham), Ida Mabel (Mrs. Walter W. Hook), Charles Wesley, and Jacob Shuford. These with nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild survive him. He was a devoted husband, father and friend.

When he retired in 1949 he, with his wife, moved to the Rogers' Home in Manning, S. C., where they endeared themselves to the whole community. His presence on the streets was a blessing to the town. He was called into service again to supply his home church, Andrew's Chapel, along with Paxville, a part of the Pinewood charge, for two years, but continued to live in Manning. His last years were fruitful years.

He finished his earthly stay on April 8, 1954. His funeral was conducted from the Manning Methodist Church April 9, 1954, with the Rev. J. F. Trammell, Lake City District superintendent, in charge, assisted by the Rev. James D. Kilgore and the Rev. John Paul Patton. His body was laid to rest in the Summerton Cemetery amid a blanket of flowers expressing the esteem with which he was held.

THE REVEREND JAMES GEORGE HUGGIN

Blessed is that man who is a minister in the true sense of the word, who is not only a good preacher, but also an efficient administrator and a faithful pastor. Such a man was Brother George James Huggin, who preached the good news of the kingdom of God for more than half a century.

Brother Huggin was born near Gaffney, South Carolina, on April 23, 1874, the son of Charles Perry Huggin and Elvira Jane LeMaster Huggin. After attending the public schools at Gaffney, he was admitted to Wofford College, an institution which was always near to his heart.

He was licensed to preach at Woodruff, South Carolina, on July 4, 1899, and the following year was admitted on trial into the North Mississippi Conference at Winona, Mississippi. Two years later, he was received into full connection by the South Carolina Conference which met in December in Newberry. Bishop W. W. Duncan ordained him a deacon on December 7, 1902, and in 1904 he was ordained an elder by Bishop A. W. Wilson at Darlington, South Carolina.

Brother Huggin served the following charges: Oxford circuit, North Mississippi Conference, 1901; Belmont, South Carolina Conference, 1902; Laurens Mill, 1903-04; Victor Mill, 1905-08; Clifton and Cowpens, 1909-10; Bethel, Union, 1911; Greenville circuit, 1912-15; Bethel, Anderson, 1916; McCormick, 1917-20; Clover, 1921-22; Winnsboro, 1923-26; Green Street, Columbia, 1927; Aiken, 1928-31; Woodruff, 1932-35; Blacksburg, 1936-39; Cowpens, 1940-46; Arcadia, 1947.

On April 4, 1900, Brother Huggin was married to Miss Olive McKown of Gaffney. The following children were born to them: Miss Lucille Huggin, now a teacher in the Spartanburg schools; Dr. Perry McKown Huggin, of Knoxville, Tennessee; the Reverend James G. Huggin, who is now serving as pastor of our Methodist Church in Shelby, N. C., and Grace (Mrs. James S. White, Jr.) of Rock Hill. Mrs. Huggin, whose life was a blessing to the people who lived in the communities served by her husband, died August 31, 1944, in Cowpens.

Brother Huggin was called to his eternal reward on May 10, 1954. The funeral service was conducted at the Ben Avon Methodist Church near Spartanburg by his pastor, the Reverend R. C. Faulkner, assisted by the Reverend S. D. Newell, Spartanburg district superintendent. Interment was at Greer, S. C.

The church in our state had no more zealous worker than James George Huggin. He was always busy about the Master's business, and after his retirement, he continued to go about doing good, seeking to be helpful wherever there was a need, and looking always for people who were lost to Christ and his church. He frequently, during these days of retirement, called his neighboring preachers and reported to them people who were sorely in need of the ministry of Christ's church. The humble and the poor were always the special objects of his attention, and in his pastoral duties he was no respecter of persons, but always sought to be found where there was a need, in the homes of the rich, and in the homes of the poverty stricken. His spirit of good cheer, his love for people, his spiritual perception and his purity of heart made him a welcome guest in the homes of his people as he visited from house to house in the name of his Lord.

Always a diligent student, there were three books which were predominant in his thinking, and which he studied with great care: The Bible, The Methodist Hymnal, and The Discipline. His preaching was Bible-centered, and he presented his message in a clear, forceful manner.

We shall always remember this greatly beloved minister for his courage, for his devotion to truth and for his tireless work as pastor and preacher. Many thousands during the years of his good ministry have thanked God for his life and for the message which he so forcefully proclaimed.

THE REVEREND CLARENCE EDWARD PEELE

Clarence Edward Peele, son of Andrew H. and Nora Jane Gibson Peele, was born at Gibson, N. C., Oct. 27, 1877, and died suddenly at his home in Columbia, S. C., July 22, 1954. These two dates mark the limits of the earthly life of one of God's true noblemen.

God richly blessed him in his family heritage. The home in which he was born and reared to manhood was one which fostered the highest type of Christian character and the highest ideals of service. Small wonder it is that out of it came three sons who became ministers of the gospel (one a bishop of the Church); another son who became a successful educator and editor; and a daughter who served several years as a missionary in China.

Instilled in the hearts of the children by their parents was the desire for an education to equip them for lives of service. It was while he was engaged in this task that I first met Clarence Edward Peele at Wofford College where we spent three years together. We became fast friends and that friendship lasted and deepened through the years. From the first he made a good scholastic record and received his A.B. degree in 1901. On the campus he so conducted himself that he won the confidence of students and faculty. On every moral issue that arose on the campus we knew where Clarence Peele would be found, even though it might be the unpopular side.

His habits of study did not cease after graduation but characterized him all through his ministry contributing largely to his success. He heeded the advice of Paul to Timothy, his son in the gospel: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." As a result he rose to the top ranks as a preacher in our conference.

Another tie that tended to cement our friendship was the fact that we entered the South Carolina Conference together in Greenville in December, 1903. From a child he had felt the call to preach but did not settle it finally till he applied for and received license to preach at the Marion District Conference, held at Clio in May 1903. Entering the Conference that year his appointments have been as follows: Laurel Street, Rock Hill, 1904-5; Edgewood, 1906-8; Cameron, 1909-10; North Augusta, 1911-14; Leesville, 1915-18; Central, Newberry, 1919; Main Street, Abbeville, 1920-23; Buncombe Street, Greenville, 1924-28; Spartanburg District, 1929-32; Greenwood District, 1933-35; Main Street, Columbia, 1936-39; Bethel, Spartanburg, 1940-41; Bethel, Chester, 1942-45; Rock Hill District, 1946-50. He retired at the 1950 session of the conference but took work as a retired supply until May 1951.

Recognizing his ability and leadership Erskine College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1947. In 1941 when a Phi Beta Kappa Society chapter was installed at Wofford Brother Peele was one of the former graduates who were honored by election to membership. He was also a member of the International Society of Theta Phi.

In his conference he was soon recognized as a leader and was entrusted with many places of responsibility, in all of which he served faithfully and well. He served on the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School for fifteen years; on the Board of Managers of the Epworth Orphanage for eight years; on the Board of Trustees of Lander College eleven years; on the Board of Trustees of Wofford College two years. He was elected a delegate to the General Conferences of 1930, 1934, and 1938; the Uniting Conference of 1939; the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference of 1940; and the General and Jurisdictional Conferences of 1944. He was a member of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference Committee on Appeals.

On June 12, 1906, Brother Peele married Miss Mary Hall of Rock Hill, S. C. They had one son, Edward Vernon Peele. His widow and son survive him.

Funeral services were conducted in College Place Methodist Church

Saturday morning, July 24, with the Rev. E. R. Mason and Dr. M. K. Medlock in charge, and his body was laid to rest in Elmwood Cemetery.

One by one the friends of our early years are passing on. Heaven grows richer for us who remain. We have enjoyed our fellowship here as we labored together in the Master's service. What must it be when these ties are reunited at the feet of the Master! Farewell, my lifelong friend. My eyes grow misty with tears as I place this tribute on your grave. Some good day I shall bid you good morning where we shall never say good-bye.

THE REVEREND LUTHER EMANUEL PEELER

Forty-two years an active Methodist preacher—most of these years were spent on smaller appointments. That within itself is a story of heroic service.

Luther Emanuel Peeler, son of Alfred L. Peeler and Mrs. Rosa Klutz Peeler, was born at Granite Quarry, North Carolina, January 13, 1874. His was a pious home as witnessed by the fact that he and two other brothers, Joseph and Charles, became ministers in the South Carolina Conference. He attended the public schools of his community and Faith Academy. He then entered Rutherford College, Rutherfordton, North Carolina, where he graduated with the B.S. Degree. After graduating from college he taught school for five years.

