### *Antioch University New England – Environmental Studies & Sustainability*

Antioch University, located in New Hampshire, offers an MS in Environmental Studies with several different areas of concentration including Conservation Biology, Environmental Education, Advocacy for Social Justice and Sustainability, and Sustainable Development and Climate Change. A concentration in Science Teacher Certification in Middle Level Science and Life Sciences is also available and is the only program of its kind in the country. Certification programs are available in Conservation Psychology, Climate Change Education, and GIS, among others.

There is also an MS in Resource Management and Conservation, designed for working professionals who want to build on their environmental management skills, and a PhD in Environmental Studies.

An MBA in Sustainability, also referred to as a Green MBA, is “*the ideal way to prepare yourself for working in the new green economy.*” This business program is offered through the Department of Organization and Management.