Mr. Peeler was licensed to preach in 1898. He was admitted on trial that same year into the Western North Carolina Conference. He was ordained a deacon in 1901 and an elder in 1903. He served Elk Park, McDowell circuit and Thermal City in Western North Carolina Conference. He transferred to the South Carolina Conference in 1905 where he served the following appointments: McClellanville, 1906-07; Greeleyville, 1908-11; West End, Georgetown, 1912; Gilbert, 1913; Cades, 1914-16; Barnwell, 1917-20; Chesterfield, 1921-24; Elloree-Jerusalem, 1925-29; North-Limestone, 1930-31; Bennettsville circuit, 1932-35; Floydale, 1936-37; Cottageville, 1938-40.

Much of his ministry was spent in building and improving the church property of the charges he served.

On December 9, 1905, he was married to Miss Hattie Hogue of Rutherford County, North Carolina. One daughter, Katherine, now Mrs. M. R. Johnson of Bennettsville, South Carolina, was born to this union.

After his retirement, Brother Peeler lived for some time in Greeleyville. He later moved to Bennettsville to live next door to his daughter on Parsonage Street.

Brother Peeler went to his eternal home on June 22, 1954, after a long illness. Funeral services were conducted from First Methodist Church, Bennettsville, South Carolina, by the Reverend S. M. Atkinson, assisted by Dr. B. D. Lucas. Burial was in Sunset Memorial Park, Bennettsville. He is survived by his wife, daughter and one grandson.

Several characteristics are worthy of mention in Brother Peeler's life as a minister. First he was a student of the Word, of books and people. He was a very sociable person, always enjoying his pastoral ministry in the homes of his people and on the streets. He was a most industri-

ous man in his home and in the upkeep of church property. All these traits of personality served him well to make of him a good minister of the Lord Jesus.

THE REVEREND PAUL KISTLER RHOAD

Four score and one years was the span of life for the Rev. Paul Kistler Rhoad (1873-1954). The name given him by his pious parents was that of one of the noblest and most beloved Methodist ministers in our state during the last half of the 19th century: the Rev. Paul Kistler.

Brother Rhoad's parents were Mr. Nathaniel Byrd Rhoad and Mrs. Salina Catherine (Smoak) Rhoad. He was born on January 16, 1873, in Bamberg County, S. C. His education was secured in the local schools, Carlisle School at Bamberg, and in Wofford College.

Converted at Mt. Carmel Campmeeting in Colleton County, he joined the Methodist Church when 14 years old. In college he felt the call to preach, but resisted same for ten years. Yielding at last to the call, he was licensed to preach on June 8, 1908, largely under the blessed influence of the late Rev. T. L. Belvin. On December 10, 1909, at Abbeville, S. C., he was admitted into the South Carolina Conference (along with the writer).

His ordination dates were: **deacon:** on December 3, 1911, at Bennettsville by Bishop John C. Kilgo, **elder:** on November 30, 1913, at Rock Hill by Bishop A. W. Wilson, assisted by Bishops Collins Denny and John C. Kilgo.

The pastoral charges served by Brother Rhoad were as follows: 1909, Hendersonville; 1910-13, Antreville; 1914-16, Turbeville; 1917-21, Providence (in Orangeburg County); 1922-27, Wesley Chapel and Hebron; 1928, Andrews; 1929-32, Springfield; 1933-37, Estill-Black Swamp; 1938, Bowman; 1939-54, Retired. He resided in his last years at Garnett and Bluffton.

Brother Rhoad was a strong preacher, a genial pastor, and a builder. He was a man of vision who had the ability to lead others to see and help to realize the needs of the charges he served. Wherever he went, church property was built or repaired and debts paid off. Let us note especially certain outstanding achievements: The parsonage at Hendersonville was built. Hebron church in Lee County was remodeled at a cost of \$4,500. The story of his pastorate at Providence church in Orangeburg County reads like a romance: At a cost of \$49,000.00, a parsonage and a beautiful brick church were built out in the open country. That fine rural congregation caught his vision of their need and possibilities, and erected one of the most beautiful churches in our state. Several bishops and other church leaders declared it to be the most magnificent rural church in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at that time (1920).

His leadership qualities in the larger church affairs were recognized by his election to several Conference responsibilities: trustee of Epworth Orphanage 1918-19, Conference Board of Church Extension 1922-31, trustee of Columbia College beginning in 1931.

To his family Brother Rhoad was devoted. With his beloved companion and fine children, he had a happy and truly Christian home

life. Miss Marie Folk of Bamberg became his bride on December 24, 1903, and she survives to continue her life of blessing and service to her children and grandchildren. The children are as follows: Lt. Col. Kistler Edward Rhoad of Albuquerque, New Mexico; Mrs. M. H. (Harriet Salina) O'Neal of Estill, S. C.; Mrs. J. B. (Miriam Elizabeth) Eleazer of Estill, S. C.; Mrs. C. C. (Edith) Boyd of Nuremberg, Germany; and Franklin Nathaniel Rhoad of Bluffton, S. C.

He left five grandchildren, and many nephews and nieces. Two sisters survive: Mrs. G. W. Miley of Branchville, S. C., and Mrs. J. H. A. Carter of Ehrhardt, S. C. Two brothers were highly useful leaders in their local church in Bamberg County, and in the wider Conference circles: W. D. Rhoad and J. G. Rhoad, both of blessed memory.

After a long period of failing health at his home in Garnett, then at Bluffton, and finally at his daughter's (Mrs. M. H. O'Neal) home in Estill, he received the summons to paradise on February 2, 1954. The funeral services were held in the Estill Methodist Church, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. Joe H. Sowell, assisted by the Rev. Victor R. Hickman, the Rev. C. L. Dunn, the Rev. Dan Clark, and the writer. His body was laid to rest in the Lawtonville cemetery near Estill.

Such a life of usefulness and blessing is its own best memorial. He being dead yet speaks in the hallowed memories of many hearts and minds of those whom he has served and been associated with through the years. He loved to sing the grand old hymns of the church. Often on Sabbath mornings he was heard to sing at home when about to leave for church:

"A charge to keep I have,
A God to glorify,
A never-dying soul to save
And fit it for the sky."

JOSEPH MARION ROGERS

Joseph Marion Rogers, son of Tristram Benjamin Rogers and Mary Elizabeth Hays Rogers, was born August 28, 1862, near Mullins, S. C. Thus a noble life began whose influence ever revealed the great heritage which was his. An eager mind from the very beginning caused him to search for truth and the best. He received his early educational training in the community school and Mullins Academy. He attended Trinity College, now Duke University, for a year and then went to Wofford College where he graduated with an A. B. degree June 14, 1887, and an A. M. degree in 1891. His college days revealed his great interest in religion. He was active in Y. M. C. A. work and served as president. He attended the International Y. M. C. A. Convention in Atlanta, Ga., in May of 1885 as a delegate.

He taught school in his home community two years after graduation. During this time he felt the call to preach and was licensed to preach in Nichols, S. C., October 13, 1888, by the quarterly conference of the North Mullins circuit, the Rev. T. C. O'Dell, pastor and the Rev. A. J. Stokes, presiding elder. In November 1889 he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference, ordained deacon in Darlington by Bishop J. C. Granberry in 1891, elder by Bishop Chas. B.

Galloway in Columbia, 1901. He retired in 1939 after 50 years in the South Carolina Conference. He taught in Columbia College for two years, 1890-1892, and then health made it necessary for him to resign. From 1893 to 1900 he took the supernumerary relation. He gave 40 years of active service preaching the gospel as a member of the Conference, serving many charges with an interest of the people at heart and meeting the needs of the church. He was a preacher of real loyalty giving constructive leadership to the church as he served on a number of committees and boards of the Conference along with his regular church duties. In 1945 a retired preacher's home was bought in Manning, S. C., and named for him. There he lived four years.

He gave the historical address in 1931 to both Conferences.

He was a real brother to the younger ministers, giving them a cordial welcome and sympathetic cooperation and encouragement. He knew how to walk humbly with the lowly, meet the minds of the scholarly, stand firm with conviction. Those who knew him could appreciate his wholesome and keen sense of humor. He was a student to the very end, and accumulated a real library through the years. In 1948 he gave 300 volumes to both Columbia College and Wofford. He collected many clippings and poems which he enjoyed right up to the last, with the great hymns of the church. One of his favorite poems I give here:

OBEDIENCE

My life is but a weaving between my Lord and me;
I cannot choose the colors, He worketh steadily.
Ofttimes, He weaveth sorrow, and I in foolish pride
Forget He sees the upper, and I the lower side.
Not 'till the loom is silent, and the shuttles cease to fly
Shall God unroll the canvas, and explain the reason why
The dark threads are as needful in the skillful weaver's hand
As the threads of gold and silver in the pattern He has planned.

On March 15, 1910, Mr. Rogers married Miss Katherine Glenn of near Rock Hill, York County, South Carolina, who survives him with two daughters, Mary Glenn (Mrs. L. R. Chewning of Sumter), and Lois Josephine (Mrs. A. A. McLeod of Laurens) and three grandsons. He was a devoted husband and father, whose love was realized in a most beneficial and sustaining manner.

His life was ever one of devotion to God, and May 26, 1954, was spent in reading the **Upper Room** giving Jesus's discourse to his disciples which reads as follows, "I have finished the work which Thou gavest me to do." It seems very fitting that this was the passage he read. His life and death were so ordered and orderly.

He quietly slipped into the arms of Jesus on June 9, 1954, at the Toumey Hospital in Sumter and his funeral was conducted from St. Mark's Methodist Church, Sumter, which he served once when it was Broad Street and where he worshipped during his last years, June 10 at 4:00 p. m. The Rev. T. C. Cannon, Sumter District superin-

tendent, in charge, assisted by the Rev. J. E. Merchant, the Rev. F. C. Cunningham, the Rev. J. F. M. Hoffmeyer and the Rev. C. F. DuBose officiated using the regular church ritual. His favorite hymn, "Servant of God, Well Done" was sung by the choir and Cantey Sprott sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" as a solo. His body was laid to rest in the Sumter cemetery.

JESSE JOEL STEVENSON

The purpose of a memorial such as this is not only to record certain facts in order that they might be preserved for posterity, but also to catch the spirit of a man's life and preserve its inspiration.

In order to be fair to the factual historian, we shall first set down some of the events in Mr. Stevenson's life. Jesse Joel Stevenson, son of Dr. William Joel Stevenson and Mrs. Ester Hephzibah Ferguson Stevenson, was born October 11, 1865, at Rossville, Chester County, S. C.; died April 6, 1954, at Clemmons, N. C. He was educated in the public schools of Chester County; Leesville High School; and Leesville College, Leesville, S. C. He was graduated with the A. B. degree from Leesville College in the spring of 1891.

Mr. Stevenson was recommended by Ebenezer Methodist Church of the East Chester circuit, and was licensed to preach by the Rock Hill District Conference in 1889. He was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Annual Conference at Charleston, S. C., November 25, 1892; and received into full connection in the South Carolina Annual Conference at Laurens, S. C., November 23, 1894. On November 25, 1894, Mr. Stevenson was ordained a deacon by Bishop J. C. Keener at Laurens, S. C.; and was ordained an elder by Bishop W. W. Duncan at Florence, S. C., December 12, 1897.

The active ministry of the Reverend Jesse Joel Stevenson extended over a period of 50 years. The charges he held and the places he preached are already on record in the annals of the South Carolina Conference. He was granted the retired relation in 1941 at the Bennettsville Conference.

On January 2, 1896, Mr. Stevenson was married to Miss Henri Jesse Bond of Chester, S. C. She died February 24, 1938. To them were born five children: Esther Genevieve (Mrs. Woodford); Jesse Joel, Jr.; Bond (died in infancy); Sarah Marjorie (Wilkinson); and Bernard Henry.

These are some of the facts, but far beyond this simple recitation of the facts lies the man. What was Mr. Stevenson like? What did he love? What did he mean to those about him? In the answer to these questions and others of like nature, we find the man.

Mr. Stevenson had a unique faculty for making and keeping friends. The writer of this memorial preached in a revival meeting for him in the third year of the writer's ministry. Mr. Stevenson invited him to bring his bride along. From that contact grew a lasting friendship. For the last ten years of his life, Mr. Stevenson spent from one to two months of each year in our home. We always looked forward to his coming. We enjoyed his presence. We watched him go with deep regret. This same regard for him and joy in his presence

felt by us could have been multiplied many fold in each charge that he served. There was a warmth to his personal contacts that tied him to his friends.

There was a courtliness and quality about Mr. Stevenson that marked him as a southern gentleman of the old school. Since he had no uncertainty about his own worth and breeding, he was at home with all people whether of high or low estate. His courtesy, his kindly attitude, his very mien proclaimed what he was.

One of the marked interests of Mr. Stevenson during all of his ministry was his interest in education. Out of his retirement funds he made substantial payment to the endowment funds of Wofford College. Three of his four living children have spent their lives in educational circles, either in the public schools of our nation or on the college level. In his old age he took great joy in spending countless hours in the library of Yale University. William Wayne, "the first Methodist in South Carolina," according to Mr. Stevenson's research, was a center about which his last intellectual interests were built.

In his administration as a minister, aside from his pressing love for his people, Mr. Stevenson loved building. The present church buildings at Hartsville and Chesterfield, parsonages at three other points, and the extensive remodeling of others attest to his proficiency in this area. As long as he lived, just a mention of a people in need of a church would incite his interest and his mind would turn busily to plans for raising the money and paper would be filled with drawings for the building.

Most of all, Brother Stevenson loved to preach. He never missed an opportunity to speak for his Lord from the pulpit. He loved to proclaim the love of God for his children. In his pulpit he reached the homeland of his soul. How many people were brought into a saving knowledge of God through Christ Jesus through his ministry is now a matter of heavenly record. But we know that his life was an interpretation literally of one "called to preach". If in the tabernacle "not made with hands, eternal in the heavens" there is a service of worship he will be there to listen and to take his turn in preaching.

I hope that his room in the Father's house will not be far from mine.

GEORGE KIRKLAND WAY

December 28, 1883-August 14, 1954. These dates indicate the earthly limits of a life that cannot be measured by the length of his days or any other material consideration.

Born at Dorchester, South Carolina, George Kirkland Way was the son of David Derrick Way and Laura Jane Rumph Way. His formal education was received in the public schools of his home county and in the University of South Carolina from which he graduated in 1906. He continued his training, however, by taking the conference course of study by correspondence through Vanderbilt University, and by extensive study in training schools, pastors' schools, and the Lake Juna-

luska Leadership School. Through study and experience he became a recognized leader in Christian education.

The official record of Brother Way's ministerial career is so extensive that it can be indicated here only in brief outline. He was licensed to preach at Hendersonville, South Carolina, June 3, 1910; admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference at Charleston, December 8, 1910; received into full connection at Anderson, November 30, 1912; ordained a deacon at Anderson, December 1, 1912; ordained elder at Sumter, November 29, 1914. Appointments served were: Bethel circuit, as a supply, 1910; Mount Pleasant, 1911; Leesville circuit, 1912; Providence, Sumter District, 1913; Ridgeland, 1914-16; Cottageville, 1917-18; Chaplain United States Army, 1919; Rome, 1920-23; Bennettsville circuit, 1924-27; Extension Secretary, Conference Sunday School Board and Board of Christian Education, 1928-34; College Place, 1935-36; Cheraw, 1937-38; Orangeburg District, 1939-44; Asbury Memorial, Charleston, 1945; Camden, 1946-47; Lake City, 1948-49; First Church and Greenbriar, Winnsboro, 1950-51. At the 1951 session of the Conference, he was granted the retired relation.

Retirement did not curtail Brother Way's ministerial activity. Early in 1953 he became pastor of the Bethel Church in Forest Acres, Columbia. Under his leadership the church grew rapidly and building plans were developed. The congregation was inspired, not only by his administrative skill, but particularly by his example of true service through reducing his own salary and having the rental allowance for the pastor's home placed in a savings account for the building program. The first unit, most appropriately, was the educational building which was completed two weeks after his death. This building was opened formally on September 26, 1954, and a marker was placed naming it "The George K. Way Memorial Building". In a real sense this pastorate was a fitting and happy climax to a fruitful ministry, and the new building stands as a permanent monument to his memory.

Brother Way was active in many other ways. For nearly 19 years, from 1935 until the time of his death, he served as secretary of his conference. He served on the Board of Missions, the Board of Church Extension, the Epworth League Board, and the Committee on Standing Rules of which he was chairman. For ten years he was a trustee of Lander College. In 1942 he was one of the editors of **Methodist Ministers in South Carolina** and was editor of the 1952 edition. In 1940 he was a delegate to the General Conference at Atlantic City, New Jersey, and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference at Asheville, North Carolina. His place as a leader is indicated, further, by his being listed in **Religious Leaders of America, Encyclopedia of American Biography, Prominent Personalities in American Methodism, 1945, and Who's Who in The Methodist Church, 1952.**

He was a chaplain with the American Expeditionary Forces in France during the winter of 1918-19, serving with the 34th and the 82nd Infantry Divisions. During World War II, he served with the South Carolina State Guard as Brigade Chaplain with the rank of Colonel. He was also post chaplain and post commander of the Orange-

burg American Legion Post, and Chaplain for the Department of South Carolina.

Twice Brother Way was happily married; first on October 31, 1912, to Miss Minerva Attelia Floyd of Floydale, South Carolina, who died January 22, 1945. One daughter, Harriet Elizabeth (Mrs. Kirby D. Shealy), survives. His second marriage was on November 12, 1946, to Mrs. Lucy Jordan Taylor of Mt. Croghan, South Carolina, who survives.

This writer, blessed by the privilege of long intimate friendship with George Kirkland Way, is happy to bear the simple testimony that one found in him a man of God, honest, forthright and courageous, who, "having finished his course and having kept the faith," by the grace of Jesus Christ now lives and serves in the Father's house.

THE REVEREND SCUDDY B. WHITE

October 7, 1888 - February 16, 1954. These dates mark the birth and death of a noble servant of God.

Brother Scuddy B. White, son of the late Charles M. White and Annie Busby White, was born in Anderson County, S. C. Besides attending the public schools of his native county, he took correspondence courses with Emory University. He attended Moody Bible Institute. In 1925 he received the Litt.B.S. Degree from Eugene Bible University; and the B.D. Degree from Pike's Peak Bible Seminary in 1929. He continued his education in the study of books of his own choosing. Brother White was a writer of poetry which was featured in "The World's Anthology of Verse," 1940. He also wrote articles for newspapers and religious periodicals.

Brother White first joined the Methodist church but later joined the Baptist church and was ordained a Baptist minister. On November 28, 1915, at Spartanburg, S. C., he was received into the Upper South Carolina Conference as an elder. He served the following appointments: Pickens circuit, 1916; Blackstock, 1917-18; Chester circuit, 1919-20; Travelers Rest, 1921; Monaghan and Woodside, 1922-25; Bethel, Union, 1926-29; Concord and Apalache, 1930-31; Epting and Oakland, Newberry, 1932-35; Piedmont, 1936-39; Cambridge, 1940-41; Kinards, 1942-44; Whitney, Spartanburg, 1945-46; Tucapau, 1947-48; Green Street, Union, 1949-52; Dunean, Greenville, 1952-53.

Our friend was a good and faithful minister of Christ and the Methodist church. He was interested in all phases of the work of the church. He was pastor, evangelist, builder and organizer. He was the pastor of all of his members. His kind and sympathetic nature caused people to seek him for counsel and advice. The matter of delivering a sermon was never a thing to be done carelessly. When he stood in his pulpit he was prepared, and he insisted that his hearers dedicate their lives to God. His concern for people is further shown by the fact that he served as scoutmaster and on scout and other welfare committees. Though the emphasis of his ministry was evangelism, yet he led in building and debt-paying enterprises for churches and parsonages where he served. These included Bethel, Union; Shiloh station, which was formerly on the Piedmont charge, and the parsonage at Green

Street, Union. He thought church property should be the most attractive in any community, and he worked toward that end.

Brother White was also concerned with the organization of his church. He wanted to see that his charge always made its largest contribution to the ongoing of God's kingdom. He never shirked his responsibility to the program of his church. If one had followed him from charge to charge he would have discovered that progress had been made in every place. Brother White made no effort at being an efficiency expert but his work was always well done. His spirit was always such that he was greatly beloved. Those of us who had the privilege of knowing him rather intimately enjoyed his fine fellowship. He was friendly, kind and noble.

Brother White was married twice. He was married, first, to Miss Lillie Hawkins, who died July 30, 1950. The children surviving by this marriage are: Mrs. W. K. Bushart and Mrs. H. G. Murrah, Jr. His second marriage was to Miss Florence Ruby Badger, June 30, 1952, who makes her home in Greenville, S. C.

In the midst of an active ministry, near the close of his first year as pastor of Dunean, Greenville, with every indication that it would be most fruitful, Brother White was stricken with an illness from which he never recovered. Funeral services were conducted at Joanna, S. C., February 16, 1954, by the Rev. P. W. Turner, the Rev. S. D. Newell and the Rev. J. H. Kohler. Interment was in the Woodlawn Cemetery, Greenville, S. C.

THE REVEREND HOLLIS ALEXANDER WHITTEN

He was truly one of God's noblemen. Brother Whitten was born February 3, 1884, near Pendleton in Anderson County, S. C. His parents were: Hollis Mabry Whitten and Mrs. Annie Ellen (Jefferson) Whitten. The paternal grandparents were: John and Mrs. Myra Hubbard Whitten. The maternal grandparents were: Alexander and Mrs. Henrietta Blanford Jefferson.

Educated in the local schools and in Wofford Fitting School, Brother Whitten was a diligent student of man and books. He attended the Pastors' School regularly, and three times the Town and Country School at Emory University, Georgia.

At the age of fifteen he gave his heart and life to the Lord Jesus Christ, and joined Richland Presbyterian Church. After two years he transferred to the Methodist Church, serving as president of the Ep-

worth League, Sunday school superintendent, and steward. But the call to preach became insistent.

So when 27, he yielded and was licensed to preach on July 30, 1909, by the Anderson District Conference at old Shiloh Church in Abbeville County. His pastor, the Rev. A. V. Harbin, encouraged him much, though his final decision was made following a sermon by the presiding elder, the Rev. A. J. Cauthen.

On November 30, 1913, he was admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference at Rock Hill, and was then ordained a deacon by Bishop A. W. Wilson. His ordination as an elder took place on November 9, 1919, at Greenwood by Bishop U. V. W. Darlington.

Brother Whitten's pastoral record included the following charges: Williamston circuit, Walhalla circuit, Clover, Lexington, East Lancaster, Bethel and Park, Rock Hill; Newberry circuit, Irmo, North Easley, Pacolet-White Stone, Glendale, Westminster, Lockhart, Prosperity, and Fairfield.

The records of these pastoral years show a total of more than 1,000 persons received into the Methodist Church on profession of faith in Christ, and of them he baptized 684. He baptized 663 infants also. And the material interests of the church were carefully looked after.

Miss Bertha Elaine Riehle of Walhalla became the bride of Brother Whitten on February 22, 1905. She was of German-French descent, her father having come to America in 1874. To this union were born five children: (four of whom survive with their dear mother):

Miss Katherine E. Whitten of Graniteville, S. C.; Miss Sara E. Whitten, Rt. 3, Winnsboro, S. C.; Paul Riehle Whitten, Fairburn, Georgia; Hollis Alexander Whitten, Richmond, Virginia.

Joseph Pershing Whitten died July 30, 1931, at the age of 12. Also three sisters mourn their brother's passing: Mrs. J. F. Lange and Mrs. H. C. McKinney of Anderson, S. C.; Mrs. J. T. Frazier of Pageland, S. C.; and a brother, H. C. Whitten, of Anderson, S. C. There is one grandchild: Kathleen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. R. Whitten. Brother Whitten was devoted to his family and was a blessing to them all.

Brother Whitten understood and appreciated his relationships to the work of the church at large. He served on the Conference boards and committees with intelligent interest and fidelity: Sabbath Observance (of which he was secretary), Bible Cause, and the Temperance Board. He knew the history of Methodism, and did much to search out and preserve the annals of the local churches where he served.

After a brief illness Brother Whitten died in the Columbia Hospital on February 24, 1954. The funeral services were conducted in Bethel Church of the Fairfield charge by Dr. M. K. Medlock, the Rev. R. C. Griffith and the Rev. W. Ralph Carter. Five of the active pallbearers were his "sons in the gospel". Honorary pallbearers included a dozen more of the ministers present, and the officials of the Fairfield charge, and Dr. Dana Mitchell, Jr., Dr. W. C. McClain, Jr., Dr. W. T. Barron, Dr. Amos Estes. The interment was in the Rosemont Cemetery at Newberry.

Among Brother Whitten's favorite hymns were: "The Church's One Foundation" and "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross". James Russell Lowell's poem, "The Present Crisis" was one of which he was very fond. Of Bible passages he loved the 103 Psalm and 2 Cor. 4:6:

"For God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ."

No man could have been more devoted to his family than he. His widow and children rejoice in the sure hope of meeting him in the eternal morning. Miss Katherine tells of his passing: "While abounding in labors, happy in his work, and hopeful as regards the future, paralysis took unrelenting hold upon him, and he passed away as gently as a soft evening breeze."

The funeral of Mrs. Harper was conducted at Bethel Church February 3, 1954, by the writer. She was laid to rest at Magnolia Cemetery. A few days later the remains of her husband were moved to Magnolia from Bethel Cemetery and interred by her side.

"Miss Emma" taught for a number of years in the schools in the country around Grahamville, and is remembered with love by many of her former pupils, long since grown to maturity.

In 1912, she married the late Rev. W. P. Meadors, who for 39 years was a member of the South Carolina Conference. Although their years together were brief, she proved an ideal minister's wife, and their marriage is remembered by those in position to know as one of the happiest ever observed. She was noted for her kindness and sweetness of dispo-

sition, consideration and thoughtfulness of others, and these characteristics were most evident in the home. Her devotion to her husband was closely allied to her devotion to the cause he served. COLUMBIA COLLEGE
1854-1954

"A COLLEGE FOR OUR DAUGHTERS"

By R. WRIGHT SPEARS

Should women be educated? Not a difficult question today, but one hundred years ago there were some who had their doubts. Why should the people called Methodists in South Carolina bestir themselves in such a controversial issue? The task of bringing enlightenment to men apparently offered challenge enough.

Perhaps a more pointed question is "Why dare discuss the education of women here within the walls of an institution thoroughly insulated against femininity by its strong masculine influences?" Perhaps the subject is not so irrelevant, however, when one considers that now and then, even within these walls, male minds may occasionally wander toward the lovely creatures who are students in a woman's college. The irrelevancy may be further offset by the fact that this year, 1954, marks the centennial of Columbia College.

Adventure has always challenged Methodists. There was excitement in the idea of women's education about the middle of the nineteenth century! Writers agreed that the three basic questions related to this subject were: What is the place of woman? Is she capable of an education? Is her mind equal to that of man? Eleanor Thompson indicates that in these questions and their answers "were enough shades of opinion and niceties of distinction to provide preachers, commencement orators, and masculine writers for magazines, as well as women themselves who dared to express their hopes and ambitions, with more than ample material."¹

In 1835 a young lawyer, Daniel Chandler, made a commencement address at the University of Georgia. What a peculiar message for that graduating class . . . "There are in these United States," he said "sixty-one colleges, and be it said to the disgrace of the nation, not one is dedicated to the cause of female education. Who will dare, nobly dare, to introduce an enlightened system of education for women?" Perhaps this challenge was ringing in the ears of Methodists in South Carolina fifteen years later. Or were they recalling something Cato had said long before: "Romans govern the world, but it is the women who govern the Romans." Or could it have been that they heard someone say "When women are informed, men dare not be ignorant?" At any rate influences were moving in the South Carolina Conference, at the middle of the 19th century, for the establishment of a college for women.

But there were obstructions. It would mean defeating the power of

sinister teachings of the time to the point that finishing schools held the answer to madame's needs. Life was centered in the parlor. Feminine success ended in the lady's ability to preside gracefully over the drawing room, to speak enough French to give variety to her conversation, and to do her handwork with enough ease to somehow create the impression that she could work. The general idea was that she could not think. One writer was so bold as to say, "The mind of woman is more fluid, as it were, than that of a man; it moves more easily, and its operations have a less cohesive and permanent character."² Henry F. Harrington must have made his statement within the protected confines of a strictly male audience: "Woman has not the vigor and depth of thought, the accuracy of analysis, and the fidelity of judgment which are characteristic of man; and which seem to indicate his peculiar fitness to direct the helm of society." Then, as if to concede the point that woman should be retained in society on some basis he added: "Woman is not a lower creature . . . She hath in an eminent degree intenser affections, loftier sentiments, a deeper love of the pure and the gentle and the virtuous . . ."³

A sort of left-handed defense of the idea of education of women was expressed by one Mr. Fenelon: "Women in general have feebler minds than men; but the weaker the mind is, the more important to fortify it."⁴ Occasionally an editor admitted that the mind of woman was equal to that of man, but he did not necessarily believe it wise to place her in the same category of accomplishment with her male competitor. For instance, the editor of *The Lady's World of Fashion* in May, 1842, wrote: "But although the equality of woman is admitted on all hands, it does not follow that her sphere is the same as that of man . . . It is no more the business of woman to lead our armies, to vote at the ballot box, or to wrangle on a public rostrum, than it is for a man to darn her stockings, nurse children, or superintend a kitchen . . . Educate her not only to be a graceul and accomplished being, but a help-mate and a wife . . ."⁵

There were other editors of the middle nineteenth century who took an unequivocal position for progress. In *The Lily*, a popular publication of 1849, the following daring statement is found: "The intrinsic value of the human mind, and its infinite capacity for improvement are the true reasons for its cultivation in woman no less than man. The first reason for the education of every mind should be its own development. We are too much inclined to urge enlightenment of women as a sure means of improving man, rather than as in itself an intrinsic excellence, with the conviction that every mind should be educated for its own development."⁶

It was into such a setting that Columbia College was born on December 21, 1854. Methodists of South Carolina were determined that their daughters, and their friends, should be taught not simply the niceties of social emancipation, but the basic and fundamental courses for men-

tal growth. It was clear from the beginning that this should be done in an institution dedicated to Christian thought.

Columbia College was born of the South Carolina Conference. In 1851 Benjamin Wofford had given \$100,000 to found a college for men. No doubt this tremendous stimulus to South Carolina Methodism's interest in education also furnished inspiration for the woman's college. At the Conference session held in Sumterville the Board of Education reported on January 5, 1853: "There is an obvious necessity for another female college in some central location in South Carolina. The Conference then appointed a committee of five to investigate any offers on the part of towns or communities interested in the establishment of such a college.

The committee recommendation to the Conference meeting in Newberry on November 29, 1853, was rejected because the committee favored Spartanburg as the site of the new college. The Conference contended that a central location was needed. It proceeded to plan a convention of laymen and clergy to establish the college, after receiving proposals from the several towns interested.

Methodists of South Carolina traditionally have deliberated carefully when dealing with their institutions. They were especially careful in the "Female College Convention" which met in Washington Street Church in Columbia on February 8, 1854. From each of eight towns there was an offer of land and money. It is not surprising, therefore, that the journal reports that the discussion was long, that it was spirited, but that it was courteous. Finally, the Conference voted to accept the city of Columbia's offer of fifteen thousand dollars, and showed its enthusiasm by matching this with a five thousand dollar grant, and an extra five hundred dollars, provided the college would not charge tuition for the daughters of ministers. Other towns issuing invitations were Camden, Newberry, Laurens, Union, Williamston, Bascomville, and Spartanburg.

What pioneering on the part of the Conference! This college was launched without a large initial gift. No single benefactor was available. No endowment fund was accessible as a foundation. It was born of a parent organization interested in the education of its daughters. The founding hero was not an individual nor a family, but a Conference dedicated to Christian education!

The first trustees of Columbia Female College, chartered by the South Carolina Legislature on December 21, 1854, were: Andrew Wallace, James Guignard, John Bruce, Robert Bryce, W. W. Walker, Thomas H. Wade, S. S. McCulley, Dr. A. N. Talley, Dr. J. W. Parker, Dr. James H. Boatwright, William Glaze, John Veal, W. B. Johnston, Dr. Whitefoord Smith, N. Talley, William Martin, William Crook, W. H. Fleming, H. C. Parsons, W. T. Wightman, Colin Murchison, J. A. Porter, C. H. Pritchard, Dr. Joseph Cross, Samuel Laird, Dr. R. J. Boyd. A site on Plain Street, now Hampton Avenue, was chosen. G. E. Walker drew the plans, and a contract for construction was let to Clark Waring.

So excited was the Conference about this venture that the Southern Christian Advocate apologized editorially that the action had not been taken sooner. It further stated that there should be two colleges established for women, one in Spartanburg, and one in Columbia. The Conference did exactly this. The Spartanburg Female College, it should be

stated, was established in 1854 also, but was sold in 1872, eighteen years later, when it was thought that the efforts of the church should be concentrated on Columbia and Wofford.

Minutes of the Conference of 1855 gave some indication of the earnestness with which the cause of Christian education was held. A resolution signed by Bishop W. M. Wightman read: "Resolved, first, that the South Carolina Conference hold that the subject of Christian education is a matter of importance, inferior alone to the first influence of the gospel. Second, that we review with feelings of profound gratitude to God the position which the Conference has reached in its consummated and prospective measures for carrying on of the great department of our labors as ministers of Jesus Christ, and bound to consecrate to His service all the agencies under our control which affect the welfare of society."⁷

The early days of development were difficult ones. To Reverend Colin Murchison the Conference gave the responsibility for raising \$30,000 for a building. Reports have it that he would go out over the state until he had gathered a thousand dollars. Then he would return to the college to continue building until funds were exhausted. Promptly he would return to the field to raise additional funds. This leads someone to say that about the only difference between a college administrator of 1854 and 1954 is that today he drives a high-powered automobile.

The first building, valued at \$40,000, was completed after three years with an indebtedness of only \$19,000. What a story of emergence through adversity—crop failures and rising tension between Northern and Southern sections of the country could not defeat these determined Methodists.

Between 1859, when the college actually opened, to 1865, when it was necessary to close because of the war, there were three presidents: Rev. Whitefoord Smith, Rev. William Martin, and Rev. H. M. Mood. The student body had grown from 121 to over 300.

Dr. Mood, president in 1864, tried valiantly to keep the doors open. He gave in the Advocate of March 22, 1890, a vivid portrayal of Sherman's march on the City of Columbia. The young ladies were in terror. It was apparent that the city would be laid waste. Lives of the students were endangered. So, according to reports of the students, they left in carriages and by train, going toward the eastern part of the state, while Sherman came in from the west. Students from sections already overrun by Federal troops went home with students from the eastern section.

One interesting story gives the account of the saving of the college during those days of devastation in Columbia. It is said that W. H. Orchard, a music professor who had taught General Sherman's sister in a school in Ohio, was the hero. When the soldiers came to destroy the college, this professor pled with them to take a note to the general asking that the college be spared. They finally agreed, stating that if the note was not received favorably by their leader, they would return to burn the college and to take Orchard's life. He must have put music, pathos, and prayer into that note, for the institution was not touched by Northern soldiers!

The period of 1865 to 1873 brought grief and heartache to the Methodists of South Carolina. The college was closed. Indeed gloom hovered over all the colleges of the state. According to Green's *History of the University of South Carolina*, that state college had only 48 students in 1866, and Furman reopened that year, but only with utmost difficulty. Sherman did not destroy Spartanburg, so Wofford managed to remain open, but the President wrote: "I have had the hardest time I have ever experienced in my life, but I am still inclined not to give up the interest if we (the faculty) can keep body and soul together."⁹

Columbia reopened in 1873 under Rev. S. B. Jones' presidency. Dr. Jones served until 1876 when the Honorable J. L. Jones succeeded him. That year the Minutes said: "The college opened under almost unparalleled difficulty on October 14. The whole state has become a political cauldron, whose center was Columbia, the seat of the college. Parents were afraid to send their daughters away from home to Columbia. In spite of all this, the college advanced in educational and material success. During the past year (1876) the college could command only \$2,600 to pay the salary of the President and seven teachers. In hopes of a better day, the President and the teachers accepted the small amount paid to them without further claim on the college."¹⁰

Reconstruction days tested the stamina of this institution for women. The South Carolina Conference had little money to share in its support. It would have been easy to discard the whole idea of maintaining a school for the Christian education of Methodism's daughters. But, you recall, this college had been born of the Conference, and a parent does not quickly nor easily brush aside a child! In a desperate move to keep the institution open, the trustees rented the property to Dr. Jones in 1879 with the understanding that ministers' daughters be given free tuition. Dr. Jones continued in charge, renting the property, until 1881 when the church resumed control, choosing O. A. Darby as President. Dr. Darby served for nine years, when he was succeeded by the same Dr. S. B. Jones who had presided from 1873-1876.

A line from the Psalms, often quoted by Dr. Darby as an appropriate motto, indicated the responsibility which Dr. Darby and his associates felt: "That our daughters may be corner-stones, polished after the similitude of a palace."¹¹

Only extreme devotion to the cause of Christian education on the part of the leadership of the Conference brought development to the college. Strong competition came when the Presbyterians founded Chincora College in Columbia in 1890. The University of South Carolina, then called the South Carolina College, had begun admitting women in 1884 also.

From these early dates the college was known for its high academic standards. One historian said: "Columbia Female College, in addition to the traditional French, music, and Bible, found time for lessons in

kindergarten, training in calisthenics, telegraphy, photography, and typing."¹² But the majority of the study was in the serious vein. Little wonder, too, since the students were required to move on a strict schedule from six o'clock in the morning until nine-thirty in the evening. Correspondence with young men was not permitted. Visits from those of the opposite sex were not even considered. John A. Rice, Jr., whose father was President from 1894-1900, once said: "Columbia Female College, when my father became President, was an asylum to which the daughters of good Methodists were sent during the interval between childhood and marriage, primarily for safekeeping." This probably was a rather extreme statement, but it is interesting to compare the rigid social requirements of those early days with the modern practices of women's colleges. Particularly is it interesting to observe today the steady stream of week-end traffic from men's colleges which is tolerated by administrations, encouraged by parents, and obviously enjoyed by normal students.

By 1898 the Conference's interest in Christian higher education was revealed in several ways. It had spent some \$16,000 in rebuilding the college which had been partially destroyed by fire in 1895. Methodists had also assumed support of Williamston Female College, later to be moved to Greenwood and named Lander after that stalwart leader of Methodism, Samuel Lander.

Encouraged by Conference support, John A. Rice lifted the academic standards of Columbia Female College, acting upon the assumption of a few of the pioneers of 1850, namely, that young women were capable of academic treatment and opportunities equal to those of men. He even changed the degree designation from "Mistress of Arts" to "Bachelor of Arts" and from "Mistress of Science" to "Bachelor of Science." Another evidence of the Dr. Rice's liberality is seen in the fact that he had removed from around the campus a fence, which for years had offered shield and protection to the young ladies from the glances of daring young men who might, in passing, look toward the campus. He even advocated removing the word "Female" from the name of the college. This was going too far, of course, thought the conservatives, but the idea was passed to a successor who accomplished this radical change a few years later.

In 1900 Dr. W. W. Daniel became President, giving able leadership for sixteen years. In those days there seemed to be real competition between towns in South Carolina for the possession of a college. When there was a rumor, therefore, that the college might move from Columbia, attractive offers came from several towns, including Sumter, Laurens, and Greenwood. Greenwood actually offered \$40,000 to attract the college. But it was decided that Columbia Female College should remain in Columbia. This decision to remain in Columbia came by vote of 108 to 106 at the Conference of 1902. Happily, a few years later Williamston Female College moved to Greenwood, thereby giving to that city a splendid institution.

The Conference session of 1901 had considered expanding the college because of the need for additional space, but it was not until 1904 that

it voted to move to a new site. This new site of twenty acres of land was the gift of F. H. Hyatt, who generously offered also to contribute ten thousand dollars in cash. John T. Sloan then offered a tract of twenty additional acres. The Conference contributed \$17,000 and the new plant was begun.

Workmen had completed the new building, said to be one of the finest college buildings in the South at that time, in one year. It was complete with dormitories, classrooms, gymnasium, and administration offices. Apparently the college was to enjoy a period of growth and prosperity. But alas, four years later, on September 9, 1909, just as the academic year began, fire destroyed the entire building. Practically nothing was salvaged.

It is said that Dr. Daniel stood at the entrance to the college as the fire enveloped his hopes and dreams of the years. He threw himself to the ground. Prostrate and in terrible grief he called out to God in prayer for strength to rebuild. Undaunted, and unwilling to succumb to defeat, Dr. Daniel proceeded to conduct the year's work uninterrupted. Through the cooperation of F. H. Hyatt, the same old building formerly occupied by the college on Plain Street was made available.

What a heroic undertaking to conduct the affairs of a college in temporary quarters and direct the program of rebuilding within one year! By September, 1910, enough of the building was completed to permit the faculty to resume teaching on the campus. It was not until 1913 that administration offices were ready for occupancy.

Dignity has marked the demeanor of students throughout the years. But when a lapse into mischief has occurred occasionally, there has been rather strong intolerance for foolishness. The records show that in 1914 a group of enterprising students planned and executed a parade in downtown Columbia in the interest of woman's suffrage. Dr. Daniel, somewhat enterprising himself, punished the young ladies by having them remove debris from the fire which still littered the front campus.

Financially the college fell on hard days as the war in Europe began. Indebtedness rose steadily and alarmingly, so that by 1916 the college was staggering under a total debt of over \$100,000. There was a successful, heroic battle to keep the institution open. Let it be said to the glory of the faculty members that sacrifice was the order of the day! No salaries were guaranteed! Hardships prevailed! The President had to be quite an economist to be able to give each faculty member barely enough for subsistence. He said, "I am determined that no young lady is to leave for lack of funds." During these dark days three men in the city of Columbia practically kept the college open—Dr. W. J. Murray, F. H. Hyatt, and Edard Ehrlich. They provided a sufficient food supply, saving the college from collapse.

In 1916 a teacher of mathematics and astronomy, Dr. Griffith T. Pugh, became President. Daniel McFarland in his "History of Columbia College" remarks that the trustees must have "felt that a master of astronomy and mathematics was needed to handle the debt." Four years later, at the end of his administration, it is noted that the debt was substantially smaller.

Dr. J. Caldwell Guilds came in 1920 to lead Columbia College to new growth and development. During his administration of twenty-eight

years amazing progress was made. Student enrollment flourished. At long last the administration building was completed, a library was constructed, and a modern infirmary begun.

One of many accomplishments of Dr. Guilds and his associates was the raising of adequate endowment funds, and the lifting of standards generally, so that Columbia could receive full accreditation in the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. How this was done in the midst of a depression is one of the marvels of the one hundred years history. Again the faculty members took a leading role in an unselfish struggle to victory, for, in one year, 1935, they gave about \$10,000 to the endowment fund.

In 1948 the Conference decided to combine Columbia and Wofford colleges administratively with separate physical plants. Dr. Walter K. Greene, then President of Wofford, was chosen for this large responsibility, and there was one Board of Trustees. Lander College was given to the city of Greenwood. By 1950 it was thought advisable to form separate administrations for the two colleges. Dr. Greene continued as President of Wofford, and the writer was asked to serve at Columbia College.

In Review

Reviewing the century of Columbia's history, several facts are so clear that they become almost a constant refrain. First, God moves in and through this small Christian college, otherwise she could not have survived the battles of the years. It would be difficult to discover a single year during which the college was absolutely free of indebtedness. Two fires, three wars, and three major depressions would spell the finish of many institutions of like monetary resources.

Second, this college is the product of the South Carolina Conference, not an individual, nor several individuals. Through extreme adversity this Conference has always lovingly stood by her feminine creature, determined that her daughters and their friends shall have access to the best in Christian education.

Third, Columbia can step into her second century of life and work with the full assurance that South Carolina Methodists are committed to the idea of undergirding this great small college—a college for our daughters! She has a noble past, a challenging present, an exciting future!

Dr. J. Milton Ariail, beloved and esteemed professor of English, in his words for the "Alma Mater" gives the spirit which has made Columbia great, and which must chart the course for the second century:

"We sing the praise of her we love,
We lift on high her name in song,
White as the gleaming stars above,
Columbia, Mother, great and strong.
She who has been, shall ever be,
Wise, good and true eternally,
No stain shall touch the purity
Of our Columbia College.

"Her virtues we acclaim today
That all men might this of her deem
Her mission is to light the way
With learning's clearest, sweetest gleam.
Her gentle heart has made her great;
Her breath is love, she knows not hate;
Her faith that God controls her fate,
Makes brave our own Columbia.

"And here we pledge our love to thee
No matter what the years may bring,
Or what in life our lots shall be,

MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

A. General Regulations:

1. The Bishop, the Host District Superintendent, the Host Pastor, the Conference Secretary and the Conference Lay Leader shall constitute the Committee to arrange the Annual Conference program.

2. As far as applicable the parliamentary rules of the preceding General Conference shall govern this body.

3. Lay members of Boards and Committees (who are not members of the Conference) shall have the privilege of the floor for speaking to their reports.

4. Reports from Boards, Commissions and Committees, together with all resolutions to the Conference, shall be presented in triplicate. A copy of each report and resolution shall be filed with the Conference Secretary before it is read to the Conference.

5. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for the selection of persons to write the memoirs of preachers, wives and widows of preachers, who have died during the year, and to plan for a suitable memorial service. Memoirs of preachers shall be limited to 600 words, and memoirs of wives and widows of preachers to 250 words. The memoirs shall be published in the printed journal.

6. All laymen employed by the agencies of the Conference shall conform to the compulsory retirement age set for the ministers of the church.

7. No trustee, or member of the faculty or staff of any institution, or manager of any interest shall at the same time be a member of the parent or supervising board or commission, unless otherwise required by the Discipline.

8. The trustees of the Conference institutions (Columbia and Wofford Colleges, Epworth Children's Home, and the Southern Christian Advocate and Methodist Center) shall furnish to the Annual Conference annually through the supervising Conference Boards complete audits, made by certified public accountants, and these accountants must be approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

9. The Historical Society shall be an organization within the South Carolina Annual Conference in accord with Paragraph 661 of the 1952 Discipline. The membership of the Conference shall constitute the membership of the Historical Society, and the officers shall be elected by the Society. The Conference Program Committee shall provide for a time of meeting during the Conference session, and the Minutes of this meeting shall be a part of the official Conference record. An address on some subject of historical interest to Methodism shall be delivered each year, the speaker and subject to be chosen as the officers may direct, and the address to be published in the Journal and Yearbook of the Conference and paid for by the Historical Society.

10. No one shall serve on two disciplinary administrative boards of the Annual Conference at the same time.

11. No one shall serve on two boards of trust elected by the Annual Conference at the same time.

12. Any representative of a General Board or Institution of the Church seeking to raise special funds in this Conference shall work under an agreement with the Conference Board of like name and purpose.

13. All monies and reports due to be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer, and all statistical reports due to be in the hands of the Conference Statistician shall be mailed so as to reach these respective agents of the Annual Conference at least one week in advance of the opening date of the Annual Conference.

14. There shall be Annual Conference Committees on Public Worship and on District Conference Journals.

15. Members of Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees shall not serve more than eight consecutive years on the same Conference Board, Commission or Committee.

16. There shall be a quadrennial Commission on Group Insurance composed of nine members, nominated by the Standing Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

17. That the Secretarial Staff shall select from reports and resolutions, parts calling for activities by districts and charges, and have these action parts mimeographed and mailed to the district superintendents and pastors immediately following the adjournment of Conference.

18. That the Conference Program Committee arrange for the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance to be presented at a time not later than the Friday morning session of the Conference.

B. Ministerial Character and Records:

1. The Committee on Conference Relations and the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall prepare each year jointly for the Conference Secretary a statement concerning the age, domestic status, education, and ministerial experience of each preacher admitted on trial, this statement to be included in the daily journal.

2. The Conference Secretary shall prepare a biographical sketch of each preacher received into full connection with the Conference, including each preacher received from other denominations or by transfer, this sketch to be printed in the Journal and Yearbook.

C. Nominations and Board Organization:

1. The District Superintendents shall be a Standing Committee on Nominations for membership on Boards, Commissions, and Standing Committees and shall also make nominations for vacancies occurring

in same, except as otherwise provided for in the Discipline or by Conference order. Nominations to fill vacancies occurring during a session of the Annual Conference shall be made before adjournment of that session of the Conference.

2. When a minister is appointed as District Superintendent, his membership on any Disciplinary or Conference Board, Commission, or Committee nominated by the Standing Committee on Nominations automatically ceases; provided, that this shall not apply to ex-officio membership on Disciplinary Boards, nor to membership on Boards of Trustees, Boards of Managers, or service on Commissions and Committees when nominations are made by groups other than the Conference Committee on Nominations.

3. Each quadrennial Board shall be convened for organization (at which a majority of members must be present) by a District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop. The election of officers shall be by ballot.

4. Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall assume their functions upon the adjournment of the Annual Conference except as otherwise required by the Discipline or by Conference action.

D. Board of Missions:

1. The Board of Missions shall be composed of one layman from each district, an equal number of ministers, and such additional members as are required by the Discipline, (Par. 1295, Discipline 1952), but may not include optional memberships indicated in said paragraph.

E. Board of Education:

1. The Board of Education shall be composed of one layman from each district, an equal number of ministers, such additional members as provided for in the Discipline, and any member of the General Board of Education living within the bounds of the Conference, unless precluded elsewhere in the Standing Rules.

2. Every two years (even numbered years) the Board shall nominate suitable persons to be elected by the Conference as Trustees of our educational institutions, including nine trustees of the Southern Christian Advocate and Methodist Center, provided that approximately one-fourth of the trustees be changed each two years, beginning with those elected in 1948, thus providing that no trustee shall serve for a longer period than eight consecutive years. All of these institutions shall make their reports through this Board. (Par. 720, Discipline 1952.)

3. The Board of Education and the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall cooperate in nominating the Board of Managers for the Pastors' School.

F. Board of Conference Claimants:

1. The Board of Conference Claimants shall be composed of nine laymen and an equal number of ministers. (Par. 1613, Discipline 1952.)

2. Ministers serving in special fields as specified in paragraph 1618, Section 2, c, of the 1952 Discipline, shall receive annuity credit for these years, when such credit is recommended by the supervising Conference Board and approved by the Annual Conference.

G. Board of Hospitals and Homes:

1. The Board of Hospitals and Homes (Par. 1571) shall receive the annual report of Epworth Children's Home and transmit same to the Annual Conference; and every two years (even numbered years), shall nominate to the Annual Conference fifteen persons, seven clerical and eight lay, at least two of whom shall be women, to be elected Trustees of Epworth Children's Home, provided that approximately one-fourth of the trustees be changed each two years, beginning with those elected in 1948, thus providing that no trustee shall serve for a longer period than eight consecutive years. (Par. 1571, Sec. 2, Discipline 1952.)

2. Until the session of the 1956 Annual Conference the Board of Hospitals and Homes, Inc., shall continue to operate the Methodist Home for the Aging under a resolution adopted by the Annual Conference in 1953 (See Journal 1953, pages 133 and 134).

H. Board of Temperance:

1. The Board of Temperance shall be composed of eight laymen and an equal number of ministers. Of the laymen, two shall be young people under twenty-five years of age, and the remainder of the lay membership shall consist of an equal number of men and women.

I. Board of Social and Economic Relations:

1. There shall be a Board of Social and Economic Relations to be composed of five ministers and an equal number of laymen. (Par. 1559, 1952 Discipline.)

2. The Board shall make an annual report to the Annual Conference.

J. Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications:

This Board shall be composed of twelve ministers. (Par. 639, Discipline 1952.)

K. Committee on Conference Relations:

1. This Committee shall be composed of nine traveling elders. (Par. 638, Discipline 1952.)

L. Committee on World Peace:

1. This Committee shall be composed of six ministers and five laymen and shall make an annual report to the Annual Conference. (Par. 1551, Discipline 1952.)

M. Committee on Special Days:

1. There shall be a quadrennial Committee on Special Days composed of one representative from each Disciplinary Board, elected by that Board, to which shall be referred all requests for the observance of special days, with or without offerings, other than provided for in the Discipline.

2. This Committee shall prepare and present to the Annual Conference a calendar of Special Days for its approval for the Conference year, including those required by the Discipline.

N. Journal and Yearbook:

1. There shall be a quadrennial Committee composed of four ministers and three laymen, together with the Secretary and Statistician which shall publish the Journal annually. This Committee shall also estimate yearly the amount needed to (1) publish the Journal and Yearbook, (2) finance the work of the Secretary and Statistician, (3) maintain the Contingent Fund, as provided for in A-6, and report its estimate to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

2. The Conference Journal shall be printed according to the recommendations of paragraphs 652, Discipline 1952, with the Standing Rules and Statistics added.

3. The printed Journal shall be the official record of the Annual Conference.

4. A Committee shall be elected annually to examine the daily journal and report to the Conference.

O. Benevolence and Other Funds:

1. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds collected from general sources and on the budget for Annual Conference Benevolences, Administration, Conference Claimants and other funds in accord with paragraph 805 of the 1952 Discipline. These funds, as allocated to the various Boards, Commissions, and Committees by the Commission on World Service and Finance, shall be credited by the Conference Treasurer in separate accounts to the Boards, Commissions, and Committees. Disbursement of these funds shall be made by the Conference Treasurer, upon order by voucher, drawn by the Secretary or Treasurer of the Board, Commission, or Committee and countersigned by the Chairman or President of the Board, Commission, or Committee. All Boards, Commissions, and Committees drawing money in block amounts for use by said Boards, Commissions, and Committees for promotional work or other uses, shall make itemized statements of these expenditures to the Conference Treasurer as supporting evidence for his records.

2. Boards, Commissions, and Committees of the Conference receiving appropriations shall make an annual report to the Conference giving an itemized statement of all credits, disbursements, and funds credited still on hand.

P. Districts:

1. There shall be eleven Districts in the South Carolina Annual Conference.

Q. District Conference:

1. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
2. Each pastoral charge shall be entitled to one lay delegate, elected annually by the Quarterly Conference, in addition to the membership provided for in the Discipline.

R. Support of the Ministry:

1. The apportionments for District Superintendents Fund, Minimum Salary Fund, and Conference Claimants Fund shall be distributed to the several districts and charges on the basis of an annual fixed percentage of the total funds raised in the several charges during the preceding year, exclusive of funds raised for new buildings and grounds (churches and parsonages), for remodeling of churches and parsonages,

for payment of debts (principal and interest) on church and parsonage buildings and grounds, special funds (including buildings and endowment, not support funds) for Epworth Children's Home and for the Methodist Home for the Aging, and money raised for special mission purposes over and above any apportionment for benevolences.

2. The salaries and other allowances of the several District Superintendents shall be uniform. The Conference Treasurer shall, as far as practicable, remit monthly to the several District Superintendents the amounts due them.

3. The administration and distribution of Minimum Salary Fund shall be the responsibility of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.

4. The local church or charge treasurer shall remit to the Conference Treasurer the amounts collected for this purpose, along with other salary items sent to him.

S. Lay Delegates to the Annual Conference:

1. Lay Delegates and Reserve Lay Delegates to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually in each pastoral charge at least six weeks prior to the session of the Annual Conference.

2. Each District Superintendent shall transmit immediately the completed list of the Lay Delegates from his district in duplicate to the Conference Secretary.

T. Election Managers:

1. At any session of the Annual Conference where there are to be elections of Officers or Delegates by ballot, there shall be elected a

Board of Managers composed of one minister and one layman from each District, which shall conduct elections as the Annual Conference shall direct.

U. Election of Delegates—General and Jurisdictional Conferences:

1. Delegates to the General and the Jurisdictional Conferences shall be elected according to the recommendations of the General Conference in paragraph 502, Section 4, Discipline 1952.

V. Standing Rules Committee:

1. There shall be a quadrennial Committee on Standing Rules composed of five persons.

2. This Committee shall make an annual report immediately following the organization of the Conference.

W. Amendments to Standing Rules:

1. Proposed amendments to the Standing Rules may be submitted by any member of the Conference and shall be referred to the Committee on Standing Rules for consideration and report to the Conference.

2. The Standing Rules may be altered by a majority vote of the Conference with or without Concurrence of the Committee on Standing Rules.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS OF THE S. C. CONFERENCE**Contingent Fund**

A Contingent Fund of \$500.00 shall be maintained out of the funds collected for the secretarial and Journal expense; in order to finance (1) commissions, (2) judicial proceedings, and (3) other proper needs unprovided for. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of this fund and shall make disbursements on order of the Conference or of the cabinet, in the interim.

Board of Hospitals and Homes

The Board of Hospitals and Homes shall have authority to use Golden Cross or other available funds for:

a. The hospitalization of retired ministers, their wives, widows, and dependent children; widows and dependent children of ministers who have died in service, up to \$100.00 within an Annual Conference year, or more in extreme cases upon the recommendation of the District Superintendent and the pastor.

b. And also assist in the hospitalization of the deserving poor, aged and children.

c. Such expenditures upon homes as may be necessary for the comfort of the retired ministers, widows, and their dependents.

d. The Board of Hospitals and Homes shall report all expenditures under these provisions to the Annual Conference.

e. All funds for the Methodist Home for the Aging shall be sent direct to the Treasurer of the Methodist Home, Box 15, Orangeburg, S. C.

Group Insurance

The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in the askings for Conference Work, annually, an amount for insurance sufficient to pay two-thirds (2-3) of the cost of the annual premiums for Conference Group Insurance, including an amount sufficient to pay the total premium for the retired members of the Conference. These funds shall be administered by the Conference Commission on Group Insurance. The Commission shall make an annual report to the Conference of all disbursements of this fund.

Two Percent of Salaries

Every active minister of the Conference, including those on trial, and approved supplies, shall pay to the Conference Claimants Fund two percent (2%) of his total current annual salary (including travel and expense fund) regardless of the source from which it comes. However, in the case of ministers who are serving in special appointments and are ineligible to receive annuity credit under the provisions of section 2-c, paragraph 1618, of the 1952 Discipline, shall be exempted, in their discretion, from the provision of this resolution. The ministers shall be required to remit at least quarterly to the Conference Treasurer. If a minister on trial is discontinued, any amount paid by him on the two percent (2%) Fund may be refunded to him if he so requests.

Offerings for Church School Rally Day, Methodist Student Day, Race Relations Sunday, Golden Cross, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, Overseas Relief, Methodist Youth Fund, Fourth Sunday World Service Offerings, Veterans' Day, Town and Country Work, District Superintendents' Salary, the two percent (2%) of Pastors' Salaries, temperance, and all other funds not specifically directed shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

The Conference Treasurer shall make such reports as may be requested by any Board, Commission, or Committee that has an interest in the promotion and distribution of special offerings remitted to the Conference Treasurer.

Minimum Salary Scale

We hereby offer the following resolution as a substitute for the continuing resolution on minimum salary, as appearing on page 197 of the 1952 Journal of the South Carolina Annual Conference.

WHEREAS, the Discipline of 1952 provides for the fixing of a minimum salary by the Annual Conference, Paragraph 826, therefore, be it Resolved:

That the South Carolina Annual Conference fix its minimum salary according to the following scale to become operative immediately and to continue until changed by the Annual Conference.

Be it further Resolved, that the Board of Missions and Church Extension shall not add any supplemental salary to any minister re-

ceiving as much as \$3,600.00 per annum from all sources (including travel and expense fund); except in special cases of newly set up work, upon recommendation of the Bishop and unanimous consent of the Cabinet this may be raised by the Board of Missions and Church Extension, from their funds. \$3,600.00 shall be the maximum beyond which none of the following schedules shall apply.

- a. Supply Pastors serving full time, \$2,200.00.
- b. Accepted Supply Pastors serving full time, \$2,300.00.
- c. Conference members, including those on trial, \$2,400.00.
- d. Traveling Elders in full membership, \$2,500.00. This rate shall apply to any minister, whether on trial or in full connection, if he be a graduate of a standard four year college and shall have finished all resident work for the B.D. degree, or its equivalent, at an approved Theological School.
- e. Traveling Elders with ten or more years effective service, \$2,700.00.
- f. Traveling Elders with twenty or more years effective service, \$3,000.00.
- g. Any minister in the above classification shall receive \$200.00 additional if married, also \$100.00 additional for each dependent child unmarried and under 20 years of age.
- h. Where the maximum of \$3,600.00 has not been reached, and where a minister is serving more than two churches, he shall be paid \$50.00 extra for each church served beyond the first two.
- i. Supplemental salaries of students and other part-time Supply Pastors shall be adjusted by the Board of Missions and Church Extension after consulting the District Superintendent, but not at a monthly rate in excess of the Supply Pastor's rate.
